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Onkyo combines two into one for serious dual-function fun

Onkyo C-N7050 | CD player/streamer | £350

Is the Onkyo C-N7050 a CD player that can stream, or is it a hi-res streamer with a CD player built in? No matter which angle you look at it from, this £350 networked CD player aims to give you access to both worlds - for an attractive price.

EXCLUSIVE

It's a nice stepping-stone into the world of hi-fi separates, while giving the freedom to experiment with different sources before settling on a specific path – an ideal solution for burgeoning hi-fi aficionados.

The C-N7050's sonic presentation is upbeat and smooth, but edges aren't softened so much that detail is obscured. The Onkyo doesn't make a fuss with file types, either, having a forgiving balance that makes the most of low bit-rate MP3s while still retaining enough transparency to make listening to 24-bit/192kHz FLAC files a worthwhile experience.

Detail is crisply drawn and plentiful. You can hear taut strings being plucked in Public Service Broadcasting's funky *Gagarin*, while the layers of harmonics surrounding piano notes in The Unthanks' *Gan To The Kye* are conveyed with passion. Voices are direct and expressive, and it's easy to get caught up in the lovely melody.

It's a neat and tidy presentation, with enough drive and dynamic variation to keep the music enjoyable. There's a pleasing cohesion throughout the frequency range and a nicely judged tonal balance that refuses to emphasise one frequency band above another.

Cool under pressure

There's a good level of composure too, so when the music gets complex the Onkyo has the talent to keep every instrumental strand in place and under control.

Judged against a class-leading dedicated CD player such as the Marantz CD6005 the C-N7050 lacks a little bite, authority and rhythmic drive. Let's not forget, though, that it streams music across a network too.



Onkyo Remote 3 - Apple iPod/ iPhone only - £free

The control app is very useful to have at hand – provided you can access it. For now, it's available only for Apple users, is limited to iOS 8 and doesn't have an iPad-optimised version. Once you do gain access to it, the app is simple yet effective, with an interface that lets you scroll through the songs on your network with minimal delay.



USE IT WITH The Race For Space - Public Service Broadcasting

Re-live the eponymous US/Soviet scramble via this evocative, sample-sprinkled mix of meaty dance beats and alluring soundscapes. Streamed or from disc, the Onkyo's flair with detail will ensure high standards of PSB



That pleasant sonic character remains constant whether you're listening to CDs or streaming. We did, however, find that *The Imitation Game* soundtrack sounded just a touch more spacious and dynamic when streamed from our server than it did when played via a disc.

Aside from the CD drive, the only other physical inputs are two USB ports. The front USB is Apple-approved, and will play music stored on your iPhone, iPod or iPad, while also charging those devices.

You can listen to other radio or music-streaming apps, as long as it's

A nice stepping-stone into the world of hi-fi separates and an ideal solution for burgeoning hi-fi aficionados hardwired to the port. There's no Bluetooth or AirPlay to stream through, so third-party apps - such as Spotify, Soundcloud and BBC iPlayer Radio - can be played only through wired means.

The USB port at the back, meanwhile, will play files stored on a stick or flash drive. To plug the C-N7050 to your amplifier, you can choose between optical, coaxial and line-level outputs.

The streamer side of the C-N7050 has plenty of tricks up its sleeve. DLNA support means the Onkyo streamer can play music stored on laptops, smart devices and NAS boxes, as long as they're all connected to the same network. There's no wi-fi, so you'll have to plug the Onkyo to your home network using the ethernet port. It connects instantly, and recognises all devices on the network without a hitch.

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In detail...



When it comes to connecting to your amplifier, the Onkyo offers the standard choices of line-level for analogue and coaxial or optical for digital signals. 2 There's no wi-fi capability on the C-N7050, so any connection to your home network will necessarily be via the ethernet port, which, thankfully, works quickly and has universal device recognition. This is also the route for accessing the world of internet radio, courtesy of the widely connected vTuner service.

You can also tune into hundreds of internet radio stations via the vTuner service.

The Onkyo's file compatibility is extensive. From MP3 and AAC to highresolution 24-bit/192kHz FLAC and WAV (and 96kHz ALAC), the C-N7050 will play all popular music formats. It supports DSD files, too, but doesn't spin SACD discs.

If you'll be streaming files from a variety of sources, we'd recommend you download Onkyo's Remote 3 app. The simple interface makes it easy to scroll through long lists of songs, while the drop-down menu lets you jump between various sources with ease. We found using the remote handset when changing CD tracks more natural, though.

The app is free to download, but it's currently only available for Apple iPods and iPhones (see panel on p6).

Quality look and feel

The C-N7050 is well made and nicely finished too - in either black or silver. Build quality is decently solid considering the price. The CD loading tray operates smoothly, with no judders or stutters, and the mechanism is pretty quiet.

The fascia is neat and orderly rather than flashy, with only basic controls planted on the brushed-metal front panel. The three main control buttons - one each for CD, USB and Network - make switching between inputs quick and easy.

The Onkyo responds swiftly to any commands, whether from the unit's buttons and dial, or the ones logically laid out on the remote-control wand. We'd definitely keep the remote in close reach - even if we have the control app at hand as it's simple yet intuitive to use, .

Display details

This is all good news for the C-N7050 - and those looking for an affordable CD player/ streamer - but we do have one or two niggles. The player's large display is easy to read from a distance, but its single line of scrolling text looks meagre. It scrolls very slowly, and the cut-off text can be frustrating to read. We'd like a more sophisticated display - two lines, at least that gives more information in one glance.

But we can see this Onkyo having wide appeal, and rightly so. There aren't many products that can spin CDs and stream files from one box, and not for such an affordable price either. A common starting price for individual CD players and streamers is £350, which makes this two-in-one machine very attractive as a gateway to building your hi-fi system. It's a clever, feature-packed performer we urge you to consider.

Wharfedale Diamond 230 | Stereo speakers | £500 Compact floorstanders offer fine value

Our first experience of the Wharfedale Diamond 200 series was encouraging. The 220 standmounters, we decided, are the best-sounding budget speakers around - so much so that we gave them an Award.

No pressure, then, for the Diamond 230s, the compact floorstanders of Wharfedale's entry-level range. Will they be a resounding success like their siblings, or the black sheep of the family? The results are in – and these are great floorstanders for the money.

First things first, you want to give them a good run-in. Fresh from the box, you won't get anything remotely representative of their potential. Give them at least a day. We left them running for a weekend.

At which point, anything more than a cursory listen should lead to the suspicion that these are five-star performers.

The first thing you'll notice is their sense of scale. It's a big sound, easily capable of filling a big living-room. The soundstage is



tall, wide and spacious. Close your eyes and these speakers can give the impression they're bigger than they are.

Of course, size isn't everything. These floorstanders are talented in other areas. The level of clarity is certainly impressive. They deliver a clean sound, helped by precision in timing and definition. That's especially the case in the midrange, which is clearer and more detailed than we'd expect for floorstanders at this price. Vocals are engaging, as is a spot of guitar fiddling. We find ourselves rapt with attention at an unhealthy number of Johnny Cash tracks.

A crisp, punchy sound

Elsewhere, the treble is crisp but not harsh. Move down to the low end, and it's punchy and weighty while maintaining a good sense of agility. It could conceivably do with a bit more texture, but that's not lacking enough to ruin what is otherwise an authoritative, entertaining listen.

The frequency range is well balanced. Nothing distracts, or demands undue attention. We're particularly impressed with the level of integration, the drivers

performing as a cohesive whole, never giving the impression that a rogue element has other ideas.

Try free-standing and toed-in

Do take care with set-up. Wharfedale recommends placing the Diamond 230s at least 20cm from the back wall and 70cm from the sides, and we'd suggest moving the speakers around to experiment. And consider a bit of toeing-in, which helps to firm up the stereo image while sacrificing just a little of the soundstage width.

We're pleased to see Wharfedale has addressed the finish-related quibbles we levelled at the Diamond 100 series. A new lacquered baffle adds class and, where before there were unsightly bumps beneath vinyl wrap, the surface is now smooth.

This is in part thanks to a new cabinet, made with particleboard sandwiched between MDF. This provides a rigid and well-damped structure, which helps to reduce the amount of cabinet distortion.

Internally, there's a bigger magnet on the bass driver's motor system. This makes it easier to drive and improves responsiveness. There's also an upgraded crossover, which aims to improve the integration of drive units. We think it works.

Unusual bass-tuning technology

Elsewhere, the Diamonds are unchanged. The tweeter is the same, sitting in a deeply dished waveguide which helps efficiency.

Also present is the unusual bass tuning introduced in the Diamond 100 series. Instead of going with the more usual front or rear bass reflex port, Wharfedale is firing downwards into a gap between the cabinet and its plinth. This helps with port efficiency and reduces chuffing noise, and is claimed to make the speaker less fussy when it comes to placement.

We really like the Wharfedale Diamond 230s. They're talented performers, and for the money you're getting a great deal.

Bang & Olufsen BeoPlay H2 | On-ear headphones | £170 Stylish B&Os also score on sound

Bang & Olufsen is a brand we sometimes struggle with here at *What Hi-Fi*? The Danish company usually produces beautiful products that sound good, but we worry that, on occasion, people are paying a little too much for the style they're buying, rather than the right amount for the sound quality on offer. So the star rating can suffer - after all, we're all about sound per pound.

Quality kit, superior sound

With the Bang & Olufsen BeoPlay H2, we have no such worries. These are fine headphones that easily compete on sound terms with their price and sector rivals. That they are also a beautiful example of the legendary Bang & Olufsen style and quality is a rather nice added bonus.

That feeling of quality hits us as soon as we open the flap on the box. Inside, there's another box and a ribbon tab with a sign that says "Pull me" in an *Alice In Wonderland* kind of way. Follow that advice and a cardboard cover with teasing holes in strategic places has a "Lift up" instruction. And so it goes, until finally the BeoPlay H2 headphones are revealed, lying in a plush, cloth-covered, contoured tray.

It's an impressive start for these £170 headphones - and that feeling of pride of ownership only grows as we take the H2s in our hands. These are headphones for being out and about in, and they are suitably robust, made from a strong, flexible plastic and partly covered in a durable cloth. There are five colours - the Deep Red here, pink, blue, silver and green.

Built for show

These headphones are light, at 150g, and the earcups fold so, B&O says, when you're not listening, the H2s can be worn around your neck with the earpieces following the shape of your body. Fair enough.

When we first put the H2s on, we're a bit worried that they are going to be too tight - it's a problem the spectacle-wearers among the team have suffered with some other cans. The clever composite material the headband is made from is 'adaptive', however, and while the fit is snug it is reassuringly so, and it never becomes uncomfortable, even during long listening sessions. This impressive comfort may be helped by the beautifully finished lambskin leather-covered earpads. And we're pleased to report the sound of the H2s meets all the impressive standards the build quality has set. The 40mm driver and bass port in each earcup provide an easily accessible sound, as is appropriate for headphones intended to be worn out. It's warm without being overbearing, and the presentation is even across the frequency range, so no one area stands out as prominent.

Treble is clear without being too sharp or bright, and the midrange is a strength, with vocals coming across warm and intimate. The bass is just a touch tubby, but only compared with our current class favourites, the Award-winning Philips M1 MkIIs (indeed the H2s' bass is reminiscent of the original M1s'). It's not overblown, though, and that trait certainly doesn't hurt in a pair of headphones designed to be worn in the open.

> Those padded earcups cut out quite a lot of external noise - always a benefit on a crowded train - but they don't prevent you from perceiving what is going on around you, so road safety shouldn't be an issue.

There is no noticeable noise transferred from the plastic-sheathed cable when we're out and about, leaving us able to concentrate on the music.

Linsar X24-DVD | Television/Soundbar/DVD player | £300 Flat form produces full-bodied sound

Long wand well-labelled keys make it generally easy to use, although its length means it's quite a stretch from the controls etc) top buttons (channel selectors) to

A TV with a built-in soundbar: makes sense, no? Soundbars have been a popular solution for improving a TV's inherently thin sound for years now, so it was only a matter of time before someone put two and two together. Enter the Linsar X24-DVD.

The 'soundbar' consists of a pair of speakers, each driven by a 10W amplifier, and doubles up as the TV's stand. It looks a little tacked on - but its design adds no more height or depth than any typical stand would, so is undoubtedly more spaceefficient than even the slimmest of soundbars on the market.

A sound for sore ears

On paper, it works. In practice, it delivers. There's no denying the Linsar's sonic superiority over the hard, thin presentation of TV speakers. Fulfilling its purpose bang-on, its sound is a great deal fuller and richer the balance much closer to the sound we'd ideally like (but don't often get) from a standard small telly.

The midrange has significantly more body, and it's this more substantial delivery of voices that will be the most noticeable improvement during everyday viewing. It goes room-fillingly loud, and we find ourselves more than satisfied just halfway up the volume bar. Note that near the very limit, distortion creeps in.

The X24-DVD fancies itself a bit of a multimedia mogul: there's a Freeview HD tuner for TV viewing, Bluetooth for music streaming, USB inputs for media playback and recording programmes onto a USB stick or hard drive. As its name suggests, there's a slot-loading DVD player built-in too, though you'll have to invest in a Blu-ray player to play any HD discs.

The stick that's a carrot

The omission of smart services is a little mean, and we feel a bit hard done-by when bigger-screen models with lower price tags include it. Linsar's peace-offering is a free Roku streaming stick for access to a sea of smart apps (including BBC iPlayer, Netflix, YouTube, Spotify) if you buy (and register) the TV by the end of March 2015, but miss the date and it's not so charitable. You'll have to resort to a Blu-ray player again or a gaming console as your smart supplier.

Starting with Blu-ray performance, we hook up the Sony BDP-S5200 (£95) player to one of the X24-DVD's two HDMI inputs - also onboard are the likes of USB, component and 3.5mm inputs, as well as coaxial and headphone outputs.

First disc off the shelf is endearing space caper Guardians Of The Galaxy. No matter how much fine-tuning you do with colour, the Linsar's vivid colour palette struggles to find much in the way of balance without sucking the life out of skintones. so is a little on the vibrant side. The bold, somewhat artificial hues make for a punchy, dramatic picture, though we'd like a little more realism and subtlety in shades.

Though fair, contrast could do with a boost for deeper blacks and brighter whites, and there's a hint of motion instability as a space shuttle flies past too.

The Linsar's HD broadcast picture isn't perfect, but there's still a lot to like. It's impressively sharp and clean, with low picture noise, so viewers can sit close to the screen comfortably. Daylight scenes are full of punch and clarity, while darker settings prove coherent too.

Even as we drop resolution to DVD, the image is surprisingly well defined, with

colour punch in spades: in Lucy, Scarlett Johansson's red lipstick, leopard-print jacket and golden hair are radiant and lush.

The switch from the Sony to the Linsar's own DVD player sees slightly less sharpness and detail, yet overall holds the overall standard of quality pretty well.

The clean, clear and fairly detailed delivery of standard- and high-def channels is a credit to its tuner.

Value judgement

The focus is clear here. The X24-DVD (rightfully) prides itself on good sound, and with the typical cost of a smart-inclusive Full HD TV of this size around £200, asks a premium for it.

Is it too much? Probably, considering the TV's exclusion of smarts. We'd like a more natural-looking picture for a fifth star, too.

But for those craving a fuller, more exciting sound for movies or gaming than you usually get from TVs of this size (or bigger, even) and have the cash to spend, it will make a great telly for a second room. We know a good idea when we see one, and this TV/soundbar combo is exactly that.

Ruark R1Mk3 | DAB/FM radio | £200 Ruark buffs R1 with impressive results

For years, Ruark's R1 series radio has been one of those products that just works. Its gorgeous design makes it ready to fit into even the most stylish of homes, while its performance and usability has helped to secure it Award after Award.

However, 2012 was the last time we saw it in our winners' list, so when we heard Ruark was releasing an improved third generation of its desirably dinky radio, we were intrigued to find out what was in store.

Same again, but better

There hasn't been too much change to the design we know and love. It's still a small, single-speaker design, finished in your choice of walnut, black or white (though the last two are now matt instead of shiny), with all controls placed on the top.

It's a premium, no-fuss finish that looks as good as ever, and it's helped by the RI's new OLED display, which looks cleaner and sharper compared with its LCD predecessor.

Out of the box, the R1 Mk3 is a simple affair - screw on the aerial, plug it into the mains and you're halfway there.

The controls are handled by an improved RotoDial system on the top. While it looks like a regular volume knob, it also acts as the main control system for the radio, allowing you to cycle through menus and press down to select. It is flanked by a few individual buttons, for power and quick access to core functionality including the R1's dual alarms, radio presets, settings menu and selecting source.

Choose DAB from the source menu and the R1 will automatically set the date and time. We find the menus and controls so intuitive, the manual is far from essential.

As before, the R1 Mk3 features both FM and DAB tuners (futureproofed for DAB+ if and when it arrives on our shores), but a new addition is aptX Bluetooth functionality, allowing you to stream music to the R1 from your portable devices.

Add to this a line-in for hardwiring a device, a headphone output for private listening and a newly added USB port for charging, and this is quite the complete package for a radio that stands just 17cm tall. You can even make it portable, with the optional rechargeable battery "BackPack" for an extra £50.

New chipset and DAC improve sound

Of course, this would all be moot if it didn't sound any good, but luckily the R1 Mk3 sounds as good as ever. There have been several tweaks made to the internal workings of the R1, including a new chipset



In detail

The main control system is the RotoDial in the middle, but Ruark doesn't overburden this so as not to overcomplicate things - there are also buttons around the edge. Use the dial to control menus, then press down to select.





USE IT WITH Samsung Galaxy Note 4

Take advantage of the R1 Mk3's aptX Bluetooth functionality by streaming playlists from Samsung's fine Galaxy Note 4 with improved DAC and shorter signal paths in the audio circuitry.

The result is a sound that belies its size, and a performance that can top even some larger stereo models. With its rich, full-bodied character, it's sometimes easy to forget there's just a single 3.5cm driver delivering it, with bass that is deep and controlled, and a midrange that ensures everything from instruments to dialogue to vocals are delivered with detail and clarity.

There's a depth and solidity to its performance that many competitors lack, with a clean, open, engaging nature that works as well with talk radio as with music.

A confident performer

Despite its confident performance, there are some obvious limitations due to its size, and the R1 isn't going to have the power required to fill huge rooms.

What it can manage is pretty impressive all the same. It will spread wide and go loud enough for most situations, though the treble can border on thinness at volume with lesser quality broadcasts.

The Bluetooth performance is as musical and well balanced as the rest of the radio's performance, and it's a nice touch the new processor is able to extract Bluetooth track metadata too, so you can see what is playing on the RI's screen.

£200 is not an inconsiderable amount to spend on a radio like the Ruark R1 Mk3, but spend any amount of time with it and we challenge you not to want to take it home.

Pioneer BDP-LX58 | Blu-ray player | £600 Going to the pictures is a real treat

Spending £600 on this Pioneer Blu-ray player may seem excessive when you can get a high-performing one with more smart features for a sixth of the price.

But if you are a home cinema enthusiast dedicated to getting exceptional picture quality, we'd say it's well worth it. For the BDP-LX58, the more affordable of Pioneer's two premium models, is first and foremost all about performance - and when it's this good. arguing with that stance is tough.



Nice 'n' edgy

Even our Award-winning Panasonic DMP-BDT700 (£500) can't quite muster the Pioneer's incisiveness when it comes to depicting outlines. The LX58's picture is easily the crispest we've seen at this price, packing a punch to keep your eyes fixed on the screen and involved in the movie at all times.

Play a Coen brothers favourite *Fargo* and the snowy landscapes of Minnesota leap off the screen. The deep blackness of tyres, shoes and buried suitcases looks striking against them, and there are good levels of detail at either extreme.

Punchy and well grounded, colours are clean and convincing, while skintones have a natural warmth to them. Colours can appear a little on the vivid side - the redness of bloodied snow, for instance, is intense - but don't ever quite cross the threshold to looking overdone.

Commitment to realism

This player paints with a super-fine brush, too, the woodland trees in the backdrop having greater definition than through the rival Panasonic. Even as night falls on our kidnappers, the Pioneer is still rooting around to dig up detail and deliver clarity.

It puts in the work with DVDs too, making upscaling look easy. Spin Who Framed Roger Rabbit? and outlines hardly lose their cutting edge. Whether it's the red buses, green billboards or the yellow gloves of the rabbit himself. colours remain eye-grabbingly bright and punchy.

Elsewhere, picture noise is negligible and the image remains all-but-blur-free as cartoons whiz across the screen.

Sound quality doesn't disappoint, the soundfield nicely focused and balanced as we replay Fargo. Gunfire is backed by decent solidity, as is the shattering of windows as the kidnapping gets underway.

Listen to the music

For a Blu-ray player of this price, the Pioneer's music replay is up to scratch, too - particularly good news considering its music-format compatibility is unusually wide (it can play high-res files, SACD and DVD-Audio). You don't get the refinement, organisation or nuance that you would from the best dedicated £600 CD players, but load up Alicia Keys' If I Ain't Got You and piano sequences are full of life and body. Despite being less than half the price of

its bigger sibling, the BDP-LX58 still has the lion's share of its features: Ultra HD 4K upscaler (not a given at this price), 3D playback and high-res support for DSD 2.8MHz and PCM files up to 24-bit/192kHz.

You might expect a drop in connectivity from the well-equipped BDP-LX88, but it remains largely the same - save for the absence of balanced analogue outputs. A coaxial and pair of RCA outputs should be satisfactory for most, though. Two HDMI inputs are also sufficient, as are two USB slots (one at the front). Last but not least, a LAN socket gives you access to the built-in YouTube and Picasa smart apps.

Rather than throwing in ubiquitous smart features, Pioneer has put performance first

More comparable to the sturdy construction of an amp than the garden variety of Blu-ray players, the Pioneer's rigid chassis (made from aluminium and steel, and reinforced with an iron plate) is certainly built to last, and both quality and finish feel and look very nice for the price - especially considering it's the spitting image of the doubly-priced BDP-LX88.

The BDP-LX58 is another fine high-end achievement for Pioneer. While it's not the smartest disc-spinner we've come across at this level (in terms of smart functions). we find that easier to forgive when performance is up there with the very best. If you're looking to take the next (perhaps final) step in upgrading your system for a jawdropping movie experience, this is a great place to start.

Ultimate Ears Megaboom | Wireless speaker | £250 Megaboom? No, it's far better than that

UE (Ultimate Ears) already has a couple of portable wireless speakers in its arsenal: the Mini Boom and Boom. The latter is a firm office favourite and five-star product, but the range has recently spawned a big brother, the UE Megaboom.

To look at it, you'd think it was simply a larger version of the much-loved Boom. And you'd be right. It shares the same cylindrical design and styling, including the natty 'plasma-coated' finish which UE claims is stain resistant and waterproof to an IPX7 rating. So it should survive being dunked in a metre of water for 30 minutes. The speaker is topped and tailed in a rubberised material, which also runs down the middle of the speaker, incorporating a couple of volume control buttons as it goes.

Lie down to recharge

On top of the speaker are power and pairing buttons (you can also pair using NFC on compatible smartphones). On the bottom, there's a 3.5mm auxiliary input and a micro-USB socket for charging.

One thing to point out here is it's tricky listening to the speaker while it's charging. If you want to, you really need to lie it on its side or stand it upside down, neither of which does the sound any favours. On the plus side, once it's charged you should be able to enjoy around 20 hours of uninterrupted playback, unless you need to take a phone call using the built-in mic.

The speaker is designed to stand upright, so using the volume controls means gripping the speaker and giving them a firm press. Press and hold both buttons and the speaker chirps up, telling you the percentage of battery-life left. Of course, you're more likely to alter the volume via your smartphone, which also shows a battery-life indicator for the UE.

Extra features via the app

To do that, you'll need to download UE's app for iOS and Android. This opens up all the speaker's extra features such as the alarm clock function and "Double Up". Double Up allows you to hook two Megabooms together (or one Mega and one normal Boom) to listen in stereo.

The app also gives you access to the UE's sound settings. There are four presets: 'The Standard', 'Bass Jump', 'Cramped Spaces' and 'Voices'. We'd steer clear of the last three. They play around with the sound balance, but in our opinion don't improve sound quality - indeed, in most instances they make it sound worse.

We'd stick with 'The Standard' mode or, if you want to turn the bass down a notch from that, tap the Custom mode and drop the EQ levels to zero.



Even with this expanse of sound, the UE still manages to keep its composure and focus. There's solidity and precision here



We start with some classic hip-hop -Grandmaster Flash's *White Lines* does the trick - and the UE's punchy, energetic delivery comes straight to the fore. The track's bassline sounds weighty and taut (but never mega-boomy, ironically) and the speaker never skips a beat. The UE's ability to disperse sound really stands out too, and you're able to enjoy a decent spread of sound from various positions.

A composed, focused sound

Yet even with this great expanse of sound, the UE still manages to keep its composure and focus. There's solidity and precision through the bass, midrange and treble. It's an enthusiastic listen, bristling with life. Music is well-balanced, even if highs aren't the ultimate in refinement.

Playing a spot of classical music proves the Megaboom has a more subtle, delicate side too. Sooth your senses with a bit of *Swan Lake* and the Megaboom is happy to slow the pace, and let its excellent dynamics take over. Strings and woodwind rise and fall freely as the tune flows along.

A top addition to the range

The Megaboom is a great addition to UE's family of wireless speakers – indeed, it's arguably the most polished performer in the range. Battery life and build quality are excellent, and whether you use it indoors or outside, you're in for a musical treat.

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Creative Sound Blaster X7 (with upgrade power supply) DAC/stereo amplifier £430 Power pack can't quite shape up

We're astonished at just how much Creative has packed into the Sound Blaster X7's distinctive casework. It's a digital-to-analogue converter and stereo amplifier but, intriguingly, also has Dolby Digital decoding built in. Research the X7 and it's clear that gamers are a priority, the unit's features aiming to make the soundtrack of games more immersive and communication between players easier.

Decoding limits

We're curious about the Dolby Digital decoding. It works, of course, getting us a decent sound from *Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles* (on DVD), but for home cinema fans we think Creative has been a little half-hearted here. The X7 won't decode DTS soundtracks, and the high-resolution audio of Blu-ray is off the menu too.

You'll also need external power amplification (or active speakers) for surround sound, and the line-level outputs are an odd mixture of RCAs for the fronts and 3.5mm for the surrounds, centre and sub. If surround sound is a priority we think a stand-alone receiver such as Yamaha's RX-V377 (now down to £180) is a better bet.

We're not wholly convinced by the Sound Blaster's stereo performance either. Our review sample came with Creative's upgrade power supply option. Going for the standard version will save £100 over the price we've quoted, but also results in a notably lower peak power into difficult-todrive speakers. Oddly, there isn't much power difference between the two power supply options - the standard one is only a couple of watts down on the 22W-perchannel delivery of the upgrade option.

Full featuring

The on-board DAC is 24-bit/192Khz-capable. It can be accessed through a micro USB, if you're using a computer, or optical if you want to connect a games console or DVD player. There's also a full-size USB 2.0 socket to connect Android and iOS devices, and it works without issue as long as you've also downloaded the X7's app. Analogue users are catered for with a single RCA stereo input. Want to go wireless? There's Bluetooth, with NFC to ensure quick pairing.

While we appreciate all that connectivity we can't help wishing the Sound Blaster X7 sounded better. It's not terrible by any means, but it lacks the entertainment value suggested by its name and demanded by the price point. Remember, NAD's excellent D3020 has many of the Creative's features (bar Dolby Digital decoding) and costs less.

We start off using our resident MacBook as source. The sound through a pair of

Sennheiser Momentum headphones is tonally balanced and shows a decent degree of refinement. Detail levels are fair, but the unit is outclassed by something like Audioquest's Dragonfly (£130) when it comes to outright resolution, dynamic expression and rhythmic drive. We also try Grado's more ambitious PS500s (£500) headphones to see how the Sound Blaster copes with something more ambitious, but the Creative doesn't have the talent to make this a worthwhile exercise

Various artists

We try a range of files from Eminem's *Mockingbird* (192kbps) to Hans Zimmer's *The Dark Knight Rises* OST (24-bit/192kHz) and find that the X7 isn't particularly fussy about genre. It's listenable, reasonably articulate but not particularly insightful.

The dedicated app for the X7 (iOS and Android) has an impressive range of settings. Many of the functions improve one aspect of the sound at the cost of another. The 'SBX' switch on the front panel improves clarity and punch but unbalances the sound tonally, adding an unnatural amount of bass to the proceedings.

We try the X7 with speakers from Wharfedale's Diamond 220s and B&W's 685 S2s to ATC's SCM11s, and the find the unit's character unchanged. It's a decent listen, but there isn't much in the way of transparency or insight into the music. Even the upgraded power supply fitted to our unit fails to deliver the drive and dynamics the price deserves.

The Creative's spec sheet promises much, but it doesn't really deliver sonically. Our money would go elsewhere unless we could get one with a very hefty discount.

4K future

4K content: The revolution will be televised, but how? From 4K Blu-ray to broadcasts and streaming

he lack of 4K content has been a key concern that's checked the rise of Ultra HD TV. Is that about to change?

4K on demand

Netflix launched its Ultra HD streaming service last April. It has been followed by Amazon Prime Instant Video. Provided you've got the necessary kit, what do you get for your money?

Netflix, our favourite video subscription service, is, surprisingly, yet to offer any films in 4K. Its 4K service consists of 80 hours of TV and video content, including five series of *Breaking Bad*. Amazon has around 90 hours of 4K content and features 26 films. YouTube offers some 4K

content in the UK, too, but otherwise that's your lot in the streaming world. Ultraflix, currently available in the US, is one to look out for, tipped as it is to bring its 600 hours of Ultra HD content to Samsung and Sony TVs very soon.

Live TV and kicking...


The bottom line is that you can't yet watch live 4K broadcasts on





your TV. The BBC and Sky have carried out successful tests, so they do know what's required to bring 4K to your home. What's more, a recent BBC survey not only made clear the company was investigating 4K broadcasts but also suggested that a

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number of households could benefit from 4K based on average screen sizes and viewing distances. Meanwhile, strong rumours suggest BT and Sky will introduce 4K boxes sooner rather than later this year. So plans are definitely afoot.

Getting in a spin

And we will now get 4K Ultra HD Blu-ray discs, with the first titles due to hit the shelves this year. It's expected that these discs

will support High Dynamic Range technologies and sport a wider colour gamut as well. The final specs are due to be confirmed by mid-2015, and we could well see 4K Blu-ray discs on sale in time for Christmas.

All told: the scarcity of 4K content is finally being (slowly) addressed. And by the end of 2015, the option to watch 4K streams, broadcasts and discs could all be a reality...

Analysis "Are people

prepared to adopt a new 4K disc format?"

here are still plenty of people yet to be convinced by the concept of Ultra HD 4K TV. Even for the most committed AV enthusiast, the prospect of splashing out on a new TV might feel somewhat premature given the lack of content. It's hard to argue.

And yes, to an extent we're still being kept waiting, amid reports of trials, breakthroughs and more - but there can be no disputing progress is slowly but surely being made. 2015 is set to be the year it all comes to a head, but which way is the market most likely to go?

Getting a 4K TV is the easy bit. It's evident that prices are starting to tumble, and that's no surprise judging by just how many 4K sets we expect to hit the shelves in the UK this year. It's ever more likely that your next TV will be 4K.



It's clear the content is now coming, too. Netflix and Amazon's 4K services will surely grow only larger over the coming months - and we can't rule out new services. Streaming seems likely to be the easiest route to 4K adoption in the home.

4K broadcasts might be the next most likely option, and also provides relatively few barriers for adoption. Sky and BT will need a new box no doubt, while the Beeb shouldn't be lagging too far behind given its recent trials.

So what about 4K Blu-rays? They're due by the end of the year, but the hurdle is hardware. A sole Panasonic prototype is all we've seen. And how many people are prepared to spend money on a new disc format? The BDA says the discs will offer higher bitrates than online 4K streams, so the hook looks likely to be better quality. And that's something we're always happy to get behind. Interesting times...

B&W 685 S2 £500 *****

The original 685s were instant stars in their class, but the well-judged improvements brought by the S2s ensure these speakers continue to stand out "They're the speakers we'd put on to get our friends into hi-fi, and we can't think of a better reason to recommend the new B&W 685s." That's what we said about the S2s when we first tested them and, exactly a year later, we still feel the same.

For a £500 pair of standmounters these speakers are superb. No other speaker in this price category comes close to the sheer power and dynamic punch that they provide. Their layer upon layer of detail unearths nuance and texture that render instruments and vocals startlingly realistic.

Well-toned muscle

Nirvana's *Smells Like Teen Spirit* hits you like a wall of sound, the 685s packing in so much muscle and depth to the low end that you feel the aggression coursing through the grungy guitars and attacking drums. Basslines plunge deep, rumbling along with control and enthusiasm.

Each note stops and starts with neat precision. The rhythm is fast, punchy and agile - these speakers certainly know how to have fun.

Dynamically, the B&Ws are hugely impressive. They communicate the shifts in tone and the build up of tension in The Dead Weather's *60 Feet Tall* with stunning subtlety, while the top end is free to soar in a clear, spacious soundfield. Vocals are nicely expressive, full of emotion in a way that really draws you into each song.

The S2s are revealing enough for you to hear exactly which of your albums are recorded poorly, but instead of making a fuss they simply apply their trademark gusto to deliver the most enjoyable performance possible. Play your old records through these 685s and you'll feel like you're hearing them for the very first time - it's a thrilling performance.

Added protection

The cabinet itself is sturdy, and the chunky speakers come in black or white finishes. Next to the gorgeous Triangle Esprit Titus EZ speakers the S2s feel just a little plain, but they look pretty smart when perched on decent stands.

B&W's distinctive yellow woven Kevlar mid/bass cone is certainly eye-catching, but what makes us jump with joy is the sight of a metal grille over the previously uncovered tweeter. It aids dispersion and means stray fingers will no longer be able to callously dent the delicate metal. The S2 version was seven years in the making - plenty of time for B&W to work on the updates to the original 685s. Tweaks include improving the tweeter dome's rigidity to increase precision, and decoupling the unit from the cabinet to reduce vibration. There's also a new mushroom-shaped plug at the centre of the mid/bass driver for better damping. The result is a tauter, punchier bass than the original, and a clear treble that integrates smoothly with the rest of the frequencies.

A rare breed

The 685 S2s remain one of the most captivating speakers we've heard at this price. The agile, musical Triangle Esprit Titus EZs are the only others in this test able to worry them. We urge you to listen to the B&Ws - we guarantee they'll leave you with a huge grin on your face.

If that sounds like your cup of tea, you must have a listen to the Cabasse MT32 Antigua speakers.

Playing with the big boys

Yes, they're rather big for bookshelf speakers, but they do the job expected of their size: delivering a huge, room-filling sound that's wonderfully open and pleasant to listen to. Hans Zimmer compositions sound grand and dynamic, while Nina Simone's soulful voice is enveloping and full of warmth.

They have the kind of smooth detail that's wonderfully easy on the ears without sacrificing too much sonic integrity. Harsh or coarse edges on a recording are ironed out. The top end soars high and open, while voices are projected clearly.

The bass is full-bodied and eager to please, although the Antiguas don't quite deliver the punchy, commanding performance we were expecting from speakers of this size. We'd like a bit more rumble and impact at the low-end. A tauter, more agile presentation – such as that found in the rival B&W 685 S2s and Triangle Esprit Titus EZs – would do wonders for the Cabasse's slightly laid-back performance. The staccato rhythm of Trent Reznor and Atticus Ross's *On We March* needs a stricter sense of timing than the MT32s supply, but the speakers get by with the wide arc of sound they dish out. Voices could have more depth, too, while the easy dynamics that we like so much could be more subtle in the way they shift and soar.

Sure, these Cabasses are not quite as revealing as their aforementioned rivals, but it's impossible not to love that rich, open sound. It's inviting and full of enthusiasm – we could happily spend hours listening to these speakers.

Give them room

Big and boxy, although surprisingly light, these speakers demand quite a lot of space in your listening room. It's not just because they're large bookshelf speakers, it's also because they sound best when given plenty of space. Push them too close to the wall and not only will you exaggerate the quality of the languid bass, you'll also lose a significant amount of that wonderful sense of space.

Available in ebony or walnut finishes, the speakers are well built and finished, even if their plain appearance looks a little severe. The MT32 Antiguas may look humble, but their heritage can be traced back to Cabasse's high-end speakers. The 'MT' in the name stands for 'midrange tweeter', which is the DOM 37 tweeter - a design derived from the technology used in the flagship La Sphere and L'Ocean speakers (both with six-figure price tags). We wish they had retained some of those speakers' extravagant spherical design, too.

Easy-going nature

The main impression we take away from the MT32 Antiguas is just how easy and enjoyable they are to listen to. They're not quite precise, punchy or revealing enough to worry the best in this class but their spacious sound is unrivalled at this price. If you have the space for them, these Cabasses will do their best to entertain you.

Elac BS 73 £440 *****

These are beautifully assembled speakers, available in white or black - they certainly feel worth the money The Elac BS 73s could have been a great pair of speakers. A lack of excitement and dynamic subtlety, however, means that they aren't quite the fully fledged entertainer we hope for when it comes to mid-priced standmounters.

The BS 73s get off to a good start. The jangly-blues guitars on Hot Tuna's *The Terrible Operation* sound solid and detailed, with a good amount of weight to the bottom end. Drums hit with a satisfying thump in Green Day's *Hitchin' A Ride*, although we'd like more punch and vigour to the presentation.

In better company

Listened to on their own, the BS 73s sound perfectly fine. There are no harsh edges, and the drivers integrate smoothly. Set against their rivals, however, you'll notice they're quite dynamically restricted, their treble doesn't shine as sweetly as the competition, and there's a lack of subtlety to the otherwise solid sound.

The Elacs struggle to give the horns and strings in John Williams's *Hymn To The Fallen* the space to soar, and the sweeping music doesn't have the emotional pull to draw you in. The Epos K1s (the Elacs' closest rivals at £400) may not have the pleasing weight and depth to the bass that the Elacs do, but they're a much livelier and more open performer. Instruments sound more detailed through the Epos speakers, and there's a greater spark of excitement at the top end.

Energy issues

The BS 73s seem to come up short of fully unleashing their potential energy and dynamic range, with the bass sounding ponderous when it should be punchy and agile. As a result, music lacks drive and excitement. We'd like a touch more clarity too - the edges of notes can sound a little blurred.

We'd recommend letting the BS 73s run in for at least a few hours before settling down for serious listening, as they sound quite sluggish when played out of the box. Take care with partnering equipment, too. The agile and full-bodied presentation of the excellent Rega Brio-R amplifier would liven up the BS 73s' sound.

Elac has chosen a minimalist look for the BS 73s, offering just two finishes: white or black. Build quality is great – the speakers feel solid and the smooth finish is pristine. You definitely feel like you're getting your money's worth here. For anyone concerned with space, these are fairly compact speakers, with a 15cm mid/bass driver that takes up nearly the entire width of the cabinet. They won't look out of place in a small room. Be wary of poking the 25mm soft-dome tweeter - it sticks out, unprotected, and we'd feel more comfortable if there were some sort of cover shielding it from probing fingers.

Fighting with the big boys

The Elac speakers are in formidable company. They do have price on their side (£440 is only a notch up from the budget speaker price range) but then the superb Award-winning B&W 685 S2s are another short jump up at £500. The Elacs are decent speakers, but they need to offer greater clarity and precision, and a punchier rhythm, to compete with the very best.

Epos K1 £400 ****

The Epos K1's fascia is pure, with only a slot port and the drivers to break the line. Optional magnetic snap-on grilles are also available **The Epos K1** bookshelf speakers are ideal if you're on a tight budget, have a small listening area and are looking for decent performance. At £400, these compact speakers are a tempting offer.

There's lots we like about the Epos K1s. They sound solid and lively. Detail definition is decent, with enough energy and dynamics to get you snapping your fingers and tapping your feet in time with the music. It's a smooth, weighty sound that's a pleasant listen.

Complex problems

We like the even tonal balance of the speakers. There are no hard, bright edges to the horns in Quincy Jones's *Blues In The Night*. Nor does the bassline in The White Stripes' *Seven Nation Army* turn into a woolly, booming monster.

The K1s give a performance to match their capabilities - and price range - and while they may not be as transparent, precise or powerful as class rivals, they deliver an inoffensive sound that's easy to listen to. On the flip side, they can be overwhelmed by complex arrangements. They don't quite have the authority and subtlety to fully convey the dramatic, dynamic upheavals in Hans Zimmer's *The Dark* *Knight* soundtrack, and we could do with more nuance and clarity from voices here too.

It's always worth bearing in mind, though, that the K1s cost £400. The Award-winning B&W 685 S2s offer more excitement and insight, but they will cost you a hundred quid more. The Cabasse MT32 Antigua speakers (also £500) offer a bigger, wider soundstage, too, but the K1s have a more focused soundfield that's best suited to smaller rooms - they would be lost in a large listening space.

The Epos K1s are simplicity defined. Our review sample's white finish is startlingly minimal, with no distinct markings or branding on the clear, smooth fascia. The two drivers (a 25mm tweeter and a 15cm mid/bass driver) are similarly plain: all black, with no visible screws or any shiny accents.

Minimal fuss

The minimalist design will appeal to many, while others may find it a touch too stark. Next to the distinctive designs of the Triangle Esprit Titus EZ and B&W 685 S2 speakers, the Epos K1s look rather nondescript. The speakers are nicely made, though: edges are smooth, build quality is sturdy and there's the option to biwire them. You can also get the K1s in black, while a wood finish will be available later in the year. Magnetic snap-on grilles are also available for £30 per pair.

Active transformation

The KIs do have a neat trick up their sleeve: you can transform them into a pair of active speakers. The removable rear baffle (held on with screws) makes it easy to switch the passive crossover for an active alternative (an upgrade Epos will be releasing later this year).

Sure, if you shell out an extra £100, you get the astounding B&W 685 S2s. This may seem like a reasonable jump, but for some, £400 is the absolute limit. And the Epos K1s make a convincing case for themselves. They may not be the most exciting, but don't overlook them.

Focal Aria 905 £600 *****

From solidity of build to fidelity of sound reproduction, the Aria 905s cut an impressive figure. The 13cm cone is made of flax, which is light and well damped If you want a serious sound for serious money, the Focal Aria 905s are just the ticket. Their ability to deliver each thread of sound with the utmost competency is commendable – even if it comes at the cost of a little bit of fun.

Crisp, clear and precise, the Focal 905s are a hugely accomplished pair of speakers. Detail is abundant, and delivered with unerring control.

The stops and starts of notes are punctual. The staccato, electronicsounding drum beats in the intro to Radiohead's *15 Step* are organised and hit their mark, while the Aria 905s confidently handle the dynamic shift into the more melodic, soothing guitar strums. The tinkling xylophone in Alt-J's *Ms* sounds sweet but also has a bite to it, while the taut bassline does a great job keeping in time with the nimble rhythm.

Clinical efficiency

The Focals are ruthlessly efficient they know exactly how each instrument should sound, how to convey a vocal nuance, how far the dynamics are allowed to soar, and how tightly controlled the entire rhythm needs to be. We just wish they would let loose and have some fun. Next to the unbridled power and gleeful punch of the B&W 685 S2s, the Focals sound a little too controlled and serious. The Award-winning B&W speakers plunge ahead and have fun playing whatever you throw at them; they don't shy away from digging up grungy, crunchy textures around a bassline. The nasal twang in Stevie Nicks' voice on *You Can't Fix This* is politely subdued through the Focals. The B&Ws sound more soulful.

Placing the speakers close to a wall adds some much-needed heft to the sound. The Focals' mature presentation is admirable, but a touch more heart and emotion would make it a truly engaging performance.

Varied material

Wood, glass, leather and metal - there's a lot happening with the Focal speakers' design. The various materials and panels are fitted together expertly, and the solid, sturdy build shows how much work has been put into these £600 speakers. You get the choice of a high-gloss black or walnut finish too.

Some may find the design a bit too hectic, especially when compared with the simpler, more elegant designs of the Triangle Esprit Titus EZs or the B&W 685 S2s. Focal's signature inverted-dome tweeter adds a distinctive touch, however, while the 13cm flax cone's well damped character ensures the 905s' precise nature.

Unwanted prints

The finish isn't faultless. The leather base of our review sample was easily damaged by Blu-Tack (which we often use to fix speakers to stands), and the glass top is a fingerprint magnet.

The Focals have all the right ingredients, but they lack a touch of spice and zest. Confidence and competence are excellent qualities and for some, just what they're looking for - but we want speakers that enjoy playing music as much as we enjoy listening to it. These are talented speakers, but it wouldn't hurt the Focals to let their hair down and have more fun.

Tannoy Revolution XT 6 £600 *****

This next-generation speaker is definitely worthy of the lauded Revolution name, even if its integrated plinth makes life tricky if you want to use stands When a hi-fi manufacturer reinvents one of its most successful ranges, we're excited and cautious in equal measure.

Tannoy's new Revolution XT range has the weight of expectation behind it. The original Revolution series spawned many Award-winners, so it's only natural to expect great things from this redesigned range. The XT 6 standmounters are the first to come under our scrutiny. And we've come away excited.

Game played with enthusiasm

Play *The Imitation Game* soundtrack and the XT 6s zing through the fluid piano chords and the soaring strings with alacrity. These are nimble, speedy speakers. Give them a synth-heavy Nine Inch Nails track, or the lilting, exotic vocal quirks of Björk, and the XT 6s will happily deliver each note in a precise, attacking manner.

The Tannoys deliver a wide arc of sound, with plenty of space for individual strands to breathe. Detail is crisp and refined, with the midrange sounding particularly fluid and expressive.

We'd like a bit more weight and muscle to the XT 6s' sound, though. The XT 6s have a lean presentation - great for agility and timing, but less good for the layers of rich, textured detail needed to fully engage our attention. Rivals offer a punchier, more full-bodied sound that's more satisfying to listen to.

The squelchy bassline in *Wildfire* by Sbtrkt never puts a toe out of line, but it's not quite as rumbling and textured as it should be. The grungy, thumping drum beats in Marilyn Manson's *Killing Strangers* lack the muscle needed for a satisfying impact. B&W's 685 S2s (£500) have the appropriate weight and power to show exactly how it's done.

We'd recommend placing the Tannoy speakers close to a wall, as it adds some solidity and punch to the sound. Be wary of partnering the speakers with any bright-sounding equipment, too, as you don't want to exaggerate that lean character.

Elegant and functional

The XT 6s look smart. The trapezoid cabinet (the shape helps reduce internal standing waves) is as sturdy and beautifully made as ever. The 'XT' in the name stands for 'extra technology', reflecting the changes on the new series. Firstly, Tannoy's signature Dual Concentric driver has been redesigned to improve the integration between the tweeter and mid/bass driver, but the more obvious change is the addition of a fixed plinth. There's a downwardfiring port that exits into the gap between the cabinet bottom and plinth, which makes sense when the XT 6s are standing on a table or on a bookshelf. But ideally you want to place them on dedicated stands, and in that context they can look awkward. We'd like a sleeker design.

Compelling sound

These Tannoys are certainly speakers to watch out for. Their fluid, lightfooted presentation and crisp detail are pretty compelling - we just wish there were more brawn and richness to the sound they produce.

Triangle Esprit Titus EZ £600 *****

You might not find these speakers as readily available as those from more prominent marques, but their zesty sound is worth tracking down **Look at that** shiny tweeter horn. Look at it. Listen to that exciting, captivating sound. Can you blame us for being a little bit in love with the Triangle Esprit Titus EZs?

The Triangle speakers race across Public Broadcasting Service's *Gagarin* with unfettered enthusiasm. The drums hit with precision, while the taut strings are funky and nicely textured. The fanfares blare triumphantly - the surge in dynamics is as subtle as it is rousing. The Triangles capture the upbeat, agile tone of the song perfectly, and their energetic, insightful delivery is riveting.

Fit for action

Looking at their petite dimensions, you wouldn't think the Tituses capable of lashings of deep, cavernous bass. And you'd be right, they aren't. You'll have to go for the B&W 685 S2 speakers if you're after big-scale power and low-end authority, but the zippy nature of the Triangles make even the punchy 685s sound like they need a few miles on the treadmill.

They're admirably precise and transparent. The atonal, mangled tune of Tom Waits' *Bad As Me* has befuddled bigger, pricier speakers than the EZs, but these compact bookshelf units take it in their stride. The clangorous drums and creeping, blues-tinged melody make perfect sense through the Tituses, which keep a taut hold on each instrumental strand to deliver a thoroughly engaging and cohesive performance.

Waits' intensity is palpable, his voice veering between sinister and cartoonish, and yet the Tituses effortlessly convey each subtle nuance and quirk of his performance.

The only chink in the Triangles' armour is a rather excitable treble. It sounds quite harsh and aggressive when you listen to the speakers from new. Give them a few days to run in, though, and the top end smoothes out considerably, sounding richer, fuller and more integrated with the rest of the frequencies. We'd still avoid partnering the Tituses with any bright or hardsounding equipment, though.

Premium and no mistake

Compact and beautifully built, the Tituses are hugely desirable speakers. The walnut finish of our review sample feels and looks of a premium quality - it makes all other speakers at this price look underdressed. If the woody look is not your thing, white and black gloss finishes are available for an extra £100. The star attraction is that titanium tweeter. Some in this office are attracted to shiny things, but the horn-loaded tweeter looks more elegant than bling and the aggressively pointy phase plug gives the design a distinctive touch.

Getting the balance right

The mid/bass driver uses a new cellulose cone that's been engineered to strike the right balance between lightness and rigidity. A listen to the Titus' taut, nimble low end shows the hard work has paid off.


The Triangle Tituses might be difficult to track down compared with some better-known brands, but they're worth the trouble. They're more than just a pretty fascia, too: these gorgeous speakers are talented enough to worry our Award-winning B&W 685 S2s.

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TEST VERDICT



They've had to fight hard against varied and talented opposition, but the dynamic and subtle **B&W 685 S2s** continue to keep their rivals at bay and claim the honours at this price

e have to hand it to them - all seven speakers in this test performed admirably. Each had a distinctive sonic flavour that made us pay attention, and we've come away elated that the mid-priced bookshelf speakers market is saturated with such competitive and entertaining options.

Two peas in a pod

Elac and Epos share many characteristics: compact, minimalist design and a lower price compared with rivals. But it's the Epos K1s that win out here. They may not have the insight and precision of the Triangles, but the K1s are nicely detailed and have a smooth balance. They cost just £400, too.

We wish the same could be said about the Elac BS 73s. While they sound perfectly fine in isolation they lack the energy and drive to really grab our attention.

The Focal Aria 905s, on the other hand, are serious about getting every aspect of their

sonic performance right. The rhythm is spot-on, the bass is taut and the top end soars but never sharpens. They should be a shoo-in for top marks, but they just lack the ability to have fun. More expressive dynamics and extra bass kick would help a lot.

If stark precision and control isn't your cup of tea and you'd prefer to be enveloped in a huge, spacious bubble of sound that's utterly pleasing to listen to, the Cabasse speakers are the ones for you. They're full-bodied and smooth without sacrificing too much detail, and the eager attitude is hugely enjoyable, even if the bass gets a little out of hand. Give these big boxes some space in your room, and you'll marvel at how open and expansive they sound.

Reputation maintained

Tannoy has a reputation to uphold, and we think the company can hold its head up high with the newly designed XT 6 speakers. More muscle and weight to the low end wouldn't go amiss, but the lean presentation means the speakers can be agile, accurate and attacking. We're in two minds about the look of that integrated plinth, though.

And now we come to the two stars of this test. The entertaining B&W 685 S2s have been firm favourites for over a year, but the new Triangle Esprit Titus EZs have wowed us with their incredible agility and that gorgeous finish. If we could give both of them the win we would, but it's the B&Ws that ultimately get the nod. The Triangles can be fussy with partnering kit, they're £100 pricier, and harder to find – but we'd make the effort as they're such a talented and desirable pair of speakers.

The B&Ws remain unmatched when it comes to dynamics, bass depth and punch, and they have the subtlety and control to support that immensely captivating sound. They're just so much fun to listen to, and that's what makes us keep coming back to them. The 685 S2s are the undeniable champions.

Sony

New for 2015: Android TV, YouView, hi-res audio, ultra-thin design

Sony's TVs are coming out fighting in 2015. For starters, all sets will run on the Android TV platform, promising a cleverer user experience, new menu system and smarter integration with mobile devices. We've experienced Android TV first-hand and the initial signs are promising. The voice search function seems a big step up from what we've experienced on rival platforms.

Eyebrows were also raised at Sony's promise to equip certain TV ranges with YouView. Launched in 2012, this catch-up and TV-on-demand service has many admirers, and could be a shrewd move by the Japanese giant. It's a chance to differentiate itself from rivals, at least until Freeview's equivalent, Freeview Play, rolls out. It will be interesting to see how YouView, Android TV and Sony's smart TV set-up mix together.

Key ranges:

X90C (KD-65X9005C, KD-55X9005C) Not that any flatscreen is particularly portly these days, but Sony claims its X90C range boasts the world's thinnest 4K TVs. And, at only 4.9mm thick, they're slimmer than some smartphones. Given that Sony has chosen to put OLED on the back-burner, the X90C looks well-positioned to bring the wow factor back to the brand.

X93C (KD-65X9305C, KD-55X9305C) Sony's wedge design made its debut in 2014 and it's back for 2015. Once again, the speakers use Sony's magnetic fluid technology but they're presented in a new configuration, where a forward-firing woofer sits below a mid/bass driver and tweeter.

High-res audio is still a huge part of Sony's plans for 2015, and support for high-quality files has now trickled down to its TV sets. This range (together with the step-up X94C series) can handle high-res, and supports 24-bit/96kHz FLAC files played over USB.

S85C (KD-65S8505C, KD-55S8505C) Sony introduced its first curved screens at the end of 2014, and they proved a big hit in our test rooms. We're hoping for more of the same this year at more affordable prices - last year, Sony's 65in curved offering entered the market at just shy of £4000.

New for 2015: Ultra HD 4K OLED, WebOS 2.0, Wide Colour Gamut, Quantum Dot, Harman Kardon sound

We've been waiting for the Holy Grail of Ultra HD 4K and OLED in one set, and LG has promised it in 2015. No fewer than five ranges (curved and flat) boast this killer tech combo. LG managed to drop its OLED TVs into the realm of the affordable in 2014, with the 55in 55EC930V priced at £2000. The addition of 4K will push prices up again, but not by too much (we hope). LG has solved any flatpanel sound woes with a stand-cumsoundbar. And its 77EG990V goes from flat to curved in 6 sec Picture quality is high on LG's agenda, with a host of new technologies making their debut in 2015. ColourPrime claims to boost the way its top-ofthe-range 4K sets reproduce colour, and is available in two different versions: Quantum Dot and WCG (Wide Colour Gamut).

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WCG uses a combination of new backlighting technology and a colourenhancing filter that LG claims produces more accurate colours. It's available on the UF950V series at 55in and 65in.

Quantum Dots are nano-crystals that range from two to 10 nanometres in size. Each emits a different colour depending on its size. A film of these dots is added to the front of a TV's LED backlight, which affects colour and brightness. This tech isn't exclusive to LG, but will be on LG's UF940V series of 4K televisions.

We were huge fans of LG's WebOS smart platform and 2015 sees the launch of WebOS 2.0, promising quicker loading times and navigation for the user. There will also be greater personalisation, and a new version of LG's Magic Remote with enhanced gesture controls.

This LG set doesn't attempt to defy the laws of physics; instead, it comes equipped with a TV stand-cum-soundbar, thanks to LG's partnership with Harman Kardon.

New for 2015: 4K Pro, Firefox OS, High Dynamic Range (HDR)

Panasonic's new 4K sets will be powered by a new operating system, Firefox OS. It will incorporate a new, personalised Home Screen 2.0 where you can add your favourite channels, apps and devices to customisable 'decks'.

Panasonic claims its new 4K Pro picture engine and 4K Studio Master Processor will allow full native playback of HDR content. Netflix has promised to start producing and streaming content filmed in 4K HDR in the future. High Dynamic Range claims to deliver improved contrast. colours and brightness, and the technology looks likely to be adopted by all the key players at some point in the nottoo-distant future.

Key ranges:

CR850 (TX-55CR852B, TX-65CR852B) We haven't seen any curved TVs from Panasonic until now. It has three ranges, CR850, CR730 and CR430. The flagship CR850 features a fullarray backlight with local dimming



and uses Panasonic's new 4K Studio Master picture processing technology, designed to bring more accurate colours, contrast and brightness.

CX800 (TX-40CX802B, TX-50CX802B, TX-55CX802B, TX-65CX802B) If you're looking for Panasonic's premium flat 4K offering. it comes in the shape of the CX800 range. This shares the same backlight technology and picture processing used in the CR850 range above. Both ranges also use panels that feature Panasonic's new Wide Colour Phosphor technology - it claims to use less energy than an equivalent Quantum Dot panel yet still produces a much wider spectrum of colours.

And the rest?

Philips TV announcements are scheduled for the 16th March 2015. Early indications are that virtually all Philips screens will, like Sony, run with the Android TV platform. Philips also promises a revamped user interface and, of course, its Ambilight tech. Expect the usual gamut of Full HD, 4K and curved sets.

There's a cloud of uncertainty hanging over Toshiba. In January, it announced it was ceasing sales operations in North America and licensing its TV business to Taiwan's Compal Electronics, citing a number of factors including a slowdown in the global market and "harsh price competition". At the time of writing there's been no specific news for Europe, although we've been reassured shops will be stocking Toshiba TVs this year.

In the latter part of 2014, Sharp announced it would be entering into a brand licensing agreement with the Slovakian company Universal Media Corporation (UMC). Consequently it's currently undergoing a huge reorganisation in Europe.

At CES, Sharp announced new 4K sets, including THX-certified models and a new SmartCentral 4.0 operating system for the US market. As with Toshiba, we've been assured there will be Sharp TVs in the UK this year, but concrete information is yet to emerge.

Samsung

New for 2015: SUHD re-mastering engine, Tizen smart platform, 'Chamfer' design

Samsung's SUHD remastering engine uses nano-crystal technology, and in many ways is its take on the Quantum Dot technology being used by the likes of its main rival, LG. Samsung claims SUHD will allow for greater performance where colours, contrast and brightness are concerned compared with 2014 models.

Streamlined Smart Hub

2015 will also see Samsung use Tizen, its own open source platform, as the driving force behind its smart TV operating system. This means a new streamlined look for Samsung's Smart Hub, where you'll find recent and recommended content.

You'll be able to pair Samsung devices via Bluetooth and use Quick Connect to beam video content from a smartphone to the TV (and also TV programmes to connected devices) even when the TV's turned off.

Key range JS9500

This flagship series will be curved. 4K Ultra HD and feature SUHD technology. As previously mentioned, the range will be powered by Samsung's Tizen operating system.

All the screens in this new line-up will showcase Samsung's new 'Chamfer' bezel design, which claims to add more depth to the screen.

ometimes we just want to be alone with our thoughts and our music - but the world has other ideas. There's the annoying bloke on the train home talking too loudly on his phone, the chorus of babies wailing on a long-haul flight or just the general hubbub of an office that we'd rather do without.

That's where noise-cancelling headphones come into their own. Using internal and external microphones, they judge your surroundings and block outside noises, leaving you to enjoy your music without interruption.

There are brands that have made a name for themselves in this arena, and some promising newcomers here to challenge them. And it's high time to see how they all fare.

Beats Studio 2.0 £270 ****

Carrying the tagline "an icon

remastered", these are the successors to the classic Beats Studio cans. Perhaps most interesting here is the brand's reconsideration of the 'Beats sound' - a bass-heavy character that gave the original Studio headphones a bad name among audiophiles when they launched.

The Beats Studio 2.0s are now said to be tuned with "balance and accuracy" in mind. We'll see about that...

The design is still very much Beats, if perhaps a little more refined. They're still headphones to be seen in, available in a range of colours, with the now-iconic "B" logo emblazoned on each earcup.

The originals felt somewhat bulky, but these are lighter, and the foldable design makes them an easy portable companion. A case is included, as well as two cables - one with, one without inline controls.

The rechargeable (via microUSB) battery allows for around 20 hours of active noise-cancellation. Less than with some rivals - and there's no passive playback if the battery runs out - but it should cover you for most situations.

It's a relatively comfy fit, with the soft, thick leather earpads preventing any feel of clamping. The headband would benefit from some better padding in place of its rubberised finish though.

The Beats Studio's efforts at noisecancelling make an impact on the noises around us, but not to the extent that something like the Bose QC25s can offer.

If you're a fan of classical music, there is another thing to be aware of with Beats - there is a not-insignificant hiss when ANC is on. It's hardly noticeable with livelier tracks, but quieter, more subtle recordings can reveal it.

Hip-hop is still their thing

While there has undoubtedly been a change in the Beats Studio's character, these headphones still lend themselves to the likes of pop, hip-hop and rock music the most - anything lively will bring out the best in these cans.

They're an exciting, upfront listen, and can fill your ears with some serious volume. The bass has been refined so it's better balanced in the frequency range, and never overwhelms the midrange or sounds heavy-handed in the mix.

Let's be clear: anyone looking for a neutral pair of 'phones will find there is still a tad too much bass here, but it's a balance that works better than it did. The midrange is clear and open, and the treble crisp without ever being hard. Throw them a complex rhythm and there's agility and fluidity on show, and large-scale dynamics are portrayed with confidence and expression.

Vocals could have a touch more body and subtlety to them, and quieter sections of music don't offer the insight or expression found in some rivals.

It's ultimately a presentation that aims to be likeable rather than analytical, with finer detail smoothed off in exchange for a more forgiving character.

We can't argue with that - it's a clever tactic that will serve these headphones well with a lot of people. We would just like to see a touch more refinement and transparency in order to bestow a fifth star upon them.

Bose QuietComfort 25 £270 *****

For years, the Bose QuietComfort 15s were our go-to noise-cancelling headphones, winning our Award for the category four times in a row. For a while we wondered if anything could ever beat them. Then came their successor.

The QuietComfort 25s are an improvement in every way. Whether it's design, aesthetics, performance or noise cancellation, Bose has built on every aspect that we loved in the QC15s and made it even better.

Superb noise-cancelling

When it comes to noise cancellation, you won't get better than this. They are remarkably good at blocking out the consistent sound of an airplane engine, for example, but do a good job at taking the edge off an office environment too.

Switch on the noise cancellation while you're wearing them and you'll feel the ANC kick into action with powerful effect, creating a vacuum-like feeling between your ears and the headphones. You get used to it within a few minutes but it's a strange sensation to begin with.

The ANC runs via a single AAA battery, which should offer around 35 hours' life - and the QC25s do work passively should you be caught short. They're quieter and lose a significant amount of clarity, detail and balance when used this way though, so try to keep a spare battery with you.

When used as they should be, the QC25s offer a well-balanced presentation, without ever leaning towards any part of the frequency range.

This means the low-end doesn't have the weight of the Beats Studios or PSB M4U 2s, but what it lacks in muscle it makes up for in agility and precision.

It integrates well with the midrange, which is smooth and open with plenty of detail and clarity. We love the insight on show here too - pianos have depth and texture to every note, while percussion sounds believable and never unduly harsh.

Even-handed and mature

Despite the balanced presentation, the QC25s strongest point has to be their sparkling, open treble, which soars all the way up to the highest notes without a hint of hardening at any volume.

With such even handling, the QC25s are at home with any musical genre. They have the insight and maturity to handle subtle classical tracks, but can produce the drive and attack required to take on faster pace rhythms with confidence.

There's a precision to the way notes start and stop too, and while the QC25s steer just clear of making the sound analytical, it does make them seem a little more restrained when compared to something more up-front and fun, such as the PSB M4U 2s. Which balance works for you will come down to taste.

The QC25s won't win any awards for devastating good looks, but they're light and comfortable to wear for hours at a time, which counts for a lot. There's a lot of plastic here, but it feels solid and durable, and keeps the weight down.

So what do you do if something ain't broke? Well, if you're Bose, you go ahead and tinker with it anyway, producing a new product that's better in every way.

Philips Fidelio NC1 £250 ***

Philips has had a good run of five-star cans of late, so when the Fidelio NC1 noise-cancelling headphones were announced at CES 2015 we couldn't wait to see if the Bose QC25s had a competitor for their noise-cancelling crown.

With a design even smaller and lighter than the QC25s, the NC1s are seriously portable - crucial in this arena - and helped further by their collapsing design.

Perhaps rather strangely for a pair of noise-cancelling headphones, though, is that the NC1s have gone for an on-ear rather than over-ear design. As it turns out, the Philips don't suffer too much from this - at a decent volume, white noise is hard to pick up during music playback. Office environments don't fare quite so well, with conversations and phones creeping in fairly easily.

A design for life

Otherwise, the design works well. The NCIs look more stylish than the Bose QC25s, with a sleeker design made up of aluminium on the cups and a soft-touch material on the headband. The cable is a sturdy woven design, available both with or without inline controls, and there's a carry-case to provide protection. Being slender and lightweight, the NCls are very comfy to wear for long periods, the memory-foam and leather earpads doing well not to heat your ears.

The battery for the ANC is rechargeable via microUSB and will last around 30 hours on a full charge. That's pretty impressive, though if you ever are caught short without juice the NCIs are capable of passive playback, and do a surprisingly good job at it too.

We ran the NC1s in for two full charges before we started testing and even then they continued to improve - it will be worth giving them a lengthy bedding-in period if you want the best from them.

When it comes to performance, the NCIs show plenty of bite and attack, but sound noticeably smaller than something like the PSB M4U2s, and don't show the same level of separation and space as the Bose QC25s. The presentation tends to lean towards the upper mids and treble, leaving precious little warmth or body in the low end.

Ellie Goulding's *Burn* is a good example of this, the electronic synth melody ruling the roost while the drum bassline - though taut - takes a backseat, with very little power to be heard. This dialled-back low-end can leave vocals sounding harsh and vulnerable at certain frequencies without the authority to balance them out, and the leading edges to some notes to sound hard too.

Strangely, turn off ANC and you'll find bass is boosted. You lose some clarity, but add much-needed warmth and body. Detail retrieval is decent and insight is good, though we're not convinced of the NCls' ability to handle complex rhythms.

These cans are unfortunately not the roaring success that we were hoping for, often finding themselves held back by their size and design. Noise cancellation is surprisingly decent but ultimately the 'phones sound as small as they look. As it is, the Bose QC25s offer a lot of what's attractive about the NC1s in a better thought-out, better-realised package.

Polk Ultrafocus 8000 £260 ****

Polk Audio may be one of the biggest hi-fi brands in America, but in the UK it's still making a name for itself. The UltraFocus 8000 headphones are the first over-ear cans we've reviewed from the brand, and join the competitive noise-cancelling market at this price.

There's no arguing that the Polks are on the bulky side. Although they come with a carry-case they don't fold down like the PSB M4U2s, making them less than readily portable. Still, despite a largely plastic finish our review sample feels relatively sturdy, with colour options of white and bronze or black.

Instead of placing controls on the cable, which offers a flat, durable design, Polk has put them on the right earcup. It sounds like a good idea, but in practice it is a bit fiddly, plus you hear a plasticy click in your ear every time you skip track or change volume. Not ideal.

The fit is snug but not uncomfortable, though we do find our ears get hotter more quickly than with competitors.

A single switch handles noise cancellation, and without it turned on music won't play. Beats Studios also operate like this, but the saving grace in the Polk's favour is that they operate on two AAA batteries rather than being rechargeable - so just make sure you always have a spare set handy. Depending on your usage, you should get 40-60 hours of playback before you need them.

The noise-cancelling on the Polks is reasonably effective but not infallible, and some outside noise can creep in. We'd say they block out a bit more than the Beats Studio, but don't come close to the levels of quiet offered by the Bose QC25s. But then, not much does.

Upbeat and inclusive

Like the PSBs though, the Polks offer a really big sound. They're not quite as powerful or as spacious, but they're just as confident and display real enthusiasm for most genres of music, with a preference for lively, upbeat material.

The Polks tip the balance in favour of a deep, warm low end. While they stop short of being overpowering or boomy - in fact the bass is quite controlled feed them a bassy recording such as Jay Z's F.U.T.W. and it becomes a touch overemphasised for our taste.

The midrange is never muddied though, and is delivered with focus and clarity. Vocals are direct and full-bodied, but can lose a touch of intimacy in more delicate recordings.

For the most part, the treble is crisp and controlled, but it does lack a bit of refinement. Play a brighter recording like Of Monsters And Men's *Little Talks* and while you'll hear plenty of detail, there's a hint of coarseness too. The 8000s are never flustered by complicated rhythms or complex instrumentals though, yet can begin to sound congested under those conditions, lacking the more open presentation of the Bose QC25s.

Overall, these are good headphones. There isn't enough for us here in terms of refinement and balance, but they will pump plenty of life into your music. For a more even-handed, refined approach, we'd look elsewhere, but for an engaging, exciting listen, these cans tick both boxes.

It's been over two years since we first reviewed the PSB M4U2 headphones. While competitors have been replaced and updated, the M4U2s have stayed the course unaltered. They remain as popular as ever, so we thought it was time to take a second look.

PSB might not be as familiar to you as some of the other brands it shares this test with, but it has been producing speakers for more than 40 years. The M4U2s are one of just two pairs of headphones it produces, the others being a purely passive model.

Big and comfortable

This is a big pair of headphones, though the folding design does help their portability somewhat. Their size also makes them a little on the heavy side when compared with something like the Bose QC25, but the well-padded headband ensures your head never feels the strain, and large soft earpads keep them comfortable over your ears.

The pads are replaceable, with a spare set included in the box, alongside a 1/4in adapter, a second cable without inline remote and a carry case. You'll need two AAA batteries to power them. Most competitors use only one, but with two you can expect around 55 hours of ANC playback - a clear benefit.

Passive, active, noise-cancelling

As well as the ability to turn noise cancelling on or off (they'll work passively), the M4U2s offer an extra option to activate the amplifier without noise-cancellation for a supposedly cleaner, more powerful sound. This will also help to save the battery life on any portable device, as it won't need to work as hard to drive the headphones.

The noise cancelling on the M4U2s is pretty effective, and with the earpads offering a good amount of isolation you get a convincing feeling of being shut off from the world. The Bose QC25s best them in absolute noise-cancelling terms, but it's not a bad performance.

There's a clear difference between passive, active and noise-cancelling modes. Passively, playback is quieter and the treble has a harsh, thin edge to it. Move to active and you get a betterbalanced sound and more volume, but any noise around can be heard.

Switch up to full ANC and you get the best performance of the three, with

noises all but disappearing and the headphones sounding their best.

It's a full-bodied and exciting listen, never holding back in any area. The weighty low-end packs plenty of punch in the bassline of Dr Dre's *The Watcher*, with enough sparkle and control in the top end to counter this.

Change pace to Katie Melua's *Piece By Piece* and the M4Us deliver a clear, open midrange, with the soulful vocal full of confidence and texture body. The guitar has depth and texture to every strum, and detail levels are superb.

Dynamically the PSBs are no slouch either - they'll devour high-tempo tracks with enthusiasm, but can be equally brooding and delicate when asked.

This, then, is a multi-talented pair of headphones indeed.

Soul Jet Pro £250 *****

Following an attempt to take on the likes of Beats by collaborating with rapper Ludacris back in 2011, Soul disappeared from our radar for a while, until we recently bestowed five stars on a pair of its sporty in-ears (February

2015). A perfect time to take a look then at these stylish noise-cancelling cans. The difference between the original

Jets and this 'Pro' version comes down to about £50 and a premium, more stylish finish. There is an aluminium and leather-look headband in place of the plastic on the originals, and a solid construction rather than one that folds down to be more portable.

You'll also get a 99.99% oxygen-free copper-stranded "professional audio cable" alongside the standard inline remote cable (exclusive to the Pro version), a 1/4in adapter and a leather carry-case in the box.

A lightweight, comfortable fit

Internal electronics are the same as on the standard Jets, so we attach the pro cable to get listening.

The design is relatively lightweight and we find the fit comfy enough to wear over extended listening sessions. The earcups aren't as padded as some and though this doesn't affect the comfort level, it does mean they aren't as good at passive isolation compared with something like the PSB M4U 2s.

Dulling, not blocking

Noise cancellation could be better too. Office noise is dulled but not convincingly blocked out, while more constant sound, such as airplane noise, is noticeable, particularly with quieter recordings.

Start playing some music and the news doesn't get much better. The Jet Pros are hollow-sounding, with little body or depth to their presentation, almost as if you are listening to your tunes in a big wooden box.

The bass is boosted and sits forward in the mix, but lacks punch or impact. Listen to Nicki Minaj's *Truffle Butter* and the bassline sounds bloated and soft, with a powerful low rumble but very little detail to go at, making them sound a bit cumbersome and imprecise.

In fact, detail is lacking across the frequencies, with a muddy midrange and vocals that sound like they're being sung behind a window, losing any finer detail or emotion in the process. Dynamically the Jet Pros are pretty flat too, so you'll lose the impetus of livelier recordings while also sacrificing the intimacy of quieter ones.

Strangely, switch off ANC (powered by a single AAA battery) to listen to them passively and we'd say they sound a touch better - unusual in this category of headphones. There's a slight thinning of the treble but the bass is better balanced and the midrange is cleaner, with better clarity across the board. It's still a sound that's very much below par for this price point, but it is a saving grace of sorts.

For all their good looks, the Soul Jet Pros fail to impress, with sound quality far off the best and noise cancelling that needs improvement too. You can get both much better elsewhere, which makes these difficult to recommend.

f you're in the market for a pair of noise-cancelling headphones, you'll be looking for the right combination of sound quality, noise cancelling prowess and portability. For us, that's exactly what makes the Bose QuietComfort 25s so good. We loved their predecessors and these are better in every way, offering a wonderfully balanced, easy-listening sound and astonishingly good noise cancellation. They make five stars look easy.

Joining them in five-star glory are the PSB M4U2s. Their balance is more upfront than the QC25s, with plenty of low-end punch, and their flexibility with noise cancelling is a nice touch. They are nicely portable, too. At four stars we have the re-imagined Beats Studio and Polk Audio's UltraFocus 8000. While neither will be for audio purists, the full-on bass of the Beats is now better controlled than it was, and the Polks offer plenty of detail as part of an exciting, upfront sound.

The Philips NC1s were something of a disappointment, their on-ear design leaving them at a disadvantage, while the Soul Jet Pros underwhelmed us with their muddy sound and poor noise cancellation. Unfortunately, they are a prime example of style over substance.

And so to our test winner. A finely balanced sound, excellent portability and the best noise cancellation available seal it for the Bose QC25s.

obody ever asked for inferior sound, but they got it anyway. Even worse, they got used to it. The advent of MP3 players saw to that.

These days, for many, convenience is of greater importance than sound quality when it comes to music consumption. An entire generation of casual listeners has never experienced what the artists and engineers intended.

The answer, it appears, lies in high-resolution audio. For years it has been hailed as the next big thing of the audio world. Finally it emerges from the shadows of total nichedom.

We care about sound quality, and we believe everybody should benefit from better sound. And we're making it our mission to lay it all out. Here's everything you need to know about high-res audio: the facts, the myths, and the other.

The theory

The first rule of high-res audio club is: nobody knows anything. There seem to be no rules. High-res audio has been crudely described as high-def TV for the ears. That's not untrue but, unlike TV, high-res audio has no list of universal criteria to be met. There are merely contradictions bouncing around the 'net.

So what is high-res audio? Ideally, it's the same resolution as the original recording. It's more notion than definition at this point, but that's the closest the industry has come to

unanimity. Things got a little more official when some important people got together and hashed it out in June 2014.

An agreement was reached by Sony Music Entertainment, Universal Music Group and Warner Music Group, in partnership with the Digital Entertainment Group, the Consumer Electronics Association and The Recording Academy.


That was far from the final word, but we do at least have something to work with. They define high-res as "lossless audio that is capable of reproducing the full range of sound from recordings that have been mastered from better-than CD-quality music sources."

Better than CD

Quality, in this case, refers to the efficiency of the way music is converted to a digital file. This digital file usually takes the form of Pulse Code Modulation, PCM. The waveform is represented by two parameters: sampling rate and bit depth.

The sampling rate is the number of times the signal is measured per second. Bit depth is best thought of as the accuracy of the measurement. On a standard CD, a sample is taken 44100 times per second, or 44.1 kilohertz (kHz). Each sample is measured to an accuracy of 16 bits (or binary digits).

Put it together and the resolution of a CD is 16-bit/44.1kHz. To be 'better-than CD', a track must have bigger numbers. A higher sampling rate means a higher upper frequency (the maximum frequency that can be reproduced, according to digital theory, is half of the



sampling rate). A greater bit depth means more information is taken by each sample.

With more information to play with, high-res tracks potentially have greater detail and better-developed dynamics. Dynamic range increases with bit depth.

A CD (16-bit) has a dynamic range of 96dB (roughly the sound of a passing train), while 24-bit increases that to 144dB. Away from the theoretical, that impressive figure of 144dB is reduced by the electronic noise inherent in

recording and playback equipment. High-res audio is generally available in 24-bit at 96kHz or 192kHz, but also comes in 88.2kHz and 176.4kHz. Incidentally,

How much data?

The more information a file contains, the more space is needed. That's why MP3s took off in the early 2000s: memory was pricey, devices didn't offer much memory space, so files needed to be tiny in order to get enough of them on board.

In the chart on the right, you have the most common file types, laid out to show how much space they each take up. The 24-bit/192kHz line on the outside of the wheel takes up the most space because it contains the most information.

If you're serious about high-res audio, you'll certainly need a big hard drive. Thankfully, memory is a lot more affordable now, so many devices pack plenty of storage – and if they don't, more often than not they provide slots for you to add your own memory cards to increase.



24-bit/96kHz is the resolution the Japan Audio Society takes to be high-res.

Thus high-res audio promises to bring listeners closer to the sound musicians and engineers were working with in the studio. The more you hear, the more you feel. What's the point of music if not to move you?

Fun with formats

Beyond the 'better than CD' yardstick, there are currently no rules governing high-res audio. File formats are a freefor-all, with high-res audio files available in FLAC, ALAC, WAV, AIFF or DSD.

All of these are lossless, so data can be compressed and uncompressed without losing information, unlike MP3. But none of these is a telltale indicator of a high-res file. None of these formats promises to be more than 16-bit/44.1kHz.

That being said, FLAC tends to be the most common form of high-res. It scores points over WAV for better handling of meta-data, which is the information in music files responsible for ensuring your tracks display cover art along with artist and title details.

Tried and failed

The concept of high-res audio is nothing new. The turn of the century saw the introduction of Super Audio CD and DVD-Audio. Both of these offered sound quality that many considered to be above that of the humble CD, but they both failed to hit the mainstream.

This was down to a lack of demand brought about by poor marketing and

You don't need to fork out exorbitant amounts of money to benefit from high-res audio. There are some perfectly sensible set-ups around, parts of which you may already own. Over the next few pages you'll see our suggested set-ups for various situations: desktop. multi-room. mobile and traditional separates.

We start off with the desktop kit: a computer, a DAC, and a pair of headphones. Here we've used an Apple Macbook Air (which we nabbed off one of our reviewers) but any computer will do as long as it is capable of handling high-res files. (It's worth noting here that iTunes is not able to handle FLAC

files - there is after-market software that can rectify that situation for you.) Your laptop will also need the ability to output audio via USB.

Which leads us to the next part of this simple system, the AudioQuest DragonFly v1.2. This is our favourite affordable DAC, offering astonishing sound-for-pound value in a package the size of a memory stick. It can play files up to 24-bit/96kHz, with higher-resolution files downsampled by the computer. The DragonFly is simple to use, with a single 3.5mm output and compatibility with Apple Mac and PC alike. Just add headphones and you're flying.

The headphones we've chosen are the Philips Fidelio M1 MKII, another of our Award-winners. They're comfortable and portable, but most crucially they offer a fun, refined listen with detail aplenty and impressive precision.

Multi-room audio has really boomed of late. Sonos's monopoly is no more, with brands old and new throwing multiple hats into the ring.

Our favourite affordable choice is Bluesound, from some of the folks who pioneered hi-fi company NAD back in the '70s. What you get is ease of use and high-resolution audio (up to 24-bit/192kHz) combined in one impressive system.

We begin with the Bluesound Vault, which is an all-in-one music server and CD ripper. It offers 2TB of storage and the ability to rip CDs in FLAC, all without a computer. It happily incorporates other music stored on your network (say, on NAS drives). The Bluesound Powernode is a standalone, stereo streaming music player with a built-in digital amplifier.

Its job is to take your music from the Vault. It's worth remembering that streaming high-res audio over wifi is pretty bandwidth-intensive, so consider hard-wiring the Powernode with an ethernet cable. Outputs cater for stereo speakers and a subwoofer.

Into the Powernode we would plug a pair of Wharfedale Diamond 220s. These are top-class budget speakers: they sound excellent, delivering meaty bass with far more power than we expect from a boxes only 32cm tall.

the confusion caused by the format war. And there was a frustrating trickle of content, which tended to prioritise such audiophile staples as jazz and classical.

Storage has long been an issue: it was very expensive. Portable MP3 players thrived by squashing all your music into low-quality files. With high-res, all the extra information means much bigger file sizes. A 192kbps MP3 takes up 1.44MB per minute, compared to 34.56MB per minute with a 24-bit/ 96kHz file. That's 24 times the space.

Once more unto the breach

This time, it's different. High-res audio has built up momentum like never before, thanks to a decided and fairly coordinated drive in hardware and software.

There are now entire ranges of highres audio products, from streamers and DACs to one-box player systems. Brands big and small are having a crack at it, including Astell & Kern, Naim, Chord, Cambridge Audio, Samsung and Sony.

Portable players have also seen a push in high-res, thanks in part to the falling price of memory. This is important, as most non-audiophiles do their listening when out and about. Since 2013, a great many flagship smartphones have shipped with high-res capability.

That's not including the standalone portable music players - Sony has used high-res to rejuvenate its Walkmans.



Qobuz high-res album downloads from £10 A French site offering both a music-streaming service as well as downloads. The streaming maxes out at CD-quality, but downloads go up to 24-bit/192kHz. The collection isn't huge (and there is a lot of classical), but there are bargains to be had. Björk's Vulnicura costs £9.59 at 24-bit/96kHz.



Linn high-res album downloads from £18 Linn offers what it calls 'Studio Master' downloads, which come in ALAC and FLAC and go up to 24-bit/192kHz. A Studio Master album costs £18, or it's £10 for CD-quality.

Meanwhile, rock legend Neil Young has Pono, his own brand of portable player (as well as a music service).

So what is there to play?

Which leads us to software. Record labels are finally getting their act together. There's a healthy number of sites selling high-res downloads, and it's not limited to Brahms or The Eagles.

There is new content from current artists, available at the same time as (sometimes even before) general release. Take Björk's *Vulnicura* (review p75): a 24-bit/96kHz download was available a full month earlier than the CD release.

Increased public reach is helping this high-res drive, according to research by the Consumer Electronics Association. Its latest study found that 40 per cent of US consumers were aware of hi-res audio, while 37 per cent are actively interested.

This is far from the entire picture, but it's a sign that high-res may not be quite as niche as before. Things are looking good for high-res audio. It's all there, waiting for you, and if you care about high-quality sound, this is an excellent time to hop on. But should you?

The reality

The goal of high-res audio is simple enough: get better sound. Who can argue against better sound? Before you dive in, though, there are practicalities to consider.

The Foo Fighters' *Sonic Highway* costs £7.92 at 24-bit/44.1kHz. Meanwhile D'Angelo and The Vanguard's *Black Messiah* is £12.99 at 24-bit/96kHz.



Naim high-res album downloads from £17 Hi-fi brand Naim has a nifty sideline in high-res music. Naim Jazz and Naim Classical are joined by Naim Edge, which offers contemporary and 'artistic freedom'.

It's very easy to get caught up in numbers. After all, 'bigger numbers, better sound' is an easy concept to grasp - not to mention highly tempting to the marketing folk. So a 24-bit/192kHz recording sounds better than 16-bit/44.1kHz one, right? Not always.

The argument against

A popular argument is that high-res audio is overkill, and that CD-quality is good enough. The sampling rate of 44.1kHz was chosen for CD because it allowed an upper frequency limit of just over 20kHz - the upper limit of what humans can hear.

The way digital works means there has to be a very strong filter just above this upper frequency, which prevents phantom signals from adding distortion. This filtering unfortunately brings its own distortions, which end up affecting the audible range.

Raising the sampling rate, therefore, is a means of taking unwanted filter effects much further from audible frequencies. Numbers are great to throw about, but there are more significant factors that affect the worth of a high-res file.

The bigger picture

High-res files are not all created equal. There are recordings touted as high-res that are merely CD rips, up-sampled to the correct resolution. These are not high-res in any meaningful sense. To

combat this practise, some companies label their records as 'studio master' where it applies.

A high-quality original recording is, of course, a must. If music is engineered poorly, it doesn't matter how high your numbers go because it won't make the sound any better. You'll just get a more accurate rendition of a poor original signal.

Then there is the issue of care. Highres files and CD-quality alternatives aren't necessarily treated the same. A studio is likely to take more care when engineering high-res files, as they are intended for more discerning users.

A high-res studio master downscaled for CD release, meanwhile, will often be degraded, and there are losses involved in stepping down the resolution. It may also be engineered for less discriminating uses, such as in-car or for commercial broadcast. Many CDs are compressed in a way that sacrifices dynamics and quality in the quest for loudness.

Death Magnetic - a cautionary tale

Let's rewind to 2008, when Metallica released *Death Magnetic*. This album is one of the best examples of poor production, attracting a huge number of complaints about over-compression and distortion.

There was even an online petition demanding the album be remixed or remastered, which attracted over 22,000 signatures. Meanwhile, frustrated fans took to ripping songs from the album

that were featured on the *Guitar Hero 3* videogame, which sounded better, having been sourced from different master material.

Then there's the issue of hardware. What are you using to listen to your high-res music? If your equipment isn't transparent enough to reveal the differences, you have no chance of hearing them.

You don't need to spend a year's salary on high-end systems, but freebie earbuds just won't do. Check out our example set-ups dotted around this feature.

Hear ye, hear ye

Should you go high-res? That's a question only you can answer. You may

find yourself stepping into a larger world of higher quality and increased dynamics. You may be entirely ambivalent, or unable to hear a difference, in which case you stand to save yourself money and effort.

We've heard it all. We've streamed from Spotify, spun CDs and downloaded full-fat, studio master quality 24-bit/ 192kHz FLACs - and we've heard differences. If the stars align - if the initial recording and mastering process is up to scratch, if the subsequent download contains all the information in the master, and if your high-res system is worthy of the name - you've never had a better chance to hear the sound the musicians intended.

Yes, you can go high-res on the go. While there are a quite a few standalone portable high-res players, they aren't always the most affordable.

Most flagship smartphones these days are capable of handling high-res. If you're getting a smartphone anyway, you might as well get one of these, and avoid having to carry another device.

Take the Samsung Galaxy Note 4. It's a pocket multimedia monster, and a great portable media centre. Besides its massive screen, it also offers support for FLAC files up to 24-bit/192kHz. Its sound is enthusiastic, with admirable rhythm and drive. It's balanced and detailed. Pair this with the AKG Y5Os: well-built cans with insight, good timing, impressive clarity and punchy dynamics. Their design may be a little flash, but you also have a choice of blue, yellow, or black.

There are good arguments for desktop, multi-room or portable listening, but for us nothing beats a good sit-down with a traditional separates system. What we've assembled here arguably provides the best sound you can get for £1650.

Your source here is the Pioneer N-5OA. It's a new network audio player, with many tricks up its ample sleeves. It can take virtually any file format you can throw at it. Connections are varied, offering local and web-based streaming goodness, as well as physical inputs (optical, coaxial, USB). All that, and it sounds fantastic too. If you're after network streaming, this ticks many, many boxes. We'd connect that to the Arcam FMJ A19, the brilliant integrated stereo amp that took home a Product of the Year gong at our 2014 Awards. Its build and connections are impressive, but not as much as the big, room-filling sound. You get bags of subtle, revealing detail, as well as strong dynamics and remarkable composure.

Top it off with the B&W 685 S2s. Not only are they also Award-winners, they've proven themselves again by winning our latest Supertest (see p26). They really are a superlative pair of standmounters, with an authoritative, thrilling sound and remarkable agility.

ith flagship tellies peaking at around 75-or-so inches, the ultimate big-screen cinematic experience still comes from having a quality projector at home.

For less than £1500 you can get up to 300in of picture from some of the units here - each of them new to our test rooms.

Projectors remain the pinnacle for the cinema aficionado, with all the pleasures of sitting in a darkened room with your favourite film or box set running on a large screen. Today's projector has plenty more to offer though: 3D playback seems to be standard now at this price, as are built-in speakers, multiple HDMI inputs and USB slots for media playback. We're also seeing wireless connectivity and DLNA functionality on board.

Read on to discover which of these big-screen behemoths is best for you.

After starting out in the PC market, Acer decided to spread its wings, becoming a respected brand in the world of smartphones and tablets. Most recently it has made a brave foray into wearable technology. Along with all that, the company is known to produce projectors as well - and here we have the flagship model in its new 'home' range.

Three is a magic number

Most rivals have one or two HDMI inputs, but the Acer has three - handy if you're bypassing a home cinema amp and connecting sources directly into your projector. There's a host of analogue connections too (such as VGA inputs for laptops), and the potential for wireless playback by means of an optional wireless adapter (not included) that plugs into one of two USB sockets. The spare USB allows for playback of media files stored on a stick. while DLNA functionality allows you access files over your network via the projector's LAN input. The 'media' hub interface is nothing flashy, but it is easy to follow.

It takes a few minutes longer than usual to get up and running. This is partly

due to the lack of adjustable feet, which can make positioning a little tricky (especially when the projector is placed in a position lower than the screen).

Versatile performer

We're pleased to report the H9505BD performs consistently with Blu-ray, DVD and 3D content. It's capable of a clear, bright (thanks to its 3000 lumens) picture - edges are crisp, if not quite as sharp as the best. We play *TT3D*: *Closer to the Edge* on Blu-ray and the Acer shows respectable contrast: white details on bikes. and the black biker-jackets are convincing. Motion is mostly smooth you have to put the Acer through fast-paced scenes to notice it's a little rougher round the edges than the Epson EH-TW6600 or BenO W1500 in this test. The Acer's colour rendition is far from washed-out, but colours don't have that 'pop' factor or enough subtlety to convince. The same flaw applies with detail. The H9505BD's efforts are decent, but more subtlety is needed for it to compete with the very best.

Play the same film in 3D and, again, the picture becomes a little messy when motion is involved. It's not so bad as to hinder our enjoyment, but it is noticeable.

With only a six-watt output from the built-in speakers, it's little wonder the Acer's sound is restricted and unable to reach the same volume of rivals, but then again you won't have to worry about fan noise – it's a polite purr (though you will have to sit close by to hear movies clearly).

The Acer has its qualities: connections are decent and picture quality wins points for good clarity and brightness. Unfortunately, rivals best the H9505BD on performance at almost every other turn.

The W1500 is the next model up from the current Award-winning W1400 in BenQ's 'W' series, so it comes with plenty of expectation. And it copes with the burden admirably. Although not quite a class-leader like its smaller sibling (as the four stars awarded here shows), the W1500 maintains high standards.

Initially, it's hard to tell the W1400 and W1500 apart. They look identical and are fairly evenly matched for specification: both DLP projectors are Full HD (1920 x 1080), support 3D and have the same contrast ratios (10,000:1), brightness levels (2200 lumens), zoom (1.6) and throw ratio (1.07–1.71).

Down to the wireless

However, the W1500's wireless ability helps justify the extra spend. With the supplied transmitter plugged into the HDMI socket of a compatible source (a Blu-ray player or gaming console, say) the projector can beam its picture to a screen without a direct connection. It's easy to set up, too. If you do prefer a physical connection, there are plenty: twin HDMI inputs (helpfully located on the left-hand side for easy access), a

mini-USB, PC, component, RCA inputs, and a 3.5mm input and output.

This short-throw projector gives you a screen size of up to 84in at a distance of two metres, so it is ideal for small rooms where the projector and screen need to be close to one another (of course the zoom offers leeway here).

All the right moves

The W1500 has all the right performance assets at this price: it's bright and controlled, with good insight and solid colours. It's not as eye-catching as the Epson, yet we find the BenQ convincing. Skintones are impressive, while true blacks and vivid whites make for exemplary contrast.

Load *Harry Potter* on Blu-ray and, as the battle on the broomsticks takes off, the BenQ doesn't miss a beat. Even in low-light scenes it shows a good eye for detail, although it's not quite as perceptive as the fine Epson EH-TW6600. When it comes to 3D, the W1500 is clear, stable and has depth, making it an enjoyable watch. We turn to *The Grand Budapest Hotel* on DVD and the W1500 maintains its standards, losing only the insight you'd expect with the resolution drop. With striking aesthetics and vivid colours, this film is a good test. The BenQ complies happily: colours are deep and rich. Detail is decent too.

For sound the BenQ is clear, goes reasonably loud (fan noise being no more than a gentle whirr) and, surprisingly, has a decent amount of body. For TV viewing or gaming it will do the job.

The W1500 can't quite muster enough punch or subtlety to gain the full five stars, but there's no doubting its appeal. A very decent all-round performer.

The EH-TW6600 is, like many an Epson to have come before it, a seriously competent projector. Its picture is rich, punchy and insightful, and the complete package when it comes to build and ease-of-use. Epson has consistently been winning five stars of late (and an Award), so we've come to expect quality from the projector giant - and this EH-TW6600 doesn't let the side down.

Compare and contrast

The specification sheet here looks standard at this price point: Full HD, 3D playback (as well as 2D-to-3D conversion) and a decent number of connections. Then you discover the 70,000:1 contrast ratio – seven times higher than most rivals. The proof is certainly in the picture. Deep, oily blacks and punchy whites (even without the 'Super White' mode on) appear from the very first frame of our THX Optimizer disc.

on Blu-ray is a picture full of detail and subtlety - every whisker on Rocket the racoon is perceptible, and the tree-like Groot is precisely outlined. The EH-TW6600 sets the standard for sharpness at this price, edging the BenQ W1500 by a pencil shaving or two. It doesn't trip up with motion either. Fight sequences take place without a hitch.

Gravity has depth

3D performance is impressive: it's just as stable, detailed and clear as 2D, and communicates a good sense of depth as we look through the space shuttle in *Gravity*. Contrast remains the best in class, while our only grumble remains the richness of some colours. There's a pair of active glasses in the box (a three-minute charge gives three hours use; 50 minutes for 40 hours), although you may need to budget for a second pair.

Even when dropping down to DVD quality the Epson still manages to deliver big-screen thrills. It's hard to tell the difference in resolution as we play sci-fi thriller *Lucy*. You have to move up to the pricier EH-TW6600W for wireless connections (hence the 'W' suffix), but the EH-TW6600 is still well equipped. Easily accessible around the back are the usual component, composite and RCA inputs beside two HDMI inputs. A single USB for photo playback is a nice bonus, too. The mini-USB is only for service.

The Epson's 20-watt speakers are rear-firing, so are ideal if you're sat behind the projector. But if that's not practical, don't worry: they can belt out sound louder and clearer than most.

Overall, it's another resounding success for Epson. If you don't care much for wireless features or portability, you can't really go wrong for the money.

Since the arrival of 4K in the world of home cinema, Full HD has increasingly become a 'standard' spec. So it's surprising to still see products being made with lower resolutions, especially those with four-figure price tags.

The IN5312a has only a 1024 x 768 resolution, which means it not only has to upscale to play DVDs (like its Full HD rivals), but downscale Blu-rays, too. (The more expensive model of InFocus's two-strong IN5300a range has a 1920 x 1080 resolution).

Lighten up

Resolution may put the InFocus a step behind rivals on paper, but it does deliver 6000 lumens - double the measure of brightness of most at this price - so it could be ideal for rooms with a lot of ambient light. The result? An impressively bright picture that gives films a glowing presence. Beam *Killer Joe* on Blu-ray, and daylight scenes in the Texas trailer park are coherent (though colours aren't as rich or punchy as we'd like). Lots of brightness is often a trade-off for contrast, and although the InFocus's contrast ratio is only 2000:1

The InFocus remote control is nicely designed, with bright back-lit buttons and a ridge on the back for a more ergonomic effect The InFocus delivers 6000 lumens –double the measure of most at this price – so it could be ideal for rooms with a lot of ambient light. It's an impressively bright picture that gives films a glowing presence

(the norm is four or five times higher) whites are clean and blacks have reasonable depth. A fair amount of detail helps make for a watchable picture too, although under closer scrutiny it's clear some subtlety is lost here.

Struggles with dark matter

Clarity suffers in low-light conditions and dark detail is too easily lost: in a low-lit caravan, furniture in the background is hard to make out, and Matthew McConaughey's black gloves and cowboy hat lack texture. There's a hint of motion blur as the camera moves around the caravan, but motion is really only an issue in faster, action-packed scenes.

3D glasses are not included here, but if you're willing to spend the extra £50 per pair it won't go to waste. Though not particularly detailed, the 3D picture is coherent enough - clear, bright and holding up well with depth and motion.

The menus are helpfully blown up on-screen, though a little problematic in layout. The InFocus's single HDMI port is outnumbered by most rivals, but isn't disastrous when sources are, typically, plugged into a home cinema amp. Elsewhere there's a generous smattering of connections: composite, component, 3.5mm and RCA inputs. A USB and mini-USB port are present, but they're solely for power and service respectively.

Ideally you will want a dedicated sound system, but the projector's two built-in 3W-speakers are adequate. If you sit close by, it goes loud enough for films to be heard above the fairly loud fan.

InFocus has been off form recently, and the IN5312a is not a turning point. The sub-£1500 projector field is hugely competitive, and this projector struggles against more talented and cheaper rivals.

THE WINNER

Epson EH-TW6600 £1400 ****

From beam to screen, the **Epson EH-TW6600** is our top pick for superb colour, contrast and detail



Products with four-figure price tags rarely fall into the 'budget' end of their respective category. It's the case with projectors, though. When you factor in the cost of a source (a Blu-ray player, say) and a screen as a minimum package, (and costlier again, a home cinema amp and 5.1 speaker package) you're talking serious cash. So you need to make the right choice.

There are two projectors in this test that will make part of a great set-up - but the Epson EH-TW6600 is unquestionably our top pick. Like its sibling, the EH-TW5200, it wins on performance, with an eye-catching colour palette, gorgeous contrast and, even more importantly, an eye for detail. And if you're a fan of 3D movies then its clear, bright performance gives you all the more reason to invest.

Anyone with particularly inflexible set-ups or a small room (or both) might favour the impressive BenQ for its wireless ability and compact build. And judging its performance, purchasing the BenQ wouldn't be a bad move - the W1500 isn't quite as insightful or punchy as the Epson, but its clean, realistic picture earns it a hearty recommendation from us.

Speaker of sorts

Both the Epson and BenQ have decent, loud built-in speakers too, which will tide you over for TV viewing until a better solution (ideally a surround speaker package of sorts) comes along.

The Acer H9505BD and InFocus IN5312a are harder to vouch for - not least because they cannot match the Epson and BenQ for punch, colour depth or subtlety. The InFocus's lower resolution also proves problematic for sharpness, although its vast connectivity will no doubt please those looking to hook up a number of sources.

Acer's new flagship arrived with much expectation attached, and initially it looked good. But performance issues and a poor remote control handset cost it in the end.

t may surprise many readers to know there's no shortage of pre/power combinations that cost £20,000. They come in all shapes and sizes, with power outputs that vary from single digits to kilowatts. We've heard many of them over the years and, in our view, this Aesthetix pre/power combo is one of the very best.

We're reviewing the Signature version of each product. These retrofittable upgrades add £3300 to the standard Janus preamp's price and attract a £2000 premium for the Atlas stereo power amplifier. That additional money buys a host of improved components and results in a notably more transparent and detailed sound. The standard pre- and power are great but, if you can stretch to them, the Signatures versions are worth the extra in the right system.

It says much for the talent of this Janus/Atlas pairing that our biggest complaint has to do with the remote. While functional, it just isn't classy enough for a product of this price, and would look far more at home partnering some budget Bluetooth speaker.

Old-school but new-wave

Take a look at the spec sheet and the Janus Signature preamp seems old school: it uses a valve-based circuit and includes a serious phonostage where most rivals have long since gone line-level only. But Aesthetix's execution of this design is cutting edge.





It's the flexibility of the phono stage that grabs our attention. The circuit's gain can be adjusted from 40dB to 75dB, which means it accommodates movingmagnet and moving-coil cartridges.

If you don't have a record player, Aesthetix makes a line-level version of the Janus called the Calypso - the Signature version of that product retails for £6800. Beyond the Janus's phono stage there's an ample supply of line-level inputs and outputs of both the single-ended and balanced variety.

Care over construction

Take the lid off the preamp - an easy thing to do because it's held on (securely) by strips of Velcro - and you'll find an immaculately constructed product. The valve-powered circuit is dual mono and fully balanced, to maximise consistency between channels and keep noise levels low.

Other interesting design touches include zero overall feedback in the circuit and the use of discrete resistor ladder volume control rather than a more conventional potentiometer design. It's all done to improve dynamics and optimise resolution.

The Atlas Signature power amp is something of a beast. It's a relatively compact box by price standards but weighs a hefty 32kg. Impressively, its 200W-per-channel power output doubles as impedance halves to 4 ohms

The Aesthetix sound is smooth and as refined as you like; no hard edges here, no tendency to harshness. Yet these components partner this civility with sledgehammer muscle - that's enough to drive any speaker to decent levels, even in a large room.

Inside you'll find the same care found in the preamp. Everything is neatly assembled and the circuits carefully organised to reduce interference. The Atlas is a hybrid design that couples a valve input stage to a transistor-based output section. As with the preamp, Aesthetix has designed a fully balanced circuit with zero global feedback.

There are more front panel controls here than would be expected on a stereo power amp, and there's an input that connects to a built-in crossover. The working range of the filter is 40-200Hz, and it's intended for use in stereo systems where there's a subwoofer or speakers that have a powered bass section. It's an unusual but neat touch.

Speaker output terminals aren't something we talk about often, but the rhodium-plated ones on the Atlas are a little different. They clamp down on the speaker cable, making them ideal for use with spade connectors or bare wire rather than the banana plugs we normally use. They make for a really firm connection.

Comfortably bedded in

Our review samples of the Janus and Atlas are well-run demo units, so it only takes an hour or so before they start to sing. 'Comfortable' is the word that we keep coming back to in our notes. The Aesthetix sound is smooth, and as refined as you like. There are no hard edges here, no tendency to harshness, even with less-than-perfect recordings. Yet these components - the pre- and power share the same sonic character

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

Aesthetix has taken great care with the circuit layout on these products. Both the Janus (left) and Atlas (above) feature shielding over their power-supply sections. That's the silver metal cover you can see in the photos. This reduces the adverse effect of any electromagnetic radiation generated by the supply affecting the delicate low-level signals in the audio circuits. The result should be a purer sound.

You'll also notice the symmetrical circuit layouts, more obvious in the preamp, to maximise stereo imaging and the use of valves in both products. We reckon the better-quality components of these Signature editions are worthwhile provided your system is talented enough.

 partner this civility with sledgehammer muscle when required. That combination of abilities is rare, even among the priciest of products.

We start off with something smallscale, playing Debussy's *Clair De Lune* from our Naim NDS555PS streamer. This piece of music thrives when fed through a system that has finesse and top-quality resolution - qualities this pre/power has in abundance.

We're struck by the solidity of the sound first, then by the clean and precise way this amplifier defines the shape of the piano notes. There's just so much detail on offer, with the Aesthetix delivering a full dose of the instrument's harmonic richness.

Knight packs a punch

We follow up with Hans Zimmer's *The Dark Knight Rises* OST and are taken with the Aesthetix's scale and authority. There's an impressive amount of low-end punch in evidence and we're pleased with the pairing's ability to deliver large-scale dynamic swings with real venom. Stereo imaging is impressive too, with the soundstage nicely layered and precisely populated.

Tonally, this pre/power combination isn't the most neutral we've heard: there's a hint of sweetness at high frequencies and an element of extra warmth and richness through midrange and bass frequencies. None of this goes too far however, and the payback is a sonic balance that keeps the worst of recordings listenable while allowing the very best to shine.

Good news for vinyl

What of that phono stage? It's terrific, giving little away to the line-level inputs in terms of outright clarity - some feat considering the extra circuit complexity, equalisation and gain required.

We feed our reference Clearaudio Innovation Wood turntable a range of music from Michael Jackson's *Bad* and REM's *Automatic For The People* to Dukas's *The Sorcerer's Apprentice*, and love what we hear. There's hard-charging rhythmic drive when the music demands, plenty of punch and a class-leading degree of organisation.

We're struck by the solidity of the sound first, then by the clean and precise way this amplifier defines the shape of the piano notes. There's just so much detail on offer Vocals are delivered with fluidity and a convincing sense of presence.

We're really impressed by this pre/ power combination. Rarely has high-end amplification been so easy-going while still retaining the transparency the price point demands. Aesthetix has produced a standout performer at this price.

wo things strike us when we first unpack ATC's brand-new SCM4OA floorstanders. The first is the sheer weight of the things. They pile in at 36kg each, meaning a strong, helpful friend is handy come unpacking time. It'll avoid damage to them, and your back.

Once we've wrestled them out of their boxes it occurs to us these may well be the best-value speakers the company makes. If the idea of a six-grand floorstander being called good value bothers you, consider that there's no cheaper way of getting a full dose of ATC's heavy-duty engineering and studio-proven technology.

What makes ATCs different? It comes down to drive units, mostly. There are few speaker companies outside the industry giants making their own drive units. Most small manufacturers - ATC is tiny by most standards - tend to buy in units from OEM suppliers.

In-house and independent


With the introduction of a tweeter designed and manufactured in house, ATC now makes all its drivers. The SCM40A features a version of this new 25mm tweeter as well as being home to the company's trademark 75mm soft-dome midrange (introduced way back in 1976) and 16.5cm bass driver.

The SCM40A has three power amps (and an active crossover) in each enclosure. There's a 150W module for the bass driver, 60W driving the midrange and a 25W amplifier for the tweeter. It all comes wrapped in a solidly made, curved cabinet, finished in cherry or black ash. Our only aesthetic concern has to do with the supplied metal grilles - they're not particularly classy. Once up and running these are deeply impressive speakers. Though magnificently detailed, they sound notably less clinical than some ATC actives we've heard in the past, yet no less insightful. That's a great thing.

An unbiased account

We listen to a range of recordings from Keith Jarrett's *Paris/London: Testament* and Tchaikovsky's *Swan Lake* all the way to Dead Weather's *60 Feet Tall*, and these speakers take it all in their stride. They show no bias towards any genre.

The way they reproduce dynamics is excellent. They have the reach to convince with the large-scale dynamic swings of *Swan Lake*, punching out crescendos with enthusiasm. There's an impressive dose of muscle here, and the kind of low-end authority only really capable big speakers truly manage. Yet

Insightful and cohesive

If you want to analyse a recording, we can think of few alternatives as good. Every subtlety is sharply defined with the speakers keeping organised and controlled, yet fluid, even when the music becomes complex. Most hi-fi even true high-end kit - has problems making sense of Radiohead's *15 Step*. Not these ATCs. They take all in their stride, revealing a lovely cohesion throughout the frequency range. Resolution, timing and dynamics are all spot-on.

Initially, a price of more than six grand looks steep for a pair of conventionallooking floorstanders. But factor in the built-in amplification, exotically engineered in-house drive units and the resultant exceptional sound quality, and the SCM40As emerge as something of a high-end bargain. Consider us smitten.

Valiant overreach for the stars

Shoot for the moon, the saying goes. Miss and you'll still land among stars. The logic: stars are a fine consolation prize. That's the deal with Chris Nolan's latest, most audacious project yet: *Interstellar* is almost a masterpiece.

It is the near future. The planet is dying, and astronauts look to outer space for solutions. Leading them is Matthew McConaughey, who must abandon his family to potentially save mankind.

Interstellar isn't really about space. Its concern is the human condition. Fear, love, and hope take the spotlight as much as rockets and black holes.

But it proves just too much to handle. The ingredients are not quite done, even with a generous baking time of 169 minutes.

Not that there's anything wrong with a slow build, of course. The first hour or so admirably ensures you give a damn. *Interstellar* really hits its stride once we get to the final frontier. This is Nolan at his best, serving up hypnotic beauty and mindbending physics supposedly backed up by Real Science.

Ever wanted to see a black hole? This is about as close as you'll get. It looks gorgeous at a crisp 1080p.

A nod to the master

For Kubrick fans, the shadow of 2001: A Space Odyssey is hard to miss. *Interstellar* navigates its cosmic playground with panache.

Claustrophobic interior scenes are juxtaposed with sweeping vistas of planets. There are even a couple of mildly creepy robots.

And yet Nolan avoids being eclipsed. His is a separate vibe. The majesty of Johann Strauss has no place on the soundtrack, which opts for the turbulent Hans Zimmer instead. Sadly, the sound effects often overpower dialogue. Crucially, while Kubrick went headlong into the void, Nolan keeps an eye on Earth - with mixed results.

After two hours of restraint, the final act veers into the realm of ridiculous convenience. Scientific concepts are thrown about, and Anne Hathaway tries hard not to cringe as she delivers a soliloquy about the importance of love (and its similarity to gravity).

The bold, mature journey ends on a contrived, tedious note - and about 40 minutes too late.

Should you watch this? Oh yes, very much so. Despite some gaping flaws, this is still a journey well worth taking.

Its scale and ambition are deeply impressive, it is impossible to fault the production values, and the spectacle on offer is like nothing we've seen this year. *Interstellar* may be hard to love, but it is easy to admire.

BJÖRK VULNICURA Out now

Say what you like about Björk (people always have and always will), there's no denying the strength of her commitment or her credentials as an artist. The clarity of her artistic vision, on the other hand, has sometimes been easier to question.

Vulnicura, though, might be Björk's most unified and coherent album since 1995's Post. With the sole exception of History Of Touches (the sort of dislocated electronics and knowable-only-to-herself vocal melody that constituted almost all of 2011's Biophilia), Vulnicura combines beautifully arranged and recorded strings, glitchy electronics and percussion, and eloquent use of silence. And while Björk's vocals are as idiosyncratic as ever, lyrically there is an unprecedented level of candour here. There's a proud tradition of break-up albums in popular music, and songs like *Lionsong* and *Notget* put *Vulnicura* right up there.

Top production values

And in the right circumstances (and on the right system), *Vulnicura* can sound stunning. It's obviously been painstakingly recorded, and as a result it's a spacious, punchy, headily dynamic listen. This is particularly true of the hi-res download (which would appear to tick all of our criteria boxes laid out on p52's hi-res audio feature). It's simply alive with detail, possessing the sort of harmonic richness and differentiation that makes the copious string arrangements spring to life. So it's a spirited, challenging recording on every level.

Rough and ready charm

Despite its relative lack of hi-fi worthiness, though, *The Scene Between* is still good, harmless, scuzzy fun. *What D'You Say?, Her Last Wave* and the title track in particular build a tinny, unstable bridge between pre-Beatles Brit-pop and old-skool hip-hop you may not have even known you needed. In fact, the majority of the charm of *The Scene Between* is derived despite, rather than because of, its hi-fi credentials or lack thereof. So don't let its ramshackle sound put you off.

'71 Blu-ray Out now ★★★★☆

Belfast, 1971 – the height of the Troubles in Northern Ireland. A British soldier (Jack O'Connell) is left behind following a riot, upsetting the already delicate balance in a place of extreme paranoia and violence.

Some people desperately want him dead. Others provide random acts of kindness, but not without consequences. It's properly nasty business, and nobody is unscathed. '71 succeeds by not preaching at you. The politics are left fairly ambiguous, with admirable and abhorrent behaviour on both sides. The film refrains from passing

judgments, instead focusing on our protagonist's plight as he navigates disorientating, hostile territory.

Despite the historical setting, '71 is chiefly an action thriller – and a memorable one at that. With fine acting and tight direction, what you get is a short, sharp and utterly gripping tale of survival.

An excellent choice if you're after something a little more mature.

This is not for everyone, but if you like your games with narrative, decisionmaking and exploration, this little indie title is an utter delight. You're a denizen of the Unterzee, a London split into islands, and it's up to you to explore, uncovering new boroughs and nasty creatures using a ship.






Room for a view?

Projectors take up less room real-estate than a big TV, but they need a certain distance, or 'throw', to work. Those specs and ratios are always quoted, but you still need to do the calculations to figure out exactly how much is required.



Dark matters

While it's possible to watch a projected image in daylight, most projectors work best in darkened rooms. Thick curtains or blackout blinds are worthy investments if you're looking for that immersive cinema feel.



Put it in its place

Ideally a 'fixed' projector installation using a dedicated shelf or ceiling bracket works best. The same applies to your screen a fixed install is always ready to go. A white wall simply won't do, so invest in a purpose-built electric or manual model.



Lamp boast

If you want a particularly big screen, a Full HD 1920 x 1080 projector has its benefits. However, the quality of its lamp and its optics are every bit as important as its resolution so bear that in mind when you're on the hunt for a projector.

Setting up your... rear speakers

Do I need rear speakers?

What do rear speakers do, exactly? Well, with the advent of discrete 5.1 surround sound in 1992, sound designers gained the ability to place specfic effects into either the left or right rear speaker. Unlike older systems that relied on a mono rear channel of sound, such as Dolby Surround, the rear channels are given more to do instead of the same signal being shared between multiple surround speakers. Sound steering was better as the sound matched what was on screen more precisely. Bowers & Wilkins MT-60D £1950

Should I use hi-fi speakers?

Positioning can be a bit awkward if you have a large rear speaker. Place it too close and a headache may ensue. Hide it in a corner and performance will be diminished. Hi-fi speakers are designed to create an audio image that places sonic elements within a focused soundstage. This direct pattern of sound reproduction is what sound engineers avoid with most rear speaker effects. It's why, to avoid sound localisation, cinemas use multiple pairs of rear speakers along the sides and behind you.

Dealing with localisation

Negating the effect of localisation can be done in two ways: mounting a hi-fi style bookshelf or style speaker high on the wall, or buying a specialist rear speaker that's either bipolar or dipolar in design. A bipolar design will use an opposing-driver arrangement which run in phase (unison). This gives good bass and helps fill the room. A dipolar design is similar, using opposing sets of drive units radiating into directions, one running out of phase with the other. This creates an out-of-box sound that's hard to localise.

How loud should they be?

Whatever your speakers, watch the volume levels. It's tempting to crank it up to make the rear speakers more audible but all that does is defeat their purpose: they're not meant to draw attention to themselves. Too much rear-focused sound is unrealistic and, over long periods can become wearing for the listener, so don't be tempted to select an artificially heavy rear bias. Even in 5.1 channel mixing, it's common to use a mono effect at times. Surround speakers



Use your ears for cable management


Fed up with hearing your footsteps and the rustle of your clothes through your earbuds? Try running the cable over the top of your ear before putting the earphone in. Some models won't fit like this, but most will and many, such as the Shure SE425s, are designed specifically to do so. That way you'll significantly reduce the amount of noise carried up the cable.

Don't dismiss four-star kit

In this buying guide we only include kit rated four stars or higher, but that doesn't mean you should always go for the highest-rated option. Your specific needs, whether it's the scale and dynamism required for classical music or the low-end control that DJs demand, might be better met by a four-star amp than a five-star rival. Remember, settle on what your priorities are, and audition equipment whenever vou can.

Blu-Tack - very handy

When conducting our preliminary Dolby Atmos tests, we used Blu-Tack to keep our speakers in place and at the right angle. For small speakers they're particularly useful, so while such speakers might seem perfect for shelfmounting as they are, they rarely sound at their best that way. You can make big improvements by mounting them rigidly with a blob of Blu-Tack under each corner.

Recorded music is at a crossroads

The format in which you listen to your music could be undermining the quality of your hi-fi system

For those of us that consider themselves a music lover. albeit to different degrees, we are part of a very fortunate generation. We now have access to an evergrowing wealth of recorded music of extraordinary range and depth, effectively accumulated over the last 60 years. With the introduction of the microgroove LP record in the early 1950's, playback quality took a quantum leap forward and this also coincided with a far higher standard of recording techniques. Although further improvements have been made over the vears, this was a watershed time that first introduced hi-fi as a reality.

We now have literally millions of recorded music tracks available

to us in all genres and many different formats. One trend over recent years, however, has been to deliberately downgrade the quality in order to offer quantity. The main culprits have been MP3 and AAC formats which were designed as a low cost form of delivery when download speeds were slow and computer chip memory was expensive. Neither now applies and both formats should be consigned to history.

Quality vs quantity

Let us explain. The maximum resolution from MP3 and AAC file formats, which are both highly compressed, is 320 kbps (kilobytes per second) which compares with CD quality of 1411 kbps. This means the resolution quality is less than



a quarter of that provided by a standard CD. However, most MP3 or AAC files are downloaded over the internet and the most used download resolution is 128 kbps, which is around one-eleventh of CD quality. This should ring alarm bells. If you are only playing back these tracks on an iPod or mobile phone with a pair of earbuds, the quality may be irrelevant to you. But if these tracks are your primary source of music, perhaps with an iPod dock into a decent hi-fi system, you are only making a very poor quality sound louder. Information is irretrievably lost and the full dynamic range is lacking. The guality will be very poor in contrast with a full resolution version even if you are completely unaware of the loss you are inflicting upon yourself. This can even affect the type of music listened to

as most classical recordings downloaded as an MP3 or AAC file will have so much information missing, and all the complexities of the music lost, with the end result that the recording is reduced to just the essence of a tune.

What is the future of recorded music?

There are now positive signs for the future of recorded music. Audiophiles, or hi-fi connoisseurs, have been very important to the music industry as they are generally avid music lovers who aim to maximise their enjoyment by listening to music at its best quality level, which

means the play-back of great recordings through hi-end hi-fi to achieve the most outstanding results. Without them, a main driver for quality would probably be removed from the music industry. They have always sought out quality but there is now an increasing awareness among the wider public of the serious deficiencies of the highly compressed formats. Full resolution audio streaming, as well as CD quality downloads, are already available and will surely become the eventual norm with this greater awareness of the tremendous quality benefit. Consumers will vote through their purchases and will seek out higher resolution recordings. Look at Qobuz for a new high-profile entry into this field who offer CD quality (16 bit/44.1 kHz FLAC) streaming for over 15 million tracks.

The benefits of using a specialist dealer

Hi-end hi-fi very soon exposes poor quality recordings and specialist hi-fi dealers are constantly assessing the relative merits of different brands from manufacturers for potential stocking. With specialist hi-fi dealers, achieving the best system performance and seeking out the most outstanding combinations is almost invariably both their hobby and their livelihood. Without them, hi-fi manufacturers and potential customers would have to rely on the opinion of magazine reviewers to assess levels of performance - a notoriously unreliable decision making process. For specialist hi-fi dealers, their relationship with audiophiles and hi-fi connoisseurs is also crucial to them for, if they are to stay in business, they must satisfy the most discerning customers in the industry. The reality is that audiophiles and specialist hi-fi retailers (and the ones listed on this page represent the UK's finest) are essential to each other.

Specialist dealers know how to choose the products that combine as a superb system and how to get the best out of it by expert installation in the home. They also appreciate how exciting and involving music can be and how it can deliver a powerful emotional experience. If there's a price premium over an internet purchase by choosing a specialist dealer, it's probably a small one, but it's unquestionably worth the difference.

It's a thing of beauty, that's what it is. Kit racks don't generally get an appreciative "ooh" out of the team, but this one did - and that's all down to its ultra high-quality build and materials.

The shelves are made from solid bamboo, and come in three shades – light, medium and a sultry dark, and are set off by the glossy black legs (available in a variety of lengths to suit your kit) and shiny steel cone caps and spikes. Even better, it's modular, too: you can add extra shelves for £150 each – so it can grow as your system does.

Why did it win?

It saw our Cyrus CDi/Roksan Caspian M2 reference system deliver a confident, insightful and hugely enjoyable sound - with punchy bass, nuanced midrange and clear, open top-end.

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

Sony MD deck makes home recording a breeze

HOME RECORDING HAS under-Sony MDS-JE480 gone a quiet revolution in the last few years. The impact of digital formats has raised recording stan-
