

High-tech, high-performance... and high-quality movie sound B&W 683 Theatre | Speaker package | £2750

We think Bowers & Wilkins' brand-new 600-series speakers are great. It was love at first sight with the stunning 685 S2 standmounters; we've waxed lyrical about the 683 S2 floorstanders. Will it be the same with the obligatory 5.1 speaker package?

This B&W 683 Theatre combo is, as its name suggests, built around the superb 683 S2 floorstanders. At £1150 a pair they're the unequivocal leaders of their class, delivering a combination of transparency, detail and dynamics currently unmatched.

The rest of the system uses speakers from the new range, too: the HTM61 S2 centre speaker (£550), 686 S2 rear standmounters (£350) and ASW610XP subwoofer (£700) complete the package.

New technology

The new 600 series shares a lot of technology with B&Ws' pricier CM range, and it shows in the performance. The biggest change is in the use of the CM series' ring-reinforced decoupled tweeters.

It's a clever design. The thin 25mm aluminium dome tweeter is reinforced by a thicker outer metal ring (seen on the flagship CM10 loudspeaker), which ensures better damping. The assembly is further suspended (decoupled) in a gel ring to minimise resonances from the mid- and bass-drivers. And then there's the Nautilus tube-loading arrangement, handed down from the iconic 800-series speakers...

It all aims to deliver more precision in the upper reaches of the frequency range - and it hits that target square-on.

The bass drivers in the 683 S2 floorstanders have also been reinforced with rings of aluminium (the stiffer or white finishes. Gone are the days of wooden veneers, as the monochrome colours have by all accounts been more popular. The sub has a velvety, matte-vinyl wrap around it that feels nice to touch, although we found a slight tear in the material around the edges in our sample.

We like the clean, uncluttered look of the speakers, offset by the pop of yellow Kevlar. The cabinets are nicely built, with neat,

construction reduces distortion), while B&W's distinctive bright yellow Kevlarwoven FST drivers handle the midrange frequencies on the front three speakers.

And we have to take our hats off to B&W for finally putting a protective grille around that delicate soft-dome tweeter, which can be so easily damaged by prodding fingers. It helps with sound dispersion, too.

The 683 Theatre is available in black ash

square edges - but we can't help feeling they look a little plain at this price, even though B&W has purposely opted for a simple, modest finish.

A plethora of drivers

The ASW610XP subwoofer is a small but powerful beast, with 500W of amplification driving the 25cm cone. Line and speaker inputs, as well as multiple EQ settings, are present on the back panel. The speakers are all bi-wirable, and the 686 S2s include wall-mounting brackets on the back.

It's worth mentioning that the speakers in this system are a mix of two- and three-way driver configurations, with cones of different sizes. While the 25mm tweeter remains consistent, the midrange Kevlar drivers and bass cones differ from speaker to speaker. Some speakers - the 683 and 686 S2s - also feature a front-facing port that uses B&W's Flowport technology for cleaner bass performance. The mix of speakers might make practical sense, but before our first listen we can't help wondering if the differences will affect the package's integration too much.

So we fire up *Thor: The Dark World* and the 683 Theatre powers through the DTS-HD Master Audio soundtrack. It packs a good deal of punch, with crashes

The subwoofer's compact size means B&W has had to endow it with a lot of power – a whopping 500W – to squeeze out as much bass as possible.

There are speaker and line level inputs, and their corresponding volume controls, on the back panel. EQ presets are also available, so you can tell the ASW610XP whether it's been placed in a corner or given space away from a wall.

As much as we'd enjoy not having a massive black cube looming in our living room, we think a larger driver would've given it the thundering low-end oomph it needs to match a package of this calibre. Dynaudio's Xeo range continues to wow with this next-gen model Dynaudio Xeo 4, p18

and explosions supplying a satisfying range of thumps and wallops. There's a pleasing sense of scale too, and we can credit the impressive 683 S2s for adding height to the wide soundfield.

Clarity and precision

Detail? There's bags of it - and it cuts through clearly thanks to the revamped tweeters. High frequencies have bite and sparkle, but stop short of coarseness.

The speakers confidently portray the shifts in atmosphere, too. We know the B&W speakers go loud, and they get the chance to really show off their dynamic ability when Thor's hammer gets smashy.

But we can't help feeling like there's something missing. It takes us a while to realise that, while we're having fun, the package hasn't blown us away. We thought it would. There's a sense that the sound should be grander - more powerful - and that effects-steering should be smoother.

Heftier sub-woofing, please

We want more depth and rumble to the bass, too. Whe ASW610XP is a talented sub on its own, but it can't quite keep up with the sheer muscle of the 683 S2s. The same goes for the centre speaker. Voices are richer, more nuanced and full of personality when they're delivered from the 683s, but when the on-screen dialogue is happening bang in the middle, the centre channel isn't quite as insightful or layered as we'd like.

While the centre speaker and subwoofer are designed to work with the 683 S2s, the differences in driver size and configuration seems to affect integration across all the speakers in the package. Sound just isn't quite unified as it travels around the room.

The KEF R100 5.1 package is the B&W's direct rival. Instead of using different driver configurations, it uses identical speakers that use identical Uni-Q single drivers and it comes out on top with a stunningly seamless and precise surround-sound performance. The KEF's subwoofer digs deeper and is more muscular too, giving greater authority and scale.

The bottom line

The B&W speaker package relies heavily on the merits of the 683 S2s - and rightly so, as they're easily the most overtly talented aspect of this 5.1 package. But they cast a shadow over the rest of the system, which is a shame as the 683 Theatre is a few tweaks away from being stunning. It's not quite the class-leading package that we were hoping for, but it's still definitely worth an audition

Heavens, that centre speaker is large. It takes two of us to get it out of the box. Also, be aware that you'll need a sizeable kit-rack to place it on.

We're surprised by how small the sub is. It's talented, but does seem rather petite in this heavyweight package. It needs more low-end wallop, too. The small rear units need to be placed on stands or wall-mounted. It might be more practical to peruse B&W's in-wall speaker range... We're endlessly pleased that B&W has finally put a protective grille over the fragile tweeter. Now our children and cats can roam free. We're having a great time with this punchy, spacious and detailed set-up, but it's not quite the fully rounded surround sound we were expecting.

Humax DTR-T2000 | YouView Box | £200

The new Humax: harder, better, faster, stronger



Harder, better, faster, stronger could summarise the Humax DTR-T2000. Rather than doing something entirely new, Humax has sprinkled tiny improvements all over its YouView box. After all, why throw out something that works? This year's DTR-T2000 is not very different from last year's Award-winning DTR-T1010, but it's certainly better.

For the uninitiated, YouView is like Freeview on steroids. It's a free service with access to more than 70 TV and radio channels, but that's where similarities end. There's all manner of web-based on tap, too.

Playing catch-up

The box accesses your broadband to get content from the major catch-up services. These are integrated with the electronic programme guide (EPG), which allows you scroll back by seven days. Simply browse, pick something you missed, and the corresponding catch-up service will load.

The Great British Bake-Off, for instance, will bring up the BBC iPlayer app. There's also the ITV Player, 4oD and Demand 5. Other apps include Sky's Now TV (subscription film and TV streaming), Sky Store (pay-as-you-go films), Milkshake! (for kids), S4C (in Wales), STV (in Scotland), and UKTV (Dave, Really and Yesterday). It's fine if you don't want to play catch-up: scroll forward up to seven days, and set the box to record upcoming attractions.

The T2000 looks very similar to last years T1010, but there are a few changes. It's smaller. The power supply is now an

Access to Sky Movies and Sports for those who just want to dip in now and again. external block, keeping the device cooler, which means no noisy fan - and it's also primarily made of metal rather than plastic. Sadly there's no display to show info on what you're watching or recording. But you do get a flap hiding a USB port, which isn't for end-user use.

Instead you need to use the internal hard drive, with 500GB storage, which allows you to record around 300 hours in standard-def or 125 in HD. There's no 1TB model, but we wouldn't be surprised if that appeared. The back of the machine offers standard connections: aerial passthrough, HDMI out (plus scart and RCA just in case), digital optical out, another USB port and ethernet in. Wi-fi is still missing, though.

Universal viewing

Set-up is easy. Plug in the bundled HDMI and LAN cables, add your own RF lead, and power it up. On-screen instructions take care of the rest.

We've always been fans of the YouView interface. It's neat and nice to look at, with a welcoming blue tint. Press the 'YouView' button on the well-designed remote and you're presented with settings, apps, recordings and search.

The search function is universal. Just type in the name of the programme you want and you'll be told the service that offers it. There's a good amount of info for programmes, and it's nice to see related broadcasts in case you need advice.

Start-up times vary because of the power-saving 'Eco Mode'. Have it set high and the box will go into a deep sleep on standby. Set it to low and it will spring to life in 10-15 seconds (slightly better than its predecessor). There's little lag when it comes to flicking through menus. Button presses respond well.

Video quality depends on the strength and stability of your signal, but if you get good TV reception normally then you'll be fine. The tuners do a solid job: standard and HD pictures are clean and detailed, with decent motion-handling and sharply drawn edges. You can record one channel and watch another, or record two channels at once while you watch on-demand content.

On-demand quality is also dependant on connections, but whichever service we used pictures were clear and judder-free.

The Humax DTR-T2000 box is better than its predecessor in nearly every way. Things may have moved on in the last year, with many more TVs getting some catch-up features of their own, along with Facebook and Spotify. But when it comes to the pure simplicity of enhancing your TV-viewing experience for little outlay, there's nothing quite like YouView.

Philips Fidelio M2BT | Bluetooth headphones | £250 Award-winning headphones get an upgrade

It's always exciting when a current Award winner gets a successor - even if that successor bears only minor changes. That's the case with the Philips Fidelio M2BTs, essentially the M1BTs (our current favourite Bluetooth headphones) with just the addition of NFC (for achieving a wireless connection with a mere tap of the headphones on a compatible source) and some cosmetic changes onboard.

The price remains the same at £250, and for that you get more of what we loved in the M1BTs: aptX Bluetooth, attractive and comfortable design, and built-in controls.

Sound quality impresses

More importantly, the M1BTs' rich, balanced and musical sound remains intact. In fact, as switching between the old and new models proved, there are no notable differences between them.

Using an Apple iPad Mini 2 as our source we play Lorde's *Royals* via Bluetooth and the headphones are alive with detail. There's variation in drumbeats, transparency to vocals as they trail off and clear disparity between vocalists when the second comes into play. As with their predecessors, there's none of the harshness often prevalent in wireless sound.

Percussive clicks are distinct and snappy too, the headphones showing no signs of softness. Opting for a direct, upfront delivery, their punchy demeanour makes for a thrilling listen with any music.

We try to trip them up with Hijak Oscar's chaotic *God Knows* but they aren't fazed by the flurry of instruments and frenzied tempo. Instead, the M2BT's time well and deliver the sprightly track with enthusiasm.

Quality build and design

The M2BTs swap their predecessors' navyblue finish for black, and the original faux- leather outer headband for a ribbed woven fabric alternative. It keeps the original faux-leather underside as a soft cushioning for your head. You could see the cutback on leather as a downgrade, but the woven fabric is still a smart substitute.



The memory-foam ear-pads are cosy, and apply enough pressure to clasp firmly on your head (although they can make your ears a little toasty a few albums in).

Compact cups - which house the 4cm drivers - make them perfect companions for the commute, and they fold flat for a snug fit inside the supplied carry pouch.

Well integrated controls

Conveniently built into the right ear-cup, the controls are well integrated and intuitive. Simply hold down the crescentshaped area to pair the headphones to any

device, and to power on or off; press it once to play/pause. The only other control is a neat flick-switch - knock it up or down to change volume; press it once to skip a track and twice to skip backwards.

Fine features

The M2BTs are equipped with two microphones - one for voice and another to measure external noise and adjust sound accordingly - so hands-free calling is a doddle. The in-line controls take care of all operations, so you can forget having to scramble for your phone to answer calls. Whether in an office or out on the street, voices pull through loud and clear.

Philips claims a 15 metre wireless range, which is particularly handy for indoor use, and ten hours playback or talk-time on a full charge. They last us a fair run over a few days before needing roughly three hours to replenish via the USB charging cable.

A supplied 1.2m audio cable grants the option for a direct connection, too - and brings a touch more clarity of sound with it.

Sticking to their predecessors' Awardwinning formula, the M2BTs offer superb sound, convenience and design.

Panasonic DMR-BWT740 | Blu-ray recorder | £455 Multi-talented recorder does it all

Complex remote

The button-heavy remote can be confusing, but use the 'Function Menu' to take you to the player's hub screen. From there you can navigate to live TV and recording

For some reason, Panasonic seems to be the only company bothering with Blu-ray recorders these days. It would be easy to get complacent in the face of absent competition, but the company keeps developing impressive new models.

And so we have the Panasonic DMR-BWT740, the firm's latest Blu-ray recorder. Well, calling it just a Blu-ray recorder is a little unfair. It's a multimedia beast, and does a lot more than the BD-R label implies.

A multimedia beast

It's a PVR with a 1TB hard disk, on which you can record up to 684 hours of content. There are two tuners for Freeview HD, so you can watch one thing while recording another, or record two programmes at the same time. On top of this, you get web-based content too.

The box also handles 4K upscaling, multi-room streaming to portable devices in the home and Miracast for mobile streaming. Then there's DLNA certification, which means you can stream content from networked devices too. All that, and it plays and records to DVDs and Blu-rays.

Sturdy build quality

With all those features, you might expect a slab the size of an old VCR. But it looks like a regular Blu-ray player – it's a sturdy metal box with a drop-down front panel.

Open this and you'll find the disc tray mechanism, a large display, basic controls, along with a USB port and SD card slot for adding your own content.

Around the back is a generous array of connections. There are RF in and out

sockets for TV pass-through, while video output is via HDMI. Audio output is more varied, coming in optical, coaxial and analogue stereo flavours.

A scart input lets you make analogue recordings from older devices, and another USB port means you can attach external hard drives. There's an ethernet socket and built-in wi-fi to complete the specification.

Easy set-up

The set-up process is easy. It's just a matter of plugging in and following the on-screen prompts. You'll have a full list of channels, and internet connectivity, in no time.

Recording to disc requires copying programmes from the hard disk. Unfortunately you can't record straight to a DVD or Blu-ray, but the quality of recordings is good

Navigating with the remote is a bit trickier. If in doubt, use the Function Menu to take you to the equivalent of a TV's hub screen, where you choose between live TV and recordings, or go into settings.

Making recordings of live TV is easy. See something you like and hit record. Alternatively, there's a programme guide like you'd find on any TV, where you can set timers for upcoming shows. There's even an option to do that from your smartphone.

Recording to disc requires copying from the hard disk. Unfortunately you can't do it straight to DVD or Blu-ray.







For smart content, you get Panasonic's slightly dated Viera Connect. There's not much we'd download from the Market really: just Netflix, BBC iPlayer and YouTube. Netflix fans, though, will like the dedicated button for it on the remote.

For the most part, the interface is zippy and responsive. The machine will have a good think about the more intensive tasks (loading up the smart portal, for instance), but general flicking about is fine.

Fine picture quality

As for video quality, we have no complaints. Blu-rays look sharp, detailed and clean. Colours are punchy yet convincing, and skin-tones are natural. And it's the same when watching Freeview HD. Standard-def content inevitably looks a little softer and grainier, but overall we're very pleased.

We're also equally pleased with the quality of video recorded from Freeview HD. Both hard disk and Blu-ray playback offer the same quality as live TV. Sound is typical Panasonic: clear, smooth and with generous weight.

For some, the Panasonic DMR-BWT740 will be a bit much. But if you find yourself looking at a standard Blu-ray player and sighing at its simplicity, then this might just be the answer. Its array of functions is mighty impressive, and we think it offers great value for the money.

Yamaha knows a thing or two about surround sound. Its YSP range of soundbars has impressed us for years, being one of the few one-box solutions that comes close to giving a genuine 5.1 surround-sound experience. Its impressive sound-projection technology makes a return in the new YSP-2500 - a brilliantly designed soundbar, with wireless subwoofer, that's yours for £800.

The YSP-2500 takes over from 2012's Award-winning YSP-2200, and remains one of the best solutions for those who don't want the clutter of a traditional 5.1 speaker package and AV receiver.

Premium look and feel

It's a sleek, slim bar, and the impeccable build and finish quality is worth every penny of its £800 asking price. Its array of 16 speakers is hidden under a grille, each driver powered by 2W of amplification. The display is bright and legible.

The wireless subwoofer is discreet and can be tucked away in a corner, but the soundbar itself needs to be placed directly ahead of or beneath your TV for the best results. Make sure there aren't any obstructions around the 'bar, too: any obstacles will affect its sound projection capabilities and spoil the surround effect.

The bar is low enough to be placed in front of most TVs without obstructing the screen. But in case it blocks the TV's remote sensor, don't panic - you can always use the YSP-2500's remote repeater.

Delay, bounce and reflect

Yamaha's soundbar success lies in the way it uses delay control to direct sound-beams so that they bounce off the walls and reflect sound around the room, thus creating a virtual 5.1 surround field.

Its IntelliBeam function further optimises the sound to match your specific room, although you can manually adjust the level, distance, angle and more of each channel to your heart's content.



There's an impressive amount of apparent height as well (which makes giving the 'bar some space all the more important), especially when Falcon swoops over a skyscraper. The film's sound effects are placed with surprising accuracy bullets. footsteps and dialogue are easy to track as they move around the screen. It's exciting, and fun to listen to. There's detail, power and punch in each effect.



It's not too shabby with music, either.

Metallica's S&M concert DVD is enjoyably

atmospheric and gets us rocking, although

the YSP-2500, each offering a different way to tweak or jazz up the sound quality. You get a choice of 'Beam' or 'Playback' modes, which adjust the speaker configuration to suit your source, while Yamaha's Cinema DSP modes have a fun selection of soundeffects to play around with.

Neat handset

We have to applaud Yamaha for its well-designed remote handset and control app too. The remote has a premium feel, is just the right size and weight, and has logically placed buttons that are instinctive to use. All other manufacturers, take note.

And the Yamaha YSP-2500 has a generous spread of connections. There are three HDMI inputs, all of which support 3D, Dolby TrueHD and DTS-HD Master Audio, as well as being compatible with 4K/60p images. There's also an HDMI output. There are two optical and one coaxial inputs, along with a pair of RCA sockets and a 3.5mm headphone jack.

The YSP-2500's expansive soundfield, punch and scale are impressive, and it's the most appealing solution for those that want cinema-style sound without going the full hog with a 5.1 system.

Pioneer SC-LX58 | AV receiver | £1400 Reigning champion gets even better

Another year, another round of AV receivers, and like clockwork Pioneer has come up with the SC-LX58. It follows last year's SC-LX57, which was very successful.

The LX57 won our 2013 Award for £700-£1500 surround amps and is the benchmark against which we judge all similarly priced rivals. So is this heir apparent (£200 more expensive) a worthy successor, or merely a pretender?

We're going to go with 'worthy successor'. Pioneer has pulled out all the stops, building on everything we loved about the LX57. The LX58 is packed with features, and the sound is better than ever.

Captain courageous

Our test disc is *Captain America: The Winter Soldier* on Blu-ray. It's a veritable assaultcourse, full of shattered glass, crunching It's clear the SC-LX58 has plenty of power under the hood. We're very impressed with the scale of the soundstage, which is tall and wide enough to fill our largest testing room. We enjoyed Pioneer's weighty sound previously, but this time it feels more muscular. Gunshots command attention - they're punchy and authoritative.

It's not all about the muscle, of course. Despite being a powerhouse, the Pioneer is capable of musical nuance. We switch to a Blu-ray of Michael Jackson's *This Is It* and the amp succeeds in highlighting the subtleties of the evolving key changes of a practice session. The Pioneer also demonstrates a nicely balanced presentation, with a lively sense of rhythm. The bit where MJ finally gets round to doing *Thriller* is, frankly, thrilling.

Despite being a powerhouse, the SC-LX58 is capable of nuance too. We switch to a Blu-ray of Michael Jackson's *This Is It* and it highlights the evolving key changes of a practice session

metal and armour-piercing bullets, topped with a caffeinated score. This DTS-HD Master Audio 7.1 soundtrack is a workout for any system, but the Pioneer SC-LX58 breezes through it. It delivers a thoroughly immersive sound, with surround effects steered throughout the room with agility and precision.

We've always been impressed with Pioneer's powers of resolution, and the detail definition here is exquisite. Everything that pings off Captain America's shield is clearly identified, and when he throws it at somebody's face there's weight. That detail extends throughout the frequency range. The low-end rumble of our hero's motorbike is properly expressed. Explosions are surrounded by reverberations and it's rare to find bass so deep and articulate. At the top end, it's nicely rounded. We had no complaints about last year's SC-LX57 treble performance, but now it seems to lack refinement next to the LX58.

There are plenty of surround modes with the SC-LX58 and it's worth playing with these to suit your taste and listening environment. But we prefer keeping it in Pure Direct mode for music, which yields the most convincing results.

But how about the rest? Take a glance at the exterior and the LX58 looks virtually identical to its predecessor.

Heavy metal is the order

The design isn't going to turn heads. It's a heavy black or silver box, and built like a tank - mostly metal, with a flap at the front. It's well made: buttons are nice, the dials satisfying. And underneath, the LX58 is a 9.2-channel AV receiver with Class D amplification. It packs a powerful 190W-per-channel into 6ohms (claimed), and has an extensive list of connections. There are eight HDMI 2.0 inputs and

three outputs; 3D playback is supported, as is 4K 60p pass-through and upscaling. There is also an impressive array of





analogue connections, including a pair of dedicated subwoofer outputs featuring independent calibration.

Well-connected and compatible

Digital connections include coaxial and optical inputs (two each). There are also two USB ports - one for powering products, the other for USB drives and Apple devices.

As for networking, there's an ethernet socket for wired internet, and there's a wireless LAN adapter in the box. Finally, the SC-LX58 has built-in aptX Bluetooth (and Apple owners will be pleased to find AirPlay compatibility, which can stream iTunes libraries).

You also have use of internet radio with vTuner, plus Spotify Connect and HTC Connect. DLNA means the amp can play content from compatible network devices.

Over a network or via USB, the amp can handle quite a few formats: AIFF, Apple Lossless, WAV, FLAC, MP3, WMA, AAC and DSD. It's also happy with high-res audio

files (up to 24-bit/192kHz) as long as they are in AIFF, WAV or FLAC.

Last, but not least, is support for Dolby Atmos surround-sound tech that expands on current 5.1 and 7.1 set-ups. In cinemas that means up to 64 speakers, with some in the ceiling. For the home, Dolby's hardware partners will produce side speakers and speaker-top modules to emulate the sensation of overhead sound.

Back to the feature

Sadly we've not yet been able to test this the amp requires a software update, expected before the year's end. We can't wait, but for now this is still an impressively equipped beast.

Installation is an easy process. Well, it is once you've plugged everything in. The MCACC Pro (Multi-Channel Acoustic Calibration) makes set-up a breeze. Hook up the bundled microphone and your system will blurt out a series of test tones so the amp to calculate the distance and size of the speakers it's driving.

This takes only a couple of minutes. It's worth going into the settings to fine-tune the adjustments, but we found the automatic calibration accurate. Lastly, we should mention the updated remote, which is nicely laid out and not intimidating. We'd also suggest trying the new (and free) iControlAV5 app. Its slick, colourful interface makes operation easier and more intuitive than the standard remote.

To sum up, we love the Pioneer SC-LX58. What's not to like? Pioneer has taken last year's champ and made it even better. Admittedly it's not a massive leap over the SC-LX57, whose owners shouldn't feel the need to upgrade straight away. But if you're making the jump from an entry-level multichannel amp, prepare to be astonished. This is a terriffic piece of kit.

Dynaudio Xeo 4 | Wireless speakers | £1775 **Xeo sends out the right signal**

When it comes to wireless speakers, sound quality is often traded off for convenience. Dvnaudio is one of the few manufacturers to buck that trend, achieving great wireless sound in 2012 when it introduced its wireless hi-fi speaker range. Xeo,

Now that Xeo's successor, the solidly built Xeo 4 (also available in black), looks to take the range to new heights.

Wide-ranging improvements

This latest model, which is joined in the range by the Xeo 6 floorstanders, brings upgraded amplification, improved digital signal processing, the all-important high-res audio support (up to 24-bit/ 96kHz) and a new EQ setting for speaker position. Multi-band technology also aims to deliver a more stable connection too.

So how do they work? The Xeo 4 active speakers have built-in amplifiers - one driving the tweeter and another the mid/ bass driver. The supplied Xeo Hub wireless transmitter connects directly to the source and sends a wireless signal to the speakers to achieve playback. All you need to build a complete system is a pair of Xeo speakers and a source. That's the beauty of it.

The Xeo 4s have plenty more in their arsenal than just convenience and versatility, though. Like their predecessors, they sound fantastic. Effortlessly musical, these are hugely revealing and rhythmically adept speakers.

Network access in no time

We book the transmitter up to our Naim network player, and are up and running in seconds thanks to the speakers' automatic signal-detection. Jump straight in with a 24-bit/96kHz WAV file of Paul Simon's Dazzling Blue and the medley of instruments is delivered with precision and insight, each well imaged across a spacious soundstage. The rhythmic pattering of talking drums is spot-on, and well sustained as Simon's vocals step in.

Tonal balance holds the middle ground nicely, and there's no shortage of punch to make upbeat tracks like Drake's Take Care exciting. The song's thumping bassline has attack and tautness, while pounding piano attack has ample force behind it.

DYNAUDIO

The City of Prague Philharmonic Orchestra's The Fellowship from The Lord Of The Rings OST brings our test to a sweet end, only confirming the speakers' stunning detail and dynamics.

It may be a wireless set-up but, as usual. wires aren't out of the equation. Both speakers require external power (and thus two power-points within range). Source and Xeo Hub also require a wired connection.

The odd-looking attachment atop each cabinet has a basic dot-light display and tiny buttons to control power and volume. Ultimately, we'd like better integration.

This is a versatile system - almost any source can be hooked up to it, with as many as four able to connect at once. It has optical, coaxial and USB inputs, all of which support high-res audio files up to 24-bit/ 96kHz, plus stereo RCA and 3.5mm inputs.

Roberts Stream 93i Internet radio and music player £150

The Stream 93i also comes with the usual alarm and sleep timer functions

We're impressed with the Roberts Stream 93i from the moment we open the box.

This unit is beautifully put together - a well-engineered product, with substantial weight to back up its desk/counter-top size. It's not the prettiest black box we've ever clapped eyes on, perhaps, but its face, with its clear screen and nicely weighted, tactile buttons, is certainly ready for business.

Much more than a mere radio

The Stream 93i is, basically, an FM/DAB/ internet radio that will also act as a music player, accessing your digital music over a local area network (LAN). You can do this via the wired ethernet socket or the built-in wi-fi. A USB port allows you to play music direct from a memory stick if you don't have LAN capabilities. The usual old-school socketry, in the form of a headphone socket and an auxiliary input, is at the rear.

And, as a final flourish, the 93i also has Spotify Connect built in, so you can use your smartphone or tablet (via wi-fi) to remotely control your Spotify music. That's a pretty comprehensive list of features for your £150, and most certainly decent value for money.

Things really couldn't be much easier during set up - we can't imagine many people struggling. On plugging it into the mains and pushing the power button, a set-up wizard gets to work and pretty much holds your hand through the whole process of accessing your network, scanning the airwaves for signals, and generally getting you up and running with little fuss beyond just the odd twirl of a knob and a selective push or two.

If you do run into difficulties, there's a chunky manual to get you back on track.

Sound lives up to the promise

Things go so well until now for the Stream 93i a stumble seems almost inevitable. But as soon as we start listening to the DAB radio, our worries fade. This radio sounds really good.

Roberts has managed to combine a clear midrange (important for every type of listening, but imperative for voice radio) with a bright - not sharp - treble and surprisingly powerful bass.

It's the bass that impresses most, especially when comparing the 93i with rivals. Precise low notes go properly deep for a relatively small box - the 'subwoofer' at the back of the unit is clearly not just for show. Normally when a small-ish unit has noticeably strong bass the other parts of the frequency range can suffer, to the detriment of the overall experience. With the 93i, however, everything blends to make a really enjoyable listen.



ROBERTS

This Roberts is a really fine machine. It covers all bases for radio and adds useful features. And it sounds excellent

We start with internet radio. If you haven't yet had a dabble, we urge you to take the plunge. Many a happy hour can be spent roaming the dial and picking up stations from, literally, all over the world.

With myriad stations available, it's probably best to take advantage of the Roberts' presets. There are 40 available, so you'll be able to access your most listened-to stations quite quickly. Five are directly available via the buttons on the face; those five and the other 35 are also available via a menu accessed by the select control on the right - it's a twist and push system we find intuitive to use. The same system works for both FM and DAB, so you have 120 presets in total.

We find radio reception exemplary, though we prefer the internet for its options - podcasts, catchup and so on.



It might look like a credit-card style remote, but this is a solid-feeling handset



The music player uses UPnP, and it finds our Naim UnitiServe almost before we'd started looking for it. It won't play high-res files, but can handle MP3, WMA, AAC, FLAC and WAV. The sound matches the tuners' impressive standards.

Spotify Connect is a winner too. With your mobile device on the same network as the 93i, your Spotify playlists are accessible via the radio. The sound quality, however, while perfectly acceptable, isn't up to the radio performance.

This Roberts is a really fine machine. It covers all bases for radio and adds useful features in the form of the music player and Spotify Connect. Most important of all, it sounds excellent for a unit of this size, with a fast, well-rounded bass performance managing to enhance the rest of the frequency range rather than overpower it.



Rega Elex-R | Stereo amplifier | £900 **Elex-R goes straight to the heart**

record It's the fashion for integrated amplifiers to eschew a phono stage, but not this Rega. It's a talented circuit that shines with good turntables.

If you're on the lookout for an upmarket stereo amplifier you certainly shouldn't ignore Rega's Elex-R. It's good enough to shake up a market that's long been dominated by the likes of Cyrus, Roksan and Naim.

THE R

Think of this integrated as a more muscular Brio-R (£480) and you'll be pretty close to the mark. By using the muchadmired Brio-R as a base and adding circuit elements from the unquestionably talented Elicit-R (£1600) into the mix, Rega has created one of the most talented sub-£1000 amplifiers we've heard.

Of sound character

Anyone familiar with Rega's current amplifier range will find the Elex-R's sonic character entirely familiar. It delivers a fast, agile sound that's as rhythmically surefooted as we've heard at this level. Play a piece of music like alt-J's Breezeblocks and the Rega is right at home. It's happy to deliver that thickly layered bassline with power, and has no trouble rendering dynamic shifts or changes of pace with enthusiasm. There's an addictive sense of liveliness and energy, something most rivals tend to tone down in the search for greater refinement.

Tonally, the Rega edges towards leanness, though if partnered with care (avoiding sources and speakers that err too far towards brightness or harshness) all will be fine. We use a range of speakers from Dali's lively Zensor 3s and B&W's 685s right the way to PMC's mighty Twenty 26s and at no point does the Rega fail to shine.

Of course a power output of 72.5-watts per channel into 80hms (Rega likes to be

pretty specific, it seems) isn't enough to make the floor shake in really large rooms, but we think this amplifier is capable of decent levels in most set-ups.

Switching to Tchaikovsky's Marché Slave Op.31 shows this amplifier can keep track of complex instrumental arrangements and can deliver scale with authority when required. We are pleased with the resolution on offer, and at no time is there a sense the Elex-R is overlooking subtleties for the benefit of the bigger picture. We notice, again, that this amplifier is terrific at communicating the drama of the music. It has us hooked from the first note, right through to the end of the piece. With hi-fi this good it's easy for listening sessions to extend well in to the night.

Music is math

Move away from sound and the Rega remains on sure ground (as long as all you want is a traditional stereo amplifier). There are no digital inputs, though we imagine Rega would direct you to its talented DAC for number-crunching duties. Instead you get a good quality MM phono stage, one talented enough to make the most of £1000 turntable packages like, say, Rega's own RP6. It's a relatively quiet circuit, one which keeps all the good sonic points we noted in the line-level stages.

need to add a bit more muscle. That's probably enough for most purist stereo set-ups, though we would have liked a built-in headphone output.

Build quality is as solid as we expect from Rega. Casework is functional rather than luxurious but it's finished neatly. Everything feels like it will last for years. We're disappointed with the remote control though. It lacks the quality we expect at this price, though it works well enough.

The Elex-R is a fine achievement. It's the kind of product that gets straight to the heart of the music. It's up against the likes of Naim's Nait 5si, Cyrus's 6a and Roksan's Kandy K2, but the Rega has enough talent to shine even in such formidable company.

Philips Fidelio E5 | Home cinema system | £600 When three become five

We like the idea of the Philips Fidelio E5. It's a 2.1 stereo set-up that can be transformed into a surround-sound system. How? By detaching the small, wireless speakers from the top of the main fronts and positioning them as rear speakers. The Philips E5 then cleverly switches into surround mode, and voila: you have a 5.1 home cinema system!

Except, of course, it's actually a 4.1 system, with the front speakers creating a virtual centre – a bit like the 'sweet spot' achieved by hi-fi stereo speakers. It's a stylish, fun idea, but does it work?

Stylish presentation

It's a compact, gorgeous-looking system, the soft, grey cloth around the front speakers giving it a luxurious feel. A single cable connects the two speakers; it's long enough to place them on either side of a 50in TV. The slim subwoofer is similarly styled, with the wooden top capping off the modern look. The small 'rear' speakers break up the uniform look with a metal grille instead of the cloth finish, but they're light and sturdily built. They even have leather handles.

Detached, these speakers can last up to a claimed 10 hours on a single charge. Simply slot them back into place on top of the front speakers (they fit together neatly, if a little loosely) when you need to charge them up.

Unlike a traditional 5.1 system, there's no complicated set-up procedure with the Fidelio E5. It does, though, seem strange that there's no way to tell the Philips's processing exactly where we've placed the speakers, so it can optimise the sound quality according to the room environment.

Facing the practicalities

While the design suggests positioning is flexible, in reality it's more complex. To keep the rears at ear-height, you'll need stands, and if you don't have enough space on your TV rack for the front speakers, you're looking at yet another pair of stands. Suddenly this system seems less straightforward than we initially thought.



It doesn't want for connections, though. There are two HDMI inputs, a single HDMI output, single optical and coaxial inputs, and a 3.5mm jack for music players. You can also stream music over Bluetooth (aptX codec) and connect smart devices.

So how does it sound? Punchy, detailed, and easy-going - it's the Philips Fidelio sound that we're well acquainted with.

There's sparkle to the glass-shatters and explosions in *The Amazing Spider-Man 2*, without any hint of excess brightness. Punches have impact, dialogue is easy to follow, and there's a definite sense of surround sound. Flying bits of carnage zoom past you, although it's not as accurate or powerful as a dedicated surround sound package, or even a talented soundbar such as the Yamaha YSP-2500.



It's a clear sound that's easy to listen to. We like this laid-back character, but it does hold the E5 back from expertly delivering the more visceral scenes in a film. Tauter bass would give a more authoritative performance.

The lack of a dedicated centre channel is keenly felt when viewing dialogue-driven films such as *The Grand Budapest Hotel*. Voices hover in the middle, but it's not as solid and nuanced as it could be. There's also the fact that the E5 is only capable of decoding Dolby Digital 5.1, DTS Digital surround and Pro Logic. That takes care of standard surround sound, but with no Dolby TrueHD or DTS-HD Master Audio support, you're missing out on the benefits of HD audio from Blu-ray discs.

The Philips Fidelio starts out as a great idea, but the novelty of the detachable speakers wears off when it comes to practical application. They're beautifully made and their laid-back presentation is easy to get along with, but the £600 price tag demands more, and we can think of packages that do a much better job at similar money - such as Tannoy's HTS-101 (£350) with a suitable amplifier.

SMARTPHONE FIRST TESTS

Nokia Lumia 930 | Smartphone | From free

Nokia is in transition. After four years of being the champion of Microsoft's Windows Phone operating system, Microsoft recently bought the hardware division of Nokia's business. But with its name emblazoned on its colourful back panel, the Lumia 930 is still very much a Nokia phone, and it could be the best Windows Phone yet.

In a market filled with increasingly slimmer phones, the Lumia 930 feels chunky. At 9.8mm thick it's added over a millimetre in bulk from the Lumia 925, and it's pretty heavy too. But in true Nokia style, the build quality is solid. The back panel is plastic but feels nice next to the metallic trim, which has well-placed buttons for volume, power and camera-shutter. Our sample is a striking lime green, but there's orange, black, or white as well.

The Lumia 930 is capable of wireless charging. It's nothing new, the LG G3 can do

The 5in 1080p OLED screen is a delight, with 441ppi that puts it up there as one of the sharpest screens on the market. This shows in its video performance, which is packed with fine detail that gives a tangible feeling of depth to images. Blacks are as deep and inky as we'd expect from an OLED display and whites punchy, with colours reproduced vividly and with strong contrast. They can verge on looking a little overdone at times, but it doesn't take away from a largely superb viewing experience.

Music to go

Music performance isn't quite as strong, but it's still perfectly listenable on the go. It doesn't have the rhythmic drive of the Xperia Z2 or the iPhone 5s, but it's still punchy and engaging. It's a well-balanced presentation, with a deep bass, controlled treble and plenty of detail.

The camera on the Lumia 930 is as good as you expect from a Nokia, with a 20-MP sensor, wide f/2.4 aperture and Carl Zeiss optics. Focus is rapid, while colour and picture are balanced

the same, but the big difference is Nokia includes a wireless charging pad in the box. It's a nice touch.

The Lumia 930 packs Windows Phone 8.1, the most recent update to the operating system. It brings new features that feel somewhat borrowed from the likes of Android and iOS. The biggest, and handiest, addition is the swipe-down notification pane, which holds toggles for things like wi-fi and Bluetooth, plus details on missed calls, messages and emails. There's also a more customisable homescreen.

It looks as good as any Windows Phone, with live tiles constantly changing with information updates. But its biggest problem still remains its app selection.

Play catch-up

Microsoft has managed to play catch-up to some degree and now most of the main apps you'd want - BBC iPlayer, Spotify and Netflix - are available, though some of them are lesser versions of those you can get on Android and iOS. BBC iPlayer doesn't allow downloads, for example, and Spotify isn't as functional as elsewhere.

Games suffer too, and if you're a *Candy Crush Saga* fan you'll have to go cold turkey if you want to go Windows Phone, not to mention deal with older versions of games that have been out on iOS and Android for months. That aside, the Lumia 930 is a lovely phone to use, and dips in and out of apps with all the speed you need. Our biggest problem with the Lumia 930 is file compatibility - we are unable to load our collection of CD rips in WAV or FLAC.

The camera on the Lumia 930 is as good as you'd expect from a Nokia device, with a 20-MP sensor, wide f/2.4 aperture and Carl Zeiss optics. Focus is rapid, pictures are crisp and colours well balanced, and with a good handle on contrast for the most part. There's no HDR mode in the default camera app though, which can make snaps in direct sunlight a little washed out.

In low light we notice a bit of grain starting to creep in, but the dual flash can help with that, and there are plenty of manual options for white balance, shutter speed, ISO and exposure compensation if you want to fiddle around with the settings. Video is captured in 1080p with a range of shutter speeds, with four microphones

Denon Envaya DSB200 | Wireless speaker | £170

A weighty business



Thin treble and non-existent bass. These are two criticisms that often come into play when assessing the merits of portable Bluetooth speakers. Well, the good news is that the Denon Envaya doesn't suffer from either of these problems.

In fact, you spend the first few minutes of life with the Envaya reeling from just how much bass it produces. Play Rudimental's *Waiting All Night* and bassheads will be pleased with the way the speaker powers through the song, bringing a solid sense of weight and depth to the pounding bassline. There's a good sense of scale and authority. The bad news is that these low frequencies have a tendency to sound overblown and overbearing. As well as becoming distracting over time, the amount of bass produced by the Denon upsets the balance of the speaker and robs the music of some of its clarity.

In detail

Clear controls The aux selector, Bluetooth initiator, NFC sensor and volume buttons sit above an 'on' light around the Denon logo On the plus side, highs sound anything but bright. They're actually smooth and rounded, which helps them gloss over the jagged edges of poorer-quality recordings. Even so, there's still enough life and vibrancy in the percussion and piano during Tom Odell's *Sirens* to spark your interest. But even here, the edges of bass notes tend to butt in when they're not needed. The more you listen, the more you think the Denon could show a little more care with delicate, demanding music.

It's a shame, because the Denon's an attractive design and a nice thing to use. Solidly built, the Envaya is available in black or white. The metal grille unclips, and you can switch the fabric cover beneath for one of four different colours that come with the speaker. We think charging £20 for an optional carry case is a little steep, though.

Designed for (an easy) life

The Envaya isn't short of other useful design quirks and features. Squeeze the rear edge of the speaker and a kick-stand pops out. It's neatly integrated and the angle is such that it helps keep the speaker firmly planted.

A line-up of large, chunky buttons on top gives you all the basic controls - hold down the button with the Bluetooth symbol to start the pairing process or tap an NFC-enabled device onto the NFC logo on top of the speaker to speed things up. The Denon is aptX compatible too, so you can

use it with HTC One (M8)

The HTC's NFC connectivity means a quick tap on top of the Denon and you're ready to stream music using aptX Bluetooth.



take advantage of higher-quality Bluetooth streams from compatible smartphones such as the HTC One M8 and Samsung Galaxy S5.

Charge in, charge out

A full charge takes around two and a half hours (there's a small indicator on top of the speaker) and this is good for around 10 hours of playback. If your smartphone's running low on juice you can use the USB socket on the side of the speaker to draw on the internal battery and help top it up.

Out of the box, the Denon really makes its mark: this is one of the most powerfulsounding portable speakers we've heard at the money. But we'd sacrifice some of that bass weight for a more balanced delivery.

IFA 2014: All the news from Berlin

We report on the latest trends from Europe's biggest electronics show...



erlin has once again been the European stage on which some of the world's leading hi-fi and home cinema brands have revealed their latest products and the trends out to grab our attention this autumn.

The resolution will be televised

We start with the TV, which we saw last month was enjoying a renaissance amid a rise in online video streaming - and one of the driving forces is Ultra HD 4K.

While 4K TV may be going strong, the same cannot be said for plasma. It seems that now Korean giant LG is poised to join its rivals and call time on the technology.

And LG was behind one of the showstopping sets of IFA, partnering with Swarovski to unveil its curved 4K OLED TV complete with 460 crystals and a 98in Ultra HD 8K set as well.

Not to be outdone by the firm it locked horns with at CES, Samsung introduced its bendable 105in curved TV to wow visitors. And that's not to leave out the 4K TV ranges Toshiba, Panasonic, Loewe and Philips also announced, not to mention talk of Sony's 4K content.

Hi-fi at home or on the go

Wireless audio has been firmly among the main AV trends this year, with new streaming solutions from a Vinuleia host of companies at IFA 2014. From Harman Kardon and Monster's first cracks at the multi-room market, through the Flexson digital VinylPlay turntable that can be used in tandem with Sonos, to the WiSound technology aiming to improve wireless-speaker sound quality, the variety of solutions on show looks really impressive.

But traditional hi-fi showed it's not about to be consigned to the cloud - and there's no finer example than the revival of the Technics brand, which showed some tasty new high-end kit.

Not only was there high-end product, but high-res too. Onkyo unveiled its first 24-bit/192kHz streaming CD player and Sony also reaffirmed its commitment to high-res audio with new products like the PHA-3AC headphone amplifier.

32IN TELEVISIONS SUPERTEST

With 32in TVs getting smarter all the time in both design and features, and with some models priced as low as £200, it might well be time to find just the right one for you...

Significant

his time last year, a good 32in smart TV for £200 was unheard of. Now we have two in this test from price-competitive TV brands Polaroid and Finlux. Alongside them, five pricier models (ranging up to £460) from Panasonic, Philips, Samsung, Sony and Toshiba battle it out for a place in your living room, on your bedroom dresser or kitchen tabletop.

All have smart portals (with BBC iPlayer, Netflix and YouTube at their heart), digital Freeview HD tuners and wi-fi capability, while some feature fancy interfaces and additional catch-up, music and movie streaming services. One includes a smart remote; one supports 3D; one even has a built-in DVD player.

While features are fast developing, screen resolution seems to have back-pedalled from Full HD (1920 x 1080) to HD Ready (1366 x 768) this year. The lower-res screens dominate this test, with Full HD panels appearing on only the two more expensive models. But when we look at the overall package, which ones prove their worth? Read on to find out... What's on test



Smart features, a decent picture, a slim, attractive design and ample connections all for just £200? Yes please. Last year, getting your hands on a smart TV for this giveaway price was merely a pipe dream.

Now Finlux - which made quite a name for itself last year with its bargain TV deals - has slashed £80 off the price of its 32in entry screen. On paper, the spec has suffered for it, the TV losing the Full HD resolution (1920 x 1080) of last year's models for an 'HD Ready' (1366 x 768) substitute. It doesn't wave goodbye to Blu-rays or HD channels though: the screen simply crams (or, technically speaking, downscales) the higherresolution content into the lower-res panel. How does it do? In short, great.

It would be easy to pick faults with the Finlux's performance against the leading 32in models, but bearing in mind it's around half their price, it does well.

Convincing colours

Load mildly futuristic romance *Her* on Blu-ray and, as well as producing a startlingly crisp picture, the Finlux complements the film's aesthetic palette; the set's rich, vibrant hues make the most of the pops of colour that appear against the backdrop of a largely pale-toned New York. You don't get the depth or punch offered by the Sony or Philips, but colours are still convincing. Contrast is just as striking, too, with blacks inky deep, and whites clean and pure, although reaching that result takes some picture tweaking.

Our only qualm is with the picture's insight. At a cursory glance, detail seems fine, but colours could do with a touch more refinement and subtlety. Motion can trigger flicker, too. Though infrequent, it's noticeable as the camera pans quickly down a tower block.

Remote handset



This remote – used across Finlux's 2014 range – measures over half the height of the TV itself! Netflix, YouTube and browser shortcuts are easy to spot though and the layout is easy enough to master.

Swap in *Dirty Harry* on DVD and the Finlux proves a good upscaler. Its well-defined image has precise lines and punchy colours, although background detail is sometimes lost in the shadows. Performance with broadcast TV, shows the same traits. The Finlux's sound is uninspiring, so you might find it pays to spend more for the better-sounding Panasonic TX-32AS500B (opposite).

Featuring three HDMI and two USB inputs, as well as other legacy inputs such as scart), the Finlux isn't stingy on connections. There's a LAN socket, too, for a wired connection to a home network. To connect wirelessly, plug the supplied dongle into one of the screen's USB inputs. Just as with many of its pricier rivals you can connect a USB hard drive, pause live broadcasts, and record.

Much appreciated

We don't take smart features for granted at this price, so are grateful for the commonplace BBC iPlayer, Netflix and YouTube apps, as well as musicstreaming service Deezer.

While the Finlux's familiar interface is basic, using it is a breeze. The go-to page for online services is comprehensible, grid-formatted and usefully keeps the TV viewing screen in a preview box above tabs for Facebook and Twitter.

While its shortcomings don't go unnoticed (the absence of a fifth star sees to that) there's no question of the Finlux's cracking value for money. Got a £200 budget? Go for it.

Panasonic TX-32AS500B £300 ****

Our last issue witnessed the 42in from Panasonic's entry-ranging AS500B Series receive a respectable four stars, and now the range's baby TV steps up to the plate.

If wall-mounting this TV, bear in mind that the majority of connections - which comprise two HDMI, RGB scart and component/composite inputs, as well as analogue and optical outputs - are on the TV's back panel, with only a single USB input and headphone output on the easily accessible side panel.

You don't get the whole shebang of features found on Panasonic's bigger screens (after all, this model is quite far down the company's 2014 line-up), but its list is nothing to sneeze at.

Apps aplenty

Connecting to a home network via a wired or wireless connection is an open door to the big three online apps (BBC iPlayer, Netflix, YouTube), as well as a prolific 'app market' where you'll find a host of add-on apps. What's more, Panasonic's TV Remote 2 app (see panel) enables the use of Swipe & Share, which can beam a smartphone's pictures, videos and music to the big screen. The physical remote is easy to get to grips with too.

Last but not least, Remote Sharing allows video memos and text messages to be sent from an Apple or Android smartphone to a compatible Viera TV. We're big fans of Panasonic's My Home Screen portal. With a highly customizable home screen, moveable apps and everything logically boxed-out, it's both foolproof and fun.

For £300, it's not wholly surprising that resolution falls short of the Full HD figure. Its 1366 x 768 (or, in other words, 'HD ready') panel lies between high- and standard-definition, meaning the set has to downscale or upscale almost

For a mobile app, it's all there: a touchpad, shortcuts to individual apps, remote-control functions and keyboard. Response time is speedy too, though navigating the numerous pages can be long-winded.

everything it plays. But if it's done well, it shouldn't be an issue.

We test its downscaling ability first with *American Hustle* on Blu-ray and it has our attention from the outset. Its razor-sharp picture is packed with detail and punchy, vibrant colour. Slightly tempering down the exaggerated out-of-the-box colour palette using a THX Optimizer disc and changing colour temperature to 'cool' brings a more natural balance.

Yet even after toying with contrast and brightness, darker shades are often blacked out; the Sony KDL-32W70B and Samsung UE32H6400 bring out colours more accurately and add a bit more subtlety and naturalness, too.

The colour purple

As the TV upscales *The Grand Budapest Hotel* DVD, it makes the most of the film's colourful aesthetics - the purple of the lobby boy's coat looks deep and rich. The picture is both sharp and detailed too, and there's not so much of a motion blur as sleds pelt down the snowy hills. The Freeview tuner keeps up its end too.

The Pana's frame may be slim and lightweight, but sound doesn't give that away. In fact, we have few complaints. The Samsung has a richer delivery, but sound is generally weighty and clear.

The Panasonic does a lot - and does it well. It may not produce the most subtle or natural picture on the market, but for a price that doesn't cost the earth it's certainly worth a punt.

Philips 32PHT4509/12 £280 ****

Finally, a 2014 Philips TV that does standard-definition well! The company's Full HD line-up has struggled to win our good word when it comes to upscaling DVD-quality content, but this 32in LED from the 4000 Series bucks the trend.

Does that have something to do with its HD Ready-only panel (its 1366 x 768 resolution being much nearer to standard definition's than Full HD screens are)? Possibly. But while resolution may be lower than on some rivals, the set's wallet-friendly £280 gets vou an awful lot when it comes to features and performance.

Functionality over aesthetics

Design is not much of a talking point, mind. Its light, super-slim build is practical, yet very basic. The remote in-line with the range - is cheap-looking, has rubbery buttons and a flat body that's not particularly nice to hold. The buttons are well spread out, though.

With essentials such as BBC iPlayer. Netflix. YouTube and Facebook joining Spotify, Blinkbox and more, the Philips certainly isn't shy on apps. Skype is also installed, though you'll need to purchase Philips' TV camera to benefit.

An internet connection is necessary and that's where an Ethernet cable comes in handy - the TV is only 'wi-fi ready' so Philips' USB Wireless Adapter

(£27) is essential to make going online a wire-free affair. The adapter will take up one of the TV's two USB slots, which accompany two HDMI, a scart and component inputs, as well as one digital and headphone output apiece.

The interface isn't flashy and customizable like some, but the screen-wide home menu does the trick. Menus could be more user-friendly; it's often a long journey to get from A to

Z. And be warned that the TV picture is completely replaced by the screenhogging EPG when loaded.

Sci-fi drama Transcendence on Blu-ray reveals the TV's downscaler as capable. The sharp, clear picture is instantly watchable and detail is abundant. Properly adjusted, colours are punchy and full-bodied, the futuristic computer's flashy lights appearing accurately intense.

That said, the Philips lacks the subtlety of the best screens. The Sony KDL-32W706B burrows further into the film's picture, taking more care to

uncover the finer details and tonal variations of lab machinery.

Load up Star Trek Into Darkness on DVD and it seems only a little less sharp than the high-definition picture. Detail remains sky-high, and colours are true and deep. And as the camera jumps around to keep up with Spock and Khan's fight, the picture remains stable.

Broadcast quality

The Freeview tuner keeps its end up, too. Flick between the standard and HD BBC Two channels as they air the European Athletics Championships and it's a punchy picture on both. It's not the subtlest, but enough detail shines through to keep you watching.

Apart from its shortage of subtlety and a few gripes with sound (it's a bit on the shrill side), the Philips has a lot going for it. For a mere £280, an insightful, refined picture and selection of smarts aren't qualities to be ignored.

Polaroid 3-32-LED-14 £200 ****

Polaroid is quickly becoming hot on our bargain TV brand list. After its dirt-cheap 42in 5-42-LED-14 flew out of a packed test with four stars, the instantfilm camera company returns to repeat history with its 32in HD Ready set.

At a friendly £200 (Polaroid TVs are sold exclusively at ASDA supermarkets in the UK), it's easy to match up against the Finlux 32H8075-T (£200), and the similarities don't end with price.

Familiar and functional

The gold-on-black horizontal strip menu we've seen on Finlux sets features here, in addition to a blue single-page portal where you can access the usual online services (BBC iPlayer, Netflix, YouTube), your social media (Facebook and Twitter) accounts; and an 'app market'.

The no-nonsense interface gets the important things right: simplicity and ease of use. Tabs and apps are coherently spaced-out and clearly labelled.

A supplied USB dongle grants the Polaroid wi-fi. though a LAN input allows for a wired connection via an ethernet cable too. Three HDMI, two USB, a scart and PC inputs are also on board, as well as a coaxial output.

It's all very well being able to tick the boxes marked 'features' and 'interface', but picture performance needs to impress. And it does.

Load up the latest Jean-Claude Van Damme action thriller. Enemies Closer. on Blu-ray and the picture is crisp and clear as we enter the film's wooded setting. Cabin floorboards are sharply outlined, and details in the panels' varying patterns are laid bare.

Colours appear strong and punchy, too, as the greens of the forest and reds of the drug cartel's jackets litter the screen. Inevitably, hues aren't as deep or

rich as those produced on the best (and pricier) sets. but we're fans of the Polaroid's convincing delivery and even tone.

Fresh from the box, there's a slight issue with factory settings that cause unwanted glare on faces. Run the telly through a THX Optimiser test - finetuning brightness and contrast along the way - and that dies down nicely. As a result, contrast is good. Night-time backgrounds are appropriately pitch black while whites have pop, though nuances in shades can be soft-pedalled.

The Polaroid misses the Finlux's natural-looking picture warmth, so skin can look a little pale at times. We'd keep colour temperature to 'Normal'. Motion isn't an issue, mind: forest flights are two a penny in the film, and the set stays blur-free.

Switch to broadcast programming and the set's Freeview HD tuner livens up daytime TV with bright, vivid colours. There's a slightly overcooked delivery but the picture's punch, sharpness and detail make it a satisfying watch - even with standard-definition programmes. Sound is relatively thin and hard though.

Ask yourself, do you feel lucky?

We still feel lucky to get 32in smart tellies for just £200, but when they have a decent picture, the value factor really hits home. This Polaroid's sound and design are less inspiring than its picture, but it's certainly worth the boot-space among your weekly groceries.

Samsung UE32H6400 £460 *****

Samsung is taking the TV world by storm this year, one set at a time, and this 32in LED from the 6 Series is the latest screen to carry the torch.

The UE32H6400 has all the assets of its big brother (the UE40H6400): a natural, detailed picture, wealth of features and smooth interface - but in a smaller package. The only problem is price. At £460, it's the most expensive set of this size we've come across. You can pick up a 40in five-star set - Sony's KDL-40W605B, for example - for less If your budget allows it, however, then this is the best performer of the lot.

Hats off to HD capability

A generous three USB ports are included along with RGB scart, component and audio inputs, as well as optical and headphone outputs. It's one of the four HDMI inputs, however, we use to plug in our reference Panasonic Blu-ray player and view *Dallas Buyers Club*.

Unlike many (albeit cheaper) rivals at this size, the Samsung boasts a Full HD panel, meaning it doesn't have to downscale high-def content. So it should produce good results - and it does. Sharp and crisp, the folds in Matthew McConaughey's hospital bed pillow and the shading of his cowboy hat are apparent. Depth is good too, and though rich and concentrated, colours remain natural and lifelike. Skin tones are both realistic and warm, while blacks are solid and whites punchy.

There's no blip when it comes to upscaling, either: the Samsung does a great job with DVDs. The dip in quality from Blu-ray is small in images in *The Lord of the Rings: The Two Towers*, while there's no dip in broadcast TV either.

Despite having to upscale more than the 'HD Ready' competition (Panasonic

and Philips, for example) the picture is just as impressive and colours are striking. 3D is understandably rare at this level, so we're surprised to see it in the specs, but it is decent. *Harry Potter and the Deathly Hallows: Part 1* (on 3D Blu-ray) comes to life and the effect is smooth and stable. It doesn't suffer from the lack of brightness common in 3D.

The Samsung has a surprisingly rich, weighty sound - it sets the benchmark for a TV its size. Wind atop the high hills in *LOTR* has plenty of detail, for example, and the Samsung can go loud. Netflix, YouTube and a web browser join a full set of catch-up services (BBC iPlayer, ITV Player, 4oD and 5 On Demand), as well as BFI Player, Spotify and Eurosport Player for streaming on a seamless, well thought-out interface.

A smart remote is supplied as a neat addition to the traditional one. The pebble-shaped tool sits comfortably in the hand and impresses with its accurate pointer and voice commands, but we find the standard controller (which can be set up as a universal remote for your other AV components) the better option.

Samsung's signature glossy-black bezel is here, while the company's trademark metal stand is good support; it extends front and back, though, so consider your table top dimensions.

The Samsung has everything, but price could be a sticking point. Yet this 32in is a class leader in picture and sound quality and if your budget suits, then it should be on your shopping list.

Sony has found it hard to secure a five-star verdict for its TVs in 2014; only the 40in KDL-40W605B managed it, and that was recently. Now this 32in looks to follow in its footsteps.

Unlike some of its lower-resolution rivals, this baby screen has a Full HD panel, and every bit of its 1920 x 1080-resolution panel shines.

Five minutes into star-studded war film *The Monuments Men* on Blu-ray it's clear the TV is just as skilled as its bigger, pricier sibling. Sharp, refined edges clearly define the opening images of opulent paintings and grand government buildings, and a rich, punchy colour palette produces solid reds in Nazi flags.

Natural ingredients

Delivering naturalness is the Sony's real forte. Its even-handed tone accurately conveys the khaki colour of war attire, while skin tones bear realistic warmth. Its stark contrast is worth saluting too: the blackness of army truck tyres is arresting, and the snow-covered woods are Essex-smile white, without glossing over the subtle gradations of shade that define the mud footprints within them.

When it comes to detail, the Sony is all over it. The neat folds in military uniforms are full of intricate shading, and low-light conditions bring little deterioration of clarity. As you might expect for £110 more, the Samsung UE32H6400 unveils the finer strokes of Bob Balaban's moustache a touch better. Its improvements are small though, and struggle to fully justify the Samsung's much higher price.

The Sony delivers with its standarddefinition performance too. Whether it's broadcast channels or a *Die Hard 2* DVD, the picture bears impressive definition and neutral balance.



Sony SideView app

The SideView app complements basic controls with a well developed EPG, direct shortcuts and a programme-record function. Colourful and easy to use, it's a worthy alternative to the traditional tool.

The Sony's sound is better than the usual flatscreen quality. It doesn't have quite the body or dynamic aptitude of the Samsung, but it's close. The set looks good, too. Its narrow, tapered bezel wears an elegant, sparkly metallic finish, although it's also available in black.

Connections are generous for the price. Consistent with models way up Sony's Full HD line-up, there are four HDMIs - one is an ARC channel - and two USB inputs, plus scart, component and audio phono inputs as well as an optical and headphone output. The remote is the same ship-shape tool as used across the 2014 range and, though a Smart remote is nowhere to be seen here, Sony's brilliant TVSideView app (see panel) is compatible.

Land of plenty

There's no shortage of online services on Sony's Entertainment Network (SEN). BBC iPlayer, Netflix, Amazon Instant Video, Demand5 and YouTube are the pick of a very broad bunch.

We're big fans of Sony's One-Flick Entertainment user interface, which we think betters last year's XrossMediaBar design. Its multi-page portal is intuitive and easily personalised.

This Sony is the full works: fine picture, eye-catching design and seamless interface. In absolute terms it might not have the most accomplished 32in picture money can buy - the Samsung sees to that - but a nice price puts it at the top of our wish-list.

Toshiba 32D3454DB €300 ★★★☆☆

There's more than one reason this Toshiba LED TV might catch your eye in the 32in crowd: it comes in white (available in black too), it has a built-in DVD player, and it costs £300.

Other features are decent for the price, too, with essential smarts like Netflix, YouTube, BBC iPlayer and a web browser accompanying extra apps like musicstreaming service Deezer. Simply connect the telly to your home network over its integrated wi-fi - or directly via ethernet - and you're away.

It's well-equipped for external sources: two HDMI inputs, a scart and PC input, and a coaxial output in a small area on the back panel. USB, component and composite inputs are easily accessible on the unit's side. Underneath, a group of buttons for input, volume and channel prove handy.

Not so hidden depth

The matte-white plastic bezel (curved at the corners) is eye-catching and a nice finish. It's not the skinniest TV, but the cumbersome, slot-loading DVD player justifies its 9cm depth. Despite its relatively bulky backside (some rivals are just half the depth), it sits securely on the supplied base.

The remote feels and looks a bit cheap, though, and its tall, thin body means you can't reach all the keys with one grip. With a panel resolution of 1366 x 768, the Toshiba is 'only' HD ready (not Full HD like some of its pricier rivals). And though performance is good, price-matching rivals do better.

We load *The Raid* 2 on Blu-ray and the picture is crisp. Colours are balanced, albeit not as rich as some rivals. In comparison with the rival Philips 32PHT4509, the Toshiba can't quite produce the same depth of colour when

the film's title splashes up against the red background. The punchiness of the white bold lettering is inferior as well.

The Toshiba struggles with subtlety, too: detail in our martial arts hero's cut, muddied face is marked, though scars are often overdone. Contrast is fair, though, while black depth is admirable and whites are convincing. Even in the breakneck fight scenes, the picture stays composed. Meanwhile, the Toshiba's upscaling of *Top Gear* in standard-def is perfectly watchable, if not the sharpest. The integrated DVD player (which can play CDs too) can be found on the right-hand side of the TV along with general playback buttons, though keys at the bottom of the remote are handier.

Play Star Wars: Return of the Jedi on DVD and its sharp, reasonably detailed picture is watchable. Colours are a bit overcooked, though. Switching back to our Panasonic DMP-BDT260 DVD player emphasises the Toshiba's weaknesses.

Sound is sufficiently detailed through the TV's twin 6W speakers, but can't disguise its brittle delivery. Dialogue on daytime TV is OK but when things get frantic, it's hard on the ears.

If convenience is key, and you're after a competitively priced one-box solution to save on an extra DVD player or Freeview box taking up space, then this Toshiba is a versatile option. But if you're willing to forgo this, there are better performers out there for the price. Or cheaper (for example, the Philips 32PHT4509). It's your call.



THE WINNER

Sony KDL-32W706B £350 ********

> Not for the first time, this contest quickly developed into a two-horse race between pedigree brands. Both runners revealed their fine breeding, but the superior value of the **Sony KDL-32W706B** secures the win

ony versus Samsung - that's where we find ourselves (once again) as we whittle our *Supertest* down to the best two. So far this year these two TV giants have mirrored a Harry Potter/Draco Malfoy rivalry, a McEnroe/ Borg head-to-head.

A similar scenario defined the battle of the 40-42in screens fought in our last issue. That time, the Sony came out on top with price on its side. As if this test had been cut from the same cloth, the Sony's value clinches it again.

It has everything you need: a deeply rich, detailed picture with a treasure-trove of smarts, refined interface and solid sound. It even looks the part. For £350, we wouldn't think twice.

The only other Full HD set - and coincidentally the only other five-star model in this test- is the Samsung. Though ultimately we find its price a bit steep, it delivers the best picture of the lot, having a smidgen more insight and richness than the Sony, not to mention a jazzy interface, weighty sound and, uniquely, 3D support too. Got £460 lying around? Go on, treat yourself. Heading to the opposite end of the price spectrum, our budget entries follow up the leading pair with a solid selection of four-star verdicts. Those looking for a cheap second (or even third or fourth) telly are in luck.

THIN.

Budget bargains

Confirming that Polaroid is in a groove, the 3-32-LED-14 is another success story for the company, its clear, punchy picture and essential smarts a no-brainer at the price.

Similarly, in fine Finlux fashion, the 32H8075-T gets our performance-per-pound bells ringing with a rich, well-defined presentation and easy-to-use interface. Forgive the thin sound delivery in each case, and both are good buys for a very reasonable £200.

Also nicely priced, the Panasonic and Philips offerings bask in four stars apiece too. Panasonic continues its consistent year with the TX-32AS500B. This screen's vivid hues are a pleasure (as is its user-friendly interface), but a lack of subtlety and accuracy with dark colours keeps it from shining above the rest. And we're relieved to find the Philips screen competent with both high- and standarddefinition content (we haven't been able to say that of all the company's sets this year).

The fact that buyers will need a separate USB adapter to secure a wireless internet connection is a bit stingy on Philips' part, but the telly's startlingly sharp, detailed picture and pleasing price make up for it.

A built-in player - but not a winner

Finally we get to the Toshiba - the test's only three-star TV. Toshiba has had a tough year, its TVs' performance not quite up to that of the cut-throat competition. The company's bonus built-in DVD player stands it in good stead feature-wise, though a lack of picture subtlety and brittle sound secure its fate.

And there you have it - two great tellies, four good ones and one that doesn't quite cut it. There's plenty of talent here to bless multiple rooms of the house with a different screen, but if you've only got the space and budget for one, the Sony should be your prime pick.

Nearly £2000 may seem a high price to pay for a relatively small box, but it really is a case of getting what you pay for. Superb build quality: check. Beautiful finishes: check. Sensational sound quality: check. We're pitching the Award-wining PMC Twenty 22s against the five-star Dali Rubicon 2s and brand-new, never-beforereviewed contenders from Bowers & Wilkins and Spendor. This test is definitely going to separate the men from the boys...

Bowers & Wilkins CM6 S2 £1500 ****

Bowers & Wilkins

The Bowers & Wilkins CM range has a huge worldwide following, so the launch of the second generation of the range is big news - and the CM6 S2s are the first pair we've had the pleasure of listening to in our test rooms.

In hand, they're impressive. Ask someone to guess the most expensive model in this test and fingers are likely to point straight at the B&Ws. It's easy to see why. The glossy-black exterior oozes quality and contrasts well with the trademark woven kevlar mid/bass driver. The front of each speaker is very clean-cut with not a screw in sight. The specially designed stands feel suitably robust and match the speaker's premium finish (although they do cost an extra £300). Even the little Bowers & Wilkins badges look high quality.

Tweet talk

The most obvious talking point, though, is the B&W tweeter, which sits in its own enclosure on top of the cabinet. This arrangement can already be found on its premium 800 Diamond series. B&W claims mounting it separately improves imaging and dispersion.

The entire assembly sits on a soft, gel-like material to isolate it from cabinet vibrations, while a super-thin aluminium ring reinforces the main The glossy-black exterior of the B&W CM6 S2s oozes quality and contrasts well with the trademark woven kevlar mid/bass driver

tweeter diaphragm. B&W believes this extra stiffness delivers a cleaner sound.

alt-J's *Breezeblocks* is a complex track, and the B&Ws do a great job of controlling and positioning all the different elements. They work well at higher volumes - the tune's quirky vocal sounds distinct, while the ding of the percussion sounds elevated and out in the open. The sound is projected so well that it's hard to locate the speaker cabinet when we have our eyes closed.

Low frequencies sound robust and solid. The speakers do a fine job of separating the individual notes during *Breezeblock's* staggered bassline, giving each individual hit great impact. In fact, this level of bass definition makes the Dali Rubicon 2s sound a tad tubby.

Where the B&Ws don't quite convince is in the realm of dynamics. Yes, you can hear that authority and solidity, and they're more than capable of going loud (they actually perform better at higher volumes), but the way they deliver low-level dynamic shifts isn't quite as graceful as the best of their rivals. Play something that requires a more careful and considered approach, such as Nick Cave's *Mermaids*, and the CM6s have the arrangement down to a tee - Cave takes centre stage and there's plenty of detail among guitars, percussion and backing vocals. But the B&Ws don't really get across the fluid, carefree nature of the track. You don't feel as involved or moved by the music as you do when listening to the PMC Twenty 22s or Dali Rubicon 2s.

The CM6 S2s are good speakers. Built to impress, they sound impressive on a number of levels. They just struggle to communicate dynamics and subtlety, preventing us falling for them entirely.

Dali Rubicon 2 £1600 *****

Dali doesn't seem to know how to make an ugly speaker. The company's budget offerings always look and feel beautifully made, and at this price, the Rubicon 2s take things to another level. They may be one of the less expensive options, but they don't look it.

The Rubicon 2s are available in four finishes: high-gloss black, high-gloss white, Rosso or Walnut (pictured here). Each cabinet boasts a subtle curve both front and back, which adds to their elegant appearance. Like the B&W CM6 S2s, the Dalis feature a rear bass port but unlike them you will only find terminals for single-wire speaker cable. For those interested in the fine details, the Rubicon 2's driver configuration uses the same 29mm soft-dome tweeter found in the company's high-end Epicon range of speakers, twinned with a 16.5cm wood-fibre mid/bass driver.

Play in their best position

Getting the Dalis into their best position requires a little care. Tightly hugging a rear wall, you will encourage boomy, ill-disciplined bass - give them around 30cm or more as a space and they will be fine. Excellent dispersion comes as part of the package, so parking them front-on to your listening position is fine.

Dalis is their dexterity and speed. There's real agility and nimbleness to the sound which we like right away. The xx's *Chained* rolls along and the Dali's never skip a beat. There's urgency and subtlety in equal measure. The midrange sounds wonderfully rich and warm.

Explosive performance

Vocals have a softness and smoothness that entices you to listen for longer. As the track switches between male and female leads, you can clearly hear the differences in level and dynamics. The Rubicons bring plenty of texture and insight.

Switch to some rough and ready rock courtesy of Metallica's *One* and the Dalis are more than happy to oblige. They conjure up a proper sensation of being in the heat of battle during the explosive intro to the epic song.

Gunfire and explosions all leave their mark on the soundstage, before the bass riff kicks in. Next comes the crashing and bashing of Lars Ulrich's drum kit. The Rubicon 2s knit the various elements together, so as a whole, it all makes perfect sense.

Such is the fun factor offered by the Dalis, it's hard to lay too much criticism at their door. Lows sound tighter and better defined on the PMCs and B&Ws. The Dalis can sound a little bit tubby and imprecise in a direct comparison. We'd also suggest giving bright electronics a swerve - an amp with some weight will serve the Dalis better.

Overall, though, these Rubicon 2s are exciting and rewarding speakers with bags of charm. In our opinion, their likeable, enthusiastic delivery is enough to guarantee a serious audition at the very least.

PMC Twenty 22 £1970 ********

The PMC Twenty 22s are current Award-winners, and the three other speakers in this test are all relatively new to the scene - so it's time to see exactly what the PMCs are made of.

When it comes to writing a review we're always looking for an angle, and the PMCs provide us with one. Quite literally. As you can see from the photograph, there's a slight rearward slope on the cabinet's front and back panels. These not only give the speakers a distinctive look , but also help cabinet rigidity and reduce the build-up of internal standing waves.

As with the B&W CM6 S2s and

speaker, which takes the rearward output of the mid/bass driver and absorbs all but the lowest frequencies. These frequencies are then released through the rectangular grille at the front. They exit, and add to the forward output of the driver - PMC thinks this is the best way to get low-distortion bass.

Explicit manner

And the 22s don't mess about - the amount of bass weight and power they produce is impressive. There's detail and depth, yet their lows are still agile enough to integrate well with a very explicit and emotive midrange. The sum of all these individually excellent parts is a really cohesive sound.

These PMC speakers do it all. They have the scale and power to do Carmina Burana justice, but they're able to do so while keeping an even and relatively neutral tonal stance. Individual instruments sound convincing and balanced.

Intimacy isn't an issue either, and music such as Sam Smith's acoustic

version of *Latch* is handled with a great amount of finesse. The Twenty 22s' sense of insight, low-level dynamics and ability to communicate and engage with the listener make them a real force to be reckoned with. Sam's vocal sounds expressive and forlorn, while the speakers also capture the delicacy of the piano, and sadness and vulnerability of the strings, as they ebb and flow in the background.

The PMCs are a finessed, exciting listen, impressive across multiple music genres. These are all the signs of a quality speaker and a reminder that the 22s won't be giving up their class-leading crown without a fight.

Spendor D1 £1795 *****

Spendor's D-Line of speakers currently boasts a perfect record in *What Hi-Fi? Sound and Vision*. The D7 is a five-star floorstander, and was the sole model in the range until the announcement of the pint-sized D1. Can these new Spendors extend the record?

Next to rivals, the Spendors give the impression of a featherweight boxer who took a wrong turn and stumbled into a heavyweight bout. The fit and finish of the D1 is superb, but the size difference is apparent. We wouldn't be surprised if you could fit both Spendors inside one PMC Twenty 22 cabinet.

Blessing in the size

But size isn't everything, and their compact dimensions will be a blessing for those where space is at a premium. Being a sealed cabinet, they're also less fussy about positioning than the Dalis and B&Ws, although we'd still stop short of pushing them up against a rear wall.

Spendor gives you the option to buy its own speaker stands: £595 seems steep, but we couldn't find an alternative to allow the DIs to sound better. Spendor claims the novel tweeter design (which positions a very thin micro-foil in front of the dome) actually evens out the tweeter output over a wide frequency range, and helps to aid dispersion. And

this is one of the areas where the DIs score highly. Highs sound open, crisp and immediate, and if definition and analysis are high on your list of priorities you won't be disappointed. Leading edges and lines of notes are well etched.

Lows don't sound especially weighty and nor do these D1s go as deep as some rivals. The small cabinet does have a large say in what goes on further down the frequency range and bassheads aren't going to be satisfied, but it isn't all bad news. Clear and clean bass is the order of the day here. Play Paul Simon's *You Can Call Me A1* and there's no sluggishness. It's taut and precise.

But for all this precision, the Spendors don't really capture the essence of the track. And we're not talking about the fact the Spendors don't go as loud as some rivals, nor is it purely down to a lack of bass weight. It's a deeper-rooted issue: it feels like you're not quite getting the full picture in terms of dynamics. There's a lack of excitement to the song, and before you know it the track passes you by. Switch to *Earth*, from the *Gladiator* OST, and the sweeping mid and upper frequencies just don't have the impact as when heard through the likes of the PMC Twenty 22s. The shift in dynamics as the tune sways back and forth is more apparent elsewhere in this test. You can counter this to a degree by taking care over partnering: the solidity and weight of an amp like the Roksan Caspian M2 makes good sense. Partner this with the D1s and you inject more body. But they still aren't perfect.

The D1s are dainty and detailed speakers, but they're hampered by a lack of dynamics. Add in their relatively high price and we can't help but feel a little disappointed.

They're the kind of speaker that makes you want to sit down and listen to a CD in its entirety. If a speaker keeps you coming back for more, then that's a foundation for a long listening relationship

The PMC's wonderful blend of detail, agility, and high/low-level dynamics serenade you in a way their closest rivals simply can't match. The Dali Rubicon 2s should be thought of as free spirits of the speaker world. Their agile, nimble character encourages a fluid and richly textured sound. They're seriously entertaining and easy to listen to. A great alternative to the PMCs.

PMO

The B&W CM6 S2s arguably might sound more robust, and sure of themselves but they lack a little flexibility and subtlety. They don't sound quite as at ease as the PMCs. The Spendor D1s didn't really shine in the way we hoped for. Sure, they're small, discreet and will suit smaller spaces. They also produce a lot of detail. But in an attempt to squeeze out every last morsel of information, it seems the D1s have been stripped of natural warmth.



Smooth but punchy

Play the *Pacific Rim* Blu-ray and the W1070+ delivers a richly detailed, silky smooth and wonderfully punchy picture. Its vibrant colour palette has no trouble tackling the film's myriad colours with aplomb. Vivid reds could do with a touch more subtlety and skintones could be shaded more realistically, but overall it's an enjoyable picture.

That picture is clear and crisply drawn too, with a good sense of depth to films. The W1070+ also manages to discern dark objects against shadowy backgrounds without compromising on fine detail.

It's also a smooth picture, with no hiccups in motion, whether it's Captain America dishing out justice with his speedy shield or the panning scenes across the railway station in *Hugo*.

Sound quality, too, is refreshingly good for a projector (see caption).

In 3D, the picture has a lovely sense of depth, and the W1070+ manages to deliver a stable and likeable image despite the inevitable dimming. The active-shutter glasses aren't included, and they're around £50 a pair.

Compared with rivals such as the Epson EH-TW5200, DVDs are entirely watchable on the W1070+. *Who Framed Roger Rabbit* is upscaled with minimum fuss, there's very little noise to deal with and a good helping of detail is left intact.

The W1070+ projector is light at 2.75kg, yet it's sturdily built as well. There are controls for zoom, focus and keystone, including a manual lens shift.

Easy to set up, easy to operate

Setting up the projector is quick and painless (we used a THX Optimizer disc to get the picture perfectly tuned). The remote, which is responsive and easy to use, has a bright red backlight.

There's a good spread of connections on the BenQ for analogue and digital sources alike. Two HDMI inputs and a PC input share space with composite and component inputs. Two 3.5mm audio jacks are also available. The W1070+ is also compatible with BenQ's new Wireless Full HD Kit (£250). It gives you an extra two HDMI inputs, but most importantly it negates the need to keep your projector close to the rest of your AV kit, as this 'hub' will transmit Full HD and 3D images to your projector.

The BenQ W1070+ is a big improvement upon its predecessor the W1070. Its subtle and punchy picture quality, complete with satisfyingly deep black levels and smooth motion, is utterly engrossing. We like its compact design, its upscaling talents and that surprisingly full-bodied sound quality too. And all that for just £650? If you're thinking of building your first home cinema system, this projector should be at the top of your shopping list.

EPSON EH-TW5200 £700

The Epson EH-TW5200 replaces our favourite sub-£1000 projector from last year, the Award-winning EH-TW5910.

Looking at the specs, it doesn't feel like a step up: the new model's claimed contrast ratio is 15,000:1 (compared with the EH-TW5910's 20,000:1), while the rated brightness is 2000 lumens (down from the 5910's 2100 lumens).

The downgraded specs are explained by the price: the new machine is a whole lot cheaper at £700.

Firing up *Captain America: The Winter Soldier* on Blu-ray, we're met with a bright picture that digs up a great amount of detail for this price. The Cap's gritty new blue suit, and the steel-grey tones present throughout S.H.I.E.L.D.'s facilities, are delivered with the kind of realism the Marvel film is aiming for.

Natural and believable

Colours are lively and dynamic, but stay firmly on the natural side. Skin-tones are fleshed out with believable shadows and realistic contours around the face, and deliver just the right amount of detail without needing to show every single hair follicle. The Epson packs a punch with its highlights. Metal weapons glint dangerously, fluorescent lights are pleasingly bright and daylight scenes are appropriately sunny and warm. We just wish this same level of intensity were present in the Epson's black levels.

It's a crisp, subtle picture, although there are hints of noise creeping through. This is more apparent when the EH-TW5200 is upscaling content, with the usually-impressive DVD transfer of *Who Framed Roger Rabbit* looks a touch grainier than usual. Motion, on the other hand, is smooth across all content.

We play *TT: Closer To The Edge* in 3D, and the motorbikes whizz down winding country roads with no stutter or judder. The sense of depth is exciting, and the picture retains a level of brightness and detail that rival projectors fail to match.

The EH-TW5200 has built-in speakers, but while voices are clear and easy to hear, there's more than a hint of the tinny sound you get from flatscreen TVs.

It's a compact and sleek design, with curved lines and an all-black finish that looks rather attractive. There are manual zoom, focus and keystone adjustments on the unit itself, all of which are subtle enough to help you get the most accurate picture possible.

The included remote control is a good size - not too large, not too chunky - and, though not backlit, it's easy to use.

Smartphone source

There are two HDMI inputs, one of which supports MHL (Mobile High-Definition Link) so you can feed videos from a compatible smartphone.

We're used to decent projectors costing £1000, so the fact that you can now get a bright, natural-toned, detailed picture for just £700 is an eye-opener for home cinema. It's not quite as impressive as the EH-TW5910, but then it's £200 cheaper. And a great place to start.

INFOCUS IN8606HD £650 ★★★★☆

With its big picture, compact design and affordable price, the IN8606HD is worth considering if you're taking the first step towards a home cinema package.

With Full HD and 3D credentials, the InFocus delivers a large, bright picture. *Pirates Of The Caribbean: At World's End* on Blu-ray shows a good level of detail coupled to low levels of noise and decent contrast in scenes that combine bright and dark elements in a single frame. The colour balance is a touch understated but is none the worse for that, looking convincing with skin-tones.

In-depth analysis

Black levels, on the other hand, are pleasingly dark. They may swallow up finer detail, but they give low-light scenes a nice sense of depth.

There's a hint of instability around moving objects, but not enough to annoy or distract you during a film, even in 3D. *Life Of Pi* looks relatively smooth and there's a pleasing sense of depth, even if the picture is dimmed. It's comfortable to watch.

The active-shutter 3D glasses, on the other hand, are chunky and grip just a

little too tightly for our liking. They don't come bundled either, and cost around £50. At least they stay on the head and have a comfortable nose bridge.

We wish the IN8606HD was more successful when it comes to upscaling DVDs. The picture looks a little patchy around the edges and lacks detail. We'd stick with Blu-rays.

Boost that sound

The IN8606HD has built-in speakers, but don't expect fully-fledged surround sound. The sound is thin, and voices aren't fleshed out in the way that they are on the BenQ W1070+. A budget 5.1 speaker package should be on your shopping list if you want all the punch and pizzazz of a movie's soundtrack to come across as it should.

The build of the IN8606HD is solid and sturdy, yet it's also compact enough to position easily in your room. The all-black finish is broken only by a bright blue ring around the lens, giving it a distinctive look.

The InFocus comes equipped with a generous helping of connections. There are two HDMI inputs - handy if you want

to keep two different sources plugged in at all times, such as a Blu-ray player and a games console. Analogue sources are well catered for, with component, composite, S-Video and 3.5mm inputs neatly arranged on the back panel. You'll also find single 3.5mm jacks for audio input and output, and a PC input for connecting laptops.

There's plenty to like about the InFocus IN8606HD. The breadth of connectivity on offer is appreciated, as is the compact design. A better remote would help (see caption), as would more controls on the projector itself. This InFocus has just enough detail, punch and conviction in its colour palette to make it an enjoyable watch, but not quite enough to be class-leading.

OPTOMA HD26 £650 ★★★☆☆

Finding a Full HD projector for £650 is no mean feat. Finding a great projector for £650, however, is even trickier. The compact Optoma HD26 seems like a good bargain on paper - 1080p and 3D support, twin HDMI inputs, large picture - but some may not be enamoured with its limited connectivity (see caption) and less-than-subtle picture.

Lavish, but garish too

Play *Thor: The Dark World* and the Optoma delivers a clean and lavish picture, but one in which the colours veer on the overblown side and blocks of colour have little shading or subtlety. The golden armour of the Asgardian army is richly detailed and inviting, but skin-tones could appear more natural.

Detail is dished out with little subtlety, and there isn't enough gradation in the contours of objects to give them realistic depth.

It's not the brightest picture, either, especially when compared with the Epson EH-TW5200 and BenQ W1070+. This helps black levels though, the dark cave scenes in *Thor* revelling in the appropriate level of gloom. Highlights appear muted, a fact that robs the picture of punch and excitement. The metallic gleam of Formula 1 cars in *Rush* is dulled down, while sunlit scenes don't have the intense, warm brightness you'd expect. Motion isn't the smoothest either, with faint judders present around moving objects.

Upscaled content, such as material on DVD, takes an even greater hit, with the half-processed, blocky and noisy picture of *Stoker* proving difficult to watch. We're not expecting the most insightful and lifelike picture at this budget price, but we're still a little disappointed.

On a positive note, the Optoma's built-in speakers have a rich, weighty way with voices. It's easy to follow dialogue, and voices don't sound as tinny as they do on many rivals.

Comfortable 3D experience

Films in 3D are surprisingly easy on the eye with the HD26, even with activeshutter glasses on. There's a decent level of depth, albeit not too dramatic. As expected the picture is a little dark though. Thankfully, the motion issues don't worsen during fast-moving action scenes, such as in the Isle of Man TT race documentary *Closer To The Edge*.

The 3D glasses are light, but they don't grip securely. You'll have to purchase them (£80 per pair) and an RF emitter (£10) separately too.

Zoom, keystone correction and controls all feature on the projector itself and you can adjust the focus of the lens manually. The remote has a blindingly bright blue backlight, which is great for using in a dark cinema room (but may leave you with sunspots in your eyes).

If the HD26 was notably cheaper than its rivals we would forgive its shortcomings. But there are price rivals out there, and many offer superior performance. We know you'll find a better entry-level alternative elsewhere.

ECENE)

he BenQ W1070+ proves you don't have to break the bank to build a home cinema system. At just £650, it's a ridiculously good projector. It's got spades of detail, rich yet subtle colours, and black levels that are gloriously deep and inky. Superclean upscaling is a bonus, as is its surprisingly decent sound quality.

The Epson EH-TW5200 came so close to taking the crown. Its crisply drawn picture, natural colour tone and excellent detail retrieval make it stand out from the pack, and it's a smart looking projector, too. But it doesn't quite deliver the velvety deep black levels that the BenQ can, and its picture is a little noisier. The InFocus IN8606HD isn't too far off in terms of performance. It's perfectly watchable, and dishes out convincing blacks. A brighter, sharper and more detailed picture would see it gaining that fifth star, and we'd like a better remote control design, too.

A noticeable difference

Then there's the Optoma HD26, whose overblown colours just couldn't match the standard set by its rivals. It's a decent effort in many ways, but roundly outclassed in this company.

We don't expect top performance at this price, but the BenQ W1070+ shows you can balance picture quality and price in a deeply effective way.



Not all in-ear headphones are equal – and prices can be misleading. Here we sift the wheat from the chaff across the price spectrum

Beyerdynamic DX160 iE £86 ★★★★☆

We expect great things from Beyerdynamic - the company has won countless Awards from us.

There's plenty of detail and texture to instruments and vocals alike. The presentation is smooth too; a boon for long-term listening.

Tonal balance leans slightly towards the low end for a full, weighty sound. It never gets too much though, and the midrange and treble are never threatened.

The only issue here is the competition, namely the (cheaper) Sony MDR-EX650APs. They don't have the Beyerdynamics' weight, but are more agile and punchy.

These buds are well made and come with a flat cable, which helps minimise tangles. There's no in-line remote, but a split in the cable lets you to add the bundled Y-shaped splitter, so someone else can plug in and share your tunes.

We really like the DX 160 iEs - but that competition is rather fierce.

Klipsch X11i £200 *****

It's always tough to follow up a hit, but Klipsch has managed it nicely. The banana-shaped X11is, with their comfy silicon tips, are the successors to the Awardwinning X10is. Are they any good? Oh yes. Very, very good.

We're amazed by their powers of resolution. The level of insight is seriously impressive and there's plenty of detail and texture.

Tonally, there's a good balance: the strong, well-defined bass doesn't overpower the expressive midrange or crisp treble. It's a punchy performance, yet smooth enough for long-term listens.

The cable is lined with Kevlar, the stuff they put in body armour. While the X11is probably won't stop bullets, they can take being stuffed into pockets. And the square cable is genuinely tangle-resistant.

Great sound and great design: if you're serious about portables these in-ears need to be on your shortlist.

Lindy Cromo IEM-75 £70 ★★★☆☆

If you're after decent performance for your money, you'll get that with these Lindys. The sound is nice and solid, with a good sense of clarity and heft behind it. These buds are also efficient, evidenced by their extra loudness over some rivals.

The biggest problem here is the competition. Sony's MDR-EX650AS, which cost less, outperform the Lindys in almost every way.

What we're really lacking here is detail. The Lindys don't astonish with textures, and without the finer subtleties the performance is less refined than we'd like.

Then there's the matter of entertainment. These buds are fine if you're after an easy listen, but if you want your temples to pound to the noise of Infected Mushroom, you'll have to look elsewhere.

Build quality is good, and as for design, the flying-saucer look is likely to split opinion. Decent, yes, but these won't blow you away. For a full list of specifications and other useful info visit *whathifi.com*

IN-EAR HEADPHONES ROUND-UP

NAD Viso HP20 £130 ★★★★☆

When we get kit from NAD, we tend to expect large boxes, so it's a bit of a surprise to find headphones.

These are aluminium bullets solid and substantial. They do stick out of your ears quite a bit, though.

By contrast, the inline remote feels a little delicate. We do, though, like the flat cable, which promises to fight tangles.

The sound is lovely. It's delicate and refined, and very detailed. There's a good amount of weight to the delivery: substantial but not overbearing, so if you're a bass head, you may want to look elsewhere. The soundstage is open and there's a good sense of scale.

If there's a problem it's that the timing could be a bit tighter. As it stands, the performance is an easy listen, but not particularly punchy or authoritative.

These are good, but they need a little more sparkle if they want to justify that fifth star.

Samsung Level In £130 ★★☆☆☆

Mention headphones and it's unlikely the name Samsung will come up. On this showing, that's unlikely to change anytime soon.

These buds look good but feel very plasticky. You do, though, get a flat cable (for tangle resistance), a three-button microphone/remote unit and a selection of ear tips. We like the memory foam ones.

The first thing we notice is the hardness of the sound. It's a bright, harsh treble that has you thinking about the volume switch. The similarly priced NAD Viso HP2Os offer much more texture, subtlety and refinement.

Bass has clearly been a priority but although there's a place for bass-centric headphones, it's not that well-defined here. The Level Ins also lack the dynamics and snappy timing to really entertain.

If they were half the price, we might consider the Level Ins - but at £130, we really can't.

Sony MDR EX650AP

Well, these are unusual. We don't tend to see brass in our kit. But considering brass has been used to make musical instruments for centuries, it makes sense to use it.

The design and build is lovely. If the gold colour is too bling for you, you can opt for the silvery-grey version. By current in-ear standards these are not small, but they are very comfortable to wear.

The sound is just as pleasant. Vocals are engaging and focused, yet given space to breathe. The soundstage is open, expansive and expertly organised, creating an overall presentation that's fabulously immersive.

Drums are precise and snappy, with a firm low end that never drowns out the rest of the range. Tonal balance is beautifully judged, and there's plenty of detail and attack. If you're after an engaging, exciting listen, these fit the bill. At this price, they're hard to fault.

Soundmagic E10S £40 ★★★★★

We've got to hand it to the folks at Soundmagic: they don't rest on their laurels. Even after winning three Awards in a row, the E10 in-ear headphones keep receiving upgrades. Now we're getting the E10S (the S is for smartphone).

Driver placement and venting have been adjusted to improve sound and there's a neat inline remote (but no volume control), as well as a cable switch to ensure compatibility with various devices.

The performance is better than ever. It's an even subtler, smoother sound than before. Bass weight is nicely judged (making for a tight, fast, agile sound) treble sparkles and the vocals are clear and nuanced. You get a lovely, airy presentation and plenty of detail.

These buds punch well above their weight. If you want to upgrade your smartphone or music player's bundled buds, look no further. Soundmagic indeed. Sonos has long ruled the multi-room systems roost, but other brands are looking to make an impression now. Is there room for them all?

Sonos System from £170, p79 nce a sector dominated by a single brand, multi-room audio is booming this year, attracting attention from big brands and new names alike. Samsung and Panasonic used CES to announce their respective systems, while high-resolution audio across the home has finally become a reality with efforts from new company Bluesound and Simple Audio's Roomplayer+.

Throw in an updated Jongo range from Pure, and multi-room king Sonos might just have a serious challenge to its position in the market for the very first time. We've decided it's the right time to put them all into a *Group Test*, to have it out once and for all. We're looking at systems as a whole here, rather than individual performance, so read on to find out where your multi-room money is best spent.

Simple audio





Bluesound

from £400

With its five-star First Test still fresh in our minds (October 2014), we have high hopes for the high-res capable Bluesound. Could this be the multi-room solution that hi-fi fans have been waiting for?

The Bluesound range is aimed at those who value audio performance above all else, but who also want a good user experience.

Blue for go

After getting each component out of the box and powering it up, the first thing to do is get them onto your home network. The quick-start guide walks you through this, with the LED on the top-mounted mute button glowing solid blue once it's successfully connected.

You will need to repeat the process for each component - there's no quick pairing method between speakers at the moment, but it doesn't take long. Unlike Simple Audio's or Samsung's set-ups, there's no requirement to hardwire any part of your Bluesound set-up (except for the Vault, if you have one) in order to go multi-room. However, if you stream lots of high-res audio we'd recommend the more stable hardwired connection.

Applying the system

There's a free iOS and Android app to control each product in the range. As long as your mobile device is on the same network as your Bluesound players, the app will automatically show them as available for streaming music and allow you to group them together.

It will also help you pull in music from NAS drives on the same network, as well

as access some of the most popular streaming services (including Spotify, Rdio, Deezer, Qobuz and TuneIn Radio). Bluesound picks out our NAS easily, and displays its contents and artwork under the 'local library' tab on the app. We have some indexing issues with some of our WAV files. but that's a common problem we've stumbled across in similar systems. We'd recommend saving your music as FLAC files if you want to ensure the most accurate indexing.

Use your index finger

A wired connection will index around 1000 songs per minute - wireless will take a little longer depending on your connection but, once done the first time, re-indexing is much quicker.

Listening to the Pulse, it is one of the most 'hi-fi'-sounding speakers of its type we've ever heard. It offers up a considerable amount of detail and there's a spaciousness to its presentation that we aren't used to from a one-box design. It's powerful too, making Sonos's Play:5 sound weedy in comparison. Stream a 24-bit/96kHz resolution file

of Fleetwood Mac's Dreams and the Pulse shows it's no slouch, with the rich

Bluesound **Z** Pulse (£600) is one of the most 'hi-fi'-sounding speakers of its type we've ever heard.

bassline proving to be as agile as it is weighty - the rhythmic drum intro punches with precision and impact.

The Powernode, paired with a pair of Q Acoustics 2020i speakers, is for obvious reasons capable of a bigger soundfield and better stereo separation. But otherwise it demonstrates the same attention to detail and dynamic wherewithal as the Pulse. They're both exciting and engaging to listen to, and they don't lose their enthusiasm when we move to lower resolutions and start streaming via Spotify at 320kbps.

Bluesound is one of the most musical multi-room systems we have heard. Its high-resolution capability is its strength, of course, but just as importantly it's easy to set up and use. Multi-room audio has never sounded so good.

We can't quite put our finger on why, but we're a little uninspired by the design of Panasonic's ALL Series. The finish is nice enough, with a solid build and metal grille, but it doesn't have the appeal of some of its competitors. Unfortunately, the same can be said for its audio performance too.

The range is made up of three parts: the ALL3 and ALL8 speakers, and the ALL1C adapter, for connecting to an existing hi-fi system. Set-up is simple. The Panasonic Music Streaming app walks you through getting each one onto your network. You'll have to do so for each speaker, so it's not quite as slick as Sonos, Samsung and Pure.

Single source problem

Adding music is easy - the app picked up both NAS drives on our network without issue, and you have the option to play music directly from your device. Spotify Connect is supported in the UK and is the only service available at the time of testing. The Panasonic Music Streaming app isn't as intuitive as some we've used, and it needed quite a while to work our way around it. Instead of choosing the speaker you want to stream to or control, you choose the source you want to play from, and then the speaker. It feels strange, but something you get used to.

Another quirk in the app is that while we could build playlists (from a single source only) we couldn't find any way of saving them for playing back later.

Pick up and go

Similar to Pure, Panasonic's multi-room system doesn't require any hardwiring to the router, so it's just a case of plug-andplay. It has chosen to go with Qualcomm's open source AllPlay multi-room platform rather than produce its own, meaning that you can control other AllPlay devices alongside your Panasonic kit. There's not a whole host of other manufacturers on board right now, but it's a relatively new platform we would expect to see grow.

The Panasonic speakers lack the

excitement that we hear from systems by Sonos or Samsung. It has a rather laid-back character that can struggle with more upbeat music. Play alt-J's *Breezeblocks* and the Panasonic also sounds rather closed in, with a muddy midrange lacking clarity, particularly in the vocals. The treble is a touch unrefined too, with a hard leading edge on some notes that can tip into harshness, particularly at high volume.

Largely though, it's a perfectly listenable character that's pretty neutral in its tonal balance. Bass is never boomy or overdone, and the speakers are flexible with placement too, which is handy for those short on space.

The smaller ALL3 can be used in both

multi-room setup, the ALL1C will do just that. It packs a 24-bit/192kHz DAC and connects to your kit via conventional RCA phono sockets. The two speaker units (ALL3 and ALL8) share a common character, but as you might expect the bigger unit is more suited to a larger room.

2 Add the ALL1C module into your existing hi-fi system and it can form part of your multi-room system. vertical and horizontal positions and, as always, it's worth experimenting, especially if you intend to use it in the kitchen or bedroom. With both speakers, it's worth trying out the various sound profile positions - unlike the Samsung, we're not largely taken by one over the other, so choose whichever suits best.

Stereo no-go

The ALL3 can't be made into a stereo pair just yet, although Panasonic hinted it might be coming soon. As an option that many of its competitors offer, functionality like this needs to be integrated much quicker.

Right now, Panasonic's ALL Series just doesn't feel like quite the polished offering that some of its competitors provide, both in range and performance. It's not even competitively priced, so it's hard to know why you would choose it in its current form.

We're intrigued to see how Qualcomm's AllPlay multi-room platform plays out, as it could be something really worth having as more brands sign up. But until then this multi-room system must try harder if it's going to make an impression in such a competitive market.

Pure Jongo from £80

Pure's Jongo multi-room system was among the first to take on Sonos, but at a more affordable price.

Now in its second year, the Jongo has grown up a little, losing the colourful grilles for a simpler, more understated design and, with a major audio update, it's now arguably at its best thus far. Following the set-up instructions with each Jongo speaker is easy: you need one master speaker on your wi-fi network first (using a set-up page) and the remainder can be added by holding down a button for a few seconds. This is Sonos levels of simplicity, and we're impressed.

Family pack

The Jongo family is reasonably well stocked, offering four sizes of speaker, one of which is portable. Best of all are the prices. A recent price cut means it's £80 for the smallest T2 speaker, going up to £180 for the T6, so a two-room set-up can cost as little as £160.

Speaker control is via the Pure Connect app, which is also the home for Pure's own streaming service. You're not obliged to use the service, but it does

stand in the way of control just a little if you're not a paid-up subscriber.

P

If you're considering buying into the Jongo system, it's worth giving the one-month trial a go - we find the store well stocked and it offers a more seamless experience with Jongo than other streaming services. Within the Pure Connect app you'll be able to control your speakers - edit their names, control grouping, tweak EQ settings, volume and so on.

As for music control, you'll only be able to stream music either via Pure Connect (subscription required) or content stored locally on your device or home network.

Finding another stream

If you want to use another streaming service (such as Spotify), you have to turn on the Bluetooth Caskeid setting within the app - a feature that allows for multi-speaker streaming over Bluetooth.

This means selecting the speakers you want to use within Pure's app, heading to your phone's Bluetooth pairing menu and selecting any one of the Jongo speakers showing. They will then push the music to any of the other speakers you selected automatically.

It's not as straightforward as streaming over wi-fi from Pure's app (you must move back and forth between your streaming app and Pure's to control your speakers, for example), plus you can't choose to stream different music to different speakers. It's limiting when compared to rival systems. We're also unsure how this would work in a large house, considering the range limitations of Bluetooth. 2

1 Whichever speaker you choose from, the Pure Jongo is capable of of a big sound, with the T6 the ideal choice for bringing your music to larger rooms.

2 If you do plump for the Jongo system, it would be a good move to give the Pure Connect one-month trial a go. The store is well stocked and it offers a better user experience on the Jongo than other streaming services. Streaming Ella Eyre's *If I Go* from Pure Connect shows the Jongo system is not short on big, powerful sound. No matter which speaker you choose, they're capable of a sound that outstretches their physical size, with the T6 fitting the bill for filling the bigger rooms.

We reach for the EQ settings with most of the speakers to take the bass down a notch or two - there's a little more refinement needed here, and bass can sound heavy-handed. The low-end has a weighty punch to it, which can work well with some music, but more delicate tunes need a softer approach.

There's a decent level of detail here, but it's not the last word in clarity, (particularly in the midrange, which doesn't sound as clear and open as the Samsung system). Treble, for the most part, stays on the right side of bright, which gives the Pure an up-front character. Push the volume and it can start to sound harsh, though. Overall, the sound is energetic and listenable with everything we throw at it, from John Legend to Metallica.

Pure has hit the spot with the Jongo system. It can't match Sonos and Samsung for out-and-out sound quality, but its price means multi-room is an option for more people than ever before.

Shape Audio System

Samsung has proved time and again it can make a success of almost any product it turns its hand to. With the launch of the Shape Audio System, it can now add multi-room audio to that list.

At the moment, the system is a reasonably humble one: the Shape M5 and M7 speakers, and the HW-750 soundbar. But Samsung has already announced the smaller M3 speaker, and we expect more will be on the way soon.

Package deal

The Samsung system is very attractive in its looks and as an overall package. It's priced just below its Sonos equivalents, at £230 for the M5 and £330 for the M7, and arguably offers more features: Bluetooth with NFC connectivity (a one-to-one connection only), and DLNA certification on top of wi-fi playback.

Some 2013-onwards Samsung TVs are compatible for wireless sound playback via Samsung's TV SoundConnect feature, and you can also set up a surround-sound system using two speakers and a soundbar, à la Sonos.

For multi-room, you must purchase Samsung's wireless Hub (£50), which

What it comprises

M5 £230 - The M5 is the smaller of the two speakers currently available (although will soon sit in the middle of the system, with the announcement of the M3). It has a two-way design with twin tweeters and a woofer.

M7 £330 – A true three-way speaker for more power, the M7 packs twin tweeters with an improved cone design, a mid-range driver and a woofer.

HW-750 – This soundbar can be used solo as part of a multi-room system, or can be paired with two speakers to create a surround-sound system. Using Samsung's TV SoundConnect, it will connect wirelessly to newer Samsung TVs. needs to be hardwired to your router via ethernet. Once this is hooked up, it's a case of pressing the 'speaker add' button and switching on your speakers to register them onto your network.

The Samsung multi-room app helps walk you through this, and is also the place you will control your music and speakers, choosing to control them independently or with others.

Need to go native

The streaming services supported in the UK are: Rdio, Deezer, Spotify (via Spotify Connect), Napster, 8Tracks and TuneIn Radio, all of which (bar Spotify) are controlled by the Samsung app. You will also be able to plug in sources like NAS drives on the same home network, as well as playback music stored on your device. Playlists can be built within the app from the latter only; you'll need to prepare any streaming-service playlists natively for the Samsung multi-room.

The speakers feel solid and well built. The triangular design is stylish and understated. We found standing them up helps improve bass evenness, while also helping to disperse sound. File compatibility is extensive: MP3, WAV, WMA, AAC, AIFF, ALAC and FLAC (up to 16-bit/44.1kHz). High-res music is supported too - the speakers are able to offer playback of 24-bit/96kHz tracks and downscale anything above that.

The five-star M5 remains our favourite of the two speakers, with a much better balance across the frequency range. Both Controls are minimal and touch-sensitive: there are icons for source, a volume dial and a mute button, but we never used them in testing as everything is easily controlled from your device.

2 It's worth experimenting with speaker position: they can be placed vertically, using the included stand, or set flat. offer a rich, full-bodied presentation, but the bass on the M7 tips too much onto the tubby side for our tastes. If you want a big, powerful sound, though, the M7 delivers, and the M5 does a good job for its size too. There's a bit more agility in the M5 over its bigger sibling, and there's a fun, energetic character to both of them. They jump into life when we stream Ella Eyre's *If I Go*. The midrange is a strong point, sounding clear and open where rivals like the Panasonic ALL Series can sound closed in. We still think the M5 pips the M7 when it comes to out-and-out detail, though.

It's a shame Samsung hasn't been able to create a consistent sound across the speaker range. But with the Shape Audio System it has come close to providing Sonos with one of its first serious competitors in years. With extensive functionality, a well-designed app and easy set-up, all it needs is a 'family sound' and a few more speaker options.

Simple Audio

It's been two years since we last saw the Simple Audio Roomplayer. In that time, it's added a '+' to its name, introduced support for high-resolution music up to 24-bit/192kHz (up from 24-bit/96kHz) and brought in the direct NAS-drive support its predecessor was lacking.

Not that you can tell by looking at it its design has stayed largely unchanged, remaining a sturdy, yet elegant combination of aluminium and tempered glass. It's a rather different proposition from the all-in-one multi-room speaker designs offered by the likes of Pure and Samsung, and you'll have to add in your own speakers for the system to work. We used a pair of Q Acoustics 2020is.

Adding the Amp

The Roomplayer+ with Amp (£700) is the unit we've tested. It contains a Class D amplifier and a claimed 2 x 50W output. There is also the option for the Roomplayer+ without amp (£600) that connects to an existing system.

On the back of the unit you'll find speaker outs, line-level inputs and outputs, a subwoofer out and both optical and coaxial outs. There are also ethernet and USB ports. Tucked low on the front are two 3.5mm sockets, one for headphones and one for connecting a phone or tablet.

You'll need to provide your own speaker cables, but in the box you'll find phono-to-phono, phono-to-3.5mm, 3.5mm-to-3.5mm and ethernet cables, which should cover any other connections you need to make.

The mains thing

Simple Audio uses a system called Powerline, built into each of its units. This uses the regular mains power supply to deliver data to speakers in place of regular wi-fi. Simple Audio says this can offer data rates of up to 200mbps, ensuring high-resolution music is played back without issue.

To get the Roomplayer+ system online, you'll need to hardwire your master unit to your router, or opt for a Roomplayer Bridge if this isn't possible. Pairing between the Bridge and the Roomplayer(s) requires a simple series of button-pushes - we were up and running within a few minutes.

Simple audio

You will need to download a desktop app for your PC or Mac to finish the set-up though, which seems somewhat long-winded considering most of the Roomplayer+'s rivals offer set-up through a tablet or smartphone app.

Here it will let you set up all your music shares from local network sources such as iTunes libraries and NAS drives. You will also be able to plug in your information for the numerous streaming services it offers, which include Deezer, Qobuz, WiMP and TuneIn Radio - but not Spotify. If you're happy using the desktop we'd recommend sticking with it, as controlling the service from a mobile device is currently rather limited.

In profile

One nice feature of the Simple Audio Roomplayer+ is the ability to create user profiles, so different people can add their own music libraries.

When it comes to performance, the Roomplayer+ benefits from its ability to play high-res music, and a 24-bit/96kHz download of Dire Straits' *Walk Of Life* is delivered with notably more detail than its non-high-res competitors.

The chords in the uptempo keyboard melody are layered and threedimensional, and there's a precise handle on rhythm and timing that ensures everything is well organised.

The bass is punchy and well controlled, and the treble is clear and open, producing a clean, balanced sound that works well with all genres of music. 1 Most of the connections are round the back, but there are also two 3.5mm sockets tucked under the main front panel.

2 If you're not connecting to an existing system, as well as speakers you'll need the Amp unit, which adds £100 to the price. You get a wonderful feeling of space from the wide soundstage too, which fills our listening room with ease.

Despite this, there's something about the Roomplayer+ that doesn't quite hold our attention. Even though there's more detail here than with many competitors, it lacks the ability to uncover the textures, dynamics and nuances that make a piece of music truly engaging.

Almost there

Play a 24-bit/192kHz copy of Hans Zimmer's *Gotham's Reckoning* and it falls short of delivering the edge and urgency of rival system Bluesound, for example, lacking that last layer of expression and fine detail that really draws us in.

And herein lies the Roomplayer+'s biggest problem - it faces excellent competition, at £100 cheaper, in the Bluesound Powernode. And that's not a saving to be sniffed at.

But with good speaker pairing, the Roomplayer+ is still an excellentsounding system that's very much worth an audition. However, to score the full five it needs to put a touch more thought into its audio, not to mention get its mobile and tablet apps working properly across the board for the full experience.

Sonos

For years, Sonos has been

synonymous with the concept of multi-room audio, so much so it's almost hard to know which came first. At the very least, Sonos spotted a trend long before its competitors - at most, it's responsible for making the market what it is today.

Sonos as a system has two big things going for it - breadth of choice and simplicity of use. In the time its rivals have needed to play catch-up, it's been able to launch a whole family of products and get onside with a long list of streaming services, not to mention really nail the usability side of it all too.

Simple set-up

Of all the systems we've tested, the Sonos system is one of the easiest to set up. You'll need the Sonos app for your iOS or Android device, or alternatively you can download a desktop application for Mac or PC, all of which will walk you through the process step by step.

Until recently, users were required to hardwire their first Sonos player directly to their router if possible, or use the Sonos Bridge (£32). While this is still recommended for the most robust connection, an update now allows users to skip this step as long as their wireless network is strong enough to reach the room(s) containing the speaker(s).

We use a Bridge set-up to be sure of the most robust connection, and it takes seconds. The Sonos app is a large part of the system's charm. As well as walking you through set-up, it is where all of the

control for your system will take place, enabling you to easily see and control what music is playing where.

SONOS

One big gap in Sonos' offering is its lack of support for high-res audio, and with systems from Bluesound, Simple Audio and LG now offering just that, it's a shame Sonos hasn't followed suit. Still. it supports all the main file formats, including MP3, WMA, FLAC (up to 16-bit/44.1kHz), WAV, AAC and AIFF.

Flexibility and continuity

When it comes to performance, each member of the Sonos family offers the same entertaining character, giving a wholly universal sound no matter which speakers you own.

While it can't compete with the detail heard in high-res systems, it's able to dig out a decent amount of insight from our Spotify stream of Ten Walls' Walking With Elephants. It's an enthusiastic and engaging listen, yet one that keeps a firm hand on the bouncing bassline.

Play something softer, like Bon Iver's Skinny Love, and the vocals are focused **1 Play:1**. This is the first rung on the Sonos speaker ladder. If you're connecting via the Bridge unit, press a two-kev combination on the Play:1 to link up.

Z Play:5. This **O** is the most powerful of the trio. All the speakers have individual EQ settings, plus a 'loudness' switch.

and believable while the banjostrumming is packed with texture. There's a believable amount of depth and space to the presentation too, not to mention a good sense of scale and a rich, well balanced delivery.

When it comes to general usability, it's hard to find fault. There's no delay when skipping tracks or source, and the whole experience is well intergrated.

Sonos provides a fantastic ecosystem within which to build your multi-room set-up. Reasonably priced, effortlessly stylish and with a plethora of options to expand your system as you go, Sonos is still one of multi-room's class acts.

There's a new champ in the wireless multi-room market – **Bluesound** combines high-resolution audio and ease of use in one impressive system

his is the first time we've ever undertaken a test of multi-room systems, and the results are very interesting indeed.

In the end, the battle for the win came down to a veteran and a newbie, and it was high-res support that swung it. Bluesound's sound quality simply can't be ignored, and while it is a fair bit pricier than Sonos, we'd argue it offers quality worth paying for.

Sonos remains a safe bet in the mainstream multi-room market, but if you want real hi-fi sound from your multi-room system, Bluesound is for you. The Sonos still deserves five stars, but it now needs high-res support.

Simplicity is the key

Another mainstream brand breaking into the multi-room market this year is Samsung, and it's certainly showing some promise as one to watch. Offering Sonos-levels of simplicity, the speakers are packed with functionality too, but just fall short when it comes to out-and-out refinement and a homogenous family sound.

Aboard the four star bandwagon is the high-res capable Simple Audio Roomplayer+, which put in a strong performance but fell short when compared to the Bluesound's superior sound and greater affordability.

Multi-room on a budget

If you're keen to start a multi-room system but don't want to spend too much, Pure has a fun and affordable take on multi-room that's welcome in the market. We really like its nice range of speaker options and upfront, full-bodied sound. We'd like more clarity, though, and greater flexibility with other streaming services for full marks though.

Panasonic's ALL Series came in at the bottom of our six, dropping points for its uninspiring sound and limited functionality compared to its rivals.

The Sonos still deserves five stars, but if you want real hi-fi sound from your multiroom system, Bluesound is for you

WHAT TO LOOK FOR

Wireless vs wired

Connecting a multi-room system to your existing wi-fi network might sound like the simplest option, but it won't give the most robust connection. If you can wire part of your system directly to your broadband router, you should.

High-resolution audio

Some of the systems here, such as Bluesound and Simple Audio, will handle high-res files. Others, such as Sonos, won't. Decide if that's important to you before you buy.

Powerline transmission

The Simple Audio system uses the mains electricity cables in your home to transmit sound from one room to the next. Powerline tech can handle data rates of up to 200mbps, ideal for high-res audio.

Streaming services

If you're a regular Spotify user, pick a system that can handle it.



PMC Twenty 26 Floorstanders

■ £5750 ★★★★★

e're big fans of PMC's Twenty range. The two middle models in the series, the 22 standmounter (£1970) and 23 floorstander (£2300) have been regular Award-winners in recent years and are in with a decent shout of repeating the feat yet again this time round.

The newly introduced 26 sits well above those two in price and, we're glad to report, in performance too. Like the rest of the range these floorstanders look a little odd when you first see them due to that sloping cabinet. The slope isn't just there to grab your attention either, it's claimed to make the cabinet more rigid and reduce the build-up of internal standing waves.

This is the first three-way Twenty model. A standard Twenty series tweeter handles the highs - it's a drive unit co-engineered with the highly respected OEM manufacturer SEAS. It uses a 27mm soft dome made of a fabric called Sonolex. The tweeter's grille doesn't just protect the driver from prying fingers, it also helps sound dispersion giving a wider, smoother off-axis response.

Star driver

The dome midrange driver is the star here. It's a 5cm coated linen design that builds on the units PMC has long used in its more upmarket offerings. This dome covers a wide frequency range, from 3.8kHz right the way down to 380Hz, meaning the all-important midrange area - where our hearing is at its most sensitive - is covered by just one driver. This approach moves the phase issues and other shortcomings innate in any crossover network to frequencies where such flaws are less critical.

The dome midrange driver is the star here. It's a 5cm coated, linen design. Building on the units PMC has long used in its more upmarket offerings, it covers a wide frequency range

A hefty 18cm driver - designed specifically for this speaker - delivers bass frequencies. It uses a stiff, damped natural fibre (otherwise known as treated paper) cone with rigid cast alloy chassis and a vented magnet assembly. Together these things help with detail, dynamics and power handling.

The output from this bass driver is augmented by PMC's trademark transmission line system (see panel on p86). The company has been honing this kind of bass tuning system for years and gained considerable success, delivering deep, clean low frequencies from smaller cabinets than you might expect.

Three-way harmony

A three-way design has innate advantages. Each drive unit can be optimized for the frequency band it works in, which should lead to a more revealing sound. Power handling is improved over two-way alternatives too, but the addition of an extra crossover – between midrange and bass – makes it harder to achieve a truly seamless balance throughout the frequency range. Rhythmic precision tends to suffer too. Still, with PMC's experience you'd hope these difficulties would be overcome.

Build quality is as good as we'd hope for. The 26's cabinet is solid and smartly finished. There's a choice of four finishes - the Amarone of our review sample along with oak, walnut or diamond black. The finish is smart regardless of option chosen.

A sizeable plinth has to be attached to the base of the cabinet with some sturdy-looking Allen bolts. Unusually the plinth is separated from the main cabinet with hybrid cork/rubber spacers, which provide a degree of decoupling. The company claims improved bass definition and greater high frequency focus compared to the conventional solid approach, which rings true in use. Be careful not to do up the plinth bolts too tightly otherwise the decoupling effect is reduced - aim for fairly tight rather than lock-down rigid.

Sing from the source

Any speaker at this kind of level needs great electronics to sing, and the Twenty 26 is no different. We used our reference system of Clearaudio Innovation Wood-based record playing package, Naim NDS/555PS streamer and Bryston BP26/4B SST2 pre/power amplification. In this system the Twenty 26s shine.

Some products take a while to get under your skin, but not these. We like them straight away. They're beautifully balanced, from a tonality that's as even as you like to a combination of attack and refinement that's class leading.

Play a piece of music like Lorde's *Royals* and it's hard not be impressed




with the 26s' low-end power and precision. There's a fine sense of weight here, yet these speakers have no trouble defining the texture and reverb of the bass notes too.

Lorde's vocals are rendered superbly. There's a massive amount of detail through the midrange and a lovely display of low-level dynamics that help make the most of her distinctive, engaging vocal delivery.

Move onto something more dramatic, such as Stravinsky's The Rite of Spring, and these PMCs continue to impress. Here their dynamic reach stands out, as does the way they maintain composure when the piece becomes complicated.



We think that transmission line bass loading technology is the best way of

achieving high levels of musicality; a natural sound with deep, clear bass and from a far more compact cabinet than other designs allow. The transmission line is a difficult design to get right and it is far more costly to produce - but the payback is the sound quality.

Transmission lines work in a very different way to sealed or bass reflex designs. In our Advanced Transmission Line (ATL) the bass driver is placed at one end of a long tunnel, which is heavily damped with up to five different formulas and profiles of acoustically absorbent foams, to absorb all the upper bass inside the cabinet. The result is extremely lowdistortion bass with no unwanted harmonics. The lowest frequencies emerge from the vent at the end of the line, which effectively acts as a second driver, giving deeper bass. The bass output of the ATL is consistent regardless of listening level, meaning it's perfectly clear, even at the lowest level. Great for late night listening!



Time to shine

Perhaps most impressive of all is the way PMC has managed to engineer such a seamless sound from the three-way design. The drive units really seem to work as one. delivering a consistent character from the lowest bass notes upwards. We're happy with the agility of these floorstanders too. Despite delivering a sound of pleasing weight and authority they never sound slow or unresponsive. These are lively, entertaining speakers that are refined

enough to allow you to enjoy poor recordings yet transparent enough to allow the best material to shine.

We come back to that word balance. While we've heard even more revealing high-end floorstanders (including those from PMCs more upmarket Fact range), very few have delivered music in such a likeable way. This is an all-round package that's very hard to pick holes in.

enchmark has real confidence in the DAC2 HGC's electrical design. How do we know? Why else would the company fill a third of the 67-page manual with performance graphs and specifications?

While all this information is nice to have (and shows Benchmark's design thoroughness), it doesn't give any indication as to whether the DAC2 HGC is a good listen. Happily, it is.

The meat of the matter

What do you get for your £1750? You get a high-grade digital-to-analogue converter that uses four Sabre 32-bit D/A converters per channel for PCM duties. It'll accept 24-bit/192kHz signals through USB and coax dropping to a 96kHz sampling rate limit for the optical input.

The quad D/A chip arrangement is mirrored for DSD data streams, which means the DAC2 HGC doesn't need to convert DSD files into PCM before the number crunching begins, which will please purists.

Take a look at the DAC2's crowded back panel and you'll also find analogue users are well catered for. There's a pair of stereo inputs and a trio of outputs including a balanced option.

Usually digital-based products such as the DAC2 convert analogue signals into the digital domain for processing purposes. But Benchmark has, once again, chosen the purist route of keeping analogue signals unconverted all the way through.

The front panel is a riot of LEDs. These indicate the input selected as well as the signal's word length and sampling rate. We would have preferred a clearer, neater display, but the lights do their job. The DAC2's overall build is good, though the simple bent-metal folded chassis and exposed bolts and screws give it a cottage-industry feel.

You'll also find a pair of 6.3mm headphone outputs, and for once we can't really notice any degradation of performance when both outputs are in use. It's a sign that the headphone amplifier section is well designed.

A unit like this demands good quality sources - we use our reference Naim NDS/555PS streamer; and Macbook packed with a range of material from 192kbps files of Eminem's *Encore* set through to Beethoven's *Piano Concertos* (*Nos. 3, 4* and *5*) in 24-bit/192kHz.

Headphone choice is equally important. The bulk of the test involved AKG's superb K812s and Grado's PS500s.

in the analogue domain, and the digital inputs in the digital domain. The DAC2 is also unique: it reduces the digital signal by 3.5dB before it enters the digital filters to stop intersample clipping – high-level peaks causing filter overloads.

convincing, particularly when allied to such a high level of resolution. If you're the kind of listener that likes to analyse recordings, the Benchmark is for you.

It's a clean, precise presentation but avoids the clinical edge that often goes along with such an outlook. The DAC is transparent enough to reveal flaws in a recording but refined enough to stop this being an issue. Eminem's *No Love* is about as harsh as recordings get, but the Benchmark keeps it listenable.

Equal rights for all

From Michael Jackson's *Thriller* (24-bit/176.4kHz) to Stevie Wonder's *Innervisions* on DSD, we never once feel the Benchmark gives preferential treatment to a specific file type.

with analogue sources. Using the Naim's outputs we hear all the good qualities evident through the digital inputs plus a lovely sense of fluidity and body.

Flaws? Perhaps that's too strong a word, but there are areas where we feel rival designs such as Chord's Hugo do better. We think the Benchmark could do with a stronger sense of drive to better convey the ebb and flow of recordings.

While the DAC2 HGC has a superb headphone output we are less pleased with how it sounds when used as a preamp in our main reference system. The good points are still present but coupled with a thinner, less substantial sound than we want.

Overall the Benchmark DAC2 HGC is a talented product. It's a fabulous headphone amplifier, great DAC and a pretty decent preamp. If your preference is analysis we doubt you'll find better for the money. But if you want something that will make you want to dance along too, there are cheaper contenders that will serve you better.

Putting the butch in butchery

Men in underwear. Hacking and slashing. And because these are Classical times, everybody has capes. Super-slow-motion makes a meal of flesh (glistening), blood (splattering) and fabric (billowing).

In 2007, the first adaptation of Frank Miller's historically liberal graphic novel struck a chord. Suddenly, toga parties made a comeback. Rugby teams the world over began trading *300* quotes over European stag nights.

Everyone likes a good underdog story, and the idea of three hundred (unfeasibly hard) men holding off a million certainly ticked that box. Then there was the rampant homoeroticism and stylised presentation, which made it equally hilarious and epic.

300: Rise Of An Empire tries, and partially succeeds, to replicate the same formula. Textbook sequel syndrome. But curiously, this isn't really a sequel. It's context for the events of the first *300*. Or rather, an excuse to show all the fights that take place before, during and after.

That, and the introduction of Eva Green, is how we make do without Gerard Butler's shouting. She plays the villain who sparks the entire Persian invasion of Greece, and is a more-than-worthy centre of attention for the film's brisk 102 minutes.

Bland of make-believe

It's not enough, however. Even Green's relentless smouldering can't cover up the Greek army's utter lack of personality.

There's no real reason to root for those who are clearly supposed to be the good guys. And so the fights become boring in no time, even if they are delightfully ridiculous.

At least there are a few naval battles. These are an unexpected and very welcome treat. There's actually some strategy involved, which offers a much-needed change of pace. They're tense and spectacular, and it's a shame there aren't more of them.

As with the first 300, the film has a very specific, very stylised look. Colours are desaturated, and more often than not the backgrounds are CGI.

But there are many chances to test black levels, and the superslow-mo carnage is a great challenge for your system's motion-handling capabilities.

The DTS-HD Master Audio 7.1 soundtrack is a delight. The many effects are weighty and aggressive, speech is clear, and Junkie XL's score is appropriately anarchic.

Fans of the first film will find enough to enjoy here. But nobody should be under any illusion that *300: Rise Of An Empire* is anything but a load of rubbish. Delightful, utterly insane rubbish.

alt-J All This Is Yours Out now

Two years on from Mercury Prizewinning debut *An Awesome Wave*, alt-J are back. Short on bass players (Gwil Sainsbury left in January this year), long as you like on strong, confident songs, and suffering quite badly from Dodgy Second-Album Cover Art Syndrome.

The history of pop is littered with acts who, having scored big with the debut album they'd spent their whole lives writing, stiffed terminally with the follow-up they had 10 weeks to write and record. But alt-J are made of stern stuff – *All This Is Yours* shows artistic growth, unarguable maturity and greater ambition without losing sight of what made *An Awesome Wave* such a fierce proposition in the first place. *All This Is Yours* is stuffed to bursting-point with the sort of hooky, folktronica-inflected power-pop tunes that will see it high in the 2014 Albums of the Year lists.

Demanding stuff

Treading an assured path between high-minded IQ-pop (the cyclical Arrival In Nara, Nara and Leaving Nara) and the transparently lascivious (Every Other Freckle, Left Hand Free, Warm Foothills and the Milev Cyrus-sampling Hunger Of The Pine), All This Is Yours is a bit of a handful for your system. It's an extremely dense recording in places, portentous horn stabs grinding against minor-key synth beds and wordless, openthroated choirs. Stereo focus and separation are key, then, as is tonal variation enough to make sense of the diverse instrumental palate.

LEONARD COHEN Popular Problems Out now

Leonard Cohen – songwriter, musician, novelist, poet, monk, lover and defraudee – marked his 80th birthday on 21st September with this, the 13th studio album of a career that's well into its sixth decade.

Popular Problems comprises nine songs of tastefully arranged, quietly intense complexity. Tempos top out at 'stately' (the dignified chick-aboom of *Did I Ever Love You*). Instrumentation is lushly organic, built around organ, pianos electric and analogue, electric or stand-up bass, with occasional string- or horn-stabs for texture and punctuation. The female chorus that's served to lighten the shadows of Cohen's deep, dark vocal ever since his 80s renaissance (*Various Positions* from 1984 and 1988's *I'm Your Man*) is in place. And throughout, Cohen delivers couplets and rhymes ("my mother says I'm chosen. My father says I'm not") that are so far beyond your standard pop-music fare it's almost funny.

A particular kind of ability

The demands *Popular Problems* places on your system aren't the most wide-ranging, but they are stern. Cohen's voice is a subterranean rumble alive with the texture of the years, and it's stage-front ahead of a band that needs all a set-up's powers of integration and textural resolution to fully communicate its Steely Dan-levels of fully accomplished musicianship. Plus it needs to swing, albeit as gently as befits a recording of this gravitas.

It's unclear if the story concerns the Adam and Eve, but they've been around forever. Adam wants to be left alone with his music. Eve likes to travel and read. They maintain a long-distance relationship while trying to avoid being noticed. What else do you do if you're immortal?

It's a mature approach to lore: moody, contemplative, but not without quirks – entirely compatible with Tom Hiddleston and Tilda Swinton's understated turns. Vampires haven't felt so fresh (or fun) in decades. This is how you rescue a genre.

Infamous: First Light PS4 Out now ★★★☆☆





Charts and diagrams don't sound like the most appealing theme for a game, but in *Metrico* they're the basis for a brilliant puzzle platformer. Obstacles react to you in different ways, and as you progress you unlock more advanced controls. Before long you're twirling your Vita around like a lunatic.

Get those three-piece wool suits, flapper dresses, fedoras and glittery headpieces out - it's time to say farewell to Enoch 'Nucky' Thompson and his merry band of gangsters on *Boardwalk Empire*.

We jump seven years in this fifth and final series, leaving behind the glitz and glamour of the roaring 20s and plunging deep into the Great Depression. With a Democrat president about to enter office and the alcohol ban soon to be repealed, things aren't looking good for Republican Nucky's political hold.

American Horror Story: Freak Show Fox HD - 21st October. 10pm

The horror anthology series continues with a fresh new set of twisted, bizarre storylines and characters for its fourth series. titled *Freak Show*. Set in the small town of Jupiter, Florida in 1952, the show follows one of the last remaining 'freak show' troupes of the American carnival tradition, complete with bearded lady, conjoined twins, three-legged contortionist and the world's smallest woman (actual Guinness record-holder Jyoti Amge).

When a rapid-response team from the Centre for Controlled Disease is sent to investigate the entirely mysterious death of 206 passengers on a plane, the last thing they were expecting was an outbreak of infectious vampirism.

These vampires aren't prettyfaced brooding teen-romancers. They're creatures of nightmare, with dislocated jaws, sickly pale skin and parasitic tendencies.

Adapted from the horror novels by Chuck Hogan and Guillermo del Toro (of *Pan's Labyrinth, Hellboy* and *Pacific Rim* fame), this is a fastpaced, gory thriller whose strength lies in del Toro's talent for building a layered, believable world.

Doctor Who BBC One HD -Saturdays, 7.30pm

We're loving Peter Capaldi's grumpy, irreverent 12th Doctor, who seems content to let Clara (whose character has finally been fleshed out with a winning temperament) handle the main grunt work of saving the day amid the pair's various crises. Unlike past companions, Clara seems less reliant on the Doctor than the Doctor is on her (she's his "carer - she cares so that I don't have to"). We've got the wonderfully titled episode *Mummy On The Orient Express* awaiting us, in which the Time Lord takes up a job as caretaker of Coal Hill School.

Peaky Blinders BBC Two HD - October

Post-war Birmingham's premiere crime family is back, bringing its violent-yet-stylish world back to our screens with smoky bars, razor-edged caps and more charisma than should be decent.

If the likes of Cillian Murphy and Helen McCrory weren't enough, the period drama has Tom Hardy joining its ranks as the leader of a rival gang. Expect sharp suits, stunning cinematography and an anachronistic soundtrack blessed with Jack White and Nick Cave.



What you need to know... AV receivers

Speaker packages can only do so much on their own. Connect a multichannel receiver and give your home cinema a boost

How does it work?

Surround speaker packages require amplification from a multichannel amp or receiver. A Blu-ray player feeds a digital stream to the receiver, which decodes this into up to eight channels, amplifies the signals and powers the surroundsound speakers. A good way to think of an AV receiver is as the engine that drives your home cinema system.

What will I love?

Watching films with the audio in surround sound is an entirely different experience from regular stereo. Your films, Blu-ray in particular, will take on a new lease of life there's a reason why it's called 'home cinema'. If you want to make a splash, invest in the Award-winning Q Acoustics 2000i 5.1 package (below) for large scale and dynamics.

What else to look out for? What will I hate?

Does it have all the decoding modes you'll need - Dolby, DTS and all their latest HD variants (Dolby TrueHD, DTS HD)? Does it have the inputs and outputs to suit the rest of your system, and is auto set-up essential for you? Read the specs and choose carefully. A good receiver to compare against would be Sony's STR-DN1050, which is a great performer.

A multichannel receiver won't be as good with music as a dedicated stereo amp at the same price. If your surround system is doubling up as a stereo setup for music, the sound is going to be compromised, no matter how good the speakers on the front left/right channels. As always, figure out what you want before putting your hard-earned cash down.

The end for MP3?

If you own a half decent hi-fi system, using 'FLAC' instead of 'MP3' files could be music to everyone's ears

For those of us that consider themselves a music lover, albeit to different degrees, we are part of a very fortunate generation. We now have access to an ever-growing wealth of recorded music of extraordinary range and depth, effectively accumulated over the last 60 years. With the

introduction of the microgroove LP record in the early 1950's, playback quality took a quantum leap forward and this also coincided with a far higher standard of recording techniques. Although further improvements have been made over the years, this was a watershed time that first introduced hi-fi as a reality.

Listening to music has many benefits

Hi-Fi is, of course, a means to an end – the reproduction of music. Many studies over the years have shown remarkable benefits for mankind through listening to music. Making music is intrinsic to all cultures and music is often used for various therapeutic purposes because it involves using the whole brain. It is believed to improve memory and intelligence, improve physical development and coordination, reduce stress and blood pressure, and even reduce levels of pain.

We now have literally millions of recorded music tracks available to us in all genres and many different formats. One trend over recent years, however, has been to deliberately downgrade the quality in order to offer quantity. The main culprits have been MP3 and AAC formats which were designed as a low cost form of delivery when download speeds were slow and computer chip memory was expensive. Neither now applies and both formats should be consigned to history along with 78 rpm records and the 8-track cartridge. Unfortunately, such is the current market penetration of MP3 and AAC formats that many people today are listening to a considerably lower quality of music reproduction than their peers back in the 1970's.



Quality vs quantity

Let us explain. The maximum resolution from MP3 and AAC file formats, which are both highly compressed, is 320 kbps (kilobytes per second) which compares with CD quality of 1411 kbps. This means the resolution quality is less than a quarter of that provided by a standard CD. However, most MP3 or AAC files are downloaded over the internet and the most used download resolution is 128 kbps, which is around one-eleventh of CD quality. This should ring alarm bells. If you are only playing back these tracks on an iPod or mobile phone with a pair of earbuds, the quality may be irrelevant to you. But if these tracks are your primary source of music, perhaps with an iPod dock into a decent hi-fi system, you are only making a very poor quality sound louder. Information is irretrievably lost and the full dynamic range is lacking. The quality will be very poor in contrast with a full

> resolution version even if you are completely unaware of the loss you are inflicting upon yourself. This can even affect the type of music listened to as most classical recordings downloaded as an MP3 or AAC file will have so much information missing, and all the complexities of the music lost, with the end result that the recording is reduced to just the essence of a tune.

What is the future of recorded music?

There are now positive signs for the future of recorded music. Audiophiles, or hi-fi connoisseurs, have been very important to the music industry as they are generally avid music lovers who aim to maximise their enjoyment by listening to music at its best quality level, which means the play-back of great recordings through hi-end hi-fi to achieve the most outstanding results. Without

them, a main driver for quality would probably be removed from the music industry. They have always sought out quality but there is now an increasing awareness among the wider public of the serious deficiencies of the highly compressed formats. Full resolution audio streaming, as well as CD quality downloads, are already available and will surely become the eventual norm with this greater awareness of the tremendous quality benefit. Consumers will vote through their purchases and will seek out higher resolution recordings. Look at Qobuz for a new high-profile entry into this field who offer CD quality (16 bit/44.1 kHz FLAC) streaming for over 15 million tracks.

How to buy a CD player

THE BASICS

CD players are pretty simple things. They'll respond well to decent equipment support and like to be placed on a level surface. The vast majority have digital outputs, so if you want to upgrade their performance (particularly applicable to an older player) an outboard DAC is a option.

There's occasionally a choice of analogue outputs. Standard RCAs are the norm, but some players mostly at the higher end of the market - have a balanced XLR option. This can often sound better. Ensure your amplifier can accept a balanced signal before you buy, though.

SYSTEM MATCHING

The arrival of CDs took compatibility issues (for the most part) out of system matching, in an electrical sense at least. Turntables, or cartridges, need a lot of pampering if they're to give their optimum performance. CD players are far less fussy.

That doesn't mean you shouldn't take care which amplifier and speakers you use in terms of sonic character, though. Every bit of a system should pull in the same direction if you want optimal results. A fast, dynamic CD player is wasted if the partnering

> amplifier produces a soft, smooth sound. The one will simply cancel out the benefits of the other.

HOW TO AUDITION

Take along a variety of discs to the dealer demo. Choose music that you know well and be sure that your test selection covers a wide variety of music. It's important that the player copes with everything you throw at it. If you have a lot of CD-Rs, make sure they work - there can be incompatibilities between recorders and players, particularly with discs recorded on PC drives. Also, have a listen to how noisy the transport mechanism is; some are loud enough to spoil quiet music.

DIGITAL INPUTS

In a world where the 5in silver disc is no longer the only major digital music source around, there's more than a little advantage in accommodating other formats. We've seen a growing trend towards CD players with digital inputs.

After all, computers, iPods and TVs now have digital outputs. And they all sound better through a well-designed digital-to-analogue converter such as fitted to Audiolab's 8200CD. Even so, CD remains the main music source for many.

Inside your kit... what does a preamp do?



The Heed Obelisk pre/px/ps is a three-box combination merging a power amp, preamp and power supply

First things first, what is a preamp? It's an electrical device that takes an existing signal and prepares it for further amplication before passing it on to the main amplifier.

All one-box amps have preamplifier sections and they have two main jobs: to select the source, and to control the volume. Sounds easy, no?

It's so easy that it's perfectly possible to make a simple stereo preamp with an appropriate volume control and selector switch. It could work well too, because most stereo sources have an output that's too high to feed directly into a power amplifier, and needs to be turned down.

Such a device is usually called a passive preamp, and can produce excellent results if care is taken with system matching.

But that's not the only kind of preamp available. Most preamps we come across are of the active variety. That means they are powered (usually by the mains) and are actually capable of making a signal louder if needed.

Active versus passive

There are certain advantages with active designs. For one thing, they are far less system-fussy than their passive relatives, and are better able (in an electrical sense) to drive a power amplifier.

Also, if you play records, components such as phono stages – once an intricate part of all pre-amplifiers – need powered circuitry to increase the delicate signal from a cartridge hundreds of times to make it usable.







The latest generation of Yamaha's soundbars (as typified by the YSP-2500 tested in *First Tests* this month, p14) has evolved the original concept. Set-up is easier than ever and the addition of a dedicated subwoofer gives the overall sound an authority the original barely hinted at. Yet at heart the YSP concept remains startlingly unchanged. We still think it's a great concept.
