



All-round excellence from a high-res wonder

Cambridge CXN | Music streamer | £700

Cambridge Audio is back with a splash. The new CXN streamer - part of the company's new CX series launched earlier this year with all-new design and improved sound - is a stonkingly good high-resolution network streamer for £700.

The Cambridge CXN streamer is built on the success of the Award-winning Stream Magic 6 v2 (also £700), but the new CXN's fresh, modern design makes it feel like a complete overhaul.

But it's the hugely enjoyable sonic performance that really singles the CXN out. It sounds fantastic.

Enthusiasm and entertainment

There's an enthusiastic drive to the CXN's performance, combining subtlety, snappy timing and rich detail to deliver a sound that's just wonderfully entertaining.

It's a punchy sound that has a really good grasp of rhythm and low-end impact. We've seldom heard a Cambridge product sound so muscular. Basslines are meaty, textured and bound along happily to the lively sense of rhythm. The stop and start of notes are precisely and snappily delivered, and there seems no end to the streamer's energetic

drive. The CXN is skilful at conveying the space between instruments too, a point made obvious when we hear Ghostpoet's atmospheric *X Marks The Spot* filling the room with effortless dynamic headroom.

OCAMBRIDGE

No holding back

The sound isn't overly smooth, but the Cambridge does deliver a full-bodied performance that's hugely pleasing to listen to. The CXN certainly doesn't hold back from delivering the full impact of a song: the intensity of The Dead Weather's brooding, screeching 60 Feet Tall is fully conveyed, while you'll be blasted with the full force of Extreme's funk-metal anthem Rest in Peace.

The admirably balanced tone in evidence on these samples never puts a foot out of place, either. Drums hit accurately, the bass digs deep, and the top end sparkles - yet stops shy of sounding bright or coarse. The midrange in particular sounds lovely, with voices fully fleshed out and packed with character. This streamer is not fussy with file type, either, sounding fluid and dynamic with high-resolution and Spotify-streamed tracks alike.

The CXN is fully decked out with all the latest streaming features, so it's crucial you

have a stable network connection. You can connect to your home network via ethernet, but Cambridge does include a wi-fi antenna in the box if you prefer the flexibility of a wireless connection. All you need to do is make sure your NAS drive, laptop or smartphone is connected to the same network, then just press play. Setting up the network is swift, and we experienced no dropouts while streaming.

Apple users can stream songs stored on their devices using AirPlay, but we're not too keen on the rather weedy sound quality that is the result. Instead, we'd suggest hard-wiring your iPhone or iPod into either the front or back USB port for a more solid sound. Those ports will charge your device while playing, too.

Ready-made music - in any form

The CXN also features Spotify Connect and internet radio, so you have access to a few million songs from around the globe. File support is extensive: all the popular formats such as WAV, FLAC, AIFF, ALAC and MP3 are supported, as well as DSD 64

The app



Cambridge Connect app on Android/Apple

The Cambridge Connect app is free to download and has a neat interface. And it's the app – rather than the streamer – that accesses and sorts through the music stored on your server, laptop or 'phone. This means your smartphone's powerful processor is doing the grunt work, so songs load more quickly. The app is speedy, displays album artwork and track information, and is especially handy for scrolling through your vast music collection. You can also queue up tracks for an immediate playlist.

All digital inputs on the CXN are capable of playing high-resolution files of up to 24-bit/192kHz, and they can be upsampled to 384kHz too. That includes the USB type B input for your laptop, and the optical and coaxial inputs. There's also a pair each of RCA and balanced XLR outputs, along with two digital outputs.

We have to hand it to Cambridge Audio - the CXN is one classy-looking streamer. It's a neat, modern construction that's

moved away from the more traditional looks of the previous Azur 351 and 651 components. The 'floating design', the brushed aluminium chassis and the sleek finish (in either black or silver) look and feel premium-quality. We have to give special mention to that lovely volume dial - it has a smooth, perfectly weighted resistance, and the way the menu responds is delightful.

We also like how neat the design of the front panel is, as it shows off the crisp and

vivid TFT (thin-film transistor) display in all its glory. The 4.3in screen is packed with information but never looks cluttered. Track, artist, album and sampling rate are displayed, as is album artwork in full colour.

Control options

You can use the panel buttons to control playback and access the input menu, but using the included remote control (also redesigned) is far more intuitive. We tend to

Wi-fi dongle There's an antenna included in the box that gives the CXN wireless abilities. Network is easy to set up, although we prefer the stable wired connection. **USB Media** If you have DSD files stored on a USB stick or hard drive, plug your stick into this USB port to access them. It will charge smart devices, too.

Digital inputs All of the CXN's digital inputs whether optical, coaxial, USB or wireless - will support 24-bit/192kHz high-res files.

Labelling The upside-down labelling is a stroke of genius. No need to crane your neck or squint your eyes when connecting inputs from above.

Control bus Use the cable included to link the CXN to either of the CXA60 or CXA80 amplifiers, and you'll be able to control both using the Connect app.

use the remote interchangeably with the new-look Cambridge Connect app, as the app is more suited to scrolling and selecting lists of songs. There are some hiccups in operation, but they're relatively minor and certainly not enough to stop us from using the app on a regular basis.

It's the little things...

Another masterstroke from Cambridge Audio is its ongoing policy of writing input labels upside down, which means you can easily read the inputs when you're leaning over the unit.

It's clear a lot of thought and attention went into the creation of the Cambridge CXN. The functionality, design and ease of use are the best we've seen at this price, and the engaging, vigorous sound is sure to win buyers over. Those in the market for a streamer should really give this one a listen - and be prepared to put it at the top of their wishlist.

Well worth the extra

The closest rival to the CXN is the excellent Pioneer N-50A, an updated version of our Award-winner that easily won five stars recently. Yes, the Pioneer does cost £200 less than the Cambridge Audio, but we



would happily dish out that additional cash for the Cambridge. The CXN feels more special, is nicer to use and delivers a more robust, more revealing sound.

REVIEWER'S NOTES ... GETTING TO KNOW THE CAMBRIDGE CXN

We love the sleek, uncluttered design of the CXN. We immediately peel off the British flag sticker to keep it neater still.

The back panel's labels are written in both directions - that's a great touch that'll make connecting inputs easier.

That volume dial feels lovely to use. We spend a while just playing around in the menus and admiring its smooth action.

We download the Connect app and find it works instinctively with the CXN. Artwork doesn't always appear, though...

Time to start streaming - wow, it sounds brilliant! The muscly, detailed and lively rhythm is utterly engaging to listen to.

Reconnecting the Energy supply

The hi-fi industry isn't short of speakers around this price - quite the opposite, in fact. A handful of brands rule the roost at the budget end, the likes of Wharfedale, Dali, Cambridge Audio and Q Acoustics topping the pile. A few years ago, we'd have added Acoustic Energy to that list, but lately the British company had dropped off the radar somewhat.

Aesthetic influences

We're told Acoustic Energy is currently undergoing changes - being 're-energised' at the business end - so we're rubbing our hands at the prospect of new products.

The 101 standmounts are one of the brand's more recent offerings and the smallest member of its entry-level 1-Series. Acoustic Energy says the range has evolved from the mid-range 3-Series, so the 101s owe their heritage to their five-star elders, the 301s. From technical to aesthetic design, influences are clear: they share the same 28mm fabric dome tweeter and 11cm aluminium cone mid/bass driver.

Acoustic Energy has preserved its classic design. The straight-edged boxes are neatly finished with black ash or walnut veneers, while little touches like the silver trim on the driver cones and the silver 'AE' badge neatly tucked inside add a touch of class.

Articulate midrange

The cabinets are compact enough to occupy shelf space, though sitting them atop stands such as Atacama's Moseco 6s (£120) should ensure you get the best from them.

Like the 301s, they have a front-facing slot-ported arrangement, designed to control air turbulence and allow for flexible positioning. It seems to work: the 101s perform well both in the middle of a room or close to a rear wall (though the latter brings more solidity), and toeing in isn't compulsory for a good stereo image.

The resemblances continue into performance too. The 101s sound clean and crisp, their presentation tonally balanced and nicely refined. Consistently pleasing across the frequencies, they revel in clear and articulate mids, crisp highs and taut, agile lows. For the 101s' size, the bass on offer in Supertramp's *Give A Little Bit* takes




us by surprise. It's deep, tuneful and does its bit to help drive the song rhythmically.

Generous bass levels can sometimes hamper pace and tempo, but that isn't the case here: the 101s employ bite and energy where needed. Strings are enthusiastic, while the chorus is delivered with gusto.

Sensible match

The Acoustic Energys aren't the weightiest or richest speakers we've heard - they favour the lean side of neutral - so avoid partnering them with similarly thin-sounding kit. Smooth, full-bodied electronics such as Marantz's 6005 Series CD/amp combo are a sensible match.

It's clear they fall just under the level set by the class leaders. The Q Acoustics 3020s (£60 cheaper at their most

Budget music for the masses

There's a new kid on the British hi-fi block and its name is Mitchell & Johnson, It's a company assembled by Paul Mitchell and Dave Johnson, the same duo that brought products from electronics company Sansui to the UK in 2011. Those products have been rebranded and re-engineered under the new name, and there are some shiny new ones in its roster too, comprising stereo amps, streamers and DACs, headphones and, as here, CD players.

The brand has a mission: to make good hi-fi accessible (ie. affordable) to the masses. Of course, Marantz and Cambridge Audio already do this successfully, but the budget CD player market is hardly swarming with competition, so the arrival of Mitchell & Johnson is a welcome one.

Sturdily built

The CDD-201V is a remodelled version of the £200 Sansui, to which we gave four stars in 2012. There's more advanced circuitry under the hood, and the faceplate is brushed-metal rather than plastic. That may have knocked the price up slightly, but £250 is still reasonable for those on a budget.

Aside from the different branding on the machine and remote control, looks are similar. We wish a little more flair had gone into the casework, but the CDD-201V is sturdily built and generally finished to a good standard. The smart front panel features a readable display and nicely spaced buttons. We like our sample in black, but a silver finish is available too.

Design-wise, that's all we used to expect from budget electronics before Marantz radically upped the bar for aesthetics, finish and build at this price, raising the bar for its competitors in turn. The Mitchell & Johnson looks and feels a tad economical in comparison: its buttons are looser and sound more clicky, while the transport is a little noisy when fed discs. Still, it's functional all the same, and helpfully compact if space is an issue.

Punchy and upbeat

Less appealing is the 'credit-card' remote

lost down the sofa. On the plus side, it works perfectly well and will also operate the company's matching (and also re-designed) SAP-201V amp.

Whatever amplifier you use, it can connect to the digital- and analoguefriendly CDD-201V through the RCA, optical and coaxial outputs. Connections haven't changed from the unit's Sansui days, but three years on what you get remains good for the money.

A welcome new arrival, Mitchell & Johnson is on a mission to make good hi-fi accessible and affordable - to the masses

Insert Eminem's The Eminem Show (the player reads MP3, CD-R and CD-RW discs as well as standard CDs) and memories of Sansui's clean, crisp sound come flooding back. The sonic presentation is well balanced, clear and direct.

Add 'punchy' and 'upbeat' to that and you've got an enjoyable sound. It jumps to the album's catchy tunes and edgy beats: the hard-hitting bassline in Without Me has enough kick, and the track's momentum is delivered with a healthy dose of attack.

There's fair insight into Eminem's distinctive vocals, though the Mitchell & Johnson makes no secret of the fact it favours body, clarity and solidity over outright finesse - that's true across the



frequency range, yet it never fails to open the window into a piece of music wide enough to paint the general picture.

Mind you, it doesn't quite do justice to a song like Michael Simone's Any Other Name (from American Beauty OST), which relies heavily on precision and subtlety to carry its intimate piano sequences. The notes are clear, the leading edges crisp, but a lack of dynamic subtlety and a few timing issues mean they don't flow together as fluently as they should.

The Award-winning Marantz CD6005 is more convincing in this respect, showing more determination to express the intricate piece's depth, dynamics and subtleties.

Worth the wait

Having first got wind of Mitchell & Johnson's arrival at CES 2014, we have been keen to get our hands on its goods - we've waited patiently for a Mitchell & Johnson product to land in our test rooms for over a year. So has it been worth the wait? In a nutshell, yes. The CDD-201V might not be quite good enough to trouble the first-class Marantz, but it's a proficient player in a market where talent is sparse.

Carried away by the Momentum

When Sennheiser announced the

Momentum 2.0s (or M2s as they're called in some quarters) at the beginning of the year, we were intrigued as to how they planned to tinker with what was already a winning formula. After all, the company really struck a chord with the original Momentums. They brought a level of style, refinement and sound quality that was extremely tough to beat at the money.

Folding design

The only negatives were a slight lack of portability compared to some rivals and the fact they came with quite a large, bulky carry-case. So guess what? Sennheiser has addressed this by simply adding a couple of hinges, making them foldable and easier to store. They've also been able to wave goodbye to the old chunky case too.

But a new folding design is just the tip of the iceberg. The biggest changes are to the earpads and earcups, both noticably larger on the 2.0s. The new larger design does a better job of enveloping your ears, and they're also asymmetrically shaped to further enhance the fit.

It does add a bit of extra bulk, but the benefits are better noise isolation and an even higher level of comfort, especially for those who wear glasses. We think the changes have been well worth it.

As well as new earpieces, the headband has also had a tweak. It still uses high-quality Alcantara, but the band itself now has a more rounded profile.

Premium appearance

The eagle-eyed among you will notice the headphone cable now runs out of the right earcup instead of the left. It's just something to bear in mind depending on which pocket you keep your phone in.

The in-line remote has been redesigned - it's now smaller and made out of black instead of silver plastic. Also, the 3.5mm jack is now fixed, as opposed to being hinged as on the original Momentums.

It would have been nice to keep these little flourishes on the new design, just to complement the premium appearance of the actual headphones. The brown finish here is exclusively for Apple device users, who also get to choose from the ivory and black finishes available to Android or Windows fans. The 2.0s come in two flavours, the AEi for iPhone users, the AEG for the rest.

Greater detail

According to Sennheiser the drivers inside the earcups remain the same, but the earpad coupling allows for less bass leakage. After a quick blast, you can tell that, although general character hasn't drastically changed, the quality level has gone up. They now lavish you with greater detail and insight, sounding more confident and stopping and starting with greater precision.

Play The Temper Trap's Sweet Disposition and the rolling guitar plucks show clarity and nuance. Drum kicks and vocals have definition, as each element knits seamlessly together.

Switch to Drake's *Started*From the Bottom and the
Sennheisers have no trouble serving up weighty bass. The headphones do a great job of communicating the different tones to the tune's bassline.

Classical music is welcomed with open arms too. There's beautiful ebb and flow to *La Traviata, Act 1*. Strings rise and fall dynamically as the Momentums show their flexibility and fluidity. Timing is spot on, and there's a great balance of energy and finesse that keeps you listening long-term.

LG's new flexible approach pays off

LG likes curves. That much is clear just from looking at some of its TVs. But those curves extend to smartphones too. The LG G Flex 2 is the company's second crack at a curved smartphone and, thanks to better ergonomics and a sharper screen, it's an improvement over the original.

Eye ergonomics

There is a reason for that curve, and it's not what you might think. It is lovely to handle, fitting into your hand more naturally than a flat slab of the same size. It will hug your derrière when you put it in your back pocket, and the side of your face during phone calls. And if you happen to drop the device, the curve keeps it from landing flat on the screen. But LG dismisses suggestions that a curved screen has any visual benefits, and it's nothing to do with eye ergonomics or other buzzwords either. Essentially, it makes little difference in everyday use. The focus here is on the user experience.

We've been here before, with LG's original G Flex. That was a monster of a phone with a 6in screen, which some found difficult to use regardless of the curve. The G Flex 2's 5.5in screen means a smaller footprint. A gentler curve also helps make the G Flex 2 sleeker and more manageable than its predecessor.

Brilliant whites

On the subject of the screen, we're pleased to see LG has got rid of the original G Flex's 720p screen. Now it's Full HD 1080p. The picture is noticeably crisper than before, but it's still not up there with the Quad HD (2560x1440) display of the LG G3 or Samsung Galaxy S6 Edge.

It's sharp enough most of the time and images are well defined, with no jagged edges. The OLED panel offers much stronger contrast than smartphones with LCD screens. Dark scenes go properly black, and colours are strong. But it's not the most subtle picture when it comes to details in dark areas. Whites are also not quite as brilliant as we'd like.

The standard palette is on the bold side of realistic, but you can tweak that by changing the picture mode. Use 'Vivid' if you want to sear your retinas, or for bright outdoor use, but we preferred the 'Natural' mode.

There are some issues: the screen doesn't go dim enough - even the lowest setting is bright, which is not ideal for bedtime viewing. We also notice an occasional bit of graininess.

Balanced sound

The G Flex 2 is capable of playing back high-resolution files up to 24bit/192kHz. It's a clear, balanced sound, neither harsh nor overly weighty. There's a good amount of detail. Clear textures and leading edges make instruments easy to identify.

In the past, LG phones tended to lack excitement in sound, but this has been addressed. There's a decent amount of energy, although it's still not quite as agile and entertaining as we'd like. In comparison the Sony Xperia Z3 offers more precision, making for a more exciting listen.

Self-healing cover

Build quality is very good on the whole. The phone feels solid despite its removable plastic back. Yes, it's plastic - but it looks very smart in metallic silver (with a red option to come) and attracts plenty of compliments. It doesn't feel tacky either.

The G Flex 2 also has a good degree of elasticity. It's not flexible, as the name might suggest, but you can put it face down on a table and push it flat. While that's a little extreme, it means you could conceivably sit on it without incident.

The other party trick is the unique self-healing polymer on the back of the device. On the original G Flex, the healing process took minutes. Scratches now disappear in 10 seconds, but it's only designed to withstand normal wear and tear. Light scratches are fine as long as they

don't penetrate the self-healing coating. Don't go digging at it with your keys.

However, even after a week of careful use we found irreparable scuffs on the back. It seems the self-healing needs more work before it can be something to boast about.


Intuitive interface

There's more to boast about when it comes to features. There's a microSD card slot, for cards up to 2TB. And out of the box, it runs Android 5.0 Lollipop.

That means you have the option to interact with notifications directly from the lock screen, without having to open up the appropriate app separately. It's a cleaner and more intuitive interface than before.

There's also an effective Battery Saver mode, which comes in handy when you're running out of juice. You may not need it often - with normal use we managed to get a day-and-a-half out of one charge. The 3000mAh battery - sadly non-removable - has a Fast Charge feature that goes up to 50 per cent in 40 minutes.

LG's own software tricks include Glance View, which lets you swipe from the top to

peek at crucial information without turning the screen on full. There is also an advanced Knock Code, which lets you unlock the phone by tapping on certain points of the screen, without the need for a lock screen.

Slick operation

The camera has been taken from the LG G3, and that's a good thing. The 13MP sensor is aided by a laser, which makes for superfast and accurate focusing. Optical image stabilisation, meanwhile, plays nicely with shaky hands. You get sharp pictures and accurate tones in light and dark conditions, although in the dark the LG needs more thinking time.

The LG G Flex 2 features a 2Ghz 64-bit octa-core Qualcomm Snapdragon 810 processor. This is supported by 2GB of ram and either 16 or 32GB of storage. It sounds speedy – and it is. At its best, the operation is slicker than John Travolta in *Grease*. You can bounce between menus and apps with no hint of stutter.

That is, until things warm up a bit. The device is fast when fresh, but after a while it slows down a little. On a few occasions, it took a good 10 seconds to load up our video gallery. This can be helped by clearing unused apps and freeing up some memory, but it's hardly ideal. Thankfully, this is quite rare and day-to-day operation is just fine.

G Flex 2. When it's good, it's great. But the user experience is let down by a few hiccups, which keep the device from being on the same tier as flagship smartphones. This is a good choice if you want a powerful device that stands out from the crowd. But if you're after a multimedia beast that ticks all the boxes, there are better options.

There's a Revolution in the air

Tannoy's new Revolution XT range has made quite an impact. The XT6F floorstanders (£1000) waltzed away with a test win in our May issue, while the XT6 standmounters delivered a strong showing the month before. Having spent a considerable amount of time with the new XT8Fs, we think they're arguably the best of the bunch.

In essence, these are just larger 6Fs, using an 8in (20cm) version of Tannoy's dual concentric driver rather than the 6in version. Tannoy has put a lot of work into this latest generation of drive unit, honing just about every aspect of the design from the motor system to the tweeter waveguide in an attempt to push performance standards higher.

Smart finish

By putting the tweeter in the middle of the mid/bass driver, integration is improved over the separated arrangement used in most rivals, as is the time alignment of the drive units and uniformity of dispersion. In the XT8F, a dedicated 20cm bass driver augments the dual concentric's output. The additional unit comes into play below 250Hz.

We think Tannoy has done a great job with the cabinet. It's solid and smartly finished, though with a volume of almost 50 litres it's pretty big. There are two finish options: Medium Oak and our review pair Espresso (pictured), which is a dark walnut. We think both look smart.

There's more to this 108cm tall cabinet than just crisp edges and angled sides (to reduce the build up of internal standing waves). Tannoy has designed a coupled cavity bass reflex system to optimise low-frequency performance. A downward-firing port exits into the gap between the base of the cabinet and plinth.

Power and precision

When we start listening, it's obvious the work has paid off. We begin with Hans Zimmer's *Time (Inception* OST) and discover the Tannoys are capable of producing oodles of low-frequency information. Not only is it deep, it's delivered with real power and precision. There's plenty of agility here, coupled with a solid punch.



If you place them in a small to mediumsized room - say anything less than 4x4m - then it's possible the quantity of low-end may prove too much. But give them a larger room to play in and the XT8Fs will shine. In a suitably large space, these speakers deliver a scale of sound, loudness capability and dynamic reach that's hard to better for the money.

There's more to these towers than just bass and brawn, though. Move up the frequency range and they're articulate and communicative; alt-J's *Breezeblocks* is delivered with enthusiasm and coherence. There's a fine degree of rhythmic drive and

plenty of attack on offer. Vocals are crisply rendered, lacking nothing when it comes to subtlety and precision. There's a lovely directness to the way these speakers produce sound that just draws the listener into the music.

Tonally, these aren't the sweetest-sounding performers around. You'll have to take care not to partner these Tannoys with anything that sounds overly forward or harsh, because they'll do little to tone these qualities down. But feed them with well-balanced electronics and these floorstanders will deliver appropriately.

We're pleased with the stereo imaging. These speakers shine when placed well out into the middle of our test room and given just a touch of toe-in towards the listening position. Once the Tannoys are positioned with care, their sound stage is crisp, nicely layered and pleasingly solid.

Makes music fun

Given a suitably talented system and a large enough room there are few rivals that match the XT8F's combination of muscle and subtlety. Most of all they make listening to music fun and that, more than anything else, is the reason why we're happy to recommend them wholeheartedly.

Is it just us or are Blu-ray players getting smaller? Sony's most recent budget deck. the BDP-S5500, comes in at little more than the size of a hardback book, shrinking even further from last year's already dinky S5200. But don't let its size fool you - this little player goes big on performance.

Sony has tweaked the design of this year's players, ditching the fussy geometric

When it comes to apps, Netflix, BBC iPlayer, Demand 5 and Amazon Instant Video are all on board, but there's still no ITV Player or 40D. It's a shame but far from a deal-breaker.

As before, Netflix has a short-cut button on the Sony's small but perfectly formed remote, though this time with the official Netflix logo (sometimes it's the small things), while the shortcut to the Sony

Apps are presented in a "featured" tab ordered in most popular, but you are able to select your own favourites and pin them to a separate section so they're easy to get to.

Entertainment Network has been replaced with a favourites button for you to store as another of your most-used apps. That aside, they're nigh-on identical.

Convincing image

We load Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles on Blu-ray and notice that the loading time has been almost halved from last year's model. From selecting the disc, the Paramount screen loaded within around 10 seconds; it was nearer 20 seconds on the S5200.

Pictures are crisp and full of detail, with a great sense of depth and texture to the Turtles' shells. Blacks are very slightly deeper and colours a little punchier than on last year's model too. Switch it up to 3D and the image is convincing in its depth, with processing stable - there's very little to fault here at this price.

Upscaling from DVD is handled with aplomb - we watch the testing combat scene from Robocop and the S5500 delivers crisp lines, well-balanced colours and very little picture noise. You certainly wouldn't mind revisiting some old favourites with

Clint Audio Odin | Wireless speaker | £320

Odin isn't quite a great Dane

It's not often a manufacturer evokes the might of Norse gods, but that's exactly what you get from Clint Audio. The Danish brand has experience in DAB and internet radio technology, and is now invading the UK with its Asgard series - a three-strong range of wireless speakers. In keeping with Norse mythology, Odin is the big daddy of the family. But does it have what it takes to earn a place in the hallowed halls of Valhalla?

Impressive specs list

Standing at nearly 40cm tall, it's bigger than it looks. It will certainly take up a lot of desk space, which is why Clint Audio recommends that it should live on the floor instead. There's an easily assembled stand, which lifts the Odin off the floor by 5cm and tilts it upwards by eight degrees, but this is sold separately for £46.

We have mixed feelings about the aesthetics. There's something smart and neat about the rounded triangular design,

If you have multiple Asgard wi-fi speakers, you can set up a multi-room system, or just set up a pair for a stereo set-up. If you don't have a wi-fi network you can use wi-fi direct, which lets you send music directly to the Odin. If that's not enough, you can go down the cable route: USB (for iOS devices) and 3.5mm inputs.

Mixed connectivity

As is now common with wireless speakers, there is no remote control. There are a few buttons on top, but mostly you will control the device with the free Clint Asgard app for Android and iOS, which is cleanly designed and easy to navigate. Besides some basic track and volume controls, you get to choose input, choose speakers, and activate/deactivate the multi-room feature. You'll also find options for settings (simple tone adjustments) and firmware updates.

Connectivity to the app is a mixed bag. Even when the speaker was connected to

but our white version looks like a portable air conditioning unit. Thankfully you can also get it in dark grey, which is a lot cooler.

Look at the spec-list and it's more impressive. The Odin is a stereo speaker with 2x25W of Class D amplification and a bass reflex enclosure. It has a smörgåsbord of wireless skills: over a wi-fi network, it can handle AirPlay, Spotify Connect, DLNA streaming, and internet radio. Sadly there is no Bluetooth, which is a shame.



our smartphones, it often wouldn't show up on the app without a fight. The Odin was also fussy when we tried playing from networked storage devices.

We could connect and even browse through our albums but sometimes songs would not play, suggesting that either the Odin or the app isn't fully sorted. That said, we didn't have any issues when playing tunes by wi-fi direct, Spotify Connect, or Apple Airplay.

An impressively loud sound

Once connected, the Odin puts out a thunderous bellow - as you'd expect from something named after Thor's dad. It has no problems filling larger rooms and the spread of the sound is wide, no doubt helped by the triangular, sideways-firing design. The speaker is meant to work off your walls, with the recommended placement being in a corner. For the best spread use the dedicated stand, which lifts the presentation up significantly.

Bass goes impressively deep, there's a good amount and it's fairly well defined. It's a weighty sound that nobody could accuse of being insubstantial.

Elsewhere there are a few issues. The Odin is tonally uneven. The upper bass part of the frequency range needs more energy, and the treble could do with more precision. In the midrange, voices have a hollow, boxy quality.





Spotify

A huge catalogue of tracks, ease of use and versatile listening options make this our favourite free music streaming service On the subject of dynamics, the Odin does not punch as hard or as firmly as similarly priced rivals. The notably smaller Geneva Model S Wireless DAB+ and the Libratone Zipp both offer a lot more in the way of detail and subtlety.

For the money, we'd expect a more seamless wireless experience, if not a better sound. And that stand really ought to be included in the price. Sorry Odin, you won't be packing your bags for Valhalla just yet.

Revox Joy \$120 | Music streamer | £1940

Past master plays a new game

Revox is a brand that's steeped in history. Born in 1952 as the domestic arm to professional audio brand Studer, it made its name in tape recorders, producing some of the most highly regarded reel-to-reel and compact cassette recorders in the business throughout the '60s and '70s, before expanding into loudspeakers.

In 1990, with the retirement of founder Willi Studer, the company was sold to investors, and while it continued to produce products the brand went quiet in the UK and we've heard little from them since.

Resurgence of a brand

That was until ISE (Integrated Systems Europe) 2015. Among the halls of the Amsterdam RAI at that show, we found Revox, fresh from a period of focusing on multi-room in foreign markets and showing off a new stereo range named Joy.

Made up of an audio server, CD player, three network receivers and a convenient all-in-one, it's launching alongside a five-strong loudspeaker range in a bid to reignite the love for the brand in the UK.

We have here the top-end network player of that range, the Revox Joy S120. It's an amplifier and a streamer, wrapped up in a smart aluminium half-rack design.

It's a very modern design - sleek and minimalist. So minimalist, in fact, that there's not even a display on its front panel, just an LED that changes between dark blue and white to show when it's off or on.

App or optional remote

While we'd have liked a display or, at the least, a few more LEDs to show what input is selected, the idea is that you use the free iOS or Android app or the optional S208 remote control (£300) to get your system set up, make selections and see what's playing.

The remote is rather like the one Cyrus offers for its streamers, and is nicely

designed and easy to use, with a full-colour display at the top that makes easy work of navigating through menus. It also doubles up as a universal remote for any other kit you want it to control, and has the nice touch of a motion sensor on board (so it will jump to life as soon as it's picked up).

Whether it's worth the £300 outlay is another question - the app does well enough for basic controls, though we do find it rather unintuitive and occasionally unreliable. It crashes or freezes several times during testing, and also doesn't manage to pull album art through from our server - the remote does.

Considering this box's compact size, Revox has managed to fit rather a lot into it. First, there's an impressive 120W per channel, which is augmented by a good complement of connections.

Alongside a pair of speaker terminals there are two coaxial and two optical ins, a USB-A port, two analogue inputs, one each of analogue and digital outs and a subwoofer output should you want it.

Network capability

There's also an ethernet port for hardwiring the S120 to your network, a connection for the Joy CD player to enable universal control, and the option to add an FM and DAB+ tuner module. AptX Bluetooth is on board for streaming from mobile devices.

We're seeing more and more high-end kit choosing Class D amplification over more traditional methods, and that's what Revox has gone for in the S120. While some may well prefer the idea of Naim's Unitiqute 2 and its AB amplification, opting for Class D here will allow the S120 to run more efficiently, offering plenty of power from



Hooked up to our reference system, the S120's set-up is quick and easy. It swiftly finds our wireless network and connects to it without issue. To put it through its paces, we point the S120's attentions to our Naim music server and begin playing.

We test it with music ranging from Spotify streams right up to 24-bit/192kHz, and find a similar character across all, aside from the expected drop in quality in Bluetooth streams.

It's worth noting that we encounter some stop-start playback issues with the 24-bit/192kHz tracks and were unable to ascertain why. We had no problems with any other bitrates, so can only assume there's a handover problem somewhere between the two.

It does have pace on its side though, with real drive behind the more up-tempo parts of the song. Unfortunately, this doesn't necessarily translate into good timing across the board. In fact, it can come across as a little impatient in the more brooding, ponderous parts of the song when we want it to be a little gentler, and it can't portray those shifts in tempo as well as it should.

Give it the right music though, and this can work in its favour. Its forward character





does give it plenty of punch for something like Faithless's *Insomnia*, making for a powerful, energetic performance.

Dynamically indifferent

Nevertheless, while the pace of the S120's delivery certainly carries the tune forward with plenty of urgency, it once again struggles to convey the song's changes in momentum. Its inability to develop a sense of excitement as the song builds and drops is not what we'd expect from kit at this level.

Detail levels are pretty decent across the board, but it's the finer subtleties that are missed most here. It means instruments and voices don't have much of a sense of depth or texture to them, making them sound a little one-dimensional.

This lack of subtlety, mixed with its impatient character, can lead to some organisational issues too, meaning it can struggle to give clear definition of the stopping and starting between a complicated grouping of notes.

To try to address some of these issues we substitute our rather neutral ATC reference speakers for something a little warmer and more laid back, namely the Q Acoustic Concept 40s.

This definitely helps add more weight to the low end and decreases the Revox's overly forward nature, but the overall character is still a little on the thin and inexpressive side. It lacks the kind of full-bodied openness you'd expect to hear from an AB amplifier.

That said, even using the pre-outs to bypass the amplifier section and purely employing the streaming module of the S120 shows up similar qualities, so it appears that this is a character flaw that affects both sides of the device.

Overall, the Joy S120 lacks the subtlety to provide us with the expression, excitement and eloquence we expect at this price. No matter what genre we throw at it - different paces, tones, voices - it struggles to drive home their relative differences in dynamics, like a performer unable to change his or her act to suit their audience.

Liking it loud

There's stacks of power here, and matched with the right speakers you can find a balance that will make it sonically impressive with big, loud music. It's not, however, one that will hold your attention with subtler passages over extended listening periods.

Some of the biggest problems for the Joy S120 are the excellent products that fall a little way below its price, such as the UnitiQute 2 (which even comes pretty close in spec). We'd take its open, more expressive character at the expense of a bit of power and a couple of inputs any day - and it's £700 cheaper to boot.

Revox's return hasn't proved to be quite as iconic as its history might suggest, and at its current price, this unit is a tough one to recommend.

Loudspeaker design

The secrets inside the box

Interview **Peter Comeau** Director of audio design, International Audio Group



This month. we've gone a little mad with loudspeakers. There are two pairs in our

First Tests section, and about 20 of them in our speaker packages test on page 60. So what better time to investigate the science - and indeed, the art - of building a speaker?

To get the insider word we spoke to Peter Comeau, director of acoustic design at International Audio Group, and responsible for brands such as Quad, Mission and Wharfedale.





WHF: How do you decide on what kind of speaker to build and, when it comes to production, where do you begin?

PC: "First of all, you must work out a concept. This concept has to be based on the reality of what people actually want to buy. Not all great designs make it into people's homes.

"Over the past five decades I've seen speakers diminish from popular models sporting 12-inch bass units, down to today's hi-fi bookshelf systems with four-inch drivers. Ignore market trends at your peril!

"On the other hand, you also have to consider the physics of the speakers. What sound quality is required and which drivers and cabinet system will best provide it? How does this fit in with the visual concept of the design? In the end, it has to be a compromise between what the market wants and what is physically possible for the price."

As soon as the first prototype is complete, it's time to start listening. It is important, early on, to know what the product might sound like. A discerning ear is key to a loudspeaker's fate, although having the latest tech also helps.

"Nowadays it is relatively easy to create a starting-point crossover using computer software and, even at this stage, you should be able to hear

whether the drive units are behaving as you would like.

"My main target is to achieve a system that portrays the music in an enjoyable and convincing way. That's not as easy as it sounds! You have to make sure all the instruments and vocalists can be easily heard and that the dynamics of how they are performing are translated as accurately as possible. Timing and rhythm also have to be transmitted to the listener with precision.

"You should be able to close your eyes and feel that you're at a concert listening to a real, live and thoroughly enjoyable performance. It's tough to get that right for rock, jazz and classical all at once, but it has to be done!"

A working prototype

"After developing a concept, you move on to building a prototype. This does not need to look aesthetically pleasing. It can be a rough and unfinished wooden box, complete with staples and splinters. This is the stage where the most research will take place, along with the most changes.

"It only has to be good enough for you to judge whether the drivers and the system achieve the performance required. Expect to make a lot of changes before you can decide how you're going to put the production model together.

"For example, in the Wharfedale Diamond 200 Series I did a lot of

research into the slot-loaded port because I really wanted to achieve a powerful bass performance that made it sound as though you were listening to a much bigger system.

"After developing a working prototype, it's time to build a pre-production unit. There is still plenty left to tweak, but the design has the cabinet in its final form, along with the approved drivers that will make it into the final product.

"At this point, you'll expect to make design changes that 'fine-tune' the performance. When you're satisfied with the pre-production unit and all the

engineering wrinkles have been ironed out, you can hand over the drawings to mass production.

"Of course, a speaker company rarely puts out just one speaker design. People want different sizes of speakers. A decision must be made on which variants of the speaker are made."

Range requirements

"I'm handling brands that sell worldwide so, at the very least, you need two standmount models - one small, one larger - plus a smaller and

larger floorstander, as well as a centre-channel unit. If you know you'll be selling lots of AV systems, a dedicated surround speaker is also a bonus to the range."

"The practical application of the speaker also matters. Will it be used in a stereo configuration, or in a surround set-up? This should be factored into the design.

"The genetic makeup of a loudspeaker is a complicated decision, based on price and performance. Nobody wants a poor product no matter how wallet-friendly it is, but there is no point in a fine product

nobody can afford. So the choice of materials and components is crucial.

"A lot of the choices made are down to price. For example, can you afford to use a woven carbon-fibre cone in a budget speaker? Or would you achieve better performance using a cheaper (but still good-sounding) paper cone and put more money into the magnet size?

"You need a Bill Of Materials as early as possible so you can see whether you're on track to meet the price target. It's helpful to know what materials make the most difference sonically, so that you can adjust compromises without having a dramatic effect on sound quality.

"A lot of that is down to experience. Unless you're designing a nocompromise loudspeaker, the black art of speaker design is knowing how to juggle with components to get the best performance you can at the price."

So there you have it. Speakers are not the most complex products, but plenty of thought and effort goes into their design. Sure, you can just bung some drivers in a box, but without someone like Peter Comeau, they won't really sing.


CAN BUY A perfect hi-fi system will bring the best out of your music collection – whether it's on vinyl, laptop, CD or streaming

f you have a budget hi-fi system, chances are you can improve it significantly. Or, if you're new to the world of hi-fi and want to start off with a bang, this is your stepping stone.

Building that perfect system, however, can be tricky. It's not about picking five-star products, shoving them together and hoping they work. It's about experimenting with combinations and keeping an ear out for that perfect balance - at one point, it'll sound just right.

It depends on the way you listen to music. A record player is no use for someone whose entire music library is stored on NAS drives and a laptop. Similarly, you may only have space for a desktop system - no floorstanders for you, then.

But we don't cater for just one audience: everyone should have a fair chance at owning the best sounding system. With that in mind, we've assembled four exciting systems based around four different sources: streamer, laptop, CD player and turntable. We think you'll find your dream team here.







STREAMING SYSTEM £1850

STREAMER

Cambridge CXN £700 Arcam FMJ A19 £650

B&W 685 S2 £500

What do you do when you have music stored in bits and pieces all over the place? Say you've ripped your entire CD collection and have stored it on a NAS device or your laptop. Or you've ventured into the realm of downloading high-resolution files for that leap into higher-quality sound. And then, of course, there are all the songs and playlists you have on your smartphone - it's a mishmash of file types, and you simply can't stick to just one format. What you need is a streamer to bring them all together.

Cambridge Audio's new CXN streamer is the perfect foundation for your hi-fi system if you have music stored over various devices. Its extensive streaming features mean it can play just about any music file from anywhere (by wired or wireless means), and it's a joy to use, too.

Conversion experience

We originally started off the system with the five-star Pioneer N-50A (£500). But once we heard the new Cambridge CXN, we switched instantly. It's a richer, more detailed and entertaining performer easily worth the additional £200.

Add to that a tried-and-tested combination of the Award-winning Arcam FMJ A19 stereo amplifier and B&W 685 S2 speakers, and you have an exceptional system that fits together like pieces in a puzzle.

The Arcam A19 amplifier's impressive detail and refined tonal balance lend a lot to the system's overall smooth sound. Played through the punchy B&W 685 speakers, you get a sound that's full-bodied, packed with bold rhythms and full of vibrancy. The speakers aren't afraid to go loud, either: they can easily fill a medium-to-large room with big, spacious and dynamic sound.

Inclusive approach

The smooth approach bodes well for a varied music collection, as the system isn't fussy whether you're playing an MP3, a 24-bit/96kHz FLAC or if you're streaming songs from Spotify. While you'll be able to spot a poorly recorded album when you hear one, this CXN/ A19/685 combination feels no need to snub its nose at the quality. It's far more interested in delivering the smoothest, most enjoyable performance possible.

That rumbling bassline in The White Stripes' Seven Nation Army sounds deep, punchy and agile enough that you'll be

humming it the second you hear it. The tempo changes are deftly handled, and the screech of distorted guitar riffs full of grunt and aggression. There are no hard or sharp edges at any point, nor does the snappy rhythm ever miss a step.

The crunch and crackle in Massive Attack's Teardrop is crisply delivered. There's also plenty of breathing space in between the harpsichord, drums and delicate, breathy vocals - it's an immersive listen. What strikes us most is just how solid the system sounds. The Arcam's refined subtlety permeates through the song, while the B&Ws lay on the muscle and excitement.

Go up the price scale and you'll find that components at £1000 each will offer greater precision and insight, but this combination of products is very hard to fault at this price.

You wouldn't think it at first glance, but the Cambridge and Arcam actually match visually. They share similar

dimensions and uncluttered fascias. The Arcam is available only in black, but the CXN comes in silver or black. You can get the B&W 685 S2s in black or white, too. The speakers are well made, a protective grille covering the delicate metal tweeter, and the striking yellow Kevlar mid/bass driver adds a splash of colour.

No-nonsense approach

The A19 isn't quite as flash as the sleek, modern design of the CXN, but we can't argue with its sturdy build quality. The display just spells out the input name and volume in large letters - it's appealingly simple and easy to read from a distance. In contrast, the CXN's more informative display shows off the track, artist. sampling rate and album artwork in full colour.

We love using the CXN streamer. It has a lovely control dial that responds smoothly with the menu, while the included remote and free Connect app are just as intuitive. The app can be used on Android and Apple devices, and is handy for scrolling through radio stations and your music collection. It's a breeze to use. Arcam's remote is a bit more basic, but works just as well when adjusting the volume.

Connection priorities

For setting up, the first thing you'll need is a good network connection. We always prefer the stability a wired connection gives you, so we'd recommend hooking up the CXN to your home network using the ethernet port. You can still go the wireless route: Cambridge includes a wireless antenna in the box that you can plug into the back panel. A network is quick to set up and our CXN had no problem picking up our two NAS boxes and accessing internet radio.

Once you have your devices - laptop, smartphone, tablet - connected on to the same network, all you have to do is press play. Streaming is seamless and uninterrupted, and we experience no dropouts with the CXN.

Those with Apple devices can stream over AirPlay, but it's not the best sound quality you'll get out of this system. Plug your smartphone into the USB port if you want to play stored songs (it will charge your phone as well), or use Spotify Connect to stream your playlists.

You don't have to go wireless all the way. There's a USB type B input for plugging in your laptop, while optical

The Cambridge CXN works just fine with the control dial and remote, but clicking repeatedly to scroll down a list of songs can get tiring. Download the Connect App on to an iPad Air 2 (it works on Androids as well) for a slicker experience. You can flick between inputs, access Spotify with a tap, and fine-tune station searches. The Air 2's slick interface is ideal, and the crisp, bright screen makes





and coaxial inputs are also available. All the digital inputs are capable of playing high-resolution files of up to 24-bit/192kHz, while the USB port at the back panel supports DSD64 files.

Once you're set up with your streamer, plug it into any of the Arcam's six line-level inputs. We used the tuner input to keep things simple (the input's name will show up on the amp's display), but there are enough inputs if you want to plug in your Blu-ray player, CD player, set-top box and more. The A19 also houses a good-sounding moving-magnet phono stage, should you want to dust off that old turntable and give it a spin.

And now for the finishing touch: the speakers. While the B&Ws can be propped up on top of a shelf, we would advise against it. They need a bit of space

to breathe, and you don't want to restrain the immense sense of scale and space they can produce. Invest in a good pair of stands (the Custom Design Signature FS104s are long-standing favourites at £200) and secure the speakers with little blobs of Blu-tack. You can biwire the 685 S2s, but it's not necessary: single-wiring works just fine.

Verdict

If you want the most convenient system for playing your sprawling music collection, this is it. Not only is it packed with features and seamless to use, the sonic performance is among the best you'll find at this sub-£2000 price. We can't think of a better combination in this price range, and we don't think you'll want to stop listening.

HEADPHONES

Apple MacBook Air 13in £1000 Audiolab M-DAC £600 Grado SR325E £270

Can you create a great-sounding hi-fi system out of a laptop? Of course you can - you just need the right elements. In this case, you'll need an Award-winning £600 DAC that is talented enough to make your laptop-stored music shine, and a pair of open-back Grado headphones to enjoy a winningly airy, engaging and punchy sound.

They've got the look

As far as systems go, this is a sleek and compact set-up. The 13in MacBook Air is Apple's thinnest, sexiest laptop yet, and we've long been fans of the Audiolab M-DAC's smart looks and compact, stylish design. The Grado SR325es also add a touch of ruggedness, but then some of us rather enjoy looking like a 1950s radio controller.

The MacBook Air is a gorgeous machine. It looks sophisticated perched on a desk, and the M-DAC looks natural sitting right next to it. The silver aluminium chassis matches the silver finish of the laptop, but you can also get the M-DAC in black. The M-DAC is kitted out with USB type B and twin optical and coaxial inputs, while the MacBook Air takes a more minimal approach, offering two USB ports and a 3.5mm headphone socket.

Both products are impeccably built. The M-DAC's 2.7in OLED display is crisp and easy to read. The MacBook Air doesn't have a Retina display, but the screen is nevertheless sharp, crystal clear and bursting with rich colours. We like using MacBooks in particular for their smooth operation and slick interface - crucial if you'll be using this system every day.

Remote option

The M-DAC comes with a wand-like responsive remote, but we find it much easier just to reach over and twiddle the control dial (which has a lovely smooth response) or push the buttons to control this desktop DAC.

It's a good thing this is your home system, as these Grado headphones are as leaky as a faulty colander. This would be a problem if you were out and about, but in the privacy of your home you can listen to '80s hair metal and bubblegum pop without annoying others. Or embarrassing yourself.

Don't be put off by the Grados' steely, no-nonsense design, either. No, they're not as stylish as rival headphones at this price, but they are built to last. These cans will survive more than a few knocks and scrapes, the ear cups rotate 360 degrees without creaking, and the thick cable is sturdy and effectively designed to remain tangle-free.

They do feel heavy at first, but the headband and foam ear cups are surprisingly light on the head. Crucially, they don't grip too tight, but neither will they fall off easily, and the airy foam cushions ensure your ears don't get hot over long periods of listening.

Easy set-up

The Grados have a 6.3mm plug that neatly slots into the M-DAC's headphone port. Connecting the MacBook Air to the M-DAC is almost as easy. You can connect via USB or optical, although bear in mind that those inputs limit file support to 24-bit/96kHz. Those wanting to play full-fat 24-bit/192kHz files will have to use the coaxial input.

SWAP WITH THIS:

Sennheiser Momentum 2.0 **** £270

These have been long-standing favourites in our office for their elegant design and soft, plush cushioning. The updated 2.0 version is even more comfortable, with larger, plusher ear cups. That shiny copper trim is a nice new touch, too. Where the original Momentums favoured an easy-going, gentle approach, the updated cans have kicked it up a notch with more drive. Just make sure you get a 3.5mm to 6.3mm adapter for the M-DAC.



Apple's closed ecosystem insists on using iTunes to play all tracks, but it doesn't support certain formats, such as FLAC or DSD files. There's a way out of this: you can download alternative music players that can cope with a wider range of file types. They often sound better than iTunes, too.

The Air's 256GB onboard storage isn't massive, but will hold a few dozen high-res albums. If your music collection keeps expanding, a neat solution is to get a NAS box that rips CDs. That way, not only do you gain vast amounts of space to store your music, you can also stream those songs straight to your laptop - provided both devices are connected to the same network.

External drive

There's no ethernet port, but there is a USB adapter as well as wi-fi and Bluetooth. Streaming services such as Tidal and Spotify work smoothly once we're connected to the internet. More pressing, however, is the absence of a CD drive: how are you going to rip all your CDs? Well, you can get a separate USB SuperDrive (£65 from the Apple Store), or invest in that NAS box.

Start listening and you'll immediately hear why the Audiolab has been our favourite DAC for years now, and why we love clapping those industrial-looking Grados over our ears. It's a remarkably clear and airy sound, packed with sky-high detail, precise edges and effortlessly agile rhythms.

We did test this set-up with a variety of headphones, after which the rich, smooth and wonderfully plush Sennheiser Momentum 2.0s nearly took the SR325es' spot in this system. But there's no turning back once you hear those Grados. Leaky as they are, they're instrumental in delivering the wonderfully open sound of this system.

Height, depth and breadth

The sense of scale and depth in Inception's Time is impressive, and there's no limit to how deep and how high the instruments can go. Dynamically, the music soars freely and reaches peaks without ever sounding restrained. You won't get that kind of clarity and openness with a closed-back headphone design.

This trio has a great grip on rhythm, too. The blues-tinged guitars on Songhoy Blues' Soubour sound taut and



funky, and the system breezes through the upbeat tempo with a light but speedy and controlled touch. It's a lively, expressive performance. There's a muscular depth to those jangling strings, but it never bogs down the tune. Basslines have texture and rumble deep, while the top end sparkles. It's an attacking, punchy sound that maintains its urgent delivery without ever veering into sharp or brash territory.

The system further proves its worth when we listen to a lossless FLAC file of Marilyn Manson's Killing Strangers via recently relaunched streaming service Tidal. It certainly doesn't shy away from delivering the crunch and rasp inherent in the track, while every vocal nuance and drawl is laid bare. Despite that edge, there's a smoothness to the sound that

doesn't take away any of the subtlety or attack from songs - a forgiving approach that works well with streaming services such Tidal and Spotify.

Compact and affordable

Not everyone has the space for a dedicated separates system or is freely able to blast music out loud. Laptops, downloaded music files and streaming services are becoming increasingly popular ways of listening to music, and this system proves you don't have to break the bank or sacrifice much space or effort to create a system that you can use at your desk and that won't compromise on sound quality.

Musical, insightful and full of attack - this is one classy, talented system that you can be proud of.

Reports of the demise of the CD have been greatly exaggerated. It's true that, sandwiched between the ever-growing popularity of streaming services and the vinyl revival, CDs feel like the ignored middle child. But don't dismiss those shiny discs so easily - CD isn't dead. There's still life left in them yet.

What is certain is that there simply isn't an abundance of great-sounding mid-market CD players out there. We had a hard time building the best CD system at this price.

Superbly entertaining

If you're on a stricter budget, the Marantz CD6005 is your best bet at £300. However, for the next step up in performance, you're looking at something like the Audiolab 8200CD at £800 and higher. And at £1080, the Naim CD5si is yet another step up.

It's only natural that we'd want to partner the Naim CD player with its matching amplifier, the Naim Nait 5si. The £990 amp is a former Award-winner. and sonically it's near-impossible to tell where the CD player ends and the amplifier starts.

But when it comes to speakers, we know exactly what will match. The memory of the superbly entertaining Triangle Esprit Titus EZ speakers is still fresh in our minds, and not just because of that gorgeous finish and distinctive shiny tweeter design. Their winning sense of agility, precision and musicality still excites us, and works brilliantly with the punchy, insightful character of the Naim components.

Driven nature

It's an exciting performance. There's power and muscle behind the sound, but the overall impression is of unbridled drive and enthusiasm. The Triangles zip along with glee no matter what song you throw at them, with an accurate ear for rhythm that will keep your toes tapping and your head bopping.

The Naims are similarly driven in nature, favouring pure enjoyment over transparency. There's a stunning level of detail retrieval: the growling edges of Corey Taylor's voice on From Can To Can't are fleshed out, sounding intimate and expressive as the song increases in intensity. Drums hit with impact, guitar strums are layered and sound almost tactile - there's a satisfying sense of weight that underpins the sound.

What we're most impressed by is just how cohesive the system sounds together. The individual strands of The Dead Weather's 60 Feet Tall are easy to pick out in the larger soundstage, but it takes real skill and precision to sustain the sense of tension and brooding atmosphere present in the song.

A great sonic combination

Crashing cymbals and blaring trumpets have plenty of breathing space to hit their high notes, but the Naims have a slightly rolled-off treble that prevents the sound from getting too shouty or bright. It works beautifully with the Triangles, whose spiky treble is kept in check. This does lend an attacking tone to songs, though, which makes it all the more exciting to listen to.

Dynamic upheavals are handled with authority and subtlety. The system's accurate grasp on rhythms takes any abrupt changes in pace in stride:

Sia's Chandelier spins and turns gracefully, and the system never misses a beat as the song slows down and ramps up throughout.

Solid chunks of aluminium

The Naim CD player and amplifier are identical black boxes machined out of aluminium. Not just any aluminium either - very heavy aluminium. There's something about a sturdy, hefty piece of hi-fi that exudes a premium quality feel, and the Naims' construction and finish won't leave you feeling short-changed.

After a while, the discreet finishes make them almost invisible in your room. Only the subtle glow of green LEDs - the simple display, the ring of light around the input buttons, and the volume level indicator - make their presence felt.

The Naims may look plain, but the Triangle Esprit Titus EZ speakers demand attention. They're quite compact speakers, but they make a big impact. The smooth finish - in either walnut, black or white - is impeccable and feels of a much higher quality than a £600 price tag would otherwise suggest. The pointy, horn-loaded titanium tweeter adds some muchneeded glitz and style to this system.

UPDATE WITH THIS:

Tannoy Revolution XT8F£1300 ****

If you have a bigger room, you'll naturally want a bigger speaker. While the Triangles have a surprisingly large reach that you might not expect from their petite size, they're no substitute for a pair of floorstanders.

The new Tannoy XT8Fs are astounding. They handle big-scale dynamics with grace and agility, while subtle detail is delivered effortlessly. The depth of bass they dig up is thunderous, but never flabby.



Full bodied

We've long admired the CD5si's manual swing-drawer mechanism. It makes loading CD discs that bit more involving. The drawer opens and shuts smoothly and silently, and the CD player reads the disc the second the drawer is closed.

Don't forget to unscrew the transit bolt holding the drawer in place (it's underneath the unit), otherwise it won't open. You also don't want to lose the magnetic puck that goes on top of the discs to hold them in place. The CD simply won't read the disc if it isn't there.

The only connections on the Naim CD5si are a pair of RCA outputs and a DIN connector, which connect straight into either the DIN or any of the three line level inputs available at the back of the Nait 5si amplifier. A DIN cable is helpfully included in the box.

It'd be nice if there were some digital outputs alongside the analogue ones, as it takes the upgrade potential out of the equation. There's no power supply input either - an unusual choice for Naim. However, there is a 6.3mm headphone port on the amplifier's front panel.



Make sure you run in the entire system for a good few days to get them sounding their best. The Naim products open up, sound cleaner and more full bodied after about a weekend's worth of running in, while the initially somewhat spiky treble on the Triangle speakers calms down eventually. We would recommend toeing in the speakers slightly towards your listening position, too.

Simple and satisfying

It's a simple, fuss-free set up, with very few features to make a song and dance about. Playback functions and repeat options are present on the CD5si, all of which are mirrored on the remote. You'll get the same well-made remote with both Naim components, so pairing them has the advantage of being able to use just one control for both.

The amplifier responds to volume changes instantly. Press the buttons to switch inputs or skip to a particular track, and the action happens instantly. There's no lag or hesitation and, best of all, the overall operation is so straightforward and swift that it becomes second nature to use.

As far as systems go, this is one of the most enjoyable performances we've heard at this price. The Naim/Triangle system is full of energy, and it couldn't be simpler to use. The premium quality components are worth every penny, but it's their infectious enthusiasm and superb rhythmic precision that you'll love listening to for hours on end.

There's something about the act of playing a record that still feels like hi-fi nirvana. The tiny, explosive pops and rustling crackles, the delicate operation of placing the needle on to the groove, the way the black vinyl record catches the light when spinning - they bring about the rose-tinted nostalgia in all of us, whether you've owned a turntable system before or not.

The Rega RP6/Exact has been one of our favourite and most coveted turntables for years, and the superb Elex-R works so seamlessly with it we wouldn't dream of separating them. This Rega combination is so good, we kept auditioning speakers with them until we hit the right pair. It's not that the speakers weren't any good (they're all five stars), but it's just finding that one pair that sounds just right.

Ridiculously good

For instance, the B&W 685 S2s sounded rich but bottom-heavy with the Regas; Dali Zensor 3s were lively, but we wanted greater subtlety; the agile and attacking Triangle EZs nearly got the job until we realised their excitable treble wouldn't always play nicely with the Rega's slightly lean character.

And then we heard the Tannoy Revolution XT6Fs, and we had our system. These floorstanders - apart from having the obvious advantages in delivering a large scale of sound and being able to hit bass notes while maintaining an articulate, enthusiastic performance - are ridiculously good speakers for their price.

Nimble and versatile

We start off by spinning Nirvana's Nevermind and as the first strains of Smells Like Teen Spirit kick in, we know we've got a brilliant system on our hands. The classic early-1990s grunge anthem bursts forward with punchy detail, angry strumming and drums that hit with so much impact that it's actually felt more than heard.

The Regas are terrifically musical and agile, and they zip through the charging rhythm with sheer enthusiasm. They handle all the rhythm changes with accuracy too. The stop and start of notes are incredibly precise, and the abrupt changes in tempo and dynamics are delivered effortlessly thanks to the nimble and versatile Tannoy speakers.

Kurt Cobain's voice is all gravel and hoarseness, and the Rega/Tannoy system doesn't flinch from delivering the full aggression of the vocals as the song reaches its crescendo. It's an attentiongrabbing system from the get-go.

The Regas are guilty of a slightly lean character, but there's no brightness in sight. The system also doesn't lack the grunt and depth in the low frequencies - basslines are ferociously taut and punchy. Couple the Regas' authoritative tone with the Tannoy's immense sense of scale and you have the kind of solid, articulate and spacious sound that's unrivalled at this price.

Raw and intimate

Switch to the more soulful, melodic tones of Dusty Springfield's Spooky and you'll be swept away by how raw and intimate her voice sounds. Despite the occasional crackles and pops littered throughout the recording, the sound is incredibly clear and forthright. Once again, it's that effortlessly fluid character that captivates us - you'll forget just how hard the Tannoys and Regas are working when the music sounds so good.

UPDATE WITH THIS:

Rega Fono MM MkII £200

If you're looking to upgrade this system, you don't need to change your speakers or even buy the next turntable up in Rega's range (the excellent RP8, at £2200). No, all you need is this Award-winning phono stage that will barely make a dent in your hi-fi budget.

The Elex-R's onboard phono stage is great, but the Fono MM MkII sounds even better in every single way. Place the Fono between your turntable and amplifier, and you'll hear a marked increase in detail, dynamics and scale. It adds a touch more punch and muscle, while the wide and tall soundstage becomes even more expansive. It's a small but hugely effective upgrade.

This is one good-looking system, and not just because it has a turntable in it. although we can't deny the glossy finish of the RP6 looks utterly desirable. Officially, it comes in the standard red, black and white, but other colours are also available, including our review sample's eye-catching bright green. The finish is excellent, and everything from the RP6's platter to the tonearm is built to the highest standard.

Rega continues its good form with the Elex-R. Build quality is impossible to fault, with a sturdy and hefty metal chassis that some may call functional - but we'd rather call it understated and neat. The red indicator lights contrast nicely against the hulking mass of black, while the buttons click satisfyingly when pressed.

Swift and smooth

The remote that comes as standard doesn't quite have the same authoritative design, but the controls are simple and work intuitively with the amp. Response is swift and smooth.

Completing the picture (and sound) is a pair of classy looking Tannoy floorstanders. They're tall, but the trapezoid shape, while crucial in eliminating internal standing waves, also keeps them slim enough that they don't dominate the room. Tannoy's Dual Concentric driver looks striking as always, and finish is pretty much perfect. We like the little design flourishes such as all the exposed bolts having 'TANNOY' etched on them - all these touches add up and show just how much care and attention has gone into constructing these speakers. The XT6Fs are available in either dark walnut or medium oak finishes.

Don't be scared to release the nerd

This is one system where you'll really want to take time and care when setting up. Don't be afraid to get nerdy here, either. The RP6 has no suspension, apart from three rubber feet that aren't adjustable, so make sure the support is level (nerdy tip: use a spirit level for this), has low resonance and is solid.

The key is to keep the turntable as still, flat and vibration-free as possible. We know from experience that most of us don't have a lot of flexibility in their living spaces, but if you can, position the turntable far away from the speakers to avoid





vibrations. To go one step further, install a wall stand for even greater isolation.

If you've never set up a turntable before, head to YouTube for tutorials. You'll need to know the tracking weight for the RP6's Exact cartridge (it's 1.75g), adjust the counterbalance so that the tonearm just floats on its own, and don't forget to lock the tonearm in place when you're not using it.

Needle positioning

The RP6 comes with its own power supply, too. Once connected and assembled, plug the RP6 into the Elex-R's rather excellent sounding phono stage (always input 1 on Rega amps). There are four other line level inputs for plugging in extra sources. You get the option to biwire or single-wire the

Tannoy speakers. Once you're set up, you'll start obsessing about being able to position the needle precisely at the start of a track. See? This is the fun part of using a turntable.

Gorgeous system

For those with a vast vinyl collection hidden away in the attic, now's the time to get them down. Spinning your old 33s and 45s on this system will have you listening to records like you've never heard them before.

Vinyl sales have been at their highest in almost 20 years, and we couldn't be happier. The revived interest in vinyl can only be a good thing, and if this Rega/Tannoy combination is your first ever hi-fi system - you couldn't pick a better way to start. It's a gorgeous system.



Finlux 55UT3E242S-T £1000 ****

See a 55in 4K TV for £1000 and you'd be forgiven for jumping at the chance. Most on the market are double the price (see over page). But then, eye-popping prices are Finlux's forte – and often pleasing for the performance their televisions offer.

Sadly the same can't be said here, for the tribulations of 4K, and the knotty specs that go with it, are personified in this Finlux set.

Lacks technology

While the television is indeed the 3840x2160 resolution, 8.3 million pixel-packing affair it promises, it lacks the technology to play most 4K material available today. Although the Netflix app sits at the centre of its smart portal, the Finlux doesn't have the necessary coder-decoder hardware (codec) to stream material in 4K. Nor does it have Google's VP9 decoder, so that's YouTube's 4K content out of the window too.

Although three USB inputs enable media playback and live TV recording (programmes can be momentarily paused when one is attached), none can support video formats over 1920 x 1080. The Finlux does have the HDMI 2.0 spec needed to support 4K, so feeding it content from an external 4K source via HDMI connection should work.

Clearly this isn't your best bet for 4K playback, but for high-def content - by far the biggest slice of the content cake - it's pretty good.

Thanks to the Finlux's decent upscaler, you get a quality HD picture. It has no problem filling the 55in screen with sharp outlines and good detail levels. Plunge into *Fury* on Blu-ray and there's texture to torn-up fields, subtlety in shading and detail in the soldiers' muddied faces. The picture could easily look dull and lifeless, but the bold, rich hues make even the bleakness of war look interesting.

With 'Film Mode' activated in the picture settings, motion is largely well handled as the tanks bump along uneven ground. But in faster motion scenes, a hint of judder is present.

Resolution drop

Try the Finlux with standard definition – *Exodus: Gods and Kings* DVD – and, as much as the upscaler tries, it can't hide the resolution drop. There are traces of picture noise, and you can detect a slight blur around galloping horses.

Clarity levels are reasonable enough for you to tuck into action scenes.
Colours are bright and punchy, the golds and reds of the ornate armoury and chariots bright and vivid, but rather overdone. The Finlux struggles to keep a lid on its exuberant colour palette with standard-def TV channels, though: colours are pretty 'out there', with little sign of nuance, and the picture loses its cleanliness. High-def channels fare better, though neither look as good as on

some of last year's cheaper Full HD-only sets. It supports passive 3D, with eight pairs of glasses supplied. *Hugo 3D* on Blu-ray is bright and clear, although it's not the most stable picture we've seen.

Dig deeper

Finlux's interface has gone in a different direction (literally). Gone is the horizontal gold-on-black menu, and in its place a vertical sidebar which trails down to the left of the screen. It's a far cry from the lavish affair on big brand TVs, but it's an improvement. There's direct access to settings, live TV, media browser and full-page smart portal. The separate installation tab is superfluous when it's often a one-off process.

The moral to the story: if it sounds too good to be true, it probably is. Without broad 4K playback compatibility, it's barely worth buying this telly. If you are bothered about 4K, you'll have to dig deeper into your pockets. And if you aren't, you can still pick up a better Full HD TV for a similar price.

Polaroid P55D600 £700 ****

A few years ago, the name Polaroid would have conjured up images of nostalgia-inducing cameras and pocket-sized prints. Lately, the company has proved itself in the TV market as one of the few go-to brands for budget sets.

Visual punch

Exclusively sold in Asda supermarkets in the UK, Polaroid TVs have been consistently pleasing in offering good-quality pictures for peanuts. Bearing that in mind, it's not surprising that its debut 4K TV will undoubtedly be one of the cheapest of its size we (or you) will see this year. And perhaps even the next.

The P55D600 is the only 55in in the brand's 4K line-up - there is a 65in model too, just toppling into four-figure territory. But ultra-cheap and Ultra HD 4K isn't necessarily a recipe for success (last year's one-star review for the £450 4K Bush set can vouch for that), so is this Polaroid a pleasant surprise?

In terms of 4K, not especially. Much like the Finlux 55UT3E242S-T, there are compromises when it comes to 4K compatibility. Without the necessary codec hardware, it can't stream 4K from Netflix or YouTube - the platforms driving the 4K content movement at the moment. Its HDMI spec meets the new 2.0 iteration, so should be compatible with Ultra HD Blu-ray players when they arrive later this year.

For now though, our test mostly comprises regular content. Regardless of resolutions, £700 is still a cracking price for a TV of this size - especially when its performance-per-pound is so good.

Play 22 Jump Street on Blu-ray and we're happy with the Polaroid's upscaling quality even if the comedy disappoints. Every edge is well etched and the clear, high-contrast picture is full of visual punch (translating well into 3D performance when we try it out).

The film is an attack of colour, giving the Polaroid a chance to flaunt its dynamic (and slightly overblown) display. In the American football scene the grass pitch is lush, and the blues and reds on the jerseys are vivid. There's not much subtlety, the Finlux is capable of an iota more, but you get the gist.

Colour temperature

Running the Polaroid with a THX Optimiser disc is highly recommended, particularly for sorting out the colours. We find them more natural-looking on a cooler colour temperature setting.

Up next is the not-so-epic conclusion to *The Hobbit* trilogy, *The Battle of the Five Armies*, on DVD. It's a movie that deserves Blu-ray treatment, but the Polaroid does its best. Lines are well sculpted - every soldier in the mass army has definition - and there's enough detail to enjoy even the darkest scenes. In the final battle, bodies flung through

the air draw a bit of motion instability that we couldn't eliminate with picture settings. We're disappointed by the SD channels too, which involve soft lines and misjudged shades of colour.

Comfortably loud

In terms of sound quality, it goes comfortably loud and has reasonable body, but we'd invest in a soundbar such as the Philips HTL5140 for a welcome boost in solidity and detail.

You aren't paying for a premium design, and the Polaroid is fairly unadorned. A word of caution about the stand: it requires a tabletop roughly 110cm wide and 35cm deep. Not ideal. Polaroid sticks with last year's chunky remote. It's not the most luxurious affair, but perfectly functional once you've worked out the ambiguous icons.

This Polaroid isn't going to rock your world with 4K streaming and the like. But if you can live without it and simply want a decent-performing big TV at a good price, the Polaroid is worth a punt.

LG55UF950V £2600 ****

LG has had an encouraging start to its 2015 TV campaign. Its mid-range 4K TV (65UF850V) got our hearts racing with its vivid hues, ultra-sharp lines and super-speedy operating system - even if it did just lose out to its Samsung rival. Ever since clapping our eyes on it, we've been dying to get our hands on the company's flagship 4K range.

Solid base

Here we have the 55in UF950V model, and we're instantly drawn to the stand. The range introduces LG's premium 'Auditorium' stand: a curvaceous, angled slab of metal that provides a rock-solid base for the TV. More importantly, it's designed to improve audio performance by reflecting the downward-firing sound towards the listening position.

Last year LG debuted its fresh-faced operating system, WebOS, which received much praise for its slick, user-friendly interface - the 'launcher' menu with its pop-up cards proved a welcome sight among competitor's 'hub' designs. This year's sets have the second iteration, WebOS 2.0, and it's even better. More fine-tuning than a full-blown revamp, what you get is a speedier, more streamlined experience. LG claims boot up time has been reduced by up to 60 per cent, and it runs like clockwork menus load in a flash, and getting around the TV is generally a swift experience.

The most useful connections - three USB and four HDMI (2.0) inputs - are all handily side-facing if your TV needs to be shoved up against a wall, and can accept 4K material. LG tellies are now up-and-running with 4K Amazon Instant Video, so with Netflix Ultra HD on board too there's hundreds of hours of 4K goodness at your fingertips. BBC iPlayer and Demand 5 apps appear for regular (non-4K) catch-up TV too.

The LG Content Store provides a platform to watch movies, download apps (Twitter and Deezer among them) as well as manage items in 'My Page'.

Palpable detail

Despite the advances in 4K content, most people will continue to binge on high-def for a while to come, so we'll begin there. It's a good start for the 55UF95OV, proving an excellent upscaler as we load *The Hunger Games: Mocking Jay Part 1* on Blu-ray. Despite the TV guessing three of every four pixels, there's the sharpness and detail we'd expect from the best Full HD sets.

LG's ColourPrime technology aims to boost colour gamuts and deliver 'more than 20 per cent additional colour.' The set has an eye-popping (and not entirely natural) palette, which revels in lush greens and bold reds but lacks the Samsung's subtlety and shading. 3D playback is equally pleasing, the image filling the screen with detail and clarity.

APPS WILL HAVE YOU IN A SPIN

Last year's pair of traditional and smart remotes have been rolled into one multi-tasking unit. Controlled via an on-screen cursor, and operated by gyroscopic sensors, there are keys too if your arms get tired. The roller button is useful for scrolling pages and browsing channels. The voice recognition feature also works well

Move down in resolution to *Lord of the Rings: The Two Towers* DVD and the quality is a far cry from the blurrier 4K sets of a few years ago. Lines are crisp, and detail in the orcs' faces is palpable.

Saving the best until last, we end by dabbling with 4K streams of *Breaking Bad* on Netflix and *Bosch* on Amazon Instant Video. If you've never seen 3840 x 2160 resolution before, this LG TV is a good advert for it. Colours pop, from the shadings of purple on Walter White's stripy shirt, to the rich colours in his home's upholstery and woodwork.

Class act

LG has put some work into bulking up its TV's sound, not just with the bespoke stand but by partnering with Harmon Kardon. It sounds substantial enough to put you off buying a budget soundbar. All in all, the 55UF950V is a class act, and a decent option for those deciding that now's a good time to invest in 4K. It's merely a little bit of video subtlety away from five-star fame.



Samsung UE55JS8500 £2600 *****

Last year was stellar for Samsung, and the TV giant has picked up where it left off. The first 2015 model we saw (UE65JU700) received five stars and this UE55JS8500, a 55in TV from the range above, is yet another triumph. It marks the first of Samsung's three flagship SUHD ranges, comprising nine models. Like the brand's Galaxy S smartphone range, the acronym's arbitrary 'S' stands for whatever you like.

Fine detail

The SUHD talking point is Samsung's take on nano-crystal technology - a thin layer of tiny crystals in the display panel that emit light in various colours according to their size. Samsung says it offers 64 times more colour expression and 2.5 times more brightness than traditional tellies. And we're duly impressed by what we see. With every object precisely drawn, 4K House of Cards on Netflix is an engrossing watch even if the drama isn't your cup of tea.

Switch to the first episode of Marvel's new *Daredevil* and even in the title sequence the razor-sharp lines and the way the pink graphics leap off the screen blow us away. If we can get that quality from streaming, we can't wait to see what a 4K physical disc will deliver.

For now we'll have to make do with Full HD 1080p Blu-rays, but in light of the Samsung's performance this hardly feels like a compromise. The picture is still remarkably defined: its sharp yet subtle outlines prove more realistic than on the LG and it has no problem filling the 55in screen with fine detail. Spin Oscar-nominated *Whiplash* and you can see every crease in J.K Simmons' screwed-up face.

Deeper hues

Colour reproduction is the Samsung's forte, its palette rich, solid and evertruthful. Whereas the LG's delivery brings a touch of glitz - brass instruments resplendent, the wooden cello a shiny reddish-brown - the Samsung has more natural, deeper hues. Contrast is exemplary too, the blacks especially impressive. The sea of suits in the orchestra is properly deep without sacrificing detail.

Drop down to *Star Trek Into Darkness* on DVD and the TV upholds the standard very well. The picture is notably steady as Spock chases Khan through the city.

The Freeview HD tuner (there's Freesat HD too) doesn't let it down: high-def channels draw no complaints, and although SD channels clearly deliver the worst picture of the test, they're still perfectly watchable. Samsung keeps active 3D onboard, although no glasses are supplied in the box this time round.

Curved screens account for almost a third of Samsung's 4K models this year, not to mention its entire SUHD line-up. The stylish TV looks like it's suspended

CHOICE OF REMOTES

Samsung offers two remotes - a traditional and fairly functional wand, and a stylish, rectangular smart remote. This is lovely to use and there are lots of hidden shortcuts - holding down the 'Extra' key brings up the EPG, for example - so it's worth flicking through the literature first

above the metal stand (curving parallel in front) but rest assured, it's sturdy.

Driving force

Samsung set the benchmark for app services in 2014, and it's a reputation it is likely to preserve. You can get your 4K kicks from YouTube, Netflix and Amazon Instant Video (that's the most on the market at the moment). The driving force behind its smarts is its new open-source platform, Tizen. Like LG's WebOS, it features snazzy pop-up tiles overlaying the screen. Here you can access apps, channels and other content.

Input selection runs along a bar at the top of screen, as do menus for settings, EPG and a new feature called Multi-link, which lets you split the screen in two, so you can watch a programme and check news headlines simultaneously.

Overall the Samsung 4K TV is a dream to use. Both fantastic to watch and enjoyable to listen to, the UE55JS8500 is a beauty to behold. Perhaps the 'S' in SUHD stands for 'success'. Or 'special'.



If 4K television is unchartered territory, our test winners **Polaroid** and **Samsung** will help you steer clear of pitfalls

he question of 4K or not 4K can be a real headache. The technology may now be a realistic proposition for the home, but it's still a tricky business. It's not just about panel resolution. To stream 3840 x 2160 content or play it from other sources, 4K TVs need certain hardware (codecs, HDMI iterations) and to meet specific copyright protection (HDCP 2.2) requirements.

As our first (cheaper) pair demonstrates, not all sets with '4K' in their title are capable of playing the 4K material available at the moment, so we can't stress the importance of checking specs before you buy.

For Finlux and Polaroid, the jury must be out on 4K Blu-ray performance until the discs arrive. We can report they perform decently with Blu-rays and DVDs. Performance-wise, there's not much in it: both upscale well to produce clean, sharp pictures with decent detail and bright colours. The Finlux is more subtle, but that doesn't justify the premium over its rival. So in terms of our performance-per-pound ethos, the plaudits go to Polaroid.

Our second pair are model examples of the finest (future-proofed) TVs available today - as you'd hope for £2600. Yes, it's a high price to pay when tellies of this size start around a

third cheaper, but these are sets from flagship ranges. And frankly, we'd welcome them on our AV stand any time - especially if 4K streaming is high on your priorities.

The Samsung is one of the best TVs we've seen this year. We're big fans of the new Tizen platform, and its performance is hard to fault. It trumps the LG with greater colour expression and detail, and has a richer sound, too, so no need to buy a soundbar.

The LG isn't down and out though. A super-sharp picture; clear, crisp sound and seamless operating system (our favourite) are all good reasons to splash your cash.

DEEZER



DEEZER From free ****

Deezer's roots in the streaming industry go right back to the very beginning. While Spotify is credited with being one of the first services to launch, Deezer was on the scene as much as a year earlier, but with a limited catalogue.

Wide platform support

Now its reach is huge (it's availabile in 182 countries) and its platform availability is similarly extensive - you'll struggle to find a device it's not available on rather than one it is.

The experience on a laptop, via the web or desktop app, is by far the best way to use Deezer. Though the mobile apps are easy enough to navigate once you know the layout of the service, they lack a little inspiration.

Feature-wise, Deezer is a strong competitor for Spotify and works hard at helping you to find new music. One new feature is 'Flow', which is presented to you on the homepage across platforms as the first thing you see. The idea is that Deezer does the hard work for you, picking songs from its catalogue it thinks you'll like based on your listening habits. We found it to be pretty good in its

selections, and it's helpful if you just want to get to some music quickly.

Elsewhere you have the Hear This tab, which picks out new curated content and accurate "if you liked that, then this" suggestions, the New Releases and Top Playlists tabs and lastly Mixes. which are ultimately genre and mood-based radio stations.

While Spotify has quietly ditched third-party apps, Deezer continues to offer them, as well as a handful of its own. Some of the better ones include Deezer Sessions (exclusive videos of live music sessions) and Spotizr, a hugely helpful app that replicates your Spotify playlists in Deezer.

Free option

Like Spotify, Deezer still offers an ad-supported free tier at 128kbps. There's no offline listening, so you'll want to go steady if you have a data allowance.

For £9.99/month, users get access to the ad-free Premium+ with 320kbps playback and offline listening; or, for £14.99, Sonos users only can sign up to Deezer Elite for everything Premium+ offers plus 16-bit/44.1kHz playback.

As for performance, Deezer offers a similar sound to its Big Green Rival. Critical ears will hear that 320kbps streams have a similarly hard edge when heard through unforgiving kit, but in practice this will go largely unnoticed.

The benefits of joining the Elite

Detail levels are good and timing is tight, but you'll hear a much more open, dynamic and punchy presentation if you upgrade to Elite through a Sonos speaker.

Spotify's refreshed interface shows that Deezer has been left behind in that department. While we applaud the introduction of Elite, more attention needs to be given to the user experience. Until then, it's hard not to fancy other services more.

QOBUZ From £4.99/month ***



Qobuz has been around for almost as long as Spotify, but was largely unknown until it launched outside its home country of France in late 2013.

Even now, it's not a service you'll find trying to appeal to thousands of subscribers. Instead it focuses on attracting a somewhat more niche audience from the audiophile world.

They've got company

As the first CD-quality streaming service to hit the UK, that made sense - but now, with the launch of Tidal, there's plenty that needs working on if Qobuz is ever going to become a streaming service to be reckoned with.

When it comes to subscription options, Qobuz offers quite the selection. There's the headline 16-bit/ 44.1kHz streaming for £19.99/month (though you can pay £14.99 for access to only the service's classical catalogue), a 320kbps option for £9.99/month and a basic option at £4.99/month which restricts mobile and offline listening.

Since we last looked at it there have been some interface tweaks across both the desktop and mobile apps that make

the overall look a little cleaner, but usability still leaves much to be desired.

Search is still flaky, and results often feel cluttered, unorganised or irrelevant. A search for Beyonce turned up nearly 67,000 artist results, with most there purely because they started with 'Be'.

We noted in our 2014 review that much of Oobuz still felt rooted in France. and while we'd hoped that would improve with time, it's still the case.

On the main Discover page, the majority of suggested playlists are in French, and there are more French albums suggested throughout the various genres than on other services.

Speaking of music discovery. Oobuz loses marks here too, lacking popular features such as artist radio, suggestions for similar artists or recommendations based on your listening habits.

Different focus

When you browse what's new, Qobuz often picks out more jazz and classical picks than Spotify's more contemporary options. This, plus its classical-only subscription tier, gives a hint as to the audience Qobuz is courting.

Those people probably will overlook a less-than-perfect interface for a catalogue that suits them, particularly given the sound quality you get from Qobuz - its 16-bit/44.1kHz streams sound superb.

Tracks sound more spacious and have stacks more detail and subtlety than a Spotify or Deezer stream, even pipping Tidal's CD-quality streams for detail.

We don't picture many people taking Qobuz up on its lesser subscription tiers - there are better options at the prices. We'd take Tidal over Qobuz, despite the latter having the best sound quality of any streaming service; its interface quirks and sparse features are frustrating. Classical fans should consider taking a look, but Qobuz needs to up its game if it wants to compete with the likes of Tidal.

SPOTIFY From free ****

Since its launch in 2008, Spotify has led the streaming revolution with confidence. While its model has evolved, its motto has stayed the same - 'Music for Everyone' - and it remains one of the only streaming services that still offers a free, ad-supported subscription tier alongside its premium service.

Nevertheless, the concept of music for nothing is one that still divides artists, not least because of royalty payments -Tidal claims to pay out three times the amount that Spotify does per stream.

Be that as it may, as the biggest and longest-running streaming service out there, Spotify has managed to woo many an exclusive over the years, giving it an enviable catalogue of over 30 million songs and the influence to secure more.

Interface lift

Spotify's interface has had a lick of paint since we last looked at it, with some welcome additions such as the Your Music section for storing favourite songs, albums and artists, as well as playlists which can now be synced to mobile too.

The Browse page is a well-managed, regularly updated section that throws up

context-based playlists, constantly updated charts and new releases for your attention, as well as content based on things you've previously listened to.

We found the latter generally contained rather dated suggestions - older albums of artists when there are newer ones available - but it's a handy tool for music discovery nonetheless.

The sharing aspect

Spotify has a big social element to it, with the ability to connect your social networks to see what friends are listening to, collaborate on playlists and follow artists and their new music.

The free subscription tier allows users to shuffle any artist or playlist - on a laptop or mobile device - with adverts cropping up every few songs and the ability to skip a song 6 times per hour. The sound quality is capped at 160kbps and you'll need to be connected to the internet at all times.

Take the jump to Premium and you'll get much-improved 320kbps streams, offline listening, freedom to skip tracks as you please and of course, no adverts. There's no lossless option yet, though.

96kbps/ 160kbps/ 320kbps, Ogg Vorbis For now, its 320kbps streams offer decent detail levels and a tonally balanced presentation. There's more space, punch and nuance to its lossless competitors though, and it sounds altogether less refined in comparison.

It's half the price of those services though, and is available on the widest number of platforms. It also offers one of the best catalogues and interfaces. Also, Spotify Connect is included in equipment from the likes of Sony, Onkyo, Yamaha, LG and Samsung, allowing Premium customers to play their music directly through TVs, speakers or systems.

Accessibility, ease of use and content - Spotify has it all and then some. As an all-round service, Spotify is hard to beat.

TIDAL From £9.99/month ****

Tidal's relaunch in March 2015 was quite the media spectacle. With new owner Jay-Z at the helm, Tidal was introduced to a US audience by its 16-strong star-studded line up of shareholders, including Beyonce, Rihanna, Madonna and Calvin Harris.

Several strings to the bow

With a focus on CD-quality lossless music, its other promises include big-name exclusives, HD video content and better royalty payments for artists.

We've been fans of the service since before it got cosy with some of music's biggest names, so what's changed? The main thing is a new, more accessible £10 subscription tier for standard 320kbps AAC streams, taking the fight to the likes of Spotify and Deezer while still offering the lossless option at £20/month.

Elsewhere, changes are a little less obvious. Exclusives have started to trickle through, with Beyonce and Rihanna both having songs and videos make their debut through the service.

The general look and feel of the service hasn't changed since its new owners took over, and across the web

player (HiFi subscribers will need Chrome for lossless sound) and mobile apps, it's slick and easy to navigate through Tidal's various menus.

As well as a handy area to keep all your favourite albums, artists and playlists, Tidal throws up plenty of chances for music discovery, including two whole sections dedicated to new music - Tidal Rising and Tidal Discover.

These offer a selection of up-andcoming and unsigned artists respectively, with artists even able to upload their music directly to the service themselves - no record label required. It's a nice touch that shows a dedication to giving new artists a platform as well as the established ones.

Video is on offer as well

As well as music, Tidal also offers 75,000 HD videos that you can browse, including interviews and behind-thescenes footage. Others dabble in video, but no other service comes close to this.

We'd recommend going the whole hog and signing up for Tidal HiFi if you can. It can't quite take its lossless rival Qobuz for the best in subtlety and timing, but Subscriptions Tidal Premium £9.99/month, Tidal HiFi £19.99/month Platforms Web player (Chrome only for lossless),

it's a much better interface and stronger catalogue for the average listener, plus all 25 million of its tracks are available in 16-bit/44.1kHz lossless FLAC.

The added sound quality does make a difference. Tracks streamed in lossless offer much more detail, a better sense of space and a tighter handle on timing than their 320kbps counterparts, though there's an occasional delay for buffering.

The 320kbps streams are still good if your budget won't stretch beyond £10/month, and we'd say they just pip their Spotify and Deezer equivalents too.

There are still a few things we'd like to see - such as gapless playback - but the level of choice and interesting USPs have helped Tidal become a truly compelling streaming proposition.

hen we looked at these four services, what felt quite obvious from the off is that you need to make a simple decision. Do you want to pay more for high-quality streaming or not? Once you know the answer to that question (and most services offer a trial to help you decide), your decision as to which service would suit you best is much more easily made.

With Deezer high-quality streams restricted to Sonos users right now, the only real choices for 16-bit/44.1kHz playback are Tidal and Qobuz - a battle of new yersus old While Qobuz tops Tidal on sound quality, the rest of the scales tip rather convincingly in Tidal's favour.

Interface and features

Its user interface has been more carefully thought out across the board, it packs in more useful features, plus its catalogue has a much wider appeal and fewer gaps. Tidal scores an easy five stars for all the above reasons, but Qobuz's interface and Francophile tendencies keep it at a four - even though it does sound superb.

If you'd prefer not to spend the extra cash on sound quality and

are more bothered about convenience, Spotify and Deezer offer two of the best 320kbps services going. There are a lot of similarities between the two, with great catalogues, features and subscription options, but what divides them is their mobile apps.

Spotify looks much better after last year's interface makeover, but Deezer appears to have been somewhat left behind. It's not hard to use, just rather pedestrian.

Deezer may well have the option of high-quality streams through Sonos, but that's too limited to have any clout here - Spotify is the better all-rounder.

When it came to deciding a winner, we went with the service we felt offered the best allencompassing solution, which is Tidal. For a service still in its infancy, it's made great ground on playing catch-up with the best, and can now challenge them.

Now you can have it all

Even better, it has huge potential for exclusives that could hit other services hard, not to mention the all-important choice between high-quality or not. Spotify is still a solid decision for getting plenty from the streaming world, but with Tidal you can have it all.

Acoustic Energy 1 Series 5.101 £1000 ****

There was a time, about 10 years ago, when Acoustic Energy ruled these parts. Since then the company has got close on occasion, but never quite managed class leadership. But now, after some big changes on the business side, AE is giving it another go.

The first of the new products to come through our doors were the freshly minted Acoustic Energy 101s (reviewed on page 11). They do rather well in a stereo configuration, so we're expecting great things from a surround set-up.

What we have here is two pairs of AE101s, the smallest in the entry-level 1 Series. These are joined by an older 107 centre speaker, and a 108 subwoofer. The 1 Series' design was informed by the mid-range 3 Series, which is good as far as we're concerned - the AE301s are the proud holders of a five-star rating.

Flexible positioning

All the speakers in the 1 Series use common drive units. The fronts feature 28mm fabric-dome tweeters and 11cm anodised aluminium mid/bass cones, housed in straight-edged boxes and finished in black ash or walnut wraps (as opposed to the piano gloss of the 301s).

Instead of more traditional circular reflex ports, the 1 Series features a front-firing slot port. This is designed to

reduce air turbulence and increase flexibility in positioning. It works, but they sound more solid when placed near walls. The subwoofer is relatively unfussy about placement, largely thanks to its downwards-firing driver, but it still benefits from being away from the walls and room corners.

A punchy, engaging performance

We get stuck into a Blu-ray of *Birdman*. It's a vibrant, dynamic soundtrack with a constant bed of effects and voices all around. With the Acoustic Energy package hooked up, it's a fun listen.

Both low-key and high-octane events are handled with far-reaching dynamics. Subtle conversational shifts are apparent, while the beating of a cymbal has all the texture of a trash can lid thrown in your direction. It's a punchy, lively and engaging performance.

The soundfield, meanwhile, is tall and wide - bigger than from the Q Acoustics 3000 Series 5.1 Cinema Pack. It's a blanket of sound that easily covers medium to large listening rooms.

Big and punchy, then, but that doesn't mean it's not a refined performance. The sound is clean and clear, with a healthy balance to the tonal diet. Highs are crisp, and lows are of the taut, agile variety and consistent across the board.

The Acoustic Energy package isn't too fussy about placement in your listening room The speakers integrate well with the subwoofer, which won't worry your light-fittings but still packs a solid punch. Overall it's an enjoyable, entertaining listen and easy to live with. But while the Acoustic Energy package doesn't have any particular weak points, it failed to impress us as much as some of its similarly priced rivals did.

Detailed textures

On their own, the AEs are dynamic and punchy, but not as unrestrained as the Dali Zensor 15.1. There's a good deal of detail in the textures, but Wharfedale's Diamond 220 HCP and the Q Acoustics 3000s are more subtle and analytical.

The Acoustic Energy 1 Series 5.101 package offers good sound for the money, just not enough for a fifth star. But if you're tight on space and looking for something easy to accommodate, this package is well worth investigating.

Dali Zensor15.1 £980 ****

This needs no introduction, but deserves one nonetheless. The Dali Zensor 1 5.1 package is our reigning champion. Not only has it won Awards in the £700-£1500 arena, it has also been our traditional speaker packages Product of the Year for two years in a row. It will take something spectacular to knock down these Danish warriors.

A fluid, dynamic presentation

In the package are two pairs of Dali Zensor 1 standmounters, former Award-winners in their own right. Accompanying them is the Zensor Vokal centre and the E-9F subwoofer. Together, they run like clockwork. What you get is arguably the most stunningly entertaining sound this money can buy.

It's a fluid, dynamic performance that soars with excitement before easily dropping right down for a bit of hush-hush. We put on a Blu-ray of *Whiplash* to watch JK Simmons torment a drumming Miles Teller.

The Dalis have no problem shifting up from Teller's tearful sniffing to Simmons' seething barks. It's 0-60 in less time than you can say 'oooh'. There is plenty of pop, to the extent that 'lively' really doesn't quite cut it.

It's not all about the excitement, though. The Dalis are as articulate as

they are expressive, and demonstrate great attention to detail. Dialogue is delivered with insight and delicacy. There is as much subtle texture as you like, from the rustling of sheet music to the leading edges of a full orchestra.

Combine this level of nuance with the strong, far-reaching dynamics and you have yourself a thoroughly invigorating listen. This is good, sophisticated fun.

It also helps that whole package is a uniform presentation and beautifully integrated. Sound effects that travel across the room maintain a consistency of character. That includes the subwoofer, which is authoritative yet articulate. It's fast, precise, and a seamless part of the ensemble.

Attractive package

The competition? We'd say the Wharfedale Diamond 220 HCP is comparatively more analytical and measured. Then again the Dalis are far from vague or sloppy, and any incremental gains in precision are outweighed by the Dalis' colourful, dynamically free delivery.

As for the physical side of things, what you get matches the quality of the performance. This is an attractive and well-built package. The speakers all use the same 25mm soft-dome tweeter and

It will take something spectacular to beat our reigning champ, the Dali Zensor 1 package 13cm wood-fibre mid/bass driver, and the centre doubles up on this for extra authority and better dispersion.

Top of their game

A word on placement: it's pretty easy. Dali designs its products to have wide sound dispersion, and they tend to perform best when firing straight ahead. That means you don't need to angle them towards the listening position.

They work best on a solid pair of stands, positioned fairly close to a wall. Wall-mounting works too, which lends the package a degree of flexibility not enjoyed by many rivals.


We have tremendous respect for the Dali Zensor 15.1 package. That it's lasted this long is impressive, but it's doubly admirable that it's still at the top of its game. If you're after a surround speaker package for under £1000, you must seek the Zensors out.

QAcoustics 3000 Series 5.1 Cinema Pack £700 *****

Few manufacturers have such a consistent record of punching above their weight as Q Acoustics. Since arriving on the scene less than 10 years ago, the company has amassed a disproportionate number of our Awards, many of which went to the 2000i series.

Our first experience of the new 3000 series - the 3020 standmounters - was positive, and what we have here are two pairs of the smaller 3010 standmounters, along with the 3090C centre speaker and 3070S subwoofer.

Low-resonance cabinets

The design of the 3000 series takes lessons from Q Acoustics' premium Concept series. The new cabinet benefits from double-layered top and front panels, along with improved internal bracing. The idea, as it was with the Concept 20 and 40, is to create a low-resonance cabinet.

There are new drivers too. The '2 in 1' concentric-ring dome tweeter aims to combine the best properties of ring radiator and dome-type designs to deliver highs with low distortion and wide dispersion. The whole assembly is decoupled from the main enclosure structure by butyl rubber, which isolates it from unwanted vibrations and theoretically produces a purer sound.

As for the mid/bass driver, the cone material has changed from a paper/mica mix to Kevlar. Instead of the typical cube design of subwoofer, Q Acoustics' offering is tall, thin and rather deep, with twin, front-firing 17cm drivers.

As we've come to expect from Q Acoustics, construction feels very solid. The 3000 series comes in Matt Graphite or American Walnut finishes as standard, but you can pay extra for glossy black or white lacquer, or even 'leather effect'.

Insightful and nuanced sound

This package offers a rounded sound, occupying a comfortable spot between excitement and refinement. It's a hugely insightful listen, packed with the subtlest of textures. If you're after a nuanced listen, this is it.

We find ourselves noticing the smallest sounds, like a quietly ticking clock in the corner of Michael Keaton's dressing-room in *Birdman*. As the soundtrack gets busier with layers of speech and jazz drumming, the speakers demonstrate remarkable organisational skills. What you hear is clear and controlled, and far more precise than you might get from lesser rivals.

There's a good deal of attack, too. The dragon scene of *The Hobbit: Battle Of The Five Armies* has all the fiery bite and



excitement needed to convey a sense of danger. Strong dynamics make short work of Benedict Cumberbatch's magnificent roar. It's not quite up to the Dali Zensor 1 5.1's level of intensity, but then there's a £280 price gap to consider.

Extraordinary value

The soundfield is tall and wide given the compact dimensions of the speakers. It doesn't go as big as the Wharfedale Diamond 220 HCP, but you'll have no problem filling a medium-sized room.

It's not an entirely flawless package, however. It is let down slightly by the subwoofer, which sounds a little soft and needs better definition and control to put out the taut, punchy bass we're after. It's far from disastrous, however.

Overall, Q Acoustics' latest continues the company tradition of punching way above its weight. For the money, what you get here is extraordinary.



Wharfedale Diamond 220 HCP £850 *****

We love the Wharfedale Diamond 220s, and we're not shy about saying so. As if giving them an Award wasn't enough, we have previously used language such as 'best-sounding budget speakers on the market' to describe them. So imagine our excitement when we learned we'd get to try them in a surround package.

Immersed in sound

The Wharfedale Diamond 220 HCP (Home Cinema Package) comprises two pairs of Diamond 220 standmounters, a 220C centre speaker and an SPC-10 active subwoofer - another five-star winner in its own right.

The speakers use 25mm tweeters, set in a deeply dished waveguide to improve efficiency, and 13cm woven Kevlar mid/bass drivers. The cabinet is made of particleboard sandwiched between MDF, designed to reduce unwanted distortions from the cabinet.

The unusual element here is the 'slot-loaded distribution port', a downwards-firing reflex port that opens into a small gap between the base of the cabinet and the plinth. This design helps reduce chuffing noise and makes the speaker less fussy about its proximity to walls.

We're pleased to see this port design has made it to the 220C. This feature was

missing in its predecessor, the 101C, and we felt there was a mismatch between it and the rest of the package.

Put it all together and what you get is a fine sound indeed. It's big, for starters. The Wharfedales have no problem engulfing you. Watching *Birdman*, we were so immersed in sound that it was easy to imagine we were backstage in a Manhattan theatre.

This is a well-integrated package. The centre speaker no longer sticks out oddly and the speakers work closely with the subwoofer (which focuses on agility and detail over rearranging your organs). Effects pan across the room in a tightly knit soundfield, maintaining a consistency of character as they go.

Measured approach

It's an analytical listen, offering plenty in the way of precision and fine detail. Voices are solid and insightful, there is a high level of clarity and the timing is tight. That's not to say rivals such as the Dali Zensor 15.1 are sloppy, it's just that the Wharfedales take a more measured approach.

That's not to say they're not capable of fun: the sound packs a good deal of punch, handling dynamic shifts with confidence. That said, the Dalis go about it with a greater sense of zeal.



Take care when setting up the speakers. The design may have been intended to make them less fussy about placement, but we find they actually perform best when placed close to walls. Do this and you'll be rewarded with a more solid, precise stereo image.

Atmospheric sound

It's also worth tinkering with your amplifier's output levels. On our amp's auto-calibrated settings, we initially found the sound a little clinical. Going into the settings and turning the centre speaker down one decibel or so resulted in a livelier, more atmospheric sound.

So they succeeded as stereo standmounters, and now they've succeeded as a surround package. Is there anything the Wharfedale Diamond 220s can't do? Maybe, but this package is an excellent way into the world of surround sound and at a budget price.

Then we come to the Acoustic Energy 1-Series 5.101 package, a is a well-integrated performer with plenty to offer. With no particular fault, it misses out only because of the brilliance of rivals.

In the end, you're the winner. There's no wrong choice, so have an audition, pick one and go with it. You won't have any regrets.



The world's most desirable kit

ark Levinson can quite rightly claim to be one of the handful of brands that originated what we now call the High End. Alongside the likes of Krell and Audio Research it helped establish the segment's recognised template, which includes over-engineered electronics, lavish construction and, of course, mountainous price tags.

This 326S/532H pre/power pairing may be one of the company's more affordable offerings, but in most cases we suspect it will be all the amplifier anyone ever needs. We certainly can't think of a system in which it becomes an obvious weak link.

Classy construction

We can't help but admire the 326S preamplifier. By high-end standards it's a compact unit, yet there's also an undeniable aura of class about it. That impression starts with the superbly made casework, which combines precision build with a well-damped solidity few rivals can match. We also like the feel of the front panel controls:

the input selector has a lovely, positive action while the volume control just glides as it turns.

Together, but separate

Mark Levinson's statement preamps are usually two-box designs that keep the signal and power supply circuits separated to minimise any interference. Here it's all in one case, but the engineers have worked hard to minimise any sonic degradation by covering the entire power supply section (which includes two mains transformers - one for the signal path and the other for the control circuits) in its own steel case to shield the audio circuitry from any unwanted electrical effects.

The preamp's internal electrical layout is dual-mono, where the left- and right-channel circuits are as symmetrical as possible to optimise stereo imaging. Take a look at the rear panel and you'll see this internal layout echoed in the way the left and right connections are positioned on opposite sides.

The preamp's connectivity is good, having no fewer than seven line-level

inputs in a good mix of single-ended and balanced XLRs. If you have a record player there's also the option of a built-in MM/MC phono module for an extra £1375. The 326S can be configured easily, with input names customisable and everything from display brightness to gain for each source adjustable.

The 300W-per-channel 532H power amplifier is a far simpler thing, as such units usually are. This is a sizable powerhouse measuring 19 x 45 x 50cm and, at 34kg, is heavy with it. It runs a little warm too. Not so much that it'll fry eggs, but enough to gently heat our test room after a few hours of heavy use. It's worth making sure you leave plenty of space around it to help heat dissipation.

Take a look inside and you'll find it, too, has a dual-mono configuration right down to using twin (rather hefty) mains transformers - one for each channel. There's also rather a lot of empty space inside. This is because the 532H is part of a power-amplifier range in which the mono, stereo and five-channel versions are all built using the same casework.

Multi-room possibilities

You can connect to the 532H via single-ended or balanced XLR options. A small rear-panel toggle switch allows easy swapping between the two choices. There's also an ethernet connection, but before you get too excited there isn't a streaming module built into this power amplifier. The ethernet port is there to enable the amp to be configured as part of a multi-room set-up when using ML's Media Console as the source.

The 326S/532H combination is nice to use. That's not always the case with high-end equipment, which tends to

Over time these doubts fade as we realise this impression is a result of the 326S/532H combo's class-leading refinement and composure. There just aren't any hard or bright edges in the sound, so there's never any artificially emphasised excitement.

Play a challenging piece of music such as Hans Zimmer's *The Battle* (from the *Gladiator* OST) and this pairing takes it all in stride. We're greeted by a full dose of fire and fury: crescendos crash with impressive force while there's plenty of drive to the rhythmic elements of the track. This music is enthralling and quite fearsome when replayed at the huge volume levels this amplifier is capable of. There is a massive sense of scale here and class-leading authority to the rich and insightful low-end.

Effortless might

While enjoying all the thrills on offer, we also become aware of just how composed the presentation is. Even when the music is at its most challenging this ML pairing sounds totally unflustered, almost as if it barely has to try to produce all that fury. There's no undue hardness in the presentation during dynamic peaks, and certainly no rounding-off of those extremes either. The pairing's sonic stability is breathtaking, with subtle instrumental strands remaining easy to follow no matter how demanding the music gets.

The stereo imaging is remarkable too, with a presentation that is wide, deep and very well layered. Instruments are just locked in position,

refusing to budge, even when a crescendo hits. Impressive.

It would be a real surprise if qualities such as resolution and transparency weren't straight out of the top drawer, and they are. While this amplifier is happy for you to concentrate on the big picture it's equally content if what you crave is analysis.

Clarity in the Moonlight

Low-level details are all there just waiting to be heard. You can hear the subtle clues that define the recording acoustic when listening to Beethoven's haunting *Moonlight Sonata* or revel in the lovely electronic texture of the bassline in SBTRKT's *Wildfire*. The midrange is surprisingly fluid in the way it communicates nuances, and there's an appealingly natural way with which this amplifier renders vocal-based music.

Rhythmically, this pairing does a good job communicating the changing pace and momentum of the track. The delivery is nicely agile for one so powerful, and traces the leading and trailing edges of notes nicely.

Levinsons are strictly neutral. They sound just a little rounded at the top end and a touch rich through the midrange for that. But these characteristics are mild and give this combination a more forgiving outlook as far as handling aggressive recordings is concerned.

ometimes we just get a good feeling about a product. That's what happened the first time we heard Focal's Electra 1038Bes, making up the front left and right channels in a 5.1.4 Dolby Atmos surround speaker package.

We liked what we heard enough to hold on to these floorstanders for a dedicated review, and we're glad we did. These speakers are great. A price tag of £7700 is hardly pocket change, but these towers give more than a taste of Focal's top-end Utopia models - speakers that cost around the same as a well-specified Bentley.

The Electra range is one down from the Utopia but still packs in a full dose of Focal's range of technologies. The most obvious example is the Beryllium inverted dome. While the use of Beryllium will rightly grab the headlines - combining, as it does, rigidity and low mass - the effect of the inverted dome shouldn't be underestimated either. Focal has been refining such designs for many years now, and has them working very well indeed.

Made to measure up

Focal has long majored on drive-unit engineering. The company makes all its drivers in-house, allowing the engineers to fine-tune the units for a specific model.

These drive units are well supported by the cabinet. It's tall (at 125cm high), feels immensely rigid (using MDF 50mm thick in places) and damped, yet there's enough style about the box to keep most people happy.

There are five standard finish options for the side panels - Basalt, Champagne or Mahogany, plus Black or White lacquer - which should fit most environments. These are big speakers with a trio of dedicated bass drivers, so you'll need a large room to stop all that bass from dominating. A space of around 25m² is about as small as we would go. We found the 1038Bes to be most at home well out into our test room, with a slight angling towards the listening position.

Don't skimp on the amplifier. These towers thrive on the end of something with a strong current delivery. Our usual 300W-per-channel Bryston BP26/4B SST2 combination sounded fine, but the improvement when we switched to the Mark Levinson 326S/532H (see p72) was clear. Our usual reference sources - Naim's NDS/555PS streamer and Clearaudio's Innovation Wood turntable package - serve the Focals well.

Big speakers, big sound

Once up and running there's plenty to like here. Listen to *Where We're Going* from the *Interstellar* OST at high volume and these Focals have no trouble. There's plenty of composure, and large-scale dynamics are delivered impressively.

Bass? There's loads of it. It's deep, punchy and surprisingly articulate. More

We switch over to a high-resolution recording (24-bit/176.4kHz) in the form of Alison Krauss and Union Station's *When You Say Nothing At All*, and we're impressed by the 1038Be's fluid and insightful midrange. There's real transparency and top-class precision.

Detail with heart

We're most pleased by the way these speakers deliver masses of detail but avoid sounding clinical. They're not overly fussy either. Give them something hard and bright such as Bruce Springsteen's raw-sounding *Terry's Song* and they'll reveal the limitations of the recording, but that Beryllium dome has enough refinement to keep things in check. It never overstates the flaws.

There's a lot to admire with the Electra 1038Bes. They're wonderfully polished performers that work well with all types of music. Give them a decently large room and a suitably talented system and we have no doubt you'll enjoy the results.



A&R Cambridge A60

It might not match its modern-day equivalent (the A19) overall, but it still has plenty of charm









mplification & Recording Cambridge was founded back in 1976. Now known as Arcam, the company's success was built on its first amplifier, the A60.

Back in the early '80s this slimline integrated cost £190 and was generally considered the go-to middle-market amplifier. It proved the ideal upgrade from budget champions such as NAD's original 3020.

Natural stage presence

This is a well-equipped unit, with a decent array of line-level inputs plus a capable moving-magnet phono stage. The quality of the phono input shouldn't come as a surprise considering vinyl was the dominant quality media of the day.

The tone controls are subtle in their action, and so can prove useful (on occasion) when a recording or partnering kit isn't quite balanced. And it's good to see a mono switch fitted. This can help mono vinyl recordings, replayed by a stereo cartridge, sound more stable. The A6O also has a filter switch, which rolls-off frequencies above 7.5kHz in a bid to reduce hiss from a tuner or the impact of a pop from vinyl.

We used our usual reference sources in the form of Naim's NDS/555PS CD player and Clearaudio Innovation Wood turntable. Partnering speakers ranged from the Wharfedale Diamond 22Os and B&W's 685 S2s right the way through to ATC's SCM5Os. We also used Arcam's Award-winning £700 A19 amplifier to give us some context for the old-timer's performance.

Just what can we expect from a 35-year-old amplifier when it comes to performance? The veteran is certainly less clear and precise than the A19. There's a slight fuzziness about its presentation that leaves the current amp sounding more transparent in the way it renders detail. Other obvious shortcomings include more rounded large-scale dynamics and notably less extension, punch and grip at low frequencies.

But it's not one-way traffic. Despite the shortfall in resolution the A60 counters with a fuller, more dynamically expressive midrange and a generally more enthusiastic attitude. In short, it's a fun listen.


Surefooted and energetic

Play alt-J's *Hunger Of The Pine* and the A60 delivers an upbeat sound that brims with energy. It's surefooted rhythmically and surprisingly punchy with it. A power output of 40W per channel isn't anything special but there's enough grip here to work well with a wide range of speakers. Tonally, the new amplifier is considerably more even. The A60 has a smooth presentation with a slightly rich, mid-forward balance.

It's clear that there have been significant improvements in amplifiers over the years, the A19 bettering its ancestor in most areas of performance. Still, we found ourselves returning to the older amp time and time again. There's just something addictive about its expressive, entertaining delivery. We're quite taken with that wood finish too.

Warm, and extremely animated

Big Hero 6 is about a young boy named Hiro Hamada, a robots whiz-kid who has to deal with a tragic loss fairly early on in the film, and Baymax, the adorable, oh-so-huggable balloon-like medical robot created by his genius brother.

This round, inflatable 'droid that only wants to help is a far cry from the hard-edged, metallic forces of destruction that robots have become in recent cinema. The biggest laughs are courtesy of Baymax as he flops and rolls around the place: "I am not fast," he placidly remarks as they flee from evil-minded microbots.

Like *Frozen* before it, the film's emotional core lies with two siblings, in this case the two Hamada brothers. Their relationship is quickly but effectively fleshed out using only a handful of scenes, and resonates throughout. Elsewhere, a labful of

eccentric genius students are colourful but broad-brushstroke, and the Kabuki-masked villain is appropriately menacing.

Technology plays a huge part in the film, too. It's a vision of an idealist future where advanced technology isn't just a reality: it's part of the fabric of life.

It's in the last hour that the narrative changes gear. The film resorts to a superheroes vs villain showdown that feels lifted out of the final act of *Avengers Assemble*.

A change of tone

The warm humour and subtle charm of the first hour are set aside in favour of spectacular fight scenes, explosions and sacrifices worthy of any summer blockbuster. You find out the film has really been the origin story of a superhero group and, while it's a novel way to go about it, it seems to have sprung out of nowhere.

The true star of the film is the stunning animation. More specifically, the futuristic city of San Fransokyo - a mixture of Western and Eastern architecture, cultures and aesthetics that is breathtakingly realised. We're not exaggerating when we say this is the best animation we've ever seen.

It's no surprise then that this Blu-ray makes an excellent test disc. The bright, bold colours pop, the picture is crisp and clean, and you'll need a system that can handle motion really well what with all the flying around going on.

The soundtrack isn't as impressive as the visuals, but you'll want a system that can handle powerful explosions and thruster blasts with aplomb.

This Disney/Marvel collaboration is a feast for the eyes. If it weren't for the inconsistent tone, *Big Hero* 6 could have been one of the greatest animated films ever made.

Home cinema speaker set-up


Plonking kit around the room and hoping for the best isn't the greatest of ideas...



Finding that sweet spot will ensure you see all the detail in the picture

Screen size and position


To find the best size screen for your room, work out how far away you'll be sitting from the display. We would recommend sitting 1.3m away for a 32in screen, 1.6m for a 40in, 1.8m for 50in and around 2.1m for a 60in+ TV. Those distances might seem huge for a small space, but don't forget - you will want the display to fill your field of vision for the most immersive experience and after a while you'll get use to the screen's size. Don't place it too high, either - you shouldn't have to look up more than 15 degrees, unless you want to strain your neck.



Play around with the sub's placement to find the most effective position

Using a 5.1 system?


Place the two front speakers at ear height, at a 45-degree angle to the listening position. The centre channel should go either directly above or below the TV, and be angled so it's pointing directly at the listener. The surround left and right speakers should go at 90-110 degrees to each side, and be placed a minimum of two feet above ear height if you can. It's the angle that's more crucial here, though. Strictly speaking, the sub should go in the middle - but we know that isn't always practical, so we've put it at the side here, between the centre and left channels.



Convert a 7.1 set-up into Atmos with in-ceiling or upward-firing speakers

Using a 7.1 system?

Set up the first five speakers (see left). If you don't have a THXcertified amp or speakers, place the two back channels slightly apart behind you, firing straight ahead. This will give you the most even spread of sound. If your kit is THX-certified, however, place the back speakers next to each other on the rear wall. This lets the Advanced Speaker Array tech do its job - it's a processing mode that uses one speaker configuration to disperse sound in different ways depending on what you're watching or listening to.



Place a sound isolation plinth under a sub if you're worried about vibrations

Adding an extra sub?

Using more than one subwoofer might seem excessive. But don't worry, it needn't cause ructions between you and the neighbours – deploying multiple subs isn't meant to make the bass louder. Instead, it evens out the spread of bass around the room, making it harder to localise – and therefore more immersive. If you're using two subs, place them in the middle at the front and back of the room. Pulling out all the stops and using four? Put them at twelve, three, six and nine on an imaginary clock-face.

Jurassic Park (1993)

CGI came into its own with *Jurassic Park*, but the impact of seeing photo-realistic dinosaurs is matched by the care paid to the film's characters. It looks great but the DTS-HD Master Audio 7.1 track deserves plaudits, giving suspense scenes like the introduction of the T-Rex a real tension.



Jaws (1975)

Without a doubt one of the classics to emerge from '70s Hollywood, Spielberg showed an appreciation for suspense over outright horror with *Jaws*. John Williams' two-note motif for the deadly shark exudes menace, and the sheer fright and terror Spielberg conjured up has rarely been surpassed.



King Kong (2005)

The King Kong Peter Jackson and Andy Serkis created is a thrillingly realised one despite the film being weighed down by a bloated running time.
Still, the look is sumptuous, with James Newton Howard's soaring music full of emotion and adventure.

Calibrating your AV receiver

A poorly set up receiver, with speakers at the wrong levels and EQ settings, is awful. Here's how to do it right

Do it manually

If you have a sound-pressure level meter, this is the time to free it from its current life of measuring car exhausts and burps.

In your AV receiver's settings menu, switch the test tone on, then cycle through the speakers. Switch the SPL meter to 'C' weighting and slow response mode, and then set the level of each speaker to around 75dB on the meter's display as you hold it head-height.

If you're using a phone or tablet with an SPL app, you should be fine setting the surround sound speakers, but many internal mics are pretty bad at registering bass – so you'll have to dial in the sub by ear. Now would be a good time to check the overall balance, too.

Use the included microphone

The easiest way to do it is to plug in the calibration microphone that came with your receiver. Follow the on-screen instructions, moving it between the listening positions you usually sit in at the appropriate point (if your amp supports this).

Put it at ear-level (on a stand if possible), and stay absolutely silent while it works.

Check your work

Make sure the speakers are to the correct size in the amp's menus, and trust your ears. If it sounds wrong, it probably is – you can always tweak.

Recorded music is at a crossroads

The format in which you listen to your music could be undermining the quality of your hi-fi system

For those of us that consider themselves a music lover, albeit to different degrees, we are part of a very fortunate generation. We now have access to an evergrowing wealth of recorded music of extraordinary range and depth, effectively accumulated over the last 60 years. With the introduction of the microgroove LP record in the early 1950's, playback quality took a quantum leap forward and this also coincided with a far higher standard of recording techniques. Although further improvements have been made over the years, this was a watershed time that first introduced hi-fi as a reality.

We now have literally millions of recorded music tracks available

to us in all genres and many different formats. One trend over recent years, however, has been to deliberately downgrade the quality in order to offer quantity. The main culprits have been MP3 and AAC formats which were designed as a low cost form of delivery when download speeds were slow and computer chip memory was expensive. Neither now applies and both formats should be consigned to history.

Quality vs quantity

Let us explain. The maximum resolution from MP3 and AAC file formats, which are both highly compressed, is 320 kbps (kilobytes per second) which compares with CD quality of 1411 kbps. This means the resolution quality is less than

a quarter of that provided by a standard CD. However, most MP3 or AAC files are downloaded over the internet and the most used download resolution is 128 kbps, which is around one-eleventh of CD quality. This should ring alarm bells. If you are only playing back these tracks on an iPod or mobile phone with a pair of earbuds, the quality may be irrelevant to you. But if these tracks are your primary source of music, perhaps with an iPod dock into a decent hi-fi system, you are only making a very poor quality sound louder. Information is irretrievably lost and the full dynamic range is lacking. The quality will be very poor in contrast with a full resolution version even if you are completely unaware of the loss you are inflicting upon yourself. This can even affect the type of music listened to

as most classical recordings downloaded as an MP3 or AAC file will have so much information missing, and all the complexities of the music lost, with the end result that the recording is reduced to just the essence of a tune.

What is the future of recorded music?

There are now positive signs for the future of recorded music. Audiophiles, or hi-fi connoisseurs, have been very important to the music industry as they are generally avid music lovers who aim to maximise their enjoyment by listening to music at its best quality level, which

means the play-back of great recordings through hi-end hi-fi to achieve the most outstanding results. Without them, a main driver for quality would probably be removed from the music industry. They have always sought out quality but there is now an increasing awareness among the wider public of the serious deficiencies of the highly compressed formats. Full resolution audio streaming, as well as CD quality downloads, are already available and will surely become the eventual norm with this greater awareness of the tremendous quality benefit. Consumers will vote through their purchases and will seek out higher resolution recordings. Look at Qobuz for a new high-profile entry into this field who offer CD quality (16 bit/44.1 kHz FLAC) streaming for over 15 million tracks.

For specialist hi-fi dealers, their relationship with audiophiles and hi-fi connoisseurs is also crucial to them for, if they are to stay in business, they must satisfy the most discerning customers in the industry. The reality is that audiophiles and specialist hi-fi retailers (and the ones listed on this page represent the UK's finest) are essential to each other.

Specialist dealers know how to choose the products that combine as a superb system and how to get the best out of it by expert installation in the home. They also appreciate how exciting and involving music can be and how it can deliver a powerful emotional experience. Analogue interconnect

van den Hul M/Server Hybrid

A cable that is used to transfer an audio signal from a source (eg a CD player), to an amplifier or between a pre-and power amplifier.

Digital interconnect

Used to transfer a digital signal between two components. There are two types of digital interconnects: optical and coaxial.



Not all speakers support a bi-wired set-up.

Speaker cables

These carry the audio signal from your amplifier to your speakers. Bi-wiring uses two runs of cables per speaker and can lead to improvements in the speakers' performance

Speaker positioning

Wonder-wall?

Where's the best place to position a speaker? Some speakers sound better backed up against a wall (Wharfedale's Diamond 220 speaker, for instance), while others prefer to be out in the open. Your choice of speaker may be dictated by how much space you have.

Ear, ear

Common practice for standmounters is to have the tweeters at seated ear-level. Why? The higher frequency sounds from a tweeter are more directional. Having them at this height ensures they make a beeline for your ears.

Stand to attention

Speaker stands keep the speaker cabinet rigid. This allows for more of the drivers' movement to be translated into sound and not wasted through vibrations. If they're on a carpet, make sure you have spikes to ensure stability.
