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

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



HTC takes the special One and makes it better still

HTCOne (M8) | Smartphone | from free on contract

It's fair to say the HTC One (M8) has some pretty big shoes to fill. The original HTC One was one of our favourite phones of last year, and we weren't alone. It received five-star praise from just about every tech mag, website and blog the world over. The great news is, its successor is even better. Pick up the One (M8) and you know

you're dealing with a piece of pure quality. As with its predecessor, it's created from a piece of single aluminium. Up from around 70 per cent metal in the original, the One (M8) is now around 90 per cent metal, and it shows. There's next-to no plastic to be seen. The way it looks has been tweaked too

with more curved corners than before, and a gorgeously rounded back panel. The result is that it feels slimmer than ever too, despite its depth unchanging at 9.4mm.

A thing of beauty

Put simply, it's the best-looking phone we've ever seen. The flagship colour will be the metal-grey colour we tested, though arctic silver (similar to the original One) and amber gold versions will also be available.

Of course, while we love a beautiful design, we know its what's on the inside that counts, and luckily the HTC One (M8) doesn't slip up there either.

Under the hood, there is a 2.3GHz Qualcomm Snapdragon 801 processor, supported by 2GB RAM. The Samsung



Galaxy S5 may just pip it on paper for processor power, but the HTC One (M8) is as fast as we could want it to be.

We try our best to fluster it, running multiple apps, whizzing around the operating system and opening data-heavy webpages, but it keeps up at every stage without a single stutter or stumble.

Sitting over the top of Android 4.4 (KitKat) is HTC's newest iteration of its Sense user interface, and it looks as lovely as ever. If we had to opt for something other than vanilla Android, HTC's Sense skin would be it. It's a 1920 x 1080 Full HD screen with a pixel density of 441ppi. That's a slight drop from the original One, which offers 468ppi, but you'd never notice. The screen is gorgeous - sharp, with a vibrant, well judged colour palette and not a pixel in sight.

The level of fine detail in the picture is up there with the best, with crisp edges and a great sense of texture and depth, and contrast is superb, really nailing the handling of deep blacks and bright whites.

It uses a similar panel technology to an IPS (in-plane switching) display, which means viewing angles are really good.

This is the best-looking phone we've ever seen. Of course, while we love a beautiful design, we know its what's on the inside that counts, and the HTC One (M8) doesn't slip up there either

There haven't been a whole host of changes in the way it looks. It still has the beautifully clean, unobtrusive design we loved, with very little bloatware preinstalled, which is a welcome decision.

Blinkfeed, HTC's content-aggregating homepage, is back, with some usability tweaks. Customising it is easier than ever too (including turning it off), so you really can make it into a snapshot of all the things that matter to you.

A new software feature on the One (M8) is Motion Launch, which offers up gesture-based commands. Like the LG G2, you can now wake the screen by simply double tapping, but you can also swipe up to unlock, swipe right to go straight to Blinkfeed and turn it landscape and press the volume key to launch the camera. We found all these features responsive and reliable during our test, with some becoming second nature before we realised.

Let's talk about that screen. Up from 4.7in to 5in, the phone is bigger than its predecessor, but not awkwardly so. It's taller, for sure, but in the hand it doesn't feel much different. Those extra few inches on the screen really help to make this feel like a great size for watching movies on the go too.

When it comes to storing all those movies, many might be put off by the single 16GB on-board storage option available in the UK. The good news is that HTC has listened to the criticisms of its predecessor and included a microSD card slot, capable of boosting the memory by a whopping 128GB, instantly turning this into a multimedia powerhouse. That really is quite something.


The original's left-hand side placement of the power button was another grumble, so it's now switched to the right for easier access. Sometimes it's the little things.

Bigger, better sound

When it comes to sound, HTC has not rested on its laurels. The Boomsound stereo speakers that sit above and below the screen have had their speaker chambers redesigned, allowing the One (M8) to be 25 per cent louder than its predecessor.

There's also a redesigned 'multi-phase' amp, which allows the One (M8) to amplify different parts of a track independently,

The Dot-View case interacts with the HTC to give basic info. It's an extra £35, though

giving it the ability to boost soft vocals without overdoing the bass, for example.

There are improvements to be heard here, particularly through the Boomsound speakers. It's able to go noticeably louder, there's better stereo separation, and detail levels are up as well. Plug in a pair of headphones and the improvements are a little more subtle. It doesn't match the likes of Sony's Xperia Z1 or the iPhone 5s, but with some decent buds (ie not the bundled ones) there's a perfectly listenable sound.

There's no getting away from the fact that the revised camera on the HTC One (M8) does suffer from a lack of resolution, and there are occasional hiccups with overexposure in variable light conditions too. That said, it does take and focus photos extremely quickly, and in good lighting conditions you'll get generally good shots.

During testing we found the Duo Camera, post-shot focusing effect (see panel, above) to work best in situations where subjects were very obviously in the foreground and background.



1 One of the talking points of the One was its shunning of megalpixels for Ultrapixels - bigger pixels that HTC said improved low-light performance. That configuration returns here.

2 The 4.1 Ultrapixel lens is joined by a second lens, which HTC has dubbed the Duo Camera. It doesn't take snaps, but instead captures all the depth information of every shot, allowing you to adjust the focus of the photo from the edit menu and introduce an artsy, blurred-background effect.

This depth information allows for a handful of other features, all of which feel infinitely more gimmicky, including the ability to replace the bokeh effect with a handful of dramatic filters.

Making good use of the juice

When it comes to battery life, the HTC One (M8) does perfectly fine. There's a jump to 2600mAh (up from the original's 2300mAh), which we found to comfortably last us the day but not much more - about the same as its predecessor, really.

What has changed is the introduction of the Extreme Power Saving mode, which can really help if you get caught out without a charger. By just giving you access to core functionality, this mode can give you up to 30 hours of standby time with just 10 per cent battery remaining. A handy feature.

The HTC One (M8) is a resounding success, building on one of the best phones of last year and making it even better. The few camera grumbles can't take away from an excellent bigger picture - we like this phone a lot. There's plenty of competition approaching in the coming months, but until then this is the phone to beat this year.

REVIEWER'S NOTES... 5 THINGS ABOUT THE HTC ONE (M8)

This phone is ridiculously goodlooking, but that's nothing to when you pick it up. It's so lovely to hold, the whole office is queueing up for a go. The 16GB on-board storage just won't cut it for our movie and music addiction, so the ability to boost it by a huge 128GB via microSD card, is terrific. The Boomsound speakers aren't just a design touch, they give a serious improvement to any sound played out loud - way better than the competition. We fire up a film on this phone and we're instantly drawn in. The colours and contrast are superb and fine detail is up there as the best we've seen. There are better camera phones out there, but the One (M8) still impresses with its speed and colour balance. It has some interesting features too.

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In time, everything changes. That's progress. The new 600 Series brings 19 years of Bowers & Wilkins engineering advances, including the new Decoupled Double Dome tweeters for amazingly precise treble. But one thing hasn't changed: the new 600 Series offers the same amazing value now as when the award-winning original launched in 1995.

Bluetooth

Everything seems to have Bluetooth these days, and this is no exception. It has a 10m-range, set-up is simple, and while you lose quality compared to a wired connection, the compromise is okay for convenience.



We have been extolling the virtues of soundbars as a solution to the declining quality of flatscreen speakers for a long time - and suddenly there are so many of the things, it's almost impossible to keep up with what's what.

Given the new-found interest in them, it's little wonder that even traditional hi-fi companies such as Wharfedale are keen to get a piece of this tasty pie. But what is surprising, given its reputation for audio quality, is that Wharfedale's first offering in this growing field is such an affordable one. The only other £150 soundbars we've seen have been pretty poor - and surely even Wharfedale can't produce something that sounds good for such little money?

Or can it? Perhaps in the future it will... because the Vista 100 gets a huge amount right. Unfortunately, it also gets one thing quite badly wrong.

Smart, matt-black styling

The good news starts with the build. This isn't the slimmest soundbar and could be an issue in terms of placement, but it is a nice-looking, 1m-wide unit. Also, it's more solid and feels more premium than you'd expect for this sort of money: with smart, matt-black styling and subtle silver bands, topped with touch-sensitive controls.

Behind the grilles are six drivers driven by a 60W amp, which Wharfedale claims is enough to create a muscular, room-filling sound. The claims are spot-on.

For a soundbar, let alone one costing just £150, this makes a big noise, especially in one of the EQ modes, which apparently use Absolute 3D technology from a company called Sonic Emotion. Use the 'Movie' mode while watching a film and - while you lose a bit of focus and clarity from voices - the weight is mighty impressive, as is the dispersion of sound. Surround effects never truly envelop the listening position, but they push well into the room along the left and right sides of your soundfield.

Some will prefer turning the 3D mode off, especially for TV shows and the more

dialogue-heavy movies out there. You still don't lose depth or solidity here, but the narrower soundstage is more focused and a little bit clearer.

The problem is that the system tries a little too hard to be bassy, and when you feed it the really deep stuff it struggles. You can watch a whole movie and hardly notice. Perhaps you will get the odd bit of blowing from the drivers during a particularly massive explosion, but that's easily dismissed or ignored. If your music collection is relatively tame it's also entirely possible that you will never encounter an issue, but play something properly bassy and you're in for a shock.

vibration that we were convinced the unit was faulty. A replacement unit proved it was not.

You can turn the bass level down using the bundled remote, but while that reduces the amount of bass it doesn't improve the quality of it, and that means the issue is still clearly audible.

Essentially it rules out a big section of music that you might want to listen to. And while a soundbar might be considered by many to be geared more towards movies and TV shows than music, there's also an expectation that these are do-it-all devices - and that makes the problem impossible to ignore and hard to forgive.

Some tweaking

It's a great shame because on first listen we were convinced that the Vista 100 was head-and-shoulders above its similarly priced rivals.

We suspect that with some tweaking Wharfedale could still pull that off, but we can't recommend the Vista 100 as it is, without this one, major caveat. You should look elsewhere for your soundbar.

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Nakamichi AV1/AVP1 | Home cinema amplifier | £900 Is this blast from the past past it?

Mention the name Nakamichi and we bet most audiophiles still associate the brand with exquisite high-end cassette decks. Yet decks like the legendary Dragon went out of production decades ago.

Over the years the brand has gone through various management changes and its product mix has changed radically. The last time we remember reviewing anything from Nakamichi it was an all-in-one style system built to battle Bose. But that was years ago, so imagine our surprise to be confronted by this, the AV1/AVP1 processor/ power amp combination.

Superbly finished

On the surface this pairing seems almost too good to be true. It's smart, easy to use and finished to a high standard. So high that we couldn't believe the company could sell the combination at £900. We'd have guessed a figure at least double that.

Checking the specifications, though, throws up a few omissions. There's no network streaming ability or internet tuner (due imminently), and the AV1 processor won't pass through a 4K signal. While 4K is in its infancy we would expect most receivers to accommodate such a signal. Nakamichi plans to launch a suitable video scaler in due course, but there are no firm dates. Oddly, there are no analogue video inputs either. These are no longer essential for many, but it's still a surprise omission.

The AVP1 power amplifier is a real powerhouse, delivering 7 x 110 watts. It's a

showing few of the flourishes the likes of Yamaha or Denon manage - but they do get the job done. Much the same can be said of the remote handset. It looks smart enough, but isn't particularly luxurious.

This Nakamichi combination sounds a

little crude at initial switch-on. We leave it

delivered with a great deal of conviction either, pointing to restricted dynamics and a general lack of agility.

Moving on to the Blu-ray of Stevie Wonder's Live At Last the amp struggles to take a firm grasp of rhythms, leading to a slightly ponderous feel to songs. There's plenty of solidity behind basslines and the ability to raise replay levels close to that of the real event, yet we're still missing a chunk of atmosphere and enjoyment.

Stereo performance mirrors that heard in a surround set-up. It has lots of muscle and balanced tonality, but could do with an extra dose of finesse and rhythmic ability.

Ultimately, for all its authority this Nakamichi pairing doesn't entertain as much as the best. It needs greater insight and more expressive dynamics before it can worry the class leaders.

chunky unit, weighing in at 32kg, so get help if you ever need to move it. Even when pushed hard it doesn't get too warm, but it's still worth making sure you leave enough room around it for air to circulate.

Apart from the misgivings mentioned, overall connectivity is good. There's a decent range of analogue and digital audio connections, and the ability to output stereo signals to three additional zones. An aptX Bluetooth dongle is supplied, which opens up the processor to use with smart phones, computers and tablets. Handy.

The units can be connected via singleended or balanced leads. Most of our listening was done using balanced.

Getting started is straightforward. There's the usual automated speaker set-up - it adjusts size, distance and level, but does it with a fair bit of fuss. Once done, though, the results are accurate enough. The rest of the set-up menus are a touch basic,

with the presentation gaining refinement and losing its hard edge.

We start off with The Hobbit: The Desolation of Smaug on Blu-ray and are impressed with the solidity and power. It sounds really authoritative and delivers high volumes with impressive ease. The sound field is pleasing too. It may not be the most expansive, but it remains convincing as the dragon thumps around.

Easy to match with speakers

Nakamichi has got the tonal balance pretty much right too - enough to make speaker matching relatively painless.

It's not all good news though. There are a number of areas where this package falls short of the best at this level. Detail resolution is decent but no more. There are nuances in voices and textures to the instrumental back-drop that the Nakamichi overlooks. Crashes aren't





Acoustic Energy 103 | Stereo speakers | £550 **AE's new babies lack a little grip**

The 103 floorstanders are our first sniff of the 1-Series. Acoustic Energy's latest entry-level range.

The British manufacturer used to have good form in this field, but that was years ago and it's struggled to deliver results of late. So the new series marks a fresh effort to regain its reputation in this market.

As well as the 103 floorstanders, the range is made up of standmounts. a centre speaker and subwoofer.

The company claims the 1-Series has similar capabilities to its mid-market 3-Series, but in a smaller package and at a lower price. We liked what we heard of the earlier series, so we have high hopes.

Much carry over from the 3-Series

The 11cm aluminium-core mid/bass drivers have been carried over into the 1-Series, and are hard-anodised for rigidity and dampening. The 28mm soft-dome tweeters stick too, with the crossover remaining the same. The cabinet's slotted port design is also similar. It's put on the front panel to make the speakers less fussy about placement.

AE has kept the easy-to-mount magnetic grilles with the 103s, which prevent any ugly puncture-wounds in the baffle - although the finish of the speakers is not as sleek as the 3-Series. The 103s are available in ash. walnut or a high-gloss white vinyl wrap. They still look impressive however, with their sloped baffle and silver-trimmed cones within the compact design.

The 103s are 85cm tall and 19cm wide, so they are

practical: if your house is tight on space, then they're a good option. AE says the speakers were designed with smaller rooms in mind and their slim build makes them easier to accommodate than most rivals

optimal performance. As for that performance, well, the sound is even and clean - there is precision and detail to be found here.

Stereo imaging is an asset of the 103s too. Supertramp's Give A Little Bit gives good placement to the acoustic string ensemble and, while Eminem's skits are usually something we skip, the 103s bring the narratives to life, with sirens and footsteps well imaged.



This amplifier has the refinement to make the most of the 103s' abilities



The leading edges of notes are crisp on the 103s, although they do lack fluency. The intro piano on Daft Punk's Within feels stop-start. The speakers can sound thin and could do with more warmth and smoothness in their sound - despite running them in for a week. our music was still somewhat undernourished during the test.

Placing the 103s close to a wall, say, makes a significant difference. You lose the spacious soundfield, but the sound fills out a bit and you get a more rounded feel thicker vocals and more convincing midrange in return.

A slightly erratic tempo

Fiddling with placement can't cover over all the cracks however. The 103s' poor grip on timing fails to communicate the pace of music as well as class leaders manage. Rimsky-Korsakov's Flight Of The Bumblebee is delivered with an erratic tempo and the 103s just can't keep up with the orchestral interlude's momentum.

Sat next to our Award-winning O Acoustics 2050is the 103s are dwarfed in the shadows of their towering pillars - but the issue here is not just size. The 2050is handle rhythm better, have a richer presentation and more pep.

The 103s can't provide quite the dynamic reach of some either - nor is there quite as much room around instruments. They can sound a little congested next to the best rivals.

A decent, not great start

The 103s are by no means a bad start for Acoustic Energy's 1-Series, but they could undoubtedly perform better. The 2050is outperform them in most aspects, and are £100 cheaper as well.

This DAC impresses the moment we unpack it. It's big - built into one of the company's beautifully finished full-size 8-series cases - and features a large, clear display and an extensive range of features. We even like the remote; it's good quality and easy to use, bar some cramped buttons.

aptX Bluetooth connectivity

It's inability to play DSD aside, the 851D ticks all the boxes. It will play 24-bit/192kHz files from all inputs, including (unusually) optical. Inputs are what we'd expect: coax, optical and USB with the addition of AES/ EBU and, more usefully, Bluetooth via a supplied dongle. The addition of aptX Bluetooth opens up the DAC for use with smartphones, tablets and computers.

We're pleased to see a headphone output and that the 851D can be configured as a digital preamp, with a variable output that can be connected directly into a power amp or active speakers. This is a great idea if you only have digital sources and want an arguably more audiophile set-up with a simpler signal path. Analogue outputs are in both single-ended and balanced XLR. Initial listening impressions are good the 851D delivers a nicely balanced sound with even tonality and detail. Play Orff's *Carmina Burana* (CD rip) and the Cambridge shines with an agile sound, lacking nothing in scale or authority. Instruments are rendered with precision and delivered with suitable solidity. We're impressed by the large-scale dynamics and the DAC's punch during crescendos.

We're pleased with the soundstage too. It's wide, deep, and nicely layered. Imaging stays stable when things get busy - not always the case with some rivals. The Cambridge's tonal balance is convincing. There's no shortage of refinement either the 851D sounds silky and fluid. There's a range of digital filters, and choice will come down to system or your taste.

In our reference set-up - Naim NDS/555ps streamer, MacBook (with Pure Music media-playing software), Bryston BP26/4BSST2 amplifier and ATC SCM50 speakers - we prefer the 'Minimum' phase option, which sounds organic in our set-up. Change to something like a 24-bit/96kHz recording of *Snowflake* by Kate Bush, however, and a few cracks show in the 851D's performance. There's insight, agility and body, but the DAC is less successful communicating the nuances of the piano or the emotion in Bush's vocals. Compared with Chord's QuteHD or Naim's pricier

DAC-V1, there's less dynamic expression at low levels and less security.

Pairing via Bluetooth is easy and, while the sound isn't up to the usual hi-fi inputs, it's a welcome option. We also like the DAC's performance through the headphone output. Such outputs are often compromised, but not here - using Grado SR325is we find the same insight and transparency as with the analogue outputs.

The Azur 851D is a fine DAC. It may not match the best in outright entertainment but it still sounds good and combines talent with a useful range of features. Add fine build into the mix and you have a worthy product.

Sony SRS-X9 | Wireless speaker | £600 How to hit the high-res hot spot

Sony has been a real supporter of the high-resolution revolution, and the SRS-X9 wireless speaker is one of the most exciting additions to its high-res range so far. Three years in the making, it's certainly been worth the wait to get it as good as this.

Combining quality with convenience, the SRS-X9 is capable of streaming files wirelessly via aptX Bluetooth and AirPlay, packs DLNA for wireless networked streaming and is, of course, capable of high-resolution 24-bit/192kHz playback via the speaker's USB-B port. It supports DSD files too. As for other inputs, there's a line-in and standard USB port around the back, plus an ethernet socket for hardwiring to your router.

Ouite the box of tricks then, and it's been designed to look the part too, with its premium minimalistic styling. Its glass top panel features a number of touch-sensitive buttons for controlling volume and source, with a proximity sensor that will only light them up when you get close to them.

Armchair operation

If you prefer to make your selections from afar, you can always employ the long, thin remote, which duplicates all the controls that you'll find on the unit in the box.

Behind the removable aluminium grille is a large, centrally placed woofer and two supporting passive radiators, two of Sony's midrange Magnetic Fluid drivers and two tweeters, with two more located on the top panel to help disperse the sound.

These seven drivers are supported by an eight-channel S-Master HX digital amplifier, which Sony has developed specifically for high-res audio, aiming to reduce noise across a wider frequency range. The result is an output of 154W, which just pips the B&W A7 for pure on-paper power.

Connecting to the speaker is really easy. There's a WPS button for a quick connection with compatible routers, but Sony has also created an app called Songpal that helps you get your SRS-X9 speaker onto your wireless network in a few easy steps, as well as control the music you're listening to.

To do this, you'll first have to connect to the speaker via Bluetooth, which is a simple case of searching and pairing (or via NFC with compatible devices), then boot up the app to share your wireless network details. It took us less than five minutes to be up and running, and that's when the fun started. Once you have a track playing, you're

then able to control playback, volume and

equalisation through the app. We'd say that anyone considering the Sony SRS-X9 should certainly download Songpal to really get the most from their speaker.

Play-it-all capability

There isn't a file format you can't throw at this thing - AAC, MP3, WMA, WAV, AIFF, FLAC and DSD will all play nice, so you shouldn't have a problem playing your whole digital music collection.

We first hooked up our laptop to try out the headline high-res capabilities, and were instantly surprised by the sound that this reasonably compact speaker is capable of. There's a lot of power here, and those tweeters on the top really help to disperse the sound - we tested it in a reasonably large room and it had no problem with making its presence known.

The sound is an impressive one too, with a great sense of scale and a rich, full-bodied tone that is instantly likeable.

In particular, the SRS-X9 shows an expert handling of the lower frequencies, reaching



really deep into any bassline without ever compromising on precision and detail.

It's got a decent sense of rhythm too, and is able to switch between tempos and genres with aplomb.

Listen to Billie Jean by Michael Jackson at 24-bit/176.4kHz, and that famous pulsing bassline is packed with warmth, punch, texture and weight, and is never heavyhanded. In fact, the Sony is pretty well-balanced across the board, save for an occasional brightness to the treble when really pushed in the volume department.

Playing a 24-bit/88.2kHz FLAC recording of the Rolling Stones' Gimme Shelter, for example, we found the opening guitars and percussion to have a slightly harsh edge. Knock the volume down just a few notches from the top though, and the problem is largely solved for most recordings. There is a difference to be heard between high-res and more compressed formats, despite the built-in DSEE HX digital soundenhancement engine, which Sony says will upscale compressed music to near high-res.

Spot the difference

We found 320kbps streams from Spotify lacked the subtlety, dynamic handling and timing of higher-res material. That hard treble rears its head a little more often at this quality too.

That's not to say things sound bad at this level - far from it. The SRS-X9 offers a seriously listenable, enjoyable sound across the board of file formats and sample rates,

USE IT WITH MacBook

Pro You'll want to make use of the SRS-X9's high-res smarts, and Apple's MacBook Pro is a superb laptop with plenty of space to keep tracks stored

but compared with high-res music over a wired connection. there are always going to be some sacrifices to be made for that wireless convenience.

We'd say the B&W A7 just pips the Sony for rhythmic handling, but then the SRS-X9 does much more for £100 less (the A7 is AirPlay only). All of a sudden, that £600 price tag doesn't seem so bad.

The Sony SRS-X9 speaker wasn't three years in the making by accident. It's a carefully considered product, and a multi-talented one at that, all wrapped up in a stylish package. When you buy it, you're not just buying into high-res but into a superb wireless speaker than can pretty much play whatever you want, however you want, and sound superb in the process. It really is a true wireless wonder.



Multi-room audio

Multi-room goes mainstream

The world went wireless in 2013, now a raft of new products suggest this year it's all about multi-room

ireless music - hot on the heels of the digital music revolution - has become one of the most popular product categories on the market as people embrace the convenience of streaming music.

Now it looks like the next logical step, multi-room music, could be set to move into the mainstream in 2014. New products are queuing up to challenge the existing players, with specialist companies and big-hitters both set to bring

Sonos has expanded its h multi-room product range s since it formed in 2002

systems offering new features and functionality in an effort to ride the multi-room music wave. So what's it all about and what do we have to look forward to?

Getting in on the act

Plenty of new players are poised to enter the market. Samsung started the year by unveiling its M5 and M7 wireless speakers, which can be used to create a multi-room system.

More recently we've seen the launch of Musaic - brainchild of ex-Cambridge Audio engineering head Matthew Bramble. Musaic's system comprises wireless



speakers placed around the home, using wi-fi to stream audio. Elsewhere, Bluesound's high-definition system arrived in the UK, having been rolled out across the US by NAD and PSB's parent company, Lenbrook.

And Naim is rumoured to be readying a multi-room music system, teasing the launch of 'a new kind of system'.

A competitive market

All this means more multi-room choice – a good thing if you're a consumer, making it more likely there's a wireless streaming solution for you.

Arguably the most basic way to get started is with AirPlay or Bluetooth, with systems such as the Arcam rCube and Pure Jongo offering you varying degrees of multi-room functionality.

After a more advanced system? Since 2002, Sonos has been our go-to system of choice for 'wireless hi-fi', and remains the company to beat: Sonos's huge success has acted as a key catalyst for the new competitors we're seeing.

Sonos is the answer?

Of course, Sonos doesn't have all the answers. There's no AirPlay or Bluetooth, nor any sign of high-res audio support.

The firm has declared 2014 its 'year of software', saying it's unlikely we'll see new Sonos hardware. Could the lack of any new products or connectivity options open the door to rivals?

Island of the streams...

Not only is there more choice if you're looking to sort yourself out with a multi-room music streaming system, but there are also plenty of options when it comes to the streaming apps and services currently available to you.



Streaming apps and services




In our last issue we took a look at the main players in the world of online music streaming. But, of course, there's also internet radio consider including BBC



Music servers

There's no denying that a dedicated separates system will deliver better sound quality. If that's something you'd rather have over the flexibility of a system like Sonos, a NAS device will stream music to a networked player or client such as Cyrus's Stream XP2-QX or Naim's NDS/555 PS (right). Want more rooms? You'll need more streamers. It's expensive – but think of the quality.

Audio Pro

Addon T8 £250



Bind 'em fast

Make sure the connecting wires are fastened tight in their binding posts, as they had a habit of slipping out in our test even when we thought they were secure



"They're tiny!" Those were the first words we uttered when unboxing the new Audio Pro Addon T8s - the latest wireless speakers from Swedish hi-fi manufacturer Audio Pro. They're petite and beautifully finished, and once we start streaming songs over Bluetooth we're hooked by their lively and confident sound.

The T8s are punchy and energetic. They're more powerful and dynamic than their small stature suggests, and are driven by a 36W per channel Class D amp inside the master speaker (with all the connections). We don't expect a huge spread of sound from such small speakers, but the T8s go fairly loud, and confidently.

There's a sparkle to the sound that holds our attention, with plenty of detail and zippy timing keeping us engaged as we stream song after song from our Spotify playlists. The piano notes tinkle fluidly in *Life on Mars?* while David Bowie's voice reaches clear, strong highs. There's decent weight to the sound, although the rumbling bass could be a touch tauter and deeper to match the low-end prowess of the rival Ruark MR1s.

Confidence across the board

The Audio Pros turn a deft hand to any song, confidently playing delicate vocal-led tunes from Kimbra in the same breath as synthesiser-heavy industrial rock from Nine Inch Nails.

They're not quite as expressive and insightful as the Award-winning Ruarks, though, which have set the performance standard for small desktop speakers.

Small and beautiful

Standing just 16cm tall and 10cm wide, the T8s take up about as much space on your desk as a large cup of coffee. And they can be pushed up against the wall without affecting the sound too much.

The finish is impeccable: clean and crisp Scandinavian design with no clutter. The finely built cabinets are available in white or black, and the matt lacquer finish is smooth to the touch.

The remote control also gets a quality finish. Milled out of a solid piece of aluminium, it's a far cry from the flimsy plastic remotes you often get at this price. It looks classy, feels reassuringly weighty, and has responsive buttons.

Bluetooth is the main connection here, with the higher-quality aptX codec boosting the streaming quality. Pairing takes a few seconds, and we don't experience any dropouts when streaming from a smartphone.

There's a pair of RCA inputs and a 3.5mm input for other sources, (MP3 players that don't have Bluetooth, for example) and a subwoofer output. There's no optical input, but the T8s can be used as TV speakers by connecting to the analogue inputs. A single LED light changes colour depending on the input chosen: blue for Bluetooth, red for the RCA inputs, green for 3.5mm. It's a shame the USB port can't be used for charging smartphones or tablets; it's reserved solely for plugging in an optional Audio Pro wireless receiver (RX100; £85, or RXD200; £150) for linking to wi-fi.

Included in the box is a pair of rubber feet that angle the speakers upwards. It's a nice addition, although we found the T8s sound just as capable without them.

There may be speakers with greater subtlety, better rhythm and more refinement, but the Audio Pro Addon T8s are great for their size and price. Their punchy detail and lively character are enjoyable, while that stunning finish and petite size will garner many fans.

Up against it

At 145mm deep, the X3Os are unlikely to give you a problem with space. But if you need to shove them against a wall, they won't mind. In fact, the sound improves



The build, design and size of the Blue Auras are all spot-on for speakers of their kind, but these X30s face fierce competition from well-established, more talented rivals

The Blue Aura X30s are yet another petite pair of £300ish Bluetooth stereo speakers, but this time they're from a brand we haven't reviewed before.

Founded in 2010, this Cambridgeshire-based audio company specialises in wireless and Bluetooth speaker systems, with ease of use given as much prominence as sound quality.

The X30s look promising: compact, well built, and with a good spread of wireless and wired features. But can they match the class-leaders?

Simple set-up

Bluetooth is the main method of playing, and pairing with an Apple iPhone 5S is swift and easy. The Blue Auras also have NFC (Near Field Communication), and a quick tap with the Google Nexus 5 gets us connected with minimal fuss.

Play *Didn't It Rain* by Hugh Laurie and the Blue Aura X3Os sound pleasant. They have a smooth presentation – perhaps a touch too smooth – that lends itself nicely to low-quality streams from Spotify. The X3Os do have the higherquality aptX codec to help boost Bluetooth streaming, and while that improvement is apparent in rivals such as the upgraded Roth OLi POWA-5s, the X3Os aren't quite as distinct.

Neutral Milk Hotel's *In The Aeroplane Over The Sea* sounds quite muffled and cloudy and, coupled with a limited



simpler remotes, but we like the big buttons dynamic reach, the overall soundfield can get rather congested. Voices are smooth and direct, but they're not as natural or expressive as on the Ruark MR1s. We would have liked a clearer and more articulate sound.

That lively bass in *Didn't It Rain* isn't quite as punchy and agile as we'd like, either. The low end doesn't go that deep, and it can plod along somewhat. On the other hand, the top end is well behaved and has a sweetness to it. Timing might not be all it could be, but there are no harsh edges with the Blue Auras.

These speakers are the ideal desktop size, similar to the dinky Audio Pro Addon T8s. They're small enough to sit unobtrusively next to a laptop without taking up too much space.

Quality finish

Build quality is sturdy, while the faux-leather finish gives a soft but tough texture. The X30s are available in three finishes: graphite, sahara, or arctic white. Inside each speaker is a 20mm softdome tweeter and a 3.5in paper cone, while the master speaker houses a 25W-per-channel class D amplifier.

Bluetooth streaming is the highlight feature here, but wired connections haven't been forgotten. A pair of RCA inputs (for analogue sources) and a digital optical input (to connect to a TV or laptop) are situated on the master speaker's back panel. There's no 3.5mm input, which strikes us as an odd omission - those with non-Bluetooth MP3 players won't be best pleased.

A USB port for an optional wireless receiver is provided, as is a subwoofer output should you want to add some much-needed oomph to the X30s.

The remote is small and basic, but we like the big buttons, and it's responsive.

Pleasant as they are, the X3Os aren't the subtlest or most involving listen. The similarly petite Audio Pro Addon T8s deliver a clearer, livelier sound, and cost £40 less than the Blue Auras' £290.

The build, design and size are all spot-on for speakers of their kind, but the X30s face fierce competition from well established, more talented rivals.

The Philips Fidelio E2s aren't just Bluetooth speakers. They're a desktop stereo system, a soundbar alternative, and a smartphone charging station too.

That's a whole bunch of features that you don't usually expect from a £300 pair of wireless speakers. Add in the elegant design and smooth detail, and it's no wonder they grab our attention amid all the other talented contenders.


Elegance in any setting

These speakers are designed to look good just about anywhere in the house: standing next to our flatscreen (or curved) TV, forming the main stereo system in our living room, or perched on our desk next to a laptop or smartphone.

They're quite tall though, and could be deemed bulky, especially next to more compact designs such as the tiny Audio Pro Addon T8 and Ruark MR1s.

We're particularly fond of the E2s' 'rocker' control design. The polished wood top cap on the master speaker subtly rocks as you tap the sides to control power, volume and input. Our one niggle is that there's a second's delay between command and effect.

AptX Bluetooth is expected; HDMI input with ARC (Audio Return Channel) and Dolby Digital decoding is a bonus. The HDMI input further makes the case for the E2s to be used as TV speakers they'll easily improve any flatscreen's



An optical input, coaxial input and a 3.5mm jack are also available to connect multiple sources, and the USB port will charge your smartphone or tablet (but won't play music from it).

Bluetooth pairing is quick and easy, but you can also tap your NFC-enabled device against the NFC tag for an even quicker connection.

The supplied remote control (small, responsive) offers tonal controls, and an audio sync adjustment – a thoughtful touch from Philips.

Elegant in looks, elegant in sound the Fidelio E2s are wonderfully pleasant to listen to. There's plenty of detail to bring out the delicate plucked strings, piano notes and quirky vocal range of Regina Spektor's *Fidelity*. It's a clear and open sound, one that spreads out easily and evenly across the room. There really is no need to employ the surround sound option when streaming music.

Smooth and easy

The sweet midrange and open treble deliver a smooth and measured sound, one with no hint of sharpness or roughness. The E2s have a decent, if somewhat laidback, rhythm and aim for easy listening over long hours rather than immediate and constant excitement. There's nothing wrong with that - it's what makes us warm to the Philips speakers, after all - but rivals such as Q Acoustics' Q-BT3 and the Ruark MR1s deliver a snappier and punchier rhythm, and unearth subtler detail.

Fidelio

We have stronger reservations about the E2s's low end performance. The bass isn't as insightful as the Ruarks, and can sound a bit woolly. Stricter control and agility would give the sound some much-needed punch and excitement.

The Philips Fidelio E2s have plenty to sing about: the luxurious design, the healthy spread of connections (especially the enviable HDMI input), and versatile use. While they may not sound as transparent and enthusiastic enough to please everyone, we don't think they'll be short of admirers.



This is an interesting set-up. We're big fans of the Pure Jongo S3 - the small and colourful portable wireless speaker that comes with its own wi-fi, Bluetooth and battery. It's well designed, sounds great and, more importantly for this test, it can be paired with another S3 to create a stereo system.

It's a feature we've seen in other single-unit wireless speakers (such as the UE Boom), but we've never actually reviewed speakers that have it. Does it work? Do these two sound as capable as dedicated wireless stereo speakers, such as the Ruarks, Audio Pros and Q Acoustics in this supertest?

No connection without Connect

Set-up requires a bit of patience, a wi-fi connection and the Pure Connect app (free for iOS and Android). The app is crucial for pairing the two S3s together and assigning left and right speakers.

We stumble across our first hurdle once we're all paired up ready to go: we can only play music that's stored on the smart device being used, and only via the Pure Connect app. On one hand, the Connect app is neatly organised, fairly easy to use (barring some interface hiccups) and gives you access to the Pure Digital Connect streaming music and live radio service (£5/month). On the other hand, you can't play Spotify, BBC Radio, Deezer or any other streaming

we're struck by how big the S3s sound. Using a pair of Jongos rather than one gives a wider, more authoritative presentation, and it easily fills the room with a strong delivery that also goes fairly loud (for the speakers' size).

What's more, the clever driver arrangement (four 19mm tweeters placed on each side of the cuboid speakers) integrates really well with the upward-facing 9cm subwoofer.

It's not the clearest and most precise sound, though. There's a surprising

amount of heft to the bass, but it doesn't have the agility found in rival speakers such as the Ruark MR1s, and the treble could do with a touch more bite.

Part of the Jongos' appeal is just how small and sturdy they are. They feel reassuringly weighty and durable. The finish is smart (available in white or black), while the removable mesh grilles come in black, red, green or yellow.

Since each Jongo has its own power, amplification (20W for each) and built-in battery, they're not restricted by cables connecting a pair, giving them another tick in the flexibility column. The battery lasts for around 10 hours, too.

The imminent software update saves this Jongo S3 stereo set-up from a three-star rating, but we have to admit to being a touch disappointed with the sound; at this price level it needs to do a little more to challenge the class leaders.

The middle ground

The Q-BT3s might be larger than the tiny Audio Pro Addon T8s and Ruark MR1s, but they're more compact than the bulky Roths and tall Philips Fidelio F2s

The Q Acoustics Q-BT3s tick all the right boxes: they look smart, they're versatile, and they sound good. Who wouldn't be tempted?

Ever since we first reviewed these speakers a few issues ago, we've been itching to pit them against their peers. For £300, Philips Fidelio E2s, for example, offer a variety of connection options, while the Award-winning Ruark MR1s (also £300) pose the biggest threat in terms of sound performance. How will the Q Acoustics fare against their rivals?

Admirably so, as we found out. From the off, the Q-BT3s remind us why were so impressed with them first time round. A clear and smooth presentation in an airy, detailed soundstage - these speakers are incredibly easy to listen to.

An engaging performance

Stream Ones That Got Away by Gabby Young and Other Animals over Bluetooth, and the Q-BT3s deliver an animated performance. The guitar strings have texture, the drums hit with satisfying impact, the bassline is funky and agile, and the piano notes glide along effortlessly. It's a wonderfully musical and engaging performance.

There's a great deal of detail on board, and the Q Acoustics stay poised and in control even when pushed. The midrange is richly detailed, and there's plenty of attack, too. They do sacrifice a bit of aggression and transparency in favour of that smooth character, with whining electric guitars and bass notes rounded off a touch. The Ruark MRIs, in comparison, don't hold back: they're a bit more revealing and articulate when it comes to digging up subtle detail. But that doesn't take away from just how easygoing and enjoyable the Q Acoustics are to listen to in the long run.

Premium feel

Build quality is excellent. The cabinets are sturdy, reassuringly hefty and have a premium feel to them thanks, in part, to the smart matt finish, available in 'jet black', 'juice red' or 'urban white'.

You'll feel the need to clear space for the Q Acoustics, but these speakers aren't fussy with positioning. Connection options are numerous, too: along with Bluetooth streaming, there are optical, RCA and 3.5mm inputs on the back of the master speaker, plus an output for a powered subwoofer.

While the Philips and Roth speakers in this test have added extras (a USB charging port would have been nice here), the Q Acoustics remain a versatile pair of powered speakers. Use them as a TV soundbar alternative, or a replacement for your old dock system. Hook them up to your games console, or give them pride of place on your desk to play your laptop-based tunes - you can fit them into just about any system.

The wafer-thin remote control is neatly laid out and easy to use, with a single source button cycling through all the inputs. The speaker automatically goes into pairing mode when Bluetooth is selected; the LED on the right speaker helpfully blinks green (analogue), white (optical) or blue (Bluetooth).

Amid rival speakers flaunting their features to get noticed, the Q-BT3s remain assuredly near the top of the class. Their feature-rich package and smart looks are attractive, and their sound doesn't let the side down. They're not perfect, but they deliver the kind of all-round smooth, composed, detailed performance we could listen to for days.

Size matters

Desktop speakers? Possibly, but you'll need a pretty big desk. Wherever you put them, their high-gloss finish – in black, red or white – is sure to make an impression

Hot

When we reviewed these Roth speakers last year, we liked how undemanding they were to listen to. Since then, the OLi POWA-5s have been upgraded to include aptX coding for better-quality Bluetooth streams.

New and improved

Has it made a difference? Definitely. Where the previous version was rather boomy and in need of more refinement, the updated pair deliver a cleaner, more agile performance. It's an altogether more grown-up sound, with a decent amount of detail - plus the solid, chunky character that we liked still in place. The Roths happily charge along, delivering a huge-scale and airy sound powered by a respectable 80W class AB amplifier.

They've got a bit more bite and kick to them now. The treble shines without any harsh edges, but can stick out somewhat. You might be tempted to tone it down using the remote's tonal controls, but don't - that just dulls it down, robbing these speakers of their newfound excitement. While they're no longer as boomy as before, we'd still advise giving the Roths plenty of space to breathe.

Voices are strong (and pushed a little forward), but a little more clarity and subtlety would fully flesh out the emotion and attitude in vocals.

There's a hint of brashness going hand in hand with the Roth's new upbeat



The POWA-5s sound bigger than any other speakers on test here, but the Q Acoustics Q-BT3s are more composed and balanced, and the Ruark MR1s more nuanced and tightly controlled.

Not just a pretty fascia

The Roths are every bit as chunky and solidly built as before, although the fascia has been smartened up with a circular disc for the LED display. We do wish the cheap-feeling volume control had been redesigned as well - it's at odds with the rest of the quality finish.

Given their size (27 x 18 x 21cm), we would advise putting the Roths on stands for a cleaner, more organised sound. Prop them next to your TV and they're a decent alternative to the thin sound that plagues most flatscreen TVs.

These are among the most wellconnected wireless speakers we've come across (although the Philips Fidelio E2s and their HDMI input are giving everyone in this test a run for their money). Alongside the Bluetooth connection, the Roths offer two pairs of optical inputs (for connecting TV and laptop), a pair of RCA line inputs, a 3.5mm input, and a subwoofer output. Twin USB charging ports is generous.

The small, plastic remote control is crowded with buttons and controls, but it's straightforward enough to use.

We're glad the OLi POWA-5s were given a second chance to spread their wings. The pleasant performance is bolstered by a more upbeat, snappier and exciting sonic upgrade, and their varied connectivity is enviable, particularly for just £250

The Roth OLi Powa-5s are not quite as nimble as the Audio Pro Addon T8s, nor as precise and detailed as the little Ruarks, but if you like the look of them, we'd recommend an audition.

You can buy the MR1s with a lacquer finish in black or white, but we think there's something special about the beautifully crafted walnut option



Throughout this Supertest we've

encountered speakers that sound bigger than these Ruarks, more open, smoother or richer, or that offer more versatile features. But none of them deliver the depth of subtlety or the astonishingly revealing, powerful sound of the MR1s.

Digging for detail

The amount of detail unearthed by the Ruarks is staggering. Take the way voices are delivered; you can hear every detail, every intake of breath, the raspy edges and warbling power chords - it's startlingly intimate and raw, as if the artist were singing in the room with you.

The vocals are seamlessly integrated with the rest of the musical arrangement. Instruments are precisely placed in an immersive (if not particularly spacious) soundfield. The Ruarks may not be as large-scale as the Roths or as elegant as the Q Acoustics, but they're more dynamically subtle. Play Sbtrkt's *Wildfire* and there's plenty of space left over even after the treble has reached its clear highs, and that gorgeously squelchy bassline goes incredibly deep and is full of rich texture - it's a thoroughly satisfying sound.

The Ruarks have a strong hold on rhythm: they're agile, punchy and the edges of notes stop and start with precision. The Dead Weather's 60 Feet Tall is a stern test of any system, but the

Ruarks convey the brooding tone, the build up of tension, and the space between instruments with confidence and ease. There's controlled power coursing through the Ruark's veins, too, as Rage Against the Machine's *Killing In The Name Of* clearly shows.

The beautifully crafted wooden enclosures are the ideal desktop size, and will easily fit into most small or cluttered spaces. We'd suggest placing them close to a wall to add more weight and punch to the bass.

The radio-like power and volume dial on top of the right speaker is another great design touch. The volume changes are subtle and instant, and a press on the dial initiates Bluetooth pairing mode (or you can use the slim remote control). Connection is swift and stable.

If you're after multiple connections, you're going to have to look elsewhere. The Ruark MRIs operate solely by Bluetooth (with the popular aptX codec for higher-quality streaming), and a 3.5mm input. And that's it.

To its credit, you can connect various audio sources, such as an MP3 player, laptop and even a TV, to that single analogue input. But it's not as convenient as having dedicated RCA or optical inputs, as you'll need to invest in separate cables and adapters.

There is a subwoofer output, although we find the Ruarks talented enough in the bass department. You can also turn the MR1s into a portable wireless system by adding a £50 battery pack.

If we were to compare features and connections across the board, the Ruark MRIs would come up short. But we're not hankering after extra inputs, not when these speakers sound so capable and detailed using just Bluetooth and an Apple iPhone 5.

Despite the presence of more versatile and large-scale speakers in this test, we keep coming back to these Ruarks. Every song we listen to just sounds more exciting, more detailed and interesting through the MR1s. In terms of pure sound performance, they're sublime.

detail that's good enough to see off the best of a talented bunch

f there's one thing we've learned from this supertest, it's that these wireless stereo speakers are a multi-talented bunch.

They're not merely content to sit as desktop speakers; they're now moving into your TV room and flaunting their skills as soundbar replacements. Or they're lounging in your garden or kitchen, ready for whenever you want to stream some tunes. There are speakers here that are seriously impressive in the sonic department, and wouldn't look out of place as the centrepiece of your hi-fi system.

With multiple connections finding their way into these solidly built (some stylishly so) speakers, there's a world of possibilities for using these versatile boxes.

Versatility, size, build quality and range of features are all under scrutiny here, but it was pure sound quality that won out in the end.

It's those Ruark MR1s. They won our Best Desktop Speaker Award last year, and it looks like they may just hold on to that title for yet another year. No other speakers here come close to the depth of detail, dynamics, or sheer raw vocal talent that the Ruarks deliver - and do so with such power, grace and confidence. Admittedly, they're feature-light, but we reckon that's an acceptable price to pay for that gorgeous finish and hi-fi-grade sound.

Close, but no cigar

The Q Acoustics Q-BT3s came close to taking the win. With their smart-looking finish, good spread of connections and clean, smooth detail, they have pretty much every box ticked. They define 'easy listening', but the Ruarks edge forward with a punchier, more faithful and captivating listen.

The easy-going - and good-looking - Philips Fidelio E2s have the distinction of being the only speakers here with an HDMI input, and the surround-sound option clearly points to its TV and AV intentions. A little more pep and snap would have them worrying the Ruarks. The updated Roth OLi POWA-5s sound leaner, tighter, and more exciting than before; a touch more refinement would work wonders. They're the biggest speakers here - in size and sound - and are more suited to being placed on stands rather than on a desk.

At the other end of the scale, the tiny Audio Pro Addon T8s are full of energy and sparkle, and just a layer of insight away from worrying the Ruarks.

With their compact, portable design and multiroom streaming features, we were excited to put the Pure Jongo S3s in a stereo set-up. It wasn't quite the effusive performance we were expecting, though. They sound integrated and expansive, yet not as clear and concise as a solo S3.

Bringing up the rear are the Blue Aura X30s. They're similar in size and style to the Audio Pros, but lack the sonic grades needed to pass that three-star barrier.

This is a diverse collection of speakers, but when you've got £300 to spend and sound quality is a top priority, the Ruark MR1s get our vote every time.





Transfer windows

rom phones and laptops, to CD players and streamers, DACs are everywhere - but the job they do isn't always quite up to scratch. Opting for a dedicated external DAC, at a level to suit your system, is a good way of getting the most from your music, from low sample rates all the way up to high-resolution tracks. They come in all shapes and sizes, with some including extras such as headphone stages and wireless connectivity. We consider four contenders in a similar price range to see which one comes top of the pile.

ARCAMairDAC **£400**

It's fair to say Arcam has put its airDAC in a rather tricky position. At £400, it comes in at the same price as the company's excellent five-star irDAC - but compare the two and, well, the irDAC wins every time in terms of pure audio prowess.

However, the airDAC's big selling point is right there in its name - it offers Apple's AirPlay technology, bringing wireless connectivity to your system in a simple one-box solution. Set-up is reasonably pain-free, and requires you either to hardwire the airDAC directly via ethernet, or access a simple web interface. Step-by-step instructions show how to register it on your network.

Access Point Mode

For real ease, you can also choose the 'Access Point Mode' and hook up to the airDAC by finding it in the list of available wireless networks on your desired output device. Just make sure the music you play is offline, as you can't surf the web at the same time.

There's one seemingly glaring omission on the connections front: a USB input. It seems a little naïve of Arcam to assume that this can be replaced by wireless connectivity, when we've all dealt with the frustrations of flaky signal and stop-start music. Wired connectivity is covered instead by just single coaxial and optical digital ins, with outputs including both analogue and digital outs.

All inputs are capable of playing lossless files of up to 24bit/96kHz, and music streamed in Access Point Mode can hit this quality too. AirPlay, on the other hand, currently limits its file playback to a maximum of 16bit/48kHz.

Something to consider

This means you are limited in terms of the level of high-resolution music that you can play - something to consider for those with lots of content above 24bit/96kHz. For everyone else, the airDAC proves

to be a precise performer, offering plenty of fine detail from top to bottom.

Throw a big orchestral track at it, like *Harvey Two-Face* from the *Dark Knight* OST, and you'll hear every single instrument, nicely placed and well

integrated, with a level of detail, texture and depth that you just don't hear if you listen to the source alone.

It could do better with timing and handling of dynamics, but there's little to complain about with presentation. It puts weight behind the rumbling bassline of Run the Jewels' self-titled track, and it prevents the cymbals in Florence and the Machine's *Rabbit Heart* (Raise it Up) from sounding harsh. Choose to stream and you will lose a layer of subtlety and detail, however.

The airDAC is good, but falls short of greatness because of a couple of obvious oversights. If wireless streaming is important to you, this is one to consider. If not, there are better options out there.

DENON DA-300USB **£330**



Denon is no stranger to the world of hi-fi, but the DA-300USB is its first crack at the affordable DAC market.

At £330, the DA-300USB undercuts a lot of rivals at this level, and with a spec list that means it's equally at home on a desktop as it is as part of a larger system.

Although a largely plastic

construction, the DA-300USB feels solid and well made. Denon has thoughtfully included a stand that allows horizontal or vertical placement for those short on space, with its OLED display adjusting automatically for each position.

Lack of cables

Perhaps not so thoughtful is its lack of bundled cables - you get a pair of RCA leads for connecting to an amp or CD player, but you'll need your own for the rear-mounted asynchronous USB-B socket, one coaxial in and two optical digital inputs. On the front you'll find a 6.3mm headphone socket and volume control, doubling up the DA-300USB as a headphone amp as well as a more traditional DAC. It's here that you'll

select your source too, by tapping a touch-sensitive icon. The bright OLED display will then show the source selected and the music bitrate.

All inputs can handle all files up to 24-bit/192kHz and support both PCM and DSD files natively. The DA-300USB uses the same Advanced AL32 signal processing and digital-to-analogue conversion found in Denon's top-of-therange CD/SACD players.

Squeezing such high-end tech into a device at this price is admirable and shows in its performance, which is assured and well balanced. Play Angels by The xx through our reference system via coaxial and the wonderfully stripped-back production is handled beautifully, with the vocals front and centre. full of expression and emotion.

The DA-300USB is on the relaxed side in its character though, meaning it can lack the impact and edge needed for more lively tracks. Timing can feel off compared to the best, and bass kicks are on the soft side. Play *Elephants* by Them Crooked Vultures and the aggressive guitar riff doesn't have the same feeling

of grit to it, while the drums that underpin it lack punch. If your music is of a heavy sort, there are better options.

Similar character

We found all inputs to have a similar character, including the headphone stage, which worked wonders in bringing new levels of detail to our Spotify collection. Don't forget you'll need an adapter if your headphones feature the standard 3.5mm jack though.

The Denon DA-300USB is an easyto-listen-to DAC offering detail and a good selection of inputs for the majority of setups. But it won't be for everyone. The softness in the bass and the timing issues means can't make five stars.

MYRYAD Z20 £395



Understated in its design, there's no flashiness here: a simple line of LEDs shows what's playing and its sample rate, alongside two physical buttons for power and source selection.

'Simple and functional' is all well and good - design-led kit isn't for everyone - but the Z2O's sound is similarly plain, and failed to leave a lasting impression on us during testing.

No headphone socket

There are three inputs, one each of optical, coaxial and asynchronous USB-B, each capable of 24-bit/192kHz. There are also two sets of standard RCA line outs, but no headphone socket for desktop use. Also mounted on the back is an input and output for Myryad's 'My Link' system - a communications bus allowing you to link other Myryad kit so they'll operate together. We hook up a MacBook Pro via USB and play Lorde's debut album at 24-bit/48kHz. Playing *Tennis Court* demonstrates a clean and detailed character, with direct vocals, and a tonally neutral presentation.

However, the unforgiving metronomelike beat punctuating the verses shows up the Z2O's less-than-perfect timing, particularly when compared with the beautifully rhythmic NAD D 1050.

Dynamically it's not as subtle as the NAD either, failing to demonstrate the changes in tempo between the verses and chorus quite as adeptly, and there's just not the same punch.

The major problem with the Myryad is everything it does is 'just okay'; there are no serious grumbles of note, but no flashes of brilliance either. This is most obvious when you compare it with any of its testmates and realise how good it could be. We tested its performance via the other inputs too and found it to be largely the same: when connected to our reference £12k Naim NDS streamer via coaxial, it didn't sound much different to our MacBook Pro over USB. Better DACs would show more difference between these sources. The Myryad is out of its league a little.

Levels we'd expect

While it performs adequately and offers a well-balanced and ultimately inoffensive sound, it doesn't push sound quality to the levels we'd hope for. Nor does it provide anything extra, like a headphone stage or wireless connectivity, to help its cause.

Existing Myryad owners may well consider adding the Z20 to their system because of its ability to communicate easily with other kit but, for us, it doesn't do enough to stand out from the increasingly competitive crowd.

The NAD D 1050 comes from a very talented family, and this model is happily maintaining that prestigious reputation. Earning a five-star review late last year, the NAD D 1050 came into this test faced with new competition, and has still shown the rest of them how it should be done.

The D 1050 certainly looks distinctive. Designed to be placed upright, with the none-too-subtle volume control protruding from the top, it could divide opinion if judged on looks alone. But one listen to it and you'll remember what really matters here.

Instantly drawn

Play music through any of the inputs and you won't be left wanting, with twin pairs of coaxial and optical inputs and an asynchronous USB-B socket to choose from - you'll instantly be drawn in to the NAD's engaging manner. It's a fluid yet focused listen, with a superb sense of positioning and organisation.

Play something that requires a bit of oomph, and the D 1050 isn't shy about showing what it's made of. The hefty

bassline of Kanye West's *Black Skinhead* is delivered with plenty of punch and weight, and offers a serious feeling of attack and excitement.

There's a touch of low-end emphasis here (which only adds to an enjoyably rich, full sound) and a great sense of scale too - it makes some of its test competition feel lightweight in comparison. The treble is well handled too, with cymbal crashes crisp and precise, without being harsh or sharp.

While the D 1050 does big, showy pieces well, it also shows a wonderful way with more intimate, simpler tracks. Play Kate Bush's *Among Angels* and the level of detail and subtlety the D 1050 picks out is fantastic. Piano notes have depth and texture, and you feel every wavering note of the expressive vocal.

As for sample-rate support, the D 1050 is capable of up to 24-bit/96kHz via the optical sockets and up to 24-bit/192kHz through the coaxial and USB.

Outputs are available in the form of balanced XLR outputs and standard RCA sockets, while on the front there is a 3.5mm headphone jack for using the NAD as a headphone amp too. Plug in your choice of cans here and the D 1050 brings a similar class to its headphone stage: stacks of detail, a wonderfully warm bassline and a thoroughly listenable presentation that stays true to the original recording.

Seriously capable

The NAD D 1050 is a seriously capable DAC at this price, and plays the skilful veteran in the company of not-quitethere newbies. There may be others out there that could get the better of it for out-and-out precision, but the competition in this test don't come close. The NAD D 1050 is a serious operator flying the brand flag with flair.

The distinctive **NAD D 1050** may be the veteran of the test but it shows the new kids on the block how to do it with its full-bodied sound, unique design and superb connectivity

AD'S D 1050 wins our test because it has all the things that we think are important in a DAC at this price range. It offers superb sound quality first and foremost, with its rhythmic, detailed and full-bodied performance markedly better than its testmates. It's good on the basics too.

The D 1050 has a great selection of inputs and outputs, the ability to handle any sample rate and a headphone stage, which is a nice bonus.

Denon includes a headphone stage on its DA-300USB too, and it looks the part: it's a headphone amp you'd want on your desk, and its versatile placement is a nice touch. Format fans will also be happy with its support for PCM and DSD files - and at a price that undercuts every other DAC on test. However, performance-wise, it fell just short - we would have liked more punch and attack, plus better timing.

Joining the Denon on four stars is the Arcam airDAC. While Arcam is to be applauded for bringing wireless connectivity to a DAC at this price, it has come at a cost. Inputs are limited to 24-bit/96kHz and the lack of a USB input is a big oversight for this market. Sound could have been better too, particularly when we know what Arcam can produce from the excellent (and same-price) irDAC. While precise and detailed, it lacked dynamic subtlety.

Completing the test was the Myryad Z20 at three stars, dropping marks for its far-from-remarkable sound quality. While it made no mistakes in its tonal balance or overall presentation, in comparison to the competition we found ourselves wanting more from it.



Amazon Prime Instant Video

Subscribe from £5.99 a month/On demand £13.99 \star \star \star \star \star

Amazon. LoveFilm. Prime. Instant. Prime Instant. Video. No, we've not lost the plot - it's just hard to keep up with these two brands and their baffling rebranding exercises.

These days, Amazon owns LoveFilm. The service formerly known as LoveFilm Instant is now Amazon Prime Instant Video, and £5.99 gets you unlimited streaming of its film and TV catalogue.

Something of a maze

There are a number of price options (see panel) for the service, although they are something of a maze - it took us an hour to work through the various options.

And this is before we even came to Amazon Instant Video: the on-demand purchase and rental part of the website, streaming the newest and best goodies not included in Prime.

Confused yet? We are. Amazon doesn't seem to have decided what it wants to do. Visit the website and you'll find 'Instant Video' in the same list as Gardening and Groceries; hardly accessible. It's a pity, because once you get past the confusion, Amazon Prime Instant Video is pretty good.

The film selection is one of the best in UK subscription services. The site boasts

2107 titles. That's good, not great, but it has quality. The range of genres is wide, with a nice split of old and recent. Some titles hit Blu-ray six months ago.

No premier titles

The TV offering isn't as strong. Amazon Studios has started producing its own content (*Alpha House, Bosch*), but it has some way to go before it can catch up to Netflix's original offerings. Elsewhere, there's a decent number of popular shows (*Sherlock, Castle, Parks & Recreation*) but no premier titles like *Breaking Bad* or *Game of Thrones*.

The best and latest content is reserved for purchase or rental only, outside the Prime catalogue, at the average prices. A new film in HD costs £13.99, or a TV series for £24.99. They do vary depending on age: *The Amazing Spider-Man* (2012) is £6.99 in HD.

The streaming quality is excellent. Amazon offers a video resolution of up to 1080p as well as Dolby Digital 5.1 surround sound where possible. One account can stream to two devices at the same time, with each video limited to one device at a time. The same twodevice deal applies to downloads of purchases, or one device for rentals.



Price Options Annual £79 package gives you one year of instant video, plus speedy delivery and Kindle book rentals. **Prime** £5.99 per month gives you unlimited streaming of the Prime Instant video catalogue. On demand TV series and movies can be purchased for up to £13.99 per HD film.

LoveFilm by post. Unlimited DVDs and Blu-rays (two at a time) for £7.99 per month.

Compatibility

The service runs on most computers and all current and last-gen game consoles, as well as select TVs and Blu-ray players from LG, Samsung and Sony. Amazon Prime Instant Video also runs on Kindle Fire devices and iOS, although iPad video quality is not great. No Android support is disappointing.

Overall, we like Amazon Prime Instant Video. Sure, there are issues: the services, pricing and branding needs to be simplified. The iPad app needs fixing, and there really needs to be Android support. But these are small quibbles, easily outweighed by everything else. We like the video quality and the catalogue of films, and the TV offering is only going to get better.

For the money it's a tempting proposition, especially when you get a free one-month trial. There is no excuse not to try it.



Blinkbox Movies

Blinkbox is the on-demand video service from Tesco - one of the last things we'd expect from a supermarket megabrand, but it's pretty good and does the job. Blinkbox offers some of the latest releases, including some titles that have yet to be released on disc.

No monthly contract

The deal here is simple: no contract, no monthly ties. You pay for what you rent or buy. Rentals are yours for 30 days, and you have 48 hours to finish anything you start. Purchases are stored in your Blinkbox digital locker, and you get to keep them 'forever'.

Prices are the norm for on-demand services (see panel). For TV series it's a bit more unpredictable because of the varying running times and number of episodes. Individual episodes tend to be £2.49 in HD and £1.89 in SD. We've seen HD box sets priced at £25, but the final season of Breaking Bad was £17.99.

As an offshoot of Tesco, there are benefits for Clubcard holders. You get one point for every £1 you spend, and there are exclusive offers including discounted (or even free) content. Choice is excellent, particularly when it comes to the latest releases. Films are

available on the same day as the Blu-ray and DVD - some times even earlier. We've spotted films online two weeks before their disc debut. That's months before they are likely to appear on any other subscription service.

Variety

The TV series offering is almost as good - not in quantity but in variety. You'll find older BBC and ITV titles along with some of the latest from Sky and HBO, including all of Boardwalk Empire and *Game of Thrones.*

You will be able to use the service on an impressive number of platforms: computers, Xbox 360, PS3, and select Blu-ray players and TVs from Samsung, LG, Philips and Toshiba. There are tablet apps on Android, iOS and even Windows. No smartphones. however.

Downloads are only available on PC, so you'll have to stream on all other formats. One account can register up to five platforms at a time - try to register a sixth and you'll be invited to ditch one of the others. You can do this three times in 90 days. Each purchase can only be watched on one device at a time.

Mostly good so far, but Blinkbox loses

video resolution is only up to 720p, and sound is in stereo. It looks good enough not to distract, although it is softer than a 1080p feed from Google Play. And to make things worse, you only get 720p on computers and Xbox - it's standard definition everywhere else.

Overall, it's a strong effort. We like the catalogue. We like the interface. The platform support is impressive. It's the video quality and lack of mobile support stopping us from awarding the five stars. However, if your priority is getting latest releases, you will be perfectly happy.

Google Play

On demand $\star \star \star \star \star$

The Google Play store is a one-stop shop for apps, games, books, music - and of course video too. Google has a finger in every technological pie we can think of, so it's no surprise it also provides films and TV programmes. Well-equipped and effectively organised, this is a legitimate alternative to buying Blu-rays and DVDs.

No monthly obligation

It's a straight-up, on-demand service, so there's no monthly obligation. You buy or rent films and TV shows when you want. Purchases are kept in your account 'forever', while rentals expire in 30 days (or 48 hours once you begin watching).

The library is pretty good. Recent films releases are available on the same day as Blu-rays and DVDs and there are a healthy number of older titles too. The same can be said of TV series: *Girls* Season 3 was out before the DVD/Blu-ray release. There's also lots of old content from BBC, Channel 4, Sky and HBO.

We're quite happy with the number of devices supported by Google Play: PCs and Mac computers are included, though we wouldn't really expect otherwise. It forms the heart of every Android device (phones as well as tablets), so you won't have any issues there. It may be surprising to find a Google presence on iOS devices, but it's true. Google Play movies worked fine on our iPad Air. The caveat: the iOS app has no shopfront and only handles playback. Still, it's a comfort to know you can switch systems without ditching your purchases. At present, Google Play doesn't feature on smart TVs or games consoles. If you want to use a TV, the Google Chromecast streaming stick will see you right. Or you can hook up an HDMI cable, if your device allows it.

Offline viewing

Content can be downloaded for offline viewing on Android devices. Google recommends doing this for optimum quality, as 3G/4G data or wi-fi can cause the occasional stutter. Purchases have a five-device download limit, while rentals are restricted to one. Video resolution goes up to 1080p, and audio up to 5.1 surround sound. Only one in 10 of the films we flicked through offered 5.1 - the rest were stereo, so there's room for improvement in this department.

Specifications aside, the service is a joy to use. On each platform, it's easy to find your way around the neatly

Price Options HD films are available for £11.99 or £9.99 for SD, and we found plenty of discounted titles for as little as £4.99.

Rentals are £4.49 (HD) and £3.49 (SD).

TV streaming has plenty of choice, with the newest boxsets, such as the latest season of *The Big Bang Theory*, priced at £24.49. Meanwhile, *Bates Motel* Season 2 was priced at a reasonable £16.49

Compatibility

For now, there's no GooglePlay app on any smart TV or games console. But there is a simple way of getting the service: the Google Chromecast streaming stick (\pounds 30). Or, if you've got a device with the output, you can use an HDMI cable. And content can be downloaded for offline viewing on Android devices.

organised catalogue. Once you make a purchase it's automatically shelved for you, showing up on any device with your account on it. Streaming is just a matter of pressing play, or click on the little pin icon and it will download. Google has nailed cross-device sharing.

This is everything we could ask from an on-demand video service. The catalogue is well stocked and easy to use. There's support for different platforms and it's easy to download purchases for offline viewing. A little more polish is the only thing we'd ask.

Trust Apple to give you a good looking screen – it's nicely laid out and easy to sort through. We're not keen on some adverts though. 'Preorder this digital release'!? Why, are they're going to run out of downloads?

iTunes Store

On demand $\star \star \star \star \star \star$

This one needs no introduction. We all know Apple has an on-demand movie service. The iTunes Store has been at the heart of every iOS device (and Mac ones, to an extent) for so many years that it's virtually impossible to avoid. But does it have what it takes to hold off its new rivals, or is it in need of an update? We think it's a little of both.

Entertainment hub

Like Google Play, iTunes is less movie shop and more master entertainment hub. It also handles music and podcasts, but TV and movies take up a significant chunk. For what is essentially a shop, iTunes looks great. That's hardly surprising coming from Apple, but we really like way the system is laid out on desktop and portable devices. With a carousel of miniature billboards, to tiles of movie posters in various sizes, Apple has succeeded in breathing life into something inherently dull.

Then you go to use it. At this point it's less extraordinary - you get the typical neat lines (or categories) of films, and they are easy to flick through. These are occasionally interrupted by adverts suggesting you 'send iTunes gifts' or pre-order something that's months away from release. Are they going to run out of digital downloads? We understand promotions but that's a bit much.

Back catalogue

The film selection is good. New releases come out at the same time (or before) they hit DVD. As for back catalogue, you'll find titles going back to the 1920s. The TV selection isn't quite so promising - with the exception of *Breaking Bad*, it's mostly older shows (*Lost, The Sopranos*) and lesser-known ones (*Fleming, Da Vinci's Demons*). There's no sign of *Game* of *Thrones* or *Boardwalk Empire*, and *Mad Men* is available only up to season four of a possible six.

What Apple does have is iTunes Extras, which works similarly to the bonus menu of a DVD. You get special features such as interviews and documentaries. This is available only on selected titles, though.

Video resolution goes up to 1080p. Here we'd advise checking your settings, because they may be set to 720p by default. Meanwhile the sound quality goes up to Dolby Digital 5.1.

Apple is known for its locked-down approach, and we're not surprised that it applies to iTunes. Your video is available

What Apple does have is iTunes Extras, which

This is only available on selected titles, though

works similarly to the bonus menu on a DVD.

Price Options On demand iTunes' offering is strictly ondemand: no monthly payments, no subscription. Film prices are the norm for new stuff: £13.99 for an HD film. £9.99 for SD. Rentals are £4.49 for HD and £3.49 for SD. while there are also film bundles to buy. **TV shows** tend to be £2.49 (HD) and £1.89 (SD) per episode. Full seasons can range from £13,99 to £35, but cheaper if it's an older show.



In comparison with some, Apple is poor in this department. It's well-known for its insular approach and this applies to iTunes as much as to everything else. Video is available only on computers, iOS devices and Apple TV. The open nature of Google Play and Blinkbox feels far more 21st century in comparison.

Apple's ecosystem

Overall, we think iTunes is a good service. We like the interface and its catalogue of movies and TV shows. If you've bought into Apple's whole ecosystem, there's little reason to look elsewhere. For newcomers, however, it could be more accommodating.

Knowhow Movies

On demand ★★☆☆☆

Visit the Knowhow website and the first thing you will see is a refrigerator. 'Knowhow is all about helping you solve those annoying issues,' says the official blurb. If that doesn't sound quite like a video service, it's because Knowhow was originally conceived to provide after-sales product support for Dixonsowned Currys and PC World.

Streaming competition

At some point, Dixons decided to join the video-streaming collective, and Knowhow Movies was born. It worked for Amazon and Tesco after all - and those guys sell coconut water. Sadly, Knowhow Movies isn't really that good.

We'll start with the money. Despite being a little player in a big game, Knowhow Movies charges more than the usual on-demand service. The latest films cost a hefty £16.99 in HD, or £12.99 in SD. Rentals are £4.99 and £3.99 respectively, although there is a handful of 99p rental offers. Episodes of TV programmes cost £3.99 in HD and up to £2.99 in SD. The usual rules apply: purchases are kept in a digital locker for 'an indefinite period of time', while rentals last for 30 days (or 48 hours once you begin watching). Content is a mixed bag. There's a decent quantity and variety of films, although we'd classify these as fairly recent. With brand-new releases, Knowhow Movies keeps up with the competition in offering the necessary blockbusters. The TV side, however, is embarrassing. It consists of precisely the following: *Sherlock, Doctor Who, Ripper Street, An Idiot Abroad, Being Human, Top Gear and Red Dwarf.* That's it. Depressingly, the page is padded out with copies of the same posters.

Organisation is poor

The layout is easy enough to navigate, but organisation is poor. For example, when we think 'drama', the first films coming to mind tend not to be *Death Race: Inferno* or *Bullet to the Head*.

Theoretically the service offers 1080p resolution and Dolby Digital 5.1 surround sound. It's powered by Rovi, which uses clever DivX adaptive streaming software. The idea is to let video quality take a hit to reduce stuttering and buffering.

It's nothing new - Netflix and Amazon employ similar techniques but it does ensure smooth playback. It's a pity, then, that HD playback is limited to computers running Intel

Compatibility

The service will run on computers and some devices running iOS or Android. It is also available on some TVs and Blu-ray players from LG and Samsung, but there is nothing on games consoles as of yet. Downloads are limited to PCs, so it's streaming only on other platforms, of up to five devices at a time.

Insider. It means, despite spending a small fortune on HD movies, you may not being able to play them properly on the majority of your devices.

It's not hard to see what Dixons is trying to do. Video streaming has taken off in a big way, and it makes sense to get in on a sure-fire trend while it's on the rise. But Knowhow Movies is hideously unprepared for the fight, and has a long way to go before it proves a viable alternative to established winners. In its current state, we'd struggle to recommend this service.

This is how you do it. Netflix is a perfect example of doing the right things well. It's without doubt one of the most satisfying streaming services we've used: fuss-free and easy to love.

And it's everywhere. Netflix runs on every platform we can expect: if you want to be universally loved, you have to be universal. Netflix understands this.

Simple and clear

It also helps that the offering is simple and clear. Netflix is a subscription-only, streaming-only service. You get unlimited access to films and TV shows for £5.99 per month. This allows you to stream to two devices at the same time. And if you want to use up to four devices, it's £8.99. Simple. It's a lot less confusing than Amazon's Instant/Prime/ LoveFilm packages.

Netflix has the lion's share of TV shows when it comes to content: big hitters such as 24, *The Killing, Sherlock* and *Battlestar Galactica*. Streaming *Breaking Bad* exclusively has no doubt significantly contributed to the service's meteoric rise. But Netflix isn't content just supplying shows - it's making them too. Exclusive content like *House of Cards* and *Orange Is The New Black* are Netflix Original programmes, and more are currently being produced.

There are also a huge number of films. Netflix wouldn't specify how many, but they did say 'tens of thousands'. They're not the latest releases - Amazon has an advantage here - but it's safe to say there's more than you could ever reasonably expect to watch. The only issue is that films and TV shows sometimes disappear without warning whenever license deals expire.

Where possible, Netflix gives 5.1 surround sound and video in 1080p resolution. It's Full HD, but Netflix calls it 'Super HD', promising a higher bitrate and less compression than other Full HD streams. We can't deny the picture is sharp; it rivals Blu-ray quality.

4K is on the cards

And it's going to get better. Netflix is the only provider doing anything about 4K at the moment. We've been told that the company is ready with its 4K streaming, which will come as soon as TV manufacturers release the sets capable of handling it. Content will kick-off with *House of Cards* series two and some nature documentaries, and we've been told things will grow slowly from there.







Price Options Unlimited access to films and television programmes for £5.99 per month. This allows you to stream two devices at the same time. For more devices - up to four - Netflix charge £8.99 per month; a simple price plan.

Compatibility

Netflix runs on every platform we could reasonably expect it to: PC and Mac computers, video game consoles, Roku boxes, Google Chromecast, every big brand of smart TV, Blu-ray players from Samsung, Sony, Panasonic and LG, tablets and phones running Android, iOS... and even Windows.



Sky subscription has been a big thing for a long time, but it's never been the most accessible service. It's pricey for starters, and not everyone has access to a satellite dish. The company has had to fight harder than ever to keep customers defecting in the hunt for convenience.

Exclusive goodies

And so Now TV was born: a more affordable way to enjoy otherwise exclusive goodies, without the hassle of installation. It's a subscription-based service, with on-demand thrown in. Where Amazon and Netflix offers you a massive library, Now TV offers you 'passes' to different content (see panel).

The catalogue is an unusual beast. There are approximately 800 films, with an emphasis on more recent releases, although there are plenty of classics too. The unique selling point here is that you get the latest releases as they hit Blu-ray and DVD, long before 'regular' subscription services. *Django Unchained*, for instance, is nowhere to be seen on Netflix or Amazon Prime Instant Video.

The same applies to TV shows, only it's more enticing. Content is from major channels: Sky 1, Arts, Living and Atlantic; ABC and Comedy Central. Alongside the entirety of big hitters (24, Futurama, Modern Family) you get some of the latest shows before they're on disc. At the time of writing, True Detective was available two months early.

Sky package made easy

We also like the access to live TV - it's basically a regular Sky package made easy. Occasional licensing issues mean some programmes aren't available, but thankfully the latest *Game of Thrones* and *Mad Men* are not affected. In a way, it means you can watch similar content as people paying over £20 a month.

Time for some complaints. First off: the interface. It's attractive, but not easy to use. If a TV show doesn't happen to be on the home page carousels, you must scout around the channels.

There's a search box, but this is next-to useless. Look for 24 and you're not given the excellent thriller starring Kiefer Sutherland, but instead episode number 24 of other shows. It makes the process more of a hassle than needs be.

Then there's the quality of streams. The most you get is 720p resolution and stereo sound. And that only applies when you stream catalogue content through a TV - it's standard definition

Interface

Big pictures help it look very pretty, but try to watch more than one thing and it's trickier than we'd like. Dividing TV shows into channels is a pain for browsing, and that search box is practically useless.

everywhere else. Live TV, meanwhile, is only in SD. It's worth noting that occasionally you get Sky adverts, typically one per TV episode.

Now TV has some brilliant ideas and a few daft ones, but ultimately it offers enough to differentiate itself from the pack. You get to choose between movies and TV shows, or take both and still pay less than a regular Sky subscription. And we love the early access to some of the best content around. Sky just needs to smooth out a few edges and this may become essential viewing.



Wuaki.tv

Don't worry if you've never heard of Wuaki.tv before. It's a Spanish videostreaming provider owned by Rakuten, owner of Play.com. It offers a mix of subscription and on-demand video in the same vein as Amazon. Sadly, Wuaki. tv is nowhere near as enticing.

Pay-as-you-go

At first glance, it's a regular pay-as-yougo video shopfront. You can buy or rent the latest releases at the same time as competitors like iTunes and Google Play. These can only be streamed - there are no downloads. Prices are similar to competitors (see panel).

While browsing the small print, we noticed that rentals are available for 48 hours. Most services give you 30 days, and 48 hours to finish watching anything you've started. The small print also says purchases are yours for a measly three years. We're going to come back to this...

The other side of the service is the streaming subscription called 'Selection'. It works much like Netflix. A flat fee of £5.99 per month gets you unlimited streaming, no questions asked.

So, why would you want to subscribe to this? The Selection costs as much as

Netflix or Amazon Prime Instant Video, except it doesn't have the numbers, variety or original programming.

Films comprise mainly older titles, with one of the newest being 2010's *Toy Story 3*. There are a few classics here and there, but no exclusives. TV programmes aren't much better: Wuaki has reserved too many titles for its on-demand stock.

Video quality

Platform support is... fine (see panel). Video quality has a maximum resolution of 720p, and sound comes in stereo. But this applies only to Samsung TVs and Xbox 360. It's standard definition on everything else, even if a title has an 'HD' banner strewn across it.

The interface isn't great, either. Wuaki.tv's website is fine, if a crowded. It's the apps, though, that haven't been thoroughly thought through.

The Android app is unstable, and when it works it's a fairly basic series of lists. The iPad app looks very nice, with swiping pages that resemble a book - but it doesn't allow you buy anything, so having a large page of titles there merely titillates. You have to go elsewhere to buy a title, then go back to the iPad for viewing.

Selection is the streaming service and is similar to Netflix. A flat fee of £5.99 per month gets you unlimited access. **Small print** we noticed purchases made on Wuaki.tv are only yours for a measly three years, whereas rentals are available for only 48 hours.

Compatibility

Platform support is more limited than we'd like. It runs on PC and Mac, as well as Xbox 360, Xbox One and some TVs from Samsung, LG and Panasonic. Portable devices are less straightforward: it works fine on iPads but less well on some Android tablets. You can use the same account on up to three devices at a time.

We are very frustrated with Wuaki.tv. Considering the limited catalogue, the poor user experience and sub-standard video quality, it seems cheeky to charge the normal prices. And when we factor in the three-year limit on purchases, the service seems ridiculous. It's not a purchase - it's a glorified loan.

We find no reason to recommend this service. The same money could get you more, and better. There's a free onemonth trial of the Selection if you're desperate to give it a go. We wouldn't bother after this test.

here are two winners here, because ultimately there are two distinct categories.

We'll start with on-demand video services, which tend to be the very latest titles, timed to coincide with - or even come out earlier than- the release of Blu-ray and DVD editions.

Most expensive

First up is Dixon's Knowhow Movies. It is by far the most expensive of the lot, but despite this you don't get to watch HD content on anything besides the latest PCs. Combined with a poorly stocked and badly organised catalogue, they finish bottom of the pile.

Above them we have Blinkbox from supermarket giant Tesco. The quality could be better, but we were impressed with its library, which often has titles before the disc release. Add Clubcard benefits and a friendly interface, and it's a very likeable service.


Apple's long-established iTunes is similarly good with early releases, but its catalogue is bigger and more varied. It also boasts Full HD, 5.1 surround sound and a nice shiny layout. Only an insistence on limiting supported platforms denies it five stars.

For this reason, Google Play comes out on top. It's more open to supporting devices outside its immediate system, making it more accessible. Google's library isn't far off what Apple offers, the video quality is just as good, and titles are marginally more affordable.

Moving to subscription-based services, these tend to have films and TV shows months after disc and on-demand release - but the selling point is the unlimited access to a vast collection. Well, the best ones have a vast collection. Rakuten's Wuaki.tv doesn't. It also doesn't have great video quality, nor great platform support in HD. We like that it supports its subscription selection with the on-demand releases, but losing a purchase after three years is not cool. Significantly better than that is Now TV.

Netflix does nearly everything right: it rules supreme on TV programmes, and let's not forget strong platform support and top-class video quality, with 4K content on the horizon

Google play



Clearly in flux

Amazon Prime Instant Video is clearly in flux at the moment, but get past the identity crisis and you have unlimited access to a good catalogue. It could do with a better selection of TV shows, but the company is working on that.

Finally we get to Netflix, which does nearly everything right. It doesn't have the latest films, and some disappear every now and then, but it makes up for this with a huge library. It rules supreme on TV shows, with exclusivity to some of the biggest titles, as well as Netflix Original content. And let's not forget the strong platform support, top-tier video quality, and 4K on the horizon.



The In-betweeners

An interconnect is the crucial link between source and amplifier. Choose wisely...

Atlas Element Integra 75 £45 ★★★★

We couldn't bring you a selection of interconnects without our current, two-time Award-winner: the Element Integra. It's well-made, with sturdy, solder-free plastic plugs; Atlas claims that the lack of solder helps the music signal flow more easily through the cable.

Solid sound

And it's easy to understand why we're huge fans. These interconnects allow a punchy, solid sound. The Wireworld Luna 7 gives music a more relaxed vibe, but the Atlas gives a greater sense of determination and drive. The 75 gives music a bolder presentation, placing greater emphasis on solidity and weight, yet still sounds wonderfully balanced. The cable is also unfussy about the kit you use, making it a great all-rounder.

The Luna 7 allows detail and insight from a track to come through - it seems to capture the rhythm and vibe of Katy B's *Emotions* with greater ease than most.

AudioQuest Red River £85 ★★★★☆

=== 2 ===

AudioQuest cables are functional - and educational too. Some are named after snakes, others bridges, and this interconnect comes from a range named after rivers (there are two Red Rivers in the US: North and South). But enough of the geography lesson...

Space and dynamics

Plugged into our reference kit, there's immediately a greater sense of space and dynamics compared with budget cables such as the Wireworld Luna 7 and the Atlas Element Integra. Playing Marshmallow Attack! from Frozen's delightful OST, the AudioQuest promotes a broad soundstage and driving sound. The boldness makes for a slightly forward and at times overwhelming approach compared with others, but that's our only real criticism. The Red River doesn't have the refinement of, say, Van den Hul's the Bay C5, but what this interconnect lacks in smoothness and subtlety, it makes up for in scale and dynamic scope.

Black Rhodium Twist

£36 (1m) ★★★☆ **Twist by name**, twist by nature,

Black Rhodium's entry-level interconnect is intertwined. Why? It's claimed this helps reduce the effects of any outside electrical noise. Tape secures the individual interconnects together at either end, and it's marked to indicate which direction the audio signal should travel.

Allows a lively sound

Hooked up to our system, the Twist transmits a lively sound. Play Mombassa from the Inception OST and the Twist doesn't hesitate in conveying its energy. The drums hit hard and with force, strings sound precise and dynamic. The pace and flow of the track isn't as accurate as it could be, though, and the soundstage can become cluttered and confused. There's a slight leanness to the sound too, so we wouldn't recommend using this in bright-sounding systems. But this doesn't rule it out for fullersounding set-ups. For the money, this is a decent option.

Chord Company Cobra VEE 3 £95 ★★★★☆

____4

The Cobra VEE 3 should have enough muscle and power to re-energise even the softest- or weakest-sounding systems.

It produces a clear and detailed sound - there's a greater sense of insight when compared with the likes of Van den Hul's the Bay C5 it brings a very driven and focused feel to music.

Heart of the soundstage

The Cobra VEE 3 allows your system to lock on to the midrange and vocals of a track, thrusting them into the heart of the soundstage. Play Calvin Harris's Under Control and the vocal is front and centre. The track builds and explodes into life with a solid beat and uplifting electronica. The only downside to this forceful approach is the Cobra VEE 3 won't suit all systems - some may find it too imposing. It does allow for a great sense of timing and organisation though - you never get the feeling that the music is starting to unravel.

Ecosse Baton SE Mk2 £100 ***

First impressions of the Baton Mk2 are that the fit and finish don't match rivals such as the QED Reference Audio 40 or the Chord Company VEE 3. The Ecosse just doesn't have the feel of a £100 interconnect. But, we don't judge a cable on looks alone...

Decent amount of detail

To be fair to the Ecosse this interconnect does allow a decent amount of detail from mids and highs. During Lady Gaga's *Gypsy*, it brings insight to this footstomping track. The expressive vocal and catchy strings are dispatched with ease atop the extremely punchy beat.

But it's all a bit mid- and high-heavy for our tastes. *Gypsy's* pounding bassline lacks conviction and solidity. The lows don't delve particularly deep nor do they drive with as much conviction as the best at this money. The lack of weight and richness leaves tracks sounding cold: John Legend's *All Of Me* sounds shrill and unrefined.

QED Reference Audio 40 £85 ****

== 6 =

The Reference Audio 40 looks like a serious stereo interconnect. Build quality and feel are very reassuring - you're immediately drawn to the smart-looking 'Analoc' locking plugs. QED claims these give a higher-quality connection with your kit.

Depth and dimension

Well, the Reference Audio 40 certainly ushers through highquality sound. You are made aware of a much broader and more expansive soundstage compared with the Ecosse's Baton Mk2. Play Drake's Hold On We're Going Home and the QED interconnect brings fantastic depth and dimension. Bass notes appear to plunge deeper and there's a meaty. mature tone to music, but not at the expense of control or agility. Tunes are engaging and balanced with an impressive level of detail. Lady Gaga's Dope has texture and refinement in the piano - the interconnect really expresses the dynamics and nuances of the track.

Van den Hul The Bay C5 £85 ★★★★☆

....7 🛲

For harsh, bright-sounding systems, the Bay C5 could be an antidote. The smooth-matt jacket, surrounding the interconnect, is matched by the cable's polished, glossy take on music. Play Tom Odell's *I Know* and his vibrant piano-playing sounds rich and full of warmth, as does his vocal.

Silky richness

Thankfully, all that silky richness from the Van den Hul doesn't suffocate or stifle a system's ability to sound dynamic and exciting. There's still enough tension and drama to be drawn from *Like A Dog Chasing Cars* from the *Dark Knight* soundtrack. As a listener you're still moved and engaged by what the cable imparts.

Our only criticism is that the Bay C5 doesn't have a great grip on track timing. Even music with a simple beat - such as John Newman's *Running* - can sound confused. The different elements don't knit together, with the track seeming to trip over itself.

Wireworld Luna 7 £40 *****

In your hand the Luna 7 doesn't look overly interesting (not that we expect all interconnects to wow us with their beauty). The blue jacket and lightweight plugs seem functional enough, though, and the odds are you'll be hiding this interconnect out of sight...

Won't be out of mind

But it won't be out of mind, because the Luna 7 gives a really enjoyable and likeable sound. For an extra fiver, there's greater body and weight to music compared with the Black Rhodium Twist. Play Ellie Goulding's *Anything Could Happen* and the Luna 7 has the track marching along with a confident and controlled delivery.

There's plenty of meat in the drums and also plenty of shine and sparkle to the glistening highs. There's no brightness or sharpness to speak of from the Luna 7, and although weighty there's no suggestion that bass notes sound overblown. However, the Luna 7 is a great option at this price.



hen we first tested the Monitor Audio Silver 6 AV12 speaker package in March, we caused a stir by saying it could trouble our current Award-winning KEF R100 5.1. So it was only a matter of time before the two met on shared turf. After all, Awards season is fast approaching. This test pits the two alongside newcomers from Tannoy, Dali and Acoustic Energy. Read on to see which system rules supreme...



ACOUSTIC ENERGY 3-SERIES 5.1 £2425

We were more than happy to welcome back Acoustic Energy's 301 standmounts just months after they left our test rooms with an admirable five stars. This time they're joined by a 307 centre speaker (£350), 308 subwoofer (£800) and a pair of 305 floorstanders (£1000). Together, the ensemble is better known as the 3-Series 5.1 package, and will save you £150 on the price of the separates if bought as a whole.

The 3-Series marked the start of a new era for Acoustic Energy in 2012, bringing contemporary design to its wellestablished technology. Stylish yet simple, the package's six speakers have sturdy, well-built cabinets in keeping with the price. The glossy white finish of our review sample looks and feels somewhere along the frontline for optimal co-operation with the speakers. The 308 sealed sub houses a downwardfiring 30cm pulp-fibre driver and is powered by a 500W amplifier.

We start with *Skyfall's* pre-titles train chase on Blu-ray and the pulsating soundtrack is absorbing; there's plenty of realism as the train travels underneath tunnels. Punches are, well, punchy, and ample detail means subtleties are clear too. The sub is a gutsy performer: there's sufficient rumble when Bond plunges into water and explosions sound as devastating as they look.

AE has worked hard to voice-match the front three performers, and the results are terrific. Articulate, clear and direct - and dialogue blends in well too.

polished (black gloss is available too). The front is clean, with nuts and bolts fixed through the back panel and magnetic grilles ensuring the cabinets are immaculate too: no ugly fascia holes here. At the base of the five speakers are front slot-ports, to control air turbulence and allow for flexible placement against a back wall.

Anodized for rigidity and damping

Higher up the baffles you'll find the 11cm spun-aluminium driver, anodized for rigidity and improved damping. A 28mm fabric-dome tweeter is consistent across the range too. The 305 floorstanders up front are three-way speakers, using twinned bass drivers. Their sloped baffle - found in the company's latest entry-level 1-Series tower too - is designed to help better time-align the frequencies. Around the back are single speaker terminals, so there's no bi-wiring - a feature across the entire range.

Taking centre stage between the towers, the 307 is a nicely compact speaker with twin drivers sandwiching the tweeter. The 301s are your backseat drivers. They're standard standmounters so don't have the slim build and easy wall-mounting potential of others. This means you have to budget for stands (and one for the centre speaker too).

While the guidelines for placing your subwoofer are less rigid, it should sit

The package traces every shot, and unity across the frontline and between the front and back eliminate any holes in the soundfield. Lacklustre dynamics is what taints this package however; they are okay, but just lack a touch of drama and impact. We play a CD (Macklemore & Lewis's *The Heist* album) and again the dynamics disappoint. Tonal balance is good, while precision and stereo imaging are solid enough.

We're impressed by the 3-Series, though the slightly restrained dynamics of this package cost them a star. But if you want elegant, well-built surround sound with precision and authoritative bass, these are well worth considering.

DALI IKON 5 MK2 £2500

Dali has a fine reputation to uphold when it comes to speaker packages. You only have to look up 'Dali' under 'Speaker Packages' on *whathifi.com* to find its Award-winners. So can the Ikon 5 MK2 follow suit? The pressure is on.

A pair of 5 MK2 floorstanders are up front with a Vokal MK2 centre speaker and Sub MK2 subwoofer. A pair of On-wall MK2s complete the package as your surround channels. Dali's signature hybrid tweeter array - years in the making and inherited from its high-end speaker designs - has been a labour of love for the Danish manufacturer, and also features in the Ikon 5 MK2 range. The tweeter configuration is made up of a 28mm soft-dome tweeter and a 17 x 45mm ribbon tweeter, the latter designed for - as Dali says - the 'super-high' frequencies. They give a smooth and wide horizontal dispersion.

The tweeters are similar right across the range, differing only in the smaller speakers (rear and centre) by the magnet used. Red-coloured 13cm wood-fibre mid/bass drivers tackle the lower frequencies. In the rear On-wall MK2's case, it's a slightly enlarged 16.5cm.

Each speaker has a dual-layer baffle bonded with vibration-dampening adhesive for extra stability and solidity. Black grilles sit atop to match, but beware - they prove easy to dislodge.

We test a black-ash vinyl-wrapped set (it also comes in light walnut) and the red-on-black contrast is striking. The Ikons look mechanical, with a clutter of

screws on show, and the cabinet's sharp edges don't fit its price tag. The best packages - and some cheaper ones - are finished more impressively than these Dalis.

Aesthetes may find satisfaction in the premium gloss-white finish, however - but that will set you back an extra £300.

The Dali is a modest-sized package if space is tight. The floorstanders are short and slim, and the rear speakers which are relatively flat and about the size of a large encyclopaedia - simply require a hook on your wall. The centre speaker is unobtrusive too, but will need a quality support to sit on.

A monster subwoofer

The sub may be trickier to place. It's huge. It has a front-firing 30cm long-stroke woofer and is powered by a 325W amp.

All the speakers should be spiked for best performance, while the supplied toolbox is useful when mounting the wall speakers.

Toying with placement won't hurt. We found best integration across the front line came when the floorstanders are no more than a metre or so either side of the centre. The sub should also be within close proximity to them. It's the only part that lets the team down really - it's just a bit underwhelming.

Yet there's still plenty here to impress us, performance-wise, here. The *Fast & Furious 6* Blu-ray car chases are exciting: dynamics are agile and responsive, and sound effects are sharp. The Dali package unearths detail and has a cohesive sound that places you at the centre of the action. Integration between the speakers is first-rate too.

We finish the test with music - Michael Jackson's *The Way You Make Me Feel* - and rhythmically there's punch and timing, while the vocals are very clear too.

There aren't many speaker packages out there as exciting as this one - it will transform your movies and music. But a combination of the cheap-looking build and a below-par sub denies the Dali Ikon 5 MK2 that fifth star.

KEF R100 5.1 £2850 *****

KEF R100s are the reigning heavyweight champions - our current Award-winners - and they have no intention of giving up their title, despite some fierce rivalry from Monitor Audio.

So what's what? The KEF R100 5.1 is made up of two pairs of R100 standmounters at the corners, a R200c centre channel and R400b subwoofer.

The absence of floorstanders in the set-up will delight those with limited space, although it means the possibility of forking out roughly £200 per pair of stands.

KEF's hallmark Uni-Q drivers are at the heart of the speakers - the offbeat configuration comprises a 25mm aluminium dome tweeter sat at the centre of a 13cm aluminium allov mid/

the Moon Blu-ray and the scale is astonishing - especially considering their size. The system isn't fussy either: the cacophonous score and soundeffects perform with plenty of breathing space. We became totally absorbed in a normally unlikeable film.

All five speakers work together to create a unified soundfield - the film's sounds are dense, but the package handles the speed and immediacy of crossfire well, keeping tone consistent.

There are impressive dynamics too: hovercrafts move with definition and precision. Every sound has muscle.

The R100 5.1 has stacks of detail as well: glass splinters clearly and parachutes ruffle in the wind; a lesser system would lose such subtleties.

All five speakers work to create a unified soundfield. Transformers' sounds are dense. but the KEF handles the speed and immediacy of crossfire well, keeping tone consistent

bass driver. The Uni-Q's main strengths are that it delivers more consistent dispersion than traditional driver layouts and helps overall driver integration too. This latest iteration borrows from the company's high-end Blade design and features an improved waveguide over the tweeter and creases on the mid/bass (for improved rigidity) to push performance even further.

Resembling car alloys

With drive units resembling car alloys, the R100s have a slick, bold design and the quality finish you'd expect for the price. Coated with just as attractive highgloss piano white or black, rosewood or walnut veneers, the cabinets are sturdy. It's a clean design too, with magnetic grilles meaning no need for unattractive fascia holes. It seems KEF has thought of everything: you find terminals at the rear of the speaker with screws to link/ unlink for single- or bi-wiring.

The centre speaker is a three-way design with the Uni-Q tweeter/driver sandwiched between twin 13cm bass drivers. The subwoofer has two side-firing 23cm drivers powered by twin 250W Class D amps. The R100s may have dropped a fifth star recently in a stereo speakers Group Test (after being outpointed by B&W's new 683s) but they still work terrifically in a surround sound setting. We play Transformers: Dark of

The centre speaker ties it all together, conveying the authority and texture of Optimus Prime's voice with superb focus, while the sub keeps up its end too.

Switching to music, with Stevie Wonder's Live At Last concert Blu-ray, the KEF is inspirational: again the centre speaker conveys the vocals with style, while the surround channels deliver atmosphere from the crowd without drowning out the on-stage ensemble.

We've said it before and we'll say it again: this is an impressive speaker package. Whether it's for movies or music, watching films as diverse as *The* Notebook or The Transporter, this piece of kit is worth every penny.

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MONITOR AUDIO SILVER 6 AV12 £2875

This is a hugely talented speaker package. We've known that ever since it came out of a *First Test* earlier this year clutching a glowing report. Now, though, we have the chance to see just how much it can trouble our current Award-winning KEF R100 package.

Strapping build complements sleek-looking cabinets across the package, which comprises a pair of FX surrounds (£500), Silver centre (£375) and W12 subwoofer (£1000), headed by a pair of Silver 6 floorstanders (£1000). It can be yours in a range of finishes, including black or natural oak, walnut, rosenut, or glossy black or white lacquers.

The company takes pride in appearance, and we can't fault the handiwork that's gone into the 6 AV12. orchestrations are given a big stage to perform on. Unfazed by the demanding soundtrack, the speakers convey strong dynamics and momentum, the sub deserving much of the credit for its impressive, controlled depth and clout.

It's equally scrupulous with quieter scenes too. Plunge into the bleak world of *Davy Jones' Locker* and the subtle sounds of scuttling crabs are clear, as is the chinking of Jack Sparrow's hair braids.

Integration between the front three speakers is exceptional. Insightful and expressive, the centre speaker does a fine job with dialogue. The FX surrounds do their bit too, giving more than a helping hand distributing sound.

Most of the time, presentation is very even-handed, although we heard a slight

If you want a showboat for your living room, this is it.

Uniformity isn't just in the looks, though. The speakers all have a 25mm ceramic-coated aluminium/magnesium alloy tweeter, gold-anodized for stiffness and damping. They share 15cm mid/bass drivers too, which achieve rigidity through dimpled, concave cones.

There's an extra bass driver on the 6s, and the Silver centre has twin mid/bass drivers flanking a central tweeter. The distinctive surrounds can be switched from bipole to dipole operation at the flick of a switch.

Before set-up, ensure the sub and floorstanders are mounted on the spiked feet, or plinth, for optimal rigidity. You'll also need a quality stand for your centre speaker, which could push you over the £3000 mark. Sure, that's a lot of money, but it will pale into insignificance - or at least lessen the blow - when you hear it.

Powerful stuff

The sense of power is staggering. Take to the waters with *Pirates Of The Caribbean: At World's End* and scenes of carnage as ships battle the thunderous weather and heavy-duty cannons are loud and all-consuming. If you're looking to juice up your movies, the 6AV12 will supply carton after carton.

The score is a potent aspect of the film, and Hans Zimmer's rapturous

harshness and edge in the collisions of swords in *Pirates*, so be cautious when matching the AV12 to partnering kit.

Polished with music

Play something in stereo, such as Kate Bush's *Hounds Of Love* album, and vocals are well-layered and precise. The polished sound and balanced imaging fills an open soundfield, although we could do with a touch more vigour.

If anything, this meeting has only raised our high opinion of the Silver 6 AV12 further. Given its performance and build quality, this is clearly one of the best packages for the money. But is it *the* best? Perhaps.

TANNOY REVOLUTION SE AV £2400

This 'Special Edition' AV1 is the successor to Tannoy's Revolution DC6T package. When the Award-winning DC6T floorstanders were given the SE facelift, it paid off - a new stabilising plinth (among other changes) took performance to the next level, making them Award-winners too. And, when the DC6 standmounts received similar treatment, they emerged suitably revitalised. Both revamped models make up the outer speakers of the SE AV package, so we could be in for a real treat.

Far from sub-standard

Completing the set-up is the new TS2.12 sub, which also comes into this package with four stars from a past solo review. The teeny DC4 LCR centre speaker is the only unit that's carried over from the original line-up into the new one.

As far as technology goes, the Scottish manufacturer's trademark dualconcentric drivers feature – a titaniumdome tweeter lodged in the throat of a pulp-cone driver – is designed to improve integration and dispersion.

Centre channel apart, this is a chunky package. The brawny floorstanders sit loud and proud at the front, and the trapezoidal standmounts are pretty big for rear channels too. If you have room for them, though, these will make welcome additions to any home cinema set-up. Build is good and the unfussy facades are handsome.

Usually we'd expect a choice of two or more finishes, but here we're fans of the

sole veneer (espresso): it's a smart proposition that should appeal to most people. Unusually, the sub is mismatching, available only in dark grey vinyl or, like our review smaple, black gloss finish.

We've praised the DC6T SEs for their forward, refined stance and exciting way with music, so it's no surprise when *The Stone Roses: Made of Stone* Blu-ray sounds great. The band has a bolshy, aggressive style on stage but the floorstanders rise to the occasion, charging along to heavy riffs and capturing the electrifying energy and rhythm of the catchy tunes.

The package's knack for movies is equally impressive. We watch *The Hobbit: The Desolation of Smaug* (not all 161 minutes, mind) and are blown away by the detail and dynamic aptitude. Neutral presentation is well maintained, and never edges towards hardness. In fact, sounds mostly feel solid and rich.

All-consuming experience

When it comes to battle scenes, you feel you're getting the whole picture. This is thanks to the rear speakers working their magic too. The SE AV envelopes you with background information, - when echoes reverberate around the castle ruin, for example. Integration between the two speaker pairs helps perfect that. Of course, we'd expected good things but, as The Travelling Wilburys proved, sticking good performers together doesn't necessarily mean they'll gel as one.

The outsider here is the centre speaker, which doesn't always feel well connected to the flanking towers. Its dynamically compressed sound struggles to match the expressive, exciting floorstanders. The sub is effective, but is light on attack and could do with being a bit tauter.

On paper, Tannoy's latest offering should be good - and it is. Aside from a few issues with the centre and subwoofer, it ticks all the boxes and is a worthy contender for those six precious spots on your living room floor.

t looked like we could have had a new champion, but KEF has defended its title valiantly - not even the brilliant Monitor Audios could knock it off its perch. Our current Award-winning KEFs have dominated this higher price point with their scale and detail, punchy dynamics and seamless integration - and all in one attractively compact offering. This has everything we want from a speaker package (even if it might mean skipping a few nights out to afford extra stands).

The runner-up, Monitor Audio package is not far behind. Detailed, dynamic and authoritative, it's a marvel with movies, and its enveloping sound owes a lot to the surrounds' bipole/ dipole configuration. It will be a worthy addition to your home cinema.

There are no chumps in this test. The other three contenders sit on the cusp of greatness. The Dalis are fast and exciting with a big, cohesive sound, but a lacklustre sub lets them down. With the Tannoys, the centre speaker is the weak link, though its Award-winning front and rear speakers demonstrate agile dynamics and attention to detail.

Acoustic Energy is last but by no means least. In joint-third place, its precise, insightful and well-integrated delivery only confirms our high regard for the 3-Series.



Aesthetix Romulus CD Player/DAC

■£6500★★★★☆

esthetix is one of the brightest stars of high-end amplification. We've loved every single piece of kit we've heard from this American brand, but still approached its first foray into the digital domain with a sense of trepidation. We needn't have worried. While not flawless, the Romulus CD player is a great piece of kit. It's apparent from the first few seconds of listening.

Serious listening

Our usual practice is to let test equipment warm up overnight before starting serious listening. Our review sample wasn't new, so running-in wasn't an issue. We normally don't take much notice of the sound at this point, apart from making sure everything is working properly. The Aesthetix had other ideas.

The first few bars of Eminem's *Bad Guy* is enough to get us hooked. This

recording can easily sound hard and thin, but that isn't the case here. The Romulus delivers sound with a wonderful sense of space and ease. And detail? There's loads, as the player uncovers subtleties with considerable skill. At this point we're impressed, but we leave the player on repeat and come back to listen the following day. We wonder how the sound will change once the circuitry settles at operating temperature. The answer? A fair bit, all of it good. Listening to the Eminem track again, the presentation proves even clearer and more fluid. There are gains in transparency and top-end sweetness. Scale improves too.

Communicating the aggression

The Romulus does a pretty good job at tracking rhythms and communicating the aggression in the recording. There's an element of rounding off the edges, though, which makes recordings seem a little easier on the ear than they should be. If you're a rock or hip-hop fan, that may be an issue, but for the most part this Aesthetix delivers enough bite.

Switch to Van Morrison's *Moondance* and the Romulus sounds right at home. It captures the jaunty feel of the song brilliantly, rendering that lovely bassline with real dexterity. Tonally, things edge towards richness, but not enough to jar. Instead, the presentation is smooth yet still entertaining. It's a balance that has become something of a trademark for the company's products.

The Romulus isn't just a CD player, either. It's equipped with digital inputs too, as is becoming common. There's the usual option of USB, optical and coax, and the less-common AES/EBU connection too. The USB can be switched between Class 1.0 and 2.0 modes at the press of a little button on the rear panel. Using Class 2.0 - as we did for most of our test - extends the input

capability to 24bit/192kHz music files. Macs with OS X version 10.6.4 or higher will work right away, but if you have a PC you'll need dedicated software drivers.

5003 16 CON PRISE LOCK

Bodes well for sound quality

USB Class 1.0 should work with most computers as standard but limits the input data streams to a 96kHz sampling rate. Regardless of mode, the USB input works asynchronously - so the DAC, rather than the computer connected to it, has control of information flow - which usually bodes well for sound quality.

We play a range of music from our MacBook (which runs a Pure Music media-playing software) with really good results. There's the same largescale, spacious presentation that we hear when playing CDs, and similar levels of resolution. We're impressed by the Romulus's refinement and its ability to make low bitrate files listenable - there's much to be said for such a forgiving attitude towards recordings. But, give it something really well-recorded like a CD rip of Nick Cave's *Push the Sky Away* or a 24-bit/192kHz rendition of Mahler's *Symphony No.4* and it shines.

Comparing the Aesthetix to a

top-class, stand-alone high-end DAC such as Chord's QBD 76 is interesting. The Chord certainly shows that more timing precision is available and delivers dynamic contrasts in a more forceful manner. It even digs up a touch more detail, but the Aesthetix counters with its more spacious presentation, a nicely layered sound stage and a much more forgiving attitude.

Moving away from sound, there's much to be impressed with here. Build quality is terrific, as it has been with all Aesthetix products we've seen. The The unit's aluminium casework feels solid and is finished to a high standard

Behind the music Jim White founder



Early in my career I

worked for a well-known, high-end digital audio company. When I left and

formed Aesthetix in the early 1990s, I could have produced a DAC then. But I decided that every Aesthetix product had to be truly special and unique, so over the next decade I amassed ideas that would eventually be realised in the Romulus and Pandora DAC (which is essentially the Romulus with the disc drive removed).

Universal product

My concept was for an adaptable, universal product that contained unique and unforeseen technologies, which would break new ground in natural reproduction from digital audio. As we progressed in our development work and the prototypes were being created, I could see my vision being gradually realised, as the technology was implemented.

If we're being picky, those distinctive triangular buttons on the front panel feel imprecise to use. We'd like a slicker drawer operation too: it feels no classier than many a budget player. The same thing can be said about the remote handset.

Faraday cage

Take a look inside and you'll be greeted by neatly laid-out circuit boards. It's no surprise to see valves used in the analogue stages (after all that is what the brand is known for) and we're impressed by the high-quality internal components. As is usual for a product at this level, attention is given to preventing damaging interactions between the digital and analogue sections. This extends to the TEACsourced transport, which is enclosed in a Faraday cage to isolate it electrically from other parts of the player.

The power supply is suitably elaborate and makes use of three transformers: one for analogue, the second for digital and the third for the control circuitry.

If you fancy having a stripped-out system, you can even connect the Romulus directly to a power amplifier or

In detail

Power supply arrangement

A capable power supply is the foundation of any talented hi-fi component, and this one is no different. It uses three transformers: one each for the analogue and digital sections, leaving the third to power the control circuitry. Isolating the sections in this way reduces interference and improves sound quality. The power supply (along with the CD transport) is shielded for the same reason.

Valves, obviously

Aesthetix is well known for making great-sounding valve-based products, so it comes as no surprise to find them in the audio stages of this CD player. It uses a combination of two 12AX7 valves (fed straight from the DAC section) and a pair of 6922s in the output stage. These are relatively low-power valves so they don't tend to get particularly hot. They should have a long life too, if you don't leave the player powered on all the time.

High-quality internal components The Romulus uses highly-regarded

Rel-Cap polypropylene capacitors and Roederstein metal film resistors to get the most performance from the circuit layout.

a pair of active speakers. To do this you'll need to specify a version with a built-in volume control (our review sample didn't come with one) which adds another £950 to the price. That's a large chunk of money, but does mean you won't need to stump up for an even pricier dedicated pre-amp.

Dive right in

The Romulus is a talented machine. It's a very fine CD player and a talented unit if used as a DAC. If its refined, yet still entertaining, approach to playing music appeals, dive right in - and enjoy a smooth and elegant sound.

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

ow much? High-end, in-ear headphones have a real problem when it comes to perceived value and it's hardly surprising because they look barely different from alternatives at a fraction of the price. An aura of luxury is usually missing and these Shure SE846s are no different.

Finding talented sources

Even if you're prepared to overlook this, there's still the problem of finding suitably talented sources and amplification. Top-class performance and true portability are a hard combination to find, even with a generous budget: Sony's NWZ-ZX1, the best portable music source we've come across, still isn't good enough to make the most of these headphones.

Most of our listening for this test is done using high-quality files from our MacBook, loaded with Pure Music media software. Amplification switches between Chord's superb-sounding Hugo portable DAC and Naim's mains-powered DAC-V1.

Then the SE846s really begin to shine. There's impressive engineering inside the transparent, plastic shell. The SE846s use four balanced armature drive units, which work in a three-way configuration with twin bass drivers.

These bass units are loaded by a clever tuning system that Shure says extends the low-end response considerably.

Shure also allows fine-tuning by supplying three interchangeable filters, in the form of small coloured tubes. These adjust the tonal balance.

You'll need the supplied tool to swap them around, but it only takes a minute. Their effect is subtle. We use the 'standard' option, which delivers the most neutral tonal balance, but we like the 'bass' option too, with its warm and smooth presentation. We didn't take to the treble-boosting filter, which proves unforgiving with less-than-perfect recordings and makes listening tiring.

Comfort is all

In-ears live or die by how well they fit. Without a proper seal between the unit and ear canal, the sound will be thin. The SE846s come with a range of buds, and it's vital to take time in choosing the right set. We found the SE846s comfortable once we got a good seal, and the smooth, curved shape of the enclosure sits nicely against the ear. The signal cable is stiff at the headphone end to allow it to wrap behind the ear for extra security and this works very well.

The SE846s may not look glamorous, but they're among the most comfortable in-ears we've tried. And we've tested hundreds, so that's some compliment.

Perceived value is an issue, but if you're judging these Shures on sound quality, then they're excellent. You'd have to spend thousands of pounds on speakers before you find as much detail. These 'phones give the impression of delivering every last nuance, and do so in an appealingly natural and

Connectivity

Balanced armature drive The heart of the SE846s. All four of its balanced armature drivers fit into this assembly. Also incorporates the bass-tuning system, giving an impressively powerful, yet still controlled, low-frequency performance. **2** Filter options The tonal balance can be adjusted, though in a subtle way. They come with three filter options: Bass, Neutral and Treble. We used Neutral the most, but like the Bass option too. Changing the filters is relatively quick and easy.

3 Choice of buds The performance of in-ears depends on the quality of the seal of the buds. As is usual, the SE846s come with options to suit different ear shapes. It's worth taking the time to get this right to hear what these 'phones can do.

understated way. They don't highlight treble detail artificially (as many do) to give the impression of resolution. Instead, the leading edges of notes are naturally drawn and harmonics beautifully differentiated. There's not a hint of hardness or overstatement.

These qualities are apparent listening to Beethoven's *Moonlight Sonata*: the Shures render its harmonic complexity correctly and deliver the piano's dynamic envelope with confidence. There's a convincing sense of solidity and scale to the presentation too, and plenty of power when required.

At no point is there the feeling the SE846s are overstating things to sound



impressive. They concentrate on an honest approach to music replay.

We try Gil Scott-Heron's *Me and the Devil* and the Shures' enthusiasm in delivering the hard-charging rhythm and their punch at low frequencies impress. The bass-tuning design works very well here and gives these in-ears a solid kick at low frequencies. Scott-Heron's gruff vocals are delivered with passion and precision too.

A grand is a lot of money for any headphones, but given an appropriately talented system we think the SE846s are good enough to justify that kind of outlay. It's fair to say they're the most capable in-ears we've heard. **Consider if** You want true high-end sound quality from in-ear and budget isn't an issue. **Highlight** Quality and fantastic comfort



In truth, there aren't many bands who call it a day at the right time. There are fewer still who know when to leave well enough alone, who understand the concepts of legend and legacy. Even a band as near-perfect as Pixies (who enjoyed the sort of critical traction that could pull a planet out of orbit) couldn't get it done without sticking out a patchily so-so final album. And now, after the most tentative and protracted comeback in the history of popular(ish) music. Pixies have delivered their first album in 23 years.

For the uninitiated, Pixies built a reputation based on three violent, thrillingly visceral and menacing albums (1988's *Surfer Rosa*, 1989's *Doolittle* and *Bossanova* from 1990). Each was leavened with some sweetly melodic surfadelic pop'n'roll, but fundamentally Pixies made a dynamic, biblically corruscating indie-rock noise while a fat, bald man either screamed about incest and amputation or crooned about honeyed surfer girls. No matter how hard bands tried (and, from Nirvana on down, they tried), no one attacked it like Pixies.

Cuts an implacable swathe

Pixies got fully back into gear in late 2013, releasing three fourtrack EPs in short order after a decade of occasional downloadonly songs, some fairly consistent touring, and the departure of both original bassist Kim Deal and her replacement. *Indie Cindy* is those three EPs in rejigged order.

Produced by Gil Norton (the producer of *Doolittle* and *Bossanova* as well as 1991's ho-hum swansong *Trompe Le Monde*), *Indie Cindy* cuts an implacable swathe, like a band really trying their hardest to sound like Pixies. On the likes of *What Goes Boom*, *Silver Snail* or *Blue Eyed Hexe* Pixies demonstrate a sort of relentless battleship mentality, where every punch is an uppercut and every chord is a power-chord. There's the same sort of musclebound mass even when the band attempt a little light and shade in *Greens And Blues* or *Ring The Bells* (the latter of which sounds uncomfortably and inexplicably like The Shins).

That aside, there's little new or unexpected about *Indie Cindy* - it sounds as you'd predict it might no matter whether Pixies had enjoyed a two-decade sabbatical or had been putting out an album a year since 1991. It's loud, dense, abrasive and Rocking with a capital 'R'. Guitars crunch and squeal, bass throbs, drums pound oppressively and the larynx shreds itself gamely. Does it add to the legend/legacy of Pixies? Not really.

THE AFGHAN WHIGS Do To The Beast Out now

In what's turning into a vintage month for fans of the venerable rock-outfit comeback, The Afghan Whigs have delivered their first album since 1998's *1965*.

In fairness, there was always a bit more about The Afghan Whigs' sound than that of most of their one-trick pony Sub-Pop grunge-era contemporaries. No strangers to the LOUDquietLOUD abandon eventually patented by Pixies, there was nevertheless a consistent and overt blue-eyed Muscle Shoals-y soul aspect to The Afghan Whigs recordings - once through 1992's *Congregation* or *Gentlemen* from 1993 illustrates the scope of the band's ambition.

A contemporary sound

Do To The Beast manages the by-no-means straightforward trick of sounding like The Afghan Whigs while simultaneously managing to sound vaguely contemporaneous rather than like a tribute act. There's a sheen of 2014 modernity to the sound, a tasteful surface gloss, but at their core, songs like *Algiers* and *The Lottery* owe as much to Curtis Mayfield or girl groups like The Crystals as they do to anything minted in the 21st century.

So there's superior songwriting, creative arrangements, a suggestion of familiarity in melody lines and, happily, a solid hi-fi aspect to *Do To The Beast*. It's a dense mix at times, and your system will have to separate, focus and stage with confidence if the likes of *Royal Cream* are to enjoy some breathing-space.

At its best it sounds like the sort of stuff Boards Of Canada might turn out if they were hangoverafflicted; at its worst it sounds like Jean Michel Jarre out-takes. Neither of those comparisons should be construed as complimentary.

Short of charm

That's not to suggest it's without merit as a test disc, though (even if it's comprehensively short of charm otherwise). There's the sort of low-end fetishism that will examine the very limits of your speakers' bass-driver excursion, and there's enough clatter and glitch to keep your tweeters busy. The mix is in very wide stereo, so soundstaging and focus get a worthwhile workout too. And there are transients and fine details galore. There's just not much else to get excited about.

Looking to get your home cinema system in tip-top shape? Then look no further

1. The majority of home cinema amps include an auto set-up system. Undeniably useful and increasingly very accurate, they are a fine starting point for calibration...

2. ...But don't be afraid to check their work. A sound-pressure level (SPL) meter lets you adjust each speaker's volume 'by hand'. 3. Plan where your speakers will sit. Whether you want 5.1 or 7.1, you will need to think about your room's shape, plus your seating and screen position for the best placement.

4. The front three speakers should be aligned for solid imaging, while the centre channel should be as close to ear level as possible. Rear positioning is a little more flexible.



5. Lastly, don't be afraid to listen to your ears and trust your own judgment. The final set-up tweaks should ultimately be your decision.



Five ways to... improve your home cinema part two

Part two of our look at the simple tweaks that can pay dividends when it comes to getting the best picture quality from your kit

1. Control your lighting (1)

Rule number one: your TV, whether it's a CRT, LCD or plasma, will give a better picture in a darkened room. A properly blacked-out room can be even better, although it can strain the eyes with a smaller screen. Try positioning a light behind the screen (like Philips' Ambilight) to counter this. Even if you'd rather watch in a brighter room, you should try to avoid positioning your screen so it faces a window or direct lighting.

2. Control your lighting (2)

Don't forget there are other small sources of light that can ruin the home cinema experience. If you've got the option, use your remote control to turn off the electronic displays found on DVD players, receivers et al, and, ideally, mask any power indicator status lights on kit like subwoofers and power amps. It might seem fiddly, but it's suprisingly worthwhile. Alternatively, consider a rack with cabinet doors to hide your kit – but ensure it has proper ventilation so your kit doesn't overheat.

3. Optimise your cabling

As with audio cabling, it's a good idea to buy the shortest runs of cable you need. Video signals are vulnerable to quality loss over distances, especially if you use scart cables. You should also avoid tangling your video cables, either with each other, or with other cables in your kit rack (especially mains). Finally, buy the best cables you can afford: as a rough guideline, spend around 10 per cent of your total video outlay.



4. Upgrade your DVD player

Not convinced you need a Blu-ray player? Then consider this: if you have an extensive film collection and a good-quality display, it makes sense to buy a new player to make the most of your investment. Upgrading from a component video signal to HDMI will deliver a big jump in image quality – and a great player like Sony's BDP-S790 costs £200.

5. Calibrate your screen

If you've never tweaked your TV's standard video settings, you're doing your eyes a disservice. The rule of thumb is turn everything down -

brightness should be 45 per cent, contrast 65 per cent and colour 50 per cent.

Another way of calibrating your set-up is to try THX's Tune-up app available on Android and iOS

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

Jargon buster: loudspeakers

If you're new to hi-fi you may be unaware of the jargon and lingo involved. Choosing the right pair of speakers is fundamental to your enjoyment of recorded music, so it may help in knowing a few technical terms so you won't be bamboozled when it comes buying your first pair of speakers

Coloration

Any tonal alterations or distortion added to the original signal can be classified as coloration.

Crossover

The circuit inside a speaker that splits, or filters the incoming signal, sending high frequencies to the tweeter and midrange/bass to the woofer.

Dvnamics

A speaker's dynamic ability is the way it goes from quiet to loud and back. The best speakers manage this quickly, in a smooth sweep. The difference between the quietest sounds the speaker produces and the loudest is called the dynamic range.

Sensitivity

A measure of how loud a speaker will go for a given input power. Typical values are around 89dB/W/m. Every 3dB of sensitivity means you'll need only half the amplifier power to go as loud.

Tweeter

A type of loudspeaker usually shaped like a small dome (but can also look like a cone) that's designed to reproduce the high frequency sounds.

Bi-wire

Speakers that are bi-wired have two pairs of speaker terminals. This allows for two connections to be made between the amplifier and the speaker; one for high



frequency sounds and another for mid/bass frequencies.

Woofer

Usually the largest drive unit. It's designed to deliver low frequency sounds. Can be used in multiples to increase output.



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Stereo amplifiers

The end for MP3?

If you own a half decent hi-fi system, using 'FLAC' instead of 'MP3' files could be music to everyone's ears

For those of us that consider themselves a music lover, albeit to different degrees, we are part of a very fortunate generation. We now have access to an ever-growing wealth of recorded music of extraordinary range and depth, effectively accumulated over the last 60 years. With the

introduction of the microgroove LP record in the early 1950's, playback quality took a quantum leap forward and this also coincided with a far higher standard of recording techniques. Although further improvements have been made over the years, this was a watershed time that first introduced hi-fi as a reality.

Listening to music has many benefits

Hi-Fi is, of course, a means to an end – the reproduction of music. Many studies over the years have shown remarkable benefits for mankind through listening to music. Making music is intrinsic to all cultures and music is often used for various therapeutic purposes because it involves using the whole brain. It is believed to improve memory and intelligence, improve physical development and coordination, reduce stress and blood pressure, and even reduce levels of pain.

We now have literally millions of recorded music tracks available to us in all genres and many different formats. One trend over recent years, however, has been to deliberately downgrade the quality in order to offer quantity. The main culprits have been MP3 and AAC formats which were designed as a low cost form of delivery when download speeds were slow and computer chip memory was expensive. Neither now applies and both formats should be consigned to history along with 78 rpm records and the 8-track cartridge. Unfortunately, such is the current market penetration of MP3 and AAC formats that many people today are listening to a considerably lower quality of music reproduction than their peers back in the 1970's.



Quality vs quantity

Let us explain. The maximum resolution from MP3 and AAC file formats, which are both highly compressed, is 320 kbps (kilobytes per second) which compares with CD quality of 1411 kbps. This means the resolution quality is less than a quarter of that provided by a standard CD. However, most MP3 or AAC files are downloaded over the internet and the most used download resolution is 128 kbps, which is around one-eleventh of CD quality. This should ring alarm bells. If you are only playing back these tracks on an iPod or mobile phone with a pair of earbuds, the quality may be irrelevant to you. But if these tracks are your primary source of music, perhaps with an iPod dock into a decent hi-fi system, you are only making a very poor quality sound louder. Information is irretrievably lost and the full dynamic range is lacking. The quality will be very poor in contrast with a full

> resolution version even if you are completely unaware of the loss you are inflicting upon yourself. This can even affect the type of music listened to as most classical recordings downloaded as an MP3 or AAC file will have so much information missing, and all the complexities of the music lost, with the end result that the recording is reduced to just the essence of a tune.

What is the future of recorded music?

There are now positive signs for the future of recorded music. Audiophiles, or hi-fi connoisseurs, have been very important to the music industry as they are generally avid music lovers who aim to maximise their enjoyment by listening to music at its best quality level, which means the play-back of great recordings through hi-end hi-fi to achieve the most outstanding results. Without

them, a main driver for quality would probably be removed from the music industry. They have always sought out quality but there is now an increasing awareness among the wider public of the serious deficiencies of the highly compressed formats. Full resolution audio streaming, as well as CD quality downloads, are already available and will surely become the eventual norm with this greater awareness of the tremendous quality benefit. Consumers will vote through their purchases and will seek out higher resolution recordings. Look at Qobuz for a new high-profile entry into this field who offer CD quality (16 bit/44.1 kHz FLAC) streaming for over 15 million tracks.

For specialist hi-fi dealers, their relationship with audiophiles and hi-fi connoisseurs is also crucial to them for, if they are to stay in business, they must satisfy the most discerning customers in the industry. The reality is that audiophiles and specialist hifi retailers (and the ones listed on this page represent the UK's finest) are essential to each other.

Specialist dealers know how to choose the products that combine as a superb system and how to get the best out of it by expert installation in the home. They also appreciate how exciting and involving music can be and how it can deliver a powerful emotional experience. 

Before you buy... surround systems



Space matters

There is little point in cramming a big speaker system into a small room. Instead, try to place your kit in the right areas. Doing so will make a big difference to the overall sound quality.



Socket to me

Most all-in-one systems have fairly limited socket counts. If you have lots of sources that you need to hook up, make sure you check your prospective buy will do everything you want it to.



Streaming Streaming functionality is becoming an increasingly important component. Systems are now supporting Spotify, BBC iPlayer and Netflix, so there's a little something for everyone.



Try some music

Many buyers won't have room for both a hi-fi and home cinema system, but all-in-one kit tends not to sound great in stereo. Be sure to play some music on it before you pay.



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Speaker stands

Small speakers rely on proper mounting and support just as much as large ones. Using the wall-mount option offered with some speakers is a good idea – better yet, buy some stands.

Will you table- or wall-mount?

If you're placing the soundbar on the same level as your TV, it will need enough room to stay clear of the screen. Also, try to visualize how the soundbar will look with your TV - you wouldn't want a huge soundbar with a comparatively tiny 32in screen.



What will you connect?

Make sure the system you go for has all the connections you need for your kit. Not all soundbars feature HDMI inputs and some have only one optical digital input. If you're looking for a solution with streaming options, make sure it's wi-fi capable before you buy.



Is there enough room?

Don't forget, you really need to have the sub as close as possible to the soundbar; otherwise you could struggle to integrate the two and they could sound like separate entities. Philip's HTL9100 has detachable speakers, ideal for those with limited space.



How it works: Chromecast

Chromecast is Google's latest attempt to infiltrate your living room via a wireless streaming dongle that mirrors content from your portable device

All you need to is a wi-fi Internet connection, a TV with a HDMI port and some portable devices from which to "cast" from.

Insert it into a HDMI slot on your TV, download the Chromecast app to your smartphone or tablet (Android and iOS only, there's no support for Windows, Blackberry or Kindle) and you'll be asked to log in to your wi-fi via the app and... you're finished. Simple and easy.

Packed with it is a USB cable for powering the device, as well as a power adapter for the mains if your TV lacks a nearby USB port.

Chromecast (slightly bigger than a USB stick and weighing a measly 34g) streams directly from the Internet and not from your device, freeing your device for other tasks.

Picking the right box



Confused by the various options in the set-top market? Not sure on how to decide which one is better? Here are a few tips on the things to consider when looking for the set-top box that's perfect for you.

Tuners

If you plan on watching one channel while recording another, make sure your receiver has more than one tuner. Three tuners mean you can record two channels, so you don't have to miss out on your favourite programmes.

Content

If you're not sure which set-top box/service you want, then content is a good yardstick to measure by. BBC iPlayer and a fair few of its ilk are available on most service providers but other programmes and channels could be exclusive to just one.

HDD

Looking to record? You'll need a big enough hard drive to store your TV shows. The bigger the better. 500GB will give you 125 hours of HD viewing or two weeks of standard-def content. Some receivers now ship with a huge 1TB of onboard storage.

On the go

With service providers rolling out mobile apps, watching TV with a remote control is a thing of the past. Browsing what's on, managing your recorded content and deleting remotely when you're out and about is a handy trick. TV is now mobile.

Multi-room

Tired of someone else hogging the TV? Add an extra box and turn your set-up into a multi-room affair. Monthly fees apply but marry that with all the content on offer and you'll have a firm idea of which set-top box you should get.





Component

Superior to scart, S-video or composite, carries video from a source to a display on three leads.



HDMI

A high-quality digital connection that carries images from DVD/Blu-ray players to displays.



Analogue interconnects

These carry audio signal from source to amplifier, or between pre-amplifier and power amplifier. Some use a shielding construction to reduce external electrical interference.

Monitor Audio's latest Silver package could be the template for a modern, full-size surround set-up. It's beautifully presented and made with an obsessive attention to detail.

Yet look back at our 2001 review of the first Silver speaker package and you'll see not much has changed down the years. We were taken with the company's construction standards back then too. Dig deeper and you find the similarities between old and new go far deeper than just build standards.

It's the use of metal drive units that draws our attention. Those used in the latest package may be superior in terms of dynamics. detail and resonance control, but their DNA is easily traceable to the earlier designs. The newer package pulls ahead by using dedicated surround speakers rather than the conventional standmounters of its ancestor. These specialist surrounds are designed with great thought, and can

change from bipole to dipole operation by flicking a switch; the correct choice of dispersion depends on their positioning. True, the earlier package's

conventional rear speakers are better for music replay, but in this case convincing cinema sound has priority.

We can't help but be impressed.



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
