with many decades' worth of technological advances. Which is what we've been waiting for.







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

Sony's cottoned onto this. But also presumably recognises the marketing potential of sexy curves, which is why it's jumped on the bandwagon but with a telly that's far less curvaceous than its rivals (the idea being that the image still draws you in, but there's less of a sacrifice when viewing off-angle or further back).

Even if you subscribe to the concept of

curved TVs, there's the issue of viewing

angle. Sit in just the right spot and it's hard


to not be impressed by the extra immersion

gained as the screen wraps around you, but

sit further back or off to the side and either

the effect is lost or the image is distorted.

We're not completely convinced of the benefits. At a fairly normal viewing distance the curve is practically unnoticeable - you may as well be watching a flat telly. We'll admit that viewing angles do seem to be better than most, but it's very hard to tell whether this is thanks to the curve or





Play the ace card

simply the result of a good panel. The KD-65S9005B isn't ultra-slim, and it can't match its main rival - the Samsung UE65U8500 - for thin bezels. But it's got a striking look all of its own. The way the gentle curve blends with rounded edges at either side is especially neat, and certainly less divisive than the wedge design of its sister model, the KD-65X9005B.

Those rounded sections at either side of the screen are actually speaker units, and

you'll notice there's no real difference in terms of actual detail. And the Sony has a couple of advantages in terms of contrast and colour. It's a very dynamic picture that combines very dark blacks with pure and punchy whites effectively, and a rich colour palette adds life and vibrancy without ever venturing into the realm of unreality. It makes some rivals look grey and flat in comparison. Once you've run out of 4K content (which will, unfortunately, only

rather interesting they are too. This is the first Sony TV to process Dolby Digital and DTS signals directly (no downscaling), which it pumps out as virtual surround sound via a built-in 4.2 speaker system. You'll know when you're getting surround sound, because the little horizontal light-strips halfway up each edge glow (unless you've elected to keep them switched off), and also because your soundtrack will sound especially large. You won't quite be fooled into thinking you're surrounded by physical speakers and it's not quite up there with a top Yamaha soundbar, but for a super-neat built-in solution this produces impressively room-filling sound with good weight, punch and nice central focus for dialogue.


So it sounds very good, but what about the picture? Clearly you're going to go straight to the (unfortunately still small) selection of 4K content on Netflix. Choose House of Cards and you're treated to a lovely performance. The level of definition adds an extra degree of three-dimensionality to the image and there's lots of detail.

The Sony looks a touch behind in the sharpness stakes compared to other top 4K TVs we've seen, but pay close attention and take a few hours) you can switch to the next best source - Blu-ray. As with all 4K TVs, the KD-65S9005B has to upscale even 1080p images to fit its 3840x2160 resolution, and it does so in style. Again the colours and contrast are the real winners here - there might not be quite as much insight into the darkest parts of the picture as you'd get with some rivals, but those darkest parts are extra dark, without any sacrifice in overall punch or vibrancy. It makes everything seem a little more dramatic and moody, especially the landscapes of The Lord of the Rings Trilogy.

#### **Motion slickness**


Sony's motion processing has always been lauded, and it's still strong here. Fast action is clear and controlled, and camera pans are smooth and generally sharp (although there's occasionally just a smidge of blur to tricky horizontal motion).

which is always a bit of a shame when you've got a 4K TV because it has to do so much scaling to the ropey old signal.

Actually the Sony does a decent job here - there's a fair bit of shimmer to thin, straight edges and patterns, but the overall picture is clear and rich. We would still avoid standard-def wherever possible, but it looks good enough when you need it.

#### **Depth charge**

The same is true of 3D. We wonder how many people are interested in watching 3D at home, but those who are will be interested to hear that the Sony is a solid 3D performer that on default settings strikes a good balance between the depth of the image and comfort of the eyes.

And as well as the outright performance of the set, Sony has also put some effort into making it more user-friendly than most. The 'Discover' feature is very good at getting you to content quickly: accessed by flicking up on the touchpad of the mini-remote or pressing the dedicated button on the standard zapper, it calls up a row of content up from the bottom of the screen. These might be programs being broadcast right now, on-demand content that's been freshly added to 'Video Unlimited' or BBC iPlayer, or things that

you've recently recorded. The system needs finessing - there aren't enough personal recommendations and it doesn't bring in content from the likes of Netflix (even if you're signed in). But it already gets you to good content quicker than most rivals.

#### Set for every scenario

Power users like us should also be pleased to hear that the Sony can be set to automatically select the right picture mode ('Scene') for a given source, and that it's pretty intelligent in action.

Watch TV and it will select the 'General' mode, turn on your PS4 and it will switch to 'Game', pop a Blu-ray in (even into the PS4) and it will select 'Cinema'. These modes can be customised, so you've got a system that can be calibrated once for every eventuality and then left to work in the background. Compare that to Samsung, which hides its 'Game' mode in sub-menu after sub-menu (and nowhere near the other picture settings) and you can understand why this might seem a useful feature to many users.

It's thoughtfulness like this and a performance of serious quality that makes the Sony KD-65S9005B a real winner. The curved design is just the pretty packaging it all comes in

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Out of the box, the Sony is every inch a stunner. Our attention is drawn to the subtly-curved screen and the built-in wraparound speakers. We're impressed by the Sony's grip on high-def *Champions League* football, and bowled over by *House of Cards* in 4K. Detail and motion are superb. Flatscreens tend to sound pretty average, but the Sony's angled speakers and built-in subs serve up a dynamic, entertaining sound.

With our PS4 plugged in and *Destiny* on the go, the Sony proves to be a great set for gaming. The picture's awesome, as is the welcome absence of any lag.

The Sony uses active shutter 3D tech to fine effect, but we can't help feeling passive 3D would result in an even smoother, immersive image.

#### iPad Air 2 | Tablet | From £400

Thinner Air is most intoxicating

**We weren't sure** it was possible, but Apple has done it. Apple has taken the best tablet ever made and made it even better.

We're well aware that opinion isn't going to sit well with some people, but the fact is that when it comes to creating the best tablet experience on the market, the Apple iPad Air 2 delivers in every single way.

Of course when your predecessor is as good as the iPad Air 1, a tablet that was awarded our Product of the Year in the *What Hi-Fi?* Awards 2014, it's all about refinement rather than revolution.

First, let's look at the design. No, the iPad Air 2 didn't need to be made any slimmer than the slender Air 1, but Apple went and did it anyway and, at just 6.1mm thin, the result is stunning.

#### A lighter touch

Not only is it beautiful to look at, but it's lighter too, a fact that's noticeably different in the hand and makes the Air 2 easier to hold over long periods.


Its build quality is as good as ever, and its newfound slenderness brings no feeling of weakness or fragility.

At the heart of the iPad Air 2 is Apple's new A8X processor, which promises to offer 40 per cent faster performance and 2.5x faster graphics. It absolutely delivers. Never closer to your finger and movies are that little bit more immersive. Colours are improved too, richer in a vibrant yet subtle way. Video looks superb, and we'd say there's even a touch more sharpness, no doubt thanks to the new screen technology. All this is topped off with a new anti-reflective coating that reduces glare on the screen by 56 per cent.

Audio performance is as strong as on its predecessor, and the Air 2 continues to lead the way for sound quality on a tablet. It's an exciting listen, crisp and precise, with real drive and dynamism behind it. Voices are direct and expressive, and there's even a touch more detail here as well.

#### **Sound upgrade**

Away from headphones, the speaker sound has been improved too, with more clarity on offer, making it great for movies when you've

when using the iPad Air 1 did we feel like it was slow or lagging, but using the iPad Air 2 you realise that there was more to be had.

Swipes feel that little bit more immediate, taps a touch more responsive. Play a game and the better graphics performance is evident - we download the stunning Epic Zen Garden graphical environment from the App Store and the camera pans are silky smooth; we noticed the odd stutter on the Air 1.

#### **New screen construction**

There have been improvements to the screen too. While it remains the same resolution – a pin-sharp 2048 x 1536 – and the same size at 9.7in, it's the actual makeup of the display that's been improved. The three separate components that make it up, namely the cover glass, the touch sensor and the LCD itself, are now fused into one, eliminating any air between them.

Why does this matter? With the LCD layer nearer the cover glass, everything feels that little bit closer to you. Icons feel

got no headphones. We would, though, still love to see front facing speakers, like those on the forthcoming Nexus 9.

When it comes to cameras on tablets, we're still not sold. But more and more people are doing it, and so Apple is investing in it.

The camera on the rear has been upped to 8MP, with pictures more detailed and exposure better handled as a result. It now comes with Slo-Mo mode. The front-facing FaceTime camera has seen improvements too, including a better sensor that will take in 81 per cent more light.

If you're an iPhone or Mac (with OS X Yosemite) user, you'll get added functionality from the new iPad, thanks to the new Continuity features. This means you can start doing things on any one of them and pick up where you left off on another. You can now also control calls and messages through your iPad.

Yes, the Air 2's unexpandable nature does make it a little pricier, gigabyte for gigabyte, than competitors that allow you

to expand via microSD, but the 64GB version is now offered for the same price that 32GB was previously. It's something.



## Pay the cost to be the Bose

If you like your music loud and bassy, then the Bose SoundLink III wireless speaker is right for you. This portable Bluetooth speaker marries a premium-quality design with lashings of rich, deep bass.

It's also a far cry from the tinny. weak performance you get from most budget portable speakers, but at this price we'd expect a better quality of wireless speaker anyway.

The Bose features Bluetooth and 14 hours of battery life - a good start. It may not be the most insightful or balanced sound, but there's plenty to like about its weighty performance.

#### Don't overstate your bass

Play Blackstreet's No Diggity and the Bose charges along with energy and muscle. The bass is rich and punchy, it digs deep and there's texture to the rumble. Many will love the Bose's big, warm character - and rightly so. Its smooth presentation means it won't make a fuss over lower-quality Spotify streams, making your Bluetooth streaming sessions a comfortable listen. There are no bright or thin edges, and the sound is satisfyingly large. Make sure you don't place the speaker too close to a wall, though, as it overstates the bass.

There's decent detail: Alice in Chains's distorted guitars have grit and texture, while Beyonce's power ballads fill the room - and with sufficient detail. The Bose goes loud comfortably, too. Voices are direct and clear, although they are at the mercy of the midrange being pushed too far forward.

#### **Fading notes**

Admittedly there could be more subtlety and finesse to the Bose's overall performance. The meaty, rich bass is enjoyable, but it can be a bit of overkill at times. Gentle piano notes in particular can sound a little subdued when in the presence of such a brawny, commanding bass. Likewise, the sound could be clearer and have more insight. While Mazzy Star's delicate vocal is prominent in Fade Into You, it does sound a little thick through the Bose speaker. Sound can be a bit heavy-

handed at times, too. The drums in SBTRKT's Wildfire hit with force, but the impact sounds loose rather than taut.

> And even as we appreciate the rolled-off treble, we'd like more bite and openness at the top end for songs to truly reach their peak. A touch more breathing space, and the Bose would sound more open and naturally melodic.

As a portable speaker, the Bose keeps it simple: you can connect to the SoundLink III via Bluetooth, or by wiring your music player to the 3.5mm input.

Pairing with a smartphone is swift and painless, and the speaker responds to volume and track changes, smoothly. The control buttons on the unit itself are also responsive, although they do need a firm push at first. The Bluetooth isn't of the higher-quality aptX variety, but we don't think the Bose speaker has lost anything because of this (a USB port for charging smart devices would've been nice, though).

We've come to expect a certain quality from Bose's wireless speakers, and the SoundLink III doesn't disappoint. There's a premium feel to the steel-grey finish and solid build. We like the heft and sturdiness of the aluminium chassis, the soft feel of

the silicone-rubber control buttons, and the tiny backlit icons that indicate input and battery status - attention to detail that makes it worth its £260 billing.

Despite its sleek appearance, the SoundLink III has a durable design. The speaker is compact enough to slip into a backpack or a large handbag (although it is quite heavy) and it won't scuff easily, making it ideal for portable use. A decent 14 hours of battery life is another plus point (it doesn't take too long to recharge, either).

#### **Coat of many colours**

You can accessorise the speaker, while also protecting it from scratches, by slipping on optional soft covers. They come in five different colours, and cost £30 each.

The portable wireless speaker market is very competitive, and the Bose SoundLink III tries to stand out from the crowd. Its substantial, portable build and usability is commendable, as is that rich, bassy sound. It's not quite class-leading but worth an audition for its big and bold performance.

### **Lead off with AKG Bluetooth**

**Hands up, anyone** who has never accidentally tugged at a wire. We look forward to being free of this tethered tyranny, but it seems it's necessary if we want to hold on to our sound quality.

Making a case for the wireless option, though, is AKG and its Y45BT headphones. AKG's Y-series has already shown promise, with the Y50s being named headphone Product of the Year at our 2014 Awards. Will their wireless siblings do as well?

#### Unassuming on the outside

On the outside, the Y45BTs are fairly unassuming. It's a simple-looking product, which is no bad thing considering the parade of primary colours you see on the street. The understated looks are at odds with the amount of tech packed within.

Much of it is packed onto the right ear-cup alone. There's a smattering of buttons: play/pause, volume up, volume down, and pair/power; near field communication (NFC) speeds up the pairing process too.

There's also a microphone for phone calls, as well as a socket for a cable - you can keep listening even when you're out of power.

#### Left to charge

Charging takes place on the left ear-cup. Here you'll find a microUSB slot, which lets you charge from any USB source. AKG reckons the battery lasts for eight hours, although, naturally, this will depend on how much you use the headphones.

The headline feature, of course, is Bluetooth. It's a strong, stable connection and we have no complaints about it. Not once did we experience dropouts and the range is good. We wandered approximately 30 metres from our desk without so much as a stutter - so you'll be fine leaving that Bluetooth is a stable connection.

smartphone or tablet in your backpack.
Furthermore, the Bluetooth is of the aptX variety. Those with compatible sources will benefit from better sound. Speaking of which, the audio performance is very good. We're most impressed by the bass on offer.

There's a surprising amount of it,

Build quality is strong. There's a lot of plastic on the Y45BTs, but it's the tough kind considering the small size (and 40mm drivers) of the headphones. The kick-drum and bassline of Muse's *Panic Station* packs punch.

It's a weighty sound, but never overblown. There's decent tonal balance here, and the Y45BTs never lean too hard on any part of the frequency. The midrange is direct, while the treble is crisp without distortion. We're happy with the level of integration, and there's plenty of detail.

Instruments offer enough texture to be distinguished easily. The soundstage is not massive, but it is organised.

#### **Plastic fantastic**

It's not all good news, however.
We could do with more subtlety
and refinement. The sound is
sometimes bright and can make
longer listening more taxing than
we'd like. Quieter moments reveal a
very subtle hiss that's not uncommon
among Bluetooth headphones.

In use, the Y45BTs are perfectly pleasant. The buttons are responsive. Pairing is swift. They're comfortable to wear, thanks to soft faux-leather and memory foam in the headband and earcups. They grip without squeezing - we wouldn't recommend headbanging but you could get away with enthusiastic nodding.

When you're finished listening, they fold up and swivel flat. A small carrying pouch is supplied but they'll happily slip into a pocket. Build quality is strong - there's a lot of plastic but it's the tough, resilient kind that can take a knock or two.

The AKG Y45BTs are not perfect, but they do an impressive job for the money. They're portable, comfortable and well made, and they sound good too. These are well worth investigating.

Charging takes place on the left ear-cup. Here you'll find a microUSB slot, which allows you charge from any USB source.



All the controls are on the right ear-cup: play/pause, volume up, volume down and pair/ power; NFC speeds up pairing, too.

## **Cambridge breaks with convention**

Instead of tweeters the Aeromax 2s use BMRs to produce a smoother midrange

If you think these are yet another pair of conventional two-way standmounters, think again. There's more going on here than is obvious

That small driver isn't a tweeter, but a 46mm BMR (Balanced Mode Radiator). BMRs cover a much wider frequency range than conventional alternatives. In the case of the Aeromax 2 that's everything from the highest treble right down to 250Hz. At this point the sound is passed on to what is more a dedicated bass driver rather than a traditional mid/bass unit.

Conventional speakers tend to have the handover between the mid/bass and tweeter between 2-3kHz. This puts the crossover point smack in the middle of where vocals tend to be, and it's exactly the region our hearing is at its most sensitive.

#### Moving the crossover point

Crossovers invariably introduce all sorts of phase issues and result in a loss of detail. Any way of moving this handover to a frequency where our hearing is less sensitive is a good thing - 250Hz is far

preferable to 2.5kHz in this case. A BMR driver makes this possible. The unit used in the Aeromax 2 is a fourth-generation design and is claimed to have a smoother, more even response at higher frequencies than earlier versions. It's mated to a 16.5cm bass driver and linked through a carefully calibrated crossover.

Build quality is good. The cabinet is solid thanks to heavy bracing, and smartly finished with it. Colour options are limited to gloss black or white.

#### Anywhere's good

These speakers aren't particularly fussy about positioning. We like them best a little into the room, but the combination of taut bass performance and front-firing port means that they sound more comfortable closer to a rear wall than most rivals.

In addition, the excellent dispersion of BMR drivers means that it isn't necessary to play around with toe-in a great deal to get a good stereo image. These speakers are quite happy firing straight ahead, delivering a stable, well defined and precise soundstage while doing so.

Feed the Aeromax 2s a hard-charging track such as Bruce Springsteen's *Radio* 

Nowhere and they sound right at home. There's plenty of punch, particularly in the bass, where they pound out the low notes with real authority. They sound confident and composed too; elements stay organised when things get complicated.

There's a wonderful directness with vocals - we've noticed similar traits with other good speakers that have used BMRs. The midrange is well projected and solid. Compare those with more conventional alternatives, and even the best of them - such as B&W's 685 S2s - sound a little indistinct and soft with voices.

You can add a fairly even tonal balance and the ability to play loudly to the list of plus points too. The Aeromax 2s sound far bigger than they are, and deliver a pleasing sense of scale when the music demands.

#### A question of subtlety

Things aren't perfect though. These
Cambridges aren't particularly subtlesounding. They deliver a decent amount
of detail but they never seem to render
low-level dynamics with much conviction,
so the way a great artist such as Nina
Simone uses her voice isn't communicated
as well as it could be. Nuances are flattened

and, in the process, some of the emotional engagement is lost.

The way the standmounters latch on to a

The way the standmounters latch on to a rhythm track is pretty good, but they could do it with a bit more enthusiasm. Fastmoving tunes such as Michael Jackson's *Wanna Be Startin' Somethin'* sound a little laboured, lacking their usual dose of energy and momentum.

Despite our criticisms we like the Aeromax 2s. Using a single driver across treble and midrange has clear benefits and few rivals sound as confident and large scale. We don't think the 2s are far from challenging the best at this price. They just need just a little more development to help them get there. How about it Cambridge?

## Net gains, Aventage Yamaha

Yamaha's Aventage range of AV amplifiers have thrilled us in recent years with their powerful and immersive surround sound.

The brand new Yamaha RX-A1040 fits into this brawny, muscular mould, but the £1000 seven-channel amplifier isn't quite the resounding success we've come to expect from Yamaha.

Yamaha plays to its strengths: the RX-A1040 is powerful, punchy and energetic. Play Captain America: The Winter Soldier on Blu-ray, and the RX-A1040 relishes the chance to flex its muscles. The 7.1 DTS-HD Master Audio soundtrack sounds solid and weighty, with special effects whizzing across the room with a great deal of gusto. Explosions are big, loud and pack quite a meaty punch, while gunshots are taut and piercing.

#### Voice of reason

It's not lacking in detail either, with the zing and clank of metallic objects having plenty of bite. Voices are clear and direct, and the sparkly dialogue doesn't get lost amid frantic action scenes. Switch to a music Blu-ray, and Beyonce's vocals are smooth in her I Am Yours live performance, while rhythmically it's snappy and enthusiastic enough to keep us hooked. It might not have the outright finesse and precise cohesion needed for music, but the Yamaha does make it exciting.

What surprises us is just how aggressive the RX-A1040 sounds. Crashes and bangs are delivered with more force than expected - there's a slightly hard edge that makes us wince when the action gets explosive. The piercing top end has a spiky edge, too.

#### Scale it back

While we've always enjoyed the brawny character of Yamaha receivers, there's always been a great deal of subtlety, a grand sense of scale, and stunningly precise surround steering to go with all that power. It's disappointing, then, that the RX-A1040 isn't quite as immersive, or as open as we honed.

Special effects jump out at you from all directions, but we can't feel the movement of objects as they travel across the soundfield. Likewise, there's no sense of

wide, expansive openness as the scene moves from a crowded street up to the roof of a skyscraper - it doesn't have the subtlety to reflect the change in scale.

#### Insightful character

Compare it with the Pioneer SC-LX58 (one of the RX-A1040's direct rivals in this price range), and you will immediately hear how the Yamaha is missing that last ounce of insight that would allow for a more rounded and expressive performance. The Pioneer amplifier is admittedly more expensive at £1400, but its performance is just that much more refined, engaging and flat-out thrilling.

The RX-A1040 unit itself is a solid, sturdy chassis, and the finish (available in either black or titanium) is impeccable. The aluminium fascia is neat and sleek, with control buttons and various inputs hidden away under a panel. The display is crisp and easy to read from a distance.

The auto-calibration system is crucial for setting up the RX-A1040 and optimising its sound according to your speaker package and room acoustics. It's quick and fairly accurate, although we'd encourage you to dive into the manual settings and check the speaker settings to make sure they're correct. If you have a sound level meter at hand to fine-tune the levels, then even better.

#### Set menu options

The menus are informative and easy to navigate with the included remote. It's responsive and best for changing input, volume and trying out Yamaha's various sound programs, although anyone wanting to use their tablet or smartphone for controls can download Yamaha's AV Controller app. Free for iOS and Android devices, it's a nicely designed interface, with colour icons and graphics to guide your way through all of the RX-A1040's features. It makes streaming from various devices and services much slicker too, although using the physical remote for adjusting volume seems more natural.

The RX-A1040, as expected, is kitted out with an exhaustive list of features. There are a generous eight HDMI inputs and two

HDMI outputs, all of which conform to the latest HDMI 2.0 specification to support 4K Ultra HD upscaling as well as 3D films.

#### Socket to you

Don't worry if you haven't upgraded your AV system to include HDMI yet, as Yamaha offers a full complement of analogue sockets, including five composite and three component inputs.

An MHL input lets you play HD content from Android devices, while Apple users can play music using the front panel USB port (it will charge the device too). You can also play hi-resolution files (24-bit/192kHz) stored on a USB stick or flash drive. No amplifier is complete

without streaming features, and the inclusion of Spotify Connect, Napster and vTuner internet radio ensures you will have hours of new music to discover. DLNA-certification means you can play music libraries stored on a laptop or NAS box over your home network - while iOS users can stream their tunes wirelessly using AirPlay.

#### The cost of convenience

We'd always recommend a dedicated stereo amp if you're playing music, but the Yamaha's warm, solid sound is well suited to streaming songs (especially of lower quality) from a smartphone or laptop.

If you want the convenience of Bluetooth, however, you will have to plug in a separate YBA-11 receiver (which costs around £50). You can connect to your home network using the built-in wi-fi or wired ethernet - both proved stable - while there's another way to connect to your network: simply plug your Apple device into the USB port and transfer its wi-fi settings to the Yamaha amplifier. It's neat and fast, and means you don't have to faff about with the set-up menu.

#### Falls down on surround

The RX-A1040 is great in every other respect - features, design, use - so it's annoying that the one thing it is supposed to excel in, surround sound, is what holds it back from five stars.

There's no need for that jarring, aggressive tone, and we miss the gleefully grand scale that's usually apparent in Yamaha receivers regardless of their price or position in the Aventage range.

However, we don't want to end on a downbeat note, as the amount of power, punch and boundless energy behind the RX-AIO40's sound is commendable. But it's not the class-leading performance you'd expect at this price. It might be a more affordable option than its main rival, the Pioneer SC-LX58, but we'd probably kick ourselves for not handing over the extra cash for the SC-LX58, for it offers a more thrilling and satisfying cinematic performance. Give the Yamaha RX-A1040 an audition, though. Its beefiness of sound and numerous features means it's still a good, if not great, AV receiver.

If it's not the Otone SoundBase's cheap price that catches your eye first, it'll be its strikingly snazzy image. Soundbases aren't particularly exotic-looking products, but the Otone's sparkly. pyramid-studded front garners some interest. Comparable to an emo's belt, it somehow invites you to run your fingers along it, and would jazz up most home cinema set-ups, no mistake.

#### Two and one

Tilt the box towards the light and you can just about make out two 5cm drivers hidden behind that grille. Flip it upside down and you'll see that bass is taken care of by a single 7cm woofer.

Analogue- and digital-friendly, it houses a pair of RCA plugs and an optical input for hooking up to a telly, while the Bluetooth spec comes in handy for wirelessly playing music from a smartphone. That's the 'Base' part - now onto the 'Sound'.

Even a modestly priced soundbar should produce a noticeable improvement over a TV speaker, and the Otone duly obliges. Its presentation is significantly weightier than the aforementioned Sony TV's - more solid-sounding and open too.

We play Percy Jackson: Sea Of Monsters through both, but only the soundbase lets

The chassis' smooth, wood-effect finish looks beyond its price tag, but build quality leaves much to be desired - the cabinet's a little rough around the edges, and the vinyl wrap actually started peeling away during our time with it. Upon closer scrutiny, we realised its slightly raised rubber-ended feet weren't all fixed on straight. We don't expect a luxurious build from a budget soundbase, but the Otone aches for more care.

#### Any size you like

Our reference 40in Sony TV is a perfect fit for the Base, though any model with a stand less than 65cm wide and 32cm deep will be suitable. Otone claims it can take up to 80kg, so you shouldn't have to worry about mounting a large TV on it.

the film's bassy elements manifest. A 'Bass' mode emphasizes lower-end frequencies, but makes the whole presentation a little boomy. We'd leave it off.

#### Loud and clear

If getting more volume from your movies is a factor in investing in a soundbase, know that the Otone goes substantially loud, yet you don't need to hit the high numbers to hear dialogue. Voices are well-projected, even if they do carry hints of sibilance.

The Otone's real issue lies with dynamics and detail. Skip to the boat fight with arch-enemy Luke, and the orchestral score's brisk, yo-yoing dynamics come across as rather dull and lifeless. Inconsistent with the lively on-screen action, its overly safe

delivery simply fails to add anything to the scene's tense atmosphere.

The Otone SoundBase starts out well with a fresh and striking design, but ends up being rather average. While expectations are fairly low at this price bracket (it's by far the cheapest soundbase we've seen to date), the Otone doesn't rustle up the detail or dynamic know-how to meet them. Whether it's a soundbase or a soundbar. there are better options out there vying for your investment.

#### Sony NWZ-A15 | Portable music player | £170

## Low-cost, high-res music has arrived

**High resolution is** the audio fledgling that hasn't quite found its momentum yet. One of its obstacles is the prohibitive price of music and equipment, so we're pleased to see Sony bring its latest Walkman out at the lower end of the market.

The NWZ-A15 is an entry-level music player, offering high-res goodness for £170. While it cannot match premium rivals on performance and build, it's a good place to start your resolution revolution.

For the money we wouldn't expect many bells and whistles, and the NWZ-A15 is a suitably dedicated device. That means no wi-fi, and no apps. Fancy some Spotify streaming or Miracast/DLNA action? You're in the wrong neighbourhood.

NFC (Near Field Communication), FM radio and aptX Bluetooth is about as fancy as the feature list gets. The screen - 2.2 inches, 320 x 240 pixels - only functions as a display and offers no touch capability.

#### On the button

You control the Walkman using physical buttons - remember those? A diamond-shaped directional pad adorns the front, with enter/play/pause at its centre.

The design is a matter of function over form. That textured aluminium face makes a good first impression, but the matte finish on the back and sides looks and feels a little cheap. We find ourselves missing the luxury of the flagship Sony NWZ-ZX1, even though it costs £380 more.

At least it's tiny. Sony currently claims the A15 is the world's smallest and lightest high-resolution music player, which isn't hard to believe. Measuring 109 x 44 x 9mm and weighing only 66g, this thing will disappear into your pocket without issue.

Loading music onto the Walkman is a matter of dragging and dropping files from your computer. The internal 16GB fills up



quickly, but you can just insert a microSD card. File compatibility includes MP3, WAV, AIFF, WMA, AAC, HE-AAC, FLAC and ALAC. The NWZ-A15 does not decode DSD files.

Finding your content from the main menu is easy enough, although the 'Back' key provides an easy escape if you do take a wrong turn. It feels a little archaic, and not entirely intuitive – especially after being spoiled by lovely touchscreens.

#### **Customise the sound**

In the music playback screen, the options menu gives you many ways to mess with the sound as well as some bizarre offerings limited to non-high-res tracks. We'd recommend tinkering with the various EQ settings and sound modes, but we're essentially happy with the default sound.

We're impressed by the agile, energetic audio performance of this diminutive device. We start jamming with Bob Marley's *Could You Be Loved* and it's an insightful listen. The Walkman shows off all manner of texture, from the obvious drumming and guitar picking to the subtle cuíca, played by rubbing a wet cloth on a stick.

Tonal balance is good, with no undue emphasis on any part of the frequency range. It's a lean sound, which helps with agility, but it never oversteps into thinness.

#### **Timing and dynamics**

Our recent experience with Sony portables has led us to expect regimented precision, but the A15 doesn't quite tick that box. Instruments are well organised and clearly positioned within an accurate soundstage, but timing isn't as taut as we'd like. There's also the issue of dynamics, which we'd like to be more expressive.

Ultimately it comes down to this: if you want the very best in sound quality and features, the A15 isn't what you're looking for. But if you're not after flashy features and merely want to dip your toe into the high-resolution water of portable music, this is a good place to start.



Oppo BDP-105D | Blu-ray player | £1100

A price that's well worth paying

In today's market spending £1100 on a Blu-ray player seems awfully steep. After all, you can buy a truly accomplished machine like our newly crowned Product of the Year, the Sony BDP-S7200, for just over £200. Can this high-end Oppo justify the additional expense? On initial acquaintance we weren't so sure, but after having spent some time with the BDP-105D our opinion has changed markedly.

First of all, it would be wrong to call this just a Blu-ray player. Unlike some upmarket machines, it matches the wide-ranging feature-set of most mainstream players, but takes the opportunity to add a couple of extras for hardcore audio and video fans.

#### **Playing the standards**

Alongside the standard disc trio of Blu-ray, DVD and CD, the BDP-105D will also play SACDs and DVD-Audio discs. While the likes of SACD and DVD-Audio are hardly mainstream formats, they are good ways of getting a high-resolution music signal into your system, and that can't be a bad thing.

As has become common, the Oppo has smart functionality: it'll deliver Netflix, You Tube and BBC iPlayer among others and can stream high-resolution music files (up to 24-bit/192kHz) across a home network.

We're impressed with the BDP-105D's connectivity. It feels as if Oppo has tried to cover all bases. There's an ample supply of type A USBs (three), HDMIs (MHLcompatible inputs along with a pair of outputs) as well as the usual digital audio of optical, co-ax and (type B) USB. The optical and coax are limited to 96kHz sampling rates, while the USB accepts 192kHz.

#### DAC's a good one

Digital inputs on a product such as this are only really useful if the on-board DAC is a good one - and it is. The design uses high-quality ESS Sabre DAC chips, as found on Audiolab's hugely-talented £600 M-DAC as well as pricier digital products.

There's no shortage of analogue outputs, either. Alongside single-ended and (the better sounding) balanced XLR stereo connections, you'll find increasingly rare multi-channel audio outputs designed for use with older receivers that don't have

HDMI inputs, or can't cope with SACD or DVD-Audio signals through them.

This Oppo impresses straight out of the box. It's a big, solid unit that, while not pretty, gives off a bold, purposeful aura. It feels like a luxury piece of kit, making cheaper alternatives seem insubstantial. The front-panel controls are nicely responsive, even if the display isn't quite as informative as we'd like. Want to know the sampling rate of the piece of music you're streaming? Good luck with that.

The remote is a similarly substantial unit. It's chunky, positive in use and backlit. We wish more manufacturers would add backlighting to their remotes. It makes a big difference in a darkened room. We like this handset, even if its layout is a touch busy.

#### Blu sky thinking

Blu-ray performance seems as good a place to start as any, and here the BDP-105D excels. We love its picture performance. Oppo has added a DARBEE processing function with a view to letting the user fine-tune the image to taste. We played with it for a while and decided we liked the picture better without the additional processing, so left it alone.

The Oppo's picture doesn't need much help in any case. Watch the likes of Pacific *Rim* and it's hard not to be impressed by the crisp detailing and richly textured colours. Every edge is precisely drawn, but not so much that it looks unnaturally sharp. The dimly lit fight scenes show off the player's impressive insight into blacks and strong contrast performance. There's plenty of punch to brights, but this stops short of glare and exhibits a pleasing degree of subtlety when required. Every aspect of

picture quality from motion handling, to naturalness of colours or noise levels is top class, and a clear step better than already impressively capable machines such as Marantz's UD7007 and Panasonic's DMP-BDT700. At this point it's only fair to point out that both these machines now retail for around half the Oppo's price, so it's clear the 105D needs to do more to justify its price premium, and we think it does.

#### **Shades of greatness**

DVD picture quality is equally impressive. There's the expected drop in performance the format's lower resolution dictates and small increases in motion artefacts and noise levels. Yet, watching *Stoker*, we can't help but revel in the naturalness of the colours and terrific level of insight. There's real subtlety to shades and colours of leaves and skin tones are a joy to see.

This player continues the good work when it comes to movie sound. It has a bold, full-bodied presentation that delivers voices with real finesse and clarity, while rendering explosions and suchlike with power and authority. Detail levels are very high and the sound presentation stays composed even during busy scenes. Here again, the Oppo pulls clearly ahead of other premium machines, making for more entertaining and engaging results. This advantage is rammed home when it comes to stereo music replay. It doesn't matter whether we're talking about Eric Bibb's Where the Green Grass Grows on SACD, a CD of Carmina Burana or a DVD-A of Missy Elliot, the results are

The Oppo is a big, solid unit that, while not pretty, gives off a bold, purposeful aura The Oppo BDP-105D has a bold, full-bodied sound that delivers voices with finesse and clarity, while rendering explosions and such like, with power and authority

consistently pleasing. There's a lovely full-bodied balance with rich low frequencies packing plenty of power. Vocals are expressive and easy to follow, while the treble just sparkles. There's plenty of bite at high frequencies but it's coupled to an impressive degree of refinement.

#### The song remains the same

It's a highly listenable sound, but by the higher standards of dedicated music players it's clear that the Oppo could do with more agility and crisper rhythmic drive. As it is, music sounds a touch relaxed and relaxing, even when the source material isn't meant to be. In musical terms we think the BDP-105D is broadly the standard of a good disc player like the Marantz CD6005, which is still way better than any rival we've heard manages. Even the Oppo's headphone output sounds good, mirroring the performance heard through the standard line-level connections.

The story remains much the same when we connect to the internal DAC with our

MacBook or stream music files across our test network. Regardless of what we listen to, the Oppo's refined, authoritative nature comes to the fore. A little more excitement wouldn't go amiss, but it's not enough of a shortcoming to take away from what is a really good performance.

#### One-box wonder

It's easy to dismiss a machine like the BDP-105D as being too expensive. If all you want is a way of playing Blu-rays and DVDs, it probably is. However, if you crave a really talented source component that plays pretty much all movie and music content to a high standard, the story is very different. Want one machine to do it all? Here it is.

Calling speakers 'bookshelf' is fine

and dandy until it comes to actually finding them a home. Some are only fit for shelves that are as deep and tall as an old-school 36in CRT TV.

But the Roth Oli RAIs are the real deal. At only a millimetre over 23cm tall, 15cm wide and 15cm deep, you will be doing well to find a bookshelf these little beauties can't sit on, or a desk space they can't squeeze into.


Given the asking price, they're nicely enough designed. Okay, so the RA1s don't feel particularly solid, but the matt-black finish (white is also available) looks smart, so too do the curves that wrap around the top and bottom edges of each cabinet. It's nice to get our hands on something at this level that doesn't looked cobbled together with a few pieces of chipboard and a couple of tacks.

#### **Bouncing off the walls**

The Roths are a two-way design: each speaker features a one-inch silk dome tweeter and rather petite, four-inch fibreglass hybrid mid/bass driver. The two run-of-the-mill speaker terminals on the back of each speaker are joined by a small bass port and wall mount. Each speaker slots onto a screw-in bracket supplied in the box.

Just as you'd want from a speaker at this price and size, the Oli RA1s aren't too fussed when you place them against a rear wall. If anything, the compact cabinets thrive on





the proximity - the inclusion of a rear bass port helps to reinforce low frequencies and give them a greater sense of impact compared to when they're placed out in the open.

#### **Comes out fighting**

Play Drake's *Take Care* and the Roths jump into action - the opening exchanges are rhythmic and tightly controlled. As Drake's vocal and the percussion kick in, there's an impressive sense of weight and drive to the track - the powerful bassline acts as a solid foundation and the Roths produce just enough low-frequency heft for the listener to feast on.

Faced with the Foo Fighters' My Hero, the RAIs rock out with impressive detail and dynamics. Drum kicks and guitar riffs are tight and attacking, with plenty of expression and emotion coming across from Dave Grohl's vocal. The Roths also possess enough dexterity to cope with a shift in pace to tracks that demand a more delicate, gentle approach.

You just need to take a little bit of care when cranking up the volume - the Roths harden and brighten up ever-so slightly when they're stressed, but this only creeps

in when the volume moves towards anti-social. Otherwise they conjure up a decent sense of scale and show impressive weight and authority, all the more impressive given their small dimensions.

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

## **Class-leading portable carries the day**

It's almost a surprise that a speaker company as renowned and as popular as Bowers & Wilkins doesn't already have a Bluetooth speaker in its increasingly broad range of products. Well, now it does, in the shape of the B&W T7, its first portable Bluetooth wireless speaker.

B&W's Zeppelin Air, A5 and A7 wireless AirPlay speakers led the way in their respective price categories for Apple users wanting wireless music. Now the T7 wants to do the same for portable Bluetooth speakers, opening B&W up to an audience of Android and other device users (and, of course, Apple).

#### Thoughtful design

The T7 speaker looks like a B&W product. There's a premium look, and an obvious design flourish which helps set the speaker apart. This is mainly thanks to the Micro Matrix design, which makes for a transparent frame around the main bulk of the speaker, creating a neat honeycomb effect. It's designed to improve the sound by making a solid, resonance-free structure. It also looks smart, twinkling when it catches the light.

At 950g it's light enough to be portable and fit in a bag, yet still feels more solid and robust than you might think when you first pick it up (although it will wobble on its 4cm-deep base given too strong a prod).

On the top edge you'll find four control buttons which let you pair, play/pause and adjust the volume, and there's a blue LED to one side, which shows when you're paired.

Around the back there's a power socket and aux input for non-Bluetooth devices. There's no USB connection for charging your device as you find on some rivals, but we think that's very much a bonus rather than a necessity.

B&W told us the aptX codec was a must to ensure the T7 could achieve the Bluetooth sound quality the company wanted, so that's present and correct.

#### Quick hook-up, long playing time

We connect a variety of Apple and Android devices without problem, as well as a MacBook Pro. B&W claims 18 hours of playback (75 per cent volume, rock music) - but suggests you should get much longer, anything up to 40 hours, at lower volume and/or with speech radio. We comfortably get more than 24 hours music playback.

The specs are solid, the features more than sufficient. But what really matters is the sound quality. And at £300 it needs to be good. Thankfully, we're impressed. The B&W T7 sound is an easy, pleasurable listen that does a fine job of delivering high-quality sound in a portable package.



Streaming lossless FLAC files from our aptX-enabled Sony Xperia Z3, music is detailed, nicely balanced and musical. *It Ain't Hard To Tell* from Nas' remastered *Illmatic XX* album has a solid, punchy bass that gets your head nodding, plus clear vocals to help deliver an open, relatively spacious sound from a small speaker.

#### Realism and rhythm

Instruments sound natural and realistic, with impressive dynamics ensuring notes stop and start punctually, helping to give the sound plenty of attack and rhythm.

Play Bob Marley's *Waiting in Vain* and though some rivals might deliver more bass, it won't sound as tight as it does on the T7. There's no flappiness, no loss of composure at loud volume - instead the T7 doles out bass weight when it's required. And it does go pretty loud. The Loewe Speaker 2GO goes louder and sounds a bit bigger but is never as organised or musical.

Play something a little brighter and edgier, such as Metallica's *Until It Sleeps*, and the T7 faithfully delivers the recording's raw flavour. You can, though, push the speaker closer to a wall to take the edge off a little and fill out that bottom end.

The B&W T7 is at the upper limit of what we'd expect most people would be prepared to pay for a compact portable wireless speaker, and beyond it for some. But if you value sound quality, as of course we do, and you've got the budget for it, this really is money well spent.

The T7 looks the part, does everything you'd expect a Bluetooth speaker to do, and sounds comfortably better than any such product we've heard at the price. Bowers & Wilkins has entered the market in style.



# 2014: The year in tech

We look back at the emerging trends and fading lights of the past 12 months

nd with a single blink of an LED indicator, it's almost time to power down for 2014. From CES in Las Vegas to IFA in Berlin to the What Hi-Fi? Awards in London, it's been quite a year - and now is as good a time as any to take a look back at what the past 12 months in tech have brought us (before we get round to going round again).

#### Multi-room mania

If 2013 was the year in which hi-fi threw off its wired shackles as the digital music revolution took root, then 2014 has been all about the multi-room music market. Sonos had long been our go-to system of choice for 'wireless hi-fi', but 2014 now has us spoiled for choice.

Nowhere was it more evident than at IFA 2014, with both Harman Kardon and Monster adding to the multi-room ranks that now include HEOS by Denon, systems from LG and Samsung, not to mention a Product of the Year from Bluesound.

The introduction of new players also brings features not previously available in a multi-room system - including Bluetooth streaming alongside wi-fi to name just one.

And with the market becoming more crowded and competitive, it will come as little surprise to hear that things appear to be getting a little heated - the news that Sonos has accused Denon of infringing patents being a case in point.

#### Upping the resolution ante

One of the features that helped the Bluesound system to claim top honours at our Awards was its high-resolution audio capabilities.

High-res audio may not exactly be a new arrival in 2014, but it has started to build up a head of steam in recent months - the Consumer Electronic Association has gone as

far as to take the wraps off a formal definition for the format.

That definition wasn't without its contentions, but it does mean it should be easier for consumers to know more about their purchases.

And if streaming is your thing, Qobuz and Tidal offer millions of tracks in lossless CD quality.

#### Small screen, big definition

From hi-fi to home cinema, and 4K Ultra HD. It has moved forward in 2014 - yet the availability of 4K content still remains a bugbear.

But there is the sense that we might be getting somewhere; the World Cup and Commonwealth Games served as testbeds for live 4K broadcasting, while Japan is also making progress with its tests.

It's not just about your home cinema picture. Dolby Atmos has arrived in 2014 with the promise of cinema-quality sound at home.

Onkyo, Yamaha, Denon and Pioneer are among the companies to have either announced or released Dolby Atmos-enabled kit, and it's very much a trend to keep tabs on in 2015.

#### The spinner takes it all

Not new, but an honourable mention nevertheless to the

humble record player, which has kept up its resurgence with 2015 now looming.

April saw another successful Record Store Day celebrate the vinyl format, and it looks as though vinyl sales are set to pass one million in 2014 for the first time since the mid-1990s.

#### But it's not all good news...

In with the new, and out with the old. We can't escape 2014 without having to say goodbye to some technology titans most notably the all-conquering iPod Classic.

The long-running rumours of plasma television's demise also came to fruition this year, with LG, the last major plasma maker, calling time on the TV technology.

And we will no longer see Nokia's name on smartphones, following the sale of its mobile division to Microsoft - the end of an era with the end of an iconic mobile brand

#### Back to the future

So, what comes next? Will OLED TV hopes be realised? Will bigger smartphones steal the tablet's thunder? And will "wireless hi-fi" reach new heights? We shall see.

The "world's slimmest soundbar" - that's how Humax bills this unit. Indeed, measuring just 2cm deep, it's as thin as a Mars bar (we checked).

Humax is best known for its set-top boxes and PVRs, so it deserves kudos for entering the crowded budget-soundbar market. And we're quite taken with the Korean company's nickname for the bar, too: 'The Blade'.

The STA-12000BSW is less than 4cm tall, too, so it's safe to say it will sit in front of your telly without blocking any part of the screen. Its broad 120cm frame makes up for its slenderness elsewhere – it spreads approximately the width of an average 55in telly. It does, though, sit on a small plastic stand and can topple fairly easily if it's nudged.

# **Internal workings**

It's hard to believe there's room inside this bar for any workings, but the grey strip that runs across the matt-black body hides four drivers. A separate subwoofer boosts its efforts.

The space-efficient sub is easy to house, too. While most soundbars come

toting a wireless sub, the Humax's passive woofer needs to be wired to the bar (on the plus side, it doesn't require power from the mains).

# **Balancing act**

Of course, extreme slimness isn't everything - how does it sound? A skinny build on a soundbar often means thinness and imbalance with the sound, but the STA-1200BSW's balance is largely fine. Put on motorbike racing documentary *TT3D: Closer to the Edge* and it does well to avoid making screeching brakes sound brittle and hard. The sub delivers controlled bass, while interviews with bikers come through with fair clarity and substance.

Its physical proportions help it to produce a relatively wide soundfield. Bikes tear across the screen with a significantly more full-bodied sound than you'd get from most TVs - but they don't exactly roar through, and detail is fair rather than impressive. The price-matching Polk N1 is much more of a powerhouse, and outmuscles the Humax with relative ease.



We can't pretend the Humax's remote control is among the best of its kind. Prone to scratches and finger marks, its glossy black body looks and feels cheap

The Humax's lack of dynamic punch is its undoing. It's all a bit of a flat tyre really as the riders cane it around the dangerous road circuit.

We spin a CD of *Happy* by Pharrell Williams and the delivery is certainly listenable. Its presentation is spacious enough to give a sense of staging, even if it does fail to get us foot-tapping as we usually do with this tune.

Unfortunately, the Humax's strengths start and end with its super-thin frame. Its performance is an improvement on the sound of most TVs, but it falls short of the detail and dynamics of some rivals. When it comes to soundbars, size matters - but sound matters more. We'd take our money elsewhere.

# Our most beautiful picture ever

New Sony 4K Ultra HD TV

Now you can see everything at four times the detail of Full HD. It's not just detail, it's Sony 4K detail.







**JBL has given** us some gorgeous soundbars in the SB 200 and SB 400 - and the SB 350 is yet another knockout. It might be just another long black bar, but its tasteful silver trimmings and stylish semi-cylindrical body make a stylish change. It oozes quality, and would easily pocket the full five stars if it were about looks alone.

With two circular feet hoisting the bar to a height of 8cm, the SB 350 just about manages to sit beneath our TV screen. Its slim body doesn't require much space in front of the telly, though the bar can be wall-mounted, too (there's a switch on the back to optimise performance for placement on a table or wall).

#### **Ample connections**

Also found at the rear are an optical input, 3.5mm mini-jack and HDMI ARC output, for a passable connections list. Don't get too excited about the USB socket though – it's for firmware updates only. The JBL does double as a wireless music speaker though, thanks to built-in Bluetooth.

The partnering subwoofer is relatively nondescript, although it racks up points

for its practical, compact build. It's a downward-firing design using a 16cm woofer to shift the air.

### A big draw

One of the SB 350's biggest draws in performance is its large-scale dynamics – ideal for blockbusters like *G.I. Joe: Retaliation.* As we once again root for the Joes facing their arch enemy Cobra, the soundfield throws you right into the action. Fight scenes fill the room with sound, and it's immersive and crammed with detail. There's precision here – you can track every shard of glass as it splinters in slow-mo.

The lengthy ninja battle-scene is a challenge, as trebletastic metal-on-metal effects burst onto the soundfield, but the SB 350 remains cool, calm and collected, showing not even the slightest hint of a hard edge. Clashing swords have bite, but they are never piercing.

The sub delivers too, with generous bass (although we'd turn it down a bit to even things out tonally). Meanwhile, expressive dynamics make the fast-paced movie score all the more exhilarating.



Given the JBL's £350 price tag, we think the credit-card remote is a poor effort. Its buttons are neatly arranged but it feels cheap and insubstantial

The SB 350's midrange is clear - it becomes indistinct only if you turn on 'Virtual Surround' mode. Voices aren't as insightful or well projected as on the Philips HTL5140 (£270), while you can pay another £50 for our Product of the Year, the Q Acoustics Media 4 (£400) and get more midrange solidity and expression. Still, the SB 350's performance has a lot going for it with movies and music alike.

Ultimately, stiff competition prevents the SB 350 winning a fifth star, but the SB 350's showstopping design is exactly what you'd want in front of your telly. And with a decent sound that's big, dynamic and detailed, it grants movies the thrilling and immersive quality they (and you) deserve.

**FOR** Big, dynamic sound; lashings of detail; precise soundfield; elegant and practical design

**AGAINST** Midrange lacks the insight and clarity of some rivals

**VERDICT** An exciting and dynamic sound, if not quite revealing enough to be a class-leader



This time last year we were cooing over an LG soundbar in the budget market. Of course, we're referring to the 2013
Award-winning NB4530A. Its smaller sibling - the NB3530A - was pretty good too. Since then, LG has experienced a dip in form. Earlier this year, the NB5540 won points with its stylish, ultra-slim design but couldn't deliver the goods in the sound department. Here is its little brother, the LG NB4540, and it's much the same.

# Confounded not surrounded

In addition to the common stereo-plussubwoofer configuration, the NB4540 has two extra drivers dedicated to feeding out the 'surround' information of a film soundtrack, which is designed to create an enveloping sound.

Put on the *Ender's Game* Blu-ray and it's not the most immersive soundfield, though, as drones circulate in the space simulation - it's certainly not as big or open as with the Polk N1 or JBL SB350. Nevertheless, there's a good sense of depth to the sound, and the shuttle movements are easily traceable as they

cross the screen. It goes fairly loud, too. The sound on the NB4540 is relatively detailed, but the problem is balance. The soundbar's midrange and treble feel undernourished, lacking the weight and solidity of its their rivals. As Ender shouts commands to his crew, it's reasonably clear and communicative, but severely lacks body and substance.

Bass dominates the presentation. Jump to Ender's final simulation and there's deep rumble when fire engulfs the planet. It's a little overbearing, so we turn the bass down a notch on the remote. But even then, presentation is far from neutral, and gaps between the low and mid frequencies are noticeable.

# Bypass the bass

We find 'standard' and 'bypass' to be the best-balanced sound modes. Use the NB4540 for music (over non-aptX Bluetooth), and its reasonably detailed and musical character is hampered by that tonal imbalance. Play *Save Me (Underdog)* by Turin Brakes and the opening acoustic riff is too thin and lightweight.



**The remote has** a brushed-silver finish to match the soundbar. It's a decent unit, too

The slim body is mainly plastic, but its brushed-metal effect has aesthetic appeal (see above). The wireless sub has a similarly modern and shiny finish, and pumps out 160W through its side-firing woofer, hidden beneath a mesh grille.

Connections are another plus point: HDMI inputs aren't a given at this price, but the NB4540 has an HDMI input and ARC-compatible HDMI output. There are also USB, optical and 3.5mm inputs on board, as well as the Bluetooth spec.

Suffering the same three-star fate as its big brother, the NB4540 simply can't compete with the top performers. It falls short when it comes to balance, dynamics and integration- and not even a smart appearance can make up for that.

# Rating ★★★☆☆

**FOR** Sleek, practical design; ample connections; clear, relatively detailed sound

**AGAINST** Thin midrange; rivals have more solidity and balance

**VERDICT** Has its strengths, but sound isn't one. Outclassed by similarly priced rivals



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This smart-looking soundbar fought off a number of rivals to secure a place on the 2014 *What Hi-Fi?* Awards podium. But the newly crowned champion can't rest on its laurels yet; just a month on and it's under the spotlight again as it faces the next batch of contenders.

So does the HTL5140 meet its match this time round? In a word, no. If anything, a second spin only confirms its class-leading position.

Although we prefer the ultra-flat design of the LG NB4540, the HTL5140's build is far from distracting - the 5cm tall bar won't block your viewing, that's for sure. It doesn't draw attention to itself, and keeps a low profile in front of your telly.

# Assemble in a line

Once the bar's three parts are slotted and screwed together - the speaker ends hide four drivers and two tweeters, and fit into either side of the centre module - the HTL514O spreads roughly the width of a 42in telly.

It's a treat to use. A clear and bright text display is helpful when changing

inputs or the unit's seven sound modes, while the remote is responsive.

The HTL5140's wealth of connections includes HDMI, optical, 3.5mm and USB inputs. There's aptX Bluetooth - with one-touch NFC pairing - for wireless music streaming too. Completing the lot is a useful HDMI ARC output, which lets home cinema sources be plugged directly into the bar so only the one HDMI cable runs out to your TV's input.

# **Rich pickings**

You will be surprised at the calibre of sound from such a slim unit. Rich, dynamic and detailed, the HTL5140 is a joy to listen to. It produces plenty of energy and detail to make even the frankly dire samurai movie 47 Ronin mildly enjoyable.

As the samurai battle, the clash of their swords is clear, never once teetering into hardness. At the other end, there's decent bass punch. The subwoofer and bar work hand in hand towards a consistent soundfield. It might not break boundaries for spaciousness, but that's not a problem - it will fill an average



Largely a clone of the standard remote Philips supplies with its TVs, the curved handset has rubber buttons, feels good in the hand and is generally easy to use living space and goes louder than you'd probably need it to. Midrange carries weight and transparency in equal measure, so voices are neither too thin nor muddy.

The final showdown between the Kira and the Ronins is full of sound effects, but the HTL5140 has no problem unpicking the details in the action scene.

The HTL5140 finishes on a high with music performance. Play Eminem's *Rap God* over Bluetooth and it has a firm hand on the song's jaunty rhythms.

The HTL5140 remains the best budget soundbar around, impressing yet again with its super-slim design and insightful, balanced sound. Have you been good this year? Then put this at the top of your Christmas list.

**AGAINST** Nothing of note

**VERDICT** A brilliant performance and good design in one great-value package



While some brands are entering double-digit territory on the number of their soundbar models, Pioneer remains content with its three-strong debut range. Its flagship model, the SBX-N700 (which earned four stars earlier in the year) has had £100 knocked off the price, and returns to our test rooms once again.

The Pioneer is facing different competition this time - and our lowest-priced Award-winner, the Philips HTL5140 (£270). It doesn't beat the Philips, but it gives it a run for its money.

#### A fact not beyond recall

Rich, balanced and with plenty of detail, the Pioneer's performance is a solid one.

It takes some tweaking to get the right delivery, though: play *Total Recall* on Blu-ray and the midrange sounds a little distant. But the 'Dialogue' button on the remote gives much clearer character, and, in turn, more subtle detail. Voices are insightful and well projected. We recommend using the remote to reduce out-of-the-box bass levels for better balance – if you do, explosions still have depth and power, but more subtlety and

definition, too. Although we criticised the bass for being a touch soft in our first review, the N700 can happily match rivals at this new, lower price point. Treble has bite and the N700's dynamic handling of the score has lots of tension.

# Bar with a musical character

Changing EQs (see roundel above) is possible only through the on-screen menu, accessible via an HDMI connection between the TV and soundbar, so changing it mid-movie is a no-go.

We wouldn't hesitate to use the N700 for music playback: we play Lorde's *Team* over Bluetooth and its handclaps and beats have punch and precision, and good timing too. Vocal delivery has nuance, and space between the two voices gives the soundfield imagery.

The Pioneer impresses on features: you can stream music using Wi-Fi Direct, and access files on your home network thanks to DLNA compatibility. Its Miracast feature also lets you beam your smartphone's picture to the TV.

Physical connections are decent, too: two optical inputs, a LAN for a wired



We imagine most people will use the supplied remote for day-to-day use, due to its logical layout. Pioneer also offers a decent 'Control App', which is free, and iOS and Android compatible. internet connection and an HDMI output for a single-cable connection to your TV. The absence of an HDMI input will no doubt be inconvenient for some, though we like the inclusion of 3.5mm and USB inputs.

The N700 has one of the sturdiest builds in the budget market. It's quite deep for a soundbar - 12cm - so check your tabletop has enough space.

The sub's tall and narrow profile makes it ideal to place on the floor alongside your TV. It can be left to its own devices, thanks to automatic wireless connection with the bar. Handy.

It's not always a given that a price drop earns a product another star, but here the Pioneer proves itself worthy.

**AGAINST** Not as dynamically agile as Philips' HTL5140; build might be impractical for some

**VERDICT** The N700 gives the Award-winning Philips HTL5140 a run for its money



**The Polk N1** may have been designed as a 'gaming' soundbar - it's been engineered alongside game designers, is designed in-line with Microsoft's Xbox consoles and has specific gaming EQs onboard - but don't let that put you off if you're a cinema fan.

The N1 is a one-box soundbar (or 'SurroundBar' as Polk calls it) that will cover all your entertainment needs: movies, music and, indeed, gaming. Any source that can be hooked up to the well-equipped bar's optical, coaxial and 3.5mm inputs, or has Bluetooth compatibility, will work with the N1. And work well. The N1 is the first Polk soundbar we've heard - and we hope it's not the last.

#### Learn as you go

The design (see roundel above) isn't at all distracting. Its plastic shutter-like grill is relatively low-key, as are the springy keys up top that indicate commands through LED lights underneath.

The 'Learn' button complements power, volume and source keys and can be used to set-up the N1 to respond to your TV

remote in a few simple steps. It might be a good idea to do that (see panel, right).

The down-facing sockets are easy to slot cables into, though be mindful that their position near the bottom of the unit means cables with large plugs might get a bit squashed against your TV stand.

# Drowned in sound

As its size suggests, the N1 produces a big sound: open, spacious and with the potential to go loud. It's easy to be swallowed up in the movie you're watching - even without any of its four 'immersion' modes ('Forza Racer', 'Halo FPS', 'Cinema' and 'Music') turned on. We fire up sci-fi game *Destiny* through the Sony PS4, and are engrossed in its post-apocalyptic world and momentous orchestral soundtrack.

Play *Gravity* on Blu-ray and the boundlessness of space is well conveyed. Crashes are room-filling, and the soundfield has breadth. There's nice clarity and weight to vocals too, and a good degree of detail on offer. The midrange can feel a little 'shouty' though, so a little more refinement



The supplied credit-card style remote isn't much to shout about. Even though it's nicely responsive, it feels cheap and gimmicky.

wouldn't go amiss. Dynamically, the N1 shows good range, though we'd welcome more subtlety. Despite the lack of an external subwoofer, there's good heft to the sound as George Clooney pounds on the space station; bass levels prove decent during big explosions, too.

There's not the depth or definition to the lower frequencies that separate subs can give (that's the beauty of them, of course), but the N1 does have a sub output, so the option to add a woofer is there if you have the extra funds.

The Polk N1 entered the market at a rather steep £350, but a price drop makes it a very talented soundbar. If it fits in your set-up size-wise, the N1 is certainly one to consider.

**FOR** Big, dynamic sound; high volumes; decent detail levels; good dynamic range; price

**AGAINST** Size won't be practical for all; midrange lacks refinement

**VERDICT** Bar size won't appeal to all, but the sound will. The Polk will put pep into your films



**The last Samsung** soundbar we tested didn't quite set our hearts racing - performance flaws spoiled the HW-F750's nice, slim profile. So can the cheaper, newer HW-H550 make amends?

It will certainly take pride of place in front of your telly without being obtrusive. The long, slim bar is almost completely wrapped in a black, metalmesh grille (it's available in silver, too).

# Now you see it, now you don't

Turn on the bar, and the bold text display in the centre of the grille makes operation simple. Helpfully, it fades out after a few seconds so it's not distracting during movies.

Samsung partners a skinny bar with a beefy wireless subwoofer, although the sub shouldn't be too difficult to house and wins points for an attractive matt-black casing with a glossy top.

The wireless convenience doesn't end with the subwoofer: the bar can receive sound from a TV over a Bluetooth connection, eliminating wires from the equation altogether. The catch? The TV must be a Samsung model compatible

with the company's 'SoundConnect' feature (see roundel above).

Connections are as good as you'd expect at this price: HDMI, optical and 3.5mm inputs, as well as a USB socket for music playback from a storage device or hard drive, and an ARC-compatible HDMI output for a one-wire hook-up to the TV.

Unlike the HW-F750, the HW-H550 doesn't lose face when it comes to the all-important sound quality. Crisp, detailed and as balanced as any rival, the HW-H550 has a likeably confident sound as we spin psychedelic revenge thriller *Only God Forgives*.

As Julian's violent fight with Lieutenant Chang takes place, each blow penetrates the soundfield with brute force and clarity. Subtle detail permeates the presentation too, from the echo of footsteps to the sliding sound of our hero writhing on the floor, and the Samsung affords the film's synth-driven score decent pace and detail.

The sub justifies its bulky size as the bass is deep-seated and well integrated, while the higher frequencies prove equally disciplined.



As you'd expect from Samsung, the remote is attractive and well made. It's a good size and shape too, although rather over-packed with smallish buttons

Dynamically, things could be more exciting though, and a bigger, more open presentation would give the viewer a more enveloping experience.

# Loud and clear

On broadcast TV, there's decent weight to voices, although outright transparency is hampered by a slightly muffled element.

The HW-H550 might not have the dynamics or expression to mix it with the big boys, but it has a confident sound and well thought-out design. Price is a little steep when you consider the more talented, more expressive Philips HTL5140 costs £40 less, but this Samsung is certainly worth adding to your shortlist.

**AGAINST** Rivals are better dynamically; not the most open sound

**VERDICT** A soundbar that marries decent, attractive design with good performance



This Toshiba is just the ticket for those looking to take the first step in boosting their TV's audio. It offers decent sound, good connectivity and a smart design - all for a price that's easy on the pocket.

The bar has a cloth front hiding four 6cm drivers, with a plastic, oblong display. We're fans of the bold green-on-black text - it's clearly legible even in bright conditions and from a distance, and the spelling out of commands makes the bar easy to use. The display also eliminates guesswork by displaying 'paired' when the Bluetooth connection is complete too.

# Height and depth

Our only qualm is with the bar's size. Its slim body (just 6cm deep) is practical for those without much space in front of their TV, but its 9cm height can block the bottom of screens. The wireless sub has a downward-firing 18cm woofer, and is also on the chunky side.

There are generous connections: two HDMI inputs join the standard 3.5mm and optical sockets, while a Bluetooth connection is achieved by a mere tap of a device on the bar thanks to near-field communication (NFC). There's also the bonus of an HDMI output, which means sources can be plugged straight into the bar's inputs with only one cable running out to the TV.

# Weighty delivery

So far so good, but the cornerstone of the SB3950M1 is its performance. It can go loud, and the sound is solid. With action thriller *Hanna* the Tosh gets right into the thick of it. Punches are full-bodied, swinging iron doors have weight, and there's sufficient heft to trucks as they race over uneven ground.

The sub is well integrated too, working hand in hand with the bar to bring some serious weight and force to car crashes. You get a lot of bang for your buck.

Voices are projected with clarity and focus - far better than through our reference 40in Sony TV - and the same goes for presenters on daytime TV.

On the negative side, the SB3950M1 sounds a bit hard in the treble when pushed - rubble that flies up under the car sticks out a little, and it doesn't have



It's good to see such a solidly built, well thought-out remote handset at such a relatively modest price. It's a simple design with a logical button layout the punch or crispness in the midrange of some of its rivals. Gunfire feels a bit restrained compared with the Polk N1 (£200) and Philips HTL5140 (£270).

When it comes to music, the SB3950M1 is up to standard for budget soundbars. Stream songs over Bluetooth and there's detail, balance and drive, if not the dynamics or rhythmic skill to set your heart on fire exactly.

All soundbars pledge to be a step up from your TV's sound, but not all deliver – especially at this price. This Toshiba does, nailing the basics of sound quality and user-friendliness. We'd like a little more punch and refinement at the top end, but ultimately this Toshiba gets a whole lot right, for little cost.

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# TEST VERDICT



nother soundbar test, another mishmash of quality. It's hard to find a standout model that nails sound, design and great value - which is why we are so thrilled to have the Philips HTL5140 in our midst. We've written a great deal about this unit in recent months and we've almost run out of compliments. Almost. It's the best-sounding product here - punchy, dynamic and expressive - and a likely fit in anyone's set-up. For now, the Philips remains the one to beat.

Its closest rival is a familiar face. Sometimes price makes or breaks a product and in the Pioneer's case, a favourable price cut since we first tested it has made a whole star's difference. Now recipient of the full set of stars, it's one of the most feature-packed soundbars we've seen for less than £300 and one of the most insightful and dynamic performers in the budget market.

Move down to four-star territory and JBL graces another soundbar test with yet another elegant looker. Not only will the SB 350 draw compliments (we can't say that for many soundbars) but it also has a big, thrilling sound that will keep you engrossed in any blockbuster movie. Its slightly steep price, along with the Philips' and Pioneer's greater levels of insight, deny the JBL top honours.

# No need to bring on the sub

The one-box Polk scores well too. It proves you don't need an external subwoofer to get plenty of bass, and reaches out to both gamers and movie fans alike thanks to its 'gaming' sound modes. Like the JBL, the Polk's large profile has the spaciousness and solidity to have you reaching for your favourite movies (and games) time and time again.

We've almost run out of compliments for the Philips HTL5140. Almost. It's the best-sounding product here - punchy, dynamic and expressive - and a likely fit in anyone's set-up. For now, it remains the one to beat

The cheapest-of-the-lot Toshiba might not be such a powerhouse as the Polk or the JBL, but it nails the basics in sound without compromising elsewhere. You can only expect so much from a sub-£200 soundbar, yet this Tosh is surprisingly good in a number of respects and a shining beacon for our performance-per-pound ethos.

Our last four-star rating goes to the Samsung. It may be less dynamically expressive and cost £40 more than the Philips, but it has a lot going for it: weight, insight, balance and functional design to name a few.

# Playing catch-up

Which brings us to this test's also-rans: the three-star LG and Humax. While they both make a 'look at me' statement with their super-slim designs (in the Humax's case, record-breakingly so), it's all downhill from there – both models fall short of their rivals' solidity, insight and dynamic expression for us to vouch for them.

Still, there are more than a few soundbars here worthy of a place on your Christmas list, but we all know exactly which one deserves the top line.

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# □ Clearaudio Concept £1000 ★★★★★

When we're talking top-quality turntables, Clearaudio's Concept is never far from our thoughts. It's picked up the odd Award in recent years and its price has fluctuated, but it now stands before us with a cheaper price tag (down from £1190) and a brand new tonearm.

#### Pick up and play

Unlike some rival designs, which require patience, a steady hand and a passable grasp of mathematics to get them working, the Concept is a 'plug-and-play' product with no nasty surprises.

The company's own 'MM Concept' cartridge is fitted to the 'Verify Direct Wire Plus' tonearm. The end of the arm tube without the cartridge floats, as if by magic, thanks to a magnetic bearing inside the plinth. Clearaudio sets everything, up to and including cartridge weight and bias, before the turntable leaves the factory. Your involvement is placing the platter and fitting the drive belt. Before setting a

record to play, though, it's worth admiring the Concept's clean design and chunky, substantial finish. Speed (331/3, 45 and 78rpm) is controlled by a hefty rotary dial and the whole thing operates with the sort of solidity that gives you supreme confidence in a product.

And, with a copy of Michael Jackson's *Thriller* in place, the Clearaudio is little short of thrilling. It weaves a musical path through each and every one of Jacko's timeless tunes, pounding and punching its way through *Beat It* at a fair rate; poise and agility in equal measure.

#### Pause to reflect

There's a real sense of snap as Jacko whips through the verses, each line punctuated by a very brief, yet perfectly timed pause - the silence hangs just long enough before the track powers on.

If you think vinyl reproduction has a tendency to sound warm and wallowing, think again. The Concept's finessed sound invites you in for a closer listen, but it's the engaging dynamics and superb rhythmic ability that really seal the deal.

Set the needle to Jamie T's *Love Is*Only A Heartbeat Away and the Concept changes pace, taking you on a delicate, emotive journey. Strings sway in the background, allowing the delicate vocal and guitar to take centre stage. There's an effortlessness to the way this deck delivers any type of musical genre.

Whatever your taste, the Concept bursts with musical flavour.

#### All hands on this deck

Some might think the idea of a high-end plug-and-play turntable could take something away from the vinyl experience, but the Concept is so beautifully executed that it simply allows you more time to enjoy the music. A stunning deck.

# Pro-Ject 2-Xperience 2-Pack

£900 \*\*\*\*

It's surprising what a slab of clear acrylic and a dash of carbon fibre can do. Take the 2-Xperience 2-Pack - it looks flashy and exciting straight out of the box (at least once you've put all the various pieces together).

We've already had some, er, experience of the Xperience in previous years, but never this combination of tonearm and cartridge. Pro-Ject's striking 9cc Evolution arm features a conical, carbon fibre tube fitted with Ortofon's 2M Blue moving-magnet cartridge.

# On a firm footing

Instead of sitting underneath the platter, the motor is decoupled and sits suspended to help ward off the effects of unwanted vibrations. In a similar vein, each of the three feet has a Sorbothane inlay to give more pliant isolation for the deck.

Assembly includes positioning and ensuring the drive belt sits level along

the middle of the platter - you will also notice the absence of any switch to change speed. This requires a spot of manual labour - moving the belt from one motor pulley to the next, depending on the required speed. It isn't as convenient as being able to flick a switch, but vinyl junkies will love the chance to get hands-on.

# You're gonna carry that weight

The Pro-Ject is the only model here to come with its own record weight - the hefty disc-like device screws onto the spindle and sandwiches the record between itself and the vinyl-topped MDF platter. Pro-Ject claims this gives the 'perfect playback platform'. Experiment for yourself and see if you can hear a difference.

In our opinion, having the weight in place allows music to sound a touch clearer and more solid. And in general, these are areas where the 2-Xperience 2-Pack scores highly. Playing Michael Jackson's *Smooth Criminal* there's a real

sense of solidity to the pounding heartbeat at the beginning of the track. It's soon substituted for the track's bruising bassline and snappy percussion hits. It's an exciting sound for sure

The only area where we'd ask for more is when it comes down to uncovering the subtle nuances of the track. Sometimes, more delicate moments feel as though they're being washed over and ever so slightly steamrollered by the Pro-Ject. Timing suffers, and the turntable doesn't communicate as fluently and deliver the same dose of sonic charm as its closest rivals.

Still, this is a very fine effort, from a fine-looking deck.

# 3 Rega RP6/Exact £1000 \*\*\*\*

Take a peek inside Rega's trophy cabinet and you will find a couple of What Hi-Fi? Awards confirming our hearty admiration for Rega's RP6/Exact combo. It's been our go-to package in recent years, but how does it fare against some of the new, and improved, competition out there?

You can buy an RP6 turntable without the Exact moving-magnet cartridge, although we wouldn't recommend it. The pair work so well together, there's little to be gained by going through the potential trials and tribulations of mixing and matching.

#### Twist to the turn

Rega tends to add its own twist on turntable design and this is evident in the RP6/Exact. The turntable uses a layered glass platter, which is thicker and heavier on the outside of the disc. This increases inertia and helps to promote greater speed stability, without adding too much weight to the plinth

and main bearing. Rega's engineers have long felt too much mass spoils the sound.

This school of thought also helps explain the lightweight plinth. Rega ensures extra rigidity by using a special resin coating - and it also adds extra bracing between the tonearm and main bearing.

#### Isolationism stance

The deck's lack of isolation (apart from three rubber feet, that is) means careful positioning is a must. A level, rigid surface away from speakers (they give off their own vibration and air movement) should be your starting point before spinning any vinyl.

Unlike the other three turntables in this test, the Rega has an external power supply, which also doubles as the speed control. It's not the neatest solution and gives off a homemade feel, but this doesn't detract from performance.

The RP6 shines. It's an enthusiastic listen, with bags of detail. The deck rumbles through Jamie T's Limits Lie with a great sense of scale and deep solid drum kicks. His vocal sounds expressive and direct, especially as the track builds up to its final crescendo. Tracks come at you from a regimented and well-organised soundstage.

### Dynamic and expressive

Holst's *The Planets* demands greater insight, control and dynamic flux, but it's dispatched with relative ease. The RP6/Exact pairing delivers the quieter lows and crashing highs with real vigour. This turntable is one of the most expressive and enthusiastic you can buy at the money.

So far so good for the Rega. But as you've already seen, Clearaudio and Pro-Ject have put in decent showings, and we've still Thorens to come...

# 4 Thorens TD 206



'Level your turntable' is one of the first rules of vinyl club. But it's surprising how some manufacturers have managed to turn a straightforward task into one of the trickiest to master. Handling a turntable with only three feet, unsighted and from underneath, requires juggling skills usually reserved for the Moscow State Circus.

Thankfully, Swiss turntable manufacturer Thorens has been in the game long enough - more than 80 years - to address this issue. The feet on the TD 206 can be adjusted from above, so you can keep an eye on your spirit level.

#### **Classical conditioning**

The TD 206 opts for a classic turntable look with an rectangular MDF plinth available in red, black or white high-gloss lacquer. Compared with the more smartly dressed Clearaudio Concept and Pro-Ject 2-Xperience 2-Pack, the Thorens appears functional and it doesn't really pull off the £1000 price tag. It's nice to see electronic speed-change included, but the switch doesn't feel solid or terribly nice to use.

To the right of the belt-driven platter sits Thorens' own T90 tone arm. It uses a rolled aluminium tube, which has been damped in an effort to prevent vibrations travelling up and disrupting the needle when it's in the groove.

# Cartridge in case

As standard, the deck comes fitted with the company's AT95E cartridge, but our sample came equipped with a Grado Platinum Reference 1. For the price you still get the AT95E included as a spare - useful for any slight technical hiccups...

Listen to the TD 206 for a while and you discover the deck does the basics fairly well. It doesn't have any serious issues locking onto and following the rhythm of The xx's Heart Skipped A Beat. There's a decent level of detail, but the Thorens struggles to express itself fully. Highs don't quite sparkle and pop, and

the overall soundstage sounds flat and a tad subdued. It feels as if the Thorens is conveying only part of the story, whereas rival decks don't seem to have a problem expressing the vibrancy and playful character of the track.

Lows sound weighty and meaty but they also sound over-egged. Play SBTRKT's *Higher* and, as the bass notes rise and fall with varying weight, the Thorens overplays the heaviest, upsetting the balance and diverting your attention from the mids and highs.


There's nothing especially offensive about the Thorens' sound, but it does give the impression that it's out of its depth in this company. At this level, you can find much more impressive decks.

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
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his test had the potential to put our heads in a spin, but we're sold on the amazing sound quality and plug-and-play brilliance of the Clearaudio Concept.

At the top, it's really a two-way battle between the five-star Clearaudio and Rega RP6/Exact. On pedigree and past performances, we thought it would be a closely fought contest and, true to form, neither turntable took a backward step.

The RP6/Exact impresses with its muscular, powerful sound, while the Concept has subtlety and dynamics to die for. The Clearaudio is the complete package straight out of the box - no faff, no tears and no tantrums. Plug, play, and enjoy your vinyl collection like you've never enjoyed it before. But to be fair, whether you plump for the Clearaudio or the Rega, we know you won't be disappointed. Pro-ject's

2-Xperience 2-Pack puts in a good showing. It's a glamorous-looking deck with real presence, and demonstrates plenty of drive and authority as part of the deal. Rival decks just happen to display a greater sense of rhythm and communicate subtleties more explicitly.

# Last, and somewhat least

Which leaves the Thorens propping up the test table in fourth position. For the money it's a decent enough deck, but doesn't really sell itself, whether you're talking looks-wise or the audio quality. It's not an offensive sound, but there is a lack of detail and dynamics compared to the better decks, and the overly-rich bass doesn't make it the most inviting long-term listen. The best in this test produce a much more welcoming, and finessed, sound.

# Audio Technica ATH-M50x



**Occasionally, you just** want something that gets the job done. That's the case with the Audio Technica ATH-M50xs: no-fuss, portable over-ear headphones, with very good sound.

Beyond the most basic flourish (silver ring and a logo), there's very little song and dance about them. We think of them more as a tool than a fashion accessory, which is just fine.

There's a lot of plastic, but it's the good kind, and it feels strong enough to withstand a lot of punishment. Earcups swivel 180 degrees and can fold inwards too. Now, if only the cable had an inline remote/mic unit...

These headphones offer an enjoyable listen. Vocals and instruments are afforded texture, and are nicely separated on an organised soundstage. It's an immersive experience.

It's not quite perfect, however. We could do with more dynamic punch, and more clarity would help treble sparkle. But if you're looking for a portable pair of over-ears and you like your sound a little warm, for the money the Audio Technica ATH-M50xs are worth checking out.

# Focal Spirit One S



**Take a look** through the Focal Spirit One S webpage and you'll find a load of stuff about 'digital nomadism'. Don't worry, Focal isn't raising an army of audiophile travellers - it's an erroneously translated statement of intent from the company, about excellent sound on the go.

So, nomadism: these Focals are certainly light enough to be lugged about. And despite the lightweight materials (which don't feel very luxurious), these Focals are solid. Their limited folding and swivelling skills mean they're not as compact as we'd like, but at least you get a cloth bag and chunky, hard case for stowing them.

As for the sound, these are a lovely, easy listen. It's a balanced sound, never leaning too hard on any particular part of the frequency range. Punch and accuracy of timing are good enough to convey a strong sense of energy.

We'd like a bit more clarity and sparkle, though, particularly around the treble, which feels a little closed-in. The Focals also lack some thrust. We like the smooth sound, but feel the Spirit One S's character is at times too laid-back.

# Grado SR125e £150



When it comes to Grado, some things just don't change. You have to take them for what they are. Many of our comments about the Grado SR125es will have been said before, and will be again. You won't buy them for their design, which is unashamedly idiosyncratic. They look like a headset for a 1950s shortwave radio.

The SR125es are sturdier than they appear, with swivelling ear cups and detachable foam-pads attached to a thin band of faux-leather, courtesy of some short metal rods.

You won't buy the SR125es for their noise isolation. Indeed, Grado seem to design their headphones with the very opposite in mind. These are about as open as can be. Don't wear these on a bus - the Grados are supposed to be experienced at home, on your lonesome. They're awesomely detailed, with impressive texture. The open back affords them plenty of space, and so the soundstage is very wide.

These Grados pound along with pace and energy: overall, you have great performance for the money, with detail, precision and musicality.

# Philips Fidelio M1MKII £180



**As the name** implies, these are a second take on the Philips Fidelio M1s. You might not know it, because they look virtually identical, but that's no bad thing, because the M1s were lovely.

The MKIIs have a light yet sturdy body of mostly metal and leather. The earpads of memory foam sit snugly, providing a good deal of passive noise isolation. Internally, the new design boasts a lighter voice coil, extended high frequencies and more accurately tuned bass. It certainly works: while the looks have barely changed, the sound is a clear step up.

There is an abundance of detail, only now it is accompanied by a larger sense of space, with more precision and greater clarity. It's a fun listen. There's plenty of punch, with tight timing and strong dynamics. The bass is weighty as ever, but now it's tauter and better defined.

The high end is natural and sweet, and vocals have room to breathe. If you're looking for great portables under £200, you've found them.

# Samsung Level-On £170



Samsung is not the first name that springs to mind when we think of headphones. The company is trying to change that. The Level-Ins didn't set our world alight – so will the Level-Ons? Sadly, no. It's not near the level of sound quality we expect for £170. It's not that they do anything particularly badly – it's just, for the money, we expect something special.

Instruments are not as distinctive as they are on similarly-priced rivals. The Level-Ons are not very agile either. We'd also like a greater sense of space and definition. Drumbeats, for example, could be tighter. To make matters worse, these are designed with Samsung Galaxy devices in mind - controls don't work with other devices.

They're well made and comfortable to wear and fold up for stowing away, with a nice zip-up hard case. But our second encounter with the Samsung Level range is a disappointment. They don't do any one thing wrong, but for the money, we expect them to get more things right.

# Sennbeiser Urbanite £150



**Headphones have become** more flamboyant in recent years. Hence the Urbanites, which promise "urban style on the move".

What you get is a chunky metal headband, part of which is covered in fabric and rubbery plastic. The rest of it has a metallic paint job, which extends to the plastic earcups. These fold inwards, while a flat cable fights tangles. Build quality is strong, overall.

Audio-wise, these Sennheisers have a punchy sound, which is mainly due to the bass, which is somewhat exaggerated. There's an undeniable emphasis on the low end. It's well defined: listen to Lorde and the sparse basslines are taut. This definition means the sound is clear, and there's a decent amount of detail on hand, but we wouldn't go so far as to call it natural. The midrange isn't as expressive as we'd like. Vocals are less detailed, less subtle and less direct.

The Urbanites are a good pair of 'phones by Sennheiser, but not the best around.

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# Apple iPhone 6 Plus £619

\*\*\*\*

#### Camera, action

You will find a new option for tweaking exposure, a faster HDR mode and a handful of filters on the iPhone 6 Plus.

After years of sticking to its guns over smaller screen sizes, 2014 is the year Apple conceded that the rest of the smartphone world could well be onto something with their bigger displays. Enter the iPhone 6 Plus.

There's no getting away from it - the iPhone 6 Plus is a big phone. With its 5.5in display, it offers the same size screen as the LG G3 but is considerably larger in the hand. In fact, it's even taller than the Samsung Galaxy Note 4 and around the same width, despite the Note 4 offering a bigger screen.

At just 7.1mm thick though, it's seriously slim and, as we've come to expect from Apple, its build quality is second to none. With an aluminium body that curves around to join seamlessly with the screen, it both looks and feels every bit the premium device. We've no 'Bendgate' stories to add here.

# First bite at Full HD

With that bigger screen comes more pixels and a better resolution, with the 6 Plus being Apple's first phone with a full HD display. It might not top the LG G3's and Note 4's Quad HD resolution on paper, but in use it still proves itself to be one of the best screens out there.

In video playback, the 6 Plus demonstrates a hugely watchable and detailed picture, with pure, controlled whites and blacks that show good depth and solidity. Colours are beautifully balanced and well judged, with the 6 Plus managing to look both punchy and vibrant without ever appearing overblown or saturated. And while we thought that bigger screen might have a negative impact on battery life, it doesn't seem to be the case. While

far from class-leading, its 2916mAh battery lasted 10 hours 32 minutes during our battery rundown test (wi-fi on, Bluetooth off, looping a 720p video at half brightness).

This easily beats the likes of the LG G3 and just pips the Moto X, but lags some way behind the 13 hours-plus the Xperia Z3 and Note 4 notched up.

Sound quality has been a traditional strength for Apple products over the years, but we can't help feel a little disappointed with the 6 Plus.

There's not the same level of fluidity and musicality as we heard in the iPhone 6 and Z3, with the 6 Plus losing its footing when it comes to timing and tempo. There's still solidity and weight, but the 6 Plus just lacks a touch of clarity and dynamic thrust that makes the Xperia Z3 such an engaging listen.

When it comes to camera, there's a new sensor on board the 6 Plus but it's ultimately still the same 8-megapixels we saw in the 5S. Not that this is a bad thing - the iPhone has always been one of our favourites for point-and-shoot

simplicity. Results are impressive, offering sharp, detailed images with quick focusing and excellent colour reproduction. Even low-light snaps fare pretty well, but noise creeps in once light gets sparse.

# Sizing up your options

Video remains at 1080p, and thanks to added optical image stabilisation on the 6 Plus it's sharp and steady. There are also slow-mo and time-lapse options too, and an improved front-facing camera, which should make selfies and video calls sharper - and perfectly framed, with the addition of a timer.

The iPhone 6 Plus's biggest selling point (size) is also likely to be its biggest deterrent. It makes the best out of its bigger screen, with added functionality when used horizontally, but it hasn't managed the big-screen-in-a-small-body trick of the G3. Most disappointing, though, is the sound. It's this that sees the 6 Plus drop a star. But if you're an iOS fan with the belief that bigger is better, it's still definitely worth considering.

# LG G3 £395

# Whippersnapper LG G3's 13MP-camera is rather stripped back, with barely any manual settings to play with other than

HDR mode.

Let's get one thing straight from the off: we love the LG G3. It's been six months since it stormed the market, replacing the excellent G2 and winning well-deserved five star praise for bettering its predecessor in every way.

But like it or not, six months is now a long time in the world of smartphones, and unfortunately for the G3 it's starting to show. LG's Quad HD screen on the G3 was a first for the market and understandably one of the handset's headline features. But while there's still a lot to like here, we find ourselves drawn to its competitors now.

### Screening test

With HD resolution of 2560 x 1440 and a whopping 538ppi, its sharpness and ability to dig up fine detail is never in doubt. However, its poor screen brightness now feels more of an issue than ever. Despite a beautifully balanced colour palette that works wonders with any video you throw at it, the screen looks a little dull in comparison to the bright screens on the Galaxy Note 4 and the iPhone 6 Plus. While this might sound like a small thing, in use it can be more of a problem, particularly when watching films on-the-go.

Watch outside or in any well-lit setting and you'll struggle to see the extra detail the G3 is capable of, because it can't push its screen brightness high enough to compensate for the environment.

This affects contrast too, and while whites still pop in dark scenes, they aren't able to shine through as brightly as they do on the Sony Xperia Z3, for example. We wouldn't mind if this helped its battery serve all those extra pixels, but the LG G3's battery life is now easily beaten by newcomers, despite a recent firmware update to improve it. Our battery rundown test (same as with

LG's G3 design is as nice as ever, thanks to thin bezels and a curved back panel. The back-mounted buttons sit at the right level, too

the 6 Plus), saw the G3 last a pretty lowly eight hours and 47 minutes, some way off Sony's Xperia Z3 at 14 hours and four mins – even the iPhone 6 Plus with the same-sized (and much brighter) screen lasted 10 hours 32 minutes.

Moderate users should still find it serves them well for a working day but power users with long commutes will want to consider carrying a charger.

We made it clear in our original review that we were disappointed by the G3's audio performance, despite its high-res capabilities. Unfortunately our view hasn't changed, and now it has high-res competitors in the Samsung Galaxy Note 4 and Sony Xperia Z3 that do better. Despite being well balanced and tonally

well judged, its overall sound lacks punch and excitement, giving it a laid-back character that struggles to hold our attention.

So this is what's not so great, but how about what is? Six months hasn't killed the LG G3's outstanding capability to make light work of most tasks, and it's still one of our favourite handsets when it comes to pure usability. Its design is as nice as ever too, with the G3's 5.5in screen fitting in the hand better than the iPhone 6 Plus thanks to thin bezels and a curved back panel. Back-mounted buttons sit just at the right level, too.

#### Snap happy

The 13MP-camera is largely reliable in most situations, so you're able to point-and-shoot and let the G3 do the rest. Detail and sharpness levels can't quite match the likes of the Samsung Galaxy Note 4 or iPhone 6 Plus, but it will do enough for most situations, including in low light, where it does a good job at keeping noise under control. Autofocus is quick, contrast is well handled, and colour balance is neutral.

To sum up, there are two sides to the LG G3: good and bad. It's still an excellent phone, but there are now better all-rounders out there to consider.

# Motorola Moto X £420

**Handy buttons** 

The only physical buttons are on the side, and easily reached, so the Moto X is perfect for all sizes of hands

One of the unique things about the Moto X is that you're able to custom-build your handset using Motorola's online Moto Maker service. This allows you to decide between a black or white fascia, pick an accent colour for the speaker grilles and choose from a selection of colours and materials for the back panel, including leather and FSC-certified wood for an added cost.

# Worth boosting the storage

It's also through this service that you can request a boost to 32GB of onboard storage in place of the standard 16GB - worth considering, since otherwise the Moto X is non-expandable.

Its softly curved back panel nuzzles nicely into the palm of your hand, making it comfortable to hold, while its textured power button and volume rocker - the sole buttons on the handset - lie on the right-hand side at the perfect height for quick access. Smaller hands should be able to negotiate the handset without worry.

# A sharp, punchy display

That screen has gone Full HD this year too, and while there are a handful of 2K screens doing the rounds this year the Moto X looks in no way left in the dust, with its 424ppi display looking sharp and punchy, and blacks as inky deep as only AMOLED screens can get.

Compared to the iPhone or Sony Xperia Z3, the colour palette is on the warmer side of neutral, but colours are still believable and don't look overdone.

There's plenty of fine detail too, which helps to give a great sense of depth to scenes. Contrast is strong, offering plenty of detail in the shadows. Viewing
angles are
good, with colours
not dropping in vibrancy
and blacks staying deep
when viewed off-axis. Screen
brightness levels are high enough that
viewing video outdoors is possible too.

The rest of the Moto X specs are pretty competitive. There's a quad-core 2.5GHz Snapdragon 801 processor and 2GB RAM under the hood, which keeps things

moving along without a stutter, there's NFC connectivity on board for one-touch pairing with compatible kit, and a new 13MP camera and flash (up from 10MP on its predecessor).

Pictures taken on the Moto X will work fine as quick snaps and for social sharing, producing clear, decently detailed images in good light with a largely accurate colour balance. The camera's Achilles' heel is really with low-light photos. Images look soft and undefined, and picture noise is more of an issue here too.

When it comes to audio, the Moto X lacks a little detail and sounds a touch tubby in the bass, but it makes up for that with a lively, exciting presentation.

There's never any hint of harshness from the treble, even when dropping down from our CD rips to streaming Spotify, and though it is undeniably full-bodied in the bass, it's not overpowering or boomy.

Battery life is respectable for its size, offering up to 10 hours 21 minutes in our battery rundown test, beating the G3 by some way and coming very close to the iPhone 6 Plus.

### Nothing bloated here

What's arguably nicest about the Moto X though, is the way Motorola has handled the software side of things. You'll find no bloatware here - and next to no brand-specific apps either, with Motorola leaving things such as video and music players in Google's capable hands rather than doubling up with its own efforts.

The new Moto X launched without any of the fanfare or fuss we've come to expect from a flagship smartphone. Still, it manages to be one of the best handsets we've see 2014.

#### **Inside access**

The ability to remove the back cover to boost the Note 4's 32GB storage and hot-swap a battery is a useful feature

**Bigger is getting** better, it seems, and Samsung is most certainly leading the way - basking in the success of its Note range by launching its fourth iteration, the Galaxy Note 4.

As ever, Samsung hasn't done things by halves, and this has to be one of the highest-specced phones we've ever seen. The design hasn't changed drastically, but it's been refined. It has near-on the same size body, give or take a few millimetres, Samsung instead working on improving the look and feel of the device as well as what goes inside it.

It's been largely successful. The edges of the Note 4 are now metal, and the back panel from the Note 3 has been tweaked to make it feel a little more grown up. We're not totally sold on the textured finish, but it does help to make the Note 4 easier to grip, with none of the slippiness of the iPhone 6 Plus.

# Same size, greater resolution

Samsung has put its ever-growing screen on hold for now, offering the same-sized display as its predecessor at 5.7in. What has changed, though, is the resolution, jumping from Full HD to a Quad HD Super AMOLED screen at 2560 x 1440 resolution and matching the LG G3. It looks stunning and incredibly sharp, with Samsung's vibrant colour palette and rich contrast immediately evident.

This continues in video playback. The screen is seriously bright, so you'll probably want to keep it down at around 50% unless in direct sunlight (which it's great for), or use the Adaptive Display setting that automatically tweaks the screen to suit your environment.

Samsung's colour palette has cooled recently but it's still on the warm side of

the scale, with colours full of punch, if a little over-saturated alongside something like the iPhone 6 Plus.

Viewing angles are superb, and motion is well handled too. Purists will prefer the iPhone's balance of things, but there's no doubt the Note 4 offers one of the best ways to watch video on the go.

This is supported by a surprisingly good battery life. Though it has a larger

battery than the LG G3 at 3220mAh, it also has a larger, brighter screen to power, but manages to better the G3's performance by nearly 5 hours.

The audio performance on Samsung devices has been a bit hit and miss for us in recent years, but with the Note 4 it seems to be improving.

Playback is enthusiastic, with an admirable level of rhythm and drive, and high-resolution music is also supported, offering further insight and detail with tracks all the way up to 16-bit/192kHz. Dynamically it can't quite match the likes of the Xperia Z3, but it's well balanced and plenty detailed enough.

The smartphone market spent years trying to rid itself of styluses, but the

Note range has always championed them, and in the Note 4 the S-Pen is twice as sensitive as previous iterations.

As far as the user experience goes, Samsung's inimitable Touchwiz is built over the most recent version of Android (Kitkat 4.4.4), and the interface comes with added tweaks. The most useful of these are the enhanced multi-window options. They give you the ability to shrink apps to smaller windows for easier multitasking.

# Camera boost

The camera on the Note 4 has had a slight boost here from its predecessor, up from 13MP to 16MP, and packs Samsung's new Smart Optical Image Stabilisation. The results are superb, and place the Galaxy Note 4 among the best smartphone cameras around.

When it comes to big-screen phones, Samsung knows what works. It's been doing it for years, and that shows in the Galaxy Note 4. Yes it's big, but it's worth every single inch of your pocket space.

# Sony Xperia Z3 £550



just last month, the Sony Xperia Z3 is already having to defend its position against a flurry of newcomers, and it's certainly not backing down without a fight.

It looks better than ever. Dropping the angular edges that divided opinions over its predecessors, the Z3's look and feel finally match its performance.

Far from just a pretty face though, the Z3 is as tough as we've come to expect from a Sony phone, offering both dustproofing and the highest level of waterproofing available in a smartphone, making it safe for depths of up to 1.5m for a maximum of 30 minutes.

The Z3's 5.2in screen is Full HD, with Sony actively opting against a 2K display, citing the sacrifice it would mean in battery life as one of the main reasons. We're not upset by that. The Z2 was a great screen, and the Z3 is even better. Colours are certainly punchy, sitting somewhere between the cooler, neutral tones of the LG G3 and iPhone 6 Plus, and the warmer colours of the Moto X and Samsung Galaxy Note 4.

#### **Detailed and natural-looking**

This vibrancy is never pushed into looking overdone or unnatural though. and there's stacks of detail, with the screen holding its own against the likes of the 2K-packing Note 4.

When it comes to battery life, we haven't seen a smartphone last as long as the Z3 on one charge for some time, managing a whopping 14 hours and 3 minutes on our test.

This year, Sony has added high-res music support to the Z3, and it's a much better performance than high-res on the LG G3, sounding exciting and engaging with plenty of punch and attack.

We listen to a high-res master of Michael Jackson and Justin Timberlake's

Love Never Felt So Good and there's a wonderful sense of space with a tight, warm bassline, and a precise, detailed character. Switch it up to Muse's Supremacy and the Z3 shows its agility, rhythmic prowess and superb dynamics.

Standard resolution tracks offer a similar character, with a lively performance that's precise and immersive, if on the lean side compared with the Moto X and iPhone 6 Plus.

Camera performance is handled by the same 20.7MP camera as its predecessor, though there have been some improvements, such as a wider 25mm lens, improved image stabilisation and a boosted low-light mode. To get the best from it, you'll want

you'll be rewarded with beautifully balanced, seriously detailed shots, and low-light pictures that remain crisp and do a good job of keeping noise at bay.

In day-to-day use, the Z3 zips around without a second thought thanks to a 2.5GHz quad-core Qualcomm Snapdragon 801 processor and 3GB RAM.

#### Heavy but useable

Sony's skin for Kit Kat is a little heavy handed for our taste - we prefer the purer experience offered by the Moto X - but it's easy enough to navigate and you can delete much of the bloatware.

The microSD card slot will allow for expansion up to a maximum of 128GB, which should provide plenty of room for your movies and high-res music files.

The Sony Z3 is every bit the flagship handset that Sony wants it to be, with next to no compromises, and very little in the way of gimmicks. Instead, everything has been well considered and well realised, creating a handset well and truly worthy of the tagline of 'multimedia powerhouse'. The Xperia Z3 won our Best Buy Award for good reason - competitors will have a big job on their hands if they want to top it.

he smartphone field is getting more competitive at the top end of the market, and this test just proves it. With three five-star products and two fours, there's not a bad handset among them.

The LG G3 is the oldest phone in the test at just six months, but even in that short time it's no longer the powerhouse it was. If video and music performance are important to you, it's behind the competition, and its battery can be bettered too. Despite all this, it's still one of our favourite phones to use day-to-day, but that can't save it from dropping a star down to four.

Joining it is the Apple iPhone 6 Plus, a big handset trying to find its way. It'll win over iOS fans looking for a larger screen,

but we felt the design could've been a little better. The audio lacks the rhythmic performance we've always loved on the iPhone, too.

**TEST WINNER** 

The first of our five-star winners is the 6 Plus's big competition, and we mean big. With a 5.7in-screen, the Samsung Galaxy Note 4 is a larger device, but also one of the best-specced phones we've ever seen. The good news is that is shines in performance too. The new Moto X also gets five stars, and is an excellent handset for those who want simplicity, speed and a near-on pure Android experience.

The Sony Xperia Z3 wins out, though. Protecting its Award-winning status with a multimedia performance that's hard to fault and a truly excellent battery life two things that rarely go hand-in-hand. How long can it retain its crown?

What's on test

Monitor Audio Airstream A100, p79 NAD D 3020, p80 Pro-Ject MaiA, p82 TEAC AI-301DA, p83

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#### Micromega MyAmp £480 ★★★★

Compact, feature-packed, and with a ruthless, attacking rhythm. These key points aptly describe the Micromega MyAmp. With a hi-res DAC and aptX Bluetooth streaming (that can remember up to eight paired devices) on its list of features, the MyAmp seems to assemble a formidable armoury of qualities.

#### Unorthodox appearance

Inside this curious-looking unit lies a class A/B amplifier. On the outside, heat sinks help to keep the unit cool.

This is unlike any other integrated amplifier we've seen, even in the light of forward-looking models such as the NAD D 3020. The Micromega's compact dimensions mean it can be easy to place in the home, but we're not too keen on its build quality. Given that the MyAmp costs £80 more than its rivals, the plastic finish (which comes in black or white) looks and feels rather cheap.

We're not entirely enamoured of the tiny 'credit-card' remote control either, but at least it has all the options and is responsive. We much prefer using the remote to having to push the unit's flimsy buttons.

Once you get past the lacklustre build quality, you'll be pleased to see that the Micromega MyAmp features a decent range of connectivity. Thanks to its built-in DAC it has single optical and coaxial digital inputs that support full-fat hi-res 24-bit/192kHz files, while the Type B USB input can handle up to 24-bit/96kHz.

When it comes to sound, the Micromega MyAmp is an energetic, attacking beast. It rips through *The Social Network* soundtrack's electronic and synth-based textures with a crisp and driven nature. Timing is snappy, there's grit and bite to the crunchy notes, and a decent helping of detail.

#### A love of speed

Feed it tracks that rely on a fast-paced rhythm, (such as from Eminem, Sbtrkt or The White Stripes, regardless of source or file quality), and the MyAmp gleefully dishes out excitement and speed. It's organised, controlled and punchy. But this attacking sound can veer towards the aggressive, which is sometimes jarring. Drums and cymbals can sound a bit edgy, guitar twangs are taut yet

dispassionate. We wouldn't call it brash, but there's a hardness to the MyAmp's sound that won't suit all genres.

It's not quite as full-bodied and rich as its rivals, such as the NAD D 3020, and we'd like more subtlety and refinement to pick out the nuances in vocals - Birdy's breathy tone in *Shelter* isn't quite as expressive as we know it to be.

We admire the control and energy of the Micromega MyAmp. The sheer driving force will entertain many listeners, and it doesn't discriminate when it comes to low-resolution Spotify streams, either. That versatile list of connections is also impressive, but its questionable build quality and less-than-subtle sound isn't quite everything we hoped £480 would buy.

#### Monitor Audio Airstream A100 £400 \*\*\*\*

Ever since we first tested the Airstream A100, we've been itching to pit this hi-res, AirPlay-streaming, integrated amplifier against its peers. We're taken by its stylish design and composed, insightful sound. But how will its performance fare against class rival and Award-winner, the NAD D 3020?

#### A fine spread

Straight off the bat, we know there's something special about the Airstream A100. The first impression is one of scale. We play test favourite *Shelter* by Birdy and the spread of sound is wonderfully open and wide - far wider than with any rival. And in that spacious soundfield the music is crisp and clear.

The level of detail is stunning, and it conveys a tune - be it a John Williams theme or the latest alt-J track - with a great deal of composure and refinement.

Stream alt-J's *Breezeblocks* and the delicate vocals are subtle, with each nuance laid bare. Guitar plucks are taut and tactile, drums hit with impact, and there's a good grip on basslines.

While we tend to prefer Bluetooth for streaming, the A100 is talented enough

to take off that hard edge that can creep in when playing songs via AirPlay. The sound is solid and organised across DLNA and wired USB connections too.

It's a captivating listen, but it's not perfect. The Monitor Audio is so intent on delivering the most revealing, refined sound it can that it forgets to have a little fun. We'd like a bit more punch to the rhythm and a touch more fluidity. It's here that the NAD's bite and free-flowing dynamics are a whole lot more fun.

We have to take our hats off to Monitor Audio for the A100's bold design. The build quality is solid and sturdy, while either black or white finish options make it look like a premium product. You can place the A100 horizontally, but it looks more at home propped upright on its stand next to your TV or computer.

As with its design, Monitor Audio has been brave with its connections. The main focus is on streaming with AirPlay, Airstream Direct and DLNA. The front panel USB port can charge up and play from your iPod, iPhone or iPad. You can also transfer your Apple smart device's wi-fi settings using the USB.

Monitor Audio's own Airstream Direct is a convenient option - it creates its own wireless network so you can stream songs when you aren't near a router.

Unlike its rivals, the A100 doesn't go much for wired connections. There's a pair of RCA line level inputs, a digital optical input (limited to 24-bit/96kHz files), and a subwoofer output.

#### Sleek and insightful

The A100's smart, sleek design is gorgeous, and its spacious, insightful sound will garner many fans. The lack of Bluetooth might not sit well with some, and on pure enjoyment terms we think the NAD just about edges it out. But for this price, you can't compete with that amount of refined detail.

#### NAD D 3020 £400 \*\*\*\*\*

It's no exaggeration to say the D 3020's bold, compact design and Bluetooth streaming powers paved the way for a new breed of integrated stereo amplifier. And even alongside newer rivals, this exciting little amp continues to impress and entertain us.

What we love about the NAD is just how much fun it is to listen to. Whether it's our favourite Spotify playlist or songs stored on our laptop, we could spend hours listening to this amp.

Key to the NAD's performance is its punchy sense of rhythm. Play Redbone's *Come And Get Your Love* and you'll be snapping your fingers along to the funky, lively beat and taut, agile guitar plucks. Drum beats are punctual and hit with impact, while the bass cheerfully rumbles along. It's immensely enjoyable.

#### Rising to the challenge

Switch to something more demanding (such as The Dead Weather's 60 Feet Tall), and the D 3020's remarkable control and authority keeps all the discordant instruments working cohesively, while also building up the brooding tension in the song. It's a confident performance.

There's plenty of rich, smooth detail on board too, along with ample rhythmic drive. The electronic instruments in alt-J's *Fitzpleasure* have texture, the layered harmonics are laid bare and the dynamic melody is handled with subtlety. While it may not have the Monitor Audio Airstream A100's level of clarity, insight and refinement, the NAD is more expressive in its delivery.

Its smooth presentation works well across a variety of genres and file types. This makes it a very unfussy amplifier - as content playing hi-res 24-bit/96kHz files as it is streaming songs over Bluetooth, even if a wired connection admittedly sounds punchier.

Like the Airstream A100, it can be placed on its side, but it makes more sense upright. The touchscreen power button on the top is often sluggish, but switching between inputs is simple.

The supplied remote control is compact and has a smooth, weighty build. It's responsive, too.

NAD's headline feature is aptX Bluetooth, allowing users to stream music stored on smartphones, tablets and laptops to the amp. Pairing is swift and easy, and the connection is stable. Digital connections feature prominently, with two optical inputs alongside a coaxial and a type B USB input.

It's worth noting that the NAD's built-in DAC is capable of playing files up to 24-bit/96kHz. You can still play full-fat 192kHz files, but they'll be downsampled.

#### Staying power

The NAD D 3020 remains a fantastic piece of hi-fi kit. The compact design and breadth of connections aside, it's the punchy, exciting, nuanced performance that truly engages us. Its biggest threat comes from the stylish and detailed Monitor Audio A100, but the NAD may just have the edge here with its warm, lively character and offer of Bluetooth.

#### Pro-Ject MaiA £400 \*\*\*

A small integrated stereo amplifier that's chock full of connections, the £400 Pro-Ject MaiA looks like a tempting piece of kit.

But the MaiA (a stylised acronym that stands for 'My Audiophile Integrated Amplifier', which we can all agree is a bit of a mouthful) isn't quite the small wonder we were hoping for. This amp may boast a built-in hi-res DAC and Bluetooth streaming, yet it can't quite compete with its rivals when it comes to performance.

First, the good stuff. The MaiA's diminutive size is a welcome sight to anyone who doesn't want to clutter their house with large boxes of hi-fi. Slim as it is, the Pro-Ject still packs some weight. It stands just 4cm tall, but weighs 2kg and its aluminium chassis exudes a sense of quality. The fascia is fairly neat and classy-looking, too.

#### Slight but effective

A slim 'credit-card' remote control is included and, while we wish it were a bit more substantial, it does its job with speed and no fuss. The MaiA is available in black or silver.

Given Pro-Ject's heritage and expertise with turntables, it makes perfect sense that the company has included a moving-magnet phono stage. If you don't own a turntable, you can connect your CD player, streamer or laptop to any of the two line-level, two optical, coaxial or Type B USB inputs. The built-in DAC is capable of playing 24-bit/192kHz hi-res files through the USB inputs; it's restricted to 24-bit/96kHz over optical.

#### **Aerial for streaming**

AptX Bluetooth is also on the MaiA's features list, but you'll need to screw in the supplied Bluetooth antenna before streaming songs from your smart device.

It's impressive how much Pro-Ject has managed to fit inside such a small chassis. It's just a shame its performance isn't nearly as impressive. While it sounds solid, weighty and has a good deal of detail definition, there's a lack of enthusiasm. The MaiA's rhythm trudges along, sounding laboured and weary - which brings down the mood. The bassline in Prince's *Let's Work* (24-bit/192kHz) sounds loose and lumpy where it should be taut, punchy and agile.

Dynamically, it sounds a little squashed, so there's no breathing space for the songs to soar and flow.

On the plus side, the MaiA sounds clear and detailed, although the top end could do with a touch more sparkle.

It's with the phono input that the MaiA sounds its best. Plug in a budget turntable such as the Award-winning Pro-Ject Essential II (£200) or the Debut Carbon (£325), and the amp has a bit more freedom to stretch its sonic wings.

We wish we could say that the MaiA is the ideal stepping-stone for someone with a record collection who now wants to experiment with smartphonestreaming. If only it had a touch more liveliness to its delivery, we'd be giving it a hearty four-star recommendation.

#### TEAC AI-301DA £400 \*\*\*\*

**With modern trappings** bundled inside a traditional-looking, half-width hi-fi exterior, the TEAC AI-301DA integrated amplifier will appeal to enthusiasts and newcomers alike.

The combination of aptX Bluetooth, hi-res audio and DSD playback makes it stand out from the fiercely competitive small stereo amplifier crowd. But can it beat the class leaders?

#### Easy listening

There's plenty to like about the AI-301's smooth, full-bodied performance. The rounded quality smoothes off any rough edges a song may have. Admittedly, this means the TEAC isn't the most transparent or revealing of amplifiers, but it does make it easy to listen to.

There's warmth and weight to alt-J's *Fitzpleasure*, and the abrupt dynamic shifts are relayed with an easy-going attitude. While it can't match the scale and openness of the Monitor Audio Airstream A100's sound, the TEAC does a good job of creating a wide soundstage.

Detail definition is decent. The TEAC's sonic characteristics remain consistent when switching between sources, and

from a CD-ripped WAV file to a hi-res FLAC file. It's only when you switch to Bluetooth does the TEAC falter. It sounds less solid, and less lively.

Play I Am A Man Of Constant Sorrow (FLAC, 24-bit/96kHz) from a streamer, and the folky-bluesy tune jauntily jangles along with rich guitar strums and clear, direct vocals. While we like the detail and clarity of the expressive voices, the TEAC does have a tendency to push the midrange, and thereby voices, a bit too far forward. We prefer that to a lacklustre delivery though, and it bodes well for vocal-heavy songs.

While there's plenty to keep you listening for hours, the TEAC's sense of rhythm isn't quite as confident or precise. It struggles to control all the elements in the complex arrangement of The Dead Weather's 60 Feet Tall. The NAD D 3020 easily delivers the punchy and taut music with all cohesion and tension intact.

#### Fit for the modern age

That exterior is certainly traditional, but underneath it's a different story. The AI-301DA has a Class D amplifier outputting a claimed 60W per channel, a hi-res Burr-Brown DAC, and an asynchronous USB input. But that's just the start. The single coaxial and Type B USB inputs support hi-res files of up to 24-bit/192kHz, while the optical input is limited to 24-bit/96kHz. There are also two pairs of RCA line-level inputs on the back panel, while a subwoofer output is available if you want more oomph.

The TEAC amp faces stiff competition from the likes of NAD and Monitor Audio. But despite its unadventurous presentation, it's still a warm, smooth sound that's really easy to listen to. Let's not forget its sturdy chassis and extensive file compatibility. Give the AI-301DA a whirl - you may just find it pleasant company.

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
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AD's done it again. The D 3020's bold, hybrid design marked the beginning of a new era of digital integrated amplifiers, and despite the surge of new rivals fiercely vying for top spot, this talented amplifier firmly holds on to its crown.

We applaud the Pro-ject MaiA for attempting to throw in every single option for the modern music-lover, but features only tell half the story. Despite a winningly slim design and a solid, detailed sound, the MaiA's lack of enthusiasm and punch failed to entertain us.

The TEAC AI-301DA and Micromega MyAmp share four-star status, but for completely different reasons. The TEAC sounds smooth and easy-going; the MyAmp is aggressive and snappy. Each offers a different flavour of presentation, but neither can reach the Monitor Audio's depth of subtle detail, nor the NAD's punchy rhythm.

And so it came down to a head-to-head battle between the Monitor Audio Airstream A100 and the NAD D 3020. Neither is truly perfect, and in the end it came down to which amplifier we have the most fun listening to - the one we could imagine living with and never getting bored of. Unequivocally, that honour went to the D 3020. We admire the A100, but the NAD's ability to communicate the essence of a song kept us coming back to it. It's a winner.

Pure has a proven track record of making good radios: the company took gongs in our 2013 and 2014 Awards. Next up is a trio of digital radios, called the Pop Mini, Midi and Maxi, and what we have here is the middle-sized unit. Why is it called Pop? Because it's the most noticeable feature of the radio. Press the comically large power button at the top and it will pop up, doubling as a volume knob.

The front has a small screen and a single driver, while the cloth-grille wrap is deceptive: sound only comes out the front. Power is from a microUSB connection, as opposed to a bulky power brick. The bottom of the device opens up to take four 'AA' batteries, or Pure's rechargeable ChargePAK D1 battery pack (£35, sold separately).

The Pop is lovely to use and a tidy device, with friendly dimensions (17x9x10cm). The sound, however, could be better. You get a decent amount of detail and weight, but there's no escaping the small size of the audio. There's a hard edge to everything, too, that can get tiring. It's a decent device for the price. Just don't expect excellence.

There's no getting around this: the Roberts Revival iStream 2 is a lovely thing. As 'Revival' suggests, this is one of Roberts' retro models, with a large grille and black, cream or Duck Egg leather-like material all over.

On one side, you'll find a metal clasp. Undo this and you can open the full-width back panel. This is where you can insert four 'D' batteries (if you're not near the mains) while marvelling at the radio's innards. Look to the top of the unit and you'll find this radio isn't the relic it could be. It can handle DAB. DAB+ and internet radio as well as FM.

You can play your own content with a USB stick or via the 3.5mm input, but the real surprise is Spotify Connect compatibility.

The LCD screen is small and monochrome, but it is clear and easily read. You'll have no problems scrolling through menus and channels. As for the sound, it's clear but full-bodied and not tinny. Tonally, the sound is well balanced. It could do with a little more bass weight, but it's perfectly convincing. Detail levels are good too. Yes, we really like the Roberts Revival iStream 2.

### **Roth DBT-003 £80** ★★★☆

We like a good price drop. Take this Roth DBT-003, for instance. It was launched two years ago at around £150, but now it can be bought for £80. Sounds like a good time to review it.

The DBT-003 is a desktop digital radio. Its dimensions (12x30x15cm) and weight (1.71kg) suggest it should be left at home. Its features include DAB, DAB+ and FM, as well as inputs via 3.5mm auxiliary and Bluetooth. At the back of the unit you'll find a USB port, but this is for charging only. It's a handsome device – available in glossy black or white, or walnut. The front has two drivers and clickable buttons between two dials.

It's weightier and more spacious than the relatively tinny sound of the equally priced Pure Pop Midi with Bluetooth. There's a decent amount of detail. Sadly this is outweighed by the lack of balance. It's a boomy sound, with thick bass hogging your attention. Songs thump along without any sense of refinement, and it's hard to pick out much nuance.

The price drop helps of course, but still, the Roth DBT-003 could sound better.

#### Tivoli Audio Music System Three+ £250 ★★★☆☆

We're never sure what to expect from Tivoli these days. Our recent experience has ranged from very good to not-so-good. What of the Audio Music System Three+? Well, we think it's a decent, if pricey, offering.

Its dimensions (12x29x13cm) and weight (1.89kg) means you won't stick this in a handbag, but a cavity built into the back acts as a handle (this doubles as a storage space for the credit card-type remote control).

It also has a built-in battery which frees you from the mains. It lasts up to 20 hours. A full charge takes 12 hours, but Tivoli says it can reach 75 per cent in three.

The Three+ is capable of DAB/DAB+ and FM, while there's also Bluetooth, an auxiliary 3.5mm input and a headphone output. The sound via the two three-inch drivers is passable, fairly spacious for a portable device, with decent power. But it's boomy, and not very clear. The treble is thin and fuzzy, the midrange is hollow and recessed, and the bass lacks definition.

The Music System 3+ is not a terrible purchase, but it is an expensive one.

#### View Quest Hepburn £150 ★★☆☆



**This is the** Hepburn, named after the iconic actress. It's not hard to see why. We think it's very stylish:

there are 11 colour schemes to choose from. But it's not long before we suspect the Hepburn is just a pretty face. We're not keen on build quality. The antenna bends with little persuasion, as does the leatherette at the front. It also takes very little to scratch the grille. For £150 we'd expect better.

We'd also hope for better sound. It's not a pleasant listen. The bass is over-egged and muffled. Elsewhere, it's a harsh, hard sound, and it doesn't take much volume before distortion sets in. It does fine on the features front: DAB/DAB+ as well as FM. You can play your own content wirelessly via Bluetooth, or plug in with the 3.5mm auxiliary input. There's a USB port too, but for charging only.

The Hepburn comes with a mains adaptor, but you'll find a flap for four 'D' batteries on the radio's underside. It's nice to use, and while there's no remote, you can download the 'View Quest' app. But all in all, we find it hard to recommend the View Quest Hepburn. Take your money elsewhere.





# "This deck delivers a sound full of energy and sparkle"

#### ■ Rega RP8/Apheta Turntable



he RP8 is the most ambitious Rega turntable we've ever tested. Initially, it's possible to mistake it for one of the company's more modest offerings, but a closer look reveals there's far more going on here than first impressions suggest. And we're not talking about the glossy finish, either.

Rega has long believed in making its turntable plinths as light and rigid as possible. If the material is light it doesn't store unwanted vibration energy as long, which is a good thing as far as turntable sound quality is concerned.

Over the years Rega has used plinths made of either MDF or chipboard covered with phenolic resin to deliver low weight with rigidity, but with the RP8 the company has gone much further.

#### A very bearable lightness of being

The central core of this deck's plinth is made of light, closed-cell polyolefin foam. This material took three years to develop to match Rega's needs. As with the earlier designs, phenolic resin skins are added to both top and bottom surfaces to deliver higher rigidity and an element of damping. The result is a plinth – available in gloss-black only – that is a seventh the weight of the original Planer 3 plinth.

To improve the plinth structure even further, the company has added two braces where it thinks rigidity needs to be at its highest - between the arm base and main bearing. Two different materials are used for the bracing: the upper layer is made of magnesium and the lower is phenolic. Each material damps the natural resonances in the other resulting is an immensely light, stiff and well-behaved structure.



It goes further than just materials. The RP8's plinth is a skeletal design intended to be as small as practical. The smaller it is, the lighter and more rigid it will be - notice a theme here?

There is a slight issue when using the RP8's skeletal form, caused by the foam core. The material's edges aren't smooth, and to many it looks unfinished. That's just the way the material is, and Rega no doubt feels the advantages in terms of performance far outweigh the apparent aesthetic shortcomings.

In addition, there's a practical issue with skeletal decks and that's how to incorporate a dust cover. While some hardcore purists may not care for such practicalities, for many people it matters. Rega's answer is to build a surround for the skeletal structure resulting in what looks like a conventionally rectangular plinth; that way an entirely conventional lid can be used. Neat.

#### The space between

But look carefully and you'll see that there's an even gap between the plinth and the surround, and the connection between the two is limited to thin rubber bands at each of the deck's three feet. These bands make sure the spacing between the two parts stays even.

It's a simple but very clever arrangement. The lack of a rigid connection between the plinth and surround means that any vibration picked up by the lid - a significant issue that degrades sound quality by feeding mechanical energy into the player's structure - is minimised, if not avoided altogether.

#### Weight on the outside

The only place Rega likes more mass is on its platters, or more accurately at the rim of its platters. Mass at this point helps to maintain rotational speed and irons out slight speed fluctuations - though go too far and you create problems with the main bearing design. As with everything in hi-fi, it's all about finding the best compromise.

The hefty platter of the RP8 is a complex affair. It comprises three layers of laminated glass. The top layer is where the record sits; the subsequent layers are rings to focus the mass on the outer edge. The idea is to maximise the flywheel effect but keep the weight at the centre low.

This glass platter sits on an aluminium sub-platter, rather than the plastic versions used in the more affordable models. We try to spot some play in the main bearing, but can't - it's as precisely machined as we'd hope for at this price. A 24V AC motor spins the sub-platter though a twin-belt arrangement. It's controlled by Rega's TT-PSU outboard power supply, which provides a clean, high-quality power feed. The power supply is fine-tuned to the specific

motor by hand to maximise smoothness. The TT-PSU also has speed control on it so you can swap from albums to singles  $(33^{1}/3 \text{ to } 45\text{rpm})$  at the press of a button rather than having to take the platter off and move the drive belt manually as with some rivals.

Compared with the plinth, other parts of the Rega may look more conventional - but that doesn't make them any less interesting. The arm is an RB808. It's handmade, with great care taken over the fit and tolerance of the bearings. Each bearing is individually selected to find the closest match to the relevant spindle. The bearing assembly is an all-new design too, majoring on - you've guessed it - low mass and high rigidity.

#### Strong arm tactics

Even the arm tube is different from those used by Rega's lesser arms. It's been designed to redistribute mass and reduce resonances, and rigidity is also improved over earlier designs. Lastly, the RB808 uses high-quality cabling with fewer joins in the signal path than before and better quality plugs.

The final part of the package is the Apheta moving-coil cartridge (see panel). It's the only moving-coil cartridge the company makes, and is the natural partner for the RP8. While it may be tempting to save the £600 it costs and go for a cheaper alternative, we think it fits the turntable's character really well and is worth the expense.

As with all turntables, the RP8 benefits from careful placement. There isn't much in the way of suspension, so performance will suffer if the deck is placed too close to the speakers or on a surface that resonates strongly. Take care

The cartridge

The Apheta is Rega's first moving-coil cartridge. The company looked at the conventional way of designing such a cartridge and decided that the workings could be simplified with modern materials and technology.

The result is a fast, agile and highly detailed performer but one which errs on the bright and lean side of neutral. Careful system matching will stop the tonal character from being an issue. Each sample is supplied with a specific tracking weight, rather than the general value given by most manufacturers.



with respect to these points and this Rega will reward you richly.

How does the package sound? In a word, detailed. We've heard many turntables at this level but can't think of one that digs up as much information as this one.

Play Mars from Holst's The Planets and the RP8 excels. There's power coupled to wide-ranging dynamics and the ability to keep a tight grip on instrumental strands. Nothing gets confused as the piece builds to its crescendo.

Tonally, things aren't quite neutral. The presentation is always just a touch lean and bright. Bass, while wonderfully taut and tuneful, doesn't quite have a full dose of weight to it. This lack of neutrality doesn't go too far though, and certainly won't be a problem unless other components in your system have harsh or aggressive tendencies.

#### **Energy and agility**

The pay-off for that tonal balance is speed and plenty of it. This is a magnificently responsive-sounding deck and it delivers a sound full of energy and sparkle. If you want excitement, drama and the ability to just lose yourself in your music, we haven't heard a better alternative for the job. The soundstage is good too. It's stable, focused and nicely layered.

Switch to Michael Jackson's Billie Jean

and the Rega is right at home. It's brilliant at latching on to that

infectious rhythm track and thumps out the dense, undulating bassline with considerable skill. Jackson's distinctive vocals are delivered with

passion and superb clarity, and are in no way submerged by the packed instrumental backdrop.

#### Takes all sorts

We scan our record collection, taking in the likes of R.E.M.'s Automatic For The People, Miles Davis's Kind Of Blue and Bob Marley's Exodus, and the Rega takes it all in its stride, delivering a class-leading combination of attack and subtlety.

This is a hugely accomplished package that lifts a massive amount of information off the groove and organises it in a musically engaging way. It's the kind of record player that has us listening well into the night, just wanting to see how good it makes the next record sound.

Rega is quite rightly recognised for the quality of its more affordable decks. The likes of the RP3 particularly have dominated their sectors, and our Awards. for longer than we care to remember. But when the company really goes for it, shooting for the stars rather than trying to meet a price point, the results are spectacular. If you have the budget for the RP8/Apheta combination, jump right in. You won't be disappointed.

hose with long memories may remember the original Roksan Darius. Introduced in the '80s, they were the company's first speakers; odd-looking high-end standmounters with a suspended tweeter and, in their earliest incarnations, an intriguing exoskeleton stand.

They could perform really well, if pampered, having a direct and dynamic delivery. Fans of the originals might be surprised to learn that the new S1s share little engineering DNA with that classic design, but we have to say they're none the worse for that.

The S1 remains a two-way design. It mates a high-quality aluminium ribbon tweeter (an Aurum Cantus G2N) with a custom-made 13cm mid/bass driver. That fearsome-looking grille in front of the mid/bass is only there to prevent unwanted poking and prodding.

#### Care on the crossover

Roksan has taken a great deal of care with the crossover design, trying to integrate the two drivers as seamlessly as possible. Take a look at the quality of the components used and it's clear the company hasn't tried to save the pennies. The crossover components for treble and mid/bass are also positioned on separate boards to prevent unwanted interaction, and good-quality internal cabling is claimed throughout.

That smart, internally braced MDF cabinet is immaculately made and finished. We like the attention to detail, right down to the curved cabinet edges and dimples machined into the side panel. It makes the speakers look so much more interesting than would otherwise be the case. The enclosure

is relatively slim in proportion, but deep enough to gain a decent amount of internal volume. Look around the back and you'll find a pair of determinedlooking reflex ports and a biwire set of rather swish WBT terminals.

While the Darius will work on third-party stands we would suggest sticking to the dedicated supports. These aren't cheap at £750, but look good and suit the speakers both in appearance and performance. There's also a tidy cable management arrangement. The combination is available in two gloss finishes, white and black - both options look smart.

A word of caution though. If you have young children running around it's worth knowing that the speaker/

> stand combination is fairly easy to topple if it's bumped, thanks to a pretty high centre of gravity and a relatively small stand footprint.

Any speakers at this level need top-class electronics to shine and these Roksans are no different. Their quoted sensitivity is relatively good at 89dB/ W/m but the nominal impedance is 4 ohms, which suggests a relatively beefy amplifier is required. We get good results with our reference system of Naim NDS/555PS streamer, Clearaudio



Innovation Wood turntable package and Bryston BP26/4B SST2 amplifier. Given this kind of system the Darius S1s soar.

We like them best positioned well out into our test room. It pays to take a bit of time getting the toe-in and the distance between the channels just so. Get it right and these standmounters produce a lovely, well-focussed soundstage that extends well beyond the physical placement of the cabinets. The imaging is wide, deep and beautifully layered with impressive precision.

The Darius S1s are immensely likeable speakers. They have a wonderfully fluid delivery that blends attack, insight and refinement well. Most high-end speakers tend to be mostly about analysis; with the better ones you'll be able to unravel a recording and spot any errors in production or the musicianship. That's

great as far as it goes, but we want more. We want to feel the energy of Stevie Wonder at his best on *Higher Ground*, and get caught up in the hard-charging momentum of the song. This is the area many fall short on, delivering lots of detail without communicating the energy of the music properly. Not the Darius, which get straight to the core of the track with ease.

#### Attention to detail

Equally, play an intricate piece like Arvo Pärt's *Tabula Rasa* and we want to get caught up in the drama of the melody and swept away by the ever-building tension of piece. The Darius SIs manage all this and more.

While they reveal plenty of detail, it's the way they organise it that impresses us most. These speakers are rhythmic and dynamic, and yet have finesse when the music demands too.

They're pretty small, standing just 38cm high, so truly deep bass isn't on the menu. Roksan itself quotes 47Hz (-3dB) as the low-end limit, so you'll certainly find alternatives that will dig deeper.

But don't dismiss these speakers on that account. Importantly, the Darius produce enough low-end weight and authority to ensure a lack of bass reach never gets to be an issue in our test room. We never feel like we're missing out on the lowest octaves. The solidity at low frequencies is pleasing, as is these speakers' ability to render texture to their bass delivery. The leading and trailing edges of notes are defined neatly.

#### Seamless flow

This solid foundation is mated to a quite lovely, flowing midrange. We're impressed by the naturalness on vocals and the utterly seamless way they track sounds from the lowest notes upwards. It's all topped off with a clear, crisp and subtle treble performance that sparkles with cymbals but has the required bite when needed. Tonally, things are nicely balanced and without emphasis on any part of the frequency range.

While Roksan has always made speakers, they have never grabbed the limelight in the way the company's amplifiers, CD players and even turntables have. These new Darius S1s are good enough to change that.

# Space opera at its very best

**Ten films in,** and things look uncertain for Marvel. Its last three films were sequels, and now one of its lesser-known properties gets adapted. Is the studio out of ideas? Not even close - *Guardians of the Galaxy* is a delight.

Suffering from superhero fatigue? Then this is the remedy. In place of The Avengers is a band of misfits: a dancing thief, a couple of vengeful killers, a humanoid tree and a gun-toting raccoon.

This is Marvel's most far-fetched picture yet, but it's also the most endearing. It wholeheartedly embraces the silly side of comic books and never takes itself too seriously. This is the antithesis of the dark, sulky nonsense that weighed down *Man of Steel*.

That's not to say this is less epic or heroic - it's just a departure in style and tone. Bad Guys still get vanquished, but capes and powers give way to camaraderie. An interstellar setting also helps. It makes for a grander, more flamboyant affair than just beating up New York again.

The result: a space opera more likeable, more magical, and altogether more *Star Wars* than anything in all of Episodes I-III.

The script is sharp. The banter is snappy and subversive. Main characters have room to develop - proof that it doesn't take multiple films to set up a good ensemble.

#### There's still plenty of action

Action occupies a secondary role, but when the time comes, it's thrusters on full. From prison breaks to aerial dogfights, there's plenty of variety.

The sheer number of colours employed makes for a seriously attractive picture. The cinematography is sensible enough to make the most of this, with no attention-deficit editing.

Music plays a far bigger role here than other Marvel flicks. There's a suitably caffeinated score, punctuated with '70s hits on a cassette tape.

It's an inspired playlist, crucial in anchoring the proceedings to a vibe of irreverence and camp.

If there is a flaw, it's with the plot. With so much attention on the Guardians themselves, there's little time for much else.

It's basically a trek through space for A Dangerous Thing. It's also never really justified why the main (and entirely forgettable) villain wants to hit things and conquer a bunch of planets.

Still, these are minor bumps. In nearly every other way, this is a thoroughly satisfying journey.

Guardians of the Galaxy is a rare beast indeed. Bold, adventurous and plenty of fun, this is space opera at its best. JJ Abrams should be very concerned.

When the app to build your perfect album finally arrives, it will have limitless options. Go to 'Instruments' and select 'electric piano', 'muted wah-wah guitar', 'mellow string sections', 'sensitively brushed drums' and 'eloquent singer/songwriter piano'. #### Still, it's a system stretcher


As a collection of songs to give your system a stretch, though, *Into Colour* is the real deal. There's not a lot of dynamic variation on show, but in every other respect this is an album to separate a really great set-up from the rest. Every instrument is alive with timbre and nuance, Rumer's voice remains a humbling experience, and the sound is spacious. As a top-to-bottom showcase of a system, then, you could do a lot worse. As entertainment, though, not so much.

One valid argument says Stevie Ray Vaughan was a virtuoso guitarist with nuance of tone and touch few can come close to, a talent taken before his time (at age 35) just as his career was entering an intriguing second act.

A second argument, similarly easy to defend, holds Stevie Ray Vaughan to be a one-paced, generic (if accomplished) blues player whose best songs were covers, who had an anonymous singing voice and who gave work to the whitest backing band ever to play.

Either way, the entire SRV&DT cannon – four studio albums and a plodding, shamelessly overdubbed live double set – has been parlayed into the 12 (count 'em!) discs that comprise *The Complete Epic Recordings Collection*. If, at the end of this marathon, you feel the need to hear any more clean, overdriven, impeccably played and deeply felt blues guitar in the next, oh let's say decade, well, you have a blues affinity almost as strong as Stevie's.

#### The guitar's the star

And just the first few hours of the recordings here will tell you all you need to know about your system. The guitar is front-and-centre, of course, and there's no denying how much SRV's playing demands of your set-up's tonality, speed, detail retrieval and dynamism. The rest is a mid-'80s nightmare of enormous drums, flabby bass and approximate vocals, though, and barely exercises your system at all.

# What does a speaker crossover do?

It's one of the inescapable laws of physics – and of hi-fi design – that a loudspeaker containing only one drive unit won't be able to reproduce the entire frequency spectrum as deftly as one with multiple drivers.

Tweeters and mid/bass drivers are designed to handle different parts of the frequency range with the minimum of distortion and the maximum finesse.

However, sending the full frequency range to both of these drivers will stop them working at their best or even cause damage, so a crossover circuit is used to split the incoming signal into frequency bands optimised for the different drivers.

There are two crossover types: passive and active. Passive ones, used in most domestic speakers, are unpowered and deal with speaker-level signals that amps deliver from their speaker outputs. Because the current they have to deal with is so high, they use robust (and so, less precise) components. This can lead to a loss of detail and transparency.

Active designs are powered, and route a low-voltage line-level signal to the drivers' individual power amps. There's less power loss, although they can add noise. But the smaller power-handling needs let them use more precise parts, which gives more control over the sound.

# What to look for... wireless speakers



# **Battery life**

The longer the better, especially if you're going portable. Seven hours is okay, but current speakers (like the Ultimate Ears Boom) can go for 10+. Bonus points if your speaker has a USB port to charge your smartphone.



# **Build quality**

A portable speaker needs to be compact and light, but still sturdy and well-finished. Check it doesn't feel flimsy or cheap, that it won't get too scuffed or dirty if it's used outdoors, and that the controls are responsive and easy to operate.



# **Auxiliary input**

Bluetooth is most convenient (aptX especially, which we'll come to next), but a wired connection can often sound better than a wireless one. Make sure your speaker has a 3.5mm input if you choose this path.



# **AptX**

We wouldn't get hung up on aptX as some speakers aren't transparent enough to reveal the format's benefits. Nevertheless, if you can find a speaker that can take advantage of it, your music will sound superb.

## Noise isolation v noise cancellation

Noise isolation is not the same as cancellation. They're two different ideas that go about reducing external noise in different ways. What isolation does is stop external noise from coming in (isolation is something of

a misnomer in this case). Cancellation on the other hand, deals with the noise once it's in, with several mics on your device capable of recording outside sounds and play them in reverse phase (opposite), 'cancelling' external sounds.

All headphones are able to isolate sounds to some degree. Some are better than others, but in truth it's not something that's easily quantifiable.

Not all sounds will be cancelled (constant hums, yes, sharp noises, probably not), you'd need batteries to keep them going and the

effectiveness of the cancellation will depend on how tight a seal your headphones can create. However, if you enjoy your music without (much)
Bose's QuietComfort 25s interruption, are effective noisecancellation is cancellers the way to go.

### **Spatial awareness**

You'll need the subwoofer as close as possible to the soundbar, otherwise sound integration may be a problem and they'll come across as two distinct entities.

### **Table topper?**

Some soundbars are flat and slim, but others aren't, and may block off your TV's infrared receiver. Consider a shelf under the telly, or invest in a power drill.

### **Always look**

Check the connections. Some bars need you to plug everything into your TV, then connect that to your soundbar. But you may prefer to use the soundbar directly.



# The end for MP3?

# If you own a half decent hi-fi system, using 'FLAC' instead of 'MP3' files could be music to everyone's ears

For those of us that consider themselves a music lover, albeit to different degrees, we are part of a very fortunate generation. We now have access to an ever-growing wealth of recorded music of extraordinary range and depth, effectively accumulated over the last 60 years. With the

introduction of the microgroove LP record in the early 1950's, playback quality took a quantum leap forward and this also coincided with a far higher standard of recording techniques. Although further improvements have been made over the years, this was a watershed time that first introduced hi-fi as a reality.

# Listening to music has many benefits

Hi-Fi is, of course, a means to an end – the reproduction of music.

Many studies over the years have shown remarkable benefits for mankind through listening to music. Making music is intrinsic to all cultures and music is often used for various therapeutic purposes because it involves using the whole brain. It is believed to improve memory and intelligence, improve physical development and coordination, reduce stress and blood pressure, and even reduce levels of pain.

We now have literally millions of recorded music tracks available to us in all genres and many different formats. One trend over recent years, however, has been to deliberately downgrade the quality in order to offer quantity. The main culprits have been MP3 and AAC formats which were designed as a low cost form of delivery when download speeds were slow and computer chip memory was expensive. Neither now applies and both formats should be consigned to history

along with 78 rpm records and the 8-track cartridge. Unfortunately, such is the current market penetration of MP3 and AAC formats that many people today are listening to a considerably lower quality of music reproduction than their peers back in the 1970's.

Bach - my favourite!

# **Quality vs quantity**

Let us explain. The maximum resolution from MP3 and AAC file formats, which are both highly compressed, is 320 kbps (kilobytes per second) which compares with CD quality of 1411 kbps. This means the resolution quality is less than a quarter of that provided by a standard CD. However, most MP3 or AAC files are downloaded over the internet and the most used download resolution is 128 kbps, which is around one-eleventh of CD quality. This should ring alarm bells. If you are only playing back these tracks on an iPod or mobile phone with a pair of earbuds, the quality may be irrelevant to

you. But if these tracks are your primary source of music, perhaps with an iPod dock into a decent hi-fi system, you are only making a very poor quality sound louder. Information is irretrievably lost and the full dynamic range is lacking. The quality will be very poor in contrast with a full

resolution version even if you are completely unaware of the loss you are inflicting upon yourself. This can even affect the type of music listened to as most classical recordings downloaded as an MP3 or AAC file will have so much information missing, and all the complexities of the music lost, with the end result that the recording is reduced to just the essence of a tune.

# What is the future of recorded music?

There are now positive signs for the future of recorded music. Audiophiles, or hi-fi connoisseurs, have been very important to the music industry as they are generally avid music lovers who aim to maximise their enjoyment by listening to music at its best quality level, which means the play-back of great recordings through hi-end hi-fi to achieve the most outstanding results. Without

them, a main driver for quality would probably be removed from the music industry. They have always sought out quality but there is now an increasing awareness among the wider public of the serious deficiencies of the highly compressed formats. Full resolution audio streaming, as well as CD quality downloads, are already available and will surely become the eventual norm with this greater awareness of the tremendous quality benefit. Consumers will vote through their purchases and will seek out higher resolution recordings. Look at Qobuz for a new high-profile entry into this field who offer CD quality (16 bit/44.1 kHz FLAC) streaming for over 15 million tracks.



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

# NAD 3020 The budget amp that defined a brand



t's fair to say the NAD brand was established on the success of the original 3020 amplifier. Introduced in the late '70s, this unassuming budget amplifier set the standard for sound quality in a category where most still put specification and features first.

And it did sound good, as our 1983 review of the upgraded 3020A showed. The major news with this model was the addition of a moving-coil phono stage, turntables being the main quality source.

Back then it wasn't unusual for highend decks to be partnered with budget amps and speakers - the idea being that whatever the source missed couldn't be added later - so the 3020A's moving-coil upgrade made sense.

There were doubts about the awkward speaker connections and the loss of a mute button, but these weren't enough to overshadow the NAD's sound-quality advantage over rivals or dent its success.

The market is very different now. Our source components are overwhelmingly digital, so it comes as no surprise to find the latest 3020 (see page 83) loaded with digital inputs, including Bluetooth.

The D3020 is also smaller, to slot into places more conventional amplifiers wouldn't, and is styled to look good when laid flat or standing upright. It still has some of the pared-down functional charm of the original, though.

The D3020 may be different from the original in many ways, but NAD hasn't forgotten the reason its ancestor was so successful - sound quality. The latest amplifier is engaging and entertaining, and yes, still a class leader.

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
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
