An ambitious attempt by Arcam to raise the bar

Arcam Solo bar | Soundbar | £800

There's more than one way to skin a cat, or in the case of home cinema, use a soundbar. One way is to plug your sources into your TV and have just one digital cable running from the back of your set into the unit.

The other approach is one taken by Arcam and it's first ever entry into this market: the Solo bar. The British company has used its experience in home cinema to transplant some of the brains and features of a surround-sound receiver into its new creation.

Surprise package

So the Solo bar has a number features you expect to see in a home cinema amp and a couple of surprises thrown in too: four 4K-supporting HDMI inputs. The Arcam's HDMI output is also ARC (Audio Return Channel) enabled, so it can accept audio from compatible TVs.

Cycle through Arcam's menus and you'll find 'Auto Setup.' Like some surround-

sound amps, the Solo bar comes with a microphone and automatic-calibration software. Hit 'ok' on the remote, the bar fires out a few test tones and the levels of the speakers in the bar are adjusted accordingly. When it's connected, the bar does the same for the optional wireless Play subwoofer too (see panel).

There's no on-screen GUI (graphical user interface) for the Solo bar, everything's done through the display on the unit. It's reasonably large and fits in a decent amount of information, although the pale blue characters look dated compared to the dark green ones on other Arcam kit. Once the soundbar has been calibrated you still have the option of switching the EQ off, and you might want to experiment to see what you prefer. With it on, we find the Arcam sounds more airy and open. Turn it off and you sacrifice some of the spaciousness but gain more solidity at the bottom end.

You also have three different sound modes to work with: 'Movie', 'Concert' and 'Stereo'. 'Movie' gives a broader spread of sound, while the other two give varying degrees of focus. Play music through the Arcam's Bluetooth receiver and the system defaults automatically to 'Stereo'.

The Arcam Solo sub isn't cheap and costs an extra £500. It's a sealed-box design and uses a 10in driver together with a 300 watt amplifier. The most convenient way to connect is wirelessly, but there's always the wired option too.

A plus-point for the Arcam is its ability to decode the high-quality Dolby TrueHD and DTS-HD Master Audio soundtracks found on Blu-ray discs, something many rivals cannot do



Talking of Bluetooth, the Arcam allows you to go wireless, but with a significant twist. Not only can you beam music to the Solo bar the traditional way, but you can also transmit sound from it to a pair of Bluetooth headphones. It's a clever touch and something we haven't seen in a soundbar before. Bonus points to Arcam for thinking outside the box... or should that be outside the bar?

Bar any issues

The bar itself is quite a substantial unit, with a solid, aluminium chassis. To all intents and purposes it's a pair of speakers with 50-watts per channel. The tweeters at either end of the bar are angled out, at five degrees each, to enhance the width. There's a bracket for wall-mounting bundled in the box too. Since the first shipment went into stores, Arcam now supplies wedge-shapedfeet that slot under the soundbar and help angle it upwards, which is useful if it is at a much lower level than you are seated. Besides the smart use of Bluetooth, another plus point for the Arcam is its ability to decode the high-quality Dolby TrueHD and DTS-HD Master Audio soundtracks found on Blu-ray discs. The majority of soundbars on the market tend to only take the core DTS and Dolby soundtracks off a disc so, theoretically, the Arcam is digging out more information than many of its rivals.

In reality, movie soundtracks beam out of the Arcam loud and clear, and there's an impressive level of transparency across the board. Soak up the action from the DTS-HD Master Audio soundtrack to *After Earth*, and you're aware of the bar's even tonal balance. Voices are just as audible and lucid as the action. Just before Kitai sky-jumps off the waterfall there's a ton of detail in the heated exchange between Jaden and Will Smith. As the young hero tries to avoid the giant bird of prey, there's a real sense of punch and precision, as bird and boy swoop and jostle.

In detail...



There are two 3.5mm inputs tucked away under the Arcam. The one on the left is an analogue input for hooking up a different source. The right input is for the Solo's set-up microphone – don't get the two confused!

2 You've got access to both optical and coaxial digital inputs. They sit alongside a subwoofer pre-out, should you want to connect to the Solo sub (or any other sub) via a wired connection.

3 Four HDMI inputs should be more than enough for a set-top box, games console, Blu-ray player and so on. If you suffer any lip-sync issues, you can manually adjust the delay in the Arcam's menus.

Where the Arcam doesn't quite succeed is in drawing you into the film, as it doesn't really convey the dynamics or drama of the movie as well as it could. As the camera pans and streams merge into the waterfall, rival soundbars, like the Dali Kubik One or Focal Dimension, give more of a sense of the rushing water and the power of Mother Nature as it cascades over the edge. There's greater richness and finesse to the sound too. Dialogue sounds that bit more natural and emotional.

Fails to bring the funk

Playing Stevie Wonder's *Live At Last* Blu-ray, the Arcam shows it's able to deliver music with poise and precision. During *Superstition* percussion stops and starts in all the right places. The saxophone has a distinct tone, but it doesn't sound edgy or hard enough. It's easy enough to listen and isolate all the different elements of the

Arcam electronics. It's small, minimalist and feels quite cheap. It also seems to suffer from a split personality – sometimes we press buttons and get an instant response, other times we press the same button (mainly volume) three, or four times before it decides to respond. There is a solution: Arcam suggests

track. We just aren't excited enough, and the normal upbeat funk of this classic tune doesn't register as much as it does when heard through more capable rivals. They offer greater weight and richness in the bass and greater dynamic thrust.

In need of a little finesse

The story continues when you switch to simple streaming of music via Bluetooth. Complex rhythms don't present a problem and there's nothing wrong with how the Arcam organises music. But nonetheless you still yearn for greater finesse and sonic artistry.

Arcam has been very ambitious with the Solo bar, and in some ways it goes above and beyond what we've come to expect from this kind of product. But when it comes to sound quality, the Arcam doesn't quite cut it against the very best. you download its dedicated Solo bar remote app for iOS and Android devices. It connects via Bluetooth, mirrors the soundbar's display on your phone. and also gives you access to the same assortment of buttons via your touchscreen. The Solo is quicker to respond to these prompts too.

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Our seating position is slightly above the Solo bar, so we use the small plastic feet supplied to tilt it upwards a few degrees. We experiment with the different sound modes and find we prefer the EQ off and either the 'Movie' or 'Stereo' modes. 3 The standard plastic remote can be frustrating so we switch to the iOS app, which is much better. Once we've paired our iPhone 6 to the Arcam we open Spotify to stream some tunes over Bluetooth which... ...turns into late-night listening, so we pair the Arcam to a set of Bose Bluetooth headphones the set-up works a treat.

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Pioneer N-50A | Music streamer | £500 A sequel offering you just can't refuse

In 2012, Pioneer released the N-50 and it proved so formidable that we gave it an Award - two years in a row. Now we have the Pioneer N-50A, a rare sequel that improves upon the original: the specs alone offer everything a reasonable user requires.

Fully certified

The N-50A works with a number of sources. Its DLNA certification means it will traverse your network to shake hands with other connected devices from NAS drives to smartphones. USB Type-A ports let you play from iPods and iPhones, as well as hard drives and memory sticks. A USB Type-B connection allows you hook up a computer.

You also get Spotify Connect and internet radio, while AirPlay brings in Apple devices. And if that's not enough, there are digital optical or coaxial inputs. Optional external adapters offer to add wi-fi or Bluetooth. File compatibility is extensive: MP3, LPCM, WAV, WMA, AAC, Apple lossless, FLAC, AIFF and DSD. Got high-res audio? This thing goes up to 32-bit/192kHz (or 5.6mHz with DSD). The N-50A can take pretty much anything you can throw at it.

But what really impresses us is how it sounds: the top end sparkles (it is confident

In detail

1 Go wireless

The N-50A doesn't have any built-in wireless goodies, but you can buy the AS-WL300. Pioneer's own wireless adapter, which plugs into the ethernet socket, and is powered by this USB output.

2 Take control

If you have Pioneer's other components (such as a CD player or amplifier) you can hook them up here and control everything centrally with the Pioneer ControlApp.

and controlled but never sounds hard) while the midrange is poised and detailed. Bass notes are hefty but not heavy-handed. Tonal shifts are conveyed with ease.

It's a toe-tapping performance, rhythmically adept and fluidly dynamic. Vocals are expressive. There's plenty of attack. too: the combination of precision and punch makes for an engaging listen.

There's also plenty of insight thanks to good detail definition and a high level of clarity. Instruments and vocals are placed firmly on the soundstage, which is airy and spacious.

'Artificial high-resolution'

If you're the type to fiddle with the sound modes, then you're in luck. 'Hi-bit32 audio processing' expands the input bit signals in an attempt to create a more analogue-like waveform. 'Up-Sampling' increases the sampling frequency to 192kHz. Artificial high-resolution, in other words. The sound becomes more detailed, but it feels manicured and less dynamic.

There's also the 'Auto Sound Retriever' option for low-quality, high-compression files. We found it affected the quality of normal tracks too: the sound gets a bit cloudy, so we wouldn't recommend it.

We prefer listening on 'Direct' mode, which is the default setting. Here, audio signals bypass digital processing to reduce noise. The performance is clearer and more precise than standard, with tighter timing.

The N-50A is a well-built metal box, which looks and feels like a quality item. We are fans of the brushed aluminium faceplate and its modern. minimalist vibe. The colour LCD screen, which felt cramped in the original N-50, has been bumped up to 3.5in and the finish options are in silver (the N-50A-S, for your information), or you can opt for the N-50A-K. Here the 'K' stands for 'kuro' (or black to the rest of us).

The remote control offers well-spaced, solid. responsive buttons. Smartphone fans can download the control app (imaginatively called 'ControlApp') for free on Android and iOS. This is great for track selection and viewing album artwork, but we wouldn't mind if it were a little slicker to use.

The Pioneer N-50A is a success. If you're in the market for a sensibly-priced network audio player, look no further. This is a talented performer, with plenty of tricks stuffed into its capacious sleeves. It's not easy to surpass a double Award-winner, but that's what Pioneer has done here. And we are absolutely delighted.

music without breaking the bank, and a good option if an extensive feature spec isn't on your list of priorities.

Philips SW750M | Wireless speaker | £130 **Philips narrows it down**

At face value the slim Philips SW750M may seem like a tempting multi-room option - for Spotify Premium users at least. The speaker can play music solely from Spotify through the streaming service's Connect feature, available only to subscribers of the £10-per-month version. Essentially, Connect lets you stream the service's 30 million-song catalogue to the speaker over a shared wi-fi connection, using its app as a remote control.

The Philips doesn't have Bluetooth or any physical inputs, so non-subscribers or those that listen to music from other sources too will need to look elsewhere.

Multi-room options

One speaker can be used on its own, or grouped with up to three others (of any combination in the Philips' range) to take advantage of its multi-room functionality. Getting started couldn't be easier - the simple set-up process via Philips' SpeakerSet app (free, iOS and Android) gets you up and running in a few minutes.

Spotify's app (extensively available across Windows, Android, iOS and even Blackberry platforms) will be your go-to controller for the most part, though. For those unfamiliar with it. its attractive and intuitive interface is easy to get along with.

If a smartphone is your device of choice you can still make or take calls and watch videos during playback as music streaming runs in the background. What you can't do is stream files stored on a device, so any songs not on Spotify's database aren't playable through the speaker.

A kind of versatility

While the Philips is hardly versatile when it comes to features, its attractive physical design is more so. Despite the twin rear-firing bass ports, it's as happy close to a wall as it is in the middle of a table.

If you've already cast your eyes to the star rating, you'll know there's a catch: poor performance. At this price, the benchmark

is set by Cambridge Audio's Bluetoothbased Go (our Award-winner), and plonked next to the SW750M it's easy to see why. Both stream at a reasonably low bitrate. but fed the same material the Go is a much more enjoyable listen.

Capable competition

The Philips' lack of body and richness in comparison is immediately clear, and it's only a few songs in that we realise insight comes up short too.

Select Barbra Streisand's Don't Rain On My Parade and while the Philips serves up a fair amount of detail in her vocals, the Go better expresses the dynamics and subtle accents in the theatrical delivery.

Supertramp's *The Logical Song* is a good track for showing off a piece of equipment's drive and musicality, but here it only reveals the Philips' lack of killer instinct. We'd like the bouncy keyboards to have

more life about them, and the lead edge of notes more impact.

It's not all bad news. The Philips' presentation is pleasingly open and big enough to fill a medium-sized living room happily, and the bass has decent weight.

It's clean and well detailed, too, and the soundstage gives instruments stacks of space to work in - even if the SW750M's less than perfect organisation means they don't all tie together as they should.

There's no doubting that Spotify Connect is a worthy feature on a wireless speaker's spec sheet but, with competition getting more feature-packed by the minute, we find the Philips' narrow-minded attitude odd.

If the sound quality were good enough, a multi-room speaker at this price would turn plenty of heads. Unfortunately for the SW750M, its performance is not competitive enough to capitalise on any favourable first impressions created by its affordability, multiroom functionality or stylish design.

Dali Rubicon 5 | Stereo speakers | £2400 **Rubicon clearly sparkles**

Dali has long had a knack of making likeable speakers. All it takes is a short listen to confirm that the Rubicon 5 is yet another. These floorstanders might not be flawless, but they have a sparkle about their performance we can't help but enjoy.

That extra half-way

Dali tends to do things a little differently. While the 5s are a two-and-a-half-way design, there's a twist: that extra half-way refers to an additional tweeter rather than the more usual dedicated bass driver.

The extra tweeter is a 17 x 45mm ribbon design - it takes over from the conventional soft-dome unit at around 14kHz, with the dual aims of maintaining dispersion at the highest frequencies and improving resolution.

have a fluid way with dynamics, and their energetic presentation makes them happy to belt out Bruce Springsteen's Radio Nowhere - even at high volumes.

There's an infectious sense of drive here, combined with plenty of punch. Despite a bit of excess richness in the bass, it's agile enough not to slow things down. Overall resolution is good, making it easy to follow instrumental strands. even though the production is pretty dense. We like the Rubicon's way with voices too. Springsteen's voice is rendered with convincing texture and nuance.

Moving on to Prokofiev's *Romeo and Juliet* shows off the Dalis' fine stereo imaging. It's wide, nicely layered and well focused. If your kit is talented enough, the 5s won't disappoint

Moving down the frequencies, the midrange and bass are delivered by a 16.5cm-unit tuned by a rear-firing port. The driver uses Dali's trademark wood-fibre cone material, which is claimed to give a good balance of low weight, rigidity and damping.

The Rubicon 5s are well built, though they feel a little lighter than expected. The white-gloss finish on our review samples is nicely applied and looks classy. Other finish options include gloss-black, rosso-veneer and walnut.

We're happy with the level of fit and finish - it's clear that the company has put in a great deal of effort to ensure the speakers' quality is right. Positioning is easy: just give the Rubicon 5s space to breathe and fire them straight ahead, rather than angling towards the listening position. The speaker's wide dispersion makes this positioning preferable.

Once set up these towers certainly deliver. These are lively performers that

Flawed, but with appeal

What flaws do we find during our test? There are better options if tonal purity is a priority, and the very best rivals have a transparency the Dalis can't quite match. Neither of these things is enough to upset us too much, however.

There's no shortage of competition at this level, with models from Spendor, ProAc and PMC setting very high standards. Yet the Rubicons have enough appeal to be worth a serious listen. We doubt you'll be disappointed if you pick up a pair.

It has that warm, full-bodied presentation characteristic of Yamaha's sound, combined with a squeaky-clean, smooth quaility that's lovely to listen to. There are rich layers of detail here, while the smooth quality to the treble ensures you won't hear any bright or sharp edges. It's an easy-going approach that suits all kinds of music files, whether a 24-bit/96kHz Tom Waits album or the *Guardians Of The Galaxy* soundtrack streamed over Spotify.

We just wish it would sound a little more energetic. The R-N500 knows exactly how to deliver all the right notes at the right time - it just doesn't have quite the drive to do it. The lively, sprightly tune of Pink Martini's *Donde Estas, Yolanda*? sounds laid-back when it should be bubbling over with nimble-footed excitement.

Get the right speakers

The system does need careful speaker matching. B&W's 685 S2 speakers show off the large scale and refined detail of the R-N500's sound, but the Wharfedale Diamiond 220s (£180 - see below) are a better fit because the system sounds perkier and more upbeat.

When it comes to features this Yamaha covers most bases. Plug it into your home network (via ethernet only, there's no wi-fi)

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and you can stream all your music files stored across laptops, smartphones, tablets and NAS devices. File compatibility is extensive: you can play anything from standard MP3s to hi-res 24-bit/192kHz FLAC and WAV files.

Music from many sources

AirPlay and DLNA support are also available, and with Spotify Connect, vTuner internet radio, and FM and AM tuners on board, you have access to more music than you can shake a glowstick at. Streaming quality is stable and we don't experience any drop-outs during testing.

There are multiple digital and analogue inputs if you prefer a wired connection, and even a moving-magnet phono stage for plugging in your trusty old turntable. There are two things the R-N500 can't do: wi-fi and Bluetooth, but we didn't miss either. If you want them, you can buy separate modules from Yamaha for around £50 each.

We like using the neatly designed and intuitively laid out NP Controller free app

more than the old-fashioned remote handset thanks to its logical, organised layout. It can be a little unresponsive at times though. The physical remote may be old hat, but it is at least reliable.

We're puzzled every time we look at the R-N500's relatively budget price tag, as it looks and feels every inch a premium piece of kit. Those beautifully machined controls are wonderful to use.

The R-N500 is good value for a product of its kind, and is a fine system for anyone with a sprawling collection of music files, or someone wanting to take their first steps into hi-fi. All it needs is a fresh dose of energy, and a touch more precision and punch.

We weren't sure what to expect with the Technics ST-C700 streamer. When we reviewed the hi-fi brand's comeback products (a stereo amplifier and a pair of speakers) in the last issue, they received two stars each, which was very disappointing. The Technics ST-C700, happily, hasn't followed suit. This multi-featured streamer offers a more competitive performance, even if the price is quite steep.

A good first impression

Clean, balanced and agile, the Technics streamer makes a good first impression. The funky, electronic vibe of Public Service Broadcasting's Gagarin is delivered with a decent amount of detail, and the ST-C700's clean presentation helps deliver a toetapping rhythm. It could do with more punch and pizzazz, though.

Tonally, the ST-C700 is evenly balanced. Yes, the top end could be more open and have more bite, but we like how there's no hint of brightness. Piano kevs have impact in The Imitation Game's soundtrack, while cellos add weight convincingly. However, we'd like notes to hit those dynamic peaks and troughs better.

Play a track with crunch and low-end grunt, such as Alice in Chains' Rooster, and the Technics' restrained presentation doesn't agree with the heavy guitars. More muscle in

the bassline would give a richer sound, too. Voices are clear, but again, they could do with more subtlety and warmth. Regina Spektor's Blue Lips is light and airy, but the breathy quality of her voice and her intonation don't quite come across from the ST-C700.

USB

Bluetooth

We like how the streamer isn't fussy with file types - we use a mix of high-res. CD-ripped files and Spotify streams, and the character remains consistent. The ST-C700 packs in plenty of streaming features, with a wired-ethernet connection and DLNA support being the main method of accessing all your music stored on NAS boxes, laptops and smart devices. There's no wi-fi option, but the wired connection is stable. It also features AirPlay streaming from Apple devices, Bluetooth aptX and NFC pairing.

All the right connections

Pairing is mostly fast and simple - making a Bluetooth connection needed one too many clicks though. As for connections, the ST-C700 is straightforward: two USB inputs, one for plugging in Apple devices for playback and charging, the other for plugging in your laptop to play stored files (MP3s, CD-ripped WAVs, hi-res 24-bit/192kHz FLAC files). The Type-B input also supports DSD files. Single outputs for coaxial, optical and line level are on the back panel, and you also get DAB+, DAB and FM tuners on board.



We like the build of the Technics (the display is crisp and clean), although we think it could be a more impressive finish, considering the price. Bizarrely, the backlit touch-sensitive icons on the front panel don't control playback, but are for menu selection.

The big stumbling block for the Technics ST-C700, though, is that there are more capable rivals out there and at hundreds of pounds less. In comparison to some of these, the Technics sounds lacklustre.

There's plenty we like about the Technics ST-C700 streamer's performance, but it really needs to offer more in terms of insight and dynamics to be a truly engaging

Cambridge Audio TV5 | Soundbase | £280 An affordable 'base hits the big time



Soundbases may not come in different shapes, but sizes they do. Cambridge Audio is now the second manufacturer (after Canton) to produce a giant version of its debut soundbase specifically for 'larger' TVs. It's a sensible move: bigger soundbases can take the weight of bigger tellies and accommodate their bigger stands.

If you haven't already guessed, the TV5 is a larger version of the Award-winning TV2, 18cm wider than its forerunner (bringing its width to 73cm) and housing a second 16.5cm subwoofer underneath the unit for a bigger, bassier sound.

Worth the extra

It might cost £80 more than the TV2, but it wasn't long into our viewing of time-loop thriller *Edge Of Tomorrow* we decided this was a reasonable extra spend, for the TV5 not only embraces the TV2's rich, full-bodied and balanced character, but builds on its level of clarity, subtlety and dynamic ability too.

Sure enough, it has a bigger sound. Though matching the TV2's level of amplification (100W), the TV5's bigger enclosure and extra woofer help it achieve greater scale and an increased sense of power. Skip to Cruise's combat-training scene and, as the machinery swings across the screen from all angles, there's no doubting the soundfield is as immersive as you're going to get at this price. It certainly had no trouble spanning the 55in screen we tested it with.

There's no questioning the upshot of the extra woofer elsewhere, too. Bass is laid on thick as Cruise is given his first taste of battle: compared with the TV2, there's much more rumble from the aircraft, and a harder thud as it falls to the ground. Explosions (the film's time-loop style ensures there are plenty) have punch and definition, too. The bold, rich bass presence gives the entire presentation a solid backing, meaning that everything from gunfire to dialogue sounds solid, but never over-egged. It's this grasp of balance and weight that makes the TV5 comfortable at high volumes.

This soundbase's muscular delivery isn't without control and subtlety, either. It might not be natural to listen out for the finer details behind the high-energy action, but that subtle information adds to the whole experience.

The TV5's flair for dynamics is the highlight: it laps up the soundtrack's crescendo when our heroes prepare for war, and it ably communicates the drama and intensity of the battlefield.

It's a case of *déjà vu* viewing the unembellished black chassis and cloth grille front (hiding the same dual 57mm drivers as the TV2). The minimalist design isn't in the least eye-catching, but it's functional at least. Build is reassuringly sturdy so you won't be afraid to mount a hefty TV on top of it. Our only gripe: while a single, colour-changing LED indicates sources well enough, we'd prefer everything spelled out with a text display.

Digital and analogue

The TV5 (like the TV2) is analogue-friendly, with both 3.5mm and RCA sockets, and an optical input too. It supports Bluetooth aptX and, while there's no sign of NFC, it has its own neat trick for making Bluetooth pairing quick and convenient by remembering up to eight paired devices and connecting to them automatically when in range.

Also handy (and in this case, environmentally friendly) is the Cambridge

Remote synchronisation

Gently peel away the clothed front panel and you'll see that between the two BMR drivers is a control panel. This allows you to set up the TV5 so that it can 'learn' your TV or Sky remote's functions and so obey their volume-level commands. Note that you'll still need the TV5's own remote handy for changing source input and sound modes.



Audio's ability to automatically power down when sound isn't detected after what the company quotes as "several seconds" and switch back on when it does. Those who covet convenience might also prefer to set up the base so a TV or Sky remote can control its volume.

A "step up in size and sound", promises Cambridge Audio. Tick, tick. The TV5 does exactly what it sets out to do, and is a sensible addition to the company's range at a time when good budget soundbases are few and far between.

Should you buy the TV5 over the TV2? If you have the space and extra cash, then sure. It's a great budget option for anyone looking to take their first step to improve their TV's thin, tinny sound – and not just for those of us with large tellies. And what's £80 between friends?

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Triangle Esprit Titus EZ | Stereo speakers | £600 **Titus delivers an imperial performance**

We've long been fans of Triangle's approach to music replay. The company may not always produce the most rounded speakers, but in our experience its products rarely lack entertainment value. The Titus EZs. the only standmounters in the French company's new Esprit range, are a fine example.

Listen to these standmounters straight out of the box and you might well wonder what the fuss is about. They sound tonally uneven and have a peaky treble that needs little encouragement to sound harsh and aggressive. Triangle has long promoted horn-loaded tweeters so it's no surprise to find one here. It's a titanium dome fronted by a distinctive and rather aggressive looking phase plug.

Give the Titus EZs a couple of days of use and things improve considerably. The speakers' high frequencies gain in smoothness and integration improves. We would still recommend taking care in partnering electronics (avoiding brightersounding kit). The result, when you do take care is excellent. We tried a range of amplifiers - from NAD's D 3020 and Arcam's A19, right through to our reference Bryston BP26/4B SST2 - and at each stage these Triangle speakers have the transparency to take a notable step up in performance.

A powerful reckoning

They're small, standing just over 30cm, so really deep bass isn't on the menu. Accept this innate shortcoming and you have one of the most articulate and expressive speakers we've heard below the £1000 mark.

Positioned around 30cm from a rear wall on some solid stands. the Tituses sound fast. responding to leading edges and dynamic shifts with admirable precision. Play a complex piece of music such as Hans Zimmer's Gotham's Reckoning and they take it all in stride, keeping a multitude of instrumental strands under control and refusing to blur things even when the music becomes demanding. Both large-scale and low-level dynamics are delivered with

Cellulose hero

The mid/bass driver is a new development. It uses a cellulose cone, with plenty of attention put into optimising the balance between rigidity and

infectious enthusiasm and no sense of the rounding-off of which many rivals are guilty. The result is an involving sound that pulls you in and holds you until the music ends.

Moving on to Tracy Chapman's Goodbye shows the Titus's subtler side. There's finesse here, with a nuanced rendering of Chapman's distinctive voice leaving us spellbound. We're impressed by the way these speakers deliver rhythms and the way they portray changes of pace. All the energy and drive, particularly in upbeat tracks like Bruce Springsteen's Radio Nowhere, is delivered with determined skill.

Finishing touch

They're well made and nicely finish. Finish hasn't always been Triangle's strength in its more affordable ranges, so it's nice to see progress here. If you don't like the walnut of our review sample, white- or black-gloss alternatives are available for a £100 premium.

We rate the Triangle Esprit Titus EZs very highly (even if they are harder to track down Finishes come in walnut or. for a premium of £100, white- or black-gloss than alternatives from better-known brands. it's well worth the effort). In a suitablytalented system, these classy standmounters will excel.

Google Nexus 6 | Smartphone | free with contract Big 6 pushes the boundary

It's almost impossible to pick up the Nexus 6 and not make a comment on its size. Packing a 6in display, it's one of the largest smartphone screens on the market, and not that long ago would have been considered a small tablet rather than a take-everywhere phone.

How times change. While there's no denying it's big, it doesn't feel quite as ridiculous in the hand as perhaps it once would have. Samsung's successful Note range can take a lot of credit for that, while handsets from manufacturers like Apple have only helped cement the big-screen trend as here to stay.

The Nexus 6 is Google's reply, but does it prove that anything Apple can do, it can do better... or just bigger?

The Nexus 6 itself is made by Motorola, which puts it in good hands if the most recent Moto X is anything to go by. In fact, it bears more than a passing resemblance to its stablemate, with the same curved back panel and indented M logo that provides the perfect place for your finger to rest in when you hold it. It's a wholly plastic design, but feels well-built and sturdy, available in blue or white.

It doesn't have the premium design of the iPhone 6 Plus then, but many will find its gently rounded back panel and flat edges easier to hold, particularly at this size.

Speaking of the iPhone 6 Plus, there's really not much between it and the Nexus 6 in terms of physical size, despite the iPhone's screen being 0.5in smaller. The Nexus 6 is a touch wider, but height-wise there's hardly anything in it.

Controls kept to a minimum

There are very few physical controls on the Nexus 6, save for the ridged power button and volume rocker on the right-hand side. The 3.5mm headphone jack is placed in the middle along the top of the handset, with the nano SIM card slot next to it. There's no microSD card slot here though, which is a shame – you'll need to choose wisely between 32GB and 64GB when you buy it to ensure it sees you through.

Under the hood the Nexus 6 packs one of the most powerful chipsets currently available in mobile phones, comprising Qualcomm's 2.7GHz Snapdragon 805 quad-core processor, the Adreno 420 GPU and 3GB of RAM. It's a plastic design but wellbuilt. The combination of flat sides and a gently rounded back make the Nexus 6 easy to hold too

It certainly seems to do its bit, and the Nexus 6 feels quick and responsive when zipping around menus, multitasking or playing games. Even with really graphicintensive apps, like Gameloft's *Asphalt 8: Airborne*, we don't suffer from stutters or long load-times at any point.

The power behind the phone

Such a big screen needs a decent-sized battery to power it, and fortunately the Nexus 6 carries a 3220mAh power pack. It includes Qualcomm's QuickCharge 2.0, which gives you up to six hours of charge from a depleted battery in just 15 minutes.

Its performance is a reasonable one too. Our battery rundown test, running a 720p video with wi-fi on at half brightness, saw it lasting 10 hours and two minutes, and with everyday use we still managed to get around a full day's usage out of it.

And so to that screen. At 5.96in it's just screaming to be used for watching films, with a Quad HD 1440 x 2560 resolution and 493ppi putting it up there with the best phone screens around, on paper at least.

In use, it can't quite match the Samsung Note 4 or iPhone 6 Plus's video performance, despite its resolution advantage over the latter. But it gives it a good go. Watch a Full HD clip and the screen looks plenty sharp enough with both text and images - it's not until it's compared with Apple's handset that you notice some of the finer details are a little soft. Landscape scenes don't have the same depth to them

Streaming has never sounded better – Tidal is a smartlooking, contentpacked service for streaming hi-fi quality music. and textures, like the fur on Paddington Bear, aren't quite as well realised.

The Nexus 6's colour palette certainly has a warmer tone to it than the iPhone too, but which you prefer will be down to personal choice. We'd say the iPhone probably just pips it when it comes to absolute balance, but the richer, more vibrant tone looks punchy and engaging rather than hugely unnatural.

We watch a couple of movies on this phone and it doesn't feel strange to do so - the 6in screen is somewhat of a sweetspot for great mobile movie marathons, and means we don't even feel the need to cast it to our TV once we get home.

Aside from its large screen, one of the biggest talking points of the Nexus 6 is its inclusion of Android 5.0 Lollipop out of the box. This is the first time we've seen it on a phone, following its debut on the Nexus 9 tablet, and it's not an insignificant upgrade. Icons are simpler, colours are bolder and the overall appearance of it is flatter, stripped back and fuss-free. Folders now appear as round circles, there are subtle new animations for opening and closing menus and the three main soft keys for navigation have been given a makeover too.

Strengths inherent in the system

Without a doubt, the pure Android experience has always surpassed that of any manufacturer-tweaked offering, and this, alongside the Lollipop update, serves as a big selling point for the Nexus 6.

When it comes to music, Google's allaccepting nature means there's wider file compatibility than on an iPhone, with FLAC playback up to 24-bit/96kHz supported.

More handy

Even so, its music capabilities fall short of that on the iPhone 6, lacking the same level of dynamics and timing that we love in its rival. There's drive to its character, but the organisation isn't as tight and notes don't deliver the same level of depth or dynamic subtlety.

Listening to a Tidal stream of D'Angelo's Sugah Daddy, it's also clear that its presentation isn't as precise as the iPhone, with leading edges of the notes in the piano intro a little soft.

Try a movie without headphones and the Nexus 6's front-facing stereo speakers project a fairly solid, full-bodied sound directly at you, which the iPhone's sideways-firing speaker can't compete with. We'd argue the iPhone offers a little more clarity though.

A new focus

The Nexus 6 packs a 13MP camera, which has seen some improvements to the one on the Moto X. with a better sensor, image stabilisation 0 and a wider aperture. However, despite it being a huge improvement on the poor camera of the Nexus 5, its performance still underwhelms when compared with the best at this level. On a bright day it will produce sharp, clean and largely well-balanced shots with plenty of detail, but the autofocus can take some time, particularly in tricky or low lighting.

For video, the Nexus 6 includes 4K filming at 30fps alongside its 1080p mode. There are no slo-mo or hyperlapse features, but there are always apps you can download if it's a feature you'll really miss.

Google's Nexus range has always been competitively priced. The 32GB version is available SIM free for £500, with the 64GB costing £50 more at £550. Compare that to the Samsung Note 4 32GB at £600 and the iPhone 6 Plus 64GB (no 32GB option) at

£700, and the Nexus 6 seems a good deal. Google's Nexus phones have always been a refreshing change from the norm, and the



processors available in phones, the Nexus 6 is responsive and smooth in operation

Nexus 6 undoubtedly continues that trend. Its screen is sure to divide opinion while its vanilla Android experience remains unbeatable and alone makes a strong case for buying the Nexus 6.

However, with video and audio performance that can't match the iPhone 6 Plus or Samsung Galaxy Note 4, we have to dock it a star from the full five. If you can get to grips with its size, this is a hugely likeable phone where simplicity is king. But when it comes to performance, the Nexus 6 is bigger but unfortunately not better.

The tech expected to rule the hi-fi and home cinema roost this year

ach January, the focus of the tech industry is on Las Vegas, as the annual International Consumer Electronics Show (CES) kick-starts the year with a showcase of new products and technologies.

What Hi-Fi? was on the showfloor all week to figure out what we should be looking out for in 2015, whether it's in the world of TV, home cinema, hi-fi or portables.

Small screens, big deals

TVs often grab the headlines at CES and this year was no exception, with manufacturers aplenty introducing new sets they hope will create waves in the months ahead.



It was no surprise to find Ultra HD 4K screens even more prevalent, but screen technology has diversified. LG has put its faith in OLED, Panasonic has developed a new Wide Colour Phosphor technology, Samsung unveiled 'SUHD' screens, and there were new TVs featuring Quantum Dot and High Dynamic Range technology, too. From offering better-than-ever pictures to making 4K screens more affordable, there is plenty promisesd in the TV market in 2015.

It's not just TV hardware that made a real impression at CES 2015. Smart TV platforms will clearly be a key battleground in 2015, with LG's webOS, Samsung's Tizen and Sony's Android operating systems set to shake-up how our television's interfaces look and perform, not least in terms of greater integration with mobile devices.

The new year's resolution

If 4K is the next step forward in TV, in hi-fi circles it's all about high-resolution audio. Sony unveiled its latest high-res, DSDsupporting NWZ-ZX2 Walkman. Neil Young, meanwhile, was extolling the virtues of his Pono Player – now on sale in the US. And again - as TVs proved - it won't all be about the hardware. Meridian Audio used the show as a stage on which to demonstrate the potential of MQA, a new format that aims to package more efficiently studio master quality files for downloading and, potentially, streaming. Tidal, which runs a CD-quality streaming service, confirmed to *What Hi-Fi*? that it is working with Meridian on a high-res streaming service.

A cinema experience... at home

Dolby Atmos has been labelled "the most significant development in cinema audio since surround sound" (by Dolby, admittedly) but it's not alone in wanting to shake up the home cinema market.

DTS:X is an "object-based codec technology" that made its debut at CES, with 90 per cent of major home AV companies set to launch products this year that support the codec. A rival to Atmos? Sounds like it.

2015 TV tech explained

Dolby Vision is billed as an end-to-end solution from the creation of content to distribution and playback. Philips, Hisense, Toshiba and TCL have said they will produce Dolby Vision TVs.

High Dynamic Range (HDR) promises more dynamic pictures, with deeper black levels and brighter colours. HDR content will be available to stream via Netflix and the Dolby Vision platform, while LG, Samsung and Sony have plans for HDR-ready TVs.

Quantum Dot adds a film in front of an LCD backlight to improve the reproduction rate of picture colour and overall brightness. LG, TCL and other brands have announced Quantum Dot TVs.

SUHD is Samsung's marketing term for the company's Quantum Dot TVs. We await LG rapidly devising of a similar rebranding exercise for the company's sets.

Three of the best 2015 TVs



Sony X90C

You'll need to take a good look at the image above to make sure you don't miss this TV. At just 4.9mm at its slimmest point, this new 4K TV from the Japanese tech giant is said to be the thinnest Ultra HD screen hitting shelves in 2015. It's one of six 4K models coming to the market this year from Sony, with 55in and 65in variants of the X9OC set to be available. No pricing has been confirmed as yet, but we do know that, like all Sony 2015 TVs, they'll sport a new Android TV platform.

Samsung SUHD TVs

Samsung is claiming to redefine what TV is capable of in terms of brightness, contrast, detail and colour reproduction with its three-strong range of SUHD TVs. The series ranges from 48 in to 88 in with the JS9500 (*below*), JS9000 (*below right*) and JS8500. One of the innovations involved is the SUHD re-mastering engine that analyses how bright an image is to minimise additional power consumption, without sacrificing contrast levels. The curved design has also been refined by Samsung for 2015.

LG EG9600

OLED is the way forward for LG this year, and the EG9600 (below) is among its Ultra HD 4K OLED line-up for 2015. It will be available in 55in and 65in screen sizes and, as you'll have noticed, comes with a curved design. However, LG will also have flat and even flexible OLEDs going on sale this year, with all the new TVs running WebOS 2.0 - the latest version of LG's smart interface that promises to be faster and more customisable.

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If you've just bought a new budget hi-fi system, the chances are you can improve it hugely from the get-go by upgrading the speakers. And there are some stunning options out there...

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(F.)

hether you're starting out on your hi-fi odyssey or just looking for another pair of speakers, the budget speaker market is in fine shape right now. For two years the much-loved Q Acoustics 2020i batted away all newcomers. But the arrival of Wharfedale's Diamond 220 just before last year's Awards season raised the bar - and put a halt to the winning streak of the 2020is.

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Spectal

Both return here, alongside an array of new contenders from Cambridge Audio, Monitor Audio, Polk and Teufel, all of them jostling for pole position. The brilliant Dali Zensor 1 also returns – aiming to keep their five stars for yet another year.

This test shows that if you've already got decent electronics, then a good pair of standmounters that cost no more than \pounds 200 can really make your system shine. The question is, which speakers will make it shine the brightest? The answer is only a few pages away...

SUPERTEST STEREO SPEAKERS



Cambridge Audio Aero 2 £150 ****

At first glance, the speaker looks unassumingly traditional - but look closer and you'll see that the 'tweeter' is actually a BMR driver We know the Aero range fairly well. Some of its speakers make up the Aero 5.1 home cinema speaker package that's been our Award-winner in the sub-£2000 category for two years on the bounce.

The range's Aero 2 standmounts are not part of that particular bundle, but they are now in the budget speaker market at £150 following a £50 price drop. You certainly get a lot of cabinet for your money: 37cm tall and similarly deep, the Aeros are chunky, which is not ideal for those short on space. But there are benefits to their size.

Cabinet discussion

These Aero 2s are not the most distinctive speakers to look at: the standard MDF cabinets are rather bland and straightedged. Still, the vinyl-wrap finish (in dark walnut or black) is tidy, well applied, and gives a classic look.

Play an epic orchestral track like John Williams's *Duel of the Fates* and the Aeros soar. Voices, horns and strings have scale and authority Something to note, both aesthetically and technically, is the speaker face – at first glance the baffle looks unassumingly traditional, but a closer look above the 16.5cm woofer reveals a BMR driver.

A clean handover

The BMRs cover a wider frequency range than a conventional tweeter (250Hz to 2kHz) which moves the crossover point to an area where our ears are less sensitive to the distortions inherent in any driver handover. The result is a cleaner, wellintegrated and widely dispersed sound. The soundstage is spacious and involving, filling our largest test room with precision.

The Aero's solidity and sure-footed delivery are impressive too, and the speakers don't need to be placed near a wall for this. If anything, the Aeros benefit from being pulled out slightly for better balance and tighter stereo imaging (30cm or so should do it). Play an epic orchestral track like John Williams's *Duel of the Fates* and the Aeros soar: choral vocals, frenzied strings and dominating French horns are given all the scale, authority and dynamics they require. They also render enough punch and rhythmic drive to get you on your feet during Michael Jackson's *Bad*. They aren't the be-all and end-all in vocal expression, however, struggling to match the Wharfedale Diamond 220s' level of insight into Jackson's emotional delivery during *I Just Can't Stop Loving You.* That said, vocals are clear and solid, and projected with such stunning focus and directness that you almost forget about the track's instrumentals.

The large cabinet facilitates the Aero's big bass, which is deep and controlled, if not as articulate as with the Wharfedales. The Wharfedales give more detail across the spectrum, too. So while you don't get the best sound from your music at this price, what you do get is an entertaining listen, especially when paired with big-sounding kit. The Aero 2s can hold their head high in a tough field.

Rating ★★★★☆

FOR Vast soundstage; good scale, authority and dynamics; competitive price

AGAINST Some rivals have more detail and subtlety; not the classiest-looking speaker

VERDICT A competitive performer, but not quite special enough to sit with the top rank



Dali Zensor 1 £200 ****

The partially-glossy cabinet of the Dali Zensor 1 is small and sturdy, while its design is clean and unfussy The superb Zensor 1s are never far from our thoughts when recommending budget speakers - even now when, after basking in five stars for the past four years, they lose one due to the arrival of even more talented newcomers.

The Dalis remained a front-runner even after the Q Acoustic 2020is claimed their crown in 2012, but now the bar has been raised again courtesy of Wharfedale's Diamond 220s. They no longer have quite the level of subtlety, refinement or dynamics to remain in the top tier. Still, one thing tough competition can't take away from the Dalis is the fact that they're simply a joy to listen to.

Magic within

There's no questioning their listenability: lively and musical, they make the most of Daft Punk's *Random Access Memories*. The Zensor 1s effortlessly belt out its

Dynamic insight usually makes or breaks speakers at this level, but the Dalis do not stumble. They're slick and agile as we spin *Within* funky tunes, firing energy into catchy beats with a potent sense of attack and rhythmic drive. Play one of the album's downtempo tracks, *Within*, and notes emerge with definition and weight. The Dalis sound more solid and sure-footed close to a rear wall (whether stood on stands or wall-mounted) and deliver greater low-end presence when positioned there.

Wide-open space

Considering the small size of the speakers, the openness of the soundstage takes you by surprise. You'll hear detail and balance, too. Bass is taut, and clean, sparkly highs meet a clear and communicative midrange. Dynamic insight usually makes or breaks speakers at this level, but the Dalis do not stumble. They're slick and agile enough for the piano of *Within* to come through fluidly. However, dynamics need a touch more expression (particularly in the quieter sections) and greater scale to match the Q Acoustics and Wharfedales of the budget speaker world.

The Zensor 1s, though, still have the talent to sit at the front of your system even after you've upgraded the rest of it.

Paired with kit one or two price points above - the Arcam A19 FMJ amp (£650) and Marantz CD6005 CD player (£350) combo, for example - they still shine.

Thankfully, build proves as strong as performance: their partially glossy cabinets are small and sturdy, meeting (rather than perhaps exceeding) expectations at this price. Design is clean and unfussy, although you'll have to look to Monitor Audio or Q Acoustics for something flashier.

However, the big selling point of the Zensor 1 is sound quality. And despite going down the pecking order a touch, they have certainly not fallen from grace. Overall, if you're after versatile, energetic little speakers that will entertain for years on end, then you need look no further.

Monitor Audio MR2 £160 ****

As with all 'bookshelf' speakers, the MR2s should really be placed on stands to sound at their best. They're not too fussy about room position, though It's music to shoppers' ears when an established hi-fi brand brings out an affordable speaker range. The BR (Bronze Reference) series was Monitor Audio's budget offering until it was replaced in 2010 by the slightly-pricier BX series. A year later, the company decided to redefine its 'meaning of entry-level' by introducing its most affordable range yet: the MR (Monitor Reference) series.

Back to the future

Essentially, the MR series is based (given a few tweaks here and there) on the old BR range, but at a lower price. We have the larger set of standmounters here and the MR2 packs a lot of technology in for its £160 price tag. Peeping out from underneath a protective metal-mesh grille is the company's long-utilised C-CAM (ceramic-coated aluminium/magnesium) tweeter: a rigid, yet light, composite design

There's a maturity to the sound that is rare at this level. When we play Michael Simone's *Any Other Name*, the Monitor Audio MR2s shine

gold-anodised to a specific thickness for improved rigidity and damping, while the MR2s also feature Monitor Audio's patented MMP II mid/bass driver.

Despite being at the affordable end of the company's offering, the MR2s have all the class and style we've come to expect from the brand. Beautifully finished in black oak or walnut vinyl, the front-ported cabinet has nicely rounded-off edges and a smart, yet traditional, fascia. The MR2s should be set on decent speaker stands (something like Atacama's Moseco 6s), but they aren't too picky about placement sat close to a wall or pulled out slightly, they're nicely balanced, detailed and as precise as they come at this price. They do sound a little less substantial out in the middle of a room, but not disastrously so.

Delicate notes

There's a maturity to the sound that is rare at this level. As we play Michael Simone's *Any Other Name*, the MR2s shine with insightful delicacy on the intimate piano notes. The sequence is full of variation, and each key is meticulously placed within the soundstage. The MR2s are just as pleasing with vocals too, as Kate Bush proves on 50 Words For Snow. The Monitor Audios reveal her unique delivery and emotional nuances well and this deftness isn't without vigour, either. It's hard to sit still during Michael Giacchino's *Married Life* (from the *Up* soundtrack): the playful, buoyant nature of the track is relayed to a T, delivering the orchestration with gusto and sufficient dynamism to accentuate its drama. Elsewhere, bass is tuneful and controlled. We find these speakers need around a 100-hour run-in for the treble to adequately integrate itself with the frequencies below, but even then they lack the refinement of some of their rivals.

Our new Award-winning Wharfedale Diamonds 220s set the bar for detail and dynamic subtlety the MR2s can't reach. And although this brings them down a level, they still do budget hi-fi very well.

Polk TSx220B £150 ****

The Polks are probably best in a larger room: not only are they big units, but they also sound better-balanced when placed away from a rear wall The TSx speaker range is Polk's new, revamped budget offering, which replaces its long-standing TSi range. Most entry-level ranges offer one speaker under £200, but the TSx range has two: these TSx220B standmounters, and a smaller version retailing at £100. Three floorstanders are also in the line-up, as are two centre speakers for anyone looking to use the range for a home-cinema set-up.

Crossover to the other side

The journey from 'i' to 'x' sees bigger drivers (16.5cm, up from 13cm) in most of the models - the layered construction used in the cones mixes pulp and polymer compounds to deliver rigidity without adding mass. Above this is the same 25mm silk/polymer dome tweeter. The crossover uses more advanced components, such as Mylar bypass capacitors (Polk says this helps produce a

There's ample bass and good lowend extension. But lots of bass can mean a trade-off in agility and that's the case here with the Polks detailed treble). This range also sees curved cabinets being introduced. The company claims this makes for a more rigid structure, and also helps reduce undesirable standing waves inside the box, leading to a clearer sound.

The 220Bs look nice - the box's distinct shape and tasteful 'cherry' vinyl wrap on our sample gives an imposing air for a sub-£200 speaker (they're also available in black oak).

Too edgy

The Polks are big: 37cm tall and 32cm deep. They might pose a problem for those short on space, especially considering they sound better balanced away from a rear wall. They're as solid and heavy as they look - we'd like the sharp corners and edges rounded-off slightly.

Move on to sound and we're amazed (though not hugely surprised, considering their size) at how big and powerfulsounding the 220Bs are.

The Polks blast out the boisterous instrumental in the Philharmonic Wind Orchestra's *Theme from Chronicles of Narnia: Prince Caspian* with power and scale and, given a bit of room, the speakers deliver a tonally balanced sound that's clean and clear. Flutes soar, and the instrument has just enough separation to prevent the presentation sounding congested.

There's ample bass and good low-end extension too: drums rumble and trombones are deep-seated. Lots of bass can often mean a trade-off for speed and agility, and that's the case here, with the Polks lacking. We want them to gallop through Prince's *I Wanna Be Your Lover*, but they deliver a slow and stodgy canter. Dynamics require more punch and subtlety, too. Vocals have good clarity and focus, but the TSx220Bs can't relay Prince's snappiness.

Ultimately, the Polks rely on first impressions, muscle and scale to impress. Unfortunately for them, class rivals offer a more polished performance all round.

Q Acoustics 2020i £150 ****

Q Acoustics' Concept 20 stands are a match made in heaven for the 2020is. The cheaper, Award-winning Atacama Moseco 6s are well suited too If Q Acoustics wants to make sure its Award-winning 2020is retain their five stars after being usurped by the new-kid-in-town Wharfedale Diamond 220s, it's going the right way about it. After a price drop, they can now be yours for a tempting £150, as long as you want them in graphite or walnut finishes (the glossy black or white versions still carry a £50 premium).

Product placement

Either choice of vinyl wrap makes for gorgeous aesthetics thanks to the solid, curved-cornered cabinet, which is one of the most attractive and well built in the budget market. Compact, and unfussy with placement too, the 2020is should be easy to house. You'll get the best from them if they have a little room to breathe, but despite the rear-firing port they sound quite comfortable close to a

It's always a treat pressing play with the 2020is at the end of a system and a spin of Broken Bells' eponymous album reminds us why rear wall. Q Acoustics' own Concept 20 speaker stands (actually designed for the more expensive Concept 20s) are a match made in heaven, both performance-wise and aesthetically (though the cheaper, Award-winning Atacama Moseco 6s are more pricecompatible). If you're upgrading your other components as well, or building a system from scratch, the Marantz CD6005 CD player (£350) and PM6005 amp duo (£280) will fit the bill nicely – and all for under four figures.

With bells on

It's always a treat pressing play with the 2020is at the end of a system - and a quick spin of Broken Bells' eponymous album reminds us why. Their presentation is well balanced and exquisitely musical, demonstrating dynamic punch and agility that's usually only found in pricier speakers. There's plenty of resolution here too.

The wide-open and explicit soundstage is all-encompassing, multilayered and precise. We play Pink Floyd's *Louder Than Words* and the 2020is deliver the song with aplomb. They give instruments body and texture, and deliver vocals with a wealth of insight. The speakers' midrange is sandwiched by clear and refined highs, and a full, solid bass. Not afraid to reveal an attacking edge, the 2020is dig into the meaty guitar riffs. But where there's authority and verve, there's also control and poise. Guitars soar through the choir, and instrument differentiation is precise.

It's only in a direct head-to-head with the new Wharfedale Diamond 22Os that we realise the Q Acoustics no longer sit at the head of the table. The Wharfedales are a touch more dynamic and subtle, and slightly tighter when it comes to timing and delivering rhythms.

Still, sonically and aesthetically the Q Acoustics are a triumph. Though trumped by slightly more talented competition, they remain exceptional speakers.

Teufel Ultima 20 mk2 £150 ****

The gloss baffle will split opinions with its exposed screws and striking mid/bass driver. The bulletshaped phase plug at its centre to aid integration **Teufel might not** be a brand that springs to mind when thinking of hi-fi speakers, but the German company planted its roots in the speaker market more than three decades ago. Its budget Ultima range has been around a while - we reviewed Teufel's floorstanders in 2009. They made an impression for their affordability, and we're pleased to report that same affordability is present in the standmounts too.

Punching above their price

The quality of build and finish on the Ultima 20 mk2s makes you think they belong in a higher bracket than this. Sturdy and built to last, the curvy cabinets are wrapped in a smart black finish that's clearly been applied with care. As design goes, the busy gloss baffle will surely split opinion with its exposed screws and striking mid/bass driver - its

The quality of build and finish on the Teufel Ultima 20 mk2s gives the impression they belong in a higher price-bracket than this orange-coloured cone has a bulletshaped phase plug at its centre to help sound integration.

It's a more familiar affair around the back though: a bass reflex port sits above a single set of speaker terminals.

But are the Ultima 20s the bargain we hope they are? In short, no - but they do get the basics right. There's decent body to their sound, and presentation is fairly balanced. The Teufels happily run through everything, from Pink Floyd to Prince, with decent solidity and clarity.

Off the wall

Their talents really stand out with bassy songs. Although bass isn't the tightest or most controlled we've heard at this price, the Teufels are generous. Don't put them too close to a rear wall, though - the presentation becomes a bit bottom heavy. We would put them 45cm or so away from a rear wall for best balance.

Toeing them in slightly gives vocals more focus too: Norah Jones's voice is rich and clear, although we find expression in short supply. The vocal doesn't have the trademark nuance revealed by the best sub-£200 speakers. It seems the Ultima 20s opt for substance over transparency and, ultimately, a lack of detail across the frequencies is their undoing - they don't possess the subtlety or dynamic insight to challenge the very best.

Trouble at the top

We'd like more refinement in the midrange and top end, too. The midrange can feel shouty, making the presentation sound uncomfortably edgy, while treble can sound scratchy. Couple that with a lack of spaciousness in the soundstage and you have a presentation that is at times troubled by higher volumes, and messy during playback of dense music.

So while the Ultima 20 mk2s show promising foundations (good build, fair clarity and balance) they fall well short of being a product we'd happily recommend.

Wharfedale Diamond 220 £180 ****

The solidity and authority of the Diamond 220s relies on them being placed near a wall. Pulled too far out in the open, and that sure-footedness is diluted somewhat Wharfedale took our one grumble (a poor finish) about the mainly superb Diamond 121s on the chin and rectified it in their replacement, the Diamond 220s. The result? A brilliant-sounding speaker with a neat design that also became an Award-winner, ending the two-year reign of the Q Acoustic 2020is. They've come down £20 since our first review, too.

Smooth finish

The composite cabinet of chipboard and MDF remains from the 121s, but now the smoother MDF panels have been moved to the outside, so the vinyl glues on better. The blackwood vinyl on our sample is ripple-free (walnut pearl, rosewood quilted or white finishes are the other options) and there are other improvements too: below the same 25mm soft dome tweeter is a 13cm woven Kevlar mid/bass driver. now with a bigger

Surprisingly for their size, the Wharfedale Diamond 220s have the low-end ability to eat up even the thickest basslines magnet, said to make it easier to drive and improve responsiveness. There's also an improved crossover for better integration.

Whole lotta Led

Also, the unusual slot-loaded port, first seen on the 100 series, has been tweaked to reduce distortion. Rather than the popular bass-reflex design, this port fires downwards into a small air gap between the cabinet and plinth below, helping port efficiency and making the speakers less fussy about placement. The arrangement pays off: surprisingly for their size, the Wharfedales have the low-end ability to eat up even the thickest basslines (Led Zeppelin's *Dazed and Confused*, for example). Bass is deep and agile too.

There's a sense of power and scale we'd normally expect from a much larger box than the 32cm-tall Diamonds. Their solidity and authority throughout the frequency range relies on placement near or against a rear wall: pull them out too far in the open and that sure-footedness is diluted slightly - bass notes are looser and vocals lose a bit of substance. Talking of vocals, the 220s' clear and candid delivery is very expressive - run through Eminem's *Relapse* album and his choppy raps are communicated effortlessly. The good news continues where integration is concerned, with everything tying together nicely.

It's the Diamonds' level of insight and dynamic aptitude that really lifts them above their peers. In Grieg's *Piano Concerto*, instruments are packed with variation and subtlety - piano sequences are fluid and telling, violins textured. Dynamic presence in even the quietest sections helps convey the gradual build of the piece. The 220s seem as happy delivering drama - as the orchestration gains impetus, they simply go along with the ride.

The talented Diamond 220s will likely be the jewel in the crown of any budget or even mid-range - set-up. Would we go as far as saying they're one of the best hi-fi products you can buy below £200? Without a doubt.

Wharfedale Diamond 220 £180 ****

> In a highly competitive field, the **Wharfedale Diamond 220s** manage to retain their title by offering verve, value and plenty of versatility

he budget speaker market is so competitive and dynamic right now that revisiting our favourite models on a regular basis has become imperative. The revised status of the Dali Zensor 1s in this test shows why. Although their five-star standing managed to survive the arrival of the more talented Q Acoustics 2020i in 2012, the Zensor 1s have finally conceded a star - and all due to the even more remarkable Wharfedale Diamond 220s. We still like the Dalis immensely, even if they are £20 pricier than the test-winning Wharfedales. The Zensor 1s are bags of fun to listen to: fast, musical, and with a good grasp of rhythms. They're great if you need speakers that must sit against a wall too.

Esteemed colleague

The esteemed Q Acoustics, on the other hand, preserve their five stars. For £150, you won't find better. Would we spend £30 more to buy the Wharfedales? Sure, but that doesn't detract from the fact the 2020is are fantastic little speakers - open, punchy, dynamic, and happy to perform wherever they're placed in a room. Now for the test victor. The Wharfedales keep the title they battled so hard for in last year's Awards season. The Diamond 22Os are budget hi-fi at its very best - the speakers have a wonderfully informative, measured, yet musical sound that will make them enjoyable additions for your microsystem or hi-fi separates for years to come. The Wharfedales are comfortable partnered with electronics double (even three times) their price, too. Put them to use with transparent speaker cables and decent stands, and they won't disappoint.

Best of the rest

Of the speakers that are new to our test rooms, there are good and not-so-good performances. The Monitor Audio MR2 and Cambridge Audio Aero 2 are the best of the rest, with four stars apiece. The MR2s are yet another solid entry from the British company, flying the flag for precision and scale, but lacking absolute refinement in the treble. The Aero 2s, meanwhile, meet our expectations for the company's successful Aero range, and appeal with a big and dynamic presentation. As with the Dalis, though, neither can quite muster enough detail, nor render the dynamic subtlety needed, to compete with the very best in this group.

A lack of get-up-and-go

Moving down the pecking order, we have the Polk TSx220Bs. Demonstrating as much solidity in their rugged build as in their performance, the TSx220Bs are hearty performers. Decent scale and bass are the big plus points, but ultimately they lack enough insight, or the get-up-and-go needed for our music. A low entertainment factor leaves the Polks languishing behind the rest of the field.

Handing out two stars isn't something we take joy in, but the Teufel Ultima 20 mk2s leave us with little choice. Their solid build and big, bassy sound (in a positive way) is outweighed by a dynamically flat, and not particularly detailed or refined, delivery.

In most tests, there will be products we'd give a wide berth to (the Teufels being the case this time) and others we cannot praise highly enough. The Wharfedales earn that distinction.



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HEAD TO HEAD

Found in translation

The business of converting digital to analogue should be taken seriously. These two do just that, and the benefits are plain to hear **igital music has** transformed our listening habits, but to take advantage of it we need to convert that digital signal into an analogue version we can play. Most digital devices - phones, laptops, CD players - have their own built-in DAC, but they're of varying quality and can strip your music of more than you realise.

Upgrade your DAC and you'll hear your music transformed in terms of detail, dynamics, organisation and timing. And once you've got that far, well, there's really no going back.

Two hi-fi heavyweights go head to head for your affections here - read on to find out where your money is best spent.

Chord Hugo £1400 $\star \star \star \star \star$

We've made no secret of our love for the Chord Hugo. How it has managed to squeeze so much into such a compact box, without sacrificing an ounce of sound quality, is nothing short of astounding - we can't remember a time we enjoyed digital music more.

Ample connectivity

Let's just recap what's on offer here an impressive range of connections, including optical, coax and twin USB inputs, with aptX Bluetooth for wireless signals. It can't quite top the choice of the Oppo HA-1 - there's no analogue inputs or balanced options here - but it should still suit most circumstances.

Alongside these inputs there's a 6.3mm headphone output and a pair of 3.5mm alternatives, plus a pair of line-level outs for using the Hugo as a digital pre-amplifier.

Sound good? Add to that portability and a 12-hour battery life, and the flexibility of the Hugo (which can go anywhere 'you go' - geddit?) adds to its charm. All this before you even listen to it, and that's where it really impresses.



The Hugo accepts input signals up to 32-bit/384kHz, but only through one USB input. The other is saved for use with tablets and phones, and is limited to 16-bit/48kHz. Despite its high-res capabilities, the Hugo is as at home with a 320kbps Spotify stream as it is with a meaty PCM or DSD file (up to DSD128).

There's stacks of detail up for grabs, the Chord delivering much more insight to the finer nuances of a track than the HA-1. This, in turn, gives way to a greater level of dynamic subtlety, timing and organisation that we've not heard from any other DAC at this price.

This more transparent nature means it's not as smooth a listen as the HA-1, and not as forgiving at lower-bitrate tracks, but even then you tend not to focus on a recording's shortcomings, thanks to the Hugo's inherently musical approach.

You get out what you put in

Of course, it really shines when fed the best of signals, and a DSD file of Stevie Wonder's *Higher Ground* powers forward with the heart and energy we found lacking on the HA-1. It's a masterclass in timing and rhythmic know-how, and is dynamically hard to fault - the bouncing bassline is delivered with absolute precision without sounding uptight.

The intimacy and expression with which it delivers vocals is obvious in a playthrough of Ladysmith Black Mambazo's *Lord's Work*. Harmonies are textured, fluid and beautifully presented. Tonally it's wonderfully natural and a little more even-handed than the Oppo, making it easy to fit into any system.

When placed into our reference system, hooked up to our Bryston 4BSST2 power amp and ATC SCM50 speakers, it doesn't drop a beat, delivering an entertaining and insightful sound, even squeezing out a touch more clarity in the process that we would normally get. Consider its ability to fill in for a £5000 pre-amp without a worry and the Hugo's £1400 price tag starts to look like quite the bargain.

None better at the price

There's no doubt the Hugo is the best-sounding DAC and headphone amp we've heard at this price, and when you add in its portability it becomes a quite superb proposition.

The Chord Hugo is nothing less than a stunning achievement - a multi-talented device that will transform your music listening so much you'll wonder what you ever did without it.

Oppo HA-1 £1200 ★★★★☆

Oppo is a name more traditionally associated with high-end Blu-ray players, but more recently it's been making moves in new territories. Last year saw us dishing out five stars to its first pair of headphones, the excellent PM1s, not to mention a commendable four stars to one of its first smartphones.

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New territory

This portfolio expansion continues with the HA-1, its first DAC and headphone amp. Presented in a sturdy, well-built aluminium chassis in a choice of black or silver, it certainly knows how to make a good first impression, with a bright 4.3in colour display and equally smart remote control to back it up (there's also a control app if you prefer).

The screen on the front offers a simple graphical interface when it comes to choosing your source, and offers technical information on the audio signal - as a digital VU meter or a more modern spectrum display (you choose).

Inside the HA-1 you'll find the same ESS 9018 Sabre32 Reference DAC and output driving stage used in Oppo's high-end Blu-ray players, alongside a



Class A amplifier, meaning the HA-1 runs quite warm as a result.

When it comes to connections, the HA-1 is no slouch, offering users the choice of both RCA or XLR balanced analogue inputs and outputs, with its digital inputs including coaxial, optical, AES/EBU, and an asynchronous USB. Add to this an Apple-compatible USB-A input on the front of the device, along with Bluetooth aptX functionality, plus the ability to double up as a stereo pre-amp, and there's not much the HA-1 is missing on paper.

We plug in a pair of Beyerdynamic TIs and fire up our music library. The HA-1 is capable of playing back PCM files up to 24-bit/384kHz and both DSD64 and DSD128 (via USB-B).

It's a big, open and refined sound that's decently detailed and offers a richer, weightier presentation than the Chord Hugo. It also has a smoother character, making it a forgiving listen with lesser-quality tracks, but one that sacrifices a layer of detail and dynamics in the process, rounding off drive and attack a little and making it sound altogether more restrained.

Energy levels

Play Run The Jewels' *Oh My Darling Don't Cry* and while the rumbling bass line has a real presence, the high-pace lyrics and impatient instrumental lack the same level of energy you'll hear if you play the same track through the Hugo.

It ultimately comes down to timing and dynamics. The Oppo is simply not as rhythmically adept as the Hugo, and isn't capable of injecting the same level of

DESIGN

Everything about the Oppo feels well considered, from the responsive volume and source knobs to the quality connections. It's built for true audiophiles.

excitement and fluidity to a track. Plugging the HA-1 into our main system and taking audio from our MacBook Pro shows similar traits. The lively intro to Stevie Wonder's *Higher Ground* lacks the same level of bounce and dynamism that the Hugo offers, and vocals sound less expressive and direct.

Revealing reference point

We test the HA-1's claimed pre-amplifier prowess and, as often with products of this type, we found it to be no substitute for our reference preamp, sounding overall weaker and less dynamic.

There's a lot to like about the HA-1. It's well built, excellently specified and has a refined, weighty sound. Many will love the choice it offers, but for the full five stars we want levels of drive, excitement and dynamics to challenge the Hugo. The Oppo falls short by a margin.

Apple TV **£80 ★★★★**☆



It is a truth universally acknowledged that Apple will always do its own thing. Take media streamers, for example. This sector has changed a great deal in the last year alone, but the folks at Cupertino have done little to the Apple TV.

The company simply calls this the Apple TV. Its real name is the Apple TV (3rd generation) Rev A. That is to say, this is a slightly tweaked version of the Apple TV released in 2012.

Its chipset has been redesigned to use less power. It costs less to produce, and the retail price has come down a little. Essentially, this is a device launched about three years ago. Is it a fossil, or a timeless design?

Members only

First, some ground rules. This is Apple, so things inevitably fall a certain way. The priority is iTunes and Apple devices. If you don't have an account, or a Mac computer, or an iOS device, you will not get the most out of the Apple TV.

This is Apple's way, which contrasts with the Google Chromecast's welcoming approach to iOS and Android devices alike. It's frustrating, but not surprising.

It's beautifully made, and a dream for Apple devotees. Others will find little to enjoy

VIP treatment. The Apple TV can play anything and everything you've bought through iTunes. You can also mirror the screen of your Mac or iOS device using Apple AirPlay over your home's network.

Bypass your network

The latest firmware allows direct AirPlay between the Apple TV and devices running either iOS8 or OSX Yosemite with no need for a network.

If that's not enough for you, you can buy or rent films, shows and music right there on the Apple TV. The shop front is right at the top of the screen, in a carousel. You have access to Apple's entire library right there, so you can watch until you dry out your eyes (or bank account). Video quality is good, going up to 1080p. You also get Dolby Digital 5.1 passthrough, where applicable.

Tired of iTunes? There is... not much else. The app offering is meagre compared with others here. The only stars are Netflix, Now TV and YouTube.

We are well familiar with Apple's 'walled garden' approach, but it's hard not to be frustrated in this age of choice. And it's not like you can bring your own bottle to the party, either: you can't stream from your networked computer or NAS drive, nor add a USB stick.

The device has the following ports: power, HDMI out, microUSB (for service only), optical out, and ethernet. There's wi-fi too. Naturally build quality is faultless, and it gets better still when we caress the remote control, a minimalist wand of aluminium. Operation is typical of Apple: super-slick (although set-up and firmware updates are fiddly).

The Apple TV is a gorgeous piece of kit, and for those who have bought into Apple's way everything is lovely. But we don't think that's enough anymore, especially when similar money buys the versatile Roku 3. Loosen up, eh, Apple?

Google Chromecast **£30 ******



TV on a stick! That's what Google promised with the Chromecast. And while it has made waves in the US in the past year, it is fairly new to UK shores.

Cast away your preconceptions

The first thing you need to know is that this is not a streamer in the traditional sense. You do not boot it up and choose from a content menu. Instead, you 'cast'.

Casting is Google's funky new way of streaming, built around the notion that most people have wi-fi at home and smartphones in hand. You begin with a mobile app. Find content you like, tap the 'cast' button, and it pings up on your TV. You don't actually send anything directly from your phone (or tablet) to the screen. It conspires with the Chromecast over your wi-fi network. The phone merely acts as a remote control, while the Chromecast plucks content directly from the internet.

The idea is to do away with boxes under the TV, along with the fight for the remote. Just find what you like on your phone, and push it to the big screen. Easy.

If there is a catch, it is the matter of compatibility: not all apps can cast.



Netflix, YouTube and Google Play in mind. Thankfully, Google has an open approach, and more are springing up all the time. Now there is a long list, which includes Now TV, Blinkbox, BT Sport and BBC iPlayer. There's no sign of 40D, ITV Player or Amazon Instant Video yet, but already the Chromecast offers more choice than the Apple TV.

The Chromecast is also hospitable. It doesn't seem to care whether you use Android or iOS. We managed to control it using both an LG G3 and an iPhone 5 with similar levels of performance.

Web pages on the telly

Another trick is the ability to cast webpages. Download a free extension on the Chrome browser and you'll be able to mirror individual tabs on your TV. This feature is still officially in beta testing, however - dropouts are not unusual.

The device outputs a crisp, stable picture that goes up to 1080p. It's also capable of Dolby Digital Plus 5.1 sound.

Overall, Chromecast works very well. Casting may seem an odd idea, but it feels perfectly natural - not to mention cool. Ideally, you'll want a good wi-fi connection. This ensures quality of performance, but also lets your phone or tablet maintain control. If your broadband is a bit sketchy, you'll be treated to adaptive streaming. Picture quality will adjust itself, downscaling to keep moving and avoid buffering.

The real wonder is how Google has crammed it all into a device barely larger than a memory stick. The sole output is an HDMI plug. Power comes by a bundled USB cable, and if you don't have a spare port in your TV you can use the adaptor.

We really like the Google Chromecast. It's a novel idea that works very well, and only promises to get better as developer support increases. For £30 - or even less online - you cannot go wrong.

Now TV Box £10 ****



Yes, it really is only £10. Back in 2013, Sky's Now TV box was a game changer. It provided a cheap way to make any HDMI-equipped TV a smart TV.

But since then streaming has taken off, with new devices now promising more features than the last. And so it is time to revisit this budget wonder.

Generation game

What you're getting is really a lastgeneration Roku LT, subsidised and rebadged by Sky. The company isn't shy about this, either: the shape, remote control and menus are all unashamedly Roku. But regardless of the manufacturer, this is Sky's show. The Now TV branding is everywhere. It is the top app in the menu, and there's even a dedicated Now TV-button on the remote.

So what is Now TV? It is a strippeddown Sky service, divided into three sections: Movies, Entertainment, and Sports. You buy passes for each of these. A Movies pass gives you unlimited access to Sky Movies for £10-per-month. There are over 1000 titles, with an emphasis on newer releases (there are classics too). The Entertainment pass gives you TV

are from 13 major channels, including Sky 1, Arts, Living and Atlantic as well as ABC and Comedy Central. Alongside big hitters (24, Futurama, Modern Family), you get some of the latest shows before they're even on disc. Sports passes are a different deal. You get day passes and week passes (£7 and £11 respectively), with access to all six Sky Sports channels.

content for £7 per month - programmes

Sky without the dish

Each of these passes let you catch up TV you've missed, or tune into live broadcasts. So essentially, you get most of the benefits of Sky, without hefty subscription fees and satellite dishes. A recent development is the availability of box packages: £20 gets you a box and a three-month Movies or Entertainment pass (or two-day Sports passes).

The Roku Channel Store has a decent choice of free apps: the UK's four main catch-up services, as well as BBC News, Sky News, Spotify and YouTube. However, Netflix, for example, is nowhere to be seen. Nor Amazon Instant Video. On the hardware side, the Now TV box is unsurprisingly stripped-back - the back features an HDMI output, mini-jack AV-out for analogue audio and video, and a power connection. Internet connection is strictly wi-fi - there's no ethernet port.

There's a maximum resolution of 720p, with 5.1 surround sound capability. However, many rivals offer Full HD 1080p to further outgun the Now TV box. Then there's the ubiquity of the Now TV app, which transfers the Now TV Box's presence to just about any other smart device (including newer TVs and consoles), making this kit less essential.

But despite all this, we still have a soft spot for this miniature hero. It is still a decent, smart offering for people with older TVs, and that price has yet to be beaten. Even after a year-and-a-half, Sky still offers great value for money.

Roku 3 **£100 ******



If Darth Vader had a hockey puck, it would be a little like the Roku 3. It's a tiny device that does a lot more than its appearance suggests.

Roku has made several streaming devices, but this is easily the best one we've seen. For starters, it is seriously fast. Whatever command you enter, the Roku 3 will comply with full thrusters.

We manage to wake the device, load up Netflix and start playing something in the time it took for the Roku Streaming Stick to merely wake up. If you have little patience and want your content right now, this will bring a smile to your face.

Speed and simplicity

It's a good performance, too. Videos load to 100 per cent and Full HD 1080p with little buffering. You can also pass through Dolby Digital 7.1 surround sound if you have an appropriate set-up. It's a very simple device in terms of hardware: there's no power button, because it uses less than 3.5W in standby mode (less than a typical nightlight). It also means the device can update its own firmware when you're not around. The only sign of life is a tiny white LED in the corner.

The 'Private Listening' feature transfers the TV sound to the remote control

connections, considering the size of the Roku 3 - an ethernet socket makes us happy; wi-fi is handy, but hard-wiring will ensure a more secure connection.

Remote access

A microSD card slot lets you expand the device's storage, in case you download too many apps and games. A USB port lets you play your own files. File compatibility could be better (MP4, MKV, AAC, MP3, JPG, PNG) but apps like 'Plex' let you stream your own content from a networked computer. Video output is via HDMI. If you have an older TV with only analogue connections, you'll have to look at another streamer in Roku's range.

The remote control is worth mentioning: it communicates wirelessly with the Roku 3, so you can tuck the box away. More impressive, though, is the 'Private Listening' feature. Plug headphones into the remote and the TV will mute, transferring its sound to the remote. Sound quality won't amaze you, but it's better than turning the sound down and switching on subtitles (don't bother with the bundled buds, though). The remote control also doubles up as a games controller, with extra buttons and motion sensors for simple games.

On to content, and Roku has a good offering: all the big names, Netflix, Now TV, YouTube and Spotify, as well as the UK's four catch-up services. There are more, but they are very niche offerings.

Oh, and one final bonus. The Roku 3 allows basic casting - you can use your phone to send Netflix and YouTube videos to the TV. It's not quite the Google Chromecast's library, but it works well.

We are very happy with the Roku 3. It is pricey compared with rivals, but its list of features is impressive, and leaves the similarly priced Apple TV far behind. Factor in the super-slick operational speeds and Roku is on to a winner.

Roku Streaming Stick **£40 *****



It's all in the name: it's a stick, and it streams. That's about as literal as it gets. We'll start with the 'stick' bit. The size and shape is comparable to that of the Google Chromecast. Think of a chunky memory stick, with an HDMI plug at the end of it, that goes directly into your TV or AV receiver.

Right end of the stick

At the other end of the stick is a microUSB port for power. The bundled cable goes into a spare USB port on your TV; if you don't have one you can use the bundled mains adaptor. It's not very neat, but you're unlikely to notice it tucked behind your screen. You also get a remote control, which communicates with the Streaming Stick wirelessly.

Now let's get ready to Roku. Fire it up and you're invited to connect to your wi-fi network. You then go to the Roku website and open a free account. Here you choose the apps you want, which are then placed on the stick (don't worry, you can add individual apps too).

The Roku way is straightforward, and is similar across the company's devices, including the Roku 3. The menu opens

market (free and paid for) and your chosen apps (or 'channels', as Roku insists in calling them). You'll find a good selection: Netflix, Now TV, YouTube, Spotify and the UK's main four catch-up services along with hundreds of niche, pointless ones. Sadly, there's no sign of Amazon Prime Instant Video.

up with three choices: settings, an app

Casting call

There's also 'casting', which is the Google Chromecast's party trick (choosing content on a compatible mobile app and shooting it to your TV screen). The stick fetches the content from the internet, while your phone or tablet acts as the remote control. Video output goes up to a crisp 1080p, but what you actually get depends on the app you use and, most importantly, the strength of your wi-fi. Sound-wise, the Stick supports Dolby Digital Plus 7.1.

All good so far. But things begin to unravel when we compare the Roku Streaming Stick with its big brother the Roku 3, and with the Google Chromecast. These other options highlight a number of flaws here. Operation is fine, but next to the Roku 3, the Streaming Stick is slower and more hesitant. Try to scroll through 10 titles on Netflix and the Streaming Stick struggles. Its loading times are longer too, both on start-up and when booting up an app.

The disparity between the two Roku devices is due to a difference in processing power, and yes, the Roku 3 is pricier, but it also offers more features. As for casting, the Google Chromecast's expanding library of apps leaves the Streaming Stick well behind. It's also not unusual for the Stick to choke on a cast, while the Chromecast casts effortlessly.

When we first reviewed the Roku Streaming Stick, we gave it five stars. It's still an impressive little package for the money, but there are better alternatives.

Affordable options for smartening up your telly are growing all the time but, for the time being, the **Roku 3** tops our list

e just watched a lot of TV. By the end, it was clear that one device had stayed plugged in the longest, by far.

That's the Roku 3. We love it the most for many reasons. Its speed. Its connections. Its laundry-list of features, including the ability to connect headphones into the controller and listen, erm, remotely.

These reasons, combined with a generous selection of apps, make the Roku 3 the most versatile and pleasant box in this selection.

Sure, it's on the pricey side. But so is the Apple TV, which has a weighty price tag despite offering nowhere near as much freedom as the Roku 3. It does offer excellent build quality, and for Apple users product integration is unparallelled. We only wish Apple would play better with others.

On the other end of the spectrum is the Now TV Box: cheap as two portions of chips but limited in features and specs. It's been outgunned, but remains a good first step into streaming.

Then we have the sticks. We love the Google Chromecast's innovative and intuitive mobile-based antics. It's great to use, with a good number of compatible apps, and that number is only growing. We'd take that over the Roku Streaming Stick, which offers more apps, but costs more and doesn't perform anywhere near as seamlessly.

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any of us carry music around on a smartphone, but listening through a pair of headphones is quite a lonely pursuit. Why not share the love (and your music collection) through the medium of a portable Bluetooth speaker instead?

If you start thinking sound quality has to take a hit, think again. You can still get great audio from a small, affordable and mobile package. In this test we present a handful of options, so let us put you on the path to finding the one you will want nestling in your pocket.

Yamaha NX-P100

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Bayan Audio Soundbook Go

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Philips BT3500B

BAYAN AUDIO SOUNDBOOK GO £72 ★★★☆☆

Scan the market and you will quickly discover that Bluetooth speaker design tends to involve a rectangle of some sort.

Bayan has opted for a sloping rectangle with just enough tilt to fire music up and towards the listener. Available in three different colours (blue, red or white), each speaker comes with its own Apple-esque magnetic cover. It lies across and protects the speaker when not in use, and provides a firm base when flipped underneath.

Take care with sticky fingers

The colourful glossy finish stands out, but there's a price to pay: it easily shows up greasy paw prints and it didn't take long for the speaker to become a bit grubby. In terms of features the Bayan is fairly competitive against the rest of the pack: there's an integrated mic, a 3.5mm auxiliary input for connecting alternative sources, and near-field communication (NFC) pairing. But there's no battery

indicator - Bayan claims it lasts seven hours, so the built-in battery falls short of the Pure Voca and Roberts Travel Pad.

However it's sound quality that is crucial for this type of kit, and the Bayan's overall balance is nicely judged. Highs don't jar as especially harsh or uncomfortable. There's decent



weight to low-frequency rumblings, yet it avoids sounding thick or woolly. Play OK Go's *Here It Goes Again* and the snappy mids are nicely taut and firm.

Where the Soundbook Go falls down is when it comes to musicality. Tracks don't sing with enough rhythm. The Bayan doesn't communicate the swing and enthusiasm of Sam and Dave's *Soul Man*, and it struggles to accommodate the more subtle dynamic demands of Stephen Fretwell's *Run*. A speaker such as the Philips BT3500B has a better grasp of the music and shows greater versatility across the range. The Bayan puts in a decent shift, but you couldn't place it among the top performers. Class leaders at this level deliver superior sound quality and features.

DAMSON VULCAN £100 ★★★☆☆

For small, portable Bluetooth speakers, it isn't easy overcoming the laws of physics. Trying to create large-scale audio from a small box is a tricky undertaking. Damson hopes to create a big, bold sound and spread it further and wider than its competitors by having more drive units and being smarter with their positioning. Besides a subwoofer, there are four drivers inside the Vulcan: two fire towards you, while the other two launch sound of out the sides.

And, to its credit, the Vulcan disperses its sound reasonably well there isn't the localised feel apparent through the Bayan Audio Soundbook Go. The Vulcan can be pushed relatively hard for a speaker of its type, and there's decent weight and body to the sound at high and low volumes. Play The Strokes' *Under Cover Of Darkness* and you can follow the trail of the bass guitar without issue. Highs sound a tad brash and lack some finesse, but they don't annoy or sound offensive. The Damson seems to do something strange to vocals. Compared

with the rest of the way music is delivered, voices sound compressed and recessed, as if they're coming from a separate speaker altogether. On Sam Smith's *Stay With Me*, there's good weight as piano keys are struck, but there's a lack of freedom and expression in his voice.

A touch of the Curate's Egg?

The Vulcan's an interesting shape: think along the lines of a small rugby ball, with the ends sliced off. The black grilles are magnetic and can be interchanged with red or white options (£20 each). The buttons on top feel a bit cheap, while a light inside the Damson logo shows if you're paired, and indicates when the built in battery-has reached full capacity (battery life is an impressive 12 hours). There's NFC pairing, a 3.5mm input, plus a built-in mic for hands-free calling. A carry-bag is also included for extra protection.

For the money, the Damson isn't a disappointment, but on the other hand it doesn't really set our world on fire. The way it handles vocals is particularly strange, and you'll find better all-round options elsewhere.

PHILIPS BT3500B £70 * * * * *



We wouldn't normally accuse a product of lying down on the job, but we're making an exception with the Philips. The BT3500B can stand either on its edge, or you can flip out its kickstand and lay it down in a shallow recline. This way it fires up into the air and encourages a bigger spread of sound, while also removing the fear that it could topple over. The only slight downside when it is in a near-horizontal position is that music loses a little precision and focus, but if you're more intent on filling a room with sound, then it'll do the job just fine.

Dial up the sound

Other aspects of the speaker's appearances are pretty unspectacular. The only real accent of note is the silver dial tucked in the upper right-hand corner of the unit: you rotate this dial clockwise or anti-clockwise to change volume. On the top edge of the Philips is a slider switch, which flicks between Bluetooth mode and the 3.5mm

auxiliary input. There's a button next door, which either starts the pairing process or ends any phone-call taken through the built-in mic. Another step along is an NFC logo, for an alternative way to pair a smartphone.



The built-in battery is charged using a micro-USB cable, which comes supplied in the box.

Battery life is only five hours, which is disappointing considering some rivals can offer double this.

Stream a few bars of The Clash's *I Fought The Law* and the Philips rocks along enthusiastically. Drums and handclaps have pep and vigour, electric guitars have just the right amount of edge. There isn't quite the clarity or outright detail in the mids and highs compared with the Roberts Travel Pad, but the Philips offers a slightly fuller, more rounded sound. Play Kanye West's *Black Skinhead* and the bassline is tight and well behaved. There's much more control in the lows here compared with playing the same track on the Pure Voca.

We'd like more from the built-in battery, but the BT3500B hits the spot with the time it has got, thanks to its all-round sonic ability.

PURE VOCA £65 ★★★★☆

Pure's Voca looks and feels like a quality product. The wrap-around aluminium case, complete with brushed-metal effect, sets it apart from the 'plastic-fantastic brigade' at this money. Even the matt-finish buttons on top feel pleasant and respond with a satisfying click. The speaker has a decent-sized footprint so it's stable and doesn't skid across a desktop (no balancing act needed here).

Our only disappointment lies with the rubber base stuck on the underside of the speaker. On our sample it was fitted skew-whiff and this small detail just took the shine off our otherwise pleasant introduction. We hope other samples do not have the same problem.

Fairly standard for features

The Voca has a pretty ordinary features list. There's a 3.5mm input and an integrated mic for taking calls. It's charged using a normal power supply instead of micro-USB. Bluetooth support doesn't include aptX

(but that isn't necessarily the end of the world), and there's no NFC for pairing devices. Battery life comes in at a claimed 10 hours.

Play 50 Cent's *Winners Circle* and the Voca starts on the front foot. Highs sound relatively sweet and refined for a product of this type, while Fiddy's vocal shows decent texture and detail. There's



a clear step up in finesse and refinement compared with the likes of the Yamaha NX-P100 and Damson Vulcan. The built-in subwoofer brings fullness and richness to the bass, but it does have a bad habit of stepping over the line.

Spin Iggy Azalea's *My World*, where the bass notes come thick and fast, and the Pure trips itself up. Each note is over-egged and as the track tries to move forward you find the bass lags behind the rest of the music. If you are willing to sacrifice bass weight, you will find greater clarity listening to the Roberts Travel Pad and more cohesiveness through the Philips BT3500B.

The Voca does a lot of things right, but in the end that troublesome bass dampens some of our initial enthusiasm.

ROBERTS TRAVEL PAD £80 ****

A Travel Pad sounds like it should come with a free ballpoint pen. But this British purveyor of radios hasn't delved into the stationery world. Instead, it's looking for a slice of the Bluetooth speaker market, and this slender offering looks rather fetching. The smooth finish of the rubber surround feels nice in-hand, and the fact you can just see the speaker drive-units beneath the main grille keeps your interest up.

Green is for go

The front of the speaker features a battery-level indicator, in the shape of three green lights. There's also a Bluetooth indicator, which glows blue when the speaker is connected, and a flash of red from the maximum volume indicator should you hit the ceiling. There are also buttons for power, volume and going hands-free through the integrated mic. Besides a USB charging-port and an auxiliary input, the Travel Pad also features a lock-switch, a bit like on a mobile phone, so you don't accidentally turn it on.

The Travel Pad supports standard Bluetooth and aptX, should your handset handle both, and you can tap compatible smartphones on its NFC logo for speedy pairing.



Given the Roberts' slender stature, it's not surprising to discover that bass weight isn't the

Travel Pad's forte. There is a lack of body and richness, even compared to the similarly slim Philips BT3500B. On the plus side, the Travel Pad actually sounds wonderfully clear and open all the way up the frequency range. Play Hozier's *Work Song* and his soulful vocal shines through with a fine sense of spaciousness.

Switch to Royal Blood's *Figure It Out* and there's texture and detail throughout. The speaker keeps its composure despite the distortion in the main vocal and it keeps a good sense of rhythm for the duration of the track. Roberts is branching out from radios in style.

The Travel Pad has nice touches where features are concerned and although not the most bombastic of sounds, it offers enough to hold your interest.

YAMAHA NX-P100 £86 ★★★☆☆

Just when you thought you couldn't squeeze any more features into a budget Bluetooth speaker, enter stage left the Yamaha NX-P100. AptX Bluetooth? Check. Built-in mic? Check. NFC? Check. A friendly voice telling you when you're paired and how much battery life is left? Check. And the Yamaha isn't finished there.

Charge the light brigade

The NX-P100 can come to your rescue and charge portable devices using its Type-A USB socket. You can even play music through the speaker from a laptop – all you need to do is run a cable from your computer to its micro-USB socket. A wired connection isn't the most practical, but it does allow you to enjoy the sound-quality benefits that come with it: music sounds more solid and refined.

All these features are wrapped up in a solid package. The edges and top controls of the speaker are rubberised and Yamaha claims it can

also withstand the odd splash of water. Wrapped in a metal case, the speaker feels robust enough to withstand a few knocks (it's perforated at the front to let sound out. The P100's rechargeable battery should hold out for around eight hours, which is about average. But then all these niceties are pointless if



theYamaha proves to be all show and no go.

Play alt-J's *Breezeblocks* and you're waiting for an explosion of energy and life, but it never really arrives. The Yamaha doesn't express itself as easily as rival speakers. There's more substance to bass notes than from the Roberts Travel Pad, but it doesn't sound particularly punchy or solid. Nor is there the same level of the texture or detail in the treble compared to the Pure Voca. There's a half-decent level of detail across the board, but the Philips BT3500B is a better option here. It provides a sense of rhythm and togetherness for all the different elements of the track that the Yamaha doesn't quite get.

It's nice to have all the features the Yamaha provides, but we'd prefer the sonic side of things being brought up to scratch.

Oppo BDP-105D £1100 ****

Oppo's flagship BDP-105D really won us over at the back end of last year, justifying its high price tag with an admirable can-do attitude.

We gave it five stars for combining a wide range of features with excellent performance, offering plenty of format compatibility to keep connoisseurs happy.

Four months on and little has changed - this is still a hugely accomplished player, and then some. Alongside the standard disc trio of Blu-ray, DVD and CD, the BDP-105D will also play SACDs and DVD-Audio discs, plus it can stream high-res music files (up to 24-bit/ 192kHz) over your home network.

Smart functionality hasn't been forgotten either, with Netflix, BBC iPlayer, YouTube and BBC News services built in. If that's not enough for you, the player's front-mounted HDMI/MHL port allows for the Noise levels are undetectable, shadow detail provides plenty of insight in darker scenes, and skin tones are reproduced with wonderful subtlety.

This carries across into DVD performance, which, despite the small increases in motion artefacts and noise levels, offers a superb level of detail and insight.

Sonic strength

Movie sound is handled with similar confidence, with a bold, full-bodied presentation that delivers big action scenes with power and authority. Our only criticism is that the bass could be a little tauter - it's weighty but doesn't always tell you as much as the precise Pioneer BDP-LX88. It doesn't take away from a wholly immersive, engaging presentation, though, with stacks of detail

addition of a Roku streaming stick or similar. Other inputs include three type A USBs for portable devices and USB keys, plus a further HDMI in on the back panel.

Digital audio provision

There's also a selection of digital audio ins, including optical, coaxial and type B USB, so you can take advantage of the player's referencelevel ESS Sabre 32 ES9018 DAC.

Outputs are largely dealt with by the dual HDMIs, but analogue outs are accounted for too - single-ended and balanced XLR connections plus rarer multi-channel audio outputs.

The Blu-ray picture here is absolutely superb. We love its crisp edges, strong handling of motion and rich colour palette, so much so we found the DARBEE picture processing functionality largely surplus to requirements. and plenty of drive and dynamism to soundtracks.

Play a CD and the player's full-bodied, authoritative character is replicated, but with plenty of refinement and a treble that shines without ever sounding hard.

It's a big, musical presentation that easily fills our listening room, and has the fluidity that the Pioneer lacks. It needs a bit more agility to come close to the performance of the best standalone players, but it's one of the best stereo performances we've heard from a Blu-ray player.

Master of all trades

Handling both movie and music content to an exceptionally high standard makes the BDP-105D a hugely multi-talented player that's hard to fault even at this price. This Oppo has the all-round talent to make its price tag look like a steal.

Pioneer BDP-LX88 £1300 ★★★★☆

It's been a few years since we've seen a reference-grade Blu-ray player from Pioneer - seven, in fact - but finally we have a successor to 2008's five-star BDP-LX91 with the new BDP-LX88. Can it justify the extra £200 over the Oppo?

Universal disc play

The LX88 is a universal disc player, so alongside Blu-ray, DVD and CD playback, it will play music from SACDs and DVD-Audio discs.

It can't, however, challenge the Oppo on connectivity. There are two HDMI outs, coaxial and optical outs, both RCA and balanced analogue stereo outputs and two USB ins, but no headphone jack nor any other digital inputs aside from USB. That seems a bit of a shame when the on-board DAC chip is such a good one - the same ESS Sabre 32 ES9018 DAC the Oppo uses. Once it gets going, it's hard to fault the Blu-ray performance here. Lines are precisely etched, textures nicely detailed, and colours and skin tones natural - just on the cooler side of neutral.Motion is handled with confidence and noise levels are very low.

DVD performance shows up similar results. We try a DVD of 2014's *Robocop* and find edges to be crisp, colours natural and enough detail offered for one team member to question whether we are watching Blu-ray or not.

Detail and heft in abundance When it comes to movie sound, the Pioneer continues to impress, with a precise and detailed presentation (if a slightly smaller-scale, more focused soundfield than found on the Oppo.) Fight scenes are backed with a tauter, more detailed bass

A DVD of *Robocop* offers crisp edges, natural colours and enough detail for one team member to question whether we were watching Blu-ray or not

Built-in network services are limited to Picasa for photos and YouTube for video, with no Netflix or BBC iPlayer in sight. While it's likely your amp or TV will offer these services now, it's still a shame not to see them included.

Music-wise, it supports all the popular file formats and includes compatibility for DSD 2.8MHz and PCM files up to 24-bit/192kHz.

As you'd expect at this level, the LX88 is fully capable of 3D playback and packs an Ultra HD 4K reference converter for upsampling content.

The unit itself is well built and sturdy. The front panel is neat, while on-screen menus, if a little basic and uninspiring, are easily navigated and simple to understand. The remote, though, is still a little too cluttered for our liking, but at least it's backlit so you can see the buttons during dark movie sessions. response, and there's a good sense of impact and solidity to explosions, where the Oppo can sound just a touch soft in comparison.

CD uncertainty

We can't help but be a little disappointed by the unit's stereo music sound. There's plenty of detail, but it's not a performance we'd recommend swapping out for your standalone CD player. Debussy's *Clair De Lune* sounds rather hard and bright, while Stevie Wonder's *Pastime Paradise* lacks the refinement and dynamic handling we crave.

With movies, there's little to separate this from the Oppo other than personal preference, but its stereo performance needs to be better to garner the full five. The BDP-105D offers a better all-round performance and feature set.

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PUT ON, PLUG IN, TUNE OUT

With a good pair of portable 'phones you can lose yourself in the music. Time to listen in

Solution of the perfect pair of portable headphones on, and you'll be whisked away to a musical haven that makes your tedious daily commute oh-so-bearable. We've scoured the market in search of the best pair of on-ears that'll keep your music close and personal to you at all times. Six portable pairs are up for grabs here, all priced sensibly between £50 and £70. Take your pick.



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AKG Y40 £70 ★★★☆☆

Bass performance, while not lacking in enthusiasm or richness, is on the tubby side. Coupled with the closed-in stage of the Y4Os, there's an indisdinct quality to the sound that's hard to shake off, even after a few days' running in. Next to more balanced and delightfully insightful rivals such as the Beyerdynamic DTX 501 p, the Y4Os sound like they're holding back.

And we can hear hints of just how good the Y4O headphones could be. The punchy, snappy rhythm that AKG delivers so well is intact. We're caught up in the build up to John Williams' *Theme From Jurassic Park*, even if the Y4Os don't leave much room for the strings and horns to hit the high notes. The stop and start of notes are handled with taut control, and there's plenty of detail on board. The agile presentation keeps our toes tapping, too.

The foldable, swivelling earcups make these 'phones portable and compact enough to stash in a handbag or even large coat pockets, and the sturdy construction feels durable and of a high quality - it's a great design. We find the dinky earcups a little too small, though. Larger earcups (with softer, plusher cushioning) would cover our ears more comfortably, thereby offering a greater degree of immersion. On the plus side, they grip snugly and securely enough.

Big brother

You only have to look to the Awardwinning AKG Y50s to find a more comfortable fit and far more engaging, dynamic and stunningly subtle performance. Which makes the Y40s' unbalanced presentation all the more puzzling. The punchy, agile rhythms are worth a listen, but the Y50's better, more engaging option is only a tenner away.

Rating★★★☆☆

FOR Punchy, upbeat rhythm; decent amount of detail; sturdy build; foldable and easily portable **AGAINST** Rolled-off treble; overblown bass; earcups are not the most comfortable

VERDICT Unbalanced, unrefined performance – this isn't the AKGs we're used to

We're used to heaping praise on AKG headphones. Given that the company has two successive Product of the Year gongs for its sub-£100 headphones, we have high expectations for the Y40s, which come in black, blue or yellow.

These portables are just one step down from our current Award-winners - the superb AKG Y50s (£80). Surely they are a shoo-in for a five-star accolade? Well, not quite.

A question of balance

They're not as balanced as we'd expect, for one. The top end is given hardly any prominence, while bass performance sounds rather overcooked. The unbalanced presentation is surprising to hear. We're used to such a winningly controlled, clear and even-toned performance from AKG.

Play Aerosmith's *Crazy* and Steven Tyler's voice strains and fizzes out before he reaches his trademark wailing peaks. The Y40s' treble is rolled off to such an extent that we miss out on the finer details of guitar-string twangs and soaring orchestra highs. It lacks sparkle.



Beyerdynamic DTX 501 p £60

Insightful, dynamic and utterly

engaging, the Beyerdynamic DTX 501 p headphones are one of the best-sounding portable pairs we've heard at this price.

There is oodles of detail on offer, and it delivers the harmonies and vocal nuances of any song with authority and ease. Voices are intimate and expressive. You can hear every intake of breath and quirk of intonation as if the artists are singing right next to you.

The sound is wonderfully balanced, with clear, open highs and a satisfyingly deep bass that's never out of shape. There's muscle and weight behind Alice Cooper's *Poison*, while the haunting tone of The Unthanks' *Gan To The Kye* is conveyed with poise. The DTX 501 ps offer plenty of space for the song to unfold, with individual instruments easy to pick out and follow.

The rich, melodic presentation isn't masking any subtleties or lack of precision, either. These are astonishingly articulate headphones. The Dead Weather's *I Can't Hear You* can flummox even high-end headphones, but the Beyerdynamics' surefooted sense of timing confidently handles that taut, punchy rhythm and maintains the slow build-up of suspense. Controlled, capable yet still managing to have fun, the 501 ps are hugely engaging and entertaining.

We wish we could be similarly enthused about the fit and build. These cans are flexible, light and have a folding mechanism that stows away the rotating earcups, making them easy to carry, but the headband is a touch too loose and too big. The grip would be perfect if you could adjust them to a smaller size, but as it is they never feel secure on your head. We find ourselves constantly nudging the (very comfy) earcups up to make them fit better.

We tested the 501 ps on all sizes of heads in the review team, and everyone said they'd want another notch or two of tightening. If you sneeze, they fall off rather dramatically.

Heads up, everyone

Another crucial element for a portable pair of headphones is the inclusion of an in-line mic and remote cable. The Beyerdynamics don't offer any controls, which is fine if you don't need them, but we think it's a glaring omission considering rivals at this price - from AKG to Yamaha - all provide the option to control music playback and take calls.

Sound and substance

We're charmed by the sound quality here. The subtle, fluid melodies and beautifully judged balance are lovely to hear at this price.

But sound is only half the story, and the DTX 501 ps don't quite pass the test when it comes to portable use. The loose fit and lack of in-line controls means they just miss out on a perfect score. But try them on for yourself: the Beyerdynamics sound far too good to be ignored.

House of Marley Positive Vibration £50

House of Marley's funky, eco-friendly design is certainly appealing, but the Positive Vibration headphones' sound leaves us feeling cold.

We've been here before: charmed by House of Marley's well built and attractive headphones, before the crushing disappointment of the limited and not-so-subtle sound quality.

The Positive Vibration sound is loud and bold - not a bad start. Notes are solid and direct, but the headphones are essentially a blunt instrument that attempts to make an impact without delving beyond superficial detail.

There's an eagerness to deliver punchy rhythm, but it manifests as a sound that's a little too boomy, a little too hard, and with little sense of space or dynamics.

Taut rhythm comes loose

Play test favourite *Wildfire* by Sbtrkt and that taut, grungy bassline loses its articulate nature. Drum hits are a touch flabby and lack the necessary impact, while leading edges of notes lack detail.

It's not the most open sound, either. Voices and instruments vie for attention in a cramped space. The Vibrations' overeager manner pushes all notes to the forefront, and it's hard to distinguish the space between instruments. An orchestral arrangement such as John Williams' *Theme From Jurassic Park* sounds rather one-dimensional as a result.

On the flat

There's little in the way of texture and dynamic complexity to the horns or string sections, so that soaring sense of wonder as the music builds up and reaches its crescendo is never fully realised. It's a flat, uninspiring sound.

Voices, whether a rasping Courtney Love or smooth-as-butter Michael Bublé, aren't very nuanced. Rivals at this price, such as the Beyerdynamic DTX 501 ps, deliver a subtler, more interesting sound.

We like the combination of aluminium, plastic and cloth that makes up House of Marley's distinctive design. The headphones look good, and the overall build is sturdy, with a flexible headband that has a firm grip. Our one gripe – and it's a big one – is that the ear cushions are far too firm. They're uncomfortably hard from the moment you slip them on, with more pressure than necessary pushing down on the top of our ears. The cushioning needs to be much softer to be wearable - even short bursts of listening leave us feeling headachy. We'd definitely recommend trying them on if you're close to thinking of buying them.

The Positive Vibrations come with an in-line remote, but there's an odd quirk with the controls. When used with Sony Xperia Z3 models, pressing the middle play/pause button turns the volume up.

The Positive Vibrations' sound is far from competitive, and the uncomfortably hard ear cushions have us reaching for rivals at this price.

JBL Synchros E30 £60 ★★★☆☆

Performance and comfort should go hand in hand with headphones. The JBL Synchros E30s have every intention of being the perfect portable pair of cans, but the uncomfortably hard fit doesn't do them any favours.

Pressure point

There's ample cushioning on the earcups and headband, but the vice-like grip is our main gripe. The headphones clamp down on our ears far too hard and the initial intense pressure doesn't let up, even after a couple of days. There's no scope for adjusting the angle of the earcups – a design flaw that doesn't take into account the various shapes of people's heads. We can't imagine keeping them on for extended periods.

It's a shame they're uncomfortable to wear, because they're tough and durable. A folding mechanism lets the ear cups collapse inwards for easy storage, making them compact enough to carry around in a bag.

The E30s fare better when it comes to music. Play Blackstreet's *No Diggity* and the E30s charge along with a nimble-

footed and detailed presentation. The upbeat bassline keeps the rhythm lively, although there's a bit too much oomph in the low end to be entirely convincing.

The blaring trumpets sparkle and bite in Quincy Jones's *Blues In The Night*. There's a brightness to the very edge of the treble that rears its head when the saxophone solo really gets going - it's exciting, but it comes at the cost of a refined or elegant top end. If you're a heavy metal fan, you'll find the E30s don't take too kindly to power vocals -Dio's *The Last In Line* sounds brash and coarse just when you want to start punching the air to the Ronnie Dio's hair-raising singing. We could do with richer layers of detail fleshing out each tautly-pulled note.

Jim Croce's melodic *Time In A Bottle* could be more inviting and engaging, too. The E30s need to punch deeper to dig out the nuances and subtleties in the warm, fluid vocals.

A more capable, revealing pair of headphones, such as the Beyerdynamic DTX 501 ps, show just how much subtler, more dynamic and punchier the sound could be. The E3Os are a little on the lean side. They're great for a snappy rhythm, but not so great for getting fully immersed and lost in the melodic ebb and flow of music (which the E3Os aren't entirely generous with).

Light and shade

A patchy performance from JBL, then. The top end blares a bit too sharply for our liking, and the lively overall sound needs a large helping of rich detail to get us fully engaged with the music.

The fiercely hard grip of these cans is the bigger stumbling block. It wouldn't hurt to give the E3Os a chance, but keep in mind there are countless rivals offering a more comfortable listening experience.

SoundMagic P21S £50

Smooth-sounding and comfortable to wear: have the SoundMagic P21S headphones hit upon the magic combination? Almost - but it's not the perfect performance we're looking for. These aren't the most detailed or precise pair of headphones. They are, however, utterly pleasant and easy to listen to.

Smooth, warm, round - no edge

The sound is smooth, warm and full of enthusiasm, but the edges of notes are rolled off to achieve that rounded quality to the sound, and outright subtlety is sacrificed along the way. The aggressive punch behind Rage Against The Machine's anthemnic *Killing In The Name* sounds rich yet lacks a touch of attack, while Leonard Cohen's gravelly voice on *A Street* is softened around the edges. But the SoundMagics do manage to keep the spirit of the song intact.

Unlike rivals the Yamaha HPH-M82s or House of Marley Positive Vibrations, the SoundMagics are dynamic and engaging. The low end charges along merrily, punching deep enough to give weight and depth to songs. Voices are expressive and fluid - the fervent string-pluckage in Paulo Mendonca's blues-tinged *Just In Case* may not sound the most taut and agile through the SoundMagics, but it's packed with energy and the dynamic shifts are delivered admirably.

The bass is on the boomy side, which takes away a bit of sparkle and bite, but here's no hint of brightness or sharpness in the treble and we can thank the rolled-off quality for that. Next to the surprisingly unbalanced AKG Y40s, we like how inoffensive and immediately likeable the SoundMagics sound despite their shortcomings.

Functional, but comfortable

On the face of it, the SoundMagic headphones don't exude quality. The build feels cheap, and the headband creaks when flexed.

We stop caring about all that though the second we slip the P21Ss on. They're light, with a stable grip that doesn't feel too snug, and the earpads are delightfully squishy and comfortable. They even offer a degree of noiseisolation, and you could while away the hours in Spotify-heaven without feeling encumbered by them.

The lightweight, foldable design means they're ideal for portable use and easy to store in a bag, while the in-line control lets you pause your music to take a call - from an Apple or Android phone.

Yes, there are clearer and more insightful headphones. Rivals such as the Beyerdynamic DTX 501 ps offer an impressive level of subtlety and dynamics, and are better built. But what the P21Ss offer is an easy-on-the-ears presentation, with enough punch and liveliness to keep us interested in what we're listening to. They're comfortable, too. Give them a whirl.

Yamaha HPH-M82 £60 ★★☆☆☆

Light and spacious, but rough on the ears - the Yamaha HPH-M82s aren't the most exciting pair of headphones we've ever wrapped around our heads.

Despite having a good deal of openness for a closed-back design at this price (rivals SoundMagic P21S and AKG Y4O sound comparatively closed in), the HPH-M82s fail to engage fully with songs being played.

They don't summon a great deal of enthusiasm. A lacklustre approach to timing means the M82s add a sluggish quality to otherwise-upbeat songs. The punchy, dynamic tones of Red Hot Chili Peppers' *Mellowship Slinky In B Major* sound a bit too laidback for a funk-rock song. Drums lack bite and attack, and guitar strings are plucked with minimal energy and agility. We'd like a deeper plunge into the lower frequencies, too - the bass could be so much punchier and textured than it sounds here.

Sluggish with rhythm

Regina Spektor's *Fidelity* has an upbeat, nimble rhythm that demands effortless yet taut control, but the Yamahas struggle to convey the light tone and staccato rhythm. The nuances in her delicate voice aren't fully expressed, either.

The treble, however, takes advantage of the airy presentation. There's space for the top end of notes to soar without sounding sharp, but they could do with a touch more refinement.

Detail and clarity

We like the spacious quality of the HPH-M82s, though. Stone Sour's alt-rock ballad *Bother* is delivered with a decent amount of detail and clarity, while Corey Taylor's gravelly voice is given centre stage. The issues with dynamics and punch still linger, though.

The M82s' lightweight build bodes well for long periods of listening. The headphones have a light but firm grip, which feels secure on your head.

The ear cushions, on the other hand, bother us. Made of material that feels like it could tear easily, they don't provide much in the way of cushioning. We can feel the hard outline of the earcups through the foam – it's uncomfortable and makes our ears itchy over time. The headband is sturdy and flexible, with no sign of creaking, but the plastic finish looks and feels a little on the cheap side. Rival headphones (such as the AKG Y40 and JBL Synchros E30) offer a higher quality of build for a similar price.

Apple and Android users can use the in-line mic and remote to take calls and control playback. The controls are responsive, although we'd like better volume buttons.

If only their lightweight build and spacious presentation were enough to win us over. But until the M82s tighten up their rhythm and find some excitement (and comfier ear cushions), there's little to sing about.

THE WINNER

Beyerdynamic DTX 501 p £60 *******

They're not perfect, but the **Beyerdynamic DTX 501 p**s show the way here

t's not often that our test winner is a four-star product. In our quest to find the perfect pair of portable headphones, we've been thwarted at every turn. Despite notable high points, the six on-ears in this test struggle to hit that Goldilocks sweet spot of a comfortable, secure fit combined with superb sound quality. No five stars for anyone, then.

Flawed genius

Nevertheless, the Beyerdynamic DTX 501 ps come so close. They're easily the best-sounding pair of the lot, with the kind of insight, punchy dynamics and brilliantly judged balance that eludes their rivals. It's a shame, then, that they don't fit as securely around our heads (crucial for a portable pair), nor do they include an in-line mic or remote cable (all the others do). It's a misstep that costs them that final star, but their engaging performance makes them the undeniable winners of this test. The three-starred AKG, JBL and SoundMagic headphones delight us with punchy, lively and rather bassy performances. But the JBLs' vice-like grip and bright edge deter us, while the uneven tonal balance of the AKGs disappoint. The smooth SoundMagics are nice to listen to (if cheap-looking), but they don't have the clearest or most insightful sound. The House of Marley and Yamaha headphones bring up the rear: both lack the excitement and dynamic prowess to deliver a nuanced performance, and neither is comfortable to wear either.

A rollercoaster of a test with some surprising results, but one thing's clear - the Beyerdynamics demand an audition. Don't be afraid to cast your net wider, though.

Linn Akurate Exakt/Akudorik Streaming system

here's no mistaking Linn's pride in its high-end Exakt range. The brand states (rather boldly) that these systems represent "the most direct connection ever made between you and the artist." Usually we don't take much notice of such claims, but here we're impressed by the company's refreshingly holistic approach to music replay.

Linn understands the music recording/playback chain better than most. It makes everything from original recordings right the way through analogue and digital sources to cables and speakers. Rarely have we come across a specialist hi-fi manufacturer with fingers in so many pies. Naim Audio is the only





other specialist company we can think of with a similarly wide spread of products.

The idea behind Exakt is to preserve the original music file as far along the replay chain as possible before any processing takes place, and from there process the signal with as little degradation as possible.

A digital journey

The signal path is as follows. Let's start with a 24-bit/96kHz Studio Master file stored on a NAS unit. The Exakt streamer - in this case an Akurate Exakt DSM (a streamer/preamp) - simply reads the digital file and passes it on to the Exakt digital-processing engine housed in each of the speaker stands.

The connection between the DSM and the speakers uses conventional Ethernet cable. The clever bit is the way the signal is transmitted. Linn couldn't find an established digital standard it liked, so the company decided to develop its own. It took three engineers more than eight months to complete the project - the result is called the Exakt Link, and it can transmit up to eight channels of 24-bit/192kHz music streams with very low jitter while maintaining excellent synchronisation between speakers.

Clever processing

Each channel pulls in the appropriate (left or right channel) lossless data into its Exakt processing engine. It's here a lot of clever things happen. First, room optimisation is applied to the music data, followed by a digital crossover that filters the correct range of frequencies for each of the Akudorik's four drive units. At this point the processing also eliminates magnitude and phase distortions caused by the crossover, drive units and enclosure. Delays are applied to the signal for each of the drive units to ensure proper time-alignment.

The next step involves scaling the data according to the volume level set on the DSM. Just to be clear, the volume adjustment is done in the digital processing engines in the stands, not in the Akurate Exakt DSM unit.

The digital stream is then sent to the appropriate DAC, which feeds the now-analogue signal straight into a power amp. The final step in the signal path is the direct connection between the power amp and the drive unit.

The important thing to note is that the original 24-bit/96kHz file remains intact up to the point it enters the DAC (unlike on a conventional signal path where the music data is converted to analogue by the source component). All the processing is done at 32-bit, so the data shouldn't be corrupted in any way.

Making a good case

So Linn's argument for Exakt is persuasive, even more so when you see the system. This is true high-end hi-fi, but as discreet as just about any lifestyle-orientated alternative. Fit and finish are as we'd expect, the Akurate Exakt DSM being as understated and classy as most Linn electronics.

It's a well equipped unit with a good range of analogue and digital inputs including HDMI, though this is for stereo replay only as there's no home cinema decoding. There are single-ended and balanced analogue outputs, as well as connections for the crucial Exakt Link.

The Akudorik speakers are even more exotic. Their stands not only support the

insight above all we doubt you'll get better for the money.

We're struck by the system's direct presentation. There's a solidity to leading edges that's a pleasure to hear, and makes the efforts of even the best passive speakers we've heard sound blurred and soft in comparison.

Stereo imaging is excellent. It's wonderfully stable and pin-sharp in focus, and layered

-

convincingly. The size of the soundstage is terrific too. It extends well beyond the outside edges of

the speakers, making it incredibly hard to pinpoint their position with eyes closed.

We listen to a range of recordings from Michael Jackson's *Thriller* (24-bit/ 176.4kHz) and Miles Davis's *Kind Of Blue* (24-bit/192kHz) to a 320kbps file of Alt J's *This Is All Yours* and are pleased with the system's consistency across genres. It's insightful enough to make the difference in recordings (in some cases) painfully obvious, but give it something reasonably well produced and it shines.

Distinguished speakers

We rate this package highly, but think the Akudorik speakers are the real stars. Just for fun we feed in the digital output from our reference Naim NDS/555PS streamer (which costs more than three times as much as the Exakt DSM) and find notable improvements in authority, punch and rhythmic drive. It shows that the speakers are capable of more than the streaming section of the DSM delivers.

As things stand the Akurate Exakt/ Akudorik system remains a highly capable package. It's nicely made, exotically engineered and designed with a flexible approach to ensure it delivers in a wide a range of environments as possible. We wish more high-end manufacturers would take a similar view.

speakers but are home to a quartet of Linn's Chakra power amps and the Exakt digital processing engine too. All the electronics are housed in the finned casing you see at the centre of the main column - this support is a terrific piece of engineering and carries a hefty price tag of £9500 to prove it. Add speakers and the price goes up to £13,500, though you'll need a dedicated Exakt source for everything to work.

Material pros and cons

These monitors use Linn's usual three-driver array of 13mm silk-dome supertweeter, 25mm polyurethane tweeter and 75mm polyurethane-dome midrange mounted onto a curved, metal front baffle (as a drive-unit material, polyurethane is heavy and so reduces efficiency, but Linn thinks its internal damping and resultant neutral sound is worth the hit.) A 16.5cm doped-paper cone bass driver augments this array.

The Akudoriks are relatively compact, standing just 35cm high, so they shouldn't dominate in most rooms. Their ability to fit in is not just about compact dimensions either. These speakers come in six standard high-grade finishes -Black Ash, Cherry, Oak, Rosenut, Walnut and White. These options are available in either standard or high gloss versions. Not good enough? Linn also offers a range of 200 premium high-gloss colour options, which means even the fussiest of interior designers should be satisfied.

Speaker positioning is far less of an issue than usual. Using Linn's Konfig software (available from the company website) the Akudoriks can be optimised for most places in the room. We tried the speakers both in free space and close to the wall and the performance was pretty much the same. This kind of flexibility is almost unheard of with speakers generally, let alone at the high end where performance usually comes first.

Speed with articulation

In many ways this is an astonishing system. We can't think of an alternative that delivers a sound with such detail and focus. All that digital work to match the phase and outputs of the drivers really pays off. This set-up is as even as they come, delivering the kind of top-to-bottom coherence we've only heard in single-driver designs.

It's a fast sound, magnificently agile and as articulate as you like. We sit back in admiration at the way this system unravels a demanding piece of music such as the *Jurassic Park OST* by John Williams. It's a highly composed performance, with the system able to track the subtlest instrumental strand with ease. If you value control and

eed Audio first came to our attention a few years ago with its £1300 Obelisk si amplifier. This simple, highly musical little integrated won our hearts, and an Award, back in 2012. The Budapest-based company has got a whole lot more ambitious since then, and pushed well upmarket with the high-end Thesis range.

The range consists of four products at the moment. There's the combination on test here - the α (alpha) preamp (£2650) with optional add-on π (pi) power supply (£1500) driving a pair of ω (omega) monobloc power amplifiers (£2100 each) - plus a ϕ (phi) moving magnet/moving coil phono stage, which will set you back another £1600.

The Thesis appearance mirrors the minimalist '80s feel of the Obelisk si and is none the worse for that. It's a clean, simple look and we like it. For the most part build quality is good. The components feel solid and nicely finished, but there's not quite the luxury feel we expect at this price. The controls, particularly the input selector, could feel a little more precise in use, and the remote feels laughably cheap. That said, Heed is not alone among high-end manufacturers in supplying a poor wand.

Hook-up options

Connectivity is decent. The α preamp has two single-ended line-level analogue inputs and four digital - co-ax in RCA and BNC form, optical and USB. You can use the preamp without the outboard π power supply (a tidy and entertaining sound), but adding it brings notable gains in scale, insight and transparency.

The $\boldsymbol{\omega}$ monobloc power amplifier presents a simple face to the world,

lacking any controls on its clean front panel. Look around the back and you'll find a single RCA input and two sets of speaker outputs to make biwiring easier. There's also a line-level output to allow additional power amplifiers to be connected should you want more grunt. We'd be surprised if you do.

Don't let the compact size fool you this is a proper powerhouse, delivering 160W of continuous power into an 8 ohm load, and capable of driving electrical loads down to 1.6 ohms. It doesn't run too hot either, so won't need acres of space around it to breathe.

Robust and authoritative

How does the four-box combination sound? Pretty good, we think. The Thesis delivers a surprisingly solid, robust sound backed up with the kind of authority that scarcely seems possible from such compact boxes.

We start with Tchaikovsky's *1812 Overture* and like a lot of what we hear. It's detailed, organised and composed, keeping track of the mass of instrumentation without trouble.

This is an amplifier that concentrates on the big picture, painting in broad strokes and giving a clear view as to what the music is about. It delivers the explosive energy of this Tchaikovsky piece superbly. Large-scale dynamics are delivered with enthusiasm, punch (particularly in the low notes) and plenty of muscle - that 160W power rating is entirely believable - while stereo imaging is secure and focused.

Change over to Nick Cave's *Mermaids* and the Heed's cohesive delivery continues to please. It digs up a decent amount of detail and arranges it into a



Heed is not alone among high-end makers in offering a cheap-looking remote, but that's no excuse cohesive and convincing whole. It's surefooted rhythmically too, giving a palpable sense of momentum.

Flaws? This isn't the most subtle of amplifiers. It doesn't have the low-level dynamic expression we would expect at this price, so the emotion packed into Cave's vocals doesn't come through with the clarity we expect. The sound could be more transparent too, our reference Byrston BP26/4BSST2 combo showing clear advantages when it comes to precision, openness and resolution.

We try the on-board DAC and are left with mixed feelings. The presentation retains the tonal balance and cohesion of the line stage but sounds thinner and less solid. It's not a particularly detailed or expressive performance by high-end standards, so we would suggest leaving number-crunching duties to a suitable outboard unit such as Chord's Hugo.

This Heed Thesis combination is fun, enthusiastic and communicates the music's message well. But at this price we expect more. Greater transparency is a must, as is a more subtle attitude.

Breaking Vlad: Dracula is born

Poor old vampires. Once the legendary figures of terror, they have become synonymous with angsty teen fluff. Bram Stoker would turn in his grave.

But now we come full circle to the Daddy of vampires: Dracula. There's quite a lot here about the torture of immortality. None of that sparkly nonsense, thank you.

As the title suggests, you don't know this part of his lore. These are the wilderness years, fleshing out the time before he begins to resemble Gary Oldman.

That's right, we have another prequel-reboot at hand. As is customary with prequels, we join the main man before he sinks his teeth into his eponymous role.

He's a perfectly affable chap talent for impaling enemies notwithstanding - minding his own business in Transylvania. Naturally, Bad Things soon happen and he gets a bit batty. This is, of course, the best part. Vlad's transformation into Dracula plays out rather oddly like a superhero origins story. Faltering first steps and a ridiculous number of bats: Gotham City certainly springs to mind.

Dracula Untold takes the time to have a little fun with established vampire tropes. Vlad's obligation to dodge sunbeams around town is appreciably more effective than any ceiling-walking in Van Helsing.

Why so serious?

What does every superhero do with new powers? Grow repetitive, of course. The set pieces are a good laugh, but it's hard to cheer Vlad's ability to burst into a cloud of bats for the 10th time.

Then the tone drops off a cliff. There is an abundance of slow motion and floaty choruses, and some risible dialogue about the power of love. Poetry is recited. Ultimately, *Dracula Untold* lacks the conviction to drive the stake in any direction. By refusing to choose between stylised silliness and Gothic romance, it ends up like the bats: all over the place.

It is best to take this more as a sensory exercise, because it's a good workout for your system.

The picture is a pleasant one. There's plenty of light and dark. The palette offers enough variety - Vlad's red armour looks particularly sumptuous. Special effects are fairly convincing.

On the audio front, you get DTS-HD Master Audio 5.1. Did we mention there are a lot of bats? They are sure to challenge any system's effects-steering prowess.

Whether or not you are a fan of vampires, *Dracula Untold* offers something a little different. Sure, it lacks bite. But unlike poor old Vlad, it's harmless and ends in 92 minutes. Add it to your Netflix list.

JOSÉ GONZÁLEZ VESTIGES & CLAWS Out 17th February ★★★★☆

Despite the seven-year gap between albums, José González has been as busy as a bee. The time between his previous solo outing (2007's *In Our Nature*) and *Vestiges & Claws* has been filled with a flurry of collaborations – his work with the band Junip, and with The Götenborg String Theory project, is particularly rewarding. But for those for whom González's previous two albums resonate, *Vestiges & Claws* comes not a moment too soon.

It's the immediacy and the intimacy of González's solo work

that's especially resonant. He sets his stall out early with opener *With The Ink Of A Ghost* and from there on out *Vestiges & Claws* is long on warm, organic acoustic nylon-string guitar sounds and close-mic'd vocals, correspondingly short on overdubs or overt percussion. Lyrically he's not the deepest thinker ever to make a record, but musically José González is as articulate as they come.

Unthreatening intensity

This low-temperature palette of sounds does make a vocal harmony, or a tapped-guitar-body-as-beatbox, arrive like a rainstorm in a desert. And on the likes of *Stories We Build*, *Stories We Tell* and *Leaf Off/The Cave* González manages to build a sort of polite, unthreatening intensity, a kind of insistent knocking from someone you know is too considerate to just boot the door in. If your system's got the breadth of expression and a properly unified frequency range, *Vestiges & Claws* has plenty to give.

Retelling the story of the American/ Soviet space race of 1957 – 1972 using hard-to-come-by access to the British Film Institute's archive on the subject, Public Service Broadcasting's *The Race For Space* is a collection of potent widescreen sonic paintings liberally studded with snatches of some of the most evocative broadcasts ever transmitted.

From the wordless-choir-plus-JFK of the opening title track, through the genteel chillout-tent beats of Sputnik to the weightlessness of Valentina, The Race For Space is a more insistent and coherent proposition than 'instrumentals-plus-scratchy-oldvoice-recordings' might at first seem. And while it's not the toughest challenge you could present to your set-up, without wide, deep and well-defined soundstaging The Race For Space could sound a bit of a mess. Timing is crucial too, plus an explicit midrange is required to fully appreciate all that history.

12 Monkeys Syfy HD - Fridays, 9pm

Fans of Terry Gilliam's time-travel dystopia *12 Monkeys* may blanch at the prospect of a TV adaptation, but let's not be too quick to judge. *Fargo* and *Hannibal* have proven they can expand upon their cult film origins and deliver an original take. On the other hand, this show is being produced by the channel that gave us *Sharknado*.

Closely following the film's storyline, the show depicts a future where 93.6 per cent of humans have been wiped out by a deadly virus. Scientists send a man back in time to stop the outbreak - but they keep sending him to the wrong year. What made the film so memorable was Gilliam's signature eclectic, off-kilter visual style. This show which looks no different than a police procedural with a bit of flashy sci-fi thrown in - doesn't quite have the same effect.

Continuing the trend for Nordic thrillers, Fortitude takes place in a small town in the northernmost tip of Norway. He soon finds that everyone seems to want to cover up the crime. including the town's governor, who doesn't want it affecting tourism. Features a star-studded cast including Christopher Ecclestone. Michael Gambon and Jessica Raine.

Underwood will use all of his political prowess and viciously pragmatic approach to stay in power, but it won't be long before secrets, rivals and circumstances move against him. Five ways to... calibrate your TV



First things first Make sure all cables and connections are secure, that your room's lighting is as it will be when you normally watch TV, and that the screen has been powered up for at least half an hour.

Dig out a disc Some DVD/Blu-rays include an Optimiser menu but be sure check www.thx.com for a full list of titles that include THX menus for confirmation.

Wield those remotes You'll need your disc player's remote to navigate the Optimiser, and your TV's handset to make adjustments to your contrast, colour, brightness and sharpness. Use the Optimiser movie clip to finesse motion processing, too.

Spend a bit more £5 or so put the way of www.thx.com buys you a pair of blue-lensed glasses, which you'll need to adjust your screen's tint (colour temperature).

Spend a lot more The Imaging Science Foundation trains TV dealers to calibrate TV to professional standards, and for the not-inconsiderable sum of £250 they'll visit your home and make sure you're getting the very best from your TV. If fine-tuning is your thing, it doesn't get better than this.

Three products to boost your TV experience



Despite the changes in how we watch content, the television can still be the centre of your entertainment experience. We've chosen three products that can improve and extend it

Multimedia

Arguably the Xbox One's media features are greater than that of the PS4's and the console's OneGuide adds to that feeling. It works by taking the feed from your digital TV box via HDMI (Virgin, BT, Sky and the majority of HD Freesat and Freeview boxes are supported), with OneGuide acting as an EPG (electronic programme guide) showing TV channels, programme times and info over the TV feed (for now there's no DVR ability).

Its advantage lies in its integration within the Xbox OS, turning the console into a one-size fits all multimedia box that can multi-task on the fly, allowing users to 'snap' a live TV feed to the side and play a game alongside it. Last October Microsoft released a Freeview tuner (£25) that plugs into the coaxial aerial cable and takes the feed in from there. Handy for those who don't have a set-top box or smart TV.

Apps/Streaming

For those who don't have a TV that connects to the internet, there are a number of ways of doing so such as Google's Chromecast or Roku's Streaming Stick – a wireless streaming USB stick that mirrors content from your portable device to your TV.

For now we'll focus on Chromecast. Slot it into a HDMI port, download the app to your tablet or phone, log in to your wi-fi network and the set-up process is done. Content was scarce at launch but the number of apps has grown (Amazon Prime Instant and Spotify are still absent). Chromecast 2 is set to arrive soon but expect an update of the current model and not an overhaul.

Sound

With premium soundbars offering a smattering of features, they're more than just a way of boosting a TV's sound. Efforts such as Dali's Kubik One reflect a trend that sees soundbars integrating with other devices and services.

The Kubik One is a system that allows for several different connections whether it's by the two optical, RCA or micro-USB connections (for connecting to a PC or Mac), even so the lack of HDMI is a drawback. If you've invested in high-res tracks the Kubik One is able to handle 24-bit/96kHz tracks.

These features would be for naught if the sound were poor - thankfully it's not. Like Yamaha's YSP-2500, the Kubik One fills the room in a manner similar to a home cinema surround package. That comes at a cost with soundbars like the Kubik coming in a big package, so save some space for it.

Setting up your... Surround sound

It's not easy figuring out where to set up your speaker system to get the right performance. Here are a few bits of advice to keep in mind when setting up...

Where should I position my sub?

Each manufacturer will have different suggestions so it's worth checking the manual to see what it says. As a rule, though, the best place for a subwoofer to get the most integrated sound is at the front of the room between the left and right speakers.

And the surrounds?

In precise terms, the surround speakers should be 110° either side of the centre speaker, angled in to your listening position. This should mean they sit just behind you, for the most immersive effect.

What about the front speakers?

As a general rule, the centre speaker should be as close to ear height as possible and the front speakers should be placed at a 30° angle either side.

Five steps to setting up your turntable

Vinyl is making a comeback in a big way so make sure you've set up your turntable just right

Get it totally level Your deck has no chance of working at its best until this is done. It helps considerably if the support is light and rigid, so external vibrations don't upset the cartridge as it tracks the record groove.

Sort the suspension

If your record player has suspension, make sure the platter sits level too. Doing this allows the stylus to sit properly in the record groove and lets it dig up more information.

Prevent excessive hum You can do this by making sure the tone arm lead isn't stressed and is positioned away from anything that runs on mains voltage.



Tweak the tone-arm

First up is the tracking weight, adjusted by moving a counter -weight at the rear of the arm. To start with, the down-force should be set according to the cartridge-maker's spec. Too high and the sound will be dull and slow. Too low and the presentation turns thin and the cartridge won't track the groove

properly. Next up is bias – a sideways force on the cartridge to balance out the inward pull of the groove. It's usually set to the same as the tracking value.

Align the cartridge

Even errors of less than a degree can result in increased coarseness. Most manufacturers supply printed gauges to get this aspect right.



All about cartridges There are two main types of

turntable cartridges you need to know: moving magnet (MM) and moving coil (MC). The former tends to dominate at

lower prices and usually produces a relatively high electrical output, typically 5-10mV. Compare that with a typical CD player's output, about 2V, and you can see why the



extra amplification of a phono circuit is needed.

Moving-coil designs tend to deliver a cleaner, more detailed sound, but command a higher selling price and produce an output that's around a tenth of MM alternatives.

Such a low output means that extra amplification will be needed in the phono stage, and any shortcomings in the circuit will be more readily apparent.

Jargon buster: Loudspeakers

Any tonal alterations or distortion added to the original signal can be classified as colouration.

Crossover

The circuit inside a speaker that splits, or filters the incoming signal, sending high frequencies to the tweeter and midrange/bass to the woofer.

Dynamics

A speaker's dynamic ability is the way it goes from quiet to loud and back. The best speakers manage this quickly, in a smooth sweep. The difference between the quietest sounds the speaker produces and the loudest is called the dynamic range.

Sensitivity

A measure of how loud a speaker will go for a given input power. Typical values

are around 89dB/W/m. Every 3dB of sensitivity means you'll need only half the amplifier power to go as loud.

Tweeter

A type of loudspeaker usually shaped like a small dome (but can also look like a cone) that's designed to reproduce the high frequency sounds.

Bi-wire

Speakers that are bi-wired have two pairs of speaker terminals. This allows for two connections to be made between the amplifier and the speaker; one for high frequency sounds and another for mid/bass frequencies.

Woofer

Usually the largest drive unit. It's designed to deliver low frequency sounds. Can be used in multiples to increase output.

Screen The tablet with the highest resolution may be the obvious choice but there's more to consider. What's the colour reproduction like? The viewing angles? Will it retain its level of performance outdoors (if you intend to use it that way) as it does indoors?

On-board or expandable storage? Amazon, Apple and Google opt for the former, LG, Samsung and Sony the latter. Price will be a consideration, too. A micro-SD card and a tablet could be cheaper than buying one with more storage and no means of upgrading it.

Recorded music is at a crossroads

The format in which you listen to your music could be undermining the quality of your hi-fi system

For those of us that consider themselves a music lover. albeit to different degrees, we are part of a very fortunate generation. We now have access to an evergrowing wealth of recorded music of extraordinary range and depth, effectively accumulated over the last 60 years. With the introduction of the microgroove LP record in the early 1950's, playback quality took a quantum leap forward and this also coincided with a far higher standard of recording techniques. Although further improvements have been made over the vears, this was a watershed time that first introduced hi-fi as a reality.

We now have literally millions of recorded music tracks available

to us in all genres and many different formats. One trend over recent years, however, has been to deliberately downgrade the quality in order to offer quantity. The main culprits have been MP3 and AAC formats which were designed as a low cost form of delivery when download speeds were slow and computer chip memory was expensive. Neither now applies and both formats should be consigned to history.

Quality vs quantity

Let us explain. The maximum resolution from MP3 and AAC file formats, which are both highly compressed, is 320 kbps (kilobytes per second) which compares with CD quality of 1411 kbps. This means the resolution quality is less than



a quarter of that provided by a standard CD. However, most MP3 or AAC files are downloaded over the internet and the most used download resolution is 128 kbps, which is around one-eleventh of CD quality. This should ring alarm bells. If you are only playing back these tracks on an iPod or mobile phone with a pair of earbuds, the quality may be irrelevant to you. But if these tracks are your primary source of music, perhaps with an iPod dock into a decent hi-fi system, you are only making a very poor quality sound louder. Information is irretrievably lost and the full dynamic range is lacking. The guality will be very poor in contrast with a full resolution version even if you are completely unaware of the loss you are inflicting upon yourself. This can even affect the type of music listened to

as most classical recordings downloaded as an MP3 or AAC file will have so much information missing, and all the complexities of the music lost, with the end result that the recording is reduced to just the essence of a tune.

What is the future of recorded music?

There are now positive signs for the future of recorded music. Audiophiles, or hi-fi connoisseurs, have been very important to the music industry as they are generally avid music lovers who aim to maximise their enjoyment by listening to music at its best quality level, which

means the play-back of great recordings through hi-end hi-fi to achieve the most outstanding results. Without them, a main driver for quality would probably be removed from the music industry. They have always sought out quality but there is now an increasing awareness among the wider public of the serious deficiencies of the highly compressed formats. Full resolution audio streaming, as well as CD quality downloads, are already available and will surely become the eventual norm with this greater awareness of the tremendous quality benefit. Consumers will vote through their purchases and will seek out higher resolution recordings. Look at Qobuz for a new high-profile entry into this field who offer CD quality (16 bit/44.1 kHz FLAC) streaming for over 15 million tracks.

Without them, hi-fi manufacturers and potential customers would have to rely on the opinion of magazine reviewers to assess levels of performance - a notoriously unreliable decision making process. For specialist hi-fi dealers, their relationship with audiophiles and hi-fi connoisseurs is also crucial to them for, if they are to stay in business, they must satisfy the most discerning customers in the industry. The reality is that audiophiles and specialist hi-fi retailers (and the ones listed on this page represent the UK's finest) are essential to each other.

Specialist dealers know how to choose the products that combine as a superb system and how to get the best out of it by expert installation in the home. They also appreciate how exciting and involving music can be and how it can deliver a powerful emotional experience. If there's a price premium over an internet purchase by choosing a specialist dealer, it's probably a small one, but it's unquestionably worth the difference.

Before you buy... Speaker cables



Termination

The price we list for a cable off a reel chances are you'll want it terminated, but that will add to the final cost. It does make connecting easier, though, and also reduces oxidation of the cable.



Direction

If there are no obvious markings or arrows, look for writing and make sure it reads in the same direction of the music flow i.e. from amps to speakers. It's a controversial subject but try it and we believe it can make a difference.



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Length

When you're measuring up for a new speaker cable, ideally you should use the same length for both left and right speakers. We'd also recommend you try to keep the lengths as short as possible for best results.



Headphone amps

The headphone outputs on most products are usually afterthoughts and have had little care taken in trying to make them sound good. A dedicated headphone amp is a must if you want the best headphone sound.

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hen Wharfedale launched the Diamonds in 1982 we doubt anyone thought they would go on to be such a success. And yet 32 years and 12 generations later, the 220s won a What Hi-Fi? Award.

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Wharfedale has built on that success with regular updates and additional variants (including active and luxury-finished versions). Gradually the process involved transforming the Diamond from a single product into a complete range. And, while some of the floorstanders models have been good, it has always been the standmounters that remained closest to our hearts.

That's where we find the 220s, the 12th generation of Diamond. In engineering terms these are way ahead of their forebears. The distributed-port arrangement gives solid but tuneful lows, while both drive units feature the kind of engineering details that would have been considered exotic just a few years ago. Despite that the 220s remain what the best Diamonds have always been: excellent budget speakers. The Diamond MkIs cost just £65 and soon built up a mighty reputation for being musically talented

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
