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This is how you do digital hi-fi properly

Sony HAP-Z1ES Music server £2000

The HAP-ZIES is a serious statement of intent from Sony. This is flagship stereo hi-fi, but the fact you're looking at a server and not a CD player shows modernity and gives an indication that the Japanese giant is taking the future of music consumption seriously.

The ZIES sits at the very top of a whole new range of hi-fi components from Sony, all of which tie in with the company's push to support high-resolution audio. As such, the ZIES copes with virtually every audio format and sample rate on the planet, including WAV, FLAC, AIFF and DSD (Direct Stream Digital, see *Jargon Buster*) format.

Full control of source material

The HAP-Z1ES is a very interesting machine. The internal 1TB hard drive brings a slightly different approach to streaming compared with stand-alone products from the likes of Naim and Cyrus. While their servers are more than happy to play music from a NAS (Network Attached Storage) device, the Sonv isn't. In fact it won't stream any music this way because Sony wants you to store it all on that 1TB hard drive. It's more of a closed ecosystem, which won't please everyone, but you can see where Sony is coming from. Music on a PC requires the computer to be on at all times and you need to rely on a network connection during playback - the internal

hard drive method means there's no danger of buffering issues, and stability is improved.

To get started, you'll need to install Sony's HAP Music Transfer software on your PC or Mac. You can then specify which music folders you want the software to access (and which file formats to transfer), and the software does the rest, moving all those files onto the server's hard drive. It's a simple yet effective way of organising things. Every time you add new music to the folder, it's scanned and transfers across, which also helps minimise hassle.

No-frills handset

The supplied remote is minimalist and thin. Part of us admires the simplicity, the other part thinks this plasticky, cheap wand isn't good enough given the streamer's beautiful finish. There are just simple playback controls and ones for volume which you can use if you hook the server up to Sony's matching £2k stereo amplifier, the TA-A1ES.

As a flagship product, the HAP-ZIES fits the bill. It's modern and retro at the same time, with the neatly finished aluminium chassis and thick front panel giving off a premium vibe. The front of the unit is dominated by a large 4.3in LCD display. It's a good size - bright and punchy, with plenty of room on there for album artwork as well as track information.

The jog dial lets you scroll through the menus but you don't press it to select. There's a separate 'enter' button to the side, which takes a little getting used to. Sony says including push-to-select would have introduced unwanted resonance into the player's structure and hindered its sound.

It's dazzlingly expressive, capturing changes of pace and momentum superbly Cyrus CDi, p14



Connectivity is very basic. There's a USB socket around the back, so you can add an external hard drive if that terabyte of storage isn't enough. There's a standard analogue audio output, or you can connect to a stereo amplifier via the balanced XLR output. There's also an ethernet port to get the server hooked up to your network for when it needs to transfer files.

The HAP-ZIES is one of the first servers we've reviewed to support DSD files and we're straight into that format with some Marvin Gaye and What's Going On. You're immediately drawn in by the streamer's invitingly smooth and refined character. Gaye's voice sounds polished and yet there's plenty of emotion to tap into. The soundstage is solid, with instruments

> convincingly placed, and the Sony extracts plenty of detail from the DSD stream. You could ask for a bit more bite and attack, but it's by no means weak or insipid. It's not just high-res music that impresses through the Sony. Play a

Better than the standard remote

The lack of a quality remote control is actually a great excuse to download Sony's free HDD Audio Remote app for Android and iOS devices. Sony has obviously put a lot of time and effort into getting it right. It's a really slick, enjoyable operating system for the Z1ES. The glossy interface grabs your attention from the get-go, as does the speed at which you can navigate the app and create and manipulate playlists.

Nice little touches

Little things like being able to wake the streamer from sleep by simply activating the app, and the way the background colour of the app changes according to the colour of the artwork, all bring a smile to your face.



standard 16-bit/44.1kHz WAV rip of Daft Punk's *Lose Yourself To Dance* and the HAP-ZIES shows a nice funky fluidity. Pharrell's high-pitched vocal peaks without any hardness or harshness. Bass notes sound weighty and rounded, with even the subtle ones in the background making their presence felt. The repetitive strumming on the lead guitar sounds tight, distinct and punctuates the track perfectly.

more attacking character. Switched on, the Sony goes for a fuller, slightly smoother sound with greater body. You lose a little in terms of attack, but we preferred the balance with it switched on.

Good work with low-res files

Even compressed tracks and internet radio stations sound relatively luxurious through the HAP-Z1ES. A 320kbps AAC rip of Eminem's *Bad Guy* obviously lacks the dynamic headroom and outright resolution of the CD original, but the Sony's forgiving ability to unearth detail and keep the organisation and rhythm of the track intact is a real highlight. it on and off, we couldn't hear any major differences, certainly nothing as obvious as the differences you can hear with the DSD Remastering engine.

The HAP-Z1ES is a great blend of the traditional and modern. If you're already in the habit of using a NAS for storing all your tunes, then the Sony probably isn't for you. Part of the Sony's internal wizardry is its DSD Remastering engine, which converts all music files to DSD, supposedly improving sound quality in the process. Thanks to the latest software update, you have the option of turning it on or off, so during testing we experimented to see if we could hear any differences. Turned off, music seems to have a slightly edgier, Internet radio is, of course, a hazardous melting pot of seriously low bitrates (some fall well into double-figures). There's no shortage of machines that find it hard work making ridiculously compressed music sound listenable, but the Sony manages it.

To help, Sony recommends using its DSEE (Digital Sound Enhancement Engine) which claims to be able to improve sound quality, but switching

Cyrus has a brilliant track record with CD players. We can't think of a rival company that has produced so many great players over the last decade or so. So when we say we think the CDi is arguably the best integrated machine the company has ever made. we don't do so lightly.

The CDi replaces both the CD6 SE2 and CD8 SE2 players in the company's range. It falls between them in price, but easily eclipses them both in performance. You'd never guess it from the outside - which looks just like any slot-loading Cyrus we've seen in recent years - but there's been a lot of work put into this player.

Revised transport mechanism

It uses the latest version of the company's transport mechanism. Cyrus has continued to develop this system and the software behind it, and is particularly proud of the transport's ability to read the data from the disc correctly the first time rather than relying on error correction to fill in the gaps.

The company claims 20 per cent fewer reading errors with this transport than the best off-the-shelf alternatives it could find. That's a huge reduction.

The other technical highlight with the CDi is an upgraded DAC section that uses a new 32-bit design. The aim, as always, is to improve resolution and dynamics while keeping noise and distortion to a minimum.

Build quality is good. The CDi is built into one of Cyrus's half-width casings, which give a rigid, low-resonance structure. The company has finally changed the remote control and it's a nice back-lit affair. It's also easier to use than the previous effort. We're

agility and dynamic expression above all else. We certainly haven't come across a more insightful performer below £1500.

Authoritative and expressive

Eminem's Marshall Mathers LP 2 is a hard-sounding album, but this Cyrus takes it all in its stride. The presentation has greater weight and low-end authority than its predecessors, but it's the CDi's way with rhythms that really catches our attention. It's dazzlingly expressive, capturing the changes of pace and momentum superbly.

Move onto Tchaikovsky's 1812 Overture and we're taken by the Cyrus's dynamic

reach and its ability to keep track of delicate musical strands when the piece gets busy. We've heard more expansive soundstages (something the addition of a PSX-R improves) but the Cyrus counters with impressive precision and focus. All in all, a performance full of finesse and drama.

Solid Albergo sounds the part



The Albergo+ is a solid, comfortablesounding DAB/FM radio alarm. It seems to be aimed squarely at the hotel market (at least that's what we infer from a glance at the product page on Tivoli's website), with the emphasis on ease of use and a mellow sound. Tivoli is convinced that such strengths ought to translate to the domestic situation as well. And it's probably right.

FM, DAB and Bluetooth

So what do you get for your £200? A nicely constructed, solid (if a little plasticky) unit in a choice of five finishes: blue, red and green have recently been added to the white and graphite in the shops from launch. There are FM and DAB tuners, and Bluetooth streaming to go along with a 3.5mm input, and a credit-card style remote control unit. There's also the facility to add another speaker (£80) to create a neat little stereo system.

And Tivoli is right: this is a simple-to-use, intuitive unit. Pull up the telescopic aerial, push the button on the top to get things going, select your input and away it goes, scanning the airwaves for stations.

A meaty midrange sound

The sound is typical of a good radio – weighted to the midrange to enhance the human voice. It has surprisingly meaty bass for a compact box – indeed we found the need to fiddle with the settings to dial this down a little. Treble is clean, clear and nicely balanced. But it's the midrange that draws the listener's attention.

The controls on the front are clearly labelled and carry out the major functions of tuning, source input and alarm setting. The remote control carries out the other, more tweaky stuff. This works perfectly well as a control system, but it does mean you'll have to be careful not to lose the slim remote control. Without it, you will have no access to the station presets or the tone controls, for example. And you will probably want to have a tinker to get the unit sounding right for you - we found

there was a definite thickness in the lower/ mid area. You'll soon find you can have too much of a chocolatey velvety sound.Tone things down a bit with the controls, though, and you'll be able to hunker down for a good long session.

Decent sound over Bluetooth

The Bluetooth function works nicely. Set-up is simple and the sound is consistent with what we found with radio reception.

There's much to like with the Albergo+. Its problem is that there are rivals out there that sound as good but are cheaper, or have more features for the same price.

This neat unit deserves to be on a shortlist, though. Its mellow tones might be just what you're looking for.

Sony PlayStation 4 | Games Console | £350 Let battle recommence

You've done well if you've managed to miss the launch of the Sony PlayStation 4. First announced back in February 2013. all sorts of hype and hyperbole has followed since. Now the PS4 is finally a reality, and in time to do battle for next-gen console supremacy with Microsoft's Xbox One.

Much of the talk around these new consoles has concerned their role as all-singing. all-dancing entertainment hubs. ready to take centre stage in your living room and your AV system. However, in the months before launch, Sony took a step back from this, suggesting the PS4 is a games console first, and indeed second.

Conversely, Microsoft has kept on the home-entertainment message, making much of the Xbox One's TV integration and Blu-ray player. However, as our Xbox One review reveals, the console is far from the

to place it vertically and this is an optional extra (despite being pictured on the box). Inside that box is one of the new DualShock 4 wireless controllers a mono headset (a cheap-looking earbud), an HDMI cable, USB cable and a power cable. Digital all the way

The PS4 connections come in the form of an HDMI and a digital optical output, two USB 3.0 inputs and an auxiliary connection for the new PlayStation Camera (see panel). There's an ethernet connection, too, though the PS4 also has built-in wi-fi. There are no

finished article in that respect. So, does the PS4 carry on where the PS3 left off? Or is it games over features to the detriment of wider home entertainment functionality?

A new slant on design

The PlayStation 4 design looks more like the PS2 than the PS3 - "a PS2 on the wonk" is how we described it in our unboxing video - but it's certainly more compact and generally easier on the eye than the black block that is the Xbox One. The angular edges, touchscreen front buttons and glowing blue power strip make for a suitably next-gen appearance.

It can stand flat or upright, though you're advised to use the official stand if you want analogue connections. an omission that raised some eyebrows at launch.

The PS4 will happily play games, Blu-ray discs and DVDs, but the drive won't play 3D Blu-rays or CDs. Strange but true. The reaction to these missing features appeared to take Sony by surprise, and the firm has since announced that an update to allow this functionality may well roll out.

There's also no DLNA streaming another feature present on the PS3 - nor support for streaming Bluetooth audio or generally playing your digital music. So while the original PlayStation, the PS2 and the PS3 all jumped aboard the disc of choice at the time (CD_DVD and Blu-ray respectively), it seems Sony doesn't see the

Essentially, Sony would rather you used the PS4's apps for streaming music and video, mainly Sony Music (monthly subscription) and Video Unlimited (pay-as-you-go). There are other apps for music and video available from the PlayStation Store, such as BBC iPlayer, Lovefilm and Netflix. The PS4 comes with 500GB storage - you do have the option to upgrade this by replacing the internal hard disk - but this is mainly for saving games.

PS4 vs Xbox One



The Xbox One - some £80 more expensive, albeit with the Kinect included in that price arguably looks more interesting and innovative, in no small part down to the TV integration and PVR functionality, but at launch the Xbox's key features are something of a let down. A little

Sony has headed in the other direction with the PS4. Games are the focus and for a gaming

machine, it's the more impressive. That said, there's still plenty of additional functionality - on-board streaming, catch-up TV, web browsing - but the ommisions of 3D Blu-ray, CD and DLNA streaming, are a shame.

It's a real score draw. If you want next-gen gaming, we'd plump for the PS4, but if you're after that home entertainment hub of dreams. think Xbox One.

Beyond the games

It's a sign of the times that even a console that puts gaming front and centre still offers all sorts of extra entertainment. The PlayStation Store sells apps, movies, TV shows and access to Music Unlimited. as well as games, while there's an internet browser and Facebook integration, too.

Navigation is essentially through two rows of icons. A top line gives you access to the general settings and your profile; drop down a level and your games and apps appear in order of most recently opened.

It's undoubtedly the PS4's strongest string, which may be no great surprise, but with all the talk of the wider home entertainment capabilities of such devices, it's no longer a given.

Neat integration of catch-up TV and music and movie apps is good, but there's no denying some of the holes in the wider spec sheet when it comes to home entertainment.

The interface itself is nice and nippy, but jumping between open apps takes 10 seconds or so which, while understandable, feels like a delay compared with the smartphones and tablets we've become accustomed to

While Microsoft makes a big play of the Kinect system, which comes bundled with the Xbox One, your first port of call for controlling the PS4 will be the standard controller, the new DualShock 4. And it's a big improvement. It feels more comfortable, the grips are bigger and the triggers seem more accurate. There's also a standard headphone jack so you can now connect any pair of headphones to hear PS4 audio. And sound quality is decent.

Ticking the Blu-ray box

So, it won't play 3D Blu-rays or CDs, but how does it perform with what it can play? More than adequately - but not a patch on a dedicated player. Compared with the Sony BDP-S370, a £200 spinner, it gives away sharpness, dynamic colour and overall detail. Motion isn't handled quite as smoothly either, but there's little sign of noise, colours are presented faithfully and the level of insight is adequate. Sonically it's a little less substantial, too.

This is a small unit at 5x16x15cm, but it delivers hugely ASP options The electrickery works surprisingly well at making the sound for headphones more realistic. We prefer setting 'i'.

The name of the Prime Headphone Amplifier makes its intended purpose clear. It has built-in digital-to-analogue circuitry, but we get the feeling most of the effort has gone into the analogue amplification stages.

It has no fewer than three headphone outputs: two 6.3mm and one 3.5mm option. It's happy to drive multiple headphones, but we find the sound is a little better defined when just one pair is driven.

Meridian is a master at signal processing, so it's no surprise to find 'Analogue Spatial Processing' on board the Prime.

It's a function designed to counteract the fact that stereo recordings are designed to be played over speakers, not headphones. ASP blends the left and right channels to varying degrees - there are three options to try to create a more natural presentation. These features can often compromise clarity and focus to improve sound staging, but ASP sounds pretty convincing.

though at a higher level when it comes to sound quality.

The tonal balance is nicely judged and the Prime never sounds flustered or rushed. It's totally in control – perhaps a bit too much, as some of the excitement is tempered. Dynamic punch and rhythmic drive are reined in a touch, too.

It's when we try the line-level inputs that we're surprised. Through the analogue inputs the Prime sounds more entertaining. Rhythmically it's more forceful, and there's plenty of punch with music as diverse as Adele's *19* and Metallica's *Enter Sandman*. All the insight and composure we noticed through the USB input is still present, but there's more spice to the sound.

The Prime also works well as a dedicated stereo preamp. It's certainly right up there with some of the best preamps we've heard at around the £1000 mark.

We were worried Meridian had been too ambitious in its pricing – if this were only a DAC we'd mark it down because of that high price. But this is a supremely capable headphone amplifier and also a fine, if slightly feature-limited, stereo preamp. And that is enough for the full five stars.

If you have some music to play, there's a good chance the RCD-N8 will find some way of playing it. This little unit is capable of an awful lot - take a deep breath. It's a CD player; has a 30-pin Apple dock for playback and charging; lets you hook up an Apple device or flash drive with USB; accepts other gadgets via the 3.5mm port; there's AirPlay and wi-fi on board (the latter for playing directly from Spotify and Last.fm through the system's built-in apps); it receives FM and internet radio too; is DLNA 1.5-certified for streaming music from a connected laptop or NAS drive; and has an optical input for connecting to your TV. Phew.

There's no Bluetooth, though, which seems like quite an oversight.

Warm and punchy sound

Denon offers matching speakers, but we tested the RCD-N8's main unit with a pair of Award-winning Q Acoustics 2010is.

Play a CD and it shows off a warm and punchy character, with a decent level of detail and a well-balanced sound. It's no slouch either: there's plenty of get up and go here, all helped along by an expressive, fluid midrange, and tight bass (we never felt the need to use the subwoofer output).

The treble steers clear of sounding harsh or thin and playing The Fratellis' Henrietta cymbals stay crisp and realistic. It's not the most refined treble we've heard - the Marantz CR610 does a better job but it's not offensive to the ears, which is often half the battle on smaller systems.

Organisation isn't class-leading either. We liked it best with simpler music.

We like the Spotify and Last.fm access. Once online and signed in, you'll have the ability to search as normal or access your playlists, all displayed on the OLED screen.

Playing music through Spotify sounded a little more congested and disorganised than CD, and dynamically lacked a bit of punch. But there's little doubt most will be happy to trade a little clarity for the convenience.

Playback was stable throughout too, no doubt helped by the inclusion of Wi-Fi Multi Media, a feature that prioritises audio data on a network over less time-sensitive applications.

Playback via USB offers a fair amount of format support, including MP3, WMA, AAC and ALAC, plus FLAC and WAV in 24-bit/192kHz quality. Feed this system the best quality you can and it will reward you, but lower quality material is given a polish too, and sounds perfectly listenable.

USE IT WITH Q Acoustics

Of course it's very hard not to draw comparisons with the similar Marantz M-CR610 and Marantz's unit takes the Denon when it comes to refinement, organisation and detail. There's a bit more punch here, but everywhere else the Denon just falls a little short.

But then the Marantz is £100 more, which is a consideration to be made when many will be paying for speakers on top. It might not quite match the Marantz, but the RCD-N8 is worth a look if you want compact kit that does a bit of everything.

Pioneer SC-LX87 | AV receiver | £2000 The home-cinema jackpot

Behold: the SC-LX87 - Pioneer's flagship home cinema amp for 2014. This is a show-stopping powerhouse that builds on the sturdy foundations laid down by last year's Award-winning SC-LX86.

There are plenty of budget AV receivers on the market, but £2000 gets you a boost in power, a wealth of connections and features, and a properly impressive 9.2-channel surround sound performance.

Startlingly precise and powerful

We start with an exercise in annoying the neighbours with a Blu-ray of *Man of Steel*. The scene where Zod is overwhelmed by sound is an excellent test of effects placement. Your attention is grabbed by the fire alarm from the front-right channel, and then yanked over to the surround-back-left where a dog is barking. Then tyres screech around you and planes zoom overhead. Precision is the key here, and the SC-LX87 is so spot-on we almost found ourselves glancing at the off-screen commotion.

It's not just the location and panning of sound that impresses us. The Pioneer shows remarkable agility, throwing effects around with confidence and extraordinary speed. You also get far-reaching dynamics, thanks in part

to the sheer power on hand. Combine that with a big, open soundfield: it's a convincingly immersive atmosphere.

Fantastic finesse

This is helped by the sound's insight, transparency and texture. In fact, you can close your eyes and still not be in the dark about just what is going on around you. Is that the sound of someone getting shot? No, it's someone getting shot while wearing impervious armour, and bullets are bouncing off as empty cases clink to the ground.

It's not all about the action, of course. The Pioneer is more than willing to shift down a few gears. It's as adept at low-key contemplation as it is with large-scale mayhem. Speech, as with everything else, is delivered with precision. Words are enunciated clearly, never glossing over even the subtlest inflection.

You can add tonal balance to this extensive list of praise too. Last year's SC-LX86 tended to edge ever so slightly to the bright side, but that doesn't happen with the LX87. Here you get an evenhanded approach to the frequency range. The bass is taut and judged well enough not to be imposing. Treble is prominent, but rounded just enough to avoid sharpness.

What of the competition?

The Pioneer even fares well against the Award-winning Yamaha RX-A3O3O. The LX87's agility and precision are its greatest strengths, and here it has an edge over the Yamaha. The champ counters with a slightly bigger soundfield, as well as a richer, smoother presentation.

It's a really tough call, and a lot of it is down to taste. We'd give this one to the Yamaha for being more comfortable with longer listens, but it's very, very close. As ever, we'd recommend an audition to see which side you come down on.

We'd consider slapping a five-star badge on the Pioneer for its stonkingly good sound alone, but there are other elements to consider. You'd expect plenty of tech from a high-end amplifier, and the SC-LX87 impresses here too.

In detail

There's a plentiful supply of HDMI ports here – nine in and three out. So the Pioneer should cope with even the most outlandish of kit-racks.

There's an ethernet port for wired networking duties, and you can use the USB port for a wi-fi

adapter if you'd rather go wireless. It's a bit fiddly to set up, though, and we prefer a wired connection for better stability.

3 User-friendly socketry

The nicely spaced speaker terminals are sturdy enough to cope with pretty chunky cable. It makes set-up easier on the knuckles, too.







What App? iControlAV2013

The remote control is clearly laid out, but the best way to control this amp is Pioneer's fabulous iControlAV2013 app for Android and iOS. We found it much easier and more intuitive than the traditional remote. Its slick panels let you tinker to your heart's content, as well as scroll through music folders on different streaming options.

There are nine channels of amplification, each delivering 220W (last year's SC-LX86 had 140W per channel). You get 4K passthrough and upscaling through the nine HDMI inputs, one of which is MHL (Mobile High-Definition Link) compatible. This means it will accept 1080p video and surround sound from compatible phones. There are not one but three HDMI outputs.

Streaming and networking

The Pioneer is DLNA-certified, so you can play music from NAS devices and networked computers. AirPlay handles streaming from Apple devices, and HTC Connect does the same for select HTC devices such as the HTC One. Spotify Connect is on hand for sending music directly to the amp from a device running Spotify on the same network too. And you can also play music from iOS devices (Lightning or otherwise) and USB sticks through the front panel's USB port. Supported formats include AIFF, WAV, FLAC, Apple Lossless and DSD.

There's also an asynchronous USB input: you can plug your computer into the Type B USB socket at the back of the machine so you can use the Pioneer's built-in DAC instead of your computer's if you choose. Stereo audio performance is very good for a surround-sound amplifier. It's clear and detailed, with plenty of pluck and there's a good degree of cohesion.

For digital audio, there are two each of coaxial and optical inputs. Analogue is well catered for, thanks to the smattering of stereo sockets and a full set of multichannel inputs. There are also four inputs for composite video and three for component.

An ethernet socket handles wired internet, and there's a bundled adaptor for wi-fi. We'd stick to ethernet: it's more stable and the wireless adapter is a bit fiddly. An optional Bluetooth adapter is available too.

This amp is a joy to use. The interface is easy to navigate, and updating it to the latest firmware version is a swift task. Setting up the speakers is simple, too: the auto-calibration process takes a little while, but it is thorough and accurate.

A must-audition amp

We love the Pioneer SC-LX87. It's a multi-talented powerhouse with nearly everything we could ask for. We're deeply impressed by its precise, punchy sound and delighted by its host of features. If you're in the market for a high-end home cinema amp, you must give this a listen.

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Samsung Galaxy Note 10.1 | Tablet | £450 Big Android goes gunning for Apple

Living with it

The Samsung Galaxy Note 10.1 (2014 Edition) is much closer to the tablet we wanted the original to be, and finally looks like something that could take on the iPad.

For a start, it looks a lot nicer than the old model, having shaved a centimetre from either side of the bezel, slimmed down to an iPad-bothering 7.9mm and dropped 60g in weight too.

Stunning screen

Its 10.1in, 2560 x 1600-pixel screen has a super-sharp density of 299 pixels per inch, and is one of the best on the market. It doubles the resolution of its predecessor and pips the iPad Air for on-paper specs.

But the proof is, of course, in the viewing - and there's no doubt that the Note 10.1's screen looks stunning. Icons and text are seriously sharp, while colours are bold and punchy, demonstrating the vivid palette we've come to expect from Samsung kit.

We found colour in video to be more natural than we've seen on some previous Samsung tablets and smartphones, which have had a tendency to look oversaturated. We still prefer the iPad Air's more neutral

colour balance overall, but there's no denying that the richer hues make for attractive viewing. Elsewhere, whites are impressively punchy, though blacks could be deeper. Knock the brightness down a few notches and this does improve, though you will lose that zing from your whites...

As you'd expect from such a high-res screen, detail is superb, with sharp outlines and smooth motion. The iPad Air has a better way with fine detail though, giving a better sense of depth, and we did have instances where some colour gradients suffered from banding rather than being smooth, which wasn't the case on the Air.

Sound could be better

The Note 10.1's stereo speakers are placed so they won't get covered when held in landscape or portrait. Their position, not to mention that of the home button and Samsung logo, would suggest the Note is intended to be used in landscape, though.

The result is a mixed bag. The soundfield is better than the iPad's mono speaker, and it goes louder too. However it's thin and lacks warmth or friendliness, with very little bass and a treble that's dangerously close to sounding harsh at higher volumes. The Air is much more subtle and dynamic. Headphones are therefore a better solution for movies and music. The performance isn't quite as punchy or solid as the Air, but it's rich and detailed, with reasonable timing and a good handle on dynamics for a portable. It supports most popular formats too, including FLAC and WAV up to 24-bit/192kHz.

Really nice to use

Performance is quick. Very quick. Web pages and apps load swiftly (though we found some Samsung apps a bit crash-prone), menu swiping is fluid and multitasking is, on the whole, stutterfree. That's hardly surprising considering the power behind the Note 10.1, which uses the eight-core Exynos 5 chip.

There's also 3GB of RAM, 1GB more than we're used to seeing (even in premium devices), and a choice of 16-, 32- or 64GB storage options with microSD card support.

One of the Note 10.1's main selling points is its stylus, the S Pen. Whether this will be of use will depend entirely on what you use your tablet for - heavy movie watchers might find less use for it, while business users and arty types will undoubtedly find the note-taking and design apps handy.

After falling short in the tablet market for a while now, Samsung has finally produced a tablet that could prove a credible alternative to the iPad - though its price might prove a stumbling block.

It still can't match its Apple competitor for video or audio prowess, but its screen, performance, form factor and S Pen stylus will doubtless be a draw for many who aren't so taken by Apple's tablet.

Without the Samsung skin on the Android OS, and with a more competitive price tag, we'd like it that little bit more.

Smart TV

How we watch TV Smart, mobile and on-demand increase – but live TV still dominates

ablet and smartphone usage for TV and radio may be on the increase - but the TV remains more central than ever to the average family's home entertainment, according to the latest research.

While we now own on average three internet-enabled devices and 40% of people consume catch-up TV content at least once a month, the vast majority of TV programmes (90%) are still viewed live and on a large TV.

Unsurprisingly, multitasking has massively increased, with 81% of tablet users and 79% of smartphone users admitting to doubling up on screens while watching telly. Tablets are now the main method of connecting to the internet for a third of tablet owners.

The figures were revealed in the annual survey of media consumption by telecoms regulator Ofcom.

Bigger, smarter TVs

The type of TV in UK homes has, perhaps unsurprisingly, got smarter and bigger in the past 12 months.

7% of the UK population owned a smart TV in Q1 2013, a 2% increase from the previous year, with 77% of those connecting their set to the 'net.

That said, 60% of people said that smart TV hadn't been a factor in their purchase, but they bought a set that happened to have the functionality it's simply a function of the set rather than being a demanded feature.

Meanwhile, the average TV has got bigger - 69% of TV sets sold in Q1 2013 had a 26in screen or larger, while 43in+ TVs now account for 15.8% of sales, a 4.3% increase over the previous year.

UK smartphone ownership hit 51% in Q1 of 2013, up from just 27% two years ago, while tablet ownership more than doubled from 11 per cent to 24 per cent.

Radio listening has meanwhile seen impressive growth on mobile and the internet, up from 13% to 20% on smartphones in the last 12 months.

DAB switchover delayed

The Government has again delayed the planned switchover for digital radio in the UK. Communications Minister Ed Vaizey said: "We are not ready for the radio switchover." The switchover could now be delayed until at least 2020.

Vaizey said he wanted to improve the digital radio service and coverage before the switchover took place. "We are putting in place the conditions to get us ready to set a date." But the Government "can't simply wave a wand and make it happen." He would not be drawn into giving a firm date for digital switchover.



Under the last Labour Goverment digital radio switchover was planned for 2015. But concerns about infrastructure costs and delays in consumers' takeup of digital radio – particularly in cars – led to a belief that switchover could be delayed until at least 2017, or even 2020.

The Government's criteria set out for switchover still stipulate that the digital listening share in the UK must reach 50 per cent of all listening hours, that local commercial and national DAB coverage should be equal to that on FM and that there should be "significant progress on conversion of cars to digital radio".

The aim is for 50% of new cars to have DAB radio by next year. Currently 41% of

new cars have DAB fitted as standard, with another 20% having it as an option.

Vaizey is not giving up on the plan however: "I absolutely believe that the future of radio in this country is digital. We cannot go backwards. The radio listener will get a much better service, and better functionality. There will be far more choice, with many more stations."

Ford Ennals, chief executive of Digital Radio UK - the body in charge of switchover in the UK - added: "We will continue to plan for radio switchover and the achievement of the criteria, and look forward to the future confirmation of a switchover date which will give industry the certainty it needs."

In the third quarter of this year, 35.6 per cent of all radio listening was through digital platforms - a slight decline on the previous three months.

To boost take-up and coverage of digital radio, Ofcom says it will begin the licensing process for a second national DAB network, Digital Two (D2).

WHAT ON EARTH IS A SOUNDBASE?

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hink soundbar, but bigger. In the past year, soundbars have become the most popular way of boosting the characteristically thin sound of TV speakers without having to splash out on a full 5.1 home cinema system. But now there's a new product in town. A soundbase is a flat, rectangular box instead of a slim bar. It's a bigger, simpler, one-box solution to improving TV sound – and you can put your telly right on top of it.

We're taken by the simplicity, and so, it appears, are manufacturers. We have eight new soundbases from eight big-name brands, all aiming to get into your living room.

With prices ranging from £200 to £400, these fledgling products have to prove they're more than just a glorified TV stand. Is a box better than a bar? Start reading to find out...

Cambridge Audio Minx TV £200

Superb sound at a budget price – it's a combination we love, and the Cambridge Audio Minx TV soundbase embraces our performance-per-pound ethos to a tee.

As part of Cambridge Audio's successful and Award-winning Minx range, this new soundbase (or sound 'plinth' as Cambridge Audio calls it) comes with high expectations. And it meets them confidently.

The Cambridge Audio Minx TV is, quite simply, a fantastic listen. Switching from the TV to the soundbase sounds a bit like when you're on a plane and 'pop' your ears - suddenly it sounds as though the entire world has opened up and everything sounds clearer and more spacious. That's exactly the effect of the Minx TV soundbase.

Great sound across the board

It's spacious, dynamic, vibrant and full of satisfying weight. The punchy and agile low end brings some much-needed muscle without sounding too laboured, while the top end sparkles with attack and tension. If you want near-immediate results, though, we would advise running the soundbase in for a couple of nights, as it sounds a bit bright when played straight out of the box.

The Cambridge Audio Minx TV has a similar driver complement to the Minx Air 200 wireless speaker - and this is very good news indeed. Two 6cm balanced-mode radiator drivers and a 16.5cm subwoofer perform together seamlessly to deliver a powerful and wonderfully integrated sound.

It incites interest, whether you're watching repeats of *The Big Bang Theory* or settling down to the delights of space-western *Firefly* on Blu-ray.

Songs streamed via Bluetooth have that lively sense of rhythm, too. While the Minx is no substitute for a dedicated hi-fi system, it does a great job in getting the best out of your digital tunes.

There are four EQ settings, but the differences between them are generally too small for our liking. It's still worth playing around with them though.

The Minx TV's solid build and matt finish look reassuringly stable, although the wooden finish betrays where Cambridge Audio has saved the money. The raised feet lend themselves to the 'plinth' status, and the wooden cabinet is sturdy - we wouldn't be worried about placing a large-screen TV on top.

Fit for purpose

Connectivity is limited but practical. The main connection is the digital optical input, but there's also a pair of phono inputs and a 3.5mm jack. You can stream audio files from your smartphone via Bluetooth, too. There is, however, no display. We feel the need to gripe about this, as the Maxell MXSP-SB3000 (the Minx TV's direct price rival) spoils us with a fantastic one. The Minx TV does have an LED status indicator though.

Proof positive that you can get quality sound across the frequency range without paying through the nose

The fly in the ointment

The remote control, on the other hand, is an abysmally flimsy and dinky plastic wafer. It's similar to the remote you get with the Minx 100 and 200 wireless speakers, but we'd like something more substantial for a soundbase.

The Cambridge Audio Minx TV is everything we want from a soundbase. Punchy, dynamic, clear and exciting - it improves upon flatscreen TV's tinny sound in every way. The only rival that delivers a superior performance is the Canton DM 50, but that's double the price. The Minx TV is an utterly engaging listen, delivering enthusiasm and subtlety in the same breath.

The DM 50 sets the bar for soundbase design: it looks gorgeous, it's the ideal size, and we reckon it'll look good with any TV



Canton DM 50 £400

The Canton DM 50 is a lesson in what a soundbase should sound and look like. With its premium quality build and lavishly detailed sound, it fully justifies its £400 price tag.

Our first impression of the Canton DM 50 is one of power. This is a big and muscular sound for a soundbase, filling the room with breathtaking dynamics. We are enveloped by a rich, full-bodied sound that packs a punch while also allowing space for the top end to soar.

Bass that'll make you smile

The DM 50 digs up plenty of detail, with voices packed with emotion and subtlety. The bass performance is the star here, sounding gorgeously deep, taut and agile with TV and music. Stream Kansas's *Carry On Wayward Son* over Bluetooth and the Canton charges along with great rhythm, taut guitar pluckage and bagfuls of energy.

It's the most dynamically subtle soundbase we've heard so far, too, with more depth and insight than the rival Cambridge Audio Minx TV. The trade-off for that authoritative bass performance is that it can sound a bit too rich at times.

Sound mode options

It's worth experimenting with the two sounds modes available on the DM 50. In Stereo mode, the Canton is tightly focused and cohesive. Surround mode predictably injects a sense of space, but without pushing voices to the back. We are happy listening to either.

The Canton goes to the top of the class with its stunning build and elegant design. It has a satisfying heft to it, and feels like it will easily shoulder the weight of most big-screen TVs. It's impeccably finished too, the smooth, semi-gloss finish (available in black, white or silver) adding a touch of class.

The DM 50 sets the bar for soundbase design: it looks gorgeous, it's the ideal size, and we reckon it'll look good with any TV, in any living room. If you want a great-looking soundbase, then your £400 will be well spent.

The fly in the ointment

Single optical and coaxial inputs and a pair of phono connectors are all the connections you get on the Canton DM 50. It's adequate enough for a direct connection to your TV (optical connection is our favourite method), but we would like a better breadth of connections, such as HDMI inputs. There is a subwoofer output too, in case you want more bass (you don't need it.)

Bluetooth streaming is on board, complete with the aptX codec support that boosts the streaming quality from your smart device. The Canton's front panel has a blindingly bright blue LED display that indicates all the basic and important information, such as the selected input, the volume level and sound mode.

You can also control the bass and treble levels. We toned down the bass just a touch, but left the treble alone.

All of this can be adjusted from a nicely made, big chunk of remote control. Unlike the small, flimsy flat remotes that are supplied with most rival soundbases (the Cambridge Audio Minx TV and Orbitsound SB60 are the worst offenders), the Canton's is solid and reassuringly hefty. The buttons are large, neat, responsive and easy to use.

The DM 50's rich, velvety sound, deep subtlety and effortless power easily wins us over. It's a thrilling performance. The only fly in Canton's ointment is the Cambridge Audio Minx TV, which performs almost as well, but for half the cost. For some, the extra will be justified.

DENON

Denon DHT-T100 £250

What do you do with a soundbase that's nicer to use than it is to listen to? The Denon DHT-T100 presents such a conundrum. On the one hand, it's effortless in use. On the other, it's not the exciting, involving listen you'd hope for.

The DHT-T100 delivers a smooth and balanced sound, but just plays it a little too safe. There's decent weight to its presentation, one that ties the overall sound together with a smooth, civilised treble. It's definitely inoffensive, but at the cost of delivering a truly engaging and punchy sound. There's a good spread of sound, but it's not as open and powerful as the likes of Onkyo's LS-T10 or the Canton DM 50.

Indifferent presentation

Dynamically it's a little flat. There needs to be more subtlety and clarity to convey the nuances in dialogue, and excitement of sound effects, in Joss Whedon's *Dollhouse* TV series.

Voices sound a little muffled and indistinct too, and it's a quality that makes us feel indifferent towards the Denon's sound.

The same characteristics apply to songs streamed over Bluetooth, which don't sound as cohesive and rhythmic as they should, their basslines short on tautness and agility. Things do, however, sound more focused in Music mode. The DHT-T100 is a good size and shape for a soundbase, we reckon: not too bulky, not too slim, and it has a discreet black finish to boot.

It does feel just a little plasticky to touch. We'd like a more substantial feel, even though its stated 27kg weight limit will easily support most flatscreen TVs.

Connectivity is mostly digital

The DHT-T100 focuses on digital connections, with optical and coaxial inputs on the rear panel, but there are no HDMI inputs. The optical input is the main connection to the TV. A 3.5mm input is the only analogue connection.

The higher-quality aptX Bluetooth codec is supported here, although we don't find the Denon discriminating enough to emphasise the difference.

This is the point at which we'd normally launch into a tirade about how there's no display, but Denon has a way around this issue: LEDs that glow in different combinations to indicate status.

A light touch

The touch-sensitive controls on the top panel light up with white LEDs when a certain input is selected (there are buttons for power, TV, Bluetooth, volume, mute). But the clever touch is how the entire row of logos lights up and goes up or down in line with volume changes. They all dim again after a few seconds too, so there's no confusion about what mode you're in.

The Denon's five listening modes have distinct LED combinations that are easy to decipher at a glance. It's a great visual aid, and is easy to get accustomed to after the first cycle of button-pressing on the remote control.

The remote is nicely made, too. It's slim and small, with a smooth rubber finish and responsive inlaid buttons. It's these little touches that make the Denon soundbase so nice to use.

It's a bit telling that we're more excited about the Denon's dancing LEDs than we are about its sound. It's an inoffensive listen, but it just doesn't stand out from the crowd - a crowd that includes exciting and dynamic rivals such as the Cambridge Audio Minx TV and Canton DM 50. It's decent value if you want smooth and easy operation, but we'd look elsewhere for outright sound quality.

LG LAP340 SoundPlate £350

You know something's wrong when your TV sounds better than the soundbase that's supposed to provide it with an audio upgrade.

The LG LAP340 SoundPlate came with high expectations. LG's budget soundbars, after all, have won group tests and Awards in the past year. In this new soundbase form, we expect LG to deliver just as good TV-bettering sound.

So we're baffled, and downright disappointed, that the LG LAP340 SoundPlate sounds so shockingly poor. This soundbase delivers a confused, disorganised sound. It sounds very weak, and has a coarse, harsh edge that's really hard to ignore. Or like.

Unpleasant combination

The sound manages to be both boomy and bright - it's a rather unpleasant combination. The bass is loud and unruly, while the top end is prone to brightness. It tones down after a couple of days' running in, but the bright edge doesn't fade entirely. Activating the Cinema Sound mode does open up the performance, but it also overemphasises the bass.

The midrange has a scooped-out quality to it. Voices sound lost and hollow and, coupled with the muddled detail definition, there's precious little emotion conveyed through dialogue. When it's all put together there's a real lack of cohesion and refinement here. Even worse, we found ourselves preferring the smoother, clearer and focused sound of the TV we were using for the test. Our reference screen, the Panasonic TX-P42GT60B, has a smoother, clearer and more focused sound. Yes, we were shocked, too.

Points for design

We can see why LG calls the LAP340 a 'Plate' - it's slimmer and flatter than any other soundbase we've seen so far, and an ideal design for the minimalistminded, tucking away neatly under any big-screen TV. Despite the LG's somewhat lightweight and plasticky feel, we've no doubt its sturdy 38kg weight limit will easily support most large tellies. It's nicely put together too, although it doesn't quite exude the same quality of finish as the Canton DM 50 or Panasonic SC-HTE80.

The bare minimum

The SoundPlate has an optical input, and Bluetooth streaming. And that's it. Given the £350 price, we feel short-changed. Compared with the multiple HDMI and analogue connections offered by the Panasonic SC-HTE80 and Maxell MXSP-SB3000 for £250 and less, the LG's sparse offering leaves us underwhelmed. Still, a colour-changing LED makes it clear when the soundbase is muted (red), connected via optical (green), or in Bluetooth mode (orange).

We do like the LG's remote control, though. It's small and light, but with big, simple buttons that are easy to find in the dark. The black rubber finish with orange accents is nice, it's responsive, and we like how simple it is to use.

There are also control buttons for power and volume, but they're at the back of the unit. Why? We have no idea.

We're dismayed by the LG LAP340 SoundPlate's performance. It's relatively pricey, too, which further hurts its case. A £350 bill comes with certain expectations of sound quality and features, and the LG simply fails to deliver.

We're surprised at how much LG has missed the mark here, given its soundbar successes. As a solution to improve the sound of your TV, the LG SoundPlate fails spectacularly.

Maxell MXSP-SB3000 £220

We haven't seen a Maxell thing in our testing rooms in a very long time, so we were pleasantly surprised when the company put forward the MXSP-SB3000 in the new soundbase category. And we are pleasantly surprised again when it sounds pretty damn good.

We quickly warm to the Maxell's crisp, clear and incredibly easy-going sound. Run it in, connect it to your telly, and simply enjoy a smooth and engaging performance. Sure, it lacks the outright subtlety and dynamism of rival soundbases such as the Cambridge Audio Minx TV and Canton DM 50, but there's enough detail here to bring out the nuances in voices.

Turn it up to feel the benefit

We'd like a touch more weight and power to the sound, but we like the clarity and agility on offer. The volume has to go quite high for maximum impact, though. At low volume, the Maxell's crisp edges sound just a little subdued, making it hard to hear clearly.

If you do want to inject some width to the Maxell's sound, turn on the 'SRS' function. It claims to enhance the stereo field and deliver 3D sound, but what it *actually* does is pull apart the SB3000's naturally cohesive sound - not a good thing in the slightest. The sound is bigger and peripheral sound effects are given more attention, but it's at the cost of that wonderfully expressive and focused midrange. We'd keep it off.

There are five EQ presets to choose from, with the 'Standard' mode being our favourite for its balanced sound.

Maxell calls the SB3000 a 'soundbar', but it looks more like a hoverboard to us. The slender box's tapered edges prevent it from looking bland, while the mattblack finish and fluorescent display look smart. We like it, but it lacks the outright quality of finish and build to compete against the likes of the Panasonic.

It's big, though. We suspect not everyone will have a big enough TV or AV rack to accommodate this soundbase. The Maxell has a proper, informative display, making it the most user-friendly soundbase we've come across so far. It tells you in one glance which input is being used, the current volume and which sound mode is turned on. It even has four dimming levels.

Nice operation, nicely displayed

You can mute the sound, employ the 'SRS' mode and pair your smart devices to stream music via Bluetooth - all options are clearly displayed on the Maxell's front panel. There are responsive touch-sensitive control buttons on the top panel, too, and the remote, though small, is also responsive. This first generation of soundbases is pretty scant on connectivity, but the Maxell breaks the mould by offering a generous helping of digital and analogue connections. Three HDMI inputs is the highlight; the Panasonic SC-HTE80 is the only other soundbase to offer HDMI connections. It also has optical and coaxial inputs and an HDMI (with ARC) on the digital side, while a pair of phono connectors and a 3.5mm input are available for analogue sources.

Quality wireless mode

You can stream from smartphones and tablets via Bluetooth (which supports the higher-quality aptX codec), and a front USB port will charge your smart device.

Its size might be ludicrous, but the MXSP-SB3000's excellent feature count and affordable price is hard to ignore. Most of all, we just really like listening to it. For £220, its clear and balanced sound is well worth a listen.

Onkyo LS-T10 £350

If you like your sound big, loud and bassy, you're going to like this Onkyo. But you will have to put up with its shortcomings in other areas.

High hopes and low frequencies

Described as the 'Ultimate One-Box Home Cinema System', the LS-T10 soundbase certainly instils high expectations. It digs deep into the lower frequencies to deliver weighty, rumbling bass. It's open and expansive too, and easily fills the room with dynamic sound.

The almighty punches thrown between the monsters and robots on the *Pacific Rim* Blu-ray have a great 'whomp' to them, but the impactful bass does boom too much. It isn't particularly taut or agile, but the strong, slightly thick sound is a vast improvement on flatscreen TV speakers.

The Onkyo's booming quality is more apparent when streaming songs over Bluetooth. Tracks with a prominent bassline, such as Led Zeppelin's *Dazed and Confused*, sound rather unwieldy - the bass really sticks out. Onkyo does let you adjust the level though, which helps.

Clarity, but at a price

It's a mixed bag with the rest of the frequencies. The treble is clear and has enough space to soar, but it is edged with hardness. Midrange performance,

especially voices, suffer as a result: they sound quite hollow and indistinct. Placing your TV directly on the LS-T10 will give dialogue a little more connection to the on-screen action.

The T10 is big, solidly built and feels reassuringly stable. It's nicely finished, too. It's also wide and sturdy enough to hold any big TV with an elaborate stand.

There are a couple of touch-sensitive buttons for power and volume on the top of the panel, while a white LED indicates which input you've selected: TV, USB or Bluetooth. There's no interesting LED light-show like on the Denon DHT-T100, and a proper display would've been nice, but it's a simple and easy-to-use unit nonetheless.

Bigger buttons, please

The remote control is small and wafer-thin. It's responsive and logical, but we would like bigger, more substantial buttons. It does feature all the (limited) options of the soundbase, though, from changing inputs and volume to adjusting the bass level and setting up Bluetooth connections.

The Onkyo LS-T10 keeps its rear panel simple, with one digital optical, one digital coaxial and one analogue 3.5mm input available. It's similar to the selection offered by the rival Denon DHT-T100, and once again doesn't include HDMI inputs. There is also Bluetooth on board, which is a nice addition even if the soundbase isn't that great with music.

A USB port round the back got us excited, but that elation quickly deflated once we found out it neither charges nor plays music from your smartphone or tablet. It only supports playback of MP3 files stored on a USB stick, but the fine print in the manual states it doesn't guarantee playback from all flash drives.

The LS-TIO is stuck between boomy bass and a hard top end, and doesn't deliver the most engaging and smooth performance. It tries to hit all the right notes – expansive sound, lots of bass, clear treble – but doesn't strike the right balance between them.

If you can look past its shortcomings, the LS-10 will reward you with a huge, dynamic sound that's rich and deep. But 'ultimate' it isn't - for £350 we'd like more from our home-cinema experience.

Orbitsound SB60 AirSound £300

The new Orbitsound SB60 AirSound soundbase looks like a larger version of the company's T12v3 soundbar. It sounds like it, too, which is great news. It's just a shame it's less good in other areas.

The SB6O delivers a signature Orbitsound performance: loud, spacious and tremendously weighty. It's a robust performance, packed with energy to liven up the sound of daytime telly.

It's got plenty of attack, with a 13cm downward-firing subwoofer doing all the heavy lifting. Bass notes are deep, luscious and full of rumble - maybe a little too much at times. The roar of engines on *Top Gear* is loud and aggressive, although a touch of tautness would add even more excitement.

No one-trick pony

But the Orbitsound SB60 isn't just bluntly loud. It can distinguish between different acoustic spaces, easily delivering changes in scale from outdoor scenes to indoor conversations.

It has two side-firing speakers that are essential in spreading that big sound across the room. So make sure you leave plenty of space around the SB60, and don't block those side speakers.

Despite the emphasis on a rich, bassy sound, the SB60 still has plenty of bite at the top end. Voices sound direct, clear and emotive, but we could do with more refinement and subtlety to compete with the superb Canton DM 50. The Maxell MXSP-SB3000 also offers a cleaner, more precise sound for less money.

Beauty is skin deep

At first glance, the Orbitsound SB60 catches the eye with its sleek, glossy black finish. But look closer and that finish masks a cheap-feeling quality of build. The wooden shell feels rather hollow when you tap on it, and it's not as finely finished as its rivals - we'd like more heft and finesse for £300. The Canton DM 50 might cost £100 more, but it gets the build and finish spot on.

(There is an extra feature: you can swap the black front panel for a silver one, included in the box.)

Digital connections are limited to a single optical input, while RCA inputs and a 3.5mm jack take care of the analogue side. There's no Bluetooth streaming, though - something many of the Orbitsound's rivals offer.

Basic featuring

While the AirSound excited us with its enthusiastic sound quality, its meagre feature count is less inspiring. First, there's no display. And that, coupled with a poorly designed remote control, is rather frustrating. There's a single LED indicator, but it isn't that informative. The remote is slim and light, but the cluster of slender buttons is annoying. The volume controls aren't distinguishable from the treble/bass level buttons, so trying to use them instinctively is out of the equation. Bigger, simpler buttons would have been more useful than the playback buttons.

So where does that leave the Orbitsound SB6O soundbase? If we were judging it on sound quality alone, this would be a strong four-star performance. It serves up a robust, wide and satisfyingly punchy sound that needs only a hint more refinement. But when you have to live with a product on a daily basis, little things - such as how intuitive the remote is to use, whether it has a display, how nice it is to use matter. A lot.

We found the SB60 frustrating to use, and its limited features further dispirited us. At £300, we expect more, so three stars it is.

Panasonic SC-HTE80 £250

We can imagine the SC-HTE8O's smart looks and compact size looking at home placed under your TV. But as neat and discreet as it is, we wish there were more oomph to this soundbase's crisp sound.

Lean in the extreme

We didn't expect a huge amount of bass from the Panasonic's compact frame, but we did expect a little more weight than we got. Everything sounds a bit insubstantial next to the more rounded and balanced sound of the Canton DM 50 and Cambridge Audio Minx TV.

Detail is crisp and clear, though, and the overall sound is focused on the midrange and upwards. The treble has plenty of bite and sparkle, but doesn't veer into harsh or sharp territory. It can sound a touch bright when watching standard-definition TV, though.

Dialogue is direct and easy to hear, although the Panasonic needs more subtlety to bring out the nuances in voices. There are two integrated 8cm 'woofers' inside the SC-HTE80, but they can't quite convey the deep and rich bass that would bring a more engaging listen.

Speed and agility

The lightweight sound does mean the Panasonic has a fast, agile delivery. Songs streamed via Bluetooth sound lively, but can edge towards brightness. This is the smallest soundbase we've come across yet, and we suspect it's no coincidence that it seems purpose-built to support Panasonic's own square TV stands. It makes sense for Panasonic to keep it in the family, and the sturdy build will withstand most screen sizes (as long as the set weighs under 30kg). If you own a TV with a wide stand, though, we suspect it might overhang quite a lot and may not be adequately supported.

The build quality itself is impeccable, the MDF casing coming in silver or black brushed-aluminium effect finishes. It's a neat and tidy box, with discreet power and volume buttons on the side.

Visual information

It has a display! Large blue letters let you know which input you're using, from TV (optical) to Bluetooth pairing, as well as the volume level.

The display makes it easy to access and navigate the Panasonic's menus with the rather dinky remote. There are plenty of options to tweak the SC-HTE80's sound, starting with a muchneeded boost in bass performance. Activating H (for Harmonic) Bass adds some much-needed weight, but at the expense of clarity.

There are also six sound modes on offer. They're worth experimenting with, but we'd suggest picking 'Music' when streaming songs via Bluetooth and selecting 'Standard' when you want to watch broadcast TV or a film.

There's a decent selection of inputs on the SC-HTE80, with the presence of HDMI connections a tick in Panasonic's favour. An optical input seems standard on soundbases, but HDMI (one input with ARC output) is rare in this first generation. Analogue connectivity is represented by a pair of RCA inputs.

The soundbase also supports NFC connectivity for one-tap connection to your Android or Windows tablet or smartphone. Along with ensuring Bluetooth is turned on, you will need to download the free Panasonic Music Streaming App for NFC-tapping to work.

It's a step up from tinny TV speakers for sure, and its very affordable, but the SC-HTE80 doesn't feel like the complete solution. We'd like a more even balance across the frequencies, with punchier, more substantial bass.

THE WINNER

Cambridge Audio Minx TV £200 ********

The **Cambridge Audio Minx TV** takes the first-ever win in this new category for its great sound, great build and great value

his was no straightforward *Supertest.* With soundbases still finding their feet in terms of sound and features, there were ups and downs with nearly every product here.

However, two soundbases stood head and shoulders above the others: the Canton DM 50 and Cambridge Audio Minx TV showed us exactly what this new product category is capable of.

Both delivered stunningly detailed and clear, balanced sound, with plenty of bite and character to voices as well as punch and oomph in crashes and explosions. They do a great job with dynamics, and keep you completely engrossed in what you're watching. They're solidly made, too.

A question of value

But there can only be one winner, and the Cambridge Audio has one big advantage over the Canton: price. At £200, the Minx TV is simply better value than the £400 Canton. The Canton has a more premium feel and sound, but the Cambridge Audio sounds almost as exciting - for half the price.

The hoverboard-sized Maxell is the only other soundbase to come close to that level of performance. It might lack some bass and dynamism, but its crisp, easygoing sound was simply lovely to listen to. And when it comes to features, the Maxell makes all of its rivals look bad. The excellent display and multiple connections feel worth more than the £220 price tag, especially when rival companies are charging more for less.

What of the runners up?

The remaining soundbases, however, don't fare so well. A combination of uneven sound performance and limited features leaves us with a huddle of three-star products. The Orbitsound SB60 sounds big, rich and loud, but the bass is just too overstated and unwieldy. The large-scale and spacious Onkyo LS-T10 is let down by a hard top end and a boomy bass. And the Denon DHT-T100 trades excitement for a flat. (albeit even) sound. The Panasonic SC-HTE80's small build seems designed with only Panasonic TVs in mind. and its lightweight sound and top-end focus won't satisfy those who crave punch.

But it's the LG that disappoints us the most. The company produces some great soundbars, so we expected good things. But the harsh, disorganised sound takes us by surprise. A real shame. You can position a soundbase directly underneath your TV, and you won't need a separate subwoofer So, what of the soundbase concept? Whether it's on a shelf or directly under your TV's stand, the single box construction is a neater alternative to soundbars that must sit in front of the TV, sometimes even obstructing the bottom of the screen. The bigger size of the soundbase also means it produces deeper, weightier bass for a fuller, richer overall sound, too. And it also means you don't have to fuss about with a separate subwoofer. Slim soundbars, on the other hand, might be more visually appealing if your TV is wall-mounted.

The limited set of connections (apart from on the Maxell) was a point of contention. We'd like more choice, such as an HDMI input or two. A readable display wouldn't go amiss, either.

A category that's worth watching

It's only the first generation, though, so we're (almost) willing to forgive the spec hiccups. But the products struggling with sound need only to look to Cambridge Audio and Canton. A few tweaks might be needed to iron out all the issues, but for now the Cambridge Audio Minx TV's excellent sound quality for such an affordable price gets the invitation to our living room.

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Why do anything by halves?

Spending upwards of £2000 on stereo speakers is serious business. And here are four serious contenders for your money

PMC Twenty 23 £2300







Tannoy

Spendor A6R £2500



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PMC Twenty 23 £2300 *****

Next to some other speakers at this price, the Twenty 23s seem a little small. These slender two-way floorstanders look like they'd be eaten alive by beefier competitors. And yet they can teach many rivals a thing or two.

Of course, simple physics dictates that a slim cabinet containing just one 14cm mid/bass driver and a 25mm tweeter will never match its rivals in pure volume levels and deep bass reach. That said, the combination of a highquality doped-paper mid/bass driver and PMC's transmission-line bass-loading technique means the Twenty 23s aren't a million miles away - and surprisingly capable in both respects.

In our 5.5m x 4.5m listening room, we never feel left wanting. Their design might not immediately give away the premium price tag in the same way the Tannoy Precision 6.4s do, and they might not be able to compete with the scale and power of the SVS Ultra Towers, but instead the Twenty 23s wow us by just being beautifully balanced.

Dynamic and entertaining

Play *Elephant* by Them Crooked Vultures and the fast-paced guitar intro is relayed with bite and attack, but also with well-judged tonality and a strong sense of refinement. Notes are well formed, the treble is handled well and the song charges along with a confident sense of rhythm. Even when things get busy, every instrument knows its place. Dynamically the Twenty 23s never

hold back either, and you can really hear

the peaks and troughs within a piece: the stops and the starts; the quiet as it builds into loud and back down again. It's precise, yet organic, and never feels false or overdone. There's a large, well-focused soundstage too.

Surprising bass for their size

Strip down to something more vocal based, like Emeli Sande's *Clown*, and you'll hear just how expressive and articulate the PMCs' midrange is. There's stacks of detail up for grabs here, and you can be sure that the 23s will convey every ounce of emotion in a recording.

There's a surprising amount of punch to the low end and, while bass lovers might feel short-changed given the performance of some larger competitors, the 23s' low-frequency performance is still splendidly fast, tight and detailed.

That's in no small part down to the transmission-line design - a technique used by a handful of companies to improve bass performance. It takes the rear output from the mid/bass driver and forces it through a damped path within the cabinet. The higher frequencies are mostly absorbed en route, leaving the lowest notes to exit the speaker at the bottom of its front panel, augmenting the driver and boosting the speaker's bass power in the process.

There could be more weight, and the 23s can't quite compete with larger peers for scale, but we'd pass up a bit of heft to get a compact design that's laid-back on placement and easier to make space for.

The Twenty 23s are proof that you should never judge a book by its cover. Yes, there are more impressive-looking speakers at this price - with better specification sheets, to boot - but when it's performance that matters, these double Award-winning floorstanders speak for themselves.

Spendor A6R £2500 *****

When a manufacturer revises a product we love, it's always going to go one of two ways. Luckily, in the case of the Spendor A6Rs, the result is all good.

The Award-winning Spendor A6 speakers from 2009 have been given a makeover, with big changes including a new mid/bass drive-unit and a reengineered crossover. You'd never know it to look at them, though, as they keep the same compact, understated design as their predecessors. There's a lot of the A6 charm in these new speakers. The musical ability is very much still there, and the A6Rs show a keen interest in making any music you throw at them feel right at home.

Coherent across the board

They put in a superb performance across the frequency range, showcasing a surprisingly deep and punchy low end alongside an expressive midrange and a detailed, refined treble. Each feels like a well-judged part of a whole, slotting together perfectly to produce a well-balanced, coherent listen.

This is in no small part down to that new 18cm mid/bass driver, which uses materials developed for Spendor's much pricier D7 speakers.

Detail is second to none too, and there is layer upon layer of subtlety and fine detail to grasp onto. Notes have depth and dimension, nuances are picked up in all their glory and vocals are conveyed with all the reality and emotion with which they were recorded.

The original A6s were never dynamic slouches, but the A6Rs show another

level of dynamic attack that outshines even our Award-winning PMC Twenty 23s. They keep a strong grasp on bouncing basslines, with a low end that's both punchy and agile enough to keep up with the energy found elsewhere in the frequency range.

Excellent with dynamics

Listen to Miley Cyrus's *Wrecking Ball* and the A6Rs do a great job of contrasting the powerful choruses against the quieter, more melancholy verses. They're not scared of going quiet either, something that really makes all the difference when building momentum in a track.

And just try to fluster them – you'll quickly find it's next to impossible. From giving them full-on orchestral pieces to feast on to challenging them with something like DJ Shadow's beat-shifting *Organ Donor*, they never lose their cool or composure.

Their upfront character does require some consideration when it comes to system matching, though. The treble stayed just on the right side of bright and aggressive when we were testing them with our reference Bryston and Naim kit, but matching with a similarly forward amp could tip the scale into hardness - something worth considering if you're building a system from scratch.

The Spendor A6Rs are a fantastic pair of speakers that manage to do so much right and very little wrong. They won't go as loud as something like the Tannoy Precision 6.4s, but they'll go pretty close challenging for scale and stereo image.

Of course, this all comes at a premium that puts them towards the top of the price bracket compared with their competitors. Audition them, though, and you'll hear where every penny of your money is going.

SVS Ultra Tower £2200 *****

The SVS Ultra Towers are big speakers. At 1.14m tall, our piano-black review pair dwarfs the majority of the competition at this price. They're deep too, due to their unique slanted trapezium shape. Want understatement? Move on.

Of course, one of the benefits of that big cabinet is that it allows for big drivers - and plenty of them. Each of the 3.5-way Ultra Towers has a 25mm aluminium dome tweeter, dual 16.5cm glass-fibre

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mid-range drivers and dual horizontally opposed 20cm woofers, mounted in this way to help reduce distortion.

There's a rear-firing port at the back too, which, combined with the sidefiring woofers, means giving the Ultra Towers really need space. Put them too close to a back wall and they'll sound overly bassy; too close to a side wall and they can sound closed-in.

They sound as big as they look

The bigger-is-better theme doesn't stop at design. If you're looking for speakers to impress in scale, volume and bass weight, you'll get that by the shed-load.

Going loud enough to seriously bother your neighbours, these speakers excel in deep, tight, impactful bass which, for all its heft, is still agile and responsive.

But they aren't without fault. The Ultra Towers can bring a feeling of heaviness when it's not really wanted, and lack the ability to handle more delicate tracks quite as well as their more articulate counterparts.

And the weighty bass only emphasises the Ultra Towers' rather unrefined treble,

as a run-through of Eminem's trebleheavy *Berzerk* shows. There's a harsh edge and lack of detail to the treble that can sound rather unpleasant at certain frequencies and, while it improved during testing, this was still noticeable after several days of solid playback.

So, be careful with system-matching - and feed these speakers the best quality tracks you can. They aren't very forgiving with poor recordings.

Not the last word in finesse

Subtlety and dynamics are a little awkward too. Listening to *Harvey Two-Face* from the *Dark Knight* soundtrack, we don't get the sense of build-up to a crescendo we do with something like the Spendor A6Rs. It's almost as if the SVSes are scared to go quiet, so you don't hear that dynamic shift as strongly; they start off loud, only to go louder still.

However, the scale these speakers offer is undeniable, and they ensure a spacious, open sound with good stereo imaging - each instrument is placed well in the mix. Individual notes can lack the same sense of insight and texture though, and the start and stop of notes can be missed, once again showing up the Ultra Towers' lack of subtlety and precision compared with competitors.

And despite the surprisingly agile bass, the Ultra Towers still lack bite. Vocals are clear, articulate and wellbalanced, but lacking a little pep. This leaves tracks feeling rather emotionless, as if the artist was just doing a guide track rather than the final recording.

These speakers are a tale of two halves. What they do well is instantly impressive, but take a little longer with them and the story begins to unravel. You get a lot of speaker for your money, but there are more rounded, better executed speakers out there at this price.

Tannoy **Precision 6.4** £2200 *****

When we reviewed the Tannoy Precision 6.2s in 2012, we said they could well mark the sweet-spot of the range, and even outshine these, their bigger, flagship brothers. We were right.

That's not to say the 6.4s aren't a great pair of speakers. They make a good case for themselves. But while the 6.2s blew us away with beautifully balanced sound and excellent stereo imaging, their flagship siblings fall slightly short of the same wow-factor.

They're extremely well made, though, setting a good first impression with a gorgeous satin dark-walnut veneer and a curved cabinet. High-gloss dark walnut or black finishes are also available.

Clever driver design

The top driver is the latest of Tannoy's dual-concentric units, which has a 25mm titanium-dome tweeter set in a 15cm paper-pulp cone mid/bass driver. Tannoy says this helps improve focus, integration and dispersion.

Below this sits a 15cm bass driver, and lower still are two 15cm auxiliary bass radiators. Among other things, these allow the 6.4s to be more flexible with their positioning than rear-ported rivals.

If there's one thing these Tannoys have over their smaller siblings, it's authority. These will go seriously loud, reach into the bass in a way the PMC Twenty 23s can't and showing a sense of scale that rivals the much larger SVSes.

The excellent stereo image we loved so much in the 6.2s is here too, but feels bigger still, positioning instruments



There's loads of detail to get stuck into here as well, and the 6.4s keep a good handle on dynamics. Faithless's Insomnia builds steadily, and as each element of the song gets introduced, it's given the space it needs to be identifiable. When the drop finally comes you can't help but want to hit the back button and start it all over again.

Not too subtle, but really likeable

It's fair to say, though, that they're not the subtlest of speakers. While they'll easily show up the likes of the SVS Ultra Towers when it comes to fine detail, compare them with speakers of a subtler nature, such as the Spendor A6Rs or PMC Twenty 23s, and we find they gloss over some of the texture and insight that the very best excel at nurturing.

And while they're far from ponderous, the Tannoys do show some signs of being less rhythmic than their livelier rivals. Play A Tribe Called Quest's Excursions and there's a feeling of them being just slightly 'off' with their handling of the energetic double

bass part. It's agile, considering its weight, but not quite agile enough.

Those things considered, it's still hard not to like the Tannoys. Their scale, detail and excellent stereo image makes them a thoroughly enjoyable, not to mention impressive, listen - all finished off in a design that's pleasing to the eye.

The Tannoy Precision 6.4s balance good (but not market-leading) handling of detail and dynamics with deep bass, power and scale. In this respect you get the best of both worlds, but not the last word in either.

There are better-rounded speakers available at this price, which loses them a star but, if bass is important to you, these are certainly worth an audition.

If you're after scale and finesse in equal measure, the fantastic **Spendor A6Rs** fit the bill. They're a no-brainer audition

he PMC Twenty 23s have been our favourite floorstanders at this price for more than two years, but the new Spendor A6Rs have just pipped them to the post in this test.

Everything we love about the 23s remains, though, and they're still fivestar speakers. They can't compete with larger speakers when it comes to scale, bass and pure volume, but everything that they do is executed with such precision and clarity that they're hard to fault. Fast, detailed and dynamically strong, their compact size will also be a plus-point for many setups that struggle to fit in a larger floorstander.

Of course if you want big, look no further than the SVS Ultra Towers. Superbly built and dwarfing the other speakers on test, they're large in looks and character, and offer impressively deep bass, scale and neighbour-baiting volume. Unfortunately they fall down when it comes to fine detail and dynamics, and while the the bass is surprising agile, timing could be better.

We had high hopes for the Tannoys - they look stunning. And their performance is relatively impressive too. Offering scale to challenge the Ultra Towers and displaying the refinement the SVSes lack, there's a lot to like. We wanted only for better rhythmic ability and attention to detail.

Which brings us nicely to the Spendor A6Rs. Well-judged and well-balanced, they show up the PMC Twenty 23s with their dynamic prowess and impress with their excellent timing, expressive nature and layers of fine detail. They require thought when it comes to kit matching, but do this well and you'll be rewarded with a pair of speakers that'll breathe new life into your music library.

In the world of wireless headphones it's important to be well connected. And these premium examples will keep you in the loop





AKG is no stranger to five-star reviews in this magazine - so the fact the K845BT wireless headphones are talented comes as no surprise, even if they are bigger and heavier than most Bluetooth headphones we've tried.

We put on a black pair (they also come in white) and the pads fitted securely over our ears, which did get a little hot after 45 minutes of listening, it should be said. They do, however, isolate you well from external noise.

Easy to control and connect

The controls on the right earcup are easy to use – push the Bluetooth pairing button once to pair the K845BTs with your device, and hold it down to unpair. The AKGs might not have the higher-quality aptX version of Bluetooth (they run Bluetooth 3.0 + HS) but they do have the benefit of NFC (near-field communication) which gives you the fuss-free method of pairing them to a compatible device.

We get half way through The Cure's *Friday I'm In Love* and it's plain that those large drive units produce an incredibly clear sound - crisp, detailed, open and precise across the frequency spectrum. Turning the volume up for The Darkness's *Love Is Only A Feeling* delivers a firm, defined bass. In fact, everything we play is delivered with a sense of effortless cohesion, even if we don't find the sound quite as exuberant as the Philips Fidelio M1BTs. If you like your music clear and uncoloured, these AKGs are well worth an audition.

Beats Wireless £250 ★★★☆☆

Portability is key for wireless cans, so this compact pair, with their signature Beats design and smart oval carry-case, make sense. The headphones, which support aptX, come in six colours - red, white, black, grey, red and blue. They feel reasonably sturdy, but the creaky noise of the plastic when they're handled lets the side down somewhat. Battery life is a generous 10 hours from a one-hour charge, so they should keep you going during the long-haul.

It's when we put the Wireless on that we hit our first hurdle. We feel the headband's rubber lining could be more cushioned, and while the soft leather pads are comfortable, they don't feel secure enough. Hardly any room noise is blocked out, either.

Navigating the controls while you're wearing the Beats takes practice, but most operations are convenient one-click affairs. That said, a clunky feel puts a downer on what's otherwise a neat five-button control cluster on the right earcup.

Back to bass-ics

True to the Beats' 'bass is power, power is music' formula, the bass here pounds with mighty punch and attack, thumping its way through the Ying Yang Twins' *Dangerous* with exuberance. Trouble is, if the music doesn't have a 'beat', the Wireless seem incapable of summoning as much enthusiasm. The sound lacks detail and articulation higher up the frequency range, feeling flat and lifeless with anything other than pop or dance music. Sadly, not the subtlest performance at this price.

Battery life Ready, charge...

Bose AE2w £200 *** * * * *** *

The AE2ws have a nice thin, flexible headband, but what strikes us most is the removable control module needed to make a Bluetooth connection. It connects via the 3.5mm jack and sticks out like a sore thumb. Having internal wireless electronics is do-able, so why not do it? The earcups do fold flat though, and fit nicely in the supplied black drawstring bag.

Snug and tidy

What the AE2ws do well is comfort; they feel sturdy yet light on all our reviewers' heads. The soft leather ear pads completely envelope our ears, giving them plenty of space inside and blocking out external sound too. All controls are on the module, so everything is at least tidily in one place.

There's no higher-quality aptX Bluetooth on board, but the standard Bluetooth connection doesn't appear to compromise the AE2ws' sound. It's very listenable. There's a strikingly spacious and open sound with plenty of detail and body. Though it's less direct than the Philips M1BTs, there's a clarity and finesse in vocals that is able to draw out the vulnerability and intimacy in Pilot Speed's *Alright* before crashing with impact into an electric guitar riff.

Dynamics are forthright, though the Bose headphones have less of a spring in their step than the Philips cans. At frequency extremes the bass is a little boomier than we'd like and the treble feels a touch hard, but Bose has done well to tick most of the Bluetooth headphone boxes here.

4 Philips Fidelio M1BT £250 ★★★★★

When we first reviewed the Fidelio M1BTs earlier this year, we gave them five stars and they ran away with a 2013 Award. Now we're matching them against new, similarly priced rivals, we're even more impressed at their superb sound quality and design.

The leather headband and modest-sized faux-leather earcups sport a classy navy blue finish, and everything is neatly contained. The spongy memory-foam ear pads latch on to your ears securely and cushion them snugly – even if, much as with a memory-foam mattress, they get a bit warm after an hour.

The controls are on the right earcup, and they're a doddle to use. The M1BTs have two integrated microphones - one for the voice, the other to optimise sound quality - and they really help make voices clear when making calls.

Rich musicality with accurate detail

It's in sonic terms that these headphones really come into their own. Vocals are rich, full-bodied and clearly more focused than on any of their direct rivals. The exasperation in Jack White's voice on *Blunderbuss* is palpable. Scrolling down our playlist, every genre sounds effortlessly musical, while detail is delivered with just the right amount of analysis.

The M1BTs also capture the right amount of buoyancy in the dynamics and are transparent in their responsiveness to shifts in pace, as well as being sensitive across the frequency spectrum. Balanced, punchy and musical; that's the Philips M1BTs - we wouldn't leave home without a pair.

If you don't want to choose between performance and functionality, here's a good option. The Pioneer VSX-528 is a 5.1-channel AV receiver that slots in just below the middle of the firm's 2013 range. It offers a good balance between sound and useful features.

Atmosphere and balance

After a simple set-up, we play a Blu-ray of robots-vs-monsters-fest *Pacific Rim*. The Pioneer's sound is good for the price. During an ocean-based fight scene, the crashing waves and sounds of crunching metal sweep across the room, giving a good sense of atmosphere. It's a clean sound, and speech is clear.

The tonal balance is good too, with no part of the frequency range given undue attention. Bass is prominent but not overpowering, while the treble offers crisp detail without hardening up. It's a neutral sound that gets the job done with minimal fuss. Plenty of agility helps.

The sense of scale is decent, but it's not the massive, enveloping sound we get from the Yamaha RX-V375. It doesn't punch quite as hard as we'd like either, and struggles a little with dynamic shifts. Volume isn't an issue – it just doesn't sound that dramatic.

VSX-528 is fairly well equipped. You get six HDMI inputs, which handle HD and 3D pictures as well as 4K pass-through. There's also a USB port, one each of digital optical and coaxial inputs, as well as three sets of analogue inputs.

There's no wi-fi on board, but you do get internet access via ethernet. The Pioneer is DLNA-certified, which means you can stream music from a networked computer or storage device. Internet radio is an option too, or you can wire up with an old-school antenna for FM radio.

Pioneer seems to have taken the stance that smartphones and tablets are integral to the AV experience. As such, mobile connectivity is here in a big way.

Connections up front

The HDMI input at the front of the machine offers MHL 2.0 connectivity, which lets users play high-definition content from compatible devices.

Apple support includes iPhones and iPods. These are handled by the front USB port, which also charges the devices. Alternatively, you can stream wirelessly via AirPlay, which uses your home network to send music from Apple devices to the Pioneer.

Don't have an Apple device? The Pioneer also supports HTC Connect, which lets users of compatible HTC phones (including the HTC One) play music and control the volume wirelessly. Bluetooth isn't built-in, but there is a port for a dongle.

There's also a free remote control app for iOS and Android. It's not the full iControlAV2013 app we know and love, but Pioneer's simpler ControlApp, which offers basic control and content-browsing.

We like this amp. It doesn't offer the final word in sound or specs, but it does occupy a comfortable spot in the middle ground. If you want good surround sound with a handful of features, this Pioneer is a very good candidate.

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Firmware Slow on the update

Unlike the rather tricky business of network configuration, updating the firmware is a simple affair, but it does take a very long time, during which the Sony seems to hibernate. For us, this went on so long that we panicked a little, but it woke up again after about 45 minutes.

Sony STR-DN840 £350

The Sony STR-DN840 sits below the 2013 Award-winning, Product of the Year-grabbing STR-DN1040 in Sony's range. Can it live up to its big brother's reputation? No pressure...

SONY

For the money, the STR-DN840 is very well equipped. You get 7.1-channel sound and internet access with built-in wi-fi as well as an ethernet socket.

Wireless AirPlay streaming takes care of Apple devices, while DLNA certification means you can play audio from NAS drives and networked computers. File compatibility includes WAV, MP3, FLAC, WMA and AAC. You can also stream music from internet services such as vTuner radio and the Sony Entertainment Network. Our European model didn't have Bluetooth, but we hear the US version does.

Ample connectivity

At the back, there are six HDMI inputs and one output with 3D and 4K pass-through. You get four sets of inputs for analogue audio and three for composite video, as well as one digital coaxial and two optical inputs.

Meanwhile, the front USB port will cater for Apple devices and memory sticks with files up to 24-bit/192kHz.

NEED TO KNOW

Consider if You want a good budget amp with 7.1-channel surround sound. Make sure You are patient with firmware updates. Avoid If your system already sounds lean. Highlight A budget amp with seven channels and lots of features? Yes please. Setting up the DN840 is quite a mixed bag. Turning it on for the first time brings up the well-named Easy Setup screen, but network configuration is less straightforward, partly because of the remote control, which isn't as intuitive or responsive as we'd like. Trying to input the password to our wireless router had us swearing a bit. Still, you only need to do it once.

HET WORKS

When it comes to sound, the STR-DN840 performs a lot like the bigger DN1040. We put on a Blu-ray of *The Wolverine* and it's a forceful sound. Punches and gunshots hit hard, and arrows have a satisfying zing to them.

The soundfield is wide, and effects are steered with precision - all of which contributes to an immersive sense of atmosphere. The low end is taut and articulate, and the midrange is clean. There's plenty of subtle detail too, conveying with ease the emotions and inflections in speech. The bigger, pricier STR-DN1040 sounds weightier and more dynamic, but what we have here is a highly commendable performance.

It's not an all-rounder, however. Surround amps at this price often sound brittle, and this is the case with the STR-DN840. A lean sound is often advantageous, particularly when it creates a sense of agility, but here the amp just crosses the line from lean to thin, and at higher volumes gets a bit bright for our tastes.

Happy with music

Stereo performance is good, though. The Sony does better here than many price rivals, delivering music with rhythmic precision and plenty of attack. But we would like more delicacy. As always, we recommend a dedicated stereo amplifier if you're serious about listening to music.

The Sony STR-DN840 is good news, even if it doesn't quite display the allround strength of its bigger sibling. It's very well equipped in terms of features and connections, and its performance is precise and energetic. Match your system carefully and you're in for a treat.

Yamaha RX-V375 £250

For two years in a row, our Award for the best budget AV receiver has gone to Yamaha. The latest winner is the Yamaha RX-V375, a relatively simple box that trades fancy tricks for thrilling surround sound. For £250 (less if you shop around) it is a fantastic proposition, and a great first step if you're ready to make the leap from two channels to five.

Full of life

The RX-V375 follows in its predecessor's footsteps to deliver a really lively sound. It bounds along to movie soundtracks with plenty of energy and soaring dynamics. Tonal balance is good, the top end is textured, voices are solid and the bass is pleasingly punchy.

Many receivers at this price sound thin and insubstantial, but not the V375. It shares the same characteristics as the bigger, more expensive RX-A3030 - a satisfyingly solid sound, with plenty of weight. It's rich and smooth, and never sounds hard-edged, even when pushed.

Then there's the sense of scale: the Yamaha offers a big, immersive sound and a convincingly cinematic experience. This kind of money won't give you the widest soundfield, but given this amp's other strengths we

NEED TO KNOW

Highlight Rich, weighty, punchy sound with accurate effects steering. aren't too bothered about that. And, as we've come to expect from Yamaha, surround sound steering is excellent.

We load up our Blu-ray of *Man of Steel* and the sound effects are precisely located. We switch to Formula 1 drama *Rush* and it's hard not to be impressed by the cars zooming past your ear and sweeping across the room.

The Yamaha doesn't produce the most refined sound we've ever come across, but it does deliver the most detailed and dynamic performance we've heard at this price - with the bonus that dialogue is clear and expressive.

Stereo music doesn't hang together as well as multi-channel movie soundtracks. The RX-V375 doesn't quite convey that crucial sense of rhythmic cohesion. If stereo music is a priority, we think it's best to leave it to a dedicated stereo amplifier if possible.

A question of priorities

Connectivity is good, but it's not the Yamaha's priority. You get the necessities: four HDMI inputs that support Full HD and 3D playback, 1080p upscaling and 4K pass-through. There are also two each of component, optical and digital coaxial inputs, as well as four composite and analogue audio inputs. The single HDMI output features ARC (Audio Return Channel) to replay TV sound, and the USB port at the front of the unit can handle audio from your iPod or iPhone.

What you don't get is anything network-related: there's no wi-fi, and no ethernet connection. As a result you don't get DLNA, AirPlay, or a remote control app. It's not surprising to see Yamaha sacrificing this to keep the price down and focus on the sound, though. It's a wise decision in our ears.

The Yamaha RX-V375 is an excellent AV receiver that prioritises the most important thing of all: sound. If you're desperate for features it probably isn't for you, but if you just want to get into home cinema, this budget offering is a fantastic bargain.

Yamaha RX-V375 £250 ********

Pitching in at a tempting price, the **Yamaha RX-V375** cleverly eschews fancy features to make it all about the sound. And it's paid off

e thought this was going to be a tough one. The fight to be the best budget home cinema amp is always a struggle, even if each company's approach is a little different. Some prefer to pile on the features, while others would rather concentrate on sound. And in the case of this test, there are reasons to heartily recommend each of these contestants.

The Sony STR-DN840, for instance, impressed us with its features and connections. It's the only amp here capable of handling 7.1-channel sound, and we also liked the energetic, forceful sound it puts out. Sadly, the Sony's treble oversteps the line from lean to thin, which makes for a more tiring long-term listen. Combine that with the highest price tag here, and Sony loses a star. Next up we have the Pioneer VSX-528, which offers slightly less in terms of connections, but makes up for it with a more balanced, rounded sound that's clear and a little easier to live with than the Sony's. There's a sensible, if not outstanding, level of features, but we nevertheless wanted that smooth sound to offer more in the way of power, punch and scale.

Sitting proudly at the top is the Yamaha RX-V375. Its low price offsets the conservative approach to features and connections, but really it's all about the sound. It's clearly the best performer here, with the large-scale, cinematic sound we wanted from the Pioneer, and the kind of smooth, rich presentation that the Sony lacks. Combine that with Yamaha's trademark precision with effects steering, and you have one seriously talented AV amp.

Audioengine

Clad in an aluminium case, held together by the tiniest of bolts, the D3 looks and feels like a solid little unit with a robust case that resists any attempts to flex it out of shape. Trying to magic what to many people is simply a USB stick into an attractive piece of hi-fi equipment is no mean feat. But the D3 gives it a jolly good go.

We're slightly disappointed, though, that there is no matching aluminium end-cap to protect the USB connector when it's out in the open, or in your pocket. The D3 does at least come with its own woolly carry pouch - perfect for keeping it warm in the cold winter months if nothing else.

Also in the box is a brief yet easily understandable set-up guide and an adapter cable for making the D3's 3.5mm Unlike the Cambridge Audio DacMagic XS, but like the AudioQuest DragonFly v1.2, the D3 does without any external volume controls. Instead, it uses the control on your music-playing software.

Decent detail and impact

Play a WAV rip of Eminem's *Bad Guy* and the D3 extracts a fair level of detail from the track. The device favours a direct, unfussy sound. The track's brooding bass notes hit with a decent sense of impact, and the claps that litter the track sound precise and well-defined – although the emotion in Eminem's voice doesn't come across quite as convincingly as it does when heard through the AudioQuest.

We'd like a bit more subtle detail and texturing of notes too. There's a lack of

output compatible with headphones that use a 6.3mm connector. We listened to the D3 using a pair of AKG K550s overears and a pair of Klipsch X7i in-ears.

Can deal with high-res audio

This Audioengine is compatible with Apple Macs and Windows computers, and, unlike some, it doesn't need any additional drivers for Windows. Like the AudioQuest DragonFly v1.2, the D3 can play sample rates up to 24-bit/96kHz natively - the computer will have to downsample 24-bit/192kHz music files to 24/96 for the D3 to be able to play them. The D3 also allows for the asynchronous movement of data between your computer's USB output and the Audioengine, for supposedly improved sound performance (see Jargon Buster on p67).

On the face of the stick there are two tiny indicators. The outer one glows blue when the Audioengine is being used with tracks boasting a sample rate of 88.2kHz and above. Otherwise, the indicator remains unlit. The inner light glows white simply to show that the DAC is powered up and ready to receive data. refinement to the general sound, which takes some of the gloss and joy out of the music.

We play Lily Allen's Christmas cover of *Somewhere Only We Know*, and while the delicate piano play and her sweet vocal sound focused and distinct, the D3 doesn't manage to make things sound as natural or believable as they do via the DacMagic XS. The tune doesn't display the same sonic subtleties, nor does it have the same emotional impact as when the piece is played via the DragonFly, either.

The Audioengine is a solid little device, but sonically it fails to grab your attention and make enough of a lasting impression. And, when you consider the D3's isn't the cheapest of its kind, this leaves it lagging behind the pack leaders.

AudioQuest DragonFly v1.2 £130

The DragonFly created a huge buzz when it launched in 2012. AudioQuest took a DAC and headphone amp, two traditional hi-fi components, and served them up in a great-sounding, consumerfriendly package.

What you see here may look identical to the original DragonFly we reviewed back in 2012, but this is actually DragonFly v1.2. You can tell if it's the new version, not just because of the new price (£130 compared with £215 when it launched) but also because a sticker on the box tells you so, and the ring around the headphone jack is now grey (instead of black). There's also a subtle smattering of new markings and logos.

It's inside where AudioQuest has made some pretty big changes. In an attempt to squeeze out even greater thrust. Tracks sound more pristine and more communicative than before.

Up Is Down, from the Pirates of the Caribbean soundtrack, for example, is a blockbuster of a track - pacy, powerful and dynamic. And the DragonFly easily communicates all these facets to the listener. With a WAV version of the track, strings flow naturally and wind instruments combine with percussion for a rousing, dynamic and explosive end to the track.

Excellent rhythm and tempo

The DragonFly's ability to follow a track's rhythm and timing is superb. Calvin Harris's *Under Control* is a feel-good dance tune and the DragonFly matches it with a fine sense of enthusiasm and an equally upbeat tempo. Listening to

sound quality, the signal path between the DAC chip and the analogue output has been shortened and the internal power supply has been tweaked.

Otherwise, the general specification of the DragonFly hasn't changed. This means the unit's still asynchronous, PC and Mac compatible, and piggybacks the volume control of your music player's software. It can play up to 24-bit/96kHz files, but high-res 24-bit/192kHz files will have to be downsampled by the computer to 24/96.

Colour-coded lighting

We've always been huge fans of the DragonFly's design. It's weighty enough in the hand, while the matt finish feels smooth and satisfying to the touch. The logo lights up in different colours to indicate the type of file being played: green is 44.1kHz, blue is 48kHz, amber is 88.2kHz and magenta is 96kHz.

Play a couple of tracks and you realise the open, spacious and detailed sound of the original DragonFly is still there, but the new version sounds even cleaner and clearer.

This DragonFly picks out greater detail and displays even greater dynamic

the track is an uplifting and hugely enjoyable experience.

There's a great sense of solidity and depth to bass notes too - the DragonFly's decisive and confident in its delivery of Jay-Z's *Empire State Of Mind* whether it's a CD-quality rip or a compressed version played through Spotify. The drum-kicks hit with real purpose, with leading edges clearly defined, as is the striking of piano keys in the background. Alicia Key's vocal doesn't sound quite as smooth as it does when heard through the Cambridge Audio, but you are getting a getting greater transparency and detail.

The icing on the cake with this DAC, though, is that you're getting all this outrageously good sound quality at such a tempting price. DragonFly has us buzzing all over again!

Cambridge Audio DacMagic XS £100

Cambridge Audio already has a couple of very capable DACs on its books in the shape of the DacMagic 100 and DacMagic Plus - but these are both reasonably hefty desktop units that require mains power. The ultra-portable DacMagic XS that completes the range is a dinky USB model.

And, although the DacMagic XS is one of the cheapest devices in its class, there's little to suggest this: the packaging is slick and the product itself has a nice finish. It's a little chunkier and wider than the DragonFly and the Audioengine, but build quality is impressive - it feels just as substantial and looks the business too.

Connections are simple: there's a micro-USB input on one end for connecting to your computer (a supplied focused, stable and confident and there's plenty of well-organised detail for the listener to take note of.

The Cambridge gives the track good weight and momentum too, with agile, precise and subtle lows spurring the tune along. The DacMagic's refined tonal balance is hugely comforting, and helps take the edge off brittle- or bright-sounding recordings. If you're used to using your laptop or desktop computer's headphone output for listening to music, the DacMagic is likely to be a big step up.

Smooth, full-bodied sound

Make the switch to a higher-resolution track and the your enjoyment goes up with the jump in bits. Kate Bush's 50 Words For Snow (24-bit/96kHz)

The DacMagic's refined tonal balance is hugely comforting, and helps take the edge off bright-sounding recordings. It's a big step up from a computer's headphone output

connector cable completes the chain) and a standard 3.5mm socket for your headphones on the other.

A single, hardworking LED shows the sample rate of the incoming audio signal - blue for 44.1/48kHz, green for 88.2/96kHz and purple for 176.4/192kHz - as well as the amp's volume limits.

Really easy to use

Where the AudioQuest and Audioengine DACs take their volume cues from your computer, the XS has its own in the shape of circular '+' and '-' buttons on top of the device. If you press them both at once and hold for a few seconds, they also switch the DAC operation from USB 1.0 to 2.0. The advantage here is that the DacMagic XS will now accept a native high-resolution 24-bit/192kHz stream. In USB 1.0 mode it is limited to 24-bit/96kHz (PC users will have to download additional drivers from Cambridge's website to enable this).

There's a hidden benefit to the USB 2.0 mode, and that is better sound quality generally. Even with a standard 16-bit/44.1kHz rip of Lady Gaga's *Do What you Want*, we preferred listening in USB 2.0 mode. The track sounds more sounds subtle and intricate. The XS delivers plenty of insight and has a silky smooth, delicate way with vocals - there's plenty of warmth here and a nice, full-bodied balance. The story is similarly positive with a recording of Beethoven's *Piano Concerto No.4 in G Minor, Op.58*.

We do think AudioQuest DragonFly sounds clearer, though, and also has the edge in terms of outright resolution and dynamic subtlety.

The Cambridge Audio has no trouble dispatching the Fiio and Audioengine DACs. Its main problem is the fierce competition provided by the AudioQuest DragonFly and its all-new pricetag. That DAC is only £30 more and is definitely worth spending the extra on for the notable jump in sound quality.

DIGITAL-TO-ANALOGUE CONVERTERS TEST

Fiio E17 £100

The Fiio E17 looks more like a portable MP3 player than a petite headphone amp/DAC. Nevertheless, it's still portable enough to slot in your pocket and be considered in the same class as the DragonFlys and D3s of this world.

Lots of features

The E17 picks up early bonus points as it manages to pack in a lot of features and functionality for the money. The most obvious inclusion is the small OLED screen. Where other devices in its class use (sometimes confusing) colourcoding systems and minuscule LEDs to show sampling rates, you can take a quick look at the display here to double-check what's being played.

There's a mini-USB input for connecting to your computer's USB Move up a level to a high-res version of The Rolling Stones' *Gimme Shelter* and the amount of detail on tap goes up too. The Fiio conveys this newfound resolution reasonably well. Keith Richards' wailing guitar solo sounds suitably edgy and sharp, even if it doesn't quite have the same dynamic and emotional reach as the DragonFly or DacMagic XS.

Not the last word in transparency

We'd like greater clarity, too: the DragonFly opens out the music, giving spacious, transparent and detailed sound. The E17 digs out just enough detail from music to strike a chord and paint a basic picture for the listener, but struggles with those subtle nuances that really drag you into a piece of music.

Play a 16-bit/44kHz rip of Naughty Boy's *La La La* and the track flows along efficiently. The Fiio's tonal balance is more pleasant and pacifying than forward and aggressive

socket. As the Fiio only meets the USB 1.0 standard it can't accept any files above 24-bit/96kHz. If you have 24-bit/192kHz files, you'll need to go into the E17 via its dedicated digital input, using a coaxial cable and the supplied adapter. If you use optical, bandwidth is limited to 96kHz.

Either way, you can also take the feed from another source such as CD player and use the Fiio's internal DAC before passing music into an amplifier or straight into a pair of active speakers.

Talking of amplifiers, there's a special connector on the bottom of the E17 which docks into Fiio's own optional EO9K desktop amp. There's also a 3.5mm jack so you can plug in a smartphone or MP3 player and use the Fiio as a basic headphone amp.

Play a 16-bit/44kHz rip of Naughty Boy's *La La La* and the track flows along efficiently and without incident. The Fiio's tonal balance is more pleasant and pacifying than forward and aggressive.

Listening through a pair of AKG K550s, strings sound delicate and intimate, and bass notes sound just punchy enough to communicate the upbeat tempo of the track. We had good results turning the E17s volume all the way to maximum and just hiking up our MacBook Pro's volume a couple of notches. There's a subtle increase in spaciousness and dynamics, but still not enough to elevate it above the class-leaders.

Lorde's *Royals* sounds reasonably exciting but the bass could explode with greater purpose and power. The Fiio doesn't really communicate the dynamics and scale of the track as easily as the likes of the DragonFly.

On paper, the Fiio is a useful little box of tricks and some of the added features and functionality might entice some users. Compared with its closest rivals, however, the sound quality doesn't set the pulse racing. The E17's an adequate listen, but nothing more.

The new version of the **DragonFly** costs a third less than the original model, yet it sounds even better. It seems, for now, that there's no competing with that combination

esirable, pocketable and packed full of sonic thrills, it's the AudioQuest DragonFly that wings its way to victory.

You have to feel a little sorry for Cambridge Audio DacMagicXS, previously five stars, now bumped down to four by our winner. If you can't spend a penny over £100 the DacMagicXS still represents a really good buy - it's exceptionally well made and produces a wonderfully refined sound for the money.

But the jump to £130 for the AudioQuest isn't a massive one and we'd have to say it's worth saving and then spending the extra. The new DragonFly v1.2 is very much improved.

Yes it has a new, lower price tag, but performance has improved quite dramatically too. Music sounds wonderfully clear, detail levels are

Fiio's E17 puts in a perfectly respectable showing. The device is a little bulkier than its rivals, but then it does pack in extra functionality for you to take advantage of. The sound's safe rather than stunning - we long for a bit more bite and drama - but you can't be super-critical, especially when you take into account the Fiio's price and features.

This leaves the Audioengine D3. Performance is on a par with the Fiio's. It's a solid little unit that sounds ok without ever setting your world alight. Not only does it sound a little lacklustre when compared to its peers, the D3 is also the most expensive of the group and by quite some margin, hence the three-star rating.

BEFORE YOU BUY File resolution

It's easy to get hung up on specification. Many of the DACs in this test top out at 24-bit/96kHz through USB rather than delivering the full 24-bit/192kHz. How important this is depends on the music files you use. If you buy from iTunes or at best rip uncompressed from CDs then that lower 96kHz limit is still far beyond what you'll need. But if you're dedicated to the highest-resolution recordings, make sure your DAC will cope.

evialet's original amplifier, the D-Premier, caused something of a storm in high-end circles. Here was a slim unit - looking more akin to a pair of posh bathroom scales than any traditional piece of hi-fi - that not only challenged the very best amplifiers around in sound quality, but did it with a hybrid electronic design that was as innovative as any we've come across.

A few years on and the company has enjoyed massive investment. The result is a three-strong range of amplifiers to replace the original. The 110 is the baby of the range: it may look much like the original, but it sells for half the money.

Look for the areas where money has been saved and you'll find them. Power is down from 240W per channel to (as the model name implies) 110W per channel. That shiny casework is subtly different, as is the distinctive remote control - both look and feel less luxurious than the original, but still have more than enough quality for the price, even if the finish is a magnet for fingerprints.

A chip off the old block

The heart of the 110 is still pure Devialet. Take off the cover and look inside and we'd bet a sack of money that even experienced electronic engineers would struggle to figure out how the circuit works. Devialets are like no other amps on the market, and don't use any of the conventional circuit structures. Like its siblings, the 110 has a clever arrangement whereby a low-power, high-quality Class A amplifier works in tandem with a more powerful Class D circuit to drive the speakers. The idea is to deliver top-quality sound from a compact, environmentally friendly box, and it works.



All the internal workings happen in the digital domain, so even analogue signals (including those from a record player) are converted before the amplifier processes the signal.

Go configure

The cleverness extends well beyond the electronic design and space-age appearance though. Devialet has had a fresh look at the features set too. Like the D-Premier before it, this amplifier is configurable.

The physical connections at the back include optical, coax and USB as well as a pair of RCAs. Each of these can be fine-tuned to an appropriate source, so, for example, the analogue RCAs can be set for line-level use or configured as a phono stage (moving-magnet only in this case). All this is done by means of an on-line configurator, which downloads onto an SD card. The SD card fits into a rear-panel slot and the 110 automatically uploads the configuration data.

Connect the 110 into your network wired or wirelessly (with an optional

£1000 module), and this amplifier will even stream music from your computer. Just download suitable software (Mac or PC) and off you go. It's easy to implement, and the losses involved in going wireless are far less than such a connection normally entails. There are even iOS and Android smartphone apps that control volume level and source selection.

The Devialet's unusual shape means that while it can be used in a conventional manner on a decent equipment rack, it's also suitable for wall mounting. That

small display changes orientation accordingly. Clever.

So it's unusual and clever, but does the 110 sound any good? The answer is a resounding 'yes'. If you're looking for a clean, precise-sounding amplifier we don't think you'll find better for the money. We can't think of a rival that uncovers so much fine detail, making even dense pieces of music such as Steve Reich's *Music For 18 Musicians* easy to unravel.

Agility and bass resolution

It's an agile sound, one that defines the leading and trailing edges of notes superbly. We're particularly impressed by the way this amplifier renders bass frequencies - there's no sense of blur with overlaid notes, and lovely resolution.

Move on to something harder-edged, such as Nirvana's *Nevermind*, and the Devialet responds with glee. It's a rhythmic amplifier, one with solid punch and the ability to communicate the aggression in the music well. High volumes aren't an issue either - the amp stays astonishingly clean - although in the end the limitations of 110W a channel are heard. Push too hard and the presentation starts to sound a little grubby and strained. We played a range of music, from Mahler's *Symphony No.4* (24-bit/192kHz fed through the 110's asynchronous USB) to a heavily compressed 256kbps version of Eminem's *Mockingbird*, and in each case the Devialet's clarity and insight impresses. It will show up any flaws in the recording but never overplays the shortcomings.



Surprisingly, despite the tonal neutrality and precision, this amplifier doesn't fall into the trap of sounding clinical or sterile either. The joy and energy in music is kept intact and communicated well.

Drop the volume right down and the story changes a bit. The impressive clarity remains for the most part, but the sound loses a surprising amount of dynamic sparkle and rhythmic cohesion. Most amplifiers suffer from losses in these

It's unusual and clever, and if you're looking for a clean, precise-sounding amplifier we don't think you'll find better for the money. We can't think of a rival that uncovers so much detail areas when the volume level drops, but the effect here is far more obvious. We'd even go as far as to say if you regularly listen to music at very low volumes this is probably not the amplifier for you.

Hot stuff

Play the amplifier at the kind of volume levels it encourages and it runs pretty hot too. Make sure it has plenty of ventilation to prevent overheating.

Is the 110 a D-Premier on the cheap? For the most part it is. The sacrifices in build are well judged and, for outright clarity, we think the cheaper option is good enough to worry the older amp.

As a package we can't think of another option that marries such sonic skill in such a neat and stylish package. Provided the low-volume issues don't bother you, this amplifier positively demands an audition.

Pixel Magic Lumin Music streamer

ixel Magic's Lumin music streamer's big selling point is its file compatibility. This wouldn't normally be considered a particularly glamorous virtue, but when it comes to streamers it's worth a pot of gold.

This streamer can play back all the usual suspects - WAV, AIFF and FLAC - as well as those less commonly seen, such as Apple Lossless.

The specification highlights are the ability to play up to 32-bit/384kHz PCM files (good luck with finding anything you want to listen to in this format) and the slightly more useful ability to replay native DSD music. The Lumin is the first standalone streamer we've reviewed with this capability.

Insight with Innervisions

Curious as to what the player sounds like with DSD, we feed in Stevie Wonder's 1973 classic *Innervisions*. Made early on in Wonder's run of superb '70s albums, this set is packed full of brilliant songs.

Higher Ground is a stern test for any system, but the streamer makes relatively light work of the dense musical mix, keeping the hard-charging rhythm track moving along with considerable momentum.

The player renders the textures of instruments well, and paints Wonder's distinctive voice with a pleasing combination of delicacy and force. We're taken with the unit's ability to draw low frequencies with agility and articulation.

Move to *All In Love Is Fair* and the Lumin has no issue dropping a couple of gears, showing impressive refinement and bags of dynamic subtlety as the song builds to its climax. Upbeat or relaxing – this streamer does both with ease. This streamer's neat-and-tidy approach to music replay continues when we stream a (24-bit/192kHz) FLAC file of Mahler's *Symphony No.4*. Here it delivers a decently sized soundstage and populates it with crisply drawn instruments. There's good stability to the image even when the music becomes complex, and the streamer impresses with its ability to keep instrumental strands separate and easy to follow.

Things are spot-on tonally, with all parts of the frequency range blending in seamlessly and evenly. There's a consistency of character throughout the range that's a real pleasure to hear.

Large-scale dynamics are delivered with pleasing confidence even if the Lumin doesn't quite deliver a full dose of authority. By the highest standards, this player has a slightly polite way with music, rounding off attack just a bit and taking the edge off rhythmic drive. But the upside is lovely fluidity.

The news is equally positive with low-bitrate files such as a 256kbps version of Eric Bibb's *Flood Water*. A file as compressed as this invariably loses a sizeable dose of subtlety, but through the Lumin it still manages to sound engaging - that's not a feat many media players can match. Surprisingly, this unit has no digital inputs (bar a pair of type A USBs). That's a shame as it means the impressive digital-to-analogue circuits, which have a pair of Wolfson WM8741 DAC chips at their heart, can't be used to improve the sound of other sources.

High standards of construction

General build quality is excellent. The main unit's casework is machined from a solid slab of aluminium and is generally finished to a very high standard. This kind of casing is more usually found on products that cost double this price. Add another £495 to the price we've listed and you can have one finished in black.

The external power supply is built to similarly high standards. A design such as this keeps high currents and any related magnetic fields away from the sensitive audio circuits, which is always a good thing as far as sound quality is concerned.

Take a look around the back and you'll find the option of balanced XLR and single-ended RCA analogue outputs. The player works equally well through both. Delve into the set-up menus and you'll find that it's possible to vary the output. In this configuration the Pixel Magic can drive a power amplifier directly.

There are notable gains when it comes to outright transparency and detail resolution over a system that has a dedicated preamp in the signal path. Of course, the system would have to be purist in the extreme, as the only source would be the player itself.

There are a couple of digital outputs - one HDMI and the other a BNC coax just in case you have a top-quality outboard DAC to add to your system. We don't think we'd bother, because the DAC inside the product is talented enough.

There aren't any controls on the Lumin's elegant front, so all functions are controlled by a dedicated iPad app. For the most part the app works well, though some of the buttons are rather small, and sometimes the controls aren't wholly intuitive. But, give it a couple of days and most of it will make sense.

Overall, the Lumin is a fine unit. It played everything we threw at it without

complaint, and did so in some style. Add the lovely build into the equation and it's clear that this unit is well worth serious investigation if you're in the market for a high-end streamer.

"At Pixel Magic Systems, we were frustrated by the fact that high-end streamers weren't always stable and their software was often unintuitive, so we set about fixing the problem.

After two years and hundreds of hours of listening we had a final circuitry design, including Wolfson DAC and Lundhal output transformers - they sounded the best and have a good reputation for reliability. We tried many configurations for a DAB radio receiver, but all our tests indicated it introduced interference, so sadly it had to go.

We were also dissatisfied with the available iPad controllers, so aimed to develop one that worked well from an album-centric perspective."

an any headphones be worth £1725? It's a question we found ourselves asking more than once when reviewing Audeze's (pronounced Odyssey) LCD-3. By the end of the test period we had our answer, and it's firmly in the positive.

Provided the source and amplifier are up to the job these 'phones deliver a scale and authority of sound we didn't think headphones could ever manage.

The first hint of greatness is apparent straight from the off. We start with Beethoven's lovely *Moonlight Sonata* (otherwise known as *Piano Sonata No.14*), and get treated to a rich, vibrant sound that lacks for nothing in resolution or dynamic subtlety. We're taken by the amount of insight on offer, from the LCD-3's convincing rendering of the layered harmonics of a piano to their ability to convey the low-level details that define the size and acoustic of the hall the piece was recorded in.

We're also struck by the solidity of the presentation. There's a real feeling of physical presence to the sound, a quality that eludes even the best of rivals such as the similarly priced Grado PS1000.

Pace and depth

Move onto *Before Your Very Eyes* from Atoms For Peace and the LCD-3s are happy to move up the gears. Here they charge along, keeping a firm grip on the intricate rhythms and delivering a full dose of the music's momentum. It's also here we notice the Audeze's terrific low-frequency performance – seriously weighty yet finely articulated.

Balance is the key to most top-class products, and the LCD-3s deliver plenty of attack without sacrificing refinement. This level of performance requires a top-quality source and headphone amplifier. We used our Naim NDS/555PS streamer with our MacBook as back-up, plus Naim's DAC-V1 and Meridian's Prime headphone amp. The Audezes are right at home with such electronics, but such is their resolution we're sure the benefits of even more ambitious headphone amplifiers would be clear.

Take the earpieces apart (if you're brave) and you'll find planar magnetic drive units. A conventional drive unit consists of three main parts - a



diaphragm, voice coil and motor assembly (which includes the magnet).

In the Audeze, the voice coil is printed on a flat diaphragm, so reducing mass and complexity. This diaphragm sits between an array of magnets and so is driven across its entire surface as the music signal flows through the voice coil. This reduces distortion and improves resolution compared with conventional driver technology.

As expected, the LCD-3s' build quality is lovely. They have a retro feel, but there's no denying the quality of the materials used. The ear cups use nicely crafted Zebrano wood while the earpads are covered with beautifully soft lambskin. It's a world away from the plastic-and-more-plastic approach of many cheaper headphones.

Sizeable but comfortable

These are large headphones - the earcups are 11cm in diameter - and fairly weighty at 548g, but they are slightly angled to sit comfortably on the head. We found this worked well, though our ears did warm up as a session went on.

The LCD-3s are an open-backed design, so leak sound. A lot. Not great if someone else is watching TV in the same room.

These things apart, there's little to complain about here. While the price may be a stumbling block, it would take tens of thousands of pounds to buy a pair of speakers that can even approach the LCD-3s' level of sound quality. Looked at in that way these Audezes almost seem like good value. Almost.

Poor Planet Earth. If it's not being invaded by aliens, it's getting overrun by zombies. This time it's the year 2154, and humanity is on the receiving end of a lecture.

Humans are split into two distinct groups. The rich live on Elysium, a gorgeous space station where mostly Caucasian people divide their time between garden parties and magical healing beds. The poor (and mostly Hispanic) get to stay on an overpopulated slum of a planet, where they toil and get sick.

And then you get Matt Damon, who has robot bits screwed into him and ends up a robo-Messiah. Elsewhere there's a shouty mercenary (Sharlto Copley, wasted) and a murderous politician (Jodie Foster, French).

There's a lot to digest. Dystopia is preachy in nature, but director Neil Blomkamp really piles on the social critique. That was kept in check with the brilliant *District 9*, but there's too much in *Elysium*. The overriding flavour is the issue of immigration, with a sprinkling of healthcare. There's not that much room for anything else, which is a shame.

Fun enough, but no District 9

The flashy science fluff is fun

To an extent this is offset with flashy science fluff, which is fascinating. Futuristic machinery demonstrates imagination, and elevates the action from generic to vaguely memorable. Bullets fly around corners and there's an innovative use of lasers.

But what really intrigues is the merging of man and machine. There's no real reason for Matt Damon to get an exoskeleton drilled into his body, but it works.

Fights are that much more lethal, but there's still a sense of vulnerability because it's not an Iron Man-style suit of armour. It's different, refreshing, and it should have been afforded more attention. Sadly, this film seems more concerned with spreading a message about socioeconomics. Combine that with clichés such as the romantic subplot and all the good stuff is well outweighed.

It's a good test disc, though. The film looks lovely. Earth's gritty greys and browns contrast sharply with the bright whites and vibrant hues used to denote the opulence of Elysium.

The DTS-HD Master Audio 7.1 has a nice mix of nattering, an effective score, and explosive action that offers plenty of opportunities to test your system's scale and effects steering.

On its own terms, Elysium is a fine (if forgettable) 109 minutes. But Neil Blomkamp is capable of better, and this is a pale shadow of his earlier work. Rent this, and then watch *District 9*.

Fast-forward to 1970's Wrapped Up, Tied Up, Tangled Up by Rev. Cleophus Robinson or Troy Ramey and the Soul Searchers' It's Jesus, Y'All (1977) and the sound tidies up dramatically without any of the literal Soul Power going astray. There's something about the griminess of the earlier records, though - there's somehow more authenticity to them.

Either way, I Heard The Angels Singing is a treat even for the godless. And all of these recordings will test your system's powers of midrange resolution. After all, if the voices don't convince there's very little point.

What to consider... 3D



Reconsider your screen size

You should sit close enough to the TV for the image to fill your peripheral vision. Aim for a viewing angle of 40 degrees: that means sitting around 1.5m away from a 50in TV, which is closer than you'd need with 2D.





The two types of 3D technology

Active-shutter 3D is (in theory) the higherperformance way to watch 3D at home, but it costs more per pair, and some users don't like its flickering effect. Passive 3D, the same as used by cinemas, is cheaper and simpler.

The supply must meet the demand Don't imagine that buying a 3D telly will automatically open the door to a world of 3D viewing. There's currently hardly any 3D on free-to-air TV, so make sure you have, pay TV or 3D Blu-rays to make it.

What does a speaker crossover do?

It's one of the inescapable laws of physics - and of hi-fi design - that a loudspeaker containing only one drive unit won't be able to reproduce the entire frequency spectrum as deftly as one with multiple drivers.

Tweeters and mid/bass drivers are designed to handle different parts of the frequency range with the minimum of distortion and the maximum finesse.

However, sending the full frequency range to both of these drivers will stop them working at their best or even cause damage, so a crossover circuit is used to split the incoming signal into frequency bands optimised for the

different drivers. There are two crossover types: passive and active. Passive ones, used in most domestic speakers, are unpowered and deal with speaker-level signals that amps deliver from their speaker outputs. Because the current they have to deal with is so high, they use robust (and so less precise) components. This can lead to a loss of detail and transparency.

Active designs are powered, and route a low-voltage line-level signal to the drivers' individual power amps. There's less power loss, although they can add noise. But the smaller power-handling needs let them use more precise parts, which gives more control over the sound.

Listening to Music – the Benefits

There have been many studies carried out over the years that have shown remarkable benefits for mankind through listening to music. It is an activity that is intrinsic to all cultures and is one of the few that involves using the whole brain. Listening to music is now often used for various therapeutic purposes because it is believed to improve memory and intelligence, improve physical development and coordination, reduce stress and blood pressure, and even reduce levels of pain.

However, music can also be irritating if it's too loud or distorted, or if it distracts from other activities we are involved in. Most of the studies have been carried out using a reasonably good quality of musical reproduction. Quite remarkably, many people today and probably a majority of teens and late teens, are listening to a considerably lower quality level of music than their peers back in the 1970's. Back then a basic hi-fi system, often consisting of just a turntable, amplifier and a pair of speakers, was a 'must have'. Students going off to university would make it a priority to set themselves up with a decent hi-fi system – and the quality was, in retrospect, surprisingly good.



Style OVER substance?

Quite remarkably, many people today and probably a majority of teens and late teens, are listening to a considerably lower quality level of music than their peers back in the 1970's

Have advances in technology driven the desire for convenience and quantity at the expense of quality?

Quality vs Quantity

How different it is today where advances in technology have driven the desire for convenience and quantity at the considerable expense of quality. For many young people especially, the iPod, MP3 player or mobile telephone, connected to a pair of in-ear headphones, is their primary source of listening to music. The problem with this is that lowgrade reproduced music is not going to deliver any significant beneficial outcomes for the listener. Probably the opposite will be true.

Low-grade music in this context is the result of two main factors, a) the delivery system (the hardware) and b) the source material (the 'music'). Although the amplification section of the mobile device is a technological wonder, it's not hi-fi! Nor are in-ear headphones. They can't hold a candle to the stereo-typical system from the 1970's. As far as the source material is concerned, it's being over-generous to call it music if it's a typical MP3 or AAC (the iTunes default format) download. These are both highly compressed formats with the most popular download speed of 128 kbps being about one-eleventh the size of a full resolution CD track (1411 kbps), so the quality is inevitably far inferior. Information is irretrievably lost and the full dynamic range is lacking. Using an iPod while jogging does not really raise a quality issue but playing low-resolution tracks through, for example, an iPod docking station that feeds into a decent hi-fi system, is a disaster area. It is very poor quality made louder and this even affects the type of music listened to. For example, most classical recordings downloaded as an MP3 or AAC file are a complete waste of time because there is so much information

missing, all the complexities of the music are lost, and the recordings are reduced to just the essence of a tune.

Future of Recorded Music

If convenience has trumped quality for many people, we must ask what the future prospects are of maintaining high quality music recordings. Fortunately audiophiles, or hi-fi connoisseurs, or perhaps most accurately described, music lovers, continue to drive the demand for quality because there are some wonderful hi-end systems available and being sold today. Another important reason for hope within the mass-market is that there is no longer any over-riding reason for MP3 and AAC to have such a following. These formats were designed to overcome very slow download speeds pre-broadband and expensive memory capacity. These are not significant factors for most people now. Even iPods, if loaded

with full resolution tracks, can deliver acceptable results through a good system. The trade-off is a smaller selection of stored music. Full resolution audio streaming, as well as CD quality downloads, are already available and will become the norm as the wider public becomes aware of the tremendous quality benefit.



Audiophiles and Hi-Fi Connoisseurs

Hi-fi connoisseurs and audiophiles are very important to the music industry. By their nature, they are generally avid music lovers who enhance their enjoyment through listening to music at its very best quality level, which means playing great recordings through hi-end hi-fi to achieve the most outstanding results. Without them, the main driver for quality would probably be removed from the music industry.



Specialist Dealers

What you need to know: PS4 streaming

Sony has positioned its new PlayStation 4 as a gaming console, but underneath its hood lies a wealth of multimedia streaming possibilities.

First up are Sony's own apps, Music Unlimited and Video Unlimited. Given a new lick of paint for the console's launch, both apps have been designed to be much faster than previous versions. This, combined with a cleaner, slicker interface, reflects Sony's attempt at a less cluttered, more user friendly experience on its devices.

Music Unlimited works in a similar way to Rdio and Spotify. Features include the ability to build your own playlists and share music across several devices, with every track available to stream in high quality. You can also play music in the background while you play your games. Nifty.

Video Unlimited offers a selection of 200,000 films and TV shows from major, and minor, American film studios. The service employs the use of Dynamic Adaptive Streaming over HTTP (DASH to you and me), which is said to be able to deliver content instantaneously, removing stability and buffering issues and delivering a smoother streaming performance.

Even though the PlayStation 4 doesn't quite meet the quantity of entertainment apps on offer on Microsoft's Xbox One, it does offer the usual streaming culprits such as BBC iPlayer, LoveFilm and Netflix. Much like the Xbox, we'd expect more apps to be arriving in future updates.

Sharing

Twitch and UStream are live video streaming sites that have been built in to the PS4. Tap the Share button on the Dualshock 4 controller (right) and head towards the 'Broadcast gameplay' option and you'll have the choice of the above sites to live-stream your gaming fails to.

As well as the above, video clips can be shared to Facebook (and screenshots to Twitter), although YouTube sharing has not yet been enabled on the console.

Picking the right box



Confused by the various options in the set-top market? Not sure on how to decide which one is better? Here are a few tips on the things to consider when looking for the set-top box that's perfect for you.

Tuners

If you plan on watching one channel while recording another, make sure your receiver has more than one tuner. Three tuners mean you can record two channels, so you don't have to miss out on your favourite programmes.

Content

If you're not sure which set-top box/service you want, then content is a good yardstick to measure by. BBC iPlayer and a fair few of its ilk are available on most service providers but other programmes and channels could be exclusive to just one.

HDD

Looking to record? You'll need a big enough hard drive to store your TV shows. The bigger the better. 500GB will give you 125 hours of HD viewing or two weeks of standard-def content. Some receivers now ship with a huge 1TB of onboard storage.

On the go

With service providers rolling out mobile apps, watching TV with a remote control is a thing of the past. Browsing what's on, managing your recorded content and deleting remotely when you're out and about is a handy trick. TV is now mobile.

Multi-room

Tired of someone else hogging the TV? Add an extra box and turn your set-up into a multi-room affair. Monthly fees apply but marry that with all the content on offer and you'll have a firm idea of which set-top box you should get.

Streaming Partners

Its lineup of streaming partners is larger than the PS4's with Machinima, TED and Now TV joining Netflix, LoveFilm, 4oD et al. There's no sign of BBC iPlayer on the platform, but as it's on the Xbox 360 we wouldn't expect it to be held up for too long...

Xbox Music and Video

Instead Microsoft look to be pushing its users towards its own apps in the form of Xbox Music and Xbox Video. Both services seem to be well stocked with content, with the latest films and TV shows available to rent or buy.

DLNA Streaming

Unlike the PlayStation 4 the Xbox One has included DLNA functionality from the off. Despite that, it is restricted in terms of how it's implemented, with only devices that meet Microsoft's 'Play To' standard able to work with the console.

SkyDrive

An extra feature for users who have Microsoft's cloud storage service SkyDrive on their consoles. Most video and music formats can be stored in the cloud and played through Xbox Music and Xbox Video.



Gameplay streaming

It's in the gameplay streaming arena where the Xbox One falters slightly compared with the PS4. Twitch gameplay streaming was due to launch with the console, but has now been pushed back to early 2014. Its internal DVR – Upload Studio – captures five minutes of footage and lets you edit content (add voiceovers, picture-inpicture commentary etc) before sending it to your friends via SkyDrive, Facebook, Twitter, YouTube and so on. To do that, however, you'll need an Xbox Live Gold subscription.

The PlayStation App: what you need to know

There are two components to the PlayStation 4's second screen experience. The first is the Playstation App which extends the console experience (for free) to Android and iOS devices. With the PlayStation App you can send messages to other users, or people who have a PS4, PS3 and PS Vita.

The app offers a smaller version of the PS4 interface, through which you can buy games and then have them downloaded to the main console when you are away from home.

You can manage your own profile, view your friends' activity, receive notifications from your friends and keep up-to-date with the latest news on the PlayStation Network as well.

Tap the 'Connect to PS4' icon and you can enable the second screen option for games such as PS4 exclusive *Knack* or the upcoming *Watch_Dogs*, which displays extra information and useful tips should you need them.

The second component of the second screen experience is the PlayStation Vita. It offers the same functionality as the app, but it also comes with the incentive of Remote Play.

Remote Play allows anyone with a Vita to stream PS4 titles to the handheld's 5in OLED screen via a wi-fi connection. A neat extra if you're looking to play games like *Killzone: Shadow Fall* or *Assassin's Creed 4: Black Flag* away from the console.

Xbox One SmartGlass: what you need to know

In comparison to Sony, Microsoft has taken a slightly different tack with regards to its Xbox One SmartGlass app.

Built from the ground up for the Xbox One (there's also an app for the Xbox 360), SmartGlass is a free companion app that's available on Windows 8, Windows Phone, Android and iOS.

Being a companion app, playing full retail games on your portable device is off the table. Instead, the app adds to the overall experience with several games - *Dead Rising 3, Ryse* and the forthcoming *Project Spark* - all SmartGlass enabled. This allows for interaction with the game even when you're not playing.

The app comes with several other features including the Xbox One's new matchmaking system – SmartMatch – which pairs you with players of similar skill and reputation for a better gaming experience. On other occasions it can follow your progress in real-time, offering useful tips and help when you need it.

Elsewhere the app can act as your dashboard when you're out and about, with the ability to send messages to friends, view profiles and watch any video clips you've uploaded to Xbox Live. In addition to that, when watching a TV show or film, the app can serve up extra details on the programme with behind the scenes access, commentary and interactive guides available to view.
