Want more? Visit whathifi.com for even more product reviews! **Sony's UK AV** amplifier offering has had a more focused approach than many of its competitors over the past few years.

Concentrating on two key price points – £400 and £500 – it's done away with big, complicated line-ups to focus on the mainstream, and what a triumph it's been.

In a few short years, it has become the king of affordable home cinema amps, turning the tables on a rather hit-and-miss few years before to pick up five-star reviews and Product of the Year Awards with ease.

Can that momentum continue with the STR-DN8602 You bet

#### Beneath the surface

While things may all look very familiar on the outside, things on the inside have seen some tweaks in an attempt to improve on last year's performance.

For a start there's an upgraded power supply to minimise noise, and a new pre-amp chip that sees the input level, volume control and pre-amplifier stages individually grounded in order to minimise interference and stabilise the amplification process. Surface-level changes include the dual antenna on the back panel, which offer support for both Bluetooth and wi-fi (2.4GHz and 5GHz) simultaneously, while high-resolution music playback is much

more inclusive now compared with that of the DN850. DSD 5.6MHz (2ch) and FLAC 24-bit/192kHz (5ch) files get USB and network support, while DSD 2.8MHz (5ch) and WAV 24-bit/192kHz (7ch) files get the full house - playable via USB, HDMI and over your home network.

As with last year, the STR-DN860 is a 7.1-channel amp, offering 95W per channel (into 6 ohms, 2ch driven) with five HDMI ins and one HDMI out. Two of the inputs are optimised for audio, for getting the best from CD or Blu-ray players for example, while another offers 4K upscaling and passthrough with HDCP 2.2, meaning it'll work all the way up to 4K/60fps. The single HDMI out packs HDCP 2.2 too.

As with last year, legacy connections are covered by four sets of inputs for analogue audio and two for composite video plus one composite out, while digital inputs are made up of one coaxial and two optical ins. There's a single USB input on the front panel as well as a headphone output.

### Simple set-up

Getting the amp set up is as easy as ever, with Sony's graphical user interface clear and easy to understand. The built-in wi-fi picks up our network with no issue and, once the included set-up mic is connected.

the speaker test tones take no more than a few seconds to sound. We'd always recommend checking your measurements look correct at this stage before moving on, and we find Sony's results to be pretty accurate. Within a few minutes, we're up and running.

We put on *The Amazing Spiderman 2* and skip to the Times Square showdown between Spiderman and Electro. The STR-DN860 wastes no time jumping straight into the action.

It's a hugely authoritative sound, with plenty of



controlled rumble in the low end, balanced out with a superb level of clarity throughout the midrange and treble. This makes for a wonderfully engaging presentation - one that pumps excitement into any action scene, but that also has a softer touch for taking on the quieter scenes too.

Voices are direct and full of nuance, cutting through even the busiest of scenes, and every strand of audio in such complex montages takes its place without being lost or forgotten in the mix. We even compare it to our 2014 Product of the Year Award winner, last year's DN1050, and find the DN860 tops it for transparency, with more subtle detail up for grabs.

While not quite as spacious in its soundfield as the DN1050, the DN860 is nevertheless able to stretch its sound impressively wide, and passes effects from speaker to speaker with smoothness, precision and natural agility.

### The app



Efree – iOS, Android Sony's Songpal app is a great companion to the DN860, as it allows you to use your phone or

tablet to select your source, make setting adjustments and easily stream music from all manner of streaming services.

A new feature this year is Songpal Link, which basically makes all of Sony's audio products – from wireless speakers to AV receivers – part of a multi-room system that can be easily controlled within the app.

You can connect to the DN860 over Bluetooth or wi-fi, but be aware you'll have to use wi-fi if you want to be able to access networked content on NAS drives for example. A well designed, easy-to-use app that's well worth a download.

For example, as Electro fills himself with electricity from the mains power source, you hear the electrical charge surge past you from either side of the room, and as the voices in his head begin to swirl with anger, you hear them whispering all around you, placing you right in the middle of his mindset and immersing you in the scene.

#### Smoother and more solid

Sony has done a good job of taking the bright edge off the treble that we noticed in last year's model, and the DN860 certainly sounds more solid than previous efforts.

Gunshots are backed by a decent thud, while the zing of metal buckling and glass smashing as the billboards around Times Square collapse under Electro's electricity-charged outrage, is clean and clear without any harshness.

We do think the big, muscular DN1050 has a little more impact in the explosions, but that doesn't mean the DN860 is at all

lacking. It manages to deliver enough punch to convincingly fill our sizeable listening room, while still remaining articulate enough to handle the more delicate elements of a soundtrack.

If there's one oversight here, it's that Sony has chosen not to put Atmos into the DN860, something many of its competitors will do - even at this price. But until those rivals arrive in our testing rooms, it's hard to tell if Atmos is a legitimate addition at this level of receiver, and whether Sony has made the right decision to concentrate on the traditional 7.1ch without compromise, at least this year. For now, at least, that's not reason enough for us to dock it big marks, but it is something to consider if Atmos is what you're looking for.

Musical performance from Sony's AV receivers is among the best available, in part because they are tuned in stereo first before they are tuned for surround. It really shows. Rhythmically the DN860 shows up

for one-touch pairing.

Two of the five HDMI input ports are labelled 'Audio' and, as suggested, have been optimised for their audio performance. To get the most from them, hook up your Blu-ray player to one of these. The central HDMI input is for 4K

This year, Sony has included the HDCP 2.2 codec on the DN850, which means the inclusion of full 4K upscaling and passthrough up to 60fps. This is available via one HDMI in and one HDMI out, which should serve most set-ups.

This is a regular 7.1ch amp, with no Atmos on board this year.
This is something to consider if Atmos interests you, as we don't know whether many of its yet-to-be released rivals are planning to include the feature.

the areas in which a lot of AV receivers fall down, timing well and with precision.

It's a cohesive presentation that does well dynamically, rising and falling in tempo, stopping and starting as it should do, showing off a musical know-how that we don't always expect from home cinema amps at this price.

#### Get yourself in a good mode

We'd certainly recommend putting the amp in Pure Direct mode for the best sound, extracting a touch more clarity in the midrange with it on compared with when it's off - we preferred to keep this on with movies during our test too.

Bluetooth pairs quickly (even quicker if you have an NFC-compatible device) and allows you to stream music from your tablet or smartphone, with Spotify Connect on board for streaming directly from the service too.

### Together, but independent

This means that your device merely acts as a remote for choosing songs, and should it go out of range or be turned off, the receiver is connected directly with Spotify and will continue playing from your playlist independently of your device.

For video content from a portable device, Sony has included Miracast, a feature that will mirror the content on your device, The standard remote is very clear, but the Songpal app is great with smart devices



pushing it through the receiver and delivering up to a 1080p picture and two-channel stereo sound. Made possible through a direct peer-to-peer connection, it doesn't even require wi-fi to work.

A feature-packed amp then, and one with a fantastic performance to boot. Only time will tell if Sony's decision to leave Atmos on the shelf this year was a clever one or not, but for now this is a superb budget amp that is eager to entertain.

### REVIEWER'S NOTES... GETTING TO KNOW THE SONY STR-DN860

Sony's design is clean and familiar. It has not strayed from the tried-and-tested look for a few years now – and for good reason.

All AV receivers could take cues from Sony's set-up procedure and user interface. Quick, simple and easy to use – full marks here. Wow, this amp really knows its way around an explosion. Our listening room is filled with powerful, clear, dynamic sound.

Oh, no Atmos. That's a shame, but not a huge letdown. The 7.1 performance certainly makes up for it, but won't futureproof it.

The DN860 is a masterclass in how an AV receiver at this price should handle music. Great timing and precision.

### Jamo C103 | Stereo speakers | £850

### Jamo muscles in on the act

Like a nightclub bouncer in a tailor-made suit, the Jamo C103s are really packed in there. Each cabinet is big and burly, with a power-bulge around the 18cm mid/bass driver and a lot of overall presence - if ever a speaker looked like it wasn't to be trifled with, the Jamo C103 is it. There are three finishes: gloss black, gloss white and the walnut veneer of our review pair, and they are all smooth and high-quality, but they give the impression of barely containing the latent threat inside.

### **Pear-shaped cabinet**

Above the mid/bass driver is a 25mm silk dome tweeter, decoupled and waveguideequipped. Around the back there are hefty biwire cable terminals and a gaping reflex port big enough for other, more modestly sized, speakers to hide in. In between, the walnut veneer is expertly applied around the vaguely pear-shaped cabinet exterior. Chrome-effect accents around each driver add a little more visual pizzazz.

Integrated directly into our reference system, the C103s sound diffused (a little) and hard (a lot). All speakers benefit from an extended running-in period, though, and after 72 hours of uninterrupted playing, the C103s are singing with their authentic voice.

### Lacking a little substance

Initial impressions are of a large-scale, open sound. Given a WAV file of The Flaming Lips' Waitin' For A Superman to deal with, the Jamos reproduction is wide and tall, with an even-handed approach to the frequency range from top to bottom.

The top end is absolutely as assertive as it wants to be (and we reckon reasonable careful system-matching is required to make sure the C103s don't overplay their hand where treble sounds are concerned), the midrange is decently detailed, although perhaps lacking a little substance, and the low frequencies are speedy and tonally varied. However, they are not as out-andout punchy as the look of the Jamos initially leads us to expect. If they are indeed a nightclub bouncer, the C103s are altogether politer and more reasonable than is perhaps usual.

### **Bottom-end muscle**

Timing is decent, dynamic range is more than adequate, and overall the Jamos are an organised, if somewhat reticent, listen. We

back the C103s closer to the rear wall of our listening room and switch to another WAV file, this time Mos Def's Hip Hop, and while there's a noticeable increase in bottom-end muscle, it's not disproportionate.

### A more confident character

A bigger improvement is realised by biwiring them. Many biwireable speakers exhibit pretty subtle changes when biwired, but the Jamos improve decisively.

There's greater substance to low frequencies, more positivity about the midrange, and an altogether more confident character emerges. There's no fundamental change to the Jamos' tonal balance - it remains on the lean side of neutral - but the C103s are a better, more convincing listen this way.

There are already a couple of extremely strong standmounting contenders at this sort of price, but clearly the C103s are a

diverting option. They have the looks and finish to justify their pricetag, they are unfussy about room position (although the fact they're pretty big boys to start with limits your options a little) and are a detailed, energetic and pleasingly subtle listen. With a bit more overall substance to their sound and a tweeter on less of a knife's-edge, they could go places.

The Evoke range has been part of Pure's furniture ever since the Evoke-1 was launched back in 2002. It's a range that has expanded over the years to include models of varying sizes, colours and features culminating, for now, in this Evoke D6 with Bluetooth

### It does what it says on the tin

The top Evoke combines DAB, FM and, as you've probably deduced by now, Bluetooth connectivity. The real-oak veneer and white front panel give the radio a light, fresh look, although it doesn't perhaps have the luxury appearance of a Ruark Audio R1 Mk3.

Once you've powered up the Pure, the autotuning sequence kicks into action. It's a smooth, painless process and it's not long before you've got a thorough complement of stations to choose from.

You can store 15 presets each for DAB and FM, and your choices can be accessed through the corresponding buttons on the remote control - an unusually classy (for this level) credit card-sized affair that's ergonomic and nice to use.

#### **Multi-function control**

When you're up close and personal with the Pure, your main points of contact are the volume and select dials on the front. With the latter, you turn it to scroll through menus and push it inwards to select.

It's simple and straightforward, and the radio responds quickly enough. It's a shame, though, that you can't switch inputs via the remote. If you want to make the jump from streaming over Bluetooth to Planet Rock, you'll need to leave your comfy seat.

The screen is a decent size and easy to read. The brightness adjusts manually or

automatically, depending on the amount of ambient light in the room.

Other features include twin alarms, which can be set to a station of your choosing, and the touch-sensitive Snoozehandle which sits on top of the radio. There's no internet radio for that you'll need to investigate the Evoke F4 or rival radios such as the Roberts Stream 93i.

Out of the box, the Evoke is mains powered, but there's always the option of going portable. For this, you'll need to buy Pure's £35 ChargePak, which delivers up to 65 hours of listening and slots neatly into the rear panel.

The D6 features custom drive units and a 20W digital amplifier behind the front grilles. Pure offers some of its products in a mono configuration, but the D6 fires sound out in stereo, and it's all the better (and louder) for it. There's a much bigger sense of scale than you get with one of its smaller siblings such as the D4.

To go with the quantity of sound, there's a decent level of quality too. Detail levels are fine for the money and the general balance isn't bass or treble heavy. Push the
Pure hard and its balanced approach

Dialogue heard through the

Dialogue heard through the studio of Radio 5 Live sounds warm and detailed. It's easy to latch onto what people are saying. Stream Daft Punk's Around The World over Bluetooth (via an iPhone 6 Plus) and the Pure does a decent job of satisfying the demands of the track's meaty, punchy bassline and sparkly highs.



### **Rival radios**

Despite these qualities, rivals offer greater clarity and insight, and do a better job of communicating dynamic shifts. Spend £30 extra on the Ruark M1 Mk3 and although you jump down from stereo to mono, the benefit is a clear improvement in clarity, detail and dynamics across the board.

The Evoke D6 with Bluetooth isn't going to revolutionise the DAB radio market, but it reinforces the Evoke range's reputation for being solid and dependable.

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Cambridge CXA60 | Stereo amplifier | £500

### This amp bridges the gap

**There's a gap** in the market for a good £500 integrated stereo amplifier. Or rather, there used to be. The highly accomplished Cambridge CXA60 now fills this space.

Part of the new Cambridge CX series, the CXA60 integrated stereo amplifier boasts digital inputs, high-resolution audio support and a smart design that is certainly pleasing to the eye.

Oh, and it sounds great.

### **Poignant and arresting**

The Cambridge CXA60 is immediately likeable. It's fluid, snappy and packed with enthusiasm. This is an amplifier that puts musical enjoyment high on its list of priorities. That doesn't mean it leaves things like detail, dynamics or rhythmic precision trailing behind though - the amplifier skilfully handles complex arrangements and is capable of delivering subtle, accurate detail.

Stream The White Stripes' *Seven Nation Army* and that iconic bassline is bouncy, rumbling and has just the right amount of tautness to keep you hooked.

The CXA60's presentation is slightly forward, but it's not to the amp's detriment. The whine and crunch of the guitar riff sounds textured and has plenty of bite, while the strained, ragged nature of Jack White's voice is deftly conveyed. It's a gripping, entertaining listen.

The energetic performance happily doesn't cross the line into unruly, overzealous territory, with the Cambridge exercising plenty of control over a song's dynamics and rhythms. Hans Zimmer's compositions for *Inception* are appropriately brooding, and the tension is maintained throughout.

The strings in *Time* rise in slow-building intensity, while the drums lend a good helping of sombre weight. The dying piano notes at the end of the track have plenty of space to breathe in the open soundstage, sounding poignant and arresting.

### **Capable listen**

There are rival amplifiers, such as the £650 Arcam FMJ A19, that are able to dig a bit deeper, reveal a touch more detail and



reach higher, more open highs - but the Cambridge remains a hugely entertaining and capable listen, especially for its price.

It has a solid sound, and one that manages to be both exciting and easy to listen to in equal measure.

#### Floating chassis design

The CXA60's sleek and modern design looks very smart indeed. It has a 'floating chassis' design, a sturdy aluminium build with finishes available in either black or silver, and a clean, uncluttered fascia. It's clear that Cambridge has given plenty of thought to every aspect of the design, as it feels and looks like a high-quality product.

The display is simple and elegant. Buttons are neatly laid out next to their corresponding input label, coloured clearly in blue, and which turn dark blue when selected. You'll notice that there's an input button with the Bluetooth icon: the CXA60 is capable of streaming music from smartphones over Bluetooth (using the higher quality aptX codec), but you'll need to buy a separate BT100 dongle (£70) to make it work. The air vent on top of the amplifier isn't just for looks, either. It helps

cool down the class AB amplifier powering the CXA60's 60W per channel.

Peek inside and you can clearly see the toroidal transformer - it's situated right in the middle of the chassis, a calculated positioning that Cambridge claims ensures low magnetic flux levels, so there's less interference on the signal path.

Other internal design highlights include separate and symmetrical circuit paths, to minimise crosstalk issues between left and right channels, and improve consistency.

### Smooth volume dial

The Cambridge amplifier is seamless in operation. The on-panel buttons click satisfyingly and they respond instantly, as does the smooth volume dial. The balance and tonal controls (indicated by the bass and treble clef icons) are nicely made and turn smoothly. The Direct mode feature is worth a go, as it diverts the signal from the tonal controls and aims to deliver the purest sound possible.

The included remote control is a sturdy, well laid-out design and quickly becomes second nature in use. You can

use the same remote across all of the CX series products, too.

There's a decent spread of analogue and digital connections, with four line level inputs and two speaker terminals (so you can biwire or run a second pair of speakers) available on the back panel.

#### **Helpful labelling**

Inside, there's a 24-bit/192kHz DAC that supports playback of high-resolution audio files across its two optical and single coaxial inputs. Incidentally, it's the same Wolfson DAC chip used in the DacMagic Plus (four stars at £350 in 2012). Those hoping for a USB input will have to look towards the CXA80 (£750), which sits right above the CXA60 in this CX range.

A 3.5mm auxiliary input is placed on the front panel for plugging in MP3 players or smart devices, alongside a 3.5mm headphone jack. There's also scope to use

The CXA60 features a decent spread of connections on its back panel the CXA60 as a preamplifier, or to plug in a subwoofer if you want to extend the low-end heft of its performance. Cambridge continues its helpful policy of labelling all inputs both ways, making it easier to read the labels when leaning over the product.

### **Exciting and competitive package**

We're impressed with the Cambridge CXA60. It's an amplifier that delivers in every aspect. It looks smart, it has a wide spread of connections, and its enthusiastic, detailed and rhythmically cohesive performance is a joy to listen to. We like using it. too.

Its closest rival is the Award-winning Arcam A19, which admittedly has a more refined and mature sound. However, it's pricier at £650 and doesn't have any digital inputs. At £500, the CXA60 offers a exciting and competitive package for less money. We think you'll like it - maybe even love it.

### Hit the big time for less

It's easy to get lost in the hubbub surrounding the future of television. OLED, UHD and HDR: impressive and exciting acronyms, but we shouldn't forget that existing TV tech is still very good. After all, Full HD has been the standard for years. Both quality and price have been thoroughly honed.

### Quality in the mid-range

Take the Sony KDL-65W855C. It's a midrange model in Sony's 2015 range. It 'only' has an 1080p LED display, but it's rather good. The video performance is impressive enough to hold your attention.

We begin in Full HD with a Blu-ray of Birdman, where Michael Keaton is levitating in his dressing room. It's a clean, sharp picture. The clutter and brickwork in the room are solidly defined, and there's little noise to speak of. We'd like more in the way of fine textures, but this is more a tiny niggle than a full-blown fault.

LED panels don't have the best reputation when it comes to contrast, but this Sony puts in an admirable effort. Whites are bright enough to occasionally

dazzle. Dark scenes are capable of looking much closer to black than grey.

A note on 3D: this set supports activeshutter glasses, but they're not included in the box as standard. You'd have to order them separately at £50 a pair.

Step down to standard definition with a DVD, and the quality holds strong. There is an inevitable increase in picture noise, but even then we see the same traits: balanced colours, good contrast and solid edges. Freeview and Freeview HD performance is similar, only with the inherent fuzz of terrestrial broadcast added.

#### **Necessary adjustment**

Fresh out of the box, the TV will need a bit of tinkering. The default settings are not ideal, so we used a THX Optimization disc to tweak the picture. Much of it is down to personal taste, but we'd suggest starting with Dynamic Contrast Enhancement turned off - that will give you more accurate control over brightness and black levels.

Noise reduction is effective, but it trades a little definition. Keep motion processing on the 'standard' setting - the effect is subtle and won't make your films overly glossy.

### It's all about angles

Sadly no amount of adjustment can solve the one big issue here: viewing angles. We find the viewing angle to be quite narrow. If you have a room with varied seating positions, those on the side may have issues with washed-out contrast.

The TV's sound is fine. There's enough detail and definition, and a reasonable amount of weight on offer.

The KDL-65W855C isn't just a pretty picture - it has smarts too. Sony is among the first to adopt Google's new Android TV platform, which is nice but not without fault. The nice bit: it's pretty, clear, and intuitive. Google's clean-cut Material Design philosophy has been copied over from the mobile world, and looks lovely on the big screen. What needs fixing is the lack of content compared with the likes of Samsung and LG TVs. For streaming, you'll mainly be looking at Netflix, Amazon Instant Video and Google Play. There's no Now TV, and the UK's main catch-up services haven't appeared yet.



Fine, if you don't mind your buttons packed in tight; better to use the SideView app though The bundled remote control is fine, but the best way to navigate is to use the TV SideView app. This gives you more comprehensive control than the standard remote control. It also shows you the TV guide. Handy.

The hardware side is a bit more comprehensive, and is up there with pricier sets. There are four HDMI sockets, three USB ports, a component-composite hybrid, Scart, and optical digital output.

The Sony KDL-65W855C is a tempting proposition. It's not class-leading stuff, but we're impressed with its blend of quality, features and price. If you're not fussed about the latest bells and whistles - maybe you're happy to wait until the dust settles on the latest format war - this is a great way to get a 65in screen for less than you might expect.

### Optoma NuForce DDA-120 | Stereo amplifier and DAC | £600

### Neat amp/DAC combo just lacks kick



The NuForce DDA-120 is a neat looking offering from the Californian hi-fi company purchased towards the end of 2014 by projector giant Optoma. An integrated stereo amplifier and digital-to-analogue converter in one nicely finished, discreet aluminium box, the DDA-120 will accept both digital and analogue signals to act as a hub for your digital music.

When you consider the diminutive size of its case, the DDA-120 will accept an impressive number of sources: two digital optical inputs jostle for position alongside one coaxial, a USB and an 'expansion slot' intended for the bundled NuForce BTR-01 Bluetooth dongle.

To go with those five digital inputs, the DDA-120 also has one set of RCA analogue inputs for any old-school legacy kit you may want to use in your system. The neatly laid out, if inevitably rather packed, back panel is also home to the stereo speaker outputs and the power socket and switch.

To round off the package there is a small, plastic remote control that, frankly, is not in keeping with the £600 price or the standard of finish of the DDA-120 itself.

### Presenting a clean face

In contrast to that cluttered rear is the rather stark-looking front. At first glance, it's a plain sheet of metal with a single knob adorning the right-hand side. That knob acts as the on/off switch, input select and volume control. It's nicely machined, and quite in keeping with the money NuForce is asking for the DDA-120.

On closer inspection, things are not quite as stark as they first appear. The front panel has a display that shows input selected and volume levels. It's all very understated - almost too understated: the display can be awkward to read from an angle.

This box will sit as the hub of a stereo system without taking up too much shelf space, and all the while able to handle an impressive number of sources, whether they be from a streamer, smartphone, TV or CD player - or even a turntable.

#### **High-resolution playback**

After leaving the NuForce to run in for a weekend, we connect the DDA-120 to our Naim streamer and a pair of Q Acoustics Concept 20 speakers. The unit will handle files up to 24-bit/96kHz, so we get stuck in to some high-resolution audio.

The midrange in particular stands out. Clear, precise vocals stand forward in the mix, and this unit leans a touch to the mid and upper registers, favouring them over low bass. The treble can tend towards brightness, so you should take care with partnering speakers to prevent this from entering into the realms of stridency - the

Concept 20s are good partners in that respect. That care having been taken, there is no denying the precision of the NuForce. Notes start and stop crisply, and instruments are clearly placed in the soundstage.

It's the lower registers that concern us, however. The bass is there, as fast-moving as the rest of the sound, but there's no real depth to notes - it's all a bit insubstantial.

It's a little lacklustre dynamically as well, the shift between loud and quiet passages being less dramatic than we'd expect. The same sonic characteristics are true of the NuForce no matter which input we use.

### More oomph required

This lack of welly becomes all the more apparent when we compare the DDA-120 to the Cambridge Audio CXA60 (£500). While it is a much bigger unit, the Cambridge offers similar specification and a far more well-rounded and enjoyable sound.

The 120's supplied BTR-01 Bluetooth dongle accepts the higher-quality apt-X codec and is easy to set up - we're sending music from our phone and tablet in seconds.

The NuForce DDA-120 has a lot going for it. It's a neat package, nicely built, and with a host of connections. We just can't ignore the fact that your £600 (indeed less) will buy you better, more involving and enjoyable sound elsewhere.

### Pro-ject RPM1 Carbon | Turntable | £325

The first Pro-ject RPM1 Genie appeared five years ago and wowed us with its adventurous styling, strong value and fine sound quality. Four generations on, Pro-ject has developed the original into a high-tech

package, still selling for sensible money.

#### **Desirable qualities**

The big news is the inclusion of an 'S' shaped carbon fibre arm, with an effective length of 21.8cm. Such technology is rare, even at high-end prices, so it's astonishing to find it included here. The benefits of carbon fibre are low mass, high rigidity and good internal damping - all desirable qualities in a tonearm.

This isn't the first time Pro-ject has included this material on a record player at this level though. It already makes the Debut Carbon, but the straight tube arm included in that package looks a completely different design, right down to the bearing housing and bias arrangement.

#### A strong style statement

Pro-ject supplies the RPM1 with cartridge fitted. Here, it's an Ortofon 2M Red moving magnet item, which would cost around £80 if bought separately. It's a proven performer that makes a fine partner for this deck.

Other engineering highlights include the use of a stand-alone motor unit that sits separately from the main chassis to minimise any unwanted mechanical energy being fed into the main turntable structure, and an inverted main platter bearing that uses a ceramic ball to reduce rumble noise.

The RPM1 comes in a choice of three colours (black, red or white) and makes a strong style statement. We like its minimalist appearance, though the finish on our sample showed up dust pretty quickly. We have no issue with the cosmetic quality, but there are areas that concern us.



On initial start up, the motor emitted a low-level clunking sound

every few seconds, but this went away after a weekend of running. The arm bearing showed a bit of free play, which, along with an insubstantial feel to the lift/lower lever, reduces the quality feel.

Set-up is easy. The cartridge is already fitted and aligned, leaving just the counterweight and bias to be adjusted. Place the turntable somewhere level and rigid, ideally far away from the speakers. This is a simple deck with little in the way of isolation from its environment, so this kind of care will pay dividends.

### Impressive detail

Play something demanding such as Holst's Mars and this package does a good job. We're happy with the Pro-ject's balanced tonality and refinement. There's an impressive amount of detail on show, and it's rendered with a pleasing degree of

### Sense of composure falters

It's not all good news, though. The sonic presentation isn't as composed when things become complex. The package also lacks some authority when it comes to delivering large-scale dynamic shifts, making the music sound gentler and less exciting than it should.

REM's Automatic for the People reinforces this impression. The turntable delivers a wealth of information, though the sense of composure falters as the music's complexity rises. High frequencies are incisive and articulate, while bass is delivered with a decent amount of power. Yet we could do with more drive and attack. There's drama in the music, but this Pro-ject doesn't quite manage to access it.

Pro-ject has a brilliant track record when it comes to sub-£500 record players. The RPM1 is less rounded in ability than we hoped, but still has enough in the way of sonic talent to earn consideration. If the style appeals it's worth a listen.





Chord 2Qute | Digital to analogue converter | £995

Chord strikes the right notes

What happens when you combine two Award-winning products into one? You get the brand new Chord 2Qute - a standalone DAC that's the latest in Chord Electronics' hugely successful Chordette range.

The Chord 2Qute replaces the 2014 Award-winning Qute EX (£990), with upgraded spec taken from the Chord Hugo - yet another winner from last year.

#### A formidable combination

Chord claims that its use of bespoke, programmable chips enables it to get a better performance out of its DACs compared with rivals that use off-theshelf solutions.

In the 2Qute, Chord goes a step further by inserting the latest FPGA (field programmable gate array) technology - the one used in the exemplary £1400 Hugo - inside the compact Chordette chassis.

It's a formidable combination, and results in an incredibly organised and detailed musical performance, no matter what song is being played.

Prince's Love (in 16-bit/44.1kHz) sounds funky and punchy, with the DAC's remarkable precision etching out every note with clarity and cohesion. A snappy, fun sound, it never lets the rhythm go flat. Stream Earth from the Gladiator soundtrack (in 16-bit/44.1kHz) and it's clear the 2Qute outperforms the former Qute EX. The new 2Qute is just more definite with the way it delivers notes. It digs deeper to reveal even more layers of subtlety, and the edges of notes are more accurate.

Switch up to a 24-bit/176kHz recording of Alison Krauss and Union Station's Bright Sunny South, and the twanging guitars are beautifully conveyed. Each pluck is taut, has rich layers of detail surrounding each strum, and almost feels tactile. The vocals are full of character and nuance.

### Window in the chassis

The 2Qute looks identical to its predecessors, with the build quality up to Chord's usual high standards. The aluminium chassis is solid, beautifully machined, and comes in two finishes: silver or black. There's a comfortable heft to it despite its relatively petite dimensions.

Chordette. One of our favourite things about Chord products is the window in the chassis, which lets you peep into the circuitry. It changes colour depending on the sample rate being played, but it doesn't really matter if you can't remember what the colours represent they just look fantastic.

The 2Qute's three digital inputs are the same ones found on the Qute EX. There's a coaxial input and an asynchronous USB type-B input, both of which can play high-resolution audio files all the way up to 32-bit/384kHz. Meanwhile, the optical input supports up to 24-bit/192kHz files.

### Admirable performance

Along with most popular file formats, all three digital inputs support DSD64. If you want to play DSD128, you'll have to use either the coaxial or USB input.

There's also a single pair of line level outputs, through which you can connect the 2Qute DAC to your hi-fi separates.

The only new addition to the back panel is a switch that lets you click between the three inputs, replacing the former auto-sensing feature. It's a nice touch, though you'll need to remember the inputs by their colour (also in the circuit window).

### Panasonic TX-40CX680B | 4K Television | £700

### Panasonic redefines the small screen

It's not just the prices of 4K TVs that have plummeted in recent times - so have their screen sizes. Last year, sets below 55in were few and far between, but 40in seems to be the popular starting point in the 2015 line-up of 4K TVs.

There's an argument that a higher resolution on a smaller screen is unnecessary, but it does mean you can sit a fair bit closer. Even nose-to-the-screen close, a 4K TV should look clean and noise-free - provided you're playing well-recorded 4K content, of course. Ideal, then, for smaller living rooms where space might be tight. Or even bedrooms, if you can dare think about having a second 4K screen in the house already.

This 40in Panasonic TX-40CX680B is the baby screen in the company's one-above-entry-level 4K LED range. It can be yours for just £700 - not much more than a brand-new Full HD model of the same size.

### The basic principle

The TX-40CX680B doesn't have all the bells and whistles of Panasonic's flagship models, such as the 4K Studio Master Processor (the brainpower behind the company's new colour, contrast and brightness technology).

You have to jump a range higher (to the CX700) for 3D too, and the absence of a smart remote means users only have the vanilla remote that seems like it has been part of the Panasonic TV package for years.

Still, there's plenty for the TX-40CX680B to shout about. It claims to combine new backlight technology and a new colour filter system to produce subtler, more realistic colours. And it also introduces the new (2.0) iteration of Panasonic's My Home Screen interface, now powered by Firefox.

It's gone under the knife a bit since last year, ditching the full-page portal and

edging nearer LG and Samsung's line of sight with pop-up menus and colourful graphics. The upshot is a speedier, more user-friendly and customisable interface, and one we like very much.

### **Playing with bubbles**

The home menu is simply a line of bubbles - or 'decks' as Panasonic calls them. 'Live TV', 'apps' and 'devices' come as default, but almost anything - whether it's your favourite TV channel, app or web page, even a media streamer over DLNA - can be pinned to the menu in two button presses.

It's not quite the fancy affair of LG's WebOS, but it gets the priorities right by nailing simplicity and convenience - and who can argue with that?

Settings are clear and straightforward, and we like how you can scoot through them without having to go back and forth into individual tabs - handy when giving settings the once-over on initial set-up.

Wi-fi is onboard but, as usual, using the LAN socket is the most stable way to get online, where there's plenty of choice (see panel). That LAN socket shares space at the back with three HDMI and USB inputs apiece. All HDMI 2.0 inputs are HDCP 2.2 compatible, so should be ready to play ball with Ultra HD Blu-ray players (and other 4K hardware) when they blow in later this year.





### **Expanding network**



The TX-40CX680B will offer Freeview Play – a

rebranded and renovated Freeview – when it launches later this year. For now, Netflix, Amazon Instant Video and YouTube provide hours of 4K material and, of course, endless amounts of regular-resolution programming. You'll also find that stacks of apps – Deezer, TuneIn Radio and Eurosport Player among them – can be installed via the app market.

Another new feature is Info Frame, which sparks up navigation bars to access local weather, recommended content, notifications, and channels so you can scroll through them without disrupting what you're watching.

Netflix is one of the best streaming services to satisfy your 4K craving now, so we tuck into comedy *Grace And Frankie* and are drawn in by the screen's knifelike edges, astute detail and buttery-smooth motion. Each questionable pattern on the cast's dodgy wardrobe choice is laid bare, and individual strands of Jane Fonda's finely combed hair are distinct.

### Smooth and natural

Characters glide across rooms without a blip, but not so much that it looks unnatural. And whether we're sitting one foot or one metre away, the picture looks squeaky clean.

But tweaking the out-of-the-box brightness and over-keen colouration is a must. We use a trusty THX Optimizer disc, and find ourselves dialling down the colour settings. Even then, colours are rather on the obvious side. In true Panasonic fashion they are admirably bright and punchy, if not quite as subtle as we'd like.

Panasonic's local-dimming technology reduces backlighting behind dark areas of the image to enhance black levels, and pays off a treat. Blacks are gorgeous - so potent, indeed, that the black bars almost disappear into the TV's (ultra thin) bezel. Clean whites don't let the side down either.

### Dark matter in detail

Dark detail is a little subdued in return - seams in t-shirts and strands in hair get eaten up - which no amount of settingsfiddling can improve.

We reluctantly tear ourselves away from 4K to feed the TX-4OCX680B *Unbroken* on Blu-ray. And we don't feel too hard done by. Switching the '24p Smooth Film' mode to 'mid' counters any unwelcome blurring, so





when our Olympian war hero takes to the track, both he and the crowd remain stable.

The Panasonic is a good upscaler with high-definition material, holding up well next to one our favourite Full HD sets from last year in terms of sharpness.

The same can't quite be said for standard definition. While the picture isn't too noisy, DVD owners should be prepared for slightly softer lines than they might be used to with a decent Full HD screen.

You can expect only so much, soundwise, from a wafer-thin TV and the 40CX680B can't perform miracles. The sound through its twin speakers (powered by 10W of amplification) is clear and fairly

detailed, but a decent bargain-basement soundbar or 'base will grant you more substance and solidity. You can't go wrong with Cambridge Audio's TV5 soundbase (£250). Or even a Yamaha RX-V377 home cinema amp (£250) paired with a Tannoy HTS-101 surround package (£350).

The TX-40CX680B is the first 40in TV we've seen this year, and it happens to be very good. Whether it will hold its own against the coming competition remains to be seen. Until then, we're more than happy vouching for the Panasonic. It's a good-value set that flies the flag for 4K, offering a fine picture and a good stack of features with it. In our minds, that's £700 well spent.



# Apple Music enters the fray

Apple may be late to streaming, but does it have what it takes to shake up the market? Possibly. Here's how it intends to do it...

#### 1 DISCOVER

The most forthright aspect of Apple Music is the straight-up streaming service. You'll be able to stream from a library of over 30 million songs, plus anything you have in iTunes, whether purchased or ripped from CD.



#### 2 RADIO

Who said radio was dead? Not Apple, because the company is bringing it back in a big way. Beats 1 is Apple's radio station, kept pumping 24/7 by celebrity DJs: Zane Lowe in Los Angeles, Ebro Darden in New York and Julie Adenuga in London. They promise an eclectic mix of the latest music, along with exclusive interviews and guest hosts.

You also get Apple Music Radio, which gives you a mix of curated music. The new stations range in genres from indie rock and classical to folk and funk. You can skip as often as you like, and personalise stations to your taste.

It's based on the Beats Music interface and offers HD music videos as well as offline playback.



**Price/packages** It will cost \$10 per month for a standard subscription - or \$15 per month for a family plan, serving six people. In the UK, it is likely to be a straight conversion of £10 and £15. Not sure you want in? Get a free threemonth trial. Just make sure to cancel if you want to stop - if you stay, you pay.

**Sound quality** Apple does not pass up a chance to show off, so its silence on the matter of sound quality speaks volumes. It seems likely at this stage that Apple will offer music streaming in 256kbps quality, as it currently does with iTunes Premium downloads.







#### \*Optical phono comes to UK

DS Audio is to bring its optical phono cartridge to the UK, after an initial launch in Japan. The DS-WI uses a beam of light to detect the vibrations from the stylus.

#### **\*Linn calls time on preamps**

Scottish hi-fi specialist Linn is ending production of its pre-amplifier range, claiming its DSM players are "set to supersede the standalone preamp".




#### **3** CONNECT

Is it essential? No. But it's a more direct way for artists and fans to communicate beyond simple tweeting. Music may get a bit more personal. Or narcissistic.

### It's nothing new, but Apple Music will raise the stakes

In the immediate aftermath of the Apple Music announcement, the internet was awash with negativity - equal parts indifference, disappointment and ridicule.

The commentators have a point - very little about Apple Music is genuinely fresh. And yet, it might just revolutionise the industry. Apple's greatest strength is not its inventions, rather its capacity to rework existing ideas before using its considerable resources to maximise reach.

It's a strategy that worked with MP3 players, tablets and smartphones, which all went stratospheric after the Apple treatment. Now history looks set to repeat itself with music.

User engagement will be the easy part. As of April 2014, Apple boasted 800 million iTunes accounts, all with

immediate access to Apple Music. iTunes could be the most effective Trojan Horse ever.

As for the features (see page opposite), they're nothing new, but nobody has yet managed to combine these disparate elements into a singularly digestible offering.

But what of audio quality? Well, Apple has previously drawn the line at 256kbps, and seemingly has no interest in an arms race of sampling rates and bit depths. It is content leaving that to the likes of Tidal and Qobuz.

This approach may not chime with audiophiles, but in the end it's almost inconsequential if Apple succeeds. The very fact that the company has entered the fray means music streaming is no longer a niche concern.

If nothing else, competition will heat up and standards will improve. As Sony Music CEO Doug Morris put it: "A rising tide lifts all ships." Whatever happens, one thing is certain: music consumption has just entered a new phase.



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### Acer

## Liquid Jade Z £150 (or free on contract) \*\*\*\*\*

Sometimes you just don't need the latest flagship smartphone with lasers and fingerprint scanners crammed into gleaming bodies of aluminium and ionstrengthened glass. Sometimes you'd be prepared to settle for something simpler.

That's especially the case if somebody promises you much of the good stuff for very little money. We're talking about the Acer Liquid Jade Z, which offers some fancy electronics for just £150. Is it too good to be true?

### **Slippery texture**

Unfortunately, yes it is. Despite being able to boast a 5in 720p screen and a 13-megapixel camera, this budget model is a bit disappointing.

First impressions are not good. It's a mess of a design, with a brushed effect on the plastic back that will convince nobody it is made of metal. It doesn't feel great to hold, thanks to a slippery texture that works against the slim profile, not to mention a power button that's got no business being at the top of the device.

Then there's the build quality: its mildly flexible nature does little to reassure us that this smartphone is built to last. But to hell with the design - at this price we'd settle for a Toblerone-shaped phone if the picture and sound quality were up to scratch.

### Good viewing angles

Sadly, the picture quality isn't. The size (5in) and resolution (720p) of the screen appeals, and it does a fine job with sharpness and contrast. Viewing angles are good for an LCD screen, but the white balance is a bit off. To our eyes (and especially when compared with the competition) it seems a bit green.

General operation is erratic.
Navigation between apps and menus is smooth enough, but during our test it occasionally slowed to a crawl. We wish the interface (Acer's own, on top of Android 4.4 KitKat) were a little cleaner. There is a lot of bloatware, much of which is not removable and ends up taking space unnecessarily.

The Acer Liquid Jade Z offers some fancy electronics for just £150, but is it too good to be true? Unfortunately, yes it is



Speaking of which, there is a microSD card slot, which we would recommend using mainly because the built-in 8GB storage doesn't go very far. We managed to load only one 720p clip, 15 44.1kHz WAV files and two high-res albums before we ran out of space.

### A little vague

We're not taken with the Liquid Jade Z's audio performance. It's a thin, insubstantial delivery. We're not expecting the kind of bass that threatens our eardrums, but better tonal balance would be good.

Detail isn't great either - textures are not cleanly defined and it all sounds a little vague. The Acer boasts DTS Studio Sound, but this is essentially an EQ that does little to improve the aural experience.

### Sluggish camera

Can the 13-megapixel camera save the day? Not really. On paper, the spec sounds promising, especially with that f/1.8 lens putting it on par with the Samsung Galaxy S6. But in reality it doesn't even come close. For a start, the software is sluggish, and even once it's loaded, details are lacking. It's not sharp enough to really etch those textures.

### Not to be scoffed at

Yes, it's cheap. And for the money, you get a 5in 720p screen, which is not to be scoffed at. But that's not enough to outweigh the Acer Liquid Jade Z's many other flaws. It's as frustrating as it is disappointing, especially when similar money could buy you a surprisingly good Alcatel OneTouch Idol 3 (4.7). If you're looking to save cash it might be worth looking at the Acer - but for just a little more you could do a lot better.

### Alcatel

The Alcatel OneTouch Idol 3 comes in two sizes, with 5.5in and 4.7 screens. The former has bumped-up specs, but the 4.7, our test model, is aimed squarely at the midrange market. It might not have Apple or Samsung quaking in their boots but, for a third of the price of flagship models, the Idol 3 does many

things very well indeed.

#### **Screen rotation**

The Idol 3 doesn't look spectacular - in fact it's rather nondescript. The front is black, symmetrical and unbranded; the back, plastic with a light brushed-metal effect. It won't fool your hands, but eyes are easily deceived. The same goes for the chrome-effect edges.

It feels good to hold. The plastic build is light, but solid enough, and it fits nicely in the palm. We're not overly keen on the button placement of power on the left, volume on the right, though the Idol 3 also knows LG's shortcut of double-tapping to turn the screen on. And if that's not enough, get ready for Alcatel's party trick - the screen automatically rotates to stay upstanding, and there are speakers and microphones on both ends of the device.

Say goodbye to taking your phone out of your pocket and finding it upside down - this Alcatel doesn't know the meaning of those words. Is it necessary? Probably not, but it is useful.

### **DJ** station

Once the novelty of flipping the screen over wears off (it takes a while), we set it in a horizontal position and load up a video. The 4.7in screen is a pleasant surprise. The Apple iPhone 6 shows that top specs aren't everything, and the Alcatel's 720p screen reaffirms this.

Colours are dynamic. Contrast is good. Skin tones are convincing. Even the viewing angles are generous. It doesn't have the Samsung Galaxy S6's level of

detail, but at this price the Idol 3 is definitely punching above its weight.

It's a theme that continues as we put it through its paces on sound. It isn't as loud as it could be, but thanks to collaboration with American audio company JBL it is clear, coherent and coordinated. It doesn't quite match the Apple iPhone 6's level of musicality, but it's still a good listen.

The front-facing stereo speakers give HTC's Boomsound speakers a run for their money. The built-in music app doesn't just play tunes – you can try mixing in Music Centre mode, turning your Idol 3 into a bona fide DJ station.

### Solid 13-megapixel camera

Even the camera has a surprising amount to offer. It's a good 13-megapixel snapper, capable of shooting vivid colours and a decent level of detail. We wouldn't expect it to match the stunning performance of the LG G4's camera, but

### Bells and whistles

Battery life is about average for a midrange phone: no problem getting through a normal day, but loop a 720p video and it will last about seven hours. Internal storage is 8GB, but you can (and should) add a microSD card.

Overall, we're impressed with the Alcatel OneTouch Idol 3, a midrange phone that punches above its weight. At this price, the big flagship models have cause for concern. If you're not after a premium phone with all the bells and whistles, this is worth your attention.

# Apple iPhone 6 £540

(or free on contract) ★★★★

If there's one thing to be said about Apple, it's that the company dances to its own tune. It certainly doesn't bother with the petty business of seeing what everybody else is doing.

For its latest smartphone, the Apple iPhone 6, that means there is no Full HD screen, even when key rivals have adopted Quad HD. There is no 16-megapixel camera with laser focusing and image stabilisation, and no high-res audio support. You might have written your own wishlist containing all the possible tech out there, but Apple couldn't care less what you think.

#### **New curves**

Why? Because Apple focuses on performance over specs, a strategy that has served it extremely well. What its products lack in grunt, they make up for in finesse. The Apple iPhone 6's performance and user experience is hard to beat, which makes it easily one of the best smartphones around.

Apple makes shiny things and the iPhone 6 is no exception. The design has been reworked with the addition of some new curves, doing away with the straight edges first introduced by the iPhone 4. It's not just pretty, it makes handling a little easier, which is necessary because of the increased size.

### Apple's screen size is growing

Yes, Apple has started to make larger phones after years of ignoring the trend and sticking with screens 4in or under. The iPhone 6's screen measures 4.7in, which is still below average but a notable increase on its predecessors.

The screen has a resolution of just 1334x750, which on paper is a little low, especially with Full HD 1080p screens being the norm and Quad HD on the rise. But resolution isn't everything and the iPhone's pixels work very hard to hold off the competition.

Edges are accurately drawn and fine details are nicely etched. Colours are on the cool side of neutral, but there's vibrancy where needed. Across the colour spectrum, tones are convincing.

The Apple iPhone 6's performance and user experience is hard to beat, which makes it easily one of the best smartphones around



Contrast is strong, too - the blacks aren't AMOLED dark but they're impressively deep, while whites are strong without being dazzling. The likes of the Samsung Galaxy S6 and LG G4 have the edge when it comes to outright detail and contrast, but the Apple won't attract many complaints on its own.

### A foot-tapping sound

Audio has always been one of Apple's greatest strengths and the iPhone 6 maintains that tradition. The absence of high-res audio support is disappointing, but easy to ignore when the CD-quality 44.1kHz performance is this good.

The rich, full-bodied character remains, but a little extra clarity makes it more detailed and dynamic than ever. It's a balanced listen, expressive in the midrange and sparkly in the treble.

We're also attracted to the iPhone's sense of enthusiasm. It's a snappy, energetic sound that encourages your foot to tap. There's background music and there's music that engages. On the iPhone 6, it's the latter.

r experience are second to none

### Polished performance

It's not just about the audiovisual performance, of course. With Apple, the whole package is polished - including the operating system. The iPhone 6 comes with iOS 8 out of the box, and it runs like a dream. Even the best Android phones stutter on occasion, but iOS sails through any task you throw at it.

We're similarly impressed with the camera. It's not top-spec like the LG or Samsung. But those eight megapixels are put to good use. Images are sharp, with excellent colour reproduction. Autofocus is fast, and there's little noise unless you're shooting in dim light.

Draw up a list of everything you want from a smartphone and it's unlikely your wishes will be granted. Apple doesn't swing that way. Rather than spreading itself thin, the company does the key things really well. If you already buy into Apple's way of doing things, you'll be very happy indeed.

If you want a lot of tech for not a huge amount of money, this smartphone could be the one. Honor - basically Huawei operating under a more Eurocentric label - seems to have designed a smartphone based entirely on a checklist.

With a big screen, capacious battery, fancy camera and powerful processor, the Honor 6+ should be right at the top of the pile. But chasing specification is a dangerous game, and this is an example of how plenty of ticked boxes don't always amount to a great product.

#### A nod to the iPhone

They say imitation is the most sincere form of flattery. In that case, Apple should be blushing severely right now, because the Honor 6+ is clearly a big fan.

The design looks essentially like a larger version of the iPhone 4. Only it's not as nice. Unlike its stablemate the Huawei P8, which could conceivably pass for an iPhone 5, the Honor 6+ feels a little tacky. The glass-like back and metal-like bumper are both just plastic.

Even the software is Apple-centric. The Honor 6+ actually runs on last year's Android interface (version 4.4 KitKat), but it's almost entirely painted over to resemble iOS. Apps appear in static grids, because the Android app drawer is nowhere to be seen.

At least one core Android feature remains: expandable memory. The Honor 6+ has two SIM trays, but one of them doubles as a microSD slot, compatible with cards up to 128GB.

### **Entering into brash territory**

Video quality is impressive, and on par with the Huawei P8. The Full HD screen is sharp and colours are vivid. The contrast levels are good for an LCD screen, although the LG G4's output is more dynamic and the Samsung Galaxy S6's AMOLED screen is miles in front. Still, we appreciate the little things, like being able to tweak the white balance.

When it comes to sound, we're disappointed. We were half expecting the Huawei P8's standard - competent

but in need of subtlety. But the Honor is one step down, overstepping the mark into brash territory. It's not particularly engaging or well defined, and often sounds rough around the edges.

### Mimic human sight

The camera here is a curious beast. There are two 8-megapixel sensors at the back, which work together to give you 13-megapixel photos. Why? According to Honor, this will mimic human sight and improve focusing. Incidentally, there's a fancy mode that lets you tinker with a picture's focus after you take the shot.

The two lenses are also supposed to help with high dynamic range photos, which combine multiple photos of different light exposures. It all seems to work because the results are pretty good. Focusing is fast, which means it's easy to get sharp shots, but it's still some way behind the LG G4 on detail and dynamism though.

Battery life is good. The 3600mAh battery will easily see you through a

couple of days. Loop a 720p video with half brightness and wi-fi connected, and it will last about 12 hours.

en down to the iOS-like software

The processor is a bit more erratic. With eight cores you'd expect the thing to zoom along, but it doesn't. It's fast enough most of the time, but we encountered the occasional stutter. Even with lighter tasks (checking emails, browsing photos) we felt the device heat up quite quickly.

### Laundry list

Specs and features aren't everything. Just look at the Apple iPhone 6: its relatively paltry specifications belie a top-class performance. Clearly the folks at Cupertino know how to maximise their resources.

Sadly it's not the same story with Honor/Huawei. Despite ticking quite a few boxes, the Honor 6+ doesn't blow us away. By all means, check it out for its laundry list of features - but not for its audio-visual talent.

SUPERTEST SMARTPHONES

When the first HTC One came along it stood out from the crowd. Not only was it an Android phone that dared to wear a full metal jacket, it also performed well enough to butt heads with the standard-setting iPhone and come away with only superficial injuries.

Now we have the HTC One M9, the third generation of this successful series. But the landscape has changed. While the latest HTC sticks to its comfort zone, the likes of Samsung and LG have undergone radical changes.

Did HTC get complacent, or was it wise not to mess with a winning formula? It's a bit of both: the HTC One M9 is a lovely device, but its relevance is put in question by the latest rivals.

### **Best loudspeakers**

When it comes to design, it's business as usual. Samsung and LG have experimented by adopting glass, metal and leather, but HTC is clearly keen to keep one foot in charted territory.

The screen is again topped and tailed by a large amount of bezel space, used for the front-facing 'Boomsound' speakers - still the best loudspeakers we've heard on a smartphone.

The machined aluminium body returns, along with angled sides that take us back to the original HTC One. The right side now has the power and volume buttons, but the drawback here is that they are too close together and could be confused for one another.

Our review sample is a two-tone light silver with gold trim, but the M9 also comes in gun-metal grey and gold.

### Super-sharp screen

Rather than jumping on the Quad HD bandwagon, HTC has stuck with a 5in Full HD display. That's not necessarily a bad thing - a QHD screen doesn't guarantee better results.

There are no discernible pixels. The screen is super-sharp whether you watch videos or read emails. Outlines are cleanly drawn, and textures are well realised. The palette is on the cool side of neutral, but never feels lifeless or dull.

Contrast is the one weak point here - it's not as dynamic as the Samsung Galaxy S6, LG G4 or Apple iPhone 6. Blacks are suitably dark but whites don't penetrate with as much gusto.

Overall the One M9 is a fine option for movies on the go, even if it doesn't push the boundaries of mobile screen tech.

### **High-resolution music support**

HTC has made a more obvious effort on the audio front. The M9 introduces hi-res music support to the range, up to 24-bit/192kHz, along with a brand new equaliser with Dolby Audio sound processing. With headphones, the equaliser helps to make the M9 an enthusiastic listen. Timing and detail levels are pretty good, although the result is not as effortless as the iPhone 6.

Feed the M9 a well-mastered high-res track and the difference is apparent. Everything tightens up and there is more in the way of coordination and subtlety. We'd still pick the iPhone 6 or the

20.7-megapixel snapper with an f/2.2 lens sounds tempting, but the results are inconsistent. In good light you get well-judged colours, minimum noise and plenty of detail. But you'll find exposure issues in tricky conditions, even with High Dynamic Range mode activated. As far as snappers go, the M9 trails the LG G4's stunning offering.

The HTC One M9 is a solid effort and there is plenty to like about it. The problem is that the competition has moved on significantly and now outclasses the HTC in most respects. It's good - but there are better smartphones for the money.

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## Huawei **P8** £360

(or free on contract) ★★★★☆

You may not have heard of Huawei (that's 'hwah-way', not Hawaii), but the Chinese company is actually the world's largest telecommunications company, having overtaken Sweden's Ericsson in 2012. Its most common products are wireless routers and mobile internet dongles, but now it is heading west with a mission to break into the highly competitive smartphone market.

Huawei has made attempts before, with little success. Now it's having another go with its latest flagship model, the Huawei P8. But how do you take on a market that's never heard of you and can't pronounce your name? Simple: do what Apple does, but sell for less.

#### **Inspired by Apple**

Nearly everything about the Huawei P8 has been, let's just say, 'inspired' by Apple. Which is a little odd, seeing as it's an Android phone deep down. The result is a delightful curiosity.

The influences are so evident that the P8 might have grown up with a poster of the iPhone 5 on its wall. It's a slender slab of glass and aluminium with a luxurious vibe. If you want to save some money but still own a respectable-looking phone, this will do nicely.

The software, EmotionUI, tweaks Android Lollipop 5.0 to within an inch of its life. Huawei has tried its best to replicate the look and feel of an Apple iPhone, to the extent of removing the Android app drawer. Here all your apps must be on the main screen, in a grid.

And yet it's not an iPhone. The closed-off unibody design means there's no way to remove the back and change the battery, but Huawei has followed the Android tradition of including a microSD card slot. That lets you expand the internal memory by an extra 128GB.

The more expensive versions of the Huawei P8 allow the microSD card slot to double up as a second SIM slot.

#### Vibrant, eye-catching picture

We have the standard model, so we insert a memory card full of music and movies. For the money, the picture performance

is good. The 5.2in screen is Full HD and not Quad HD, but it's sharp enough that you won't care. Colours are vibrant, going for eye-catching over realistic, but accurate enough to be convincing. You can also tweak the balance a bit, thanks to a temperature slider in Settings.

Contrast is the one area that keeps the Huawei from reaching the same level as the class-leading Samsung Galaxy S6 or LG G4. Blacks aren't as dark as we'd like, and whites fall short of brilliant. It's perfectly watchable, however.

#### Decent sound, and high-def too

The sound also falls just short of its rivals, but it's good enough to keep us from being disappointed. Timing is decent, as is detail definition. It gets loud enough, and also accepts hi-res tracks. Not that they make much of a difference, however - high-res or not, the Samsung Galaxy S6 offers more detail and refinement, while the Apple iPhone 6 slams harder.

The camera is one of the phone's strong points, and the quality of its 13-megapixel snapper with an f/2 lens and optical image stabilisation comes as a nice surprise. The trick up Huawei's sleeve is the world's first (they say) RGBW sensor, where red, green and blue sub-pixels are joined by a white one, meaning the camera takes in more light. Again, the LG G4 is a step ahead in detail and subtlety, but the Huawei takes good shots with little effort.

#### Looks, features and performance

Powering all of this is Huawei's own 64-bit, 2GHz octa-core Kirin 930 CPU, along with 3GB of RAM. It's fast and stable enough, but not quite capable of the Galaxy S6's lightning loading speeds. The built-in 2690mAh lasted seven hours on our 720p video loop test, but normal usage saw us through a day.

For the money, the Huawei P8 is a success. You get looks, features and a performance which is just about comparable with some of the big names. It's not perfect but if you're looking for a good multimedia device that can save you some cash, it's worth investigating.

## G4 £500

(or free on contract) \*\*\*\*

What does it take for a flagship smartphone to stand out these days? A fast processor, a high-resolution screen and a powerful camera are all on the shopping list, but if you want to be really noticed you have to do something special. The LG G4 is special because its blend of features and design is unique. It has a leather back - genuine, vegetabletanned, full-grain leather, not the imitation stuff we saw from Samsung.

#### **Fancy wallet**

The result is not unlike fondling a fancy wallet, and the vibe is premium enough to make us forget the plastic edges. Don't want cowhide on your phone? That's fine - you can pay a little less and get the device in ceramic (white) or metallic plastic (silver or gold).

Another unusual design quirk is a curved body. It's a very slight bend, not as pronounced as those on LG's TVs or the LG G Flex 2. Handling is a more pleasant and ergonomic experience, and a happy side effect is that the screen is slightly protected when face down.

You can remove the back to swap the battery, or supplement the built-in 32GB storage with a microSD card up to 2TB. That's a lot of content, but you'll make use of the flexible battery and storage arrangement, because the LG G4 is good at handling movies and music.

#### Wallops your eyeballs

The LG G4 has a marvellous picture. The G4 uses a 5.5in screen with a Quad HD (2560x1440) resolution. Now there is an IPS Quantum Display, which promises 25 per cent greater brightness, 20 per cent wider colour gamut, and 50 per cent better contrast than before.

LG says it is the closest smartphone screen to the Digital Cinema Initiative's DCI-P3 colour space - ie. better colour accuracy. In reality, it's one of the best smartphone pictures we've seen.

It's sharp. It's clear. It's bright. Viewing angles are good. Contrast is excellent, with blacks so deep it's hard to believe this is an LCD panel. The LG's biggest threat here is the Samsung Galaxy S6,

The LG G4 is special because its design is unique. It has a leather back - genuine, vegetabletanned, full-grain leather



whose AMOLED screen offers greater contrast and wallops your eyeballs a little harder. The LG, meanwhile, is more nuanced in shading and gradation.

#### An attacking, rhythmic sound

There was a time when LG smartphones sounded a little lifeless, but what you get now is a fine amount of attack and the rhythmic precision to match. The G4 isn't up there with the Galaxy S6 or the iPhone 6 in terms of bite and dynamism, but this is a sound we'd happily listen to.

The G4 regains solid footing when it comes to photography. This may be the best and most advanced camera we've ever seen on a smartphone. The 16-megapixel snapper has an f/1.8 lens for good low-light scenarios, a laser for fast focusing, and three-axis optical image stabilisation for shaky hands.

Even on automatic, the results are splendid. Pictures are sharp and clear, with a good colour balance. It's a fast snapper too, launching in 0.6 seconds.

The most exciting new feature is a full-manual shooting mode, which will appeal to anyone frustrated with the LG G3's simplified camera controls. Now you can adjust white balance, focus, exposure, ISO and shutter speed - and save your results in RAW format for better photoshopping.

#### Stands out from the crowd

Battery life is good, but not the best. The G4 lasted 10 hours looping 720p video at 50 per cent brightness, with wi-fi on. That is only average for a smartphone, but you do have the option of changing batteries. Few flagship rivals can boast that these days.

That leather back may not be to everyone's taste, but we admire LG for making the G4 phone stand out. The audio quality may not be up there with the class leaders, but this is more than compensated for by the brilliant camera and the ability to tinker with batteries and memory cards. Overall, this is a device which fills us with glee.

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## Samsung Galaxy S6 £530

(or free on contract) \*\*\*\*

We've been fairly critical of Samsung's smartphones in the past. Regardless of impressive specification, their plastic construction left us cold, especially when the likes of Apple, Sony and HTC offered gleaming slabs of glass and metal. With the Samsung Galaxy S6 series, this is no longer an issue.

Samsung has two flagship models for 2015, the Galaxy S6 and the Galaxy S6 Edge – essentially the same phone, but the S6 Edge sports a more sculpted body and a screen with curved edges.

We love the S6 Edge, so we have high hopes for the 'regular' S6. But there is nothing regular about the S6. This is an extraordinary device.

#### It's a looker

Samsung has at last created something of a looker. The plastic is gone, now it's all metal edges and glass on the front and back. Though the design has taken its inspiration from Apple's iPhone 6, the S6 is arguably even prettier.

Power up and things get even better. The screen is a 5.1in AMOLED display with a QHD (2560x1440) resolution, and it is gorgeous. Want a great picture on the go? Look no further.

With just under 580 pixels per inch, it's super-sharp. We are momentarily dazed at the level of contrast on offer, which is an inherent strength of AMOLED panels. Whites are scintillating, while at the other end the darks are black as night, and colours are vivid and attractive. As is traditional with Samsung, there are different picture modes for you to finesse the palette. We settle on Adaptive Display, which offers a good balance of vibrancy.

Samsung's biggest threat here is the LG G4, which has size on its side (5.5in), and also demonstrates greater nuance in shading. The Samsung counters with greater contrast and dynamism.

#### **Detail and dynamism**

When it comes to audio quality, the Samsung is a step ahead. It's an engaging listen, thanks to tight timing, a reservoir of power and the readiness to use both.

We loved the S6 Edge and have high hopes for the 'regular' S6. But there is nothing regular about the S6. This is an extraordinary device



The S6 happily handles high-resolution audio too. We load up a few tracks, up to 24-bit/192kHz, and are greeted with detail and dynamism.

Samsung smartphones have not always been the most insightful or refined, but the sound on the S6 is a job well done.

The iPhone 6 still edges ahead in rhythm and snap, but the Samsung has enough going for it to be a welcome alternative.

#### None of the lag from before

The S6's operation shows no signs of the lag that plagued previous generations. And Samsung has toned down its interface, which sits on top of Android's 5.0 Lollipop operating system.

That 64-bit octa-core Exynos processor and 3GB RAM is a powerful combination. Our commands are never met with hesitation, and the Samsung has no problems juggling a full HD video with high-res tracks and a 3D game.

Even the camera is fast, loading up in just 0.7 seconds. The pictures are impressive too. You get a 16-megapixel

snapper with an aperture of f/1.9 (good for low-light shots).

Results are among the best we've seen this year, even on the basic Auto mode. There is plenty of detail and colours are convincing. The sharpness may lose out to the LG G4, but there's very little in it.

#### A seriously tempting proposition

Our only misgiving about the Samsung Galaxy S6 is that you can't remove the back to swap batteries or add memory cards. The standard 32GB will be eaten up quickly if you're big on full-resolution photos and high-res tracks (though Samsung also offers 64GB and 128GB models). The battery charges at a ridiculously fast speed. Ten minutes gets you four hours of juice.

Bravo, Samsung! The restrictions on memory and battery may drive heavy users into the hands of LG, but the Galaxy S6 is a great achievement. Its extraordinary multimedia capabilities make it a seriously tempting proposition for anyone wanting top-quality picture and sound on the go. This is easily one of the best smartphones of 2015.

nd the winner is... Samsung Galaxy S6. Yes, we're surprised too. It's been a while since Samsung produced a smartphone to be truly proud of. Yet here we have a model that shines in many respects.

The company has clearly heeded the negative feedback towards its earlier, cheaper-looking models. But now we have a gorgeous design that takes the fight to Apple. It's not just a pretty face - Samsung has really stepped up its game in the audiovisual department. It's a beautiful screen and a hugely entertaining listen. All is forgiven.

#### Seeking entertainment

Neck and neck with Samsung is the LG G4. We love the screen, we admire the bold step of going for leather, and we appreciate the ability to tinker with batteries and memory cards.

But ultimately we seek entertainment, and the Samsung edges ahead in the sound department. If you prefer the practicality of expandable storage, you're sure to be pleased with the LG G4 - it's thoroughly deserving of its full five stars.

#### **Chasing specs**

In third place we have the Apple iPhone 6. Its spec sheet looks entirely lacklustre, well behind its Android rivals. But chasing specs is a dangerous, deceptive thing to do - it's clear that Apple put a lot of effort into making these resources work. The result is a user experience and a musical performance that's hard to beat.

Four stars have been awarded to the HTC One M9, the Huawei P8 and the Alcatel OneTouch Idol 3 (4.7). They're all very good phones in their own right, but for one reason or another, just not in the same league as the top three. The HTC One M9 offered nice metal design, but we wanted more from its sound, picture, camera and battery.

The Huawei P8 is a very different proposition. It's a step down from the class

leaders, but it does enough right and has the right price tag to make it a worthy proposition.

Alcatel's OneTouch Idol 3 is a pleasant surprise. It is definitely pitched at the middle-low end of the market, but its performance and list of features mean it punches well above its weight. Anyone who wants a good smartphone for less would do well to pause and investigate.

#### Something for everyone

The Honor 6+ and Acer Liquid Jade Z both get three stars, because they just don't offer the value for money we're looking for. On paper the Honor ticks a lot of boxes, but its performance in the real world lets it down. The Acer, affordable though it is, was put to shame by the similarly priced Alcatel.

There's something for everyone here. No matter which one you go for, one thing is for sure: sound and vision on the go is about to get a whole lot better.

4K Blu-ray may be the next big thing on the horizon, but now is the time to grab yourself a bargain Blu-ray player

ltra HD Blu-ray players are the talk of the town now their spec has been confirmed, but we shouldn't forget the trusty originals just yet. After all, 4K Blu-ray discs won't appear in their thousands overnight, so these machines will still be playing the majority of movies on our shelves for some time to come.

With plenty of Blu-ray players available for around £100, picking out the best buys is no easy task. But fear not, we are here to help your quest to find the best audio-visual set-up on a tight budget.

Sony ruled the roost at the sub-£100 price point in 2014, but a new year brings new models from all the usual suspects. Do Samsung, LG or Panasonic have what it takes to wrestle the prize from Sony's hands?

WHAT'S ON TEST: LG BP350 Panasonic DMP-BDT170 Samsung BD-J5500 Sony BDP-S4500

SONY



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**The BP350 is** one of four new Blu-ray players joining LG's MUSICflow multi-room family, capable of streaming music from CDs and USBs to any of the five-strong range's wireless speakers.

#### Shimmery diamond effect

Those who haven't bought into LG's 'smart hi-fi audio' can use it as a regular Blu-ray player, and to that end it's a decent option. Feature-wise, DLNA support and a throng of smarts are there for the taking. There's built-in wifi, but no ethernet port for a wired connection.

Design is a conversation starter. Its shimmery diamond-effect chassis makes the LG ideal for anyone with style in mind, and you'll need some willpower not to stroke the textured plastic. The solid black power and eject buttons stand out well against it. Our only gripe is that the disc tray cover feels a bit wobbly as we put a disc on it.

You may be disappointed to learn that LG's beloved webOS interface doesn't feature on the BP350, but its other smart platform (appearing on its lowest-ranging TVs) is almost as pleasant.

Greeting you upon start-up (it takes around seven seconds) is a home screen featuring a series of tabs across a colourful background. This is where you can locate files on a server or connected USB, and get your teeth into its generous

app offering: Now TV, Netflix, BBC iPlayer, and Amazon Instant Video, as well as rarer ones like Blinkbox, Spotify and Deezer, all make an appearance.

The apps are located in the tab labelled 'Premium'. Hover over it and they pop-up along the bottom of the screen, so are handily within reach without having to enter another page.

The LG AV Remote 5 app can be downloaded (free on iOS and Android) and used as a basic controller. It's as snazzy and responsive as mobile apps come, and it helps that the interface looks and works similarly to the player's.

#### **Pinhead-sized buttons**

You might prefer it to the remote. Some may not get on with the handset's distinctly ridged back - designed for your index finger to lie on - and the majority of its buttons are tiny.

Everything you'd expect is present and correct, though, and we find the numerical keys handy for jumping to specific tracks on CDs.

Music replay is clear and upbeat, the LG's sonic presentation detailed, fast and agile. Even an average quality recording, like the Eurythmics' *Greatest Hits*, sounds clean enough through the BP350. The synthesised beats are communicated with fervour. With music and movies, though, it's not as precise or

spacious as some of its rivals. It could be more ponderous, too, when big explosions dictate the soundfield.

#### **Fast-moving action**

But picture performance nips any carping in the bud. It's a punchy and crisp picture, the pin-sharp lines and bold, lush colours making for a compelling watch with both Blu-ray and DVD.

Clean and controlled, it isn't ruffled by fast-moving action. And contrast is impressive too: whites are pure and blacks profound. It dissects Blu-rays with rigour and scrambles after the detail in standard definition too.


It's not the last word in subtlety (that accolade belongs to the Sony BDP-S4500) and has a harder time with reds and greens than the top seeds. But for the money, it gets a lot right. For its pictures and features, the BP350 is very competitive. If the sound were better, it might not be settling for four stars.

Panasonic has carried its top-tier models from last year (the DMP-BDT460 and DMP-BDT700) into 2015 - that's good news considering the latter is even an Award winner. The company's entry-level range has been refreshed, though. There are five new models and the DMP-BDT170 is the middle child.

#### Straight-laced box

It's not often we're lost for words, but when it comes to the Panasonic's design there isn't much to say. It's simply a straight-laced box with a glossy front - but rather refreshing after last year's fad for quirky designs.

Thankfully, there's plenty to say about performance. 'Normal' is our go-to picture mode, although 'User' lets you adjust brightness, contrast, sharpness and colour to your liking. Not much fiddling is necessary - out of the box, the Panasonic puts in quite a performance.

It's a stickler for detail. Watch *Edge of Tomorrow*, with Tom Cruise at his best, and you're given a wide window into the debacle of battle. Each grain of sand on Cruise's face is visible, and there's texture to crumbling mounds of mud.

Whites are impressive and inky blacks clutch onto detail. Colours are arresting: strong, well rooted, though perhaps a touch on the inflated side if we're being fussy. Red berets jump out from behind

the mesh of khakis and browns, as do yellow tabs on the soldier's exosuits.

It's a great asset to carry into DVD performance, especially with a splashy film like *Kill Bill: Vol 2*. Everything from cars and palm trees to Uma Thurman's leathers looks inviting and accurate.

The DMP-BDT170 disguises the drop in resolution well, with sharpness, detail and motion all admirable. Those entering the 4K foray may benefit from its 4K upscaling processing too, designed to bring greater detail and sharpness when used with a 4K telly.

#### No time-waster

If picture is the Panasonic's strong suit, then sound isn't far behind. It's an exciting listen, delivering the scale and detail to handle the Blu-ray's dense soundtrack. Gunfire is solid and colliding metal has clunk, but the bass is slightly tubby; machinery crashing to the ground has less 'thud' than it should.

Over to stereo with The Cure's *Kiss Me*, *Kiss Me*, *Kiss Me*, *Kiss Me* album and it tears through the track listing with energy and drive – just not quite as much punch or precision as the Sony. It doesn't boast the split-second start-up of some of its rivals, but is hardly a time-waster, beating us to a count of five every time.

Elsewhere, speed isn't the Pana's forte. On the home menu, settings and content (from a disc, USB or your network) can be entered by pressing the navigation buttons on the remote that correspond to the grid on screen. It's simple enough, but means steering through pages to reach them. You can, at least, prioritise those which appear on the first app page.

#### Legibility on the remote

BBC iPlayer, Netflix, Amazon Instant Video and YouTube are on board, as well as an app market. But catch-up TV begins and ends with BBC iPlayer, which is a shame when rivals offer more.

Panasonic did think about legibility on the remote, though. While we'd always prefer backlit buttons, the main playback keys (play, pause, skip etc) are coloured blue, so are easier to make out when the lights go down.

If your new player must come with catch-up TV, then give this Panasonic a miss. Otherwise jump in, for this is one of the best budget boxes around.

Samsung has got curve fever. Just over a third of the company's TVs are curved this year, and that ratio is similar for its Blu-ray players. But while bendy TV panels are designed to offer a more immersive experience, for disc spinners it's simply a quirky aesthetic.

In the case of the entry-level BD-J5500 though, it's not the curved shape that steals the design limelight. The entire body, available in black or white, is deeply ribbed so could be played like a Guiro if you had a stick.

The absence of a display is becoming the norm at the budget end, but Samsung has taken things further by having no power light either. We miss the reassurance of one, but at least there are no distractions during movie-watching.

#### **Ergonomic handset**

The remote is more matter-of-fact, but sensibly sized. It makes a nice change from the pokey handsets offered with rival players, and while the spacehogging numerical keys mean its face is fairly busy, its nice, big, well-labelled buttons make it easy to get along with.

The BD-J5500 is the lowest 2015 model with smart features, and to access them you'll need an internet connection via ethernet. Once hooked up, you'll have access to Amazon Instant Video, YouTube and Netflix, among others.

Although we find the multi-panel, graphic-heavy interface a little busy, it does allow for quick access to apps and media on your network over DLNA, on a disc or from a connected USB key.

#### Neatly tucked away

The USB input is at the front of the unit, hidden under a well-camouflaged removable rubber flap. This gives the player's front a cleaner look but is a little fiddly to remove.

Like the Sony BDP-S4500, the menu flashes up instantly at start-up. The disc tray is very quiet and has an aura of sophistication about it as it smoothly slides back home. Blu-rays load in a pretty standard 10 seconds. The operational whirr during disc-play is very slightly noisier than usual so you wouldn't want it right next to your ear.

You might want it in your living room somewhere, though. Feed it *The Amazing Spiderman 2* on Blu-ray and the image is spick and span. Edges are cutting and detail delicately (but not overly) etched.

As Spidey swings through the city and the action comes thick and fast, motion is well controlled - an asset that makes it a tempting option for 3D playback too.

The Samsung's palette is invitingly radiant, and turning down colour levels a notch in the 'user' picture mode gives it a more preferable balance. It doesn't

quite have the natural colour delivery of Samsung's TVs, though, and yellow taxis, and the reds and blues of his suit, have more depth and accuracy through the Sony and Panasonic DMP-BDT170.

Contrast is generally good; the suit's black web of lines are solid and deep. That takes a small hit when we drop to DVD (as does crispness), but there's more than enough definition elsewhere to call the Samsung a decent upscaler.

#### Nimble with sound

Sonically, it isn't too shabby. It seems on its toes in fast, action-packed scenes, with soundtracks pulling through with clarity, speed and agility. We'd like a bit more weight though.

You might find the BD-J5500 an aesthetic pull. You might not. Either way there's more to like than just design. It might not have the picture subtlety and precision to top your shortlist, but it does deserve a place on it.

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o you remember the first time you saw DVD after years of flickering VHS tapes? Or the first time you watched a Blu-ray? Remember that leap in quality that made you get your other half and say "you've got to see this!"?

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to a ton of catch-up TV and on-demand content. It also uses passive 3D, so you can get truly immersed in your games and movies.

There's built-in Freeview HD, which gives up to 12 high-def channels and 60 standard-def stations. It's got Dolby Digital Plus sound, Bluetooth and built-in Wi-Fi for wireless connection and four HDMI ports along with four USB inputs for memory sticks or hard drives.

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Bluetooth connectivity you can wirelessly listen to your music from your phone or tablet, making this soundbar the perfect all in one audio solution for your living room.

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**Sony doesn't seem** capable of making a bad disc-spinner these days. 2014's models were magnets to five stars, and it took only one of its 2015 Blu-ray players (the BDP-S5500) to re-open the floodgates for praise.

Here is its little brother - no doubt one of the cheapest players we'll see this year - and again we reach for our word-bank of superlatives.

#### **Network access**

The specification drops built-in wi-fi (a direct ethernet connection opens the door to its network features instead), but 3D, DLNA and smarts remain.

The XrossMediaBar has been ditched for a simple menu, although traces of it still hang around in the set-up pages. That means you don't have to faff with longwinded menus. Instead, apps and services are conveniently in one place.

The new players have adopted PlayStation Video - formerly Video Unlimited - where you can buy tons of TV shows and movies, while Amazon Instant Video, Netflix, BBC iPlayer, Demand5 and YouTube are all on board.

The half-size remote is identical to last year's, save for a new Netflix logo on the shortcut button, and is easy to use. Sony's slick and intuitive TV SideView app (free on Android and iOS) can step in as a controller for the BDP-S4500, too.

Like the BDP-S5500, it's the size of a photo album and takes a no-frills, square-box approach.

You still get a USB input on the front, and around the back is the usual HDMI output and a coaxial for alternative hook-up to your AV receiver.

Sony has worked hard to improve boot-up and loading times from last year's models with its Quick Start Mode. It claims you get a picture in "less than one second", and isn't bluffing. As soon as your finger leaves the power button there's barely time to blink before the home screen appears.

It doesn't dawdle loading discs either, giving a picture within 10 seconds. We pop in our *Interstellar* Blu-ray, a stonking disc for testing motion and contrast, and the Sony lays its talents bare.

#### **Quite a contrast**

Black seatbelts against white spacesuits can be merely pixels apart yet both will look striking. The control panel lights are bright and sharp in the dimly lit cockpit. As the ship flies past extra-terrestrial landscapes, both remain clear and stable.

Sony hits the bull's-eye when it comes to colour reproduction. Whether it's orange hair, green crop fields, or the rare splashes of colour inside the spaceship - red life-jackets, panels on helmets - hues are rich and robust.

The picture is layered with fine detail, making the BDP-S4500 one of the most revealing sub-£100 players. Suits are textured, while intricate facial details are visible even through the helmet glass.

#### **DVD** delivery

Even with *The Hobbit: Battle Of The Five Armies* on DVD, whether it's close-ups of bearded dwarves or panoramic sweeps of mountains, the Sony flags up the insight and crispness that rivals can't touch (though the Panasonic DMP-BDT170 comes close).

The Sony grants the film's thunderous score all the trepidation and drama that Hans Zimmer intended. It makes a very convincing case as a budget CD player too. Its musical presentation is full-bodied and cohesive, lathered with punch and rhythmic energy.

Nothing's perfect, but the BDP-S4500 comes very close at this money. Delivering on every count, it's a steal.

pending big bucks on a Blu-ray player seems less and less justifiable when you have hoards of decent performers weighing in at under £100. Each of these four decks goes above and beyond to deliver your money's worth. Each gives you a great picture, as well as essential smarts and USB inputs for granting (or at least boosting) your TV's connection and feature count.

Though discrepancies in picture quality are discernible, the bigger differences are invariably in the sound department. And this is where the Sony BDP-S4500 wins. Its full-bodied presentation is full of panache and punch, making movies and music dramatic and engaging. It edges in front visually, too, revealing more subtlety than rivals with both Blu-ray and DVD. It's the cheapest model in the test and doesn't put a foot wrong.

Close on its heels is the Panasonic DMP-BDT170: competitive on performance

but less so with features, though if you already have catch-up TV services that's, perhaps, not an issue. Revelling in superb detail, super-sharp lines and beautifully judged colours, the Panasonic prioritises pure performance. It's not the most attractive player, but looks aren't everything.

If they were, the LG and Samsung would top the pile, but when it comes to performance, they don't quite live up to their peers. Both deliver sharp, clean and colourful pictures, but with slightly less punch and subtlety. Partner that with small missteps in sound and it's enough to drop a star. The LG lacks weight, and the Samsung dynamics.

In the end, we let out a sigh of relief: none of the big players is doing it wrong. Thing is, competition is fierce at the budget end and only one brand can prevail.

So it's hurrah for people who don't like change. Once again, it's Sony.

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
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
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## HOW TO.

#### **BUILD YOUR AUDIO NETWORK**







ave you recently found yourself becoming the proud owner of a sprawling, burgeoning music collection that's all in digital files? Or perhaps you want to convert all your physical music from vinyl or CD into megabytes and store them in one place that's quick and easy to play from?

The way we listen to music is evolving, and so it's

The way we listen to music is evolving, and so it's essential that you evolve with it too. But don't be afraid to take the plunge - if you've been testing the digital music waters with a handful of MP3s and ripped CD albums on your home computer, then you're already on your way towards creating a harmonious, all-digital source for your hi-fi system.

The next step is to get yourself a Network Attached

The next step is to get yourself a Network Attached Storage (NAS) device. Here, we take you through the who, what, why, and how of creating a vast, smart and networked system for your music collection.



**If you own** a laptop or computer, the chances are you already listen to digital music in one way or another, whether it's via downloaded MP3s and ripped CD albums or using a streaming service like Spotify or Tidal. You may even be listening to a curated playlist through your headphones as you read this.

But can your computer or laptop be used as a dedicated source for your home's traditional hi-fi system? Of course it can. A computer's powerful processor, its intuitive interface and ability to play songs in a variety of formats and qualities makes it a natural medium for playing your everexpanding music library.

#### System 1 Using a laptop or home PC

For those embarking on a computerbased system, a laptop is the ideal starting point for collating your entire music library in one easy-to-access place. The advantages are that you can rip CDs straight in using the optical drive; you can download and buy files from numerous sites (such as Amazon, iTunes. HDTracks and others) and vou can stream music from an expanding choice of online streaming services, from SoundCloud to AppleMusic.

It's easy to connect it to your hi-fi amplifier and speakers too. You can use either the USB or optical connection to hook up your computer or laptop to your stereo amplifier. Don't be deterred if your all-analogue amplifier is an older model and doesn't have digital inputs, as you can easily bridge that gap by using an outboard DAC (see p67 for more).

Using your home computer or laptop as a source, however, has its limitations. If you want the best possible sound quality, you'll want to dedicate your computer to doing just one job: playing music. This means not running any other apps or programs alongside, no Google tabs left open in the background, no checking Facebook every so often -

absolutely nothing to distract the processor's attention away from the music. Of course, that is virtually impossible, as computers are designed for multi-tasking.

Also, despite having a great interface you're accustomed to, the storage space isn't vast. A MacBook Pro, for example, comes with 256GB or 512GB of flash storage. That will hold a few hundred albums, but that space will also be shared by documents, photos, videos, games and more. You'll find you're running out of space fairly quickly, especially if you've decided to venture into high-resolution audio downloads.

#### External hard drive

One way around the limited storage issue is to dump all your music files into an external hard disk drive (HDD), which you can easily buy from likes of Amazon. You can expand by buying more hard drives in various storage capacities, but it means you'll have lots of black boxes connected to your computer at all times. Your music library will also be divided up across these boxes, not all in one place. It's not the most elegant solution.

#### System 2 All about the NAS

So what's the alternative? Network Attached Storage (NAS) devices. To put it simply, a NAS device is a glorified hard drive with software built in. It's a storage space with intelligence. And unlike a hard drive, which connects to a

computer, the NAS connects to your home network.

This means that you can use your laptop, smartphone, hi-fi streamer and even a multi-room system like Sonos to access and play any song stored on that NAS - as long as the devices are connected to the same network.

As it sits on your home network, filled with songs, the NAS's software is intelligent enough to know when a device connects to it, and provides songs to the right device with all the metadata attached, including track, artist and album name, album artwork and file sampling rates.

#### **NAS** storage options

The biggest advantage of using a NAS device is the huge storage space. We're talking terabytes here. Whereas we still think of 1TB as 'a lot of space', some NAS devices can support up to 12TB.

You can buy your NAS in two ways: an all-in-one NAS with a fixed storage capacity, or a NAS enclosure that lets you add multiple hard drives separately.

#### Option 1

With the first, you simply choose a NAS with a fixed amount of storage (usually ranging from several hundred GB to multiple TB). It'll have all the drives and software built in, and is easy to set up - perfect for users who want a fuss-free plug-in-and-play setup. You will be restricted to that finite amount of storage, though, so think ahead to how much you'll actually need. We'd recommend sizing up. It'll be pricier, but at least you won't run out of space easily.

#### Option 2

The second option gives you the chance to expand from the start. You get the NAS enclosure, but there are no hard drives inside: you get to add your own. This gives you the flexibility to buy your own hard drives (which, if you look at the variety online, can be cheaper in the long run) and in various sizes (500GB for now, 1TB for later, for instance).

Most NAS devices come with at least two docking bays (for two 1TB drives), but you can get some with up to eight bays. Each NAS enclosure will have an upper limit (eg. 12TB), and you simply keep adding more hard drives until you hit that limit. The advantages are obvious: you're not stuck on a finite



## The alternative is a Network Attached Storage (NAS) device, a glorified hard drive with intelligent software built in. Unlike a basic hard drive, the NAS device connects to your home network

storage plan, you can expand whenever you wish, and save some money too.

You can buy NAS devices for as little as £100 or as much as £2000, depending on features and storage capacity. Synology and Buffalo are the main brands to look out for, and they offer a variety of options as well as guides to picking the right NAS for your needs. If you're after a high-end option, check out Naim's UnitiServe. Just remember: the bigger the storage number, the higher the price.

#### What's a RAID?

Next, you need to think about backing up your files. After all, you don't want to risk losing your entire music collection by storing it in just one place - that would be a potential disaster. In the NAS world, RAID (Redundant Array of Inexpensive Disks) provides the back-up. It's a system that decides how to back up your data in the most efficient way, as well as get a better performance out of your NAS.

Most NAS devices use two or more hard drives, and that affects what RAID configuration you'll need. Synology's website provides a RAID calculator featuring all the different combinations of storage options, so you can figure out what type of RAID is best for you.

There are various levels of RAID, but to keep things simple, we'll focus on the three main options.

#### DAID

Offers the best operating performance, but zero back up. This configuration needs multiple hard drives over which to read and write data to give you the speediest performance, but if one disk fails, you've lost it all. Not the one we'd recommend for keeping your music safe.

#### RAID 1

Duplicates your music simultaneously on to a separate hard drive, but halves the amount of storage space you have. It's the simplest form of back up as it makes an exact copy. So if one drive fails, the other survives - keeping all your music intact. So far so good - but on the flip side, your disk space is compromised. If you have two 1TB drives, you don't get the full 2TB for music storage, as half will be used up for back up.

#### RAID 5

The best solution for your NAS, but it needs at least three separate drives to work. It's a cleverer system than the other two, offering good performance and the best back-up plan. Additional data used for recovery (called parity) is created and cleverly distributed across

all the drives so that when one drive fails, RAID 5 automatically recreates the lost data from the parity blocks. The only downside? A slight lag in performance.

#### **NAS** software

The bit that makes a NAS device different from (and superior to) HDDs is that it has intelligent software inside it, which recognises the data stored within. It also saves metadata, connects to your home network and acknowledges when a laptop or streamer system wants access to play files.

Most NAS devices will come with their own software embedded, although there are others that can be installed for more functions and a better, faster OS experience. For example, Logitech Media Server is used by Logitech, Synology has their own branded software, and there are third party ones like MinimServer and Plex that can be installed on your NAS and work across other smart devices, too.

Another thing to look out for on the NAS is the speed of transfer. How many kilobytes or megabytes are being transferred per second? As a general rule of thumb, the faster the rate of transfer the better. Look out for a NAS that offers USB ports, too. USB 2.0 is the standard port but rather slow, while USB 3.0 is faster in transferring files from a USB stick or flash drive

#### Getting your music onto a NAS

Whether it's your vast CD collection, high-resolution FLAC downloads or those countless MP3s you have from the days of Napster - all your music can be transferred to your NAS device.

Some NAS devices have CD drives built in, which are mighty handy for ripping and transferring your entire CD collection into your new NAS - but they also tend to cost a lot more.

Instead, you can add an external optical drive for a much cheaper price (usually around £50). Just plug it into the NAS's USB port, and you'll be able to rip CDs straight in to the NAS, and keep all the metadata intact.

The other way is to use your computer or laptop's CD drive to rip your CDs, and then drag and drop the songs into the NAS - this does take slightly longer though. For MacBook Air users, you'll need to buy the USB SuperDrive (£65).

#### **Transfer from computer to NAS**

If you've got music files stored on your computer, you can transfer them using a simple drag-and-drop method. Firstly, make sure the NAS and computer are connected to the same network. Then find the NAS on your computer's server list, and transfer your files over as you normally would. It's that easy.

For music stored on USB stick or flash drives, simply stick them into the NAS's USB port.

#### Compatibility and file format

Of course, you'll have to make sure that every device you use with the NAS is compatible. There are some checklists for the NAS: does it support UPnP? (universal plug and play - it should do exactly as its name suggests); does it have the latest DLNA certification to stream with laptops and smart devices? (it really should); does it support all the popular file formats?

Most smartphones will need an additional app to connect to and play from the NAS server, such as BubbleUPnP and DLNA Player for Android, or media:connect for Apple devices. The major NAS brands will have their own apps, too.

If you're using a computer as the primary source for your hi-fi system, you may find you'll have difficulty playing

every single type of file format. While MP3s and WAV files are universally compatible, you have to make sure other files (especially high-res ones) are supported by Windows Media Player or Apple's iTunes.

For instance, iTunes doesn't support playback of FLAC files (it has its own ALAC version) or DSD, nor does it innately play sample rates higher than 96kHz. You'll also need to download and pay for separate software (such as Pure Music) to play FLAC and DSD on a MacBook.

#### Which format do I need?

With a NAS device, you can pretty much play everything you've stored onto it. However, before you start you'll want to pay attention to the kind of format your music is stored in.

You should also consider whether you need to convert files into one format - it will make a difference to how smoothly your NAS system will run on a daily basis. You may want to configure it so that all your CDs rip into FLAC formats instead of WAV to save space. A five-minute song, for instance, takes up around 50MB in WAV; the same song in FLAC takes up 26MB.

You'll also want to ensure that all your files have their metadata intact. There's nothing more frustrating than seeing hundreds of 'unknown albums' by 'unknown artist' and not knowing what's playing. Some file formats save and present metadata better than others: FLAC and ALAC are considered the best, and are generally preferable to WAV or AIFF files.



#### **Connecting NAS to your network**

Technically, your first step before you even venture into NAS shopping is to make sure you have a stable network set up at home.

You probably already have a connection set up with an internet service provider (such as BT, Virgin or Sky). These companies provide a box which combines a modem (the gateway to the internet) and a router (a connection hub that links all the network devices) in a single chassis.

Modern routers are wireless too, which lets you connect all your devices (from TV and set top boxes to laptop and smartphones) to your home network. Along with sharing and managing your IP address across all connected devices and providing a layer of security called a firewall, a router also acts as a network switch. This lets devices within your network talk to each other. Without it, your smartphone wouldn't be able to stream songs from your NAS, nor would you be able to transfer files from your computer to the NAS.

Most routers come with a standard four ethernet ports, into which it's best to plug in fixed, stationary devices such as your home computer, TV and the NAS device. All your other portable devices can be connected wirelessly. While there are wireless NAS boxes, they're not always reliable – we prefer the security and stability of a wired connection.

Once you connect your NAS to the network, a web-based set up page will pop up on your computer, and it'll guide you through setting up the NAS. It's worth jotting down the IP address of the NAS, in case you need to find it on the server list of any connected devices. You can usually give your NAS a name, too.

#### Connecting NAS to your hi-fi

And now for the final, most rewarding step: getting all that stored music to play through your hi-fi system.


Here, you will need a networked streamer to get your files from the NAS device over to your hi-fi system.

Streamers can range from the Cambridge CXN (£700) or Pioneer N-50A (£500) to more high-end options like the Naim NDX at £3400.

The streamer, which is also connected to your network, is the device that communicates with the NAS and streams music through to your amplifier using analogue or digital connections. All you have to do now is select your favourite song, press play, and *voilà*: you've got your entire music library blasting through your speakers. Sit back and enjoy!

## The logical conclusion

From the first black and white portables to Ultra HD and OLED, your telly has come a long way in a short time. But could 4K projectors be the final word in big-screen video technology?

t's the battle of the big guns, as projector giants Epson and Sony set out to bring the full cinema experience to the comfort of your home. They may be going for it in a big way, but with these tech-packed models priced at around £6000, this also requires some serious commitment.

That figure may be more expensive than extortionate in the projector world (we've seen some models selling for north of £30,000), but shelling out the equivalent of a mortgage deposit is a risky business and you'll want to get your precious money's worth - that kick-ass surround sound system of yours deserves an equally thrilling picture, after all.

4K has made its way onto projectors and is alive and kicking in Sony's mid-range VPL-VW300ES, while Epson's all-singing-all-dancing flagship, the LS10000, stands as the brand's first laser model.

The Epson is bigger in size (just), but which goes bigger on performance? It's time to find out.



Time and time again Epson has proven itself a frontrunner in the budget projector market. But can it provide the ultimate big-screen thrill to warrant serious spending too? The EH-LS10000, the company's flagship model, is out to try.

#### First laser projector

It's a projector of firsts for the company. Sony and JVC entered the laser projector market some time ago, but this is Epson's first projector to use a laser light source. Epson claims the laser will last for 30,000 hours in Eco mode - that's a film per day for 41 years before it needs to be replaced.

It's also the first to feature the company's 4K Enhancement technology. But beware: the EH-LS10000 is pseudo-4K - a native Full HD (1920 x 1080) projector that can accept 4K material. The 'enhancement' technology claims to achieve 'better than Full HD' perceived-4K resolution by shifting each pixel diagonally by 0.5 pixels.

#### Noise-free picture

Does it work? In some ways, yes. The 4K clips we play look impressively noise-free on our 96in screen. People and objects have distinct, lifelike outlines and colours look faithful. The giveaway - and perhaps the deal-breaker for 4K purists - is its level of insight.

The pure 4K Sony VPL-VW300ES retrieves greater detail, even when the Epson's 4K enhancement setting

> is at its most intense. The Epson's real talents lie in its Full HD performance and this is where your investment is best rewarded.

Bumping down colour and experimenting with colour temperature (we prefer 'Natural') can be done with a THX Optimizer disc, though turning 'Frame Interpolation' to 'Medium' is a must for getting rid of the disruptive motion instability.

Colours are generally convincing: rich and balanced. And everything from the red running track to the green warplanes and beige prisoner get-ups are nicely nuanced.

#### **Touch of class**

The picture is beautifully bright and punchy thanks to the Epson's 1500 lumens, and myriad detail levels keep you transfixed by what you're watching. Under close scrutiny, however, the Sony edges ahead with insight by a whisker.

3D can be played in either 'Dynamic' or 'Cinema' mode. There's not much between the two - both produce an engaging and stable picture - but our preference goes to the latter for its subtler colour delivery. Two pairs of 3D glasses come supplied and extras can be purchased for £65 per pair.

Unlike its sibling in the company's Pro Cinema range, the LS9600e, it doesn't have built-in wireless connectivity. Connections include two HDMI ports - officially 1.4, but they support 4K in the higher 50Hz and 60Hz that was brought by HDMI 2.0 as part of its improved standard. Still, that doesn't detract from the fact it's a Full HD projector. Regardless, there's no commercial material out yet with that frame rate.

By projector standards the EH-LS10000 is big, but Epson's blueprint curves ensure it has beauty and not just bulk. You know you're dealing with state-of-the-art gear when an electric shutter opens upon start-up, giving you a warm, fuzzy feeling inside. It adds a touch of class that we can't help but admire. Save for the mechanism's momentary whirr, operation noise is largely

minimal. It shuts down instantly and starts up in a hurry, delivering a picture in well under the claimed 20 seconds nine times out of ten.

It's a doddle to set up too: the intuitive menus make flicking through the extensive settings manageable rather than off-putting.

#### **Chunky tool**

On the left-hand side is a retractable push-in-pop-out panel revealing power, source, menu and lens adjustment buttons - handy Shutter if you've misplaced service the remote.

its memory). Epson has some cracking projectors in its catalogue, and the EH-LS10000 is certainly worthy of its flagship title. It's not as subtle nor detailed as the Sony, but delivers the wow factor you'd expect for £6000.

We'd like to see native 4K, though: despite the 4K-enhancement technology doing its bit to surpass Full HD quality, those willing to hop on the 4K bandwagon might be better off opting for the real deal.

### SONY VPL-VW300ES £5850

Most projector brands would consider a near-£6000 model flagship territory. Not Sony. With the company's top-tier projector topping £19,000, this VPL-VW300ES is in fact a midrange model, sitting in esteemed company above the 2014 Award-winning VPL-HW55ES (£2800) and below the four-star VPL-VW500ES (£8500).

For the money you save over its bigger brother, you get a lower light output (1500 lumens as opposed to 1700), no lens memory function and the omission of a dynamic iris, meaning it doesn't boast its big brother's 200,000:1 contrast ratio. (The contrast ratio is absent altogether on the spec sheet).

#### No compromise resolution

Still, the VPL-VW300ES has plenty going for it. Firstly, it's a native 4K projector with the full-blown, no-compromise 4096 x 2160 resolution (as opposed to the slightly shoehorned 3840 x 2160 4K resolution for TVs).

It uses Sony's household SXRD panels, which are claimed to produce a more stable image by minimising the space between pixels and aligning red, green and blue areas in every

> frame at a response rate of 2.5 milliseconds. Another Sony proprietary, Triluminos display technology, also promises better colour reproduction and detail than standard projectors.

#### Texture like sandpaper

It's called a 'compact 4K home projector' on Sony's online store, but don't take that literally. It leaves the same footprint as its big brother, the chassis about the size of a

small microwave and weighing 14kg. It Individual

certainly looks the part: its black body has well-worn sandpaper.

If your set-up requires a projector to be near a rear wall, you're in luck. With just the power lead plugging into the unit's back, you'll find operation buttons on the right hand-side and connections on the left, which include two HDMI 2.0 inputs (one supports HDCP 2.2, so is kitted out for future 4K hardware releases) and a USB socket for firmware updates. An optional wireless HDMI receiver (£280) takes HDMI cables out the equation between the projector and source.

The remote is reassuringly big with clearly labelled buttons: shortcuts to bump up brightness, contrast, sharpness; adjust picture settings; switch picture modes. 'User' lets you fine-tune individual settings to your taste, though a THX Optimizer disc is the perfect aid here.

#### Razor-sharp detail

The VPL-VW300ES's biggest selling point is its performance. We start with 4K, using a hard-drive supplied by Sony. Even the stock clips of cityscapes and flowers are enough to know the Sony is a great advert for 4K: razor-sharp and erupting with fine detail and eye-popping colour. Close to the screen, people and petals are astonishingly lifelike. It's this sort of 4K performance that has us itching for Ultra HD Blu-ray players and discs.

Sony's Reality Creation - a 'super resolution upscaler' - is designed to enhance Full HD material, and does a grand job. Play Birdman on Blu-ray and the VPL-VW300ES showboats its talent in the close-ups of Michael Keaton: his face bursts with expression and subtlety, and the Birdman costume is textured, the outline of each feather distinct.

#### Swift movement

One of Sony's better processing modes, Motionflow, smooths out initial judder surprisingly well. However, the 'Smooth Low' level secures our vote for delivering a smooth yet natural look. 'Smooth High' goes one step further, but it makes the movie appear too artificially processed.

Playing out in one single shot, the film is a series of camera pans, quick jerks, and swift movement through corridors. Yet the Sony doesn't bat an eyelid, each transition steady and blur-free.

#### It's a serious business

The assault of colour on Times Square billboards is bright, solid and well-judged, while the theatre's rich curtains and seats are blood-red - just right. Praise carries into contrast. Stage lights sparkle behind the darkened audience, each well-defined. Blacks aren't as inky as through the Epson, but in The Hobbit: Battle of the Five Armies on DVD, the lapels of Alfrid's black

coat are more distinguishable.

Elsewhere, the Sony handles resolution drops well. The picture remains clean even in its densest moments. Active 3D completes the spec sheet, but you'll have to fork out £48 for a pair of glasses.

Even though the VPL-VW300ES isn't at the top end of Sony's line-up, shelling out £6000 for a projector is serious business. But rest assured, you'll see every penny of the price. At this level, you won't find many that pay more attention to detail. Or that can make movies look this good.

need an analogue waveform. Without a DAC, your digital music collection is nothing but a collection of "Os and 1s" (more on that shortly) that makes sense only within a digital device. In short, DACs play a large part in making digital music possible.


The biggest problem is that the DAC circuits used in many of these devices are just not good enough to do the original recording justice, so turning to a DAC upgrade can be the easiest way to transform your digital music and really get the most from your system whatever your set up.

#### The science of the DAC

The sounds we hear on a day-to-day basis - traffic, instruments, that baby screaming on your otherwise peaceful commute - are transmitted in soundwaves, which travel through the air to our ears in a continuously varying analogue signal.

Analogue recordings were stored on the likes of vinyl records, and later cassette tapes, but the unwanted noise and fragility of these formats made way for something new. The CD was born, kickstarting the digital revolution in the process.

Digital audio is a very different beast to analogue. Digital music files are usually found in the form of Pulse Code



In simplistic terms, a digital signal is created by taking the analogue sound waveform and taking precise measurement of it at highly regular intervals. The waveform is captured more faithfully the more accurate the amplitude measurement and the more often the measurements are taken. A good DAC is vital in reconverting those digital readings to an accurate analogue wave, and so into the sound you hear.

other hand, and you'll take a step up to 24 bits, with a sample rate taken 192,000 encoding and compression formats - but no matter how it's done, it is the DAC's job to make sense of it all, translating it as accurately as possible from its binary format to return it as close to the original analogue recording as it can.

#### So why do I need a separate DAC?

While it's true just about every piece of digital kit features a DAC, it's just as apparent that not all DACs are created equal. Poor converters can introduce unwanted noise during playback due to poorly designed circuitry - and they might not support all file data rates, not to mention add extra distortion due to iitter.

Jitter is best defined as digital timing errors. The precise timing of a digital music stream is vital to high performance, and if that isn't done properly (usually because of poorly designed digital-clock circuitry) performance suffers.

Such jitter problems can arise every time a digital signal has to travel around a circuit board - and it's particularly troublesome when the signal is transferred between devices. In recent years we've seen the rise of the asynchronous DAC, which takes over timing duties from the computer it is connected to for just this reason. The digital clocks found in dedicated hi-fi DACs tend to be more accurate



than those used in the average PC, so usually the sound will be correspondingly better.

#### The source material is all

Of course, to get the most from a DAC you need to start out with good source material - don't expect miracles if all you're throwing at a converter is 128kbps MP3s. In fact, better decoding of such a compressed signal could make any sonic shortcomings more obvious.

You'll hear the optimum results with CD-quality content and above, which is best stored in FLAC, WAV or ALAC (Mac) lossless PCM formats, or alternatively DSD if you prefer.

#### **DSD** and **PCM**

DSD, or Direct Stream Digital, is an alternative to PCM, and was a format originally conceived for Super Audio CDs (SACDs), championed by Sony and Philips in the late '90s and into the '00s.

It's a much more niche format, differing from PCM by offering a bit depth of just one, but much higher sampling rates with DSD64 at 2.8 MHz and DSD128 at 5.6 MHz.

The arguments as to which encoding system is better continue to rage on. Suffice to say if you're someone firmly settled in the DSD camp, it's worth checking that the DAC you're considering supports it - not all do.

#### The right DAC for you

DACs come in all shapes and sizes, and offer varying levels of input options and functionality, so you'll need to think about how you want to use it, not to mention the budget you have to spend.

Compact USB DACs offer portability and convenience at a reasonable price. They vary in size between something no bigger than a standard USB stick to a pocket-sized unit that connects via a separate USB cable.

More often than not, they use the power from your computer, so there's no need for an extra power source. They largely keep connections simple, with just a headphone socket and possibly a line-level output for hooking up to powered speakers or a hi-fi system.

If you need more connectivity and are not bothered about taking your DAC around with you, a desktop USB unit might be more suitable. These are usually bigger and require their own power source, but often offer several additional digital or analogue audio inputs alongside a USB input for

connecting to your computer. Keep an eye out for a headphone amp if you'll be wanting to use headphones, as not all offer one as an option.

Finally, there are the DACs that are designed to work as part of a bigger home audio system. These will usually have even more inputs - particularly more niche ones such as AES/EBU - and potentially more features too, supporting the full range of high-resolution music formats for example, or offering Bluetooth connectivity for streaming wirelessly from your smartphone or tablet. Some will even come with volume control, so they can be used as a pre-amp too.

#### A worthwhile investment

Whether you're spending £100 or more than £1000 on a DAC, there's no doubt the change you will hear in your system makes choosing a good one at your budget a task worth investing some time in - dotted around these pages are some of our favourites. Then you can simply sit back and enjoy the music.

t's easy to dismiss Tannoy's Prestige series for being old-fashioned. While the range's traditional appearance may not suit the décor in many UK homes, it's a firm favourite in the Far East where the fine craftsmanship, retro details and sonic talent have brought huge success. We have one of the mid-sized models on test here, the Kensington GR, and even a quick listen proves there's more at work here than just nostalgia.

When we say mid-sized it's only in the context of the range. What we actually have here is a huge cabinet that's 105 litres in volume and 110cm tall. Packaged, these speakers weigh in at a hefty 49kg each, so make sure you have a willing (and strong) friend to help unpack them.

#### Attention to detail

Once you do that you'll find that the Kensington GRs are beautifully made, wider than they are deep and covered with loads of retro design details. Their cabinets are solid too, using a mixture of high-density birch ply for the front baffle and rear panel, combined with particle

There are loads of neat cosmetic touches. We love the GR (Gold Reference) emblem on the front baffle and the engraved thick metal plate used for the treble adjustment section. The surprisingly heavy grille actually locks into place and there's a chunky key that

unlocks it for removal. Neat - our inner nerd loves such things.

Items such as the beautifully finished wooden box that houses the biwire links, spikes and nicely produced manual help promote pride of ownership. It's details like this that really boost the feel-good factor.

#### Traditional approach

Despite all the fancy woodwork, the heart of these speakers is Tannoy's trademark Dual Concentric drive unit. The one used in the GR builds on decades of development. It has a 25cm paper pulp mid/bass cone with an impregnated twin roll fabric surround.

The tweeter - positioned in the heart of the mid/bass to help integration - is a 52mm aluminium/magnesium dome. It fires through a 'pepper pot' grating into a stainless steel horn - an arrangement said to help sensitivity and control directivity.

We don't normally talk about the magnet material used in a drive unit, but here we'll make an exception. The Dual Concentric driver uses an Alnico magnet

to provide the driving force for both the low- and high-frequency drivers. Tannoy claims the use of Alnico helps give the drive unit array a cleaner transient response and increased sensitivity.

#### Think big

The sheer size of the Kensingtons means you'll need a big room. Around 20 square metres as a minimum, we'd say. Make sure you can place these floorstanders at least a metre out into the room to make the most of their stereo imaging.

Tannoy provides a good degree of flexibility in the treble. On the front baffle you'll find adjustments for treble energy and roll-off. These are subtle enough to be useful, so it's well worth experimenting to optimise performance.

The Kensington GRs can be biwired, and they benefit from that, sounding more precise and lucid when used this way. As with other Tannoys there's an additional terminal next to the two pairs of signal inputs, the use of which (wired to the ground-pin on your amplifier) results in a cleaner, crisper presentation.

#### Comfortably accomplished

Effortless - that's our first impression of the Kensington GRs' sound. They'll deliver a piece of music such as Hans Zimmer's *Where We're Going* (from the *Interstellar* OST) with breathtaking composure. The large dynamic shifts of the track are rendered with impressive force and the scale of the presentation is just huge. Yet it's all done with an astonishing sense of ease. At no point do these speakers sound strained or close to their limits, even at high volumes.

There's none of the hardness of lesser speakers when pushed, nor the restrained dynamics often found with small drive units and compact cabinets.

Then there's the bass. While it comes as no surprise that a speaker this size produces lots of it, we're impressed by the Tannoys' quality here. They're subtle, textured and articulate. Rivals from the likes of B&W and Focal deliver more punch and grip, but sacrifice a little grace in the process. It's a trade-off we're happy to accept.

We're impressed with the Tannoys' stereo imaging too. Positioned with care



The sheer size of the cabinets and the high quality of engineering are key to the scale of the GRs' performance

these speakers set up a wide and deep soundstage populated by securely focused instruments.

We move on to Nina Simone's Feeling Good and the Kensingtons continue to shine. That Dual Concentric driver gives a seamless and direct delivery, rendering Simone's vocals with real passion and drive. Along with the power, we're reminded just how subtle and insightful these speakers are.

We give alt-J's *Hunger Of The Pine* a listen and are struck by the Tannoy's rhythmic skill. The overall presentation is a little gentler than we're used to, but there's still enough energy to satisfy. The fine timing, strong dynamics and clarity are more than enough to win us over.

The Kensington GRs are speakers to love. While their retro appearance may not be to all tastes, there's enough sonic quality to place them on the top rung of speakers at this price. They're gentle giants, balancing finesse with force in a very appealing way. Consider us tempted.

urmester's Musiccenter 151 is difficult to pigeonhole. It's a streamer, server, CD player and ripper wrapped in one superbly made chrome-laden box. That's a complex array of talents, but it's easy to see why the German high-end brand has taken such a comprehensive approach.

Most of the company's customers have built-up their systems over a number of years, and quite likely have large collections of CDs. For these people it's easy to simply replace their existing CD player with the 151, rather than add yet another box for streaming music.

The Musiccenter has two 2TB modules: one mirrors the data on the other, so there's always a back-up of your music if one of them goes wrong. The built-in slot-loading disc drive means that ripping CDs is easy. There's a choice of two quality levels - very thorough and obsessively thorough, the 151 happy to take more than 15 minutes to rip a disc. Scratched discs take longer, as the player re-reads the damaged sections until the maximum amount of data is recovered.

### Swimming with the Tidal

A recent firmware upgrade adds a Tidal app and also means the 151 will now work as a conventional (UPnP) music streamer too, able to render music stored on external NAS devices. It'll cope with files up to 24-bit/192kHz, though the lack of DSD replay might bother some. While the company provides a conventional remote, any streaming operations are best handled with the dedicated app. The company supplies an Apple iPad Mini, preloaded with the app, in the box - that's a nice touch.

The app isn't the only way to control the 151. You can do that with a web

browser on computer too, and the web route is the way to go for configuring ripping quality or setting output voltage to match your partnering amplifier.

This Burmester's build quality is everything we've come to expect from the brand. The unit feels solid and is superbly finished, as the price demands.

### Dealing with a disc

We start off by using the Musiccenter as a CD player and are pleased with what we hear. Its presentation has the refined, creamy balance we've come to associate with Burmester. Play a hard-edged recording such as Terry's Song from Bruce Springsteen and the 151 delivers a sound full of finesse and subtlety. There's plenty of detail, from the coarse texture of Springsteen's passionate vocals to the precise rendering of the instrumental backdrop. The Musiccenter's refinement means that the hard edges of this demo-like recording aren't exaggerated. The music always takes the limelight.

A move to streaming a CD rip of Stravinsky's The Rite Of Spring allows the 151 to impress even more. The piece's vicious dynamic swings are delivered

We don't notice any great difference in quality between using the 151 as a CD player or streamer. At all times it remains informative but refined. The balance is tilted (slightly) towards richness at lower frequencies and smoothness at the top-end, but it's never taken too far. It means poorer recordings and lowerquality sources are kindly treated.

The 151 is expensive, but it's a fine high-end CD player and an equally pleasing music streamer. The decent app makes it a pleasure to use too, even if the unit's responses are a touch sluggish on occasion. If you want a high-end streamer plus the luxury of playing CDs to a very high level, look no further.



# Ascending to cult classic status?

Jupiter Ascending is a film only the Wachowskis could have made. Nobody gives spiritual hokum as much credence as they do.

Ascending sees Mila Kunis's Jupiter, a Russian immigrant who cleans toilets for a living, targeted by the space-faring Abrasax siblings Balem, Titus and Kalique (Eddie Redmayne, Douglas Booth and Tuppence Middleton), each with their own plan for her.

### Galactic wheels keep turning

The Abrasax clan seed worlds and harvest them, turning the population into a commodity to keep the (galactic) wheels of commerce churning. Jupiter, though, is the reincarnation of their mother and holds the key to the universe's most valuable resource: Earth. But as she's about to be terminated, the half-lycan albino soldier Caine (Channing Tatum) comes to her rescue.

It's an utterly daft plot that gives The Matrix duo free rein to indulge their creative wishes with spectacular chases, inventive technology and mumbo jumbo about genetic splicing that sees Sean Bean's military officer cast as a man with the DNA of a bee.

It's space camp - and no one personifies that more than Redmayne's Balem, employing a hoary whisper before shouting very loudly. Booth and Middleton are restrained in comparison, the former a charming cad, the latter a superior presence who effortlessly glides through her scenes.

Kunis's Jupiter is always being rescued and Tatum broods for much of the film. There's less fun to be had with the main leads than the colourful Abrasax family.

The problems don't stop there. The stereotypical characters and story won't win awards for being fresh. Pacing becomes a problem as the movie thunders to its extremely loud climax - and in building a mythology, it has enough exposition for three films. Attempts at levity come across as a little stiff and forced too.

### Superb visuals and sound

It is, at least, impeccably designed and this disc is reference quality. The visuals are stunning, the digital cinematography razor sharp and packed full of fine detail. The sound design is terrific too, as sounds clang and whoosh with a full-bodied intensity, and Michael Giacchino's operatic score is one of his best. Shame the US Dolby Atmos track is not included.

Jupiter Ascending could become a cult classic, adored by a few, disliked by many. It's a ludicrous, entertaining riff on Cinderella - in Space!

Check your cynicism at the door and there's much silliness to enjoy.

Is there much difference, in practical terms, between a USP and a gimmick? Everything Everything had better hope there is - they're three albums in now, and singer Jonathan Higgs' continuing willingness to get his falsetto voice out at every opportunity is this close to the tipping-point. It's quirky, and it makes EE sound distinct (even beyond their ongoing mash-up of angular indie guitar shapes, Talking Heads-y afrobeats and grinding, clattering electronic glitter). But could you do a whole 45 minutes in one sitting?

As long as your teeth aren't set too badly on edge, mind you, there's plenty about *Get To Heaven* to recommend it. It's melodically strong (*Fortune 500* in particular is an ear- worm) and while it's rather one-paced there is a lot of light and shade in the arrangements of the likes of *Spring/Sun/Winter/Dread* and *Blast Doors*.

### **Characterful midrange**

As an overall test of your system's prowess, *Get To Heaven* rather ironically suffers from the 'everything louder than everything else' school of production, with dynamics being flattened to a constant in the quest for all the volume all the time. There's a huge amount of character to be extracted from vocal in the midrange, though, and plenty of indie-disco bottom-end presence and punch to be revealed. And where separation and focus are concerned, *Get To Heaven* is as tricky a proposition as we've heard all year.

### Follows the indie template

On the whole My Love Is Cool is in thrall to the guiet-loud-guiet indie template laid down some decades ago, and as such is a decent test of your set-up's ability to turn it on and off again at speed. There's a good examination of tonality in the massed effects-pedal guitar squalls too, and a lot of midrange nuance to be revealed at the same time. The production, by and large, strikes a nice balance between hi-fi satisfaction and radio-friendly compression - so there's space and detail to be described if your system's up to it. Even if it's not, though, My Love Is Cool is a colour-coordinated and well-dressed 50 minutes.

So when you're not battling you're playing Cilla for your subjects – more fun than it might sound.

### Stonehearst Asylum Blu-ray Out now

The first time we lay eyes on Stonehearst Asylum it's wreathed in fog as thunder decorates the sky. This, it seems, is not a good place.

And yet a look inside shows happy, lively patients. The tone – light and playful – is at odds with the exterior. So what are we to believe?

That's the crux of this twisty film from Brad Anderson. Jim Sturgess's Dr Newgate arrives at the asylum to finish his studies, but he experiences some unexpected events. He is greeted by Ben Kingsley's Dr Lamb (whose presence recalls *Shutter Island*) and David Thewlis's Mickey Finn, but their demeanour suggests that something is off.

There's light in the darkness in the form of Kate Beckinsale's Eliza Graves, who sparks something in Newgate. Who is she to him and why is he so intent on rescuing her? They are all backed up by a terrific supporting cast including Michael Caine and Sinéad Cusack. The less you know about this film the better...





# Dolby Atmos & DTS:X

The lowdown on what to expect from the next generation of surround sound

The arrival of Dolby's Atmos surround system brought immersive, room-filling sound to the home. DTS has stepped up to the plate with its own DTS:X.

But what is it, where can you get it and where's the content?

### The basics

Atmos and DTS:X deliver object-based surround sound but both differ in how they implement it. Dolby requires upwardfiring speakers or in-ceiling speakers that produce 'height', which allows sounds to come from above.

DTS:X will work with existing set-ups so your speaker package should, in theory, work with no upgrades. DTS:X doesn't require a specific speaker configuration and supports up to 32 speaker locations. How does it create a 3D soundfield without upward-firing speakers?DTS claims that the extra channels will compensate, producing sounds that immerse the viewer. Will this be more effective? We'll have to wait and see.

### What can you play it on?

A standard Blu-ray player only passes through Atmos or DTS:X. Decoding is the job of the AV receiver. Atmos launched last autumn and is now supported by a wide range of manufacturers. By the time you read this DTS:X may already be out - it's on track for a summer 2015 launch - with several manufacturers and most of the industry onboard.

The list includes Anthem, Cambridge Audio, Denon,



Marantz, McIntosh, Onkyo, Pioneer and Yamaha, the majority of which will equip receivers via a firmware update. Before we went to press Sony announced some of its AV receiver line-up for 2015, but there was no mention of support for either Atmos or DTS:X. That could change when the company announce its higher-end receivers.

### Where's the content?

Dolby has seen growth in this area with American Sniper and Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles among confirmed UK

Blu-rays. Naturally, it's a little thin on the ground for DTS:X. Ex Machina is the format's first title, but only in the US. The UK Blu-ray release does not carry a DTS:X track.

Expect the situation to change once Ultra HD Blu-ray arrives later this year as both Atmos and DTS:X are included in the format's specifications. By then we'll know if either technology is here for the long haul.

Onkyo has dived in with support for Dolby Atmos across its range. The implementation of Atmos is superb in the TX-NR3030, with effects placed all around the room

#### **Speaker positioning**

Speaker positioning is a notoriously tricky subject. The size of the speakers, the space they're given and how manufacturers tune them will affect the performance. It pays to experiment, and these tips will help you on your way.

#### What's in a name?

You've heard of bookshelf speakers, right?
The name is a misnomer. They're not meant
to be placed on an actual bookshelf and that
goes for most speakers. Place them on a
rickety support and performance will
degrade because of a lack of rigidity and
resonances. Speakers need a steady and
robust support, so invest in a pair of speaker
stands. Bear in mind that no one stand will
work well with all speakers. Find what
works for you.

#### Toetheline

What is speaker toe-in? Simply the degree at which a speaker is angled in towards the listener. Some manufacturers have specific angles but it's your ears that'll notice the difference. Play a snippet of a track you know and tweak the toe-in by shifting your speaker an inch or so until the stereo imaging snaps into focus.

#### Ear me

Loudspeakers need care in positioning.
Placing them close to a wall can help
performance but it can negatively affect it
too, depending on how the speaker has
been tuned. Give them too much room and
the performance may lack solidity and
energy. Place them too close and there's a
chance they'll sound overblown with boomy
bass. Every speaker will react differently.
Start near to the rear wall and play 30
seconds of music you're familiar with: stop,
move and repeat the process until you find
an area you're happy with.

#### Where to put them?

We prefer to place the speakers at the points of an equilateral triangle, with the listener at the top. Use the triangle as a starting point and then experiment and fine tune the positioning to your satisfaction.

Noisy commute? Noisy workplace? That's where the QuietComfort 25s come into play. Flick the switch and the world goes eerily silent. Whereas other noise-cancelling cans can struggle with eliminating consistent noises (or just sharp, loud ones), the QuietComforts manage to nip most of the outside world in the bud. Rest assured they excel with playback too, having little to no problems with any genre you throw at them.



#### its Momentum range and the M2 IEis (the lower case 'i' stands for Apple iPhone), are another terrific effort. They offer an excellent fit (and come with different-sized eartips) and the attractive design draws the eye, but the true measure of them can be found in the

Sennheiser Momentum M2 IEi, £90

Sennheiser has been impressing lately with

fine clarity of their sound. Smooth and balanced, for an in-ear they offer a healthy dose of bass without muddying the details.



#### Wireless Philips Fidelio M2BT, £185

Wireless is improving, though it's not quite the match of a wired connection, Philips' M2BTs show that the gap is reducing bit by bit. The obvious benefit is not tangled cables but the M2BTs ease of use (the controls are built into the right ear pad) makes it more intuitive than reaching for your phone. And the sound? There's a sense of detail, a richness and enthusiasm with none of the harshness of wireless sound that makes listening to music with these cans a joy.



#### **Portable** AKG Y50, £80

Bold and striking, and that's just the design, AKG's Y50s are a refreshing change for the Austrian company. What hasn't been altered too much is their approach to sound. They're not as direct as another past winner - the K451s - but they offer a clear, open (despite being closed on-ears) soundstage with plenty of detail and dynamism. Effortlessly comunicating the complexities of music, they're able to pluck the sound of an instrument from a dense track. Excellent.

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
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



## Recorded music is at a crossroads

The format in which you listen to your music could be undermining the quality of your hi-fi system

For those of us that consider themselves a music lover, albeit to different degrees, we are part of a very fortunate generation. We now have access to an evergrowing wealth of recorded music of extraordinary range and depth, effectively accumulated over the last 60 years. With the introduction of the microgroove LP record in the early 1950's, playback quality took a quantum leap forward and this also coincided with a far higher standard of recording techniques. Although further improvements have been made over the vears, this was a watershed time that first introduced hi-fi as a reality.

We now have literally millions of recorded music tracks available

to us in all genres and many different formats. One trend over recent years, however, has been to deliberately downgrade the quality in order to offer quantity. The main culprits have been MP3 and AAC formats which were designed as a low cost form of delivery when download speeds were slow and computer chip memory was expensive. Neither now applies and both formats should be consigned to history.

#### **Quality vs quantity**

Let us explain. The maximum resolution from MP3 and AAC file formats, which are both highly compressed, is 320 kbps (kilobytes per second) which compares with CD quality of 1411 kbps. This means the resolution quality is less than



a quarter of that provided by a standard CD. However, most MP3 or AAC files are downloaded over the internet and the most used download resolution is 128 kbps, which is around one-eleventh of CD quality. This should ring alarm bells. If you are only playing back these tracks on an iPod or mobile phone with a pair of earbuds, the quality may be irrelevant to you. But if these tracks are your primary source of music, perhaps with an iPod dock into a decent hi-fi system, you are only making a very poor quality sound louder. Information is irretrievably lost and the full dynamic range is lacking. The quality will be very poor in contrast with a full resolution version even if you are completely unaware of the loss you are inflicting upon yourself. This can even affect the type of music listened to

as most classical recordings downloaded as an MP3 or AAC file will have so much information missing, and all the complexities of the music lost, with the end result that the recording is reduced to just the essence of a tune.

## What is the future of recorded music?

There are now positive signs for the future of recorded music. Audiophiles, or hi-fi connoisseurs, have been very important to the music industry as they are generally avid music lovers who aim to maximise their enjoyment by listening to music at its best quality level, which

means the play-back of great recordings through hi-end hi-fi to achieve the most outstanding results. Without them, a main driver for quality would probably be removed from the music industry. They have always sought out quality but there is now an increasing awareness among the wider public of the serious deficiencies of the highly compressed formats. Full resolution audio streaming, as well as CD quality downloads, are already available and will surely become the eventual norm with this greater awareness of the tremendous quality benefit. Consumers will vote through their purchases and will seek out higher resolution recordings. Look at Qobuz for a new high-profile entry into this field who offer CD quality (16 bit/44.1 kHz FLAC) streaming for over 15 million tracks.

Without them, hi-fi manufacturers and potential customers would have to rely on the opinion of magazine reviewers to assess levels of performance - a notoriously unreliable decision making process. For specialist hi-fi dealers, their relationship with audiophiles and hi-fi connoisseurs is also crucial to them for, if they are to stay in business, they must satisfy the most discerning customers in the industry. The reality is that audiophiles and specialist hi-fi retailers (and the ones listed on this page represent the UK's finest) are essential to each other.

Specialist dealers know how to choose the products that combine as a superb system and how to get the best out of it by expert installation in the home. They also appreciate how exciting and involving music can be and how it can deliver a powerful emotional experience. If there's a price premium over an internet purchase by choosing a specialist dealer, it's probably a small one, but it's unquestionably worth the difference.

Some of the menus and controls require the use of the Omnia's strange telescopic stylus. It isn't particularly accurate and you often find yourself prodding away furiously trying to get the phone to recognise your commands.

You play music and video content through the phone's Touch Player. The system is competent enough to display album artwork, but it still lacks the finesse, quality and resolution displayed by the iPhone and BlackBerry Storm.

The bundled headphones fit surprisingly well and come with different sized ear-buds, which is very accommodating. They hook up to the

phone using Samsung's own proprietary connection, although the inline volume control has a 3.5mm jack for alternative headphones. This avenue should definitely be explored, as in use, the headphones sound bright and are easily agitated by lively, dynamic tunes

Otherwise, general sound quality and video quality are okay, but not memorable. The Omnia does everything competently without ever excelling. Video playback just about matches the quality of the Nokia, and musically the Omnia just treads water, failing to bring your music collection to life.

If you're looking for a multimedia phone the Omnia might be worth a casual glance, but there are more capable. more attractive alternatives out there.



## Samsung SGH-i900 (Omnia)

#### Just a hint of things to come

e weren't the least bit surprised Samsung's new Galaxy S6 won this month's premium phone group test (p30). The Korean tech giant has been at the top of the Smartphone tree for years now.

That hasn't always been the case, as is made clear by our January 2009 review of one of Samsung's earliest efforts. The SGH-i900, known as the Omnia to its friends, showed clear signs of where the brand was headed, but it certainly didn't have the all-round talent to worry the iPhone of the day.

#### Plenty of features, but performance was lacking

It was packed with features including a telescopic stylus, the then still ooh-worthy haptic feedback and a microSD card slot. As continues to be Samsung's way, file compatibility was excellent. The phone's primitive Windows Mobile OS made the inclusion of WMV and WMA files obvious, but we were happy to see AAC alongside MP3 on the audio side of things.

Performance wasn't great though, with the i900 failing to deliver video and audio with any great skill. We also weren't taken with the Windows OS, finding it clunky in use - though the early iteration of Samsung's Touchwiz interface came in for some praise.

Fast forward to today's Galaxy S6 and it's clear Samsung has learned much over the years. The latest phone has plenty of ability to match its comprehensive specifications. Video performance is about as good as it gets and audio, once a real weakness of Samsung's handsets, has improved enough to give Apple's engineers a few sleepless nights. Not a bad showing for a handset founded from such humble beginnings.
