

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

Compact Vena is a breath of fresh air for Quad

Quad Vena | Stereo amplifier | £600

Compact stereo amps are all the rage at the moment. Products such as the Monitor Audio Airstream A100 and NAD D 3020 have been a breath of fresh air, bringing clever design, smart features and excellent sound to the world of hi-fi. They're a great shout for those of us who consume music over multiple sources, whether CD player, computer or high-tech smartphone.

New tech for a respected brand

The appeal for such products hasn't been lost on Quad, one of the most respected hi-fi brands in the business. The Vena may be chunkier than the NAD and more sedatelooking than the Monitor Audio, but it looks and feels the part - build quality is excellent, the design cut very much from Quad cloth.

The 'Lancaster Grey' finish, pictured here, gives a classic look - if you want something with a bit more pizazz, it's worth casting your eyes over the three optional





finishes - piano black, piano white or sapele mahogany - although note that each one will set you back an additional £100.

The front panel is a minimalist affair with a motorised volume control and a line-up of buttons corresponding with the amp's inputs. Everything's there bar a built-in phono stage for a turntable.

Both Type A and Type B USB inputs are on the back: the former allows you to charge an iDevice and play music directly, the latter is the go-to socket for hooking up a computer. Optical and coaxial digital inputs and outputs complete the line up. Sample-rate support extends all the way to 24-bit/192kHz high-res files.

Bluetooth also gets the nod for added convenience and the fact there's aptX support means you can take advantage of higher quality audio beamed from a compatible smartphone or tablet. Because



Faced with the meaty, concentrated bassline the Vena keeps a firm grip, offering depth and control in equal measure. The soundstage is wide but all the elements are held firmly in place. Strings sound explicit, the vocal focused and straight to the point.

We play music through the headphone amplifier and we're pleased to report the Quad's lively sonic character continues. Faced with Led Zepplin's *Kashmir* the

Switch to Bluetooth, pair up a smartphone, and even though there is the inevitable drop in quality that the streaming system brings, along with a loss of scale and dynamics compared to a wired connection, you don't experience the thin, hard quality that often blights the use of Bluetooth.

Needs a touch more finesse

It's when music calls for a little more restraint and delicacy that the Quad can't quite stand up to scrutiny. Play Hozier's soulful *Take Me To Church* and the tune sounds just a touch rushed. The soundstage is still well-organised and there's plenty of detail and attack on offer

when the chorus kicks off - but we'd like greater finesse and more of a feel for the track.

The Quad sticks to one speed, however, and isn't able to shift up or down the gears depending on the demands of the track. The emotion and intimacy of the piano and vocal at the start of the *Take Me To Church* don't latch on to your senses like the very best amplifiers at the money can.

A shift in Quad's sound

Nevertheless, the Vena is still an interesting proposition, not least because of the apparent shift by Quad to a more driven, potent sound. Whether this direction is taken with the company's future products remains to be seen - but for now, Vena is a good option to have in this flourishing sector of the market

REVIEWER'S NOTES... GETTING TO KNOW THE QUAD VENA

Lancaster Grey is the standard finish for the Vena, but £100 more gives you three premium finishes. Sapele mahogany looks particularly striking.

Don't forget to attach the supplied antenna so you can beam music to the Vena via Bluetooth. This only has to be used with the all-aluminium model.

Using Bluetooth saps quite a bit of energy from our iPhone 6, so to save juice we plug it into the Vena's USB Type A socket to charge...

...while we move on to the Type B socket next to it. With a hard drive full of hi-res tracks, we're soon enjoying the Quad's powerful and robust delivery. Playing around with various types of speakers during testing, we find the Vena seems to work particularly well with the Q Acoustics Concept 20s.

Mission M³ | Speaker package | £700

Mission, almost accomplished

If it's a tiny home cinema system you want, the Mission M3 is a great solution. We were big fans of the original - the M Cube (£1000) claimed five stars for its style and performance back in 2005.

Almost a decade on, the new and updated Mission M³ once again is a tempting proposition for those who want a large 5.1 cinema sound but don't have enough space for traditional, boxy speakers. The Mission M³ package comprises five dinky satellite speakers (each small enough to fit into the palm of your hand) and an active subwoofer.

Driving force

While the M3 speakers retain the same petite dimensions of their predecessors (each measure 9cm cubed).

there are a couple of notable changes.

The biggest update is the use of Balanced Mode Radiator (BMR) driver technology. Each M³ satellite has a 75mm-BMR driver, which replaces the NXT panels of the previous model. Mission claims that the BMR drivers help deliver a larger spread of sound as well as being able to receive a full-range signal. This means you can connect the speakers directly to your AV receiver. It's a more conventional design than before, where you had to connect your amp to the sub which in turn linked to the satellites.

The subwoofer has a downward-firing 20cm driver powered by 200W of amplification, and mirrors the cuboid design of the satellites. It's large, but still compact enough to be tucked in a corner. There are volume, crossover and phase controls on the back panel, and the sub is up on metal spikes.

Black-and-white decision

The speakers are sturdily built, with a soft-touch finish giving a smart, premium look. The package comes in an all-black finish, although there will be a white version available later in the year. The speakers are tiny, but the Mission M3 delivers a surprisingly loud and powerful performance. We're impressed with the weight and punch in the lower frequencies, too. There's muscle to the bass, with satisfying oomph and

wallop to explosions and crashes in Guardians of the Galaxy. Make sure to give the subwoofer space, as it sounds a little boomy when the action picks up.

Cohesion between each speaker is seamless, and the spread of sound is impressive. Effects are steered across the room convincingly and with a great sense of movement. While it would struggle to fill up a large home cinema room, the Mission M³ has no problem filling up smaller, mediumsized rooms with its bold sound.

Detail definition is respectable, and there's a smoothness to the Mission's presentation that's comfortable to listen to. It's a well-timed, agile performance too.

On the flipside, there's a lack of sparkle to the crunch of shattered glass, while explosions and gunshots don't have that bite we expect. We sometimes have to strain to hear dialogue over the booming power of the subwoofer. While we appreciate the Mission M³ doesn't veer towards a bright, thin sound, we think the treble is rolled off a bit too much

- rivals in this category, such as the new Cambridge Audio Minx S215 system (£500), express the balance of frequencies, dynamics and clarity better.

We're hugely impressed by how muscular and integrated the speakers are, and it's a shame it doesn't have an ounce more clarity to gain that fifth star.

Despite its flaws, the Mission M³ remains a likable and convenient speaker package. It's a fuss-free system to install and place in your room, and will suit smaller home cinema rooms nicely. But there are rivals that offer a slightly more engaging performance.

Hudi 2 | Tablet | £130

Time to get into a Hudl

After the runaway success of its 2013 predecessor, Tesco's Hudl is back with an updated spec list and new design in the hope of once again showing the budget-tablet market how its done. Does it succeed? Yes.

For its price tag of £130 (and even less if you use the store's Clubcard vouchers), the Hudl 2 packs an impressive spec sheet and performance that far exceeds its price point. It's still not going to give the iPad mini a run for its money, but then that's not its intention. This is a budget product and if you want a good, accessible tablet that costs less than half of most of its competitors, read on.

The Hudl 2 has had a screen-size boost from its predecessor, up from 7in to 8.3in, and its resolution is increased to full HD as well. There's a respectable 273ppi, which comes close to, and in some case exceeds, many of its pricier competitors. Design is much improved, and it both looks and feels a little more refined. The bulky bezels from the original Hudl have been shaved off along its longest edges, and it's slimmer too.

Thanks for the memory

It's available in 16GB only, but there is a microSD-card slot for boosting it by another 32GB, while there is a HDMI port for connecting the tablet to your TV. There's very little to grumble with at this price in terms of performance. Video is clean and crisp, with

ample detail and a good handle on motion - it's a bit softer around edges than pricier competitors, but that's only to be expected. Whites are slightly on the creamy side and blacks don't go to the inky depths of the Samsung Galaxy Tab S 8.4, but it doesn't detract from the overall picture, with colours well-judged and accurate.

Loud and direct

You'll have to make some compromises on audio quality at this price though, but we'd still take the Hudl 2's well-balanced, character over the hard-edged Nexus 9. It's perfectly enjoyable and can be listened to at length. The stereo speakers on the Hudl sit on the back of the device and are Dolby-optimised. Play a movie and they'll go pretty loud with dialogue clear and direct, though the treble is a touch harsh and unrefined, and soundtracks can sound a little muddled.

Multi-media use drains the battery on the Hudl quicker than we like, resulting in around 7-8 hours under heavy use.

Every little helps

You'll find Tesco apps pre-loaded here - but it's been nicely done. Otherwise in a largely vanilla version of Android 4.4 KitKat, there is a small 'T' in the top left-hand corner that serves as the hub for everything Tesco. This includes access to Clubcard statements, grocery and clothing offers, suggestions for content from Tesco's Blinkbox services (now covering music, movies and books). Of course, if you're not a Tesco user you can simply ignore it. Other software tweaks added are helpful too: suggestions for popular apps to download, a child-safety feature, and a 'get started' app, which will walk you around some key things to do with

General performance throws up no major issues, with its 1.83GHz quad-core Intel Atom processor and 2GB RAM managing to keep things running smoothly for the most part.

The Hudl 2 is a superb little tablet that requires a little leeway when it comes to balancing performance with value, because it offers plenty of both. In many respects it can take the fight to some of the pricier Android tablets out there, but overall it lacks the refinement available if you spend more. However, at this price its shortcomings are easier to forgive, and any compromises it's had to make in the process have been nicely done - though we wish sound was better.

We'd happily recommend the Hudl 2 for families and tablet newcomers. Tesco has done it again: the unexpected champion of the budget-tablet world.

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Amazon Fire TV | Media streamer | £80

Fire lights the way for Amazon

Physical formats are dead. Or that's what you might think, if you look at the number of streaming devices on the market. Even TVs come with streaming services built into them these days. Now Amazon wants a part of the action, and its champion is the Fire TV streaming media player. Are things about to heat up?

Box clever

The Fire TV comes in the shape of a box with cables but don't worry about it getting in the way. It's a handsome little square: about the size of two stacked CD cases. It's subtle and stylish - the black finish is mostly matt, with glossy accents, which are fingerprint magnets. Corners are a bit sharp, but you'll hardly be fondling it.

There are five connections: power, LAN, HDMI out, optical out, USB. This last one doesn't seem to do anything at the moment, but may be activated in the future. That means no plug-and-play local file playback. There is no bundled HDMI cable, but you do get two Amazon-branded 'AAA' batteries for the remote control.

Creative accounting

To get started, you need an Amazon account. A nice touch is the pre-registration: buy a Fire TV through your Amazon account and it will come pre-loaded with your details. Installation is straightforward. Just connect the mains adaptor and an HDMI cable - the system guides you through the rest. Attaching an ethernet cable is the faster (and more stable) way to connect to the internet, but wi-fi doesn't take much effort - just follow the prompts to locate your network.

Next you get a cute animated video introducing the Fire TV and its features. Once that's over, you are taken to the home screen. showing recommended content and recent activity. This is also where you download apps. It's a simple interface with colourful tiles on the right and a list on the left: 'Search', 'Home', 'Movies', 'TV', 'Watchlist', 'Video Library', 'Games', 'Apps', 'Photos' and 'Settings'. Amazon has also launched itself into games territory: there's a small (but growing) selection of titles, which can be downloaded into the 8GB internal storage. While you won't get anything near PS4 quality, there are a few of the better titles you



might find on your tablet. For more intensive ('proper') games such as *Dead Trigger 2* you'll need something more substantial. Amazon has made a Bluetooth games pad, which looks and handles like an amalgam of Xbox and Playstation controllers (it's sold separately for £35). Click on 'Movies' or 'TV' and you're taken to an extensive library, but this is limited to Amazon Instant Video great for people with Amazon Prime membership, but others will be asked to pay.

Reliable sources

Other sources can be downloaded and then found in 'Apps'. We're pleased to see most of the streaming big guns: Netflix, BBC iPlayer, Demand 5, YouTube, Spotify. It's a crowded app market, like the one you find on Roku streaming devices. That means despite some goodies, most of the apps (free or purchased) aren't particularly useful. We can see the appeal of Sky News, Curzon Home Cinema and Vevo, but HypnosisTV?

The Fire TV offers 1080p video output. Audio output supports Dolby Digital Plus with up to 7.1 channels. The quality is on par with other streaming devices we've tried: the Full HD picture is sharp and sound is solid. What really impresses us is the speed of operation - it's seriously fast.

Don't want to type? Then you can search by voice. Hold down the microphone logo on the remote and call out film titles or actors' names. Speech recognition is among the best we've seen, only occasionally tripping over such spell-check favourites as Chiwetel Ejiofor and M. Night Shyamalan. Sadly, it is not advertised that this feature works only for Amazon Instant Video. On every other app you'll have to tap your way through.

The Amazon Fire TV is mostly a success, but there's still work to do. We love the speed and the voice search function. What we don't like is the price and app offering. For the money, we'd like more apps. Rivals such as Roku may not be as slick but they offer a similar experience for less. We're also not keen on the huge bias towards Amazon Instant Video customers, which leaves everyone else unable to use all the functions.

We like this Elipson package. It's beautifully built, mostly wireless and sounds pretty decent too. And we can't overlook that distinctive appearance either.

Whether you go for the looks or not, at least it makes a welcome change from the usual rectangular wooden boxes we normally find.

Slam-dunk speakers

At the heart of this package are the Planet LW speakers. These are basketball-sized and available in neatly applied black, white or red gloss finishes. Don't worry about them rolling off their supports, Elipson supply smart-looking metal rings to act as bases.

These speakers use a two-way coaxial driver array comprising a 16.5cm mid/bass (loaded by a rear-firing port) and a fabric dome tweeter. There are two 50-watt amp modules on each enclosure - one for each drive unit - so these are truly active rather than just powered. The amplifier modules are the well-known ICEpower designs developed by Bang & Olufsen.

One of the big selling points of the Planet LWs is that they are wireless - the connection works at 16-bit/44.lkHz. As usual, wireless doesn't mean there aren't any wires involved, as you still need a mains feed to each speaker. Use either of the supplied transmitting dongles (one USB and the other a 30-pin Apple version) and you link to the speakers directly. The designated left-hand LW is the master: aim the cheap-feeling remote towards this to adjust volume.

Planet of sound

The Elipson Audio Bridge adds aptX Bluetooth, optical and analogue connectivity. These sources connect to the Bridge and it links to the Planet LW speakers wirelessly. The speakers won't work with both the Bridge and the dongles simultaneously, only

one at a time.



Set up is easy: establish the wireless link and off you go. Within a few minutes we're listening to music. We start with the Audio Bridge in the set-up, using our reference Naim

It doesn't take long for us to think these speakers play things a little too safe, though. There isn't the attack we expect, nor enough of the energy we know is in the song. Greater transparency would be welcome too.

The analogue input is to blame to a large extent, as switching to optical and, to a lesser degree Bluetooth, shows. We wouldn't say the issues go away with the digital connections, but things improve notably enough for us to have fun listening to a range of music. from Outkast to Elvis.

We power down the Audio Bridge and use the supplied dongles: the USB one with our MacBook and the other with our iPad. If anything, going directly to the Planet LWs adds a little more clarity and sparkle to the performance. Tchaikovsky's *Marché Slave Op.31* is delivered with conviction and decent

scale. Moving the speakers close to a rear wall helps with outright authority without unbalancing tonality much. Bass remains decently articulate in this position too.

We admire Elipson's fresh approach to speaker design. The wireless aspect proves stable, though we have doubts about the quality of the analogue-to-digital conversion inside the Audio Bridge. Even at their best the Planet LW speakers still sound a little restrained, but they're insightful enough to remain interesting to listen to. If the style and convenience appeal take a serious listen.



Panasonic TX-65AX902B | 65in 4K Television | £5000

A stunning but pricey 4K success

Panasonic has had a rocky start to the 4K Ultra HD scene. Its first 4K TV we tested, the TX-58AX802B, wasn't capable of streaming Netflix 4K at the time, which we felt was a glaring omission for a 4K set. That issue has now been fixed, with Netflix 4K in full working order. And the TX-65AX902B shows just what a flagship Panasonic screen can do.

A beautiful way with colours

This 65in screen looks gorgeous. What impresses us most is how beautifully judged the colour is, striking just the right balance between punch and finesse. The picture (in 4K or Full HD) is one of subtle shading imbued with rich, warm tones. The *Guardians Of The Galaxy* Blu-ray has aliens and planets of every hue, and the Panasonic screen revels is delivering each one of them.

Brightly lit scenes show off the Panasonic at its best, with punchy, bright highlights and solid blacks that remind us fondly of plasma screens. In a dark scene, those blacks aren't quite so solid and dark. The slightly patchy backlighting in the corners of our set's screen doesn't help, either.

Switch to a more realistic palette such as that of *Captain America: Winter Soldier* and the 65AX902B takes a confident approach with the steely greys and natural landscapes. Skin-tones are displayed with realism - not too pale, not too ruddy - and there's a three-dimensional quality to the characters that's lovely to see.

Stunning with 4K content

Detail definition, in 4K and Full HD, is excellent. There's depth and subtlety to *Breaking Bad* episodes on Netflix 4K, while stock clips in 4K show how stunning native content can be. Blu-ray films are upscaled with skill, with no discernable noise or pixellation. It's a clean picture, though we wish it were a touch crisper. We like the smooth, natural quality of the Panasonic but the rival Sony KD-65S9005B is more definite in the way it displays edges.

This is a passive 3D set, and it's a comfortable experience. It's not tiring on the eye, but the 3D effect isn't quite as dramatic or as smooth as we'd like

We would stick to HD as much as possible, as the quality of standard-def programmes doesn't do justice to the 65AX902B's talents - the rival Sony screen offers a slightly cleaner, crisper picture with upscaled content.

Decent sound for a flat-panel

Panasonic's speakers are comfortable to listen to on their own. There's weight and detail to the sound, and voices are heard loud and clear. If you want the full cinematic experience, though, we'd certainly invest in a 5.1 speaker package to match the performance of the 4K screen.

The TX-65AX902B may just be one of the heaviest TVs we've handled in recent years. The screen itself is two-person lift - but so is the hefty stand. Roughly the size of a large encyclopaedia, it offers stable support to the screen, which is slightly tilted back.

This tilted design means that you may need a lower-than-average stand to view it straight on. On our racks, the screen is a little too high and leans away from us - which isn't entirely immersive.

Freetime for catching up

One of the standout features for Panasonic TVs this year is the addition of Freetime, a free TV guide service that lets you catch up with the past seven days of telly. On the 65AX902B it is restricted to channels that have an on-demand app. So any BBC shows are up for grabs through BBCiPlayer, while Freetime does this as well as open up access to 4oD, ITV Player and Demand 5.

Freetime also replaces Panasonic's programme guide interface, giving the TV a breath of fresh air. Gone are the flat greys. Freetime is colourful, sleek and modern. It's faster to use, too, and makes channel-browsing a more appealing experience.

Another neat feature is TV Anywhere. It lets you stream live and USB-recorded content on your smartphone or tablet when you're on the move. Just make sure your location has a good broadband connection.

Using the 65AX902B is swift and intuitive, especially with the standard remote control. It's a nicely made, satisfyingly hefty unit, and it makes quick work of navigating

We recommend properly setting up every set, of course, but when you've invested £5k it would be silly not to go through a THX Optimizer.

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The 65AX902B has a decent spread of connections, with four HDMI 2.0 and three USB inputs. The HDMI inputs support 4K passthrough and upscaling, 3D content and ARC. You can play photos, music and video files - including 4K - stored on a flash drive or hard drive, while an SD card slot gives you another way to access media files on your camera. There are both Freeview HD and Freesat tuners built in.

Wi-fi is built in, although we prefer using the wired ethernet socket for a more stable connection when streaming Netflix 4K essential to reduce buffering issues.

We're impressed with the Panasonic TX-65AX902B. That gorgeous colour balance is hard to achieve at any price, and the 65in screen's insightful, punchy performance is hugely commendable. The sleek new Freetime TV guide adds a splash of style to the user experience, too.

The biggest issue here is price. The Panasonic TV costs a staggering £5000. That's a grand and a bit more than its five-star Samsung and Sony rivals. The Panasonic needs to achieve excellence to justify that premium price tag and best its rivals - but it's not quite there.

Arcam FMJ A39 | Stereo amplifier | £1500

Middle child awaiting maturity

Arcam's FMJ family of integrated stereo amplifiers has already tasted success this year, with a 2014 Product of the Year Award for the excellent FMJ A19. Now it's the turn of the range's middle child, the A39, to show us what it can do in the £1500 market.

When it comes to design, it shares a similar look to the rest of the family, with a sturdy black steel and aluminium shell, front-mounted controls and a dimmable display. (A green light will appear above the source you have selected - you simply need to select the corresponding button to choose what you want to hear.)

There are a total of six labelled line-level inputs for hooking up your various bits of kit, alongside a moving-magnet phono stage (which can be bypassed for a further line level in, should you need) and two analogue outs, with both a 3.5mm input and 3.5mm headphone output mounted on the front. There are no digital inputs, but there is an upgrade path offered in the form of a second internal power supply, which can drive products from Arcam's rSeries (including the rDAC, rPAC, rLink and rBlink).

Cool runnings

Inside the A39, Arcam has used a class-G amplifier, which we've previously seen in its home cinema amplifiers. This basically makes the amp capable of big, powerful sound without wasting electricity as heat. The result is not just a more efficient, environmentally friendly amp, but also a much cooler-running one. Even when we pushed it to volume levels unlikely to be used regularly at home, it remained relatively cool to the touch and certainly cooler than its big competitor, the Rega Elicit-R.

It also offers a rather impressive 120w per channel into 8 ohms and 240w into 4ohms too, which should make it capable to drive even the most demanding of price-appropriate speakers.

The power at its disposal is one of the first things you'll notice - the A39 offers an impressively large soundstage and a superb sense of scale to whatever you throw at it. There's real punch here and bass notes are weighty and precise, yet

agile enough to keep the track driving forward with a decent level of precision.

However, while there's plenty of authority in the way it handles tracks, and an eagerness to please with a get-up-and-go attitude, it still can't quite match the Rega Elicit-R for out-and-out rhythmic precision.

Chain reaction

Play Fleetwood Mac's *The Chain* and there's a natural fluidity to the Rega that the Arcam just can't match - the various layers of instruments and vocals don't quite combine and complement one another as seamlessly as they do with its competitor. Switch up the tempo to India Arie's *Ready For Love* and the A39 lacks the Rega's level of insight to deliver every last drop of emotion and nuance in Arie's intimate delivery.

It's not miles off, but at this level it's the small differences that matter, and losing these subtle details makes the Arcam feel a little restrained and impersonal by comparison. The Arcam is very much at home with big-volume, big show-stopper tracks - this is when it The power at its disposal is one of the first things you will notice about the Arcam A39 - it'll take anything you can throw at it

> does its best work dynamically. It's the lower levels of dynamics, the softer, more delicate details that it struggles to show off with quite the same authority, though.

Tonally it's neutral and well balanced, and stereo imaging is stable, keeping a strong soundstage even when tracks get busy. Leading edges aren't always the smoothest, packing impact but without much body, and as such we'd be careful with the quality of tracks you play through the A39: it's not all that forgiving.

Authority figure

However, after saying all this, the Arcam A39 is still a good stereo amplifier with plenty to offer - it just falls down when it's compared to our Award-winner at this price. If scale and authority are high on your must-haves list, then this Arcam is certainly worth an audition. But it needs to take greater consideration of timing and fine detail to earn the full five stars at this price. A worthy effort, nevertheless.

JBL Cinema Base | Soundbase | £300

It's a hit: JBL makes first 'base

Top marks to JBL for consistency. Its debut soundbase, the aptly named Cinema Base, largely mirrors its soundbar equivalent (the SB 350) in the company's new range. If you read last month's copy of What Hi-Fi? you'll know that's a good thing. The SB 350 got four stars, and now the Base follows suit, possessing a similarly decent sound, rugged build and smart design.

Priced somewhere in the middle of our two Cambridge Audio and Canton Award winners at a rather tempting £300, it's pretty good value, too, when you consider its strong performance.

Ready for action

Big, dynamic and excellently detailed, its sound is easy to buy into - not least for the action-movie junkies among us.

We unwrap and spin our new Godzilla Blu-ray, throwing the JBL straight into the thick of the action. As the chaos gets underway, it's immediately clear that the Base's dual 9cm woofers don't hold back. As the MUTO breaks free from its containment its stomps bear the heaviness and depth we'd expect from a dedicated subwoofer in a budget speaker package. The bassy sound is floor-rumbling as it reverbs around the room. It can be a little overpowering, mind, so we'd knock it down a few notches to get the best sonic balance.

The Cinema Base is capable of volume that'll make you sit right back in your seat when Godzilla growls, and its big, enveloping soundfield does wonders to draw you into the film's havoc and keep you there - even without JBL's surroundsound mode turned on.

More than just loud

Partner that with headstrong dynamics and a solid delivery and you've got a truly engrossing performance.

Our praise subsides momentarily when it comes to the midrange. It feels a bit restrained. Though the Base trumps the cheaper Cambridge Audio TV2 in some areas (dynamics, for one), mids aren't as clear or well projected as they are through the TV2. Dialogue is weighty and reasonably expressive through the JBL you can hear the exasperation in Bryan Cranston's voice as he shouts at officials - but in lengthy dialogue-heavy scenes, you wish voices were that bit more defined.

Treble stays duly behind the brightness threshold for the most part, but we'd like more a touch more definition and insight at the higher frequencies.

The JBL is a solid performer with music, its handling of a movie track paralleled in a musical setting. It laps up the meaty bassline in Daft Punk's Around The World as JBL's first soundbase we stream it over Bluetooth, and has the attack and rhythm to get your foot tapping.

We admire the effort JBL has put into aesthetics, even though the result (shiny edges on a matt-black chassis) is muted. The curved front grille saves this from being 'just another' rectangular box, too.

JBL says the Cinema Base is designed for up to 60in tellies, as long as the TV's stand doesn't exceed the unit's 60 x 40cm size.

The Base has an uncommon trick up its sleeve: a USB charging port (not an input) means you can revive your smartphone or portable while, say, watching a movie.

Also picking up points for practicality is the placement of the optical and 3.5mm inputs and HDMI ARC output, around the back. There's plenty of room around the sockets for owners of chunky cables.

The only blip in design is the feeble credit card-style remote, which is all-too easy to lose down the side of the sofa.

Commendable debut

JBL is one of many brands to channel its soundbar expertise into the burgeoning foray of soundbases of late, and the Cinema Base is a decent first effort by the company.

There's little to fault with design, and plenty to applaud with the sound. It might not be the last word in clarity or detail (up top), but its weighty, dynamic presentation makes it an appealing proposition for anyone looking for a decent upgrade in sound. At this price, it demands a listen.

Pro-ject 1 Xpression Carbon UKX | Turntable | £575

Music with plenty of Xpression

The platter on the UKX is acrylic, a change from the composite steel-thermo plastic elastomer one used on the standard version.

Pro-ject is best

known for its class-leading budget turntables. It has dominated that market for more years than we care to remember, and continues to do so. So successful has the company been in this respect, it's easy to forget it makes some mighty fine products at more ambitious prices too. You can count this latest version of the long-running 1 Xpression among them.

Carbon footprint

The Carbon in the product's name refers to the material used in the supplied arm. It's unusual to find carbon-fibre arms, even at far higher prices, so it's clear Pro-ject is trying hard to offer something special for the price.

There's more to a good arm than just tube material. We're pleased to report the one fitted to the 1 Xpression is a substantially engineered unit with smooth, play-free bearings and a nice solid feel. You'll find an Ortofon 2M Silver cartridge attached to the arm: it's a modified version of the company's much-admired 2M Red moving-magnet, which bodes well.

Pop the cork

The platter on the UKX is acrylic, changed from the composite steel/thermo plastic elastomer one used on the standard version. While it's perfectly fine to place a record directly on the acrylic, Pro-ject also supplies both cork and felt mats too. Each option changes the sonic presentation a little, with the final choice coming down to personal taste and system matching as much as anything else. Just remember to adjust the arm height to compensate for the varying thickness of the mats. We preferred

the direct acrylic option for its extra clarity. Set-up is relatively simple, though newcomers to turntables may find attaching the bias weight a little fiddly. The rest of it is straightforward: add the platter, fit the belt, and attach the counter and bias weights to the arm. Once up and running we're impressed with what we hear. We use two systems: one based around the Arcam A19 amplifier and B&W 685s, and the other our reference Bryston /ATC set-up. Regardless of partnering kit, it's clear this Pro-ject is a great-sounding deck.

Rapid ear movement

It's the sonic clarity that stands out first. Listening to R.E.M.'s *Automatic for the People* we're taken with the high level of detail. This deck digs deeply, and defines notes with class-leading precision. It's a fast, controlled sound that makes tracking low-level instrumental strands easy. The presentation is composed too, staying stable even when things get busy.

Tonally, things are nicely balanced with no part of the frequency range dominating. The Ortofon 2M Silver cartridge comes across as a refined and articulate performer, and has no trouble working into any of the phono stages we tried.

Move onto Orff's *Carmina Burana* and the Pro-ject continues to impress with wide-ranging dynamics and a decent amount of punch. There's also a pleasing

Selfimprovement

sense of scale and a nicely-layered sound stage - this is a deck that majors on analysis. We can't think of a rival that tells us as much about a recording. However, compared to the likes of Rega's RP3 it can sound a touch clinical, downplaying the rhythmic and forceful aspects of the music a little. This never goes too far though, with the Pro-ject remaining an entertaining listen regardless of genre.

Package of pleasure

We still think the 1 Xpression Carbon UKX is a terrific package for the price. It's balanced and insightful, rivalling the class leaders in overall ability. It's worth serious consideration if you love the idea of spinning some of your favourite vinyl.

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Tidal | Streaming service | £20/month

A new wave of quality streaming

Tidal is a new music streaming service that follows in the footsteps of Oobuz by offering CD-quality lossless music streams (1411kbps), thereby providing a noticeable leap in quality (on paper at least) over the typical 320kbps proffered by the likes of Spotify. In total, Tidal claims more than 25 million music tracks in lossless quality.

Tidal's other big USP is the offer of more than 75,000 HD music videos and curated content, from playlists to interviews to magazine-style features, put together by dedicated teams in the UK and US.

Platform availability

Tidal is available as a web player or desktop download, a free app for Android and iOS, and on Bluesound and Simple Audio wireless systems. Chrome is the only web browser to support lossless playback, but you can download the desktop app to get around this restriction. On mobile only certain Android devices (with Android 04.04.2004 and above) support CD-quality playback, but 'partnership and integration agreements' are said to be in place - with 34 brands in total - so we should see Tidal coming to more products and devices soon.

First we decide to take a look at Tidal on the web player (using the Chrome browser) and discover that it's intuitive and looks smart. Curated content is at the forefront. The top 'What's new' section has new albums, but much of the page is given over to Playlists - including videos, interviews and features - 'created by Tidal'. These lists showcase new music and old, and are thoughtfully assembled. You can tell the process has involved a human touch.

The desktop app doesn't look as smart and the menus are a little smaller, but the functionality is similar. Hopefully a better desktop app design is in the pipeline.

We switch to mobile and it's much more in keeping with the smart web player experience. We are impressed by Qobuz, but its mobile app experience can be buggy.

Tidal sounds great, and better than the leading lossy services, provided you're using good enough kit

There are no such issues here. Streaming music seems reliable (Tidal recommends a 2MB connection for optimum streaming) and browsing tracks is fast.

Crucially, the Settings tab is where you should select 'HiFi' for the all-important best sound quality, listed at FLAC 1411.



(AAC+ 96) are the other two options.

New editorial content is promised daily, with features, videos and those curated playlists on offer. Our only gripe is that this content could be easier to find, though we admit we're largely here for the music.

Sound for the discerning listener

The good news is that Tidal sounds great, and better than the market-leading lossy services, provided you're using good enough kit to listen - if you've got free earphones on a bus you may not hear the difference. Aphex Twin's Syro album is a fine test of detail, control and rhythm, and Tidal's FLAC stream delivers a sound with space and scale while revealing the intricate drums and effects with impressive precision.

A listening comparison with Qobuz, the other CD-quality streaming service in the UK, reveals a similar, if not identical, sound, Qobuz delivers perhaps a bit more punch and is better-organised, though we like the space and detail afforded by Tidal.

All told, Tidal lives up to its promise of high-fidelity music streaming. It isn't as exhaustive as Spotify yet, but 90 per cent of our music is there and if your tastes are fairly mainstream you should have no issues.

This new service isn't the finished article, however, and for everything that we liked about it, there are some notes in the 'against' column. Speed is one: it's a little

sluggish to respond. It's also missing support for gapless playback - annoying to lovers of classical and electronic music. It's a problem Spotify had for a long time but has now corrected.

If you value sound quality and stream a sizeable chunk of your music, then we think you should be happy to welcome another option in to the CD-quality streaming market. We are. And we think £20/month, rather than £10/month for lower-quality music, is a fair price to pay - not least when it's as well put together as Tidal.

A speaker family for the whole house

LG is the latest brand to join the multiroom party with its new Music Flow range - the family is made up of H3 (£150). H5 (£230) and H7 (£350) active wireless speakers, an R1 Bridge (£50) and an HS6 Soundbar (£500). Features are in abundance: Bluetooth, built-in wi-fi, DLNA functionality and near-field communication (NFC) across the range. The best bit? All speakers support high-res WAV and FLAC files up to 24-bit/192kHz, topping Sonos, while matching the capability of the pricier, Award-winning Bluesound system.

The price here is the cheapest possible multi-room set-up, consisting of two H3 speakers, but of course you can mix 'n' match. The speakers are primarily for music, but can also be used in a home cinema environment, working with the HS6 soundbar as rear surround channels.

The best bit? All speakers support high-res WAV and FLAC files up to 24-bit/192kHz, topping Sonos

(The Bridge isn't a compulsory purchase for multi-room, but if you forgo it, one speaker in the set-up must have a wired connection to your router.)

LG claims its mesh network technology and dual band wi-fi (2.4/5GHz) promises stable and 'uninterrupted' playback.

The proof of the pudding

performance? Ultimately, we can't help but lacking the insight, balance and energy of the respective Award-winners at their price. little undernourished. Hints of too much brightness in the treble appear as the cymbals in Jamie Cullum's Trippin' Up fill the soundfield, too.

Moving up in price and size, we have the weak link in the family: the H5's bottomheavy character makes Cullum's stark vocals muffled and a tad boomy. We expect more expression, balance and at least an inkling of dynamic aptitude at this price, but the H5 gives us little to chew on as we feed it the dynamic and intricate The Lord Of The Rings: The Two Towers soundtrack.

The marginally cheaper Monitor Audio Airstream S200 (£200) blows it away with its clear, lively and remarkably detailed presentation.

Relative merits

The H7 is easily the best of the bunch. It delivers the biggest, most dynamic and expressive sound of the lot - and is best able to pick out the subtlety and variation of the piano in Regina Spektor's The Flowers.

You get a deeper - but not particularly better-defined - bassline in a 24-bit/192kHz-resolution file of Fleetwood Mac's Dreams and balance is better than with its smaller siblings. Still, our favourite Geneva Model S Wireless DAB+ one-ups the H7 in almost every way, grasping the genteel, tremulous nature of Alison Krauss's vocals in That Kind Of Love in a way the H7 can't.

The HS6 soundbar finds itself in a similar position as its hi-fi counterparts. Load up The Amazing Spiderman and a good level of detail is present. The sound of Spidey's web shooter is crisp. The soundfield might not be the biggest we've heard at this price (Yamaha triumphs there) but LG's patented Stereo Field Extension (SFX) - designed to create a larger listening sweetspot and amplify the surround sound effect - seems effective: the sound easily spreads the width of our 65in Samsung telly.

Turning the bass down slightly on the sub and ensuring the EQ is set to 'Standard' (there's 'Cinema', 'Flat Boost', 'Treble/Bass' and our second-favourite 'Music', too) gets

The Q Acoustics Media 4 is £100 cheaper and, though it doesn't have the HS6's feature count, has a bigger, more dynamic sound - not to mention greater insight.

Marks for usability

It's a shame about the so-so sound quality across the board, because the Music Flow gets everything else pretty spot-on.

Set-up is straightforward. There's no remote for the speakers: the Music Flow Player app (free, iOS and Android, see above) is the control hub. It's easy to use but can be a little buggy under complex operation.

You can access a list of songs vou've 'liked', or get song suggestions according to your 'mood'- on a wet Monday morning we picked 'gloomy' and it whipped up a quick playlist of suitably melancholic music.

A neat trick is the speakers' ability to take over the music playing on an NFCcompatible smartphone or tablet by simply tapping it on the top left of the speaker (or on the right-hand side in the H3's case).

We like the design - the trio of speakers are stylish and well-matched with shiny, silver fascias and a rigid chassis.

The H5 and slightly larger H7 are hexagonal, and friendly looking speakers with smooth surfaces and nicely tapered corners (bar a few rough edges we found on our H5 sample).

LG has gone for basic functionality; there's just a single all-in-one button (for

So far so good, then - but how good is feel a little disappointed with the Music Flow's sound as a whole. Each speaker delivers a fairly detailed and listenable sound that is a bit safe and restrained,

We find the small H3's sound clear detailed and of a size that extends beyond its physical proportions. But it struggles to match the Cambridge Audio Go's detail and weight, and overall the presentation is a

power on/off and input changing) at the centre of a volume dial that is smooth to operate and has well-thought-out ridges to stop your finger slipping off. A small white light sits underneath the input icons to show which is in use, though these can be turned off via the app.

There are also LAN and 3.5mm inputs around the back, as well as buttons to connect the speakers to one another.

Family resemblance

The baby H3 is obviously part of the same family, with its curvy-cornered silver chassis, but has no 3.5mm input - connection is via ethernet or wireless only.



Even the HS6 soundbar looks like it's cut from the same cloth. The silver (and yes, shiny) bar resembles the LG NB4540 (£280), but is slightly wider at 102cm - roughly the width of a 48in TV. That's a good thing, to say the least. Despite its aesthetic similarity to the cheaper unit, its design is still classy enough to match its rivals - the mirror-like metal body, fronted by a hole-patterned grille, is as flat and unobtrusive as you'd want a soundbar to be. The bright text display and fancy-yet-functional remote makes it easy to operate, too. With optical, 3.5mm, USB and HDMI ins and an HDMI output, the HS6 has plenty of options for connecting to your system.

The bar's wireless sub is less familiar: tall, narrow but deep, it's almost entirely wrapped in cloth and attractive by subwoofer standards. It's not one you'd necessarily want to hide away.

LG has gone big on features with its first multi-room model, but the Music Flow goes home with only three stars due to a disappointing performance. Sound quality could be better. The H7 shows promise, and two (or more) of them would be our combination of choice with the Music Flow. But even then, we'd much sooner pick something from the Sonos or Bluesound line-up for top quality.

International CES 2015

Our pick of the key trends likely to emerge at the world's biggest tech show

hat Hi-Fi? will be on the ground in Las Vegas from January 4th to bring you all the best coverage from CES. It's the annual curtain-raiser for the year in technology and we'll have a bigger presence at the show than ever before. As an official CES partner, we'll be hosting the International News Stage with our sister publication, Stuff, and we will also be announcing our Stars of CES on Thursday January 9th, the best of the show's specialist hi-fi and home cinema products. So what can we expect to see? Here's our pick of five key trends to look out for across CES.

■4K FOR EVERYONE

The average price of a 4K TV is now £1600, according to the latest Gfk research, with 100,000 4K TVs expected to be sold by the end of 2014. With this figure predicted to double in 2015, largely thanks to 50in+ TVs, expect to see a bigger percentage of 4K TVs in all the big-hitters' ranges for 2015.

We hope to hear more news about content, too. The top streaming providers are now delivering some Ultra HD content, but it wouldn't take you long to watch it, while Sony and Samsung have offered bespoke packages to their customers. But we need more. And what about 4K Blu-ray? Tipped for a 2015 release, an announcement at CES would be ideal.

CAR TECH

It's not just the home that's getting smarter, expect plenty of noise from car manufacturers too. We've seen the first cars to integrate streaming music with Rara Music, Napster and Spotify all making their way inside motors. What's more, Apple is now involved with its own CarPlay offering.


We expect to see more tie-ins and, hopefully, better quality services for music on the move and how we can control it. With Ford - creators of Ford Sync with Spotify - giving a CES keynote, it looks likely we'll hear a lot more from the car companies.

Curved TVs and bendable TVs have sprung surprises in previous years, so we'll be on the look-out for the next tech-twist - and it could be that 8K screens bring the wow factor, after LG showcased an 8K-ready set at IFA in September 2014.

Also expect to see new picture processing 2015. Ensuring the best performance from SD and HD content on pixel-packed 4K screens is

SUPER-SMART HOME

'Smart' has been a much-used (nav. over-used) word in the consumer electronics world for a good few years now... and we don't expect that to change any time soon. Smart Home technology has its own section at CES for the first time, with the booming multi-room audio market playing no small part. And now Apple is involved, having launched 'HomeKit' in iOS 8 in an effort to make the iPhone the remote control of the future home. We'd expect to see a wealth of apps and products in this market, and we look forward to seeing how multi-room audio and even video develop.

SUPERIOR, HIGH-RES SUPERIOR, HIGH-

Streaming music has usurped the download in the public consciousness in 2014, and we expect to see this trend continue apace at CES 2015 - hopefully with a renewed focus on audio quality.

CD-quality lossless audio would be a

welcome addition to biggest mass-market players, most obviously Spotify, while high-res audio streaming is the logical next step for us, even if this remains a relatively niche market.

We expect to find out more about a new high-res

audio offering from Meridian, while Neil Young's Pono service should soon be out of beta and ready to launch. Fascinating times.

I've lost track of the number of times I've been to CES, but the show never ceases to amaze and excite in equal measure. There's an element of hyperbole, of course, but it's also a great showcase for what's in store over the coming year. So I'm going to make a few rash predictions (which I may regret!).

4K picks up momentum

I was never convinced by 3D TV (not least because I hated watching it and it gave me headaches), but I'm pretty sure there's mileage in 4K. Yes, I know there's not much content to watch yet, but that will improve over time. The buving director from one of the big UK retail chains recently told me that next year 80 per cent of the new TVs they stock will be 4K-capable to cope with demand.

High-res streaming on tap

With broadband speeds getting faster and streaming sound quality improving, the music industry may (finally) wake up to the reality of how we listen to music. Services such as Qobuz and Tidal are paving the way with CD-quality streaming, and Meridian could open the door to high-res streaming across multiple platforms. But the additional cost may be a deterrent for many.

Dolby Atmos remains niche

I'll stick my neck out on this one - good as it sounds, consumers will baulk at installing yet more speakers into their living rooms and happily live with 2.1/5.1 systems, or even a soundbar. Atmos will remain the preserve of AV enthusiasts. Think I'm wrong? We shall see.

oundbars have significantly increased in terms of popularity during the last couple of years. No surprise really, as TV companies get ever closer to turning screens into wafer-thin units - the sound suffers, naturally.

What's the solution? Not everyone is able or willing to pack their room with a full surround package. A soundbar is a fine alternative. Here we're looking at high-end soundbars, and on the following pages we put together seven of them, priced between £600 and £800. These handy pieces of high-tech kit promise to save you space, while providing a worthwhile performance-boost to your overall sound quality.

Now you can have your cake and hear it.

The Special One

Tannoy Revolution DC6T SE







At this price, soundbars tend to look pretty menacing - many of them are chunky beasts. But not the Canton DM 900. What you get is a short, slim bar that won't block the bottom of your TV, with a separate subwoofer for muscle.

Inside the bar there are two 19mm tweeters and four 50cm drivers. The bar can be wall-mounted, or placed straight on a rack. The sub, meanwhile, has a 23cm downward-firing woofer.

These are well-made boxes. The bar has enough metal to belie its delicate appearance. The sub is guaranteed to win any stubbing contest with your toes. At the back of the bar are analogue RCA, coax and optical connections, and Canton supplies cables for all three.

Long-distance operator

You can go Bluetooth too: aptX-compatibility means you can benefit from higher-quality streaming. There's also a 'sub out' socket for the subwoofer, but you don't have to use it; the sub can also connect wirelessly, with a maximum range of 10m. We're pleased to see a proper remote control included:



it's a weighty device that fits nicely into your palm, and the buttons are smooth. It's not entirely intuitive, however. The EQ, dynamic range control and lip-sync settings are hidden, and you must hold down a specific button to unlock them. Even then, you need the instructions to help decipher them. The tiny display on the soundbar doesn't tell you that 'EQ-3', for instance, is for set-ups on racks. Still, once you're all set up, things go smoothly. Well, almost.

Time, gentlemen, please

Canton recommends 15-20 hours of listening to run in the system. We oblige - but even after a weekend of continuous play, we aren't entirely satisfied with the performance. The sound is thin, and a bit disjointed. The integration between the bar and sub isn't wholly convincing. Bumping up the bass or messing with the EQ doesn't do much, besides thinly masking a lack of balance.

We put on *Captain America: The Winter Soldier* to watch Robert Redford arguing with fellow government officials. The result isn't particularly

convincing - subtlety is lacking, as are dynamics. The sense of indignation in the voices is sanded down significantly. It's not all bad, though. The treble is well balanced, never sounding hard or making us wince at the top end. There's a good sense of space, but similarly priced rivals outclass this.

Pressing the 'virtual surround' button helps to widen the soundfield a little, but it will cost you clarity of voice and reduce subtlety just a little further.

We like the idea of this Canton. The space-saving design of the bar is appreciated, and there are benefits to being able to position the subwoofer as you wish. But at this price, the DM 900 is lacking compared with the competition.

Dali has come up with some great kit over the years, mostly stereo and surround speakers, so we aren't surprised by its move into soundbars.

Dali says the Kubik One is not exactly a soundbar, however, but that it's a system in its own right rather than a mere extension of your TV. Whatever the appropriate nomenclature, one thing is for sure: we think it's brilliant.

Sounds from space

We dive straight in to Guardians of the Galaxy and are taken by the size of the sound: a wide, spacious soundstage gives jets and spaceships ample room to manoeuvre. It's an accurate sound, too. Effects ping around with precision, aided by impressive clarity, which also makes the most of speech. There's ample low-end heft as well, but it's nicely controlled. Add good timing and agility, and you have a punchy, dynamic soundbar. Dali hasn't just focused on the sound, however, the exterior is just as appealing. Soundbars don't tend to be particularly attractive, but we think this one is pretty. Those grilles are

removable: red, white or black are standard, but you can also choose from six others, from purple to lime green.

A single piece of aluminium forms the chassis - designed to keep walls thin yet sturdy enough to suppress unwanted resonances. It's heavy and solidly built, with a luxurious finish to match its price.

Pretty looks isn't all

It's not just a pretty face, though. This is a serious bit of kit. fitted with two 25mm soft-dome tweeters and two 13cm wood-fibre drivers. At the back is a fair offering of connections: inputs include two optical and one analogue RCA. We're pleased to see a micro-USB input too, which means you can hardwire a Mac or PC into the Kubik One. Three cheers if vou've got a library of high-res tracks on there: the Dali can handle tracks up to 24-bit/96kHz. The Kubik One handles aptX Bluetooth (for higher-quality streaming) too, while a sub-out socket lets you hook up your own subwoofer if you feel the need. You shouldn't have to, however. There's a switch to adjust the bass depending on the position of the

soundbar: 'Neutral' position offers the least bass, and is best when the soundbar is near a wall (there are keyhole-type mounts at the back).

'Bass Boost' is best for filling large rooms, while the halfway point is 'Bass Enhance' which gives a balanced sound in our set-up (on a rack, in front of a TV). At 16cm high, the Dali might conceivably justify its own shelf, however.

We're disappointed to find a plastic 'credit-card' remote, but Dali assures us a 'proper' remote will be brought out, and existing customers will get a free upgrade.

The Dali Kubik One is a massive success, overall. Design and features impress us, and we love how it sounds. It's a gorgeous package. Nice one, Dali.

All your music in all your rooms, wirelessly.

High definition sound, simple setup, and wireless play with the touch of a button.









We first tested the Focal Dimension in our October 2014 issue, and we loved it enough to hand it five stars. But we believe in tough love, so we're dragging it back out to fight. Will it hold its score?

More traditional hi-fi companies are now turning their hand to high-end soundbars. French company Focal is one of the latest to do so, and it seems all that experience with loudspeakers has paid off, because this is a great soundbar.

Into another dimension

The Dimension is far from your typical box - it's huge, 116cm wide, and 11.5cm tall. Those with small racks or tiny TVs need not apply. Focal suggests using it with 50in-plus screens. We agree.

Assuming you have a suitable surface, the Dimension slants back at an angle, propped up by the supplied feet.
Alternatively you can spend an extra £300 on Focal's matching subwoofer.
The two slot together and become a soundbase for your telly to sit on.

Build quality is very impressive. The chassis is made of a single piece of brushed aluminium, and feels very



sturdy. In contrast, the remote control is disappointing: it's a tiny little plastic card. Not what you expect for the money.

Focal makes up for this, to a degree, with a fancy touch panel. Wave your hand over the right-hand side of the bar and this lights up, ready for you to control volume, engage night mode (reduced dynamics) and select input.

Switching the play

Connections are decent: HDMI in, HDMI out (ARC), optical in, 3.5mm in, and sub line out. Unlike some rivals, there's no built-in Bluetooth. Focal does include an external aptX-friendly Bluetooth dongle, which plugs into the 3.5mm input.

Set-up is mostly straightforward, until you get to the selection of switches at the back. These correspond with how and where the bar is positioned, and your listening position. There are also settings for how damped your room is, and whether or not you use a subwoofer. Focal claims to use processing to manipulate the sound and place you in a bubble. Does it work? Well, it's hard for any soundbar to match a traditional 5.1

setup, but you do get an impressive soundfield. The Dimension pumps out a huge sound. It has no trouble filling large spaces: it may not be true surround sound, but it envelops you to a decent degree. It also offers plenty of detail and power. The metallic pings of gunfire are convincing, precise and punchy. The robotic suits in *Edge of Tomorrow* stomp with deep bass. Switch to music with a spot of Dr John over Bluetooth, and the Dimension demonstrates great fluidity and finesse. It's a fun, engaging listen.

Despite tough competition, the Focal Dimension has held its ground - and its fifth star. If you're looking for an expansive sound for your TV, it will do the job very nicely indeed.

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The latest Cyrus streaming models are available as four perfectly focused variants. Each is a state of the art streamer at the very peak of what is possible in HD music streaming today.

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Ever wanted a sheep in your living room? Yes, so have we. But they're not very practical. Instead, we refer you to the Diva, the latest device from Libratone, makers of woolly audio kit.

Like every Libratone product before it, the Diva sports a woolly cover. It's removable, and comes in many colours. You get 'Pepper Black' as standard, along with a voucher code to claim another colour for free (within the EU).

It's easy to remove the upholstery and look at the insides, which feature two ribbon tweeters at the ends, two 75mm midrange drivers, and a 13cm woofer at the centre. There are also clamshell-shaped internal reflectors, designed to raise and spread the sound.

Woolly thinking

Cloth cover aside, the Diva is made primarily of plastic. It doesn't feel as sturdy as some metallic rivals, but it's weighty enough to reassure us of its quality. There are two holes at the back, for a plug-in stand that stops the Diva from falling on its back and rocking like a turtle. Alternatively, you can plug in the

While it might not break any new ground when it comes to specs, its performance is hard to fault. bundled wall-mount. There's an optical input and a 3.5mm analogue alternative, too, and the Diva has a bunch of wireless tricks up its insulated sleeve. It connects to your home's wi-fi network for AirPlay and DLNA, Spotify Connect and HTC Connect.

Release your inner Diva

Alternatively, you can stream directly to the Diva with Bluetooth - it supports aptX for superior-quality Bluetooth streaming. There's also near-field communication (NFC) for relatively swift pairing. As always, aptX and NFC only apply if your device is compatible.

We had a few issues setting up the unit. The bundled quick-start guide is overly simple and doesn't quite explain everything you need to get things going.

You're supposed to get the Diva set up on your network with the help of the Libratone app (free on Android and iOS) but initially we couldn't get soundbar and app to shake hands. Once connected, the app lets you customise the sound: at the most basic level, you can change volume levels (there is no

supplied remote handset) and apply basic EQ presets. You can also input information about the Diva's height and position in the room, to adjust sound.

How does it sound? Pretty good. The level of agility and punch is enough for us to take notice. There's no harshness to the treble, and bass notes are not boomy. There's a nice sense of space, too.

What we want, though, is greater solidity. Movie soundtracks don't quite have the punch when compared with the Dali Kubik One or Yamaha YSP-2500. We'd also like a bit more subtlety.

Overall, though, the Libratone Diva is a success. Bar a few connection issues, this is a strong one-box sound system. If you want streaming in style, check this.

The Monitor Audio ASB-2 was one of the first premium soundbars on the market. At a time when soundbars offered either features or sound quality, it gave us both. It justified its £1000 price tag, we fell in love, and it went on to win one of our 2013 Awards.

Heavyweight champ

But a lot can change in a year. There are now quite a few premium soundbars, and despite the old champ's new price of £800, it must prove itself once again. Does it have what it takes?

The first thing that comes to mind isn't the ASB-2's performance, but its size: 18cm tall and over 100cm wide. You'll have to clear a shelf below the TV, or put it on a wall. The wall-mounting bracket isn't included, but you get a large rubber pad to stabilise the bar on a shelf. It's also suitably heavy, at more than 11kg. Factor in the classy finish and we're talking serious perceived value.

You certainly get a lot for your money. There are a generous number of connections: three HDMI in, one HDMI out, optical in, coaxial in, analogue RCA in, 3.5mm in, and sub out. AirPlay and DLNA compatibility means you can stream over your home network, too.

Sadly there's no Bluetooth, but you do get a proper remote control with proper buttons. It brings up an on-screen menu if you're plugged into a TV using HDMI. The menu is where you can tinker with various settings, including EQ levels. As for audio performance, it's time for good news and bad news. The good: all the praise we heaped upon the ASB-2 a year ago remains valid - there's an undeniable abundance of power and weight. This is an authoritative sound.

Crashing and smashing

The sense of scale is impressive: there's a good spread of sound, even without the soundbar's '3D Audio' mode. You also get a superb level of detail, no matter what you watch. From crashing and smashing to sedate and emotive, the ASB-2 offers a subtle performance with drama and excitement. The bad news for Monitor Audio is that the competition is fierce. The ASB-2 doesn't do anything wrong on its own, but put it next to the latest and

brightest and the cracks appear. Focal's Dimension, for instance, sounds a lot more expansive. The Yamaha YSP-2500 offers greater movie excitement thanks to its convincing surround sound. The Libratone Diva and Sonos Playbar can match and beat the Monitor Audio ASB-2's streaming skills.

Then there's the Dali Kubik One, next to which the Monitor Audio is less expressive and detailed than we'd like, especially with voices. The ASB-2's rich, weighty sound now feels thick and heavy in comparison.

And so it is with regret that we must take away the Monitor Audio's fifth star. It's had a great run, but the competition is suddenly ruthless.

Sonos has always done things its own way. It doesn't care how many inputs you want. It doesn't care about bouncing beams or 5.1 surround sound. When the Playbar first came out, there was nothing quite like it - and there still isn't.

We've always applauded and respected Sonos for being different. But now there are plenty of similarly priced rivals, it's time to reconsider.

The Sonos way

What is the Sonos way? At heart, it's all about streaming massive amounts of music. That's the Playbar's party trick: it will play everything on your networked computer, with the exception of high-resolution tracks. You can send audio directly from iOS and Android devices. With the help of the Sonos app, you have access to internet radio, Spotify, Last.fm, Napster, 7digital, Aupeo, Deezer... you get the point. Potentially millions of tracks, any time.

Forget your TV, says Sonos, it would seem. There's only one way to get sound from your TV, and that's via the single optical input. All other inputs will have to go into your TV first, and then to the Playbar. It's a gorgeous unit, nicely made and minimally styled - it can be wall-mounted or laid flat in front of your TV. The built-in accelerometers sense the orientation and adjust the sound accordingly. We think it sounds best with the wider edge facing out, so lay it on the thin edge if you can.

In terms of atmosphere

Set up is very easy using the Sonos app (free on Android and iOS), which holds your hand through every step - even with our occasionally stubborn network we managed to connect right away. But how does it sound? Very good indeed. It's effortlessly better than any TV's sound. The soundstage is impressively wide, and there's plenty of detail and weight. Tonal balance is also convincing.

Elsewhere, it's a matter of atmosphere over impact. The Playbar can handle explosions with enough punch and weight, but that's not its big strength. Instead it's impressive at subtler things: full-bodied voices and good integration. Load up some music and the Playbar

really sings - it's an insightful listen, as separate strands of tracks have their own space on the soundstage, but fit together as a cohesive whole.

Sonos has a nice habit of updating its kit, and this latest revision increases in dynamism, precision and clarity. It was never particularly keen on the lowest bass notes, and this remains the case.

It's clearly a music lover's soundbar but if you want to improve movie sound, you can add the Sonos Sub (£600), or even two (£250) Sonos Play:3 speakers.

Despite its obvious limitations, we still have a lot of love for the Sonos Playbar. It's the most affordable on test here, for starters. It's beautifully made, and lovely to use as well. A fine product.



When you get into this price range, soundbars tend to do a bit of everything. That price tag needs justifying, after all. And so many of them aren't content just bumping up the sound of your movies: they're music systems too.

But not the Yamaha YSP-2500. Its primary concern is how your films sound. Yamaha knows a thing or two about surround sound: its YSP range of soundbars has impressed us, and its latest effort won one of our 2014 Awards.

Low-profile performer

From the front, it's discreet enough. Its low profile means it won't block your TV's picture. Get a little closer and this thing is heftier than you'd think. What it lacks in height, it compensates for with depth - and a wireless subwoofer.

Build and finish quality is impeccable, looking and feeling every penny of its £800. There are 16 speakers under the grille, each powered by 2W of amplification. To the left is a handy display: small, but bright and legible.

The wireless subwoofer is discreet enough to be tucked away in a corner,

but the bar itself wants to be right in front of your TV - for the clearest, most open sound, don't hide it in a rack.

While most soundbars are plug-and-play affairs, Yamaha's way is more complicated. Sure, you can plug things in: there are three HDMI inputs, an HDMI output, two optical ins and one coaxial in, along with a pair of RCA plugs. The fun starts when you connect the microphone and run room calibration, just like with an AV receiver. Yamaha's success lies in the way it bounces beams off walls to reflect sound around the room. The more accurate the calibration the more impressive the surround effect.

Effective sound calibration

After demanding you leave the room, the soundbar emits a series of test tones. This is to figure out the surroundings and adjust its performance accordingly. Results are largely accurate, although the detailed menus let you manually tinker with each channel. It works. The soundfield is expansive and genuinely emulates a 5.1 surround system. It puts to shame the 'virtual surround' options

we usually hear from soundbars. There's an impressive sense of height, and sound effects are placed with startling accuracy. Bullets ping and whiz across the room. There's also power and impact: explosions hit hard and you'll wonder when the neighbours will come knocking.

What about the rest? The YSP-2500 is not a master of refinement. For music or more sedate films, the Dali Kubik One manages a more natural experience. The Yamaha's voices are a little harder, too.

Yet this is about as close as you can get to a home cinema surround-sound without getting a home cinema system. Only, sometimes you need something more than just wrap-around surround effects. Sometimes.

VERDICT Yamaha's done it again: a very talented soundbar with a great surround sound



t this price, you really have to be quite good to survive. And we're pleased to see most of today's contestants are very good: there are four five-star ratings, two four-stars and a single three-star. Whether you're looking for a big movie sound or for music streaming, you'll find something here.

Leading the pack is the Dali Kubik One. The company may be reluctant to call it a soundbar, but the point is moot: it's a brilliant one. Its sound is immersive and engaging with film and music alike. It offers a good set of connections. And to top it off, it looks lovely. What's not to like? It takes a lot to beat an Award-winner, but that just shows how much Dali has achieved.

Speaking of which, the Award-winning Yamaha YSP-2500 takes a close second place - but that's no indication that we love it any less. It's not an all-round sound system like the Dali, but it is an all-enveloping one.

For movies, its talents are unmatched. We never cease to be impressed by its accurately calibrated effects placement. This is the closest you can get to a full 5.1 set-up without actually being surrounded by speakers.

In third place, we have the Focal Dimension and the Sonos Playbar. The Focal is an excellent

soundbar with great sound and good connections. We love its large, spacious sound and its authoritative delivery. It just loses out when it comes to subtle expression. Oh, and its size might be a little intimidating.

The Sonos is a wonderful streaming system and has price on its side. Sure, it only has one input for your TV - but it also has access to all the world's music, all tied up in a lovely user interface. It will surely bring joy to anyone prioritising bassinets over bullets.

Feature-complete

Time to take one step down to four stars, and we find ourselves in the company of the Monitor Audio ASB-2 and Libratone's woolly Diva. It's the Monitor Audio that has the upper hand here. With its array of inputs and streaming options - and its large, powerful sound - it is the more complete offering.

That's the reason we gave it an Award in 2013. But as the standards have been raised by the likes of Dali and Focal, it has struggled to stay on top.

The Libratone Diva finds itself in an awkward position. Its relative lack of connections can be put down to its streaming abilities, but in that

arena it is entirely outclassed by the Sonos Playbar, which sounds better and is easier to operate. However, we do like its performance and its comparatively low price, and that woolly cover doesn't hurt.

You can Canton it

Finally we get to the Canton DM 900, which gets a decent three-star rating. It's not a bad soundbar by any means. Its sound is perfectly listenable. It certainly fulfils the function of boosting the sound of your TV. And as for connections, it's not too stingy either.

But in this company it's outclassed. For £700, the sound quality pumped out by the class-leaders is far beyond anything offered by this small-bar, fat-sub combination. If Canton can drop the price could do well, but today it goes home with a few bruises.

Now let's get something straight: soundbars aren't supposed to replace a proper speaker set-up. Instead, they're for people who don't have the space or inclination to put boxes and cables everywhere. If you're one of these people, and you have up to £800 to spare, you've got plenty of fine choices here.

'BAR OR 'BASE?

Not all soundbars are created equal. Some are massive blocks, mounted on the wall or sitting on a shelf under your TV. Many are slender enough to be placed right in front of the TV without blocking it, but these are usually accompanied by separate subwoofers, which act as the muscle in the sound department. But what if you don't have a spare shelf? Maybe you don't want to drill holes into your wall. Or perhaps you're aghast at the idea of having a big black box on the floor of your living room. In these cases, you should consider a soundbase. These do the same job as a soundbar, but are made flat enough to act as a sonic pedestal for your TV. It's not particularly elegant, but it solves that problem.

Don't worry if you're put off by the flesh-coloured fabric on the Soundlinks, as some of our test team were. There is a darker alternative. Thankfully, the fabric feels good quality.

The Soundlinks are a surprisingly compact pair of cans, designed to sit on your ears instead of enveloping them. They fold up into a petite package too, and come with small carry pouch.

Flick the power switch and a female assistant chirps up to help guide you through the set-up process. She'll tell you the battery level, the source connected and can also let you know who's trying to call before you pick up. That's more than many rivals offer. A big thumbs-up.

Battery life is impressive too. Bose claims around 15 hours of playtime, and that a full charge takes only an hour and a half.

Play Jay-Z's *Big Pimpin'* and there's real intent and swagger to the track. Bass sounds solid and weighty but well judged. There's a good sense of clarity and detail, plus an even tonal balance which lends itself well to all manner of music.

The Philips M2BTs have the edge in terms of overall clarity and dynamics, but the Boses are still talented and deserve to be taken seriously.

VERDICT Bose goes Bluetooth with some success - these headphones are a very decent shout

House Of Marley's Liberate XLBTs allow you to go wireless and help save the planet at the same time. The inserts for each earpiece use wood approved by the FSC (Forest Stewardship Council), while the headband, earpieces and carry pouch all use 'REWIND', the company's own fabric, made from reclaimed materials.

Unfortunately, any feeling of satisfaction disappears the moment you power them up and play music. They're hugely disappointing. Small-scale and compressed, the Liberate XLBTs seem afraid to put their head above the parapet.

Stream Sam Smith's *Money On My Mind* and the normally sprightly piano play lacks any real get-up-and-go. Percussion sounds sombre instead of sparkly. The whole track is delivered like it's wrapped in cotton wool. Bass notes sound loose and ill-defined - and there's a haze to the sound that robs it of any clarity. Play Feeder's *Fires* and the track sounds even more compressed than the 'Extreme Quality' Spotify stream, as if the band's playing inside a wardrobe. It's a shame, because the XLBTs are well made, comfortable and don't heat your ears unduly. But that's scant consolation for inferior sound.

VERDICT The Marleys miss their mark with substandard sound quality. Cast your gaze elsewhere

Tapping and swiping are actions more associated with the touchscreen of a tablet or smartphone than a pair of headphones. The Jabra Revo Wireless 'phones don't have a screen, but they can be controlled through a touch-sensitive surface. Slide your finger clockwise around the outer edge of the right earcup and volume increases. Going the opposite way takes it down. Tapping the front edge twice skips a track, while tapping the rear pings you back.

The whole system works rather well - you feel more confident using this than you do the equivalent system on a pair of JBL S400BTs.

Build quality is okay, but the plastics don't feel that solid. On the positive side, our ears only became lukewarm after prolonged use.

Musically, the Revo Wireless headphones do not offend. Lows don't sound fat or boomy, nor do highs sound sharp or bright. Dynamically they feel restricted though, and while detail levels are okay, our overall opinion is this doesn't make for a very memorable listening experience. Tracks such as Prince's 1999 should sound full of beans, but here this '80s synth-pop classic never really gets out of first gear.

VERDICT The Revos incorporate a clever design but don't quite have the sound quality to back it up

All these Bluetooth wireless headphones make it easy to hear your tunes when you're on the move, but can any of them help you book a trip to music paradise? We've had a listen, and have a view

Apart from sounding good, headphones need to be a comfortable fit. And this is the first area where the Synchros fail to deliver. The earpads and headband are soft enough, but we found our ears warming up after just a few tracks. The phones also feel quite loose on your ears.

And where the Jabra Revo Wireless integrates touch-sensitive controls with some degree of success, the JBL S400BTs don't execute this feature so well. The insert of the left earcup is a control panel, but it's not always responsive and sometimes misinterprets commands.

There's a 2.5mm jack for the supplied headphone cable, but no in-line mic or control on the cable, which is a bit of a shame.

Bassheads will get a kick from the exciting presentation on offer here. There's a real sense of power, but problems arise when the music calls for greater control and finesse. Emeli Sandé's *Maybe* requires delicacy and a subtle, tender tone. Instead the background kick-drum simply overwhelms the rest of the track.

The JBL's aren't bad headphones, but the bass needs taming and those operational and design issues need ironing out too.

VERDICT A patchy performance from these JBLs: the fit isn't quite right and neither is the sound

Headphone pricing is becoming ridiculously unpredictable. Take Philips's M2BT Bluetooth headphones. They were originally reviewed and deemed worthy of a *What Hi-Fi?* Award at £250; as we write this they're being sold online for just £185. Who knows what price they'll be by the time you're reading this review?

What we do know is these are most definitely Award-worthy. It's all about the level of detail, refinement and clarity. There's none of the brightness which can taint wireless sound. Highs are crisp and clean, but not abrasive. Play Tom Odell's *Real Love* and his vocal is beautifully rendered, with real expression and emotion.

Let rip with something more forceful and direct, such as Kings of Leon's *Don't Matter* and the M2BTs pick up the pace, delivering wailing guitars and punchy drum kicks with real verve.

The memory foam earpads are cosy and well balanced, the right-earcup controls practical and the external-noise-sensing, volume-adjusting mic effective. These 'phones offer an attractive blend of excellent build, useful features and fantastic sound quality - they're still the wireless headphones to beat at this level.

VERDICT These Award-winning cans prove their worth time after time - they're a superb buy

Anything Dr Dre can do, 50 Cent can do better. Or not, as the SMS Audio Syncs would suggest...

Out of the box, you're immediately wondering where your money's gone. Build quality is bettered by on-ears costing half as much. The plastics used feel flimsy and lightweight (and not in a good way), and the earpads insubstantial. Combine this with an overly tight fit and we find the Syncs fairly uncomfortable.

You won't be surprised to hear that these 'phones focus a lot of their attention on bass. Delivery is muscular and powerful and there's a sense of aggression, which lends itself well to hard-hitting tunes like 50 Cent's own *In Da Club*. But there's also an unwelcome edge to the presentation. Subtlety and finesse are in short supply. Tracks such as Lily Allen's *Somewhere Only We Know* are sucked of emotion and you don't feel yourself engaging with the music in the same way as with the Bose or Philips sets.

Like the House of Marley Liberate XLBTs, the Audio Sync by 50 Cent suffer from quite a few musical deficiencies. There's little satisfaction to be had by spending this kind of money on headphones that struggle to deliver.

All things considered

AV amplifiers are the engine room of your home cinema, and these two Dolby Atmos-toting high-end heroes are at the cutting edge



n this formidable head-to-head, we're pitting two powerhouse performers against each other. Pioneer and Yamaha have reputations to uphold, after all. They've dominated this end of the market for years, and each is hoping to offer the ultimate home cinema experience with their flagship AV receiver. Both cost around £2000, both promise a stunning home cinema sound, and both are kitted out with the latest features - including Dolby Atmos.


We've been eagerly awaiting the arrival of these two amplifiers to get our first taste of Dolby Atmos in a home environment.

Dolby Atmos adds a whole new dimension to your cinema experience by adding overhead sound to create an immersive, dome-shaped soundfield.






Dolby Atmos



Luckily, you don't have to completely overhaul your existing home cinema system if you want to upgrade to Atmos. You will need a new AV receiver that's capable of decoding Atmos soundtracks – such as the Pioneer SC-LX88 and Yamaha RX-A3040 on test here. But you won't need to replace your Blu-ray player, or your existing 5.1 or 7.1 speaker package. You'll simply need to add matching pairs of in-ceiling or upward-firing speakers to create that dome-like, enveloping Atmos sound.



The maximum ideal lay-out for a home Atmos set-up is 7.1.4 - that is, seven surround speakers, one subwoofer, and four Atmos speakers placed above. However, since Atmos is scalable, you can start off with a minimum of 5.1.2, and then add more speakers if you want to expand. The idea is that the more speakers you add, the greater the detail and immersion.

Whether you choose in-ceiling or upward-firing speakers, positioning them in your room is key for delivering a seamless sound around your room. Upward-firing speakers will need to be angled correctly so that sound bounces off the ceiling at the perfect angle to reach your listening position, and give that Atmos-specific impression of sound coming from above.

Spoiler alert! It works, and it sounds fantastic.

How to set up

Atmos on the Pioneer SC-LX88

Pioneer hasn't labelled the terminals for Atmos speakers clearly, so you'll have to run the set-up and use the on-screen graphics to make sure the speakers are plugged into the right terminals. We discovered the Atmos speakers need to be plugged into the 'surround back' and 'front wide' terminals. In the speaker system menu, choose the 5.2.4 option for a standard 5.1 speaker

package layout with four added Atmos speakers. This works for a 7.1 system, too, although you can opt to use the 7.2.2 layout if you want to add only two Atmos speakers to your existing seven speakers. You can then assign 'Dolby Sp' status to the added Atmos speakers in speaker settings. Finally, make sure your Blu-ray player audio output is set to 'bitstream' (not PCM) before you start playing an Atmos Blu-ray disc.



Pioneer sc-Lx88**£2200** *****

WHAT HI*FI?

Pioneer goes from strength to strength. The SC-LX88 carries all the hallmarks of a top-end Pioneer receiver - fast, precise, superb layers of detail - and adds a powerful dose of muscle to make things even more exciting than before.

That surge of power isn't the only exciting aspect of this £2200 nine-channel home cinema amplifier. Alongside the extensive streaming, connectivity and file compatibility, the SC-LX88 features Dolby Atmos.

Atmos hits the spot

We dive straight into Atmos mode with a Blu-ray of *Transformers: Age of Extinction* (there are more titles coming with Atmos soundtracks, but we have to contend with this Michael Bay sequel for now) – and are blown away by just how fluid and dynamic Atmos sounds. The soundfield opens up, the added speakers give a serious sense of height, and the way Atmos is encoded means that objects move around the room more organically than before.

It's subtly done. Effects don't jump out at you from above, instead Atmos simply allows a bigger, more spacious soundfield. You get the sense of drones and helicopters sweeping from the middle of the room and hovering above. Bullets ricochet through you rather than around the outskirts of the room where speakers are positioned. And distant chirps of birds really do feel distant and located somewhere above rather than, say, in the front-right speaker. It's a powerful sound and hugely immersive.

It takes us switching down to a standard 5.1 or 7.1 Dolby TrueHD soundtrack to truly appreciate how much Atmos adds to the cinematic experience. The sound is suddenly smaller and you're aware of the height limit imposed by your ceiling.

Impressive in standard mode

But that doesn't mean the Pioneer is a slouch with standard 5.1 or 7.1 set-ups. Its core performance is stunningly impressive and capable, Atmos or not.

While it doesn't sound as huge and grand as the Yamaha RX-A3040, the Pioneer amp gets everything else right. It's punchy, taut, and agile. We love its

crisp, clean sound and the razor-sharp precision with which it handles a film's soundtrack. It has that satisfying, meaty punch that's missing on the Yamaha.

With X-Men: Days of Future Past playing, we're sucked into the action from the get-go. There are layers of punchy detail keeping us captivated with every scene and line of dialogue. Voices are clear and direct (unlike the Yamaha) and packed with character, even at lower volumes.

The SC-LX88 has a wonderfully even tonal balance – highs sparkle with no hint of brightness, while the low end rumbles with insight. There's depth and complexity to Magento's metal-bending, excitement to the prison break scene, and the beautiful melody of Jim Croce's *Time In A Bottle* in the slow-motion kitchen scene is stunningly immersive.

Pioneer's acute grasp of rhythm and punch lends itself well when playing music. With a live concert on Blu-ray, the Pioneer delivers the plucks, twangs, Unlike the Yamaha, aptX Bluetooth is built into the SC-LX88, and there's a type-B USB input for directly connecting your laptop. Wired and wireless connections are available (both are stable) and you can, of course, play songs stored on any NAS device or laptop plugged into your home network. File support is extensive, with high-resolution 24-bit/192kHz WAV, FLAC and AIFF files playable via DLNA and USB. It also supports DSD files.

There are eight HDMI 2.0 inputs and three outputs, all capable of playing Ultra HD 4K and 3D content. SACD discs are also supported, and there's even a phono input for your turntable.

Neat, sleek and a great hulking mass of metal - the Pioneer SC-LX88 ticks all the right design boxes. Available in black or silver, the SC-LX88 is beautifully machined, sturdy, and its large display is pin-sharp and easy to read. The dials are responsive and lovely to use, too, as is the responsive remote-control wand.

We are blown away by how dynamic Atmos sounds.

thumps and vocals with plenty of style and perhaps a bit more oomph than necessary. We'll take that extra solidity over a thin, coarse sound any day.

Playing songs through USB sounds more solid and cohesive than Bluetooth, although both have a decent sense of excitement, detail and agility. Make sure you've switched to stereo mode when listening to music - it makes songs sound more focused. If you're aiming for long listening sessions, though, we would still guide you towards a dedicated stereo amplifier. The same would apply to the Yamaha.

Befitting a flagship product, the SC-LX88 has an exhaustive selection of streaming features and connections. Apple users can stream using AirPlay, while Spotify Connect and internet radio provided by vTuner opens up a world of music discovery - you'd be hard-pressed to run out of things to listen to here.

We just wish the Pioneer came with clear instruction on how to get Atmos speakers up and running with the amp - you have to explore the manual speaker settings. Our biggest complaint is that the back of the panel doesn't state which terminals are for Atmos speakers.

That apart, we can't stop praising the SC-LX88. It strikes a mature balance between subtlety and power, and offers a wealth of features that blow away the competition. It has a captivating sound that will keep you entertained for hours.

How to set up

Atmos on the Yamaha RX-A3040

Plug your four Atmos speakers into the front and rear-presence speaker terminals (if only using two Atmos speakers, pick the fronts only). In the manual speaker settings, set the amp assign mode to 'Basic' if you have a 5.1 or 7.1 speaker package. Delve into the speaker configuration menu for the layout subfolder, where you can tell the Yamaha if your additional Atmos speakers are

upward-firing (labelled Dolby Atmos SP in the menu), in-ceiling or standard height speakers. Run the auto set-up to ensure your Atmos speakers are being recognised and emitting a tone - the on-screen graphics will show if they're in the right position or not. For the Yamaha to decode an Atmos soundtrack, it needs to be set in the surround mode. Press the 'surround decode' button on the remote and the amp is ready.



Yamaha RX-A3040**£2000*******

The first impression we have from the Yamaha RX-A3040 is one of scale. This nine-channel amplifier sits at the top of Yamaha's celebrated Aventage range of AV receivers, and duly shows off its flagship status with a mammoth soundfield. And that's before we even get to Dolby Atmos.

Play the *Edge of Tomorrow* Blu-ray (with 7.1 DTS-HD Master Audio) and the soundfield is huge. You get a real sense of the scale of the battlefield. The distant sounds of fighting, the helicopters overhead and the bursts of gunfire – all are delivered with plenty of detail.

Transformative sound

Yamaha excels in surround-sound effects. and the RX-A3040 steers the violent whirring of the alien tentacles through each speaker with power and precision. There's a satisfying rumble to basslines, and the quieter moments have space to breathe. If a standard 7.1 soundtrack sounds wide and spacious, then Dolby Atmos sounds even bigger. And taller. We play Transformers: Age of Extinction (currently the only Blu-ray film available in the UK with an Atmos soundtrack) and the ceiling of our test room virtually disappears. It's less about what objects you can hear above you, and more about the space that's just opened up for a bigger, more cinematic experience. It sounds more powerful, too.

Trading subtle for 'big'

But it's not all plain sailing for the RX-A3040. It's not quite as punchy as we'd have hopes. Impacts could be stronger and tauter. Compared with the Pioneer, there could be more detail and refinement overall too. It seems that in going for a bigger sound, Yamaha has traded in some of that finer subtlety and agility for an increase in soundfield scale. This affects voices, too, which aren't as direct or nuanced as with the Pioneer, which does a more successful job with its razor-sharp precision and subtler delivery of dialogue.

A rounded-off, smooth approach is in keeping with its predecessor, the 2013 Award-winning RX-A3030, and makes the RX-A3040 an easy listen. It performs well enough when it comes to music, although our misgivings about rhythmic punch

again come to the fore - the stop and start of notes could be more distinct, and songs played via USB sound a tad more solid and cohesive than streamed over Spotify. Yamaha has a variety of fun sound programs (which are more successful than those of its rivals), but we'd pick 'stereo' mode for the most cohesive performance with music.

The RX-A3040 has the latest streaming features: Spotify Connect, Napster and vTuner internet radio service. And anyone with Apple devices get a good deal - you can stream songs over AirPlay, and also plug your iOS device into the front panel USB for playback and charging features. You can even transfer your device's wi-fi settings to the receiver via USB.

For other devices, you can stream music over your home network. Wired and wireless network connections are both stable, and DLNA certification means you can stream songs stored on a laptop or NAS box as long as they're connected to the same network. The Yamaha receiver

buttons and additional inputs are neatly hidden away under the panel.

Whether you have a standard 5.1 speaker package or are setting up the full Atmos experience, it's imperative you run the auto-calibration to optimise the RX-A3040's sound with your speakers and your home cinema room.

Atmos instructions would be nice

And on that note, we do wish the amplifier came with clear, detailed instructions on how to set up Atmos speakers. To get everything up and running properly involves delving into the manual speaker settings to choose the correct speaker configuration, assigning your extra speakers as Atmos, and ensuring the amp is set to surround mode.

The standard remote control is nice in hand, and swiftly changes inputs or volume (the remote's 'surround decode' button is crucial when playing Atmos soundtracks). But for those wanting to use their smartphone or tablet, the AV

can handle high-res files of up to 24-bit/192kHz in WAV and FLAC formats over DLNA and USB. Android users can also directly stream HD content using the MHL input on the front panel. Unlike the Pioneer SC-LX88, Yamaha doesn't include built-in Bluetooth. It is possible to get, but you'll have to plug in the YBA-11 receiver (around £50) to receive it.

The RX-A3040 has an extensive list of connections: eight HDMI 2.0 inputs are the highlight, all of which support Ultra HD 4K pass-through and upscaling, and Full HD 3D content. There are two HDMI outputs, two dedicated subwoofer outputs, and a host of digital and analogue connections on the back panel. You can plug in older AV kit that don't feature HDMI, with multiple component and composite sockets available, too.

Available in black or titanium, the amplifier has a clean fascia, crisp display, and intuitive control dials. Various control

Controller app is worth downloading and is free for Android and Apple users.

If our judging was based purely on how big and spacious an AV receiver sounds, the Yamaha RX-A3040 would win. It's powerful, but is let down by failing to deliver the subtlest, punchiest and most captivating performance that this money can buy. At this price, that honour goes to the stunning Pioneer SC-LX88. But still, the RX-A3040 is capable of playing Atmos soundtracks admirably. It's well worth an audition.

Whats on test

he term phablet first hit the public consciousness three years ago when Samsung launched its Galaxy Note smartphone. At 5.3in, it was considered far too big to be a phone, and it took a terrible portmanteau to describe something that wasn't quite phone, wasn't quite tablet.

Move on three years and the market is different. Phones are creeping up in size every year, and at the same rate tablets are shrinking. Whereas at one point the biggest competition was around the 10in market, we're now seeing the biggest growth in and around 8in. And while phones were once little more than 4in, we're now seeing them all the way up to 6in...

Are we entering a post-phablet era? It certainly feels that way. The five tablets over the next few pages offer great multimedia performances, and with screen sizes between 7.9-8.9in, they've got portability to boot too. Phablet schmablet indeed...



Amazon Kindle Fire HDX 8.9 (16GB) £330 ****

The Amazon Kindle Fire HDX 8.9 is a rather different proposition to other Android tablets, and its merit depends on what you're looking for in a device - for some it will be an excellent choice, for others it could be next-to useless.

For a start, Amazon has placed such a heavy skin over the top of it that you'd never know it was running Android at all. Anyone will need to spend some time getting used to the way it runs.

Along the top there is a menu of shortcuts which you'll use to access most of your content. Swipe up and there's a page for your favourites, pre-populated with a handful of apps such as calendar, camera and Amazon's Silk browser. It is a layout you get used to, but some things can still feel unnecessarily buried in menus.

All play and no work

This is a tablet that puts entertainment first. If you want to edit documents or produce presentations you'll need to look elsewhere. It's built around content and, most specifically, content from Amazon. We'd usually complain about such a heavy-handed approach, but we'd expect anyone considering buying it to already subscribe to a large chunk of Amazon's services, or at least be open to the idea.

You can upload your own content to the Fire, but within every menu you are presented with suggestions for Amazon content. It's everywhere. The snag? All the content you buy

on this tablet will be from Amazon and Amazon alone. There's no access to the Google Play app store like you'd get on a regular Android tablet.

Stock take

The video and music side of things is pretty well stocked but some apps are missing or delayed. That said, despite being a competitor to Amazon's Prime Video service, Netflix is available to download, as are the likes of BBC iPlayer, Spotify, Deezer and Rdio.

When it comes to performance, the HDX 8.9 is no slouch thanks to its 2.2GHz quad-core processor and 2GB RAM. We have multiple tabs on the Silk browser open, a book on the go, jump into a film and downloaded apps, and we never once see it slow up.

For a device so based around content, the HDX 8.9's display is crucial and, thankfully, its 8.9in screen is a stunner, matching the Samsung Galaxy Tab S for resolution at 2560 x 1600 and packing in 339ppi. The screen is bright and colours are rich and vibrant, yet accurate and well balanced. Viewing angles are good too.

Battery life on the Fire HDX 8.9 is extremely impressive, and in our battery rundown test it manages 14 hours and 13 minutes, four hours longer than the iPad.

When it comes to music, the Fire HDX 8.9 offers promising performance too. Plug in some headphones and fire up a WAV CD rip and you're

given a full-bodied, balanced sound. There's a decent amount of detail retrieval, though something like the Sony Xperia Z3 Tablet Compact has a touch more insight.

The main 8MP camera, too, gives good results, with largely accurate colour reproduction and decent detail. Exposure is generally accurate, though indoor strip lighting can throw it.

The design is well thought out, the back panel offering a soft-touch rubberised effect with a tapered-edge design to help with grip.

There's no microSD card slot here, so you'll have to choose your storage at the point of purchase; 16GB, 32GB or 64GB - as ever, we'd recommend going for 32GB as a minimum if you're one for downloading lots of content.

There's a lot to love about the HDX 8.9. In performance terms it's up with the best of them, with a great screen, a good way with music and movies, and a strong battery life. But its closed-in ecosystem isn't going to be for everyone.

Apple iPad mini 3 (16GB) £320 *****

The yearly upgrade cycle is now an accepted, if occasionally frustrating, part of being a technophile in today's ever-moving market. Once a year (or even sooner - yes we're looking at you, Sony), a product line will get refreshed or replaced. The iPad mini 3 apparently missed that memo and remains almost identical to the mini 2, save for the addition of Apple's Touch ID fingerprint scanner and the new gold colourway.

If it ain't broke...

It's an odd decision, particularly since the iPad mini 2 remains on sale for £80 less than its newer sibling, and is now a more attractive proposition than ever. That doesn't mean the iPad mini 3 isn't excellent, though. When it comes to design, the aluminium-bodied mini 3 still tops the tablet style charts. It's slender, sits well in the hand, and feels every inch the premium device. It's light too, at 331g. The 7.9in screen is modest in size but its 4:3 aspect ratio really works to its advantage for browsing.

That Touch ID fingerprint sensor is a welcome addition, if not a revolutionary one. It's the most accurate and best implemented scanner on the market and is not reliant on a perfect grip or orientation. As with other Touch ID devices, it doesn't play nice with wet fingers, but you can easily enter your back-up PIN if needs be.

You can also use Touch ID to buy things on iTunes, and users in the US can employ it to

secure online purchases with just their fingerprint, thanks to Apple Pay. For the moment though, that's not a service available in the UK.

As has always been the case with Apple's tablets, the iPad mini 3 is non-expandable, offering on-board storage options of 16GB, 64GB and 128GB. And, while more favourably priced than last year, it's all still a lot more expensive than the cost of a microSD card.

The 1536 x 2048 Retina resolution display is present and correct - and excellent - but it seems a shame that Apple hasn't included some of the new screen tech we've seen added to the Air 2, such as the anti-reflective coating.

The screen is bright enough to take on video outdoors. It can't quite match the retina-searing brightness of the Samsung Galaxy Tab S, but its colour balance is as natural as ever and there are none to top it at this price and screen size. Feed the mini 3 a Full HD movie and that natural balance is supported by a wide colour palette that offers great contrast and plenty of subtlety.

We still love the way the iPad mini sounds, but others are now snapping at its heels. It's clean, refined and well organised, with plenty of rhythmic know-how and a strong handle on dynamics. Detail levels don't quite match up to those on the Sony Z3 Tablet Compact though, and there's no support for high-res music.

When it comes to listening without headphones, the iPad mini 3 offers clarity to its

presentation that many of its competitors can't match. Dialogue is clear and the overall character is largely well balanced.

Apps aplenty

As is always the case with iOS, app selection is superb. Apps designed specifically for the iPad now number nearly 500,000.

When it comes to the iPad mini 3's camera, it packs the same 5MP iSight sensor from its predecessor, and performance is largely similar.

Battery life is as advertised, just surpassing 10 hours for multimedia use, managing 10 hours 15 minutes in our battery rundown test.

The iPad mini 3 is a bit of a tricky one to judge. In many respects, it's last year's tablet with a few non-essential tweaks that come at an £80 premium over the still-with-us iPad mini 2. But it also still manages to more-than hold its own in this company and offers design and performance you can't argue with.

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Google Nexus 9 (16GB) £320 ****

The Google Nexus 9 feels like it's having something of an identity crisis. At £320, it's no longer the cheap tablet the Nexus brand originally thrived as, but compare it with the premium tablet market it's now up against and it struggles to compete.

In terms of size, it sits between its two predecessors - the excellent Nexus 7 and the not-quite-as-good Nexus 10 - with a screen size of 8.9in. It feels like a 'medium-sized' tablet rather than large or small, a Goldilocks effect that many will feel is just right, and its aspect ratio matches the iPad at 4:3.

A fairly chunky body

Despite this, when we first picked up the Nexus 9, we couldn't help but be a little disappointed. Considering it's been made by HTC, the brains behind the gorgeous HTC One (M8), it's a shame it hasn't pushed a more premium design here too. At 8mm thick, it feels a little on the chunky side and, while its plastic body feels sturdy enough, there is some flex to it.

Buttons are kept to a minimum on the Nexus 9, with just a volume rocker and power button on the right-hand side. We'd like them to be a little more pronounced for easier use though.

With its £320 price tag, the Nexus 9 is a lot pricier than many were hoping for, but it does come with a suitably boosted spec list to back it up. This includes an Nvidia Tegra K1, a 2.3GHz

dual-core processor with 64-bit architecture supported by 2GB RAM for performance that's smooth and largely stutter-free, and a visually engaging upgrade to Android Lollipop.

Personalised sharing

One of the nicest additions of Lollipop is the implementation of different user accounts, allowing different people using the same tablet to have their own settings, photos and apps.

When it comes to its screen, the Nexus 9 packs the same 2048 x 1536 resolution as the iPad mini 3, yet with a Full HD clip the overall picture looks a little softer than on the Apple. Blacks can't go as deep as the likes of the mini 3 or Samsung Galaxy Tab S either, but the '9' does do a good job with keeping whites pure and bright. Colour balance is largely accurate, with skin tones well judged and no colours overdone, but more detail would really make this a screen to be reckoned with.

The music performance on the Nexus 9 is pretty disappointing to say the least. While most of its competitors have improved in this area, the Nexus has taken a step backwards. Its tonal balance is overly bright, even with the CD-quality rips we tested with, and it lacks organisation. Even something like a fast-paced guitar riff is enough to throw the presentation off, and instruments lack the depth and texture you'll find in the Sony Xperia Z3 Tablet Compact.

When it comes to battery life, the Nexus 9 does redeem itself somewhat, with its 6700mAh battery lasting for 11 hours 47 minutes in our standard test.

We never get too embroiled in the quality of cameras on tablets because we're still not sold on their form factor being suitable for serious photography. But if we were, we'd certainly be looking somewhere other than the Nexus. It simply doesn't deliver pictures you would expect from an 8MP camera, not even able to really nail a decent shot in good light. Shots are either washed out or over-exposed, and there are few options with which to correct matters.

All this comes together to leave us feeling rather underwhelmed by the Nexus 9. While its screen size may well be appealing for its mid-size approach, and its inclusion of Lollipop will be a draw for pure Android fans, when it comes to performance the Nexus 9 simply can't compete with the best at this price.

Samsung Galaxy Tab S 8.4 (16GB) £320 ****

As part of Samsung's current flagship tablet line-up, the Galaxy Tab S 8.4 is quite the on-paper spec warrior. We're talking an Exynos octa-core processor (that's eight - count 'em), 3GB of RAM and a Super AMOLED display with a test-topping 2560 x 1600 2K resolution and 360 pixels in every single inch of its 8.4in screen.

It looks the part too. While its largely plastic construction can't match the premium feel of the aluminium-bodied iPad mini 3, it still feels solid and well made, yet measures in at a super-slim 6.6mm thick and weighing just 294g.

External boost

One thing it does have over its Apple rival is a microSD card slot, which allows you to boost the 16GB on-board storage by up to 128GB.

The fingerprint scanner from the Galaxy S5 has made its way to the Tab S and works in the same way, by sliding your finger over the home button. You can register up to three fingerprints per device. While using TouchID on the iPad mini 3 feels so slick it becomes second nature, it's not the case with the Tab S. It's responsive, but the swiping gesture can be a little awkward in use, and entering a PIN code could well be as quick. The added functionality to authorise PayPal payments this way is a nice touch though.

The screen on the Tab S has to be one of the most visually impressive we've seen on a tablet this size. It beats all its testmates bar the

Amazon Kindle Fire HDX 8.9 (which it matches) when it comes to resolution, but it's the brightness of its Super AMOLED panel that really sets it apart from the competition – colours are punchy, text readable and contrast strong.

With video performance the Tab S doesn't fare quite as well as the Sony Xperia Z3 Tablet Compact or iPad mini 3. Both offer better-balanced colour palettes, with the Tab S still a little too vibrant. It makes for a visually striking picture but not always an accurate one. When it comes to contrast, it's no surprise that the Tab S's AMOLED screen does a great job of producing seriously inky blacks that are noticeably better than those on the iPad.

Sonic improvements

Audio performance is a step up from previous Samsung devices, and we have high-res playback included here to boot. With regular WAV CD rips it's a more precise, better organised performance than we've noted before, with timing improved and more dynamic get-up-and-go. It can't top the Sony for overall rhythmic know-how, but it's a good improvement.

Switch up to a high-resolution track and there's understandably more detail to go at and a touch more subtlety, but once again the high-res-capable Sony just takes it, with a touch more insight and attack. This is all through

headphones, of course - the speakers on the Tab S don't provide the best experience.

Considering how much power it has under the hood, it's no surprise the Tab S whizzes around its menus, jumping in and out of apps without stutter or stumble. We're still not big fans of the TouchWiz user interface though - it remains a touch heavy-handed for our tastes.

The 8MP camera on the Tab S does a fair job of capturing crisp, detailed images, as long as you're in good light. Low-light shots are largely noisy and often not of much use, but the Tab S does have an LED flash. Samsung's Galaxy Tab S 8.4 is certainly the best tablet we've seen from the company to date, and it's up there as one of the best Android tablets we've tested too.

That said, the iPad mini 3 (and the mini 2 for that matter) still show it up when it comes to audio and video, and the new Sony Xperia Z3 Compact Tablet proves that there is a better performance available from an Android slate too.

Sony Xperia Z3 Tablet Compact £330 *****

Sony has had a busy year in the portables market. Not content with launching two flagship smartphones and a family of supporting handsets and wearables, we now have the Sony Xperia Z3 Tablet Compact.

It's Sony's first crack at a small-form tablet, following on from the so-so success of the 10.1in Xperia Z2 Tablet earlier this year. Sony has listened to the feedback from that and has acted accordingly. The chunky bezel and unwieldy design is gone, replaced by a super-slim and light form that makes the Z3 Tablet Compact a great portable companion.

A slimline tonic

At 6.4mm it's even slimmer than one of its biggest competitors, the Samsung Galaxy Tab S, and at 270g weighs 30g less too, meaning it's comfortable to hold for long sessions of movie watching. Despite a mainly plastic construction, the Z3 Tablet Compact still feels sturdy and durable, and is waterproof down to 1.5m, for up to 30 minutes. An 8in screen features on the Z3 Tablet Compact, in the same 16:9 aspect ratio as the Samsung Galaxy Tab S 8.4. Sony has chosen to stick with a Full HD screen here in the same way as it has done on its phones, which might seem a bad move competing with the 2560 x 1600 resolution of the Tab S 8.4. But this is an excellent screen all the same, and Sony's reasoning of not wanting to compromise battery life for a 2K screen is one we fully support particularly when the results are as good as this.

Sony's own figures quote around 15 hours for video playback, but on our rundown test, the Z3 Tablet Compact managed 17 hours 6 minutes with no help from any of its (excellent) power-saving modes. That's nearly seven hours more than the iPad - compare it with the 2K-packing Samsung and we have to say we'd take the Z3 Tablet Compact's balance any day.

Reality bites

'Triluminos for Mobile' and 'Live Colour LED' do a fine job at helping with colour accuracy and contrast, but we always jump straight into the menu to turn off 'X-Reality' for mobile - its added processing makes images look overly sharpened. Play a 1080p clip on the Z3 Tablet Compact and colours are punchy and bright, yet manage to remain accurate. General performance is good here, with the quad-core Snapdragon processor and 3GB RAM keeping things moving along without hiccup or delay.

You get 16GB of on-board storage but, like the Samsung Galaxy Tab S, you can expand this via microSD by another 128GB. Sony's interface is something that will take some getting used to and will be down to a matter of taste.

Musically, we've been pretty impressed by Sony's most recent products, and it's no different on the Z3 Tablet Compact - it's taken a

long time for something to come and take the iPad's crown as the best-sounding tablet, but the Sony has done it. There's a richer tone to it than we've heard on Sony smartphones, sounding weighty and full bodied, and closer to the iPad in terms of character than ever before. There's more fine detail here, and a good handling of rhythm and timing. It's one of the best listens we've had on a tablet (helped by the Z3 Tablet Compact being capable of high-res music playback up to 24-bit/192kHz).

When it comes to taking photos, the Sony doesn't do a bad job at all. There's an 8.1MP rear camera, with a 2.3MP front-facer supporting, and we found shots to be sharp and detailed, with accurate colour reproduction.

The Sony Xperia Z3 Tablet Compact is an excellent addition to the Z3 family, offering a great video experience, a superb way with music and startlingly good battery life - all wrapped up in a slim and stylish shell.

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he tablet market is a competitive place to be right now, particularly at this screen size, and it shows. We're seeing manufacturers improving where we thought they couldn't, pushing for more from their screens and audio, updating their designs and improving their battery lives. And oneupmanship certainly makes for an interesting test.

We have to say we were disappointed by the Nexus 9. After a long wait for the successor to the Nexus 7, it arrives but at a premium price with a non-premium performance. The Samsung Galaxy Tab S held its own thanks to a new wave of Samsung products that appear to have tweaked colour balance and made sound quality a real consideration. There's still some work to be done, but it's a strong four-stars showing for Samsung. Joining it with four stars is the Amazon Kindle Fire HDX 8.9. A great tablet, but so tied into the Amazon ecosystem that it oozes an aura of self-imposed limitation.

Two five stars then, the first to the Sony Xperia Z3 Tablet Compact - quite the tongue twister, but a superb tablet that has the best audio we've ever heard on a tablet. But it's the all-round brilliance of the iPad mini 3 that takes the win. If you have £320 to spend on a tablet and you like iOS, this is where you should spend it.



Samsung UE65HU8500 £3800 *****

If you're in the market for a top-class 4K Ultra HD screen, this Samsung UE65HU8500 should be on your shortlist. The 65in curved-screen dazzles with native 4K content and Blu-rays.

It's a rich, attention-grabbing picture. The Samsung delivers a performance full of punch and panache, with crystal-clear detail and a dynamic colour palette. We fire up a 4K Ultra HD stream of *Breaking Bad* on Netflix and there's a superb amount of detail on screen. Edges of objects, strands of hair, skin texture each detail is crisply drawn. Whites are bright and clean, though while there's plenty of subtlety coming through from the shadows, we think blacks could be darker.

Blue-sky thinking

The screen's colour balance is on the right side of vibrant. Whether it's a 4K demo reel or the *Guardians of Galaxy* Blu-ray, the colours are full of pizzazz. Blue skies are perhaps a bit too blue, reds and browns are little too rich and robust, but it never looks overtly unnatural or garish. Skin tones are fleshed out, and there's subtlety in gradations and shading. It's not quite as natural as its rival, the Sony KD-65S9005B, but it's nevertheless an alluring approach that's sure to turn heads. That rich colour balance remains regardless of what kind of content you're watching – so we must commend the Samsung's

upscaling talents, as Blu-ray films look fantastic. In *X-Men: Days of Future Past*, we almost forget it's not a native 4K picture. A demo reel may show off how mesmerising 4K content can be, but your Blu-ray discs will look almost as great. The textures of clothes and metal are discernible, the picture is bright and punchy, and wrinkles on faces are well etched, while 3D films retain a bold and dynamic approach too.

Ahead of the curve

Freeview HD channels and DVDs see the inevitable drop in quality, but overall it's still watchable. We'd stick to the HD channels to make the most of that 4K screen, though.

Once again, darker scenes would benefit from more intensity, with those blacks getting more washed out if watching from an angle: the down side of a curved screen. It's very immersive, but only if you're sitting straight in front of the TV. If you have regular family-movie nights, you might also want to look at conventional flatscreens.

The curved screen does look gorgeous, though. It's sleek and sturdy, and just as elegant around the back, with no inputs (apart from the Freeview HD tuner) in sight: connections (four HDMI 2.0 inputs and three USB ports) are housed in a separate 'One Connect' box. It makes plugging in your sources easier (especially if you're wall-mounting the TV),

keeps wiring neat and leaves the way open for Samsung to offer upgrades in years to come. With six speakers fitted inside the TV, it sounds rounded and solid. Detail is good, voices are easy to follow, and it goes fairly loud.

We'd pick up the TV's standard remote control over the curved smart remote. Both fit nicely in hand, but the standard remote is more instinctive to use. You'll need the smart remote to use the motion-sensitive on-screen pointer, or the voice control option.

Alternatively, you can use Samsung's Smart View 2.0 app. It offers basic controls, a second screen to watch the current programme on your smartphone or tablet, and the ability to transfer photos, music and videos from your smart device to the TV. It's functional, and it's free.

Impressive, attractive and entertaining, this premium-quality Samsung UE65HU8500 TV makes us excited about 4K's future.

Sony KD-65S9005B £3900 *****



We recently waxed lyrical about the Sony KD-65S9005B's picture and gave it top marks for its subtle, confident performance. The curved 65in screen is an absolute stunner, and we're once again compelled to sing its praises in light of its new Samsung rival.

Where the Samsung UE65HU8500 goes for a bold, eye-popping performance topped off with metaphorical jazz hands, the Sony screen underplays its brilliance.

A natural, subtle picture

It's a remarkably natural picture, with a supremely subtle touch to the way it delivers detail and colour. Even with native 4K demo content playing, the Sony never tries too hard to make you constantly aware that you're looking at a 4K screen. It's happier to deliver the picture as it is, and as a result it's a hugely immersive and engaging screen.

Breaking Bad via Netflix 4K looks cinematic and intimate in equal measure. Detail levels are sky-high, motion is smooth and characters realistically fleshed out. Difficult-to-render things such as skin-tones are delivered well enough to convince.

Blu-ray films look astonishingly refined and crisp. *Captain America: The Winter Soldier* is full of clean lines and bright highlights, while *Guardians of the Galaxy* bursts with punchy colours and convincing shades of subtlety.

Blacks are invitingly deep and lush, without robbing detail, and offer a strong, convincing contrast that heightens drama. There's a real sense of depth to the Sony's involving picture, which can make 3D films almost redundant (although the active 3D is fairly comfortable to watch).

Sony's upscaler does a good job of handling standard-definition content. Broadcast channels and DVDs look fuzzy, soft-edged and lack the detail definition of their Blu-ray counterparts, but they're still watchable. HD channels and iPlayer shows offer a more defined performance that does justice to the 4K screen.

A decent sound as well

The TV is enjoyable to listen to on its own. The sound is big, solid and crisply detailed. Voices are nuanced and packed with character, and it gives surround sound a decent go too.

There's a generous helping of connectivity, including four HDMI 2.0 inputs that support 4K and 3D, and three USB ports for playing all kinds of media files.

We're impressed by how captivating the Sony screen is. The curved design

definitely aids immersion, but only if you sit right on front of the screen. Those sitting at an angle might find colours a little washed out, but the subtle detail and clarity stay true, thankfully.

High price, top quality

It's a hefty price to pay, but this gorgeous Sony 4K screen is certainly worth it. Its rival, the Samsung UE65HU8500, puts up a formidable fight, to give it its due, and it's a tie between the two when it comes to the amount of detail they both offer.

We're more impressed by the Sony's ability to deliver a subtle picture while still looking punchy and exciting, however. We also love how smooth it is in use. If you're looking for the best premium 4K screen that does it all, look no further than this stunning Sony KD-65S9005B.

Creek Audio Evolution 50A

he driving force in any hi-fi system, stereo amplifiers are always a hotly contested category in the *What Hi-Fi?* Awards. This year was no different, with 2014 seeing a trio of new winners. The new Rega Elex-R was one of them, dethroning the Naim Nait 5si to claim the name as the best amp £800-1500. Here, we put the two up against each other again to go all twelve rounds. Will the Naim's full star-set remain untouched?

The 2013 and 2014 Award winners are joined by the 2012 amp champ, too - the Cyrus 6a has managed to keep hold of its five stars in every group test it has graced during the past two years, so can it do this same here? And will the previously unseen Creek Audio Evolution 50A shine enough to shake things up? The answers are only a flick of a page away...

The Evolution 50A is part of Creek Audio's next-generation product range, and the supporting model to its higher-ranging Evolution 100A (£1500).

It's been a few years since we last had the pleasure of testing a Creek Audio amp, and if the 50A is anything to go by, we've been missing out. Performancewise, we're impressed.

Fast, agile and articulate, the Evolution is bags of fun. Whether it's wallowing in the piano-led rhythms of Nina Simone's *My Baby Just Cares For Me*, or throwing its all into the lively tempo of Daft Punk's *Beyond*, the Evolution's exuberant, full-of-beans delivery zings with pace and precision, and demonstrates a firm grip on timing.

A clear Creek

Its focused, transparent midrange is one of the most expressive we've heard at this price too, proving more than capable of getting across Eminem's charged vocals in *Headlights*. Though detailed, the Creek doesn't forsake subtleties for the bigger picture: *The Fellowship* from *The Lord of the Rings* soundtrack fills its wide-open soundstage. It has the organisation to challenge the Cyrus, with each instrument meticulously positioned. And dynamically the Creek is strong, as it works its way up and down the oscillating composition. It doesn't have as much appetite for the

track's orchestral crescendos as the authoritative Naim Nait 5si and Rega Elex-R, and lacks the bass punch and authority for the drumbeat underpinning Drake's *Take Care*.

A match to light the way

Taking care with system matching would be wise. You'll notice the lean low-end if paired with stand-mounters, but anyone fond of floorstanders should choose rich-sounding towers (say, the Q Acoustic Concept 40s) to flesh out the sound.

The headphone output is decent. Using AKG K701s (£200), we find openness, articulation and rhythmic aptitude, although bass depth still feels deficient through the cans. (A note to potential buyers: the Evolution takes a full weekend's running-in to even out its out-of-the-box thinness.)

The slim unit looks built to last, and has aesthetic appeal with a brushed-aluminium (black or silver) front panel. Its largely symmetrical layout gives it a neat façade: a clear white-on-black OLED display is book-ended by an input selection dial (inputs change with a click) and a slightly larger volume knob. A headphone output and power button also feature on the right-hand side. Oddly, the remote can't power the amp on or off, but we like its design. The amp's lack of digital inputs may bother

some, though a decent choice of analogue connections make it fairly well-equipped. There's a 6.3mm headphone output, a balanced XLR in, and five line-level inputs.

Input one can be turned into a phono input with one of the company's Sequel phono modules (ranging from £125-160, depending on sensitivity ratings) fitted, while input five is an expansion port that can be replaced by Creek's plug-in AMBIT Tuner (£125) or Bluetooth-toting Ruby DAC (£400). Inputs three and four can also be programmed as power amp inputs via the amp's menu, should you choose to hand over volume duties to your source. Creek would, of course, point you to the matching Evolution 50CD DAC and CD player (£950).

The Evolution 50A amp has come into a market dominated by Rega, Naim and Cyrus at this price and holds its own. It isn't the complete product, but it has the entertainment factor for listening to music for hours on end.

The Cyrus 6a has become something of a favourite son in the amp world. It won an Award after it appeared in 2012 and -despite being dethroned by the Naim Nait 5si a year later - has kept hold of its five-star status ever since. Until now, that is. In light of the outstanding Rega Elex-R's entrance to the market, this entry-level amp has finally had to step down a tier to four-star respectability.

It does so gracefully, though. The 6a is by no means swept away by the competition during our latest re-visit, and doesn't drop its fifth star without reminding us of what we love about it.

Get on the good foot

Naturally, it does what Cyrus products do best: deliver an articulate, quick-footed sound that's as precise as any at this level. Put it to the test with alt-J's *Something Good* and the Cyrus plays to its strengths. The snappy bassline is delivered with impeccable timing, and each layer of the dense track is given a place and purpose in the presentation.

It wouldn't be much of an exaggeration to label the Cyrus a 'perfectionist' when it comes to organisation - John Williams's intricate Born on the Fourth of July theme demands stringent arrangement and the Cyrus duly ups its game, keeping tabs on underlying string sequences and intermittent harps.

There's plenty to applaud in the 6a's cool and calculated manner, though we'd like more fire. Its analytical approach is a trade-off for liveliness, and as a result upbeat songs lack the get-up-and-go to get us foot-tapping as usual. The Creek doesn't quite have the Cyrus's timing, but we find its expressiveness and energy more entertaining.

Monster punch

Yet ease into Eminem's *The Monster* and there's plenty of low-end punch when the bassline kicks in. It's revealing, too, the Cyrus spitting out lyrics with venom and digging out the quips in his rap.

It doesn't possess the dynamic agility of the Rega, nor quite muster the Naim Nait 5si's sense of power and drive, but what it lacks in outright muscle it makes up for in scale. And, typically for Cyrus components, there is a long upgrade path – starting with a factory upgrade from the '6a' to a higher-end Cyrus 8 model (for an added £700). Once that upgrade is done, you can add the PSX-R outboard power supply (suddenly now costing £745), which takes performance to a whole new level.

Elsewhere there are a decent number of analogue inputs, a headphone output and both pre-out sockets (for use with an add-on power amp) and Zone 2 outputs (to, for example, feed a second source to another room). There are twin

speaker outputs for bi-wiring available, too. Anyone familiar with a Cyrus product will recognise the amp's long and narrow aluminium chassis (available in brushed-black or quartz-silver) and dated-looking black-on-green display. We've long been fans of Cyrus's striking signature design, though we're surprised to find the 6a's volume dial a bit wobbly. We don't remember that.

Still in the game

The remote has (thankfully) changed since the amp's first appearance - the new handset is as good as you should expect at this price, with a tall, robust frame and sophisticated backlit buttons.

The Cyrus 6a might not be at the very top of the league anymore - it has been leapfrogged by more exciting and powerful rivals - but it remains a good-value amp. It's fast, insightful and as precise as any stereo amplifier at this level. We're still big fans of it, even if we have to deduct it a star.

The 2013 Award-winner may have just lost out to Rega's punchier, more revealing (and pennies cheaper) Elex-R in a tight head-to-head during this year's Awards discussion. But discount the Nait 5si at your peril - especially if hearing your system through headphones is important (the Rega doesn't have a headphone output, remember).

In its own right, the Naim is a superb amp: rich, refined and capable of making your system really sing. It's hard to imagine ever being bored by its temperament. Punchy and energetic, it launches itself into Daft Punk's *Give Life Back to Music*, bouncing along to the funky bassline with attack and rhythmic precision that makes it stand out from most competition.

Weight and scale

When it comes to spending almost £1000 on an amp, you want power and drive (an amp's main duty, after all). In this respect, the Naim delivers. There's genuine muscle behind its performance that feels beyond its 60 watts. Play one of the most dynamic tracks in our music library, John Williams's *The Theme from Jurassic Park*, and the 5si rises to the occasion, giving crashing cymbals weight and conveying a scale that puts you in awe of both the composition and amp.

Yet the Naim's authority isn't at the expense of delicacy: the fine line

between muscle and subtlety isn't an easy one to walk, but the Naim does it well. Picking out bells under the force of the dominating brass and string orchestration is effortless, and at no point do we feel short of background detail either. In fact the resolution on offer is more than pleasing at this price.

A hugely capable amplifier

Everything in the track gels nicely, and the 5si renders dynamic shifts with a good degree of fluidity. It gets precise instrument separation down to a T and, although its musical soundstage isn't of the Rega's expansive proportions, flutes and trumpets have room to breathe.

Make no mistake, this Naim is an extremely capable amplifier, with a striking ability to get under Norah Jones's silky-smooth, sultry vocals, while projecting them with clarity and pinpoint, dead-centre focus. The bass is taut and controlled, and never short of punch or solidity, and up top the higher frequencies have sparkle and don't trail off too early.

If you read the 'Best Systems' test in our October 2014 issue, you'll know pairing the amp with its matching (and terrific) CD player, the CDsi (£995), and a pair of B&W's 683 S2s (£1150) gives you a cracking system. And that's still true - even if the Rega might now be considered an even better substitute, for its greater transparency and rhythmic flair. There's nothing off-putting as we move away from sound either - as long as you're not expecting digital inputs. Or Naim's usually extensive upgrade path. What analogue connections it does have are fine: four stereo RCA inputs, two DIN connectors and a sonically consistent 6.3mm headphone output that sits on the right-hand side of the tidy façade.

Core asset

We like the Naim's smart-yet-simple look; it has a great build (which happily extends to the remote control, too).

There's no doubting the Nait 5si's talents; it will shine at the core of any system made up of talented-sounding, like-minded electronics. We knew it was a class act when we first heard it. It's been a year since then, yet this hasn't changed our minds. The competition is tough, but this is a five star performer.

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Rega's latest mid-range amp isn't much to look at but it has made quite an entrance: the Elex-R received a glowing five-star review before making off with a 2014 Award as 'Best amplifier £800-£1500'. The question is, does it have the legs to sit pretty at the top for the long run? If this latest revisit is anything to go by, we'd say 'yes'.

It certainly has the workings of a great amp, borrowing from two of Rega's other Award-winning models. It uses its much-loved smaller sibling, the Brio-R (£480), as a base and borrows circuit elements from the brilliant higher-end Elicit-R (£1600). The result? Another exceptional entry, and one that shines in this mid-range price bracket.

The Elex-R doesn't stray from Rega's typical sonic character: fast, agile and as musical as they come at this level, it laps up the rhythmic clapping beat and caffeinated pace of Macklemore and Ryan Lewis' *Can't Hold Us*.

Disciplined enthusiasm

Its up-for-it, hearty delivery has the muscle and drive to charge through any song we throw at it, as well as having the refinement and discipline to keep the presentation smooth and controlled.

The Elex-R's faithful reproduction of music is nothing short of stunning.
There's detail on tap, the Rega revealing a level of subtlety that'll pique your

interest whatever the music. It's as happy picking out finer threads of detail in the convoluted sections of Hans Zimmer's *Mountains* from the *Interstellar* soundtrack - often the first to be overlooked by less scrupulous amps - as it is unveiling variation in dense electric guitar notes in Band of Horses' *NW Apt*.

There's an unmatched level of vocal expression. Nina Simone comes through with a newfound sense of rawness and realism in her rendition of *I Put A Spell On You*. The Creek Audio Evolution 50A nears this level of midrange transparency, but the Rega better captures the nuances in Simone's deep, guttural voice – and with greater solidity.

The Elex-R demonstrates authority and scale better than anything we've heard at this price, including the powerhouse Naim Nait 5si (£925). We've always been fans of the Naim's robust delivery, but the Rega takes things even further.

Dynamic performance is equally enthralling. The Rega revels in the ebbs and flows of the jazzy ballad, proving a touch more agile than the Naim. Its far-reaching range never curbs trumpets and horns, allowing them to soar with real enthusiasm.

Tonally the Rega sits on the lean side of neutral, so a little care with matching wouldn't go amiss. Paired with rich, solid-sounding speakers, such as the

Q Acoustic Concept 40s (£1000), or B&W's more neutral 683 S2s (£1100), it feels right at home.

Traditional values

If it's a traditional amp you're after, you can't go wrong with the Elex-R. It has ample connections (although there's no headphone output) and a terrific MM phono stage that's happy making the most of class-leading £1000 turntables.

Build quality is first-rate, but the remote is disappointing: it's functional but insubstantial, and it lacks the solidity of rival handsets.

You know you've got a good amp on your hands when all you can think of to fault is the remote. Performance-wise, the Elex-R takes things to another level. There are good and great amps around the £1000 mark but put any up against it and odds are the Rega will give us a wider window into any piece of music. We wouldn't be surprised if this were still true a year from now.

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hree Award-winners (one current, two previous) and an impressive newcomer - rarely do we have a test with such a wealth of credentials. Yet the Rega Elex-R manages to top them all.

Our newcomer, the Creek, came in as underdog and held its own with four stars. If a system needs an energy boost, the Evolution 50A will give it an espresso hit.

The Cyrus 6a earned four stars, too. For the first time in a test, it's no longer able to compete with the Rega Elex-Rs of the sub-£1000 amp world. Yet it still has a whole lot to shout about.


In terms of Rega-versus-Naim, in our 2014 Awards head-to-head tussle we had a Rega victory. This time around the result is the same. Features-wise the two are

fairly evenly matched: the Naim gets one over on the Rega with a headphone output (and a good one at that), and the Rega responds with an excellent phono stage. No doubt these features will sway some when choosing between them.

But when it comes to performance, it's a little less down to preference. The Elex-R is simply a fantastic performer, outclassing its closest rival with a smidgeon more transparency, dynamism and even the Nait 5si's speciality: power.

Nevertheless, the Nait still has all three qualities in spades, and retains its five-stars. It's a step-up from the Creek and Cyrus for authority, drive and dynamics, and justifies the extra cash. It remains a fine buy at the price.

amut: we wouldn't be surprised if you've never heard of the company. It's Danish, and started life under the Sirius brand name back in the early '80s making amplifiers for studio use. But this is a company that has never really shouted about itself, or its products for that matter. That's a shame, because from what we've experienced it makes some very fine components. You can count the D3i preamp and D200i power amplifier among them.

That may be understating the matter somewhat. This pre/power combination is easily one of the best we've heard and - while expensive - is comparable in performance to alternatives that cost Mercedes money.

You get what you pay for

A high-end bargain, then? Hardly. £15,000 is still a truckload of money but we certainly see this combination as great value as far as top-end amplification is concerned.

This Gamut pre/power impresses the moment the music starts. It sounds clean, crisp and invitingly clear. Detail resolution is superb; we can't think of a rival that tells us more about the recording. Listen to Vivaldi's *Four Seasons* and the production is laid bare, but not in a clinical way. Low-level information that describes the recording venue is easily heard, making the size and type of acoustic space used obvious. The orchestra is arranged with care and precision, with the placement of instruments pleasingly secure.

More than its imaging capabilities, we're taken by the way this pairing renders instrumental timbre. It's done Let's not understate the matter; this pre/power combination is easily one of the best we've heard and - while expensive - is comparable to alternatives that cost Mercedes money



in a natural, unexaggerated manner that separates the sounds of different instruments (playing in the same frequency band) with ease.

Sensitive yet powerful

We love the way the D3i/D2O0i combination deals with dynamics too. It has the finesse to deliver low-level variations brilliantly, yet given something challenging - Orff's *Carmina Burana*, for instance - it delivers the crescendos with real intensity and force.

There's more to applaud when we play *The Heist* by Macklemore and Ryan Lewis. The music has plenty of drive



here and a surefooted way with rhythms. The Gamuts deliver attack when required yet have no problem easing back with chilled-out tracks such as *Same Love*. We like the way this pairing handles midrange - it's articulate and fluid in a way most other transistor-powered alternatives barely hint at.

Rarely have we heard deep bass notes delivered with such resolution. This pre/power has no trouble discriminating between different bass instruments or notes, nor does it lack anything in agility at low frequencies. We've heard rivals that produced weightier bass (not that the Gamuts are obviously lacking in this

respect), but little that has so much insight in this region.

Top level top end

Move to the opposite end of the frequency spectrum and you'll find plenty of bite coupled to an unusual level of clarity. The combo's excellent transparency and insight mean poorer recordings are exposed, but unlike much of the competition these amplifiers don't go out of their way to emphasise those flaws. You'll get an honest and balanced account of the recording.

Move away from sound quality and the Gamuts remain on sure ground.

The preamp offers four line-level inputs, including XLR, and the usual option of balanced or single-ended outputs, which are mirrored on the power amplifier

In detail

The dual-mono design of both units keeps the two channels separate from one another, giving each its own mains transformer and smoothing capacitors. It's a weightier solution than a conventional design and it pushes production costs up, but Gamut considers it worthwhile for the gains in noise reduction and stereo separation.

Extending the principle of component separation, the preamp houses its power supply board in a compartment at the front, away from the rear-mounted audio board.

The D200i can run at high volume levels without getting worryingly hot thanks to extreme heatsinks.





Build quality is as good as we'd hope for at the price and everything feels as if it will last for years. It's hard not to be impressed by the care taken in construction. These aren't cheap products but it's clear where the money has been spent. Our only complaint concerns the remote handset, a cheapfeeling unit that's not intuitively laid out. Gamut has to do better in this respect.

Don't be fooled by the input marked 'Phono' on the D3i preamp. This is a line-level only unit. There are four inputs (including balanced XLR) and the usual option of either balanced or single-ended outputs. Take a look inside and you'll find a dual-mono configuration right down to the power supplies. The idea is to ensure the two channels don't interact unduly. something that would increase distortion and degrade the stereo imaging. The D3i is a large unit as far as preamps go, particularly when it comes to depth, so make sure your equipment support has enough clearance.

The virtue of simplicity

The D200i power amplifier is a simple affair as far as features are concerned. It mirrors the preamp's balanced and single-ended connections, and has two pairs of speaker outputs per channel to make biwiring a little easier.

Under the cover there's another dual-mono configuration with doubled-up power supplies. Gamut's power amplifiers are unusual in using just a single output transistor per channel rather than combining multiple transistors as in conventional designs. Why do this? The company feels the technical compromises involved in

input buffer, and a special analogue ALPS Volume potentiometer of only 1 Kohm. This helps keep noise and crosstalk to an absolute minimum. The buffer was chosen for its low levels of noise and coloration. The difference is in the power supply section, which has been further fine-tuned for cleaner, faster power delivery.

The key features of the D3i are its genuine dual-mono construction, with separate toroid transformer for each channel, and a very short, high-quality signal path for a very open and natural sound, with very low distortion.

In keeping with Gamut's key amplifier design philosophy, the D200i uses a single mos-fet [transistor] solution in which one ultra-fast output device drives each channel. We believe multiple devices cannot be absolutely aligned and so smear the sonic signal.

In the D200i we use a new ultrahigh current mos-fet that handles up to 500A, together with a balanced power supply with much faster and higher power delivery for a lower noise floor and improved dynamics.

As the icing on the cake, we changed the cabling on both units to our own Wormhole cable, to ratchet the performance up another notch.

combining multiple output transistors are too great.

Muscle to match

The D200i will deliver 220W per channel into eight ohms and 400W as impedance halves. The company also claims 700W per channel into a two-ohms load, which suggests the D200i will be happy driving just about any price-compatible speaker.

There's no shortage of quality high-end pre/power combinations, but we find ourselves deeply impressed by this Gamut pairing. Its transparency and resolution are class-leading and we find its fluidity quite addictive. If you want an honest amplifier that doesn't stamp its signature on the recording too heavily we can't think of a better alternative.

uxury is a quality that's sadly lacking in TVs. Even high-end models from industry giants such as Samsung and Panasonic barely hint at it. Sure, when it comes to features and technology these range-toppers tend to be right at the cutting edge, but that's not what luxury is all about. We think it's a concept that's as much about how a product makes you feel when you use it as about outright performance. It's clear Bang & Olufsen understands this well.

The BeoVision Avant 55 may be a 4K set, but that resolution is not the thing that grabs our attention. Initially, it's the elegant motorised stand. Yes, that's right, the stand. Once programmed, this lovely all-metal structure - yours for a mighty £1195 - swivels the TV into the right viewing position with all the grace of a ballerina, its multitude of motors rotating the base as well as the upright that supports the TV. Ostentatious? Certainly, but useful too if you happen to watch TV from a variety of seating positions. The support also tucks the TV out of the way once you switch off, helping to free a little bit more space in the room. B&O also makes a motorised wall bracket (also £1195) that performs similarly pleasing gymnastics.

Smooth soundbar

The motorised action doesn't stop there. As the TV glides into position, the Avant 55's speaker array lowers into place. It is, in effect, a built-in soundbar. The 55 as a whole uses no fewer than eight drive units, each with a dedicated 60W amp. The drive-unit complement comprises a trio of tweeters, three midrange drivers and two bass units. B&O has a reputation for producing fine-sounding TVs and

with this kind of elaborate specification it's easy to understand why.

The company also understands that, no matter how well the product is built (and it is lovely, with a smartly finished metal chassis) the user's main point of contact is the remote control handset. It's a rather obvious point that many manufacturers simply don't pay enough attention to. It's something that B&O invariably gets right.

Handset heaven

The aluminium-cased unit supplied with the BeoVision Avant is beautifully balanced, nicely weighted and laid out with care. Compared with this, most other TV remotes look and feel as if they belong in a bargain-basement bin.

The Bang & Olufsen proposition doesn't stop there. While most TV purchases involve you trying to wedge a big TV box into your car and getting the thing running yourself, with the Avant things are different. We would certainly expect the dealer to install it for you, though we have no doubt it would be for a charge. The price would depend on how much work is required, but it's something we recommend, because there are a lot of adjustments and features here that are easy to miss for anyone not familiar with the product.

We suspect the combination of motorised stand, gorgeous remote and the theatrics of the retractable speaker coupled to the classy overall appearance will go a long way to opening many people's wallets. We need more though. Looking through the specifications we start to worry for this 4K set.

We notice that it's equipped with only HDMI v1.4 connections, which limits

inputs of 4K video to no higher than 30fps. The other issue is that there's no on-board HEVC decoding, making Netflix 4K playback no-go.

So B&O has given us a 4K screen that can't show the only proper 4K source we have at the moment. Clever. And if you can get some outboard video streamer to do the job, the quality of its output could well be compromised by the oldergeneration HDMI connection used.

Seems like an own goal and, to a certain degree, it is. We're sure there are engineers within the company working to sort these things out. At least we hope they are. So, is this limited 4K capability a deal breaker? Almost, but not quite.

The main sources

The vast majority of source material available is in standard or HD, and will remain so for a number of years to come. It's how the Avant performs with these video standards that concerns us most. Here it's on solid ground.

We start off with a Blu-ray of *Her* and are deeply impressed by what we see. The BeoVision delivers a bold, confident picture with rich, but still convincing, colours. Difficult-to-do things such as skin-tones are rendered with finesse, while bolder colours such as the greens in grass or the blue of a clear sky are delivered with skill.

The Avant's detail levels are excellent - edges of objects are drawn with precision, while long, slow camera pans have a deeply impressive stability.

Move over to *Thor: The Dark World* and we enjoy the B&O's excellent contrast. It can combine dark and light elements in a single frame really well. Black rendition is excellent with this

edge-lit LCD panel delivering proper darkness without overtly glossing over details in the shadows. It's a terrific balancing act few LCD sets manage. There's also subtlety in bright objects things such as bright sunlight streaming into a dark space come through with uncommon nuance.

The third dimension

Next we try 3D in the form of Martin Scorsese's *Hugo*. The opening scene (the camera tracks over the city and through the train platform) is delivered with confidence. The image is crisp, with excellent depth. There's still a slight element of layered 2D rather than the fully rounded presentation of the very best sets, but the active 3D on this B&O remains stable and easy to watch over longer periods. There aren't any glasses in the box - you'll have to pay extra (around £95 each) which feels mean considering how expensive the set is.

What of 4K? Source material remains scarce, and without the ability to access Netflix we're left with B&O's demo footage showing plants, skyscrapers, coastlines and castles. We find it engaging viewing. Not really, it's as dull as anything, but it looks terrific. You can sit unfeasibly close to the screen and still enjoy a sharp, clean picture. Colours are impressively vivid while still looking natural, and edge definition is excellent. We're also impressed with motion stability, particularly in a clip that pans across London's landmarks. It makes us all the more annoyed by the set's innate engineering limitations.

Raising the standard

It's always going to be hard for standard-definition material to look good on a 4K screen - after all, the set has to guess the output of 19 pixels out of 20. Still, we're pleased with what the Avant manages. The DVD of *Stoker* looks a little soft and blurred with fast motion but remains a decent watch.

We notice similar effects with standard-definition broadcasts, even if the BeoVision still does a fine job with colours and contrast. Move to HD channels and things get markedly better. It's a crisp, clean presentation that suffers low levels of noise.

What of that elaborate sound system? It's as good as we'd hoped for. While no

alternative to a proper surround set-up, the built-in speakers are way ahead of what most TVs manage. There's a decent degree of detail here and it has dynamics expressive enough to communicate the emotional content of voices well.

But that's not the whole story as far as audio is concerned. B&O has built in a 7.1 surround processor that handles the full range of film sound formats (bar Dolby Atmos). Connect the Avant to any of the company's extensive range of speakers and the BeoVision becomes a home cinema hub. It's customisable too, in the sense that, once configured properly, the speaker set-up can be programmed to change if a different viewing position is chosen. That's neat and thoughtful.

Smart, but casual

Smart functionality? Not so smart. There's BBC iPlayer and You Tube, but not much else. B&O will argue that a partnering Blu-ray player or another source is more than likely to have such functionality built-in, and it has a point. But it's still disappointing to note the shortcoming. On the audio side, Spotify and Deezer music services are built in.

So where does that leave us? We are disappointed with the poor execution of 4K more than we are by the lack of smarts. That price tag is pretty high too. But balanced against this is the Avant's fine HD picture and commendable handling of standard-definition material. It sounds excellent, and that's before extra speakers are added to make it the heart of a full home cinema set-up.

We can't overlook the sheer class of the thing either. It really does look and feel special, from that lovely remote and motorised stand right down to the thoughtful arrangement of the menus. This is one of the classiest TVs money can buy, and unfortunately class is a quality that rarely comes cheaply.



Darkness on the edge of town

Bullets, booze and broads: that's what you'll find in Sin City, where it's always midnight and everyone has a hand in something dirty.

It's been nearly 10 years, but this place doesn't change. If you liked it the first time, welcome back. You didn't? Well, better get out before you're spat out like a bad aftertaste.

For the uninitiated, *Sin City* is a series of graphic novels, now twice adapted into motion pictures that play heavy on pounding basslines and moaning saxophones.

This is a nasty world of crooks and dames, presented with Frank Miller's signature hyper-stylised, ultraviolent panache.

It's an over-the-top noir homage and a sight like no other. Nearly everything is starkly black and white, broken by splashes of bright colour. The novelty factor isn't as strong as it was in 2005, but it will still challenge your TV's contrast.

Witch-green eyes, ruby-red lips - but blood is often white. It's probably a good thing considering how much of it is spilled. There is a lot of violence. Throats are slit and there's a particularly nasty bit involving somebody's fingers.

But it's not just the violence that's gratuitous. There's also a silly amount of nudity. Eva Green almost never puts clothes on, and the girls of 'Old Town' offer a parade of flesh and fishnets. And yet, it never truly feels offensive. Despite the relentlessly grim tone, *Sin City* is never entirely serious.

Noir with a light side

There's more than a degree of camp to everything. The narration is a string of clichés from the dustiest of detective novels, read by subterranean voices. The cast is superb, and clearly having a great time hamming it up with mouthfuls of absolute drivel.

As with the original, *Sin City 2* serves up a handful of slightly intersecting storylines. The opening segment has a thug terrorising a bunch of obnoxious students. Elsewhere, a cocky gambler messes with the wrong people. A *femme fatale* torments her ex-lover. A stripper tries to take down a politician.

Most of these tales are hugely entertaining. Well, not the bits with Jessica Alba, who still has no presence. But that's fine, because Mickey Rourke is great fun and Eva Green is utterly captivating.

What's confusing (read: a narrative mess) is that this serves as both sequel and prequel, and some re-casts feel out of place.

Sin City 2: A Dame To Kill For is much like its predecessor. Either it's a guilty pleasure or it's entirely abhorrent, and only you can decide. If nothing else, it's one stylish peculiarity.

The midrange matters

Elsewhere it's recognisably business as usual, albeit with the glossier, friendlier sound the band has been developing ever since apppointing Trevor Horn to produce 2003's Dear Catastrophe Waitress. Your system must deal with the dynamic pile-up of Nobody's Empire, the spaciousness of The Cat With The Cream and the delicate fragility of Ever Had A Little Faith? with equal dexterity, but as is usual with Belle and Sebastian recordings it's the midrange that demands the real care and attention. There's a wealth of detail, nuance and expression waiting to be revealed. With it, this is an engaging collection of songs. Without, the entire album becomes a little spurious.

Brian Eno has always had multiple fingers in numerous pies, and when he was approached to collaborate with Jon Hassell he envisaged a producer's role. Hassell, though, was keenly aware of the commercial traction Eno's name might generate (although a trumpeter of some reknown in avant-garde circles, Hassell was unsurprisingly low of profile) and the album was released with a double-billing. Not long after its release, Hassell complained Eno's approach was too 'commercial' and

indicated he was unhappy with the record. This was in 1980. Now, for the first time since 1992, Possible Musics is in shops and in download stores.

Mood and texture

Emphatically less about 'songs' and altogether more concerned with mood, texture and literal ambience. Possible Musics is a breathy, earthy collection of pieces with a very progressive eye on the idea of 'world' music. It also has an absolute determination to make a trumpet sound like anything but a trumpet. There's more than a gesture towards rhythm and groove in the likes of Delta Rain Dream and Ba-benzele. but overall the feel is outdoors-y, equatorial and, particularly in the case of the 21-odd minutes of Charm (Over 'Burundi Cloud'), abstractly pretty. A system with wide tonal variation, significant powers of detail retrieval, and the ability to express the silences as completely as the sounds is the minimum requirement.





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

Soundbars v Soundbases

As TVs have become slimmer, their sound has become thinner. It's adequate, but if you want more detail, authority, scale and dynamics, then your telly won't cut it

A 5.1 surround system would do the job but they take up space, are not great for small rooms and even for large living spaces a surround system could add to the clutter.

That's where soundbars and soundbases come in. Soundbars have been a massively popular choice for beefing up that weak TV sound. That's now being challenged by the soundbase and while it performs the same function, they have attributes that make them a viable alternative.

Positioning/placement

Soundbases offer a big, solid foundation, a 'base' if you will, that's wide enough to plonk your TV on and save space (nevertheless, thin soundbars are available). They can be a neater solution, combating the soundbar's sometimes-awkward shape.

The 'bases' we've tested state they can support a TV up to 40kg, but we've not found weight to be an issue with modern TVs being relatively light. It's the size of the stand that matters so make sure the soundbase can ably support it.

And don't expect all soundbases to be similar in size. Canton's DM 75 and Sony's HT-XT1 were made for larger TVs, putting them within touching distance of a soundbar. You'll need a sizeable equipment rack to sit a soundbase on, especially when you take into account the depth of a soundbase is much more than that of a soundbar.

Soundbars offer a different proposition. Most are sleek, some are bulky (notably Focal's Dimension bar) and tend to be a metre long,

and in most cases you'll need a rack that's wide enough to support it. If not, then there's the option of wall-mounting it.

A soundbar that's too tall may block the IR blaster on your TV. One that's too small and we wouldn't be surprised if it sounded a little on the reedy side. Philips's Award-winning HTL5140 has speakers you can detach if space is a problem.


Some soundbars have a built in bass unit (making for a chunkier unit), while others have the option of an external woofer that's either wired or wireless. Where the subwoofer will go is dependent on space, but we'd place it as close as possible to the bar for the best integration.

Inputs and outputs

Many of the soundbars and soundbases we've tested haven't been stacked with inputs or outputs. Around the budget and mid-range area, you can find a soundbar with at least one HDMI input and digital coaxial or optical audio connection.

Streaming of the Bluetooth variety (or any wireless connectivity) shouldn't be taken for granted, but these options have been creeping in to a number of lower-priced efforts (along with NFC pairing).

Expect the same options from a soundbase, with HDMI inputs at a premium, as they are with soundbars. Considering a HDMI port offers the best sound from high-res Blu-rays, the lack of one may be a sticking point.



Sound

Both options offer excellent sound. A soundbase may be more attractive, as its size and shape can hold bigger drive units, and from some of the higher-rated 'bases we've tested, performance is spacious and punchy.

Soundbases can incorporate mid-range speakers and woofers to improve the tonal range and provide that 'oomph' for low frequencies and a soundbase with side speakers could, in theory, generate a wide soundfield but that's not always the case.

Would that make them a better option than a soundbar? Not necessarily as a soundbar has its virtues, too. Yamaha's YSP-1400 can create a soundfield that's very close to aping a 5.1 surround set-up, placing sound effects around the room, while a dedicated woofer unit has a heft to it that an integrated one may not possess.

In reality there's little to choose between the two. They're different approaches to achieving the same goal. It'll be down to what's more convenient for your home set-up. We'd expect a £200 soundbase to have a similar level of performance to a £200 soundbar. Which one is better? Whichever fulfils your needs the best.

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egular readers will know that Pioneer has dominated the top end of the integrated AV amplifier market for much of the past decade. That wasn't always the case.

The seeds of success were sown with the arrival of the £2700 VSA-AX10 back in 2002. At the time, Denon and Yamaha bossed most price points, including the premium market. This Pioneer broke that hegemony.

There were a couple of notable 'firsts' with this amplifier. It was the first time Pioneer had worked with AIR studios to help fine-tune performance - a fruitful collaboration that continues to this day. It was also the first time we'd come across the company's MCACC automatic set-up procedure. Such systems are common now, but back then we were amazed by its comprehensive nature. It did everything from set channel levels and distances to optimising the speakers for the room, although we were less taken with the time it took to do its work.

Sound quality was everything we know and love about Pioneer's

higher-end amplifiers today. The VSA-AX10 sounded agile, massively detailed and impressively punchy.

Today's SC-LX88 mirrors these traits to a remarkable degree. There's a pleasing degree of consistency between the two amplifiers when it comes to sonic balance and overall presentation, and that's a fine testament to the work done at AIR studios.

Of course, the newer amp adds modern features such as 4k compatibility and Dolby Atmos - such things didn't exist back in the older one's day - but the VSA-AX10's sonic DNA remains pretty much undiluted. The SC-LX88 is as informative and exciting as we could hope for and, like its ancestor did, sets the standards at its price.

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
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
