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Wharfedale Diamond 220 | Stereo speakers | £200

Want to know the best-sounding budget speakers on the market? Easy, it's Wharfedale's brand new Diamond 220s. They're the largest standmounter in the company's new entry-level Diamond 200 series, and we wouldn't be surprised if they turned out to be the pick of the bunch if history is anything to go by.

These are the replacement for the hugely talented 121s, but while they look quite similar there are some important changes. They're neatly finished for starters. This might sound like a small point, but it was the older speaker's big weakness.

Chipboard of the old block

At its heart, this shortcoming had as much to do with Wharfedale's ambition to make the 121s sonic class-leaders as it did with the factory's quality control. In a bid to improve performance, Wharfedale's engineers used cabinet walls made of a layered construction that mixed chipboard and MDF. It was felt that using MDF alone - as on most speakers - led to an undesirable level of cabinet coloration.

The chipboard side was on the outside in contact with the (rather thin) vinyl covering. The result? An uneven surface that made the speakers look poorly finished. It didn't help that the factory seemed to have a rather lax attitude to the neat application of the vinyl wrap, particularly at the cabinet corners. We also had issues with the front baffle which, once again, looked uneven in appearance.

Creating a splash instead of ripples

We're glad to report the Diamond 220s are much better in all respects. While still not the classiest speakers we've seen around this price (Q Acoustics and Monitor Audio set the standard), they're good enough to avoid criticism.

Wharfedale has kept the layered cabinet construction, though - in this case two thin layers of MDF sandwich the chipboard section - and glue the vinyl onto the smoother MDF surfaces. Goodbye ripples, hello better finish. Now that the finish issues are sorted, the advantages of these composite panels come to the fore. The combination of chipboard and MDF helps to damp resonances, preventing the cabinet from contributing too much to the overall sound. Quite simply, you hear more of the drive units and less of the cabinet.

But there's more than just better finish involved in the move to the new model. There's a bigger magnet on the 13cm woven Kevlar mid/bass driver. This makes the speakers easier to drive and improves its responsiveness.

Slot right in

The unusual slot-loaded port arrangement first seen on the 100 series makes a reappearance here too, and it has been tweaked to reduce distortion. Such a design is claimed to be more efficient than a conventional port (see panel). The proof, as ever, is in the listening.

The tweeter remains unchanged. It still sits in a deeply dished waveguide, which helps efficiency (particularly through the crossover region). A ferrite magnet is used in the unit's motor system rather than the more usual neodymium: not only is Ferrite cheaper - always a consideration with products at this price level - but the engineers feel it produces a smoother sound too. Wharfedale has also tweaked the crossover to improve integration.

When it comes to sound quality the Diamond 220s needn't fear any rival. Give

Low-end theory

Wharfedale's engineers haven't taken the easy route with the Diamond 220's bass tuning. Instead of going down the usual route of rear- or front-firing reflex port, they've decided to fire the port downwards into a small air gap between base of the cabinet and the plinth below. This arrangement has been further <u>refined from</u> that seen on the earlier 121s.

Not only does this technique help with port efficiency and the reduction of chuffing noise, it makes the speaker less fussy about placement. Judging by the low-frequency output of the 220s this arrangement seems to work really well, giving low-end weight and authority.

them a good, solid pair of stands such as Atacama Moseco 6s (£120) and they will sparkle. In our test room these speakers sound best when placed close to a rear wall. A little bit of toe-in towards the listening position helps to firm up the stereo image.

Miniature but meaty

Used this way these speakers deliver a surprisingly meaty bass that has far more power and punch than we'd expect from speakers that stand just 50cm high. That slot-loaded port arrangement really seems to work - low frequencies are agile and tuneful, making the distinctive bassline from Van Morrison's *Moondance* a pleasure. While there's a good amount of bass it's all in proportion, giving foundation to the rest of the frequency range without dominating.

Move up the frequency range and the good news continues. Morrison's vocals are expressive and packed with subtlety. The 220's high frequencies please too,



combining bite, insight and refinement superbly. These standmounters pile on the plus points when we switch to Holst's *Jupiter*. We're impressed by the speaker's balanced tonality and their ability to deliver larger-scale dynamic shifts with enthusiasm. There's scale here with a degree of authority and substance that no rival we've heard can better. Stereo imaging is good too, nicely projected and layered.

While these speakers aren't unduly fussy about partnering kit you'll only get out what you put in. They work well as an upgrade to the speakers that come with Denon's D-M39 micro but will only really start to shine when used with something like Marantz's PM6005 amplifier. How do they compare to the older 121s? The character is similar but the newer speakers are a little better in most respects.

These are the speakers we wanted Wharfedale to make all along - one of the best budget speakers around.

REVIEWER'S NOTES... GETTING TO KNOW THE WHARFEDALE DIAMOND 220

The Wharfedale 220s still aren't the smartest speaker around but build and finish is now good enough to avoid any serious complaint.

We experiment with positioning and find the 220s sound best close to a rear wall, with a small degree of angle pointing at the main listening position. Give the 220s a couple of days to run in and they continue to improve. We're struck by their well-judged tonal balance and bass authority. We try a whole range of electronics from micro-systems up to our multi-thousand pound reference kit. The 220s sound stunning each time. The listening room is packed with pricier alternatives, but it's a measure of the 220s talents that we feel no need to move to something better.

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Philips HTL5140 | Soundbar | £270 Philips brings on a sub to great effect

If we had one criticism of Philips' brilliant debut soundbar, the HTL5120, when we reviewed it earlier this year, it was its slightly screen-blocking height. There's no such problem with its brand new successor, the HTL5140. At only 5cm tall (a third shorter than its predecessor), it's one of the least obtrusive designs we've laid eyes on. And it has a subwoofer boosting its efforts.

As the rather compact square-shaped packaging suggests, the bar is made up of three individual parts: two detachable metal-mesh ends - each hiding four racetrack drivers and two 25mm mylar tweeters - and a central glossy black control panel, where you'll find simple touch functions and a clearly readable text display (which has three brightness options).

Piece it all together

Slot the parts into one another and, with a click, you have a slim, sturdy 105cm-wide bar that extends just beyond the width of a typical 42in telly. For best performance, the whole of the bar should lie flat, so make sure your stand is big enough.

The bar partners a wireless subwoofer it has a side-firing 20cm driver and ups the total power to a claimed 320W. It might be another box to house, but its reasonably slender build makes it easy to tuck away.

We're fond of the HTL5140's sleek and functional design, which is only bettered by its wealth of connections. Far surpassing our expectations at this price, there's HDMI, optical, 3.5mm and USB inputs as well as Bluetooth (aptX) with the added

convenience of one-touch NFC pairing. An HDMI ARC output, too, means your external devices (Blu-ray players, set-top boxes etc) can be connected directly into the bar, with only one HDMI cable running from the bar into your TV.

With a rounded back and rubber buttons, the remote resembles the handset Philips supplies with its TVs. It's better than most efforts we see, though a quick glance is often needed to avoid pressing the wrong side of the rocker buttons.

The remote opens doors to Virtual Surround Sound and umpteen other sound modes (including Night Mode, which flattens dynamics when the kids have gone to bed), and a button to match up sound to picture if it's out of sync.

Design and build win our good word, but it's the HTL5140's sound quality that rubber-stamps our appreciation. Balanced, dynamically expressive and well integrated, the HTL5140 takes this year's budget 'bars to new heights. During our test we compared this Philips with every new rival we could get our hands on, and it won out easily.

Direct comparison

For £270, you should expect a fair jump in quality from your TV speakers - after all, that's the point. We flick between the Philips and our reference 48in Samsung during *Transformers: Dark Of The Moon*, and find the Philips delivers far greater scale and dynamic build-up. There's more information where detail is concerned, and more density to the Decepticons' stomps as they trample through Manhattan. Through the TV, they sound small and light-footed.

The way this 'bar does voices is pleasing: Optimus Prime's carries weight and insight, and there's clear distinction between those speaking with and without helmets on.

Of the seven sound modes on board, 'Auto' and 'Balanced' get our vote for the most even and subtle presentations.

Alongside an impressive midrange, highs and lows don't let the side down. As shards of glass fall down the glass-faced building in slow-mo, their tinkly sound effect is clear and defined. Down south, the sub brings enough beef: the clunking of metal as the Autobots twist in transformation is solid, and there's deep rumble when the rocket launches. That sub certainly earns its stripes.

Have sound, will travel

Gunshots are sharp and precisely mapped within the soundfield - as the flying Decepticons bolt corner-to-corner across the screen, there's an obvious diagonal dimension to the projection.

The 'Surround' mode effectively bolsters the soundfield, giving the sound of helicopter propellers wider swing, though dialogue is a little drowned out as a result.

Subtle too, the HTL1540 keeps track of the robots' faint mechanical clicks as they move their limbs in dialogue-driven scenes.

Our satisfaction isn't short-lived as we load up *Stone Roses: Made of Stone* on Blu-ray. The finale concert has detail and energy, the Philips showing a good grasp of rhythm and tempo in the bass guitar tab. The electric riffs have a sense of pizzazz, while vocals are solid yet articulate.

Philips' latest range of soundbars is off to a flying start with the HTL5140. The company has taken the HTL5120's successful sound recipe and packed it into a wonderfully slimline package that'll suit almost any set-up. If that's not deserving of five stars, we don't know what is.

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LG 65UB980V 4K Television 23800 Superb picture needs a final touch-up

The higher the resolution, the bigger you can go with your new screen – and with the advent of 4K comes a massive temptation in the form of this 65in LG.

And this is even bigger than most 65in TVs: 156cm wide to be precise. If you do have the space, the 65UB980V has a striking design, complete with a glowing LG logo plate along the bottom edge. But the real showiness begins when you turn the telly on: bright colours and cartoon graphics form a first-time set-up that's a pleasurable experience. By the end you will have tuned the aerial and/or satellite tuners, connected to the internet and installed the latest software - and you'll be right into LG's new webOS TV experience.

Deal the cards

The picture performance is good. Start with *House of Cards* from Netflix in 4K and you're wowed by how sharp and detailed the image is, from the time-lapsed cityscape intro sequence, to the furrows in Kevin Spacey's face. And while this is just a taste of how good 4K will be as Netflix upgrades its algorithms, it's already an image that thrills. Added sharpness introduces a level of three-dimensionality that makes actual 3D (which is also impressively handled by the LG) seem less relevant.

With still so little 4K content available, you'll be watching 1080p regularly and the LG does a good job of upscaling this to match its native 3840 x 2160 resolution, producing images that are clean and stable. Slow pans are handled very well when 'TruMotion' is set to 'Smooth', though it can get a little muddled by very fast action.

The bigger picture

Overall, though, it's a fine picture viewed in isolation, if not quite as good as the current best. Its contrast is narrower, colours a little more muted, edges a little softer and details less fine. Individually, these are not big problems, but added together and you've an image less striking than the Samsung UE65HU7500. The traits are the same with DVD and other standard-def sources, too.

Sound is very impressive. The LG houses Harman Kardon speakers that have weight and clarity, and while the virtual surround feature won't fool you it does fill the

Like most high-end TVs, the 65UB980V has a very useful top-mounted camera room fairly well. Picture and sound aside, webOS is a massive step forward: the coloured card system at the bottom of the screen is designed to equalise channels, apps and connected sources - taking you to content quickly. We like it a lot, but having lived with it a while, we discovered some niggles. The 'Today' menu is supposed to give a snapshot of what's available to watch right now - but it's not very well labelled.

Finger-clicking not so good

Highlighting one of them tells you only that it's 'Live', 'Catch-up' or 'Upcoming', so you have to actually click to get a title and synopsis. Not what you are after? Go back, highlight the next thing, click, back etc.

Our understanding when we saw webOS demoed was this feature would allow you to instantly find something to watch, even something unexpected. In its current form it doesn't do that. Catch-up programmes suggested come only from iPlayer - 4OD and ITV Player aren't yet available on webOS, but Demand 5 is, yet it still doesn't get a look in here. And what about using the TV shows available on Netflix or other TV on-demand apps? Doesn't happen.

We were shown a 'Movies' page when we first saw webOS demoed, too, and that was supposed to perform a similar function to 'Today', but it doesn't seem to exist on this UK version of the software so you have to delve into each of the movie on-demand apps individually (alongside Netflix, there's Amazon Instant Video, Blinkbox and

Still really the only way to get access to 4K content, the Netflix streaming service is a bargain at £5.99 per month. Wuaki). There are plenty of menus labelled 'Recommended' in the webOS, but we don't see any real evidence of curation going on.

And the LG Store section? It's a page dominated by live TV recommendations (not actual 'recommendations') and catch-up TV programmes (all from iPlayer, none of which actually worked when clicked on). The whole system is a touch sluggish. It's nothing serious, but it undermines the brilliance of the pointerlike 'Magic Remote'. However, we suspect software updates will soon surface from LG.

There's a bigger problem for the LG 65UB980V though - the Samsung UE65HU7500, which provides an even punchier, more thrilling picture and currently costs around £300 less.

Cyrus Stream Xa | Music streamer | £1250

Cyrus hits the streaming spot once again

The Cyrus Stream Xa sits somewhere between the preamplifier-packing Stream XP2 and the X Signature network player in Cyrus's streaming line-up. It incorporates a 32-bit DAC alongside its streaming abilities.

In terms of design, it's as Cyrus as they come. The half-rack aluminium design looks pretty much identical to the rest of the range, with the green-hued LCD display and buttons along the front for controlling source and playback.

An easy upgrade path

As is also the Cyrus way, there's plenty of consideration for upgrades down the line too, including the ability to add an external DAC and power supply should you wish, plus connections for the MC Bus universal control system, allowing this to slip seamlessly into any existing Cyrus setup.

In terms of connections, you'll find six digital inputs (three coaxial, two optical and one USB) for connecting your whole setup. The USB is Apple-compatible should you wish to hook up an iDevice for playback. Internet radio is also on board, and provided by TuneIn Radio.

Set-up is easy enough - you use the front panel and the volume dial to get the Stream Xa onto your network. Then you have the option to keep controlling it from there, or to use the included n-remote or Cyrus's Cadence app (iOS and Android).

The n-remote pairs directly with the streamer, while the app will find any Cyrus equipment on your home network. The app works perfectly well for our needs of browsing and selecting inputs, though it's a nice touch for Cyrus to include an alternative in the box for those who prefer a dedicated device.

You can stream high-resolution recordings up to 24-bit/192kHz over your wi-fi network, but if you plan to be doing a lot of that we would definitely recommend a wired connection via ethernet for the

best, most stable performance. Streaming high-resolution files places a huge demand on your network, and we have had a few dropouts during testing when we go wireless.

When it comes to performance, the Xa has got all the main characteristics of the signature Cyrus sound – lively, engaging, with class-leading levels of detail.

An articulate and agile sound

Stream A Tribe Called Quest's *Buggin' Out* and the Cyrus Xa is only too happy to show off its rhythmic know-how, keeping a sense of organisation amid two opposing bassline patterns, stopping and starting notes accurately so they have the intended impact. Articulate and agile, it's able to handle even the most complicated rhythms without ever sounding flustered.

Detail levels are superb too, as a stream of *Starless* by The Unthanks proves. The Cyrus Xa conveys the layers to each

bow-stoke of the violin intro, and when the piano joins you can hear the texture and dynamics of every single note.

Vocals are focused and full of feeling, and there's plenty of space across the whole frequency range, making for a large sound in a wide soundfield.

Fast bass and an open treble

In terms of balance, it's largely neutral with a fast, well-controlled bass and an open treble that steers clear of hardness, even with more aggressive recordings.

That open treble really helps to inject a likeable liveliness to its character that keeps it enjoyable and entertaining for long listening sessions. Don't be surprised if you plan to listen to one song and end up listening to the whole album.

There's no doubt that paying more than £1250 for a streamer is a serious consideration, but if it's something that both your system and budget can afford, the versatile Cyrus Xa will show its worth with every single track.

The Naim Mu-so marks the first time the established hi-fi manufacturer has stepped into the wireless speaker market. At £895, this is an ambitious proposition, but one that has the full weight of Naim's longstanding hi-fi expertise behind it. Expertise is all very well, but does the Mu-so have the sonic ability to prove that wireless speakers can perform to hi-fi standards? With an impressive list of streaming features matched by an equally impressive design, it certainly starts off as a seriously tempting product.

A beautifully built unit

We'll admit we're utterly taken with the Mu-so's looks. It's a gorgeous design. The cabinet is made of MDF, and then wrapped in a layer of brushed aluminium. Not only does this give it the Mu-so its hefty, premium-quality feel, but it also improves the cabinet's damping. The aluminium heatsink spanning the length of the speaker looks distinctive, as does the mirrored base with the subtly glowing Naim badge. A discreet LED at the side aids network set-up.

The highlight, however, is that volume dial. Made of a solid ring of bead-blasted anodised aluminium, the circular, illuminated control is inspired by the flagship Naim Statement pre/power amplifier. We'll wager you'll spend more time physically changing the volume rather than using the remote or control app - the dial is a dream to use. It's weighted just right, moving smoothly as you turn it all the way up to 11. We like the illumination effect, too.

The dial also doubles up as the Mu-so's touchscreen interface. Tap the illuminated icons to pause or play a track, or spin the dial to select any of the three wired inputs or to switch between five preset radio stations (you can set presets using the app). The crisp display also indicates which streaming option you're currently using.



There's a claimed 450W of power coursing through the Mu-so's sonic veins. Six custom-designed drivers (two dome tweeters, two midrange and two 'racetrack' bass drivers) are hidden behind the grille, each powered by a 75W digital amplifier. The DSP technology – a high-performance 32-bit silicon chip – has been developed from Naim's work on Bentley's in-car audio systems. And finally, the bass reflex port is ribbed and flared to minimise distortion.

The unit comes with a standard black grille, but you can swap it for three other

Take control with an app

Naim Mu-so app - iOS/Android - free

Naim's dedicated Mu-so app is a must download. Free for iOS and Android devices, it's useful for connecting the speaker to your home network. More importantly, it gives you playback control and full access to all the music stored on your connected devices. We like the neat, minimalist icons for selecting inputs (though we'd like to see one for Bluetooth), and operation is slick and intuitive. Additional features include two room-EQ settings to optimise the sound when the unit is placed near or away from walls, a loudness control, and light-dimming options. You can also pair units for a multi-room system. It's seamless to use on a smartphone or tablet, and we prefer it to the physical remote.



colours - vibrant red, deep blue, burnt orange - for an extra £70 each.

There's little this Mu-so can't do. Naim has included nearly every streaming method into the mix, ensuring you can play songs from a wide variety of devices. There's aptX Bluetooth, AirPlay, UPnP, Spotify Connect and thousands of internet radio stations on board.

Extensive file compatibility

Physical inputs include a USB port (which charges and plays Apple devices as well as USB-stored music), an optical input (limited to 24-bit/96kHz) and a 3.5mm analogue input. There's also an ethernet port to go alongside the built-in wi-fi, hidden under the unit with the power socket to keep wires out of sight. Whether you've got an iOS or Android device, laptop or NAS box, this Naim can play it all.

File compatibility is extensive as well. The Naim supports all popular audio formats, from low-res MP3s and Spotify streams to 24-bit/192kHz WAV, FLAC and AIFF files. You get full-fat high resolution through the wired ethernet connection, while going wireless limits it to 48kHz.

The neatly designed Mu-so app gives you full browsing control over your music collection across smart and NAS devices,



In detail

including selecting inputs and tweaking the speaker's EQ settings. It aids networking and multi-room set up, you can dim the unit's lights, access track info and pick from thousands of internet radio stations.

We prefer using the app to the supplied remote. While the remote is responsive and instinctive to use, the insubstantial plastic finish is at odds with the premium feel of the Mu-so itself. You're more likely to be using your smartphone and the app for playback control anyway, but we would have liked a classier design for the handset.

A case of substance with style

So far, so good. Now comes the make or break moment: does the Mu-so sound any good? In short, absolutely. Any 'style over substance' comments can be thrown out of the window. The power behind the Mu-so's sound is astonishing. It drives all songs with a sure-footed sense of rhythm, rich detail and lashings of deep, rumbling bass we've never heard from a wireless speaker before.

The scale of sound is huge. It easily fills our large listening room with its soaring dynamics, and the airy soundfield is as wide as it is tall and deep. Play Jim Croce's melodic *Time In A Bottle* and you'll be enveloped in a full-bodied sound that's enchanting to listen to. Internet radio stations sound robust, too.

The Mu-so charges through songs with boundless energy and enthusiasm. Notes stop and start with foot-tapping precision, instruments are accurately and cohesively laid out, and silences between notes have intensity. A demanding track such as *Time* from the *Inception* soundtrack shows off the Mu-so's dynamic prowess - the gradual build-up is palpably tense.

There's a stunning level of subtle detail. Feed it high-resolution tracks such as REM's *Losing My Religion* (24-bit/192kHz) and the Mu-so eagerly shows off the benefits of extra resolution. Every guitar strum is tangible, drums hit with satisfying impact and Michael Stipe's vocals are clear and intimate. High notes are crisp, open and have just the right amount of bite. There aren't any undue sharp edges to the Mu-so's sound, and taut basslines are controlled and full of texture.

Detailed and attacking

The Mu-so turns its subtle hand to CD-ripped files and Bluetooth-streamed songs too. The brooding, tense tone of The Dead Weather's *60 Feet Tall* (streamed over Bluetooth) is delivered with crisp detail and tight, attacking rhythm. Kate Bush's ethereal vocals in *Watching You Without Me* (16-bit/44.1kHz FLAC) are beautifully conveyed, with every intonation, plosive and emotion laid bare. The quirky musical arrangement makes musical sense, too.

The powerful sound is key to the Mu-so's performance. Our only niggle is that a slightly musclebound character rears its head when the volume is turned up. Detail and rhythm aren't sacrificed, but the sound does thicken up just a touch. There's no hint of hardness or brightness

at any point, though: this Naim speaker has strict control over its frequencies.

The Naim Mu-so is a seriously attractive product. Everything promised is delivered. This wireless speaker's performance lives up to the spec-sheet hype – it looks stunning, and that powerful and subtle sound is as close as we've heard to hi-fi from an all-in-one unit such as this. It's more than worthy of a front-and-centre position in your listening room.

Canton DM 75 | Soundbase | £450 Canton's DM gets bigger and bolder

If you fancied Canton's brilliant debut soundbase, the DM 50, but thought your large TV would dwarf the small black box, the DM 75 could be for you.

The big brother to the DM 50 has been sensibly designed with a larger chassis to accommodate bigger TVs. It promises more powerful sound through four (next to the DM 50's two) down-firing bass drivers.

Better for bigger TVs

The DM 50 is best suited to 40in or smaller tellies. This 73cm-wide 75 is less restricted and can cater for almost any size. TV weight won't be a deciding factor - Canton claims both models can take up to 40kg, which should allow you plenty of choice.

If you'd rather have the DM 75 as a soundbar in front of your TV, its 7cm height should sit nicely below most screens. It won't suit everyone, mind you: its build requires a pretty large tabletop or equipment rack to sit flat upon.

The modest textured-matt casing (available in black, silver or white) is smart and inconspicuous. A metal-meshed front grille hides two 5cm midrange drivers and two 25mm tweeters. Unless you peek underneath the unit, you won't see the four 10cm woofers.

A blue LED display shining through the grille's centre proves easily readable from a distance, and responsive to the remote.

Speaking of which, we're pleased Canton has kept the same remote control. Chunkier than the norm, it is nice to use, with clearly labelled buttons.

Tricky socket location

The DM 75's only lapse in design is the positioning of its sockets. Having to bend cables into the rear sockets proves tricky, especially if they're quite thick. Still, most people tend to do such things only once, so it's not too big a deal.

Connections themselves are fair, with one glaring omission. There are two digital (coaxial and optical) inputs with a pair of

analogues, and aptX Bluetooth to wirelessly stream music from, say, a smartphone. A subwoofer output gives the option to add more bass to the sound. And that completes the connections list. Which means no HDMIs. At this price, they should be a given.

Same as before - but better

As soon as we let rip with *Fast & Furious 6*, everything we praised the DM 50 for hits you - a rich, balanced sound, dynamic aptitude and insightful expression.

And as its size might suggest, the DM 75's sound is bigger and more open. Switch between the two and the DM 50 sounds more confined; the DM 75 spreading its wings to make the film's soundtrack soar. You won't get the enveloping surround effect of the Yamaha YSP-1400 soundbar even with the Canton's 'Surround' mode on, but it's fairly expansive by most standards.

It's a little clearer than its sibling too, the sound of crunching metal more prominent and defined when cars collide.

The extra weight from the doubling up on woofers really hits home as engines roar.

As its size might suggest, the DM 75's sound is bigger and more open than the 50's. It spreads its wings to make the soundtrack soar. It's fast and attacking too - made for action movies



Turning the DM 75 up to full whack more-than fills our test room, but it's never (volume aside) uncomfortable to listen to, thanks to its even-handed presentation.

Highs are clear and sharp and, even as the windows of an entire building shatter, balance is never broken - it's not often we get through a whole soundbar or -base test without wincing at least once.

The DM 75 is fast and attacking, too made for action movies. There's a blistering sense of pace to the pulsating, beat-driven score, and startling pop to gunfire.

Just as impressive is dialogue delivery. It has solidity and expression, while Vin Diesel and Dwayne Johnson's deep voices have weight. The DM 75 has no problem picking out the soundtrack's finer detail either - the mechanical clicks of a spanner at work are present, but subtle, leaving dialogue to the fore.

Good with music too

We switch to music with a CD-quality file of Eminem's *Rhyme Or Reason* over Bluetooth from our Google Nexus 7. There's a good sense of balance and detail. As expected, clarity is compromised over wireless, but there's enough attack and expression elsewhere to enjoy its stereo delivery.

We said it would "take one hell of a soundbase to better the Canton DM 50." Canton has come up trumps with the DM 75. Clearer, bigger and more powerful sounding, it's surely worth the £50 price hike if you can justify it.

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AppleiPhone 6 | Smartphone | From £540 Slim 6 is fitter than ever

Apple's new iPhone 6 is bound to have its detractors. With specs that read like an Android phone of yesteryear - no full HD screen, no 20MP camera and no high-res music support - there's a lot to think you're missing out on.

Pick it up and use it, however, and you won't think that once. For everything it lacks in spec-list grunt, the iPhone 6 makes good with a performance and user experience that's hard to argue with. It's easily the best iPhone yet, and it's also one of the finest smartphones of 2014.

Doing the rounds

For the first time in four years the iPhone has had a significant makeover, ditching the squared edges and moving back to a more rounded design. Its smooth aluminium framework melts seamlessly into its newly sized screen (more on that later), curving around in a supremely tactile way. with a rich yet natural colour palette, strong contrast, an outdoor-friendly brightness and a wide tonal spread.

Text looks sharp and is easy to read when browsing the internet using Safari, though some apps at the time of testing are yet to be optimised for the new resolution.

Apple's audio has always been one of our favourites on a smartphone, but with a few handsets offering high-resolution music in 2014, is that still the case? In short: absolutely. That rich, full-bodied character remains but with a touch more clarity, meaning it's more detailed and dynamic than ever. No, there's no high-res music support, but with a standard-resolution sound this good it's hard to be mad about that.

The iPhone is still bundled with Apple's Earpods and, though they're

It feels surprisingly slim too, shaving off 0.7mm from its predecessor to get it down to 6.9mm thin - its tapered edges making it feel slimmer still. It's a masterclass in premium smartphone design, with the HTC One (M8) the only other handset we've seen that comes close.

The power button shifts to the right-hand side to make locking and unlocking the phone easier, but everything else remains much the same - the volume buttons and silent switch on the left, the headphone jack and speaker along the bottom.

While the rest of smartphone world has been pushing up screen sizes in recent years, Apple had remained resolute at the 4in mark since the launch of the iPhone 5, which was dwarfed by the likes of the LG G3 and Samsung Galaxy S5.

Bigger screen

The iPhone 6 sees a respectable screen boost, but at 4.7in it remains below the 5in mark. Of course its larger sibling, the 5.5in iPhone 6 Plus, answers the calls for a larger Apple handset. We think the size works well - including for video and gaming - and the increase is noticeable.

This year, Apple has finally gone Full HD, but only on the screen of the iPhone 6 Plus, leaving the iPhone 6 with a resolution of 1334 x 750 (up from 1136 x 640). The smaller model still fares well against its Full HD competition, offering a sharp image better than the original white buds, we'd still recommend an upgrade to something like Sony MDR-EX650APs.

As we've come to expect from yearly iPhone updates, the iPhone 6 features a boosted processor in the shape of Apple's own A8 chip. Apple never confirms specifics, but it would appear that it's a dual-core chip supported by around 1GB RAM.

Bespoke processor

On paper, it might seem underpowered compared to some of Android's powerhouses, but in use it's up there with the best. Why? Because Apple designs its own chip for its own requirements, while many Android phones use jack-of-all-trades third-party chips. It's a hugely smooth, lag-free experience. Flicking between browser windows and different apps serves up no problems whatsoever.

The battery life on the iPhone 6 has been improved, if only rather humbly. We're seeing an extra few hours from heavy use compared with the iPhone 5. Lighter users will manage a full day without issue.

Storage options have had a tweak, the 6 offering 16GB, 64GB and the new 128GB, doing away with 32GB completely. The good news is the 64GB version is around the same price SIM-free as the 32GB iPhone 5s was previously.

The iPhone 6 comes with iOS 8 running out of the box, not looking a whole lot



different to iOS7 but bringing with it a number of usability tweaks, including the ability to change keyboards, to make the iPhone experience better than ever.

It's fair to say we're quite taken with the iPhone 6. While it might not break any new ground when it comes to specification, the evolution of its performance and user experience are hard to fault.

Yamaha A-S501 | Stereo amplifier | £360 Power and poise beautifully packaged

Back power

There isn't a Bluetooth receiver built-into the A-S501 but you can get an outboard unit from Yamaha called the YBA-11, which costs around £50. A USB connection (DC only) on the back of the amp supplies power.

amp supplies power.

Yamaha's new A-S501 is a beautifully built product. It's chunky, well finished and appealingly retro in appearance - hardly changed from its much-admired predecessor, the A-S500.

The new amplifier also feels solid, and the controls work with a crisp precision that little else can match at this price. We even like the remote handset: it's simple and nice to use. Unlike many rivals, the A-S501 gives the impression that it will last for years.

You'll find a useful range of features, too. There's a plentiful supply of line-level inputs (five in total), a moving magnet phono stage, headphone output and a pair of digital inputs. The addition of digital inputs is the big change from its predecessor. The A-S501 has both optical and coax connections, both capable of supporting 24-bit/192kHz music streams.

Deal me in

We would have liked to see a USB alternative, just to make connecting a computer easier, but it's no deal breaker. Yamaha sees this amplifier being used with a TV or Blu-ray player rather than a computer, if the information pack is anything to go by. The amplifier is stereo and doesn't decode Dolby Digital or DTS of course; the source will need to convert it to PCM before hand. It's got an adjustable loudness control too, which is unusual. People's hearing shifts in its sensitivity of frequency extremes as volume levels change (and the tonal balance of a typical speaker changes with volume too). This loudness control is designed to compensate for those changes by readjusting the balance of bass and treble. It works, and is well worth a try.

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Muscle in on the music

It's only when we get to sound quality that we become less than wholly positive about this amp. Our first impressions are good this is more muscular sounding than its predecessor. Its presentation is robust and tonally more even. The old A-S500, for all its appeal, had a rather lean and bright balance. This new one is better balanced.

It goes decently loud too, as its power output of 85 watts per channel suggests. We try the A-S501 with a range of speakers starting with Wharfedale's Diamond 220s all the way up to our reference ATC SCM50 and it drives every one as well as we expect.

We start with Bob Marley's *Exodus* and are pleased with the detail this Yamaha uncovers. Its presentation is clean, with weight to the hard-charging bassline. Marley's vocals are expressive and we like the sense of space the Yamaha imparts. It's less successful at delivering the driving rhythm though, taking some of the



excitement out of the music. Move to something more complicated, *Danse Macabre* from Saint-Saëns, and the Yamaha delivers mixed results. There's good detail resolution and a fine sense of scale from the amplifier. However, the A-S501's composure falters a little when things get complicated. It starts to sound just a touch confused, losing track of subtle instrumental strands as the piece really gets going.

Overall, the Yamaha A-S501 is a capable amplifier. It's built very well and is packed with useful features. A more balanced sound is welcome, but compared with the best at the price it just falls short.

Sony BDP-S5200 | Blu-ray player | £95

Maximum return on minimal outlay



This Sony is all about providing serious bang for just a few bucks. The BDP-S5200 looks small and unassuming - it's pretty much half the width of your average home cinema or hi-fi separate. We're thinking the lack of a display has contributed to the shrinkage and although we're all for small and compact, some may find the no-frills approach not quite as attractive.

The only sign the player is even on is a white glow indicating standby. Fire it up and you're whisked to the Sony home page in super-quick time. The player also wastes no time loading discs, something that a few rivals still struggle with, even if Blu-ray is hardly new technology these day.

The right connections

As you'd expect at this level, the Sony isn't overflowing with connections, but you're given all the basics you'd expect from a budget player. There's a single HDMI output, ethernet socket (although wi-fi is also built in) and a coaxial digital socket on the back, with a USB socket on the front for plugging in a memory stick.

Sony's AV remotes have all had a slight redesign this year - they're smaller and more streamlined, with fewer buttons. The S5200's remote feels lightweight and a little bit cheap, but it's still very effective. Once your thumb gets used to the positioning and shape of the main buttons, navigating doesn't prove difficult, even in the dark.



Gravity on Blu-ray is equally impressive in 2D or 3D, and the Sony does the transfer justice with a brilliant picture. The level of depth and sense of realism is wonderfully immersive. The Sonv's picture doesn't feel fake or forced, even when all the debris comes flying from the screen towards your face. There's an excellent level of contrast as the black expanse of space is punctuated by stars, satellites and astronauts. Whites are punchy, but dark areas remain inky-black and the Sony still has enough in the tank to extract plenty of detail from the shadows. The Sony also has a firm hand on movement - when Sandra Bullock spins out of control during the movie's opening salvo, edges remain resolute and sharply drawn.

Solid building blocks

Upscaling a DVD to match a TV's 1080p resolution isn't an easy task, but the Sony puts in a serious shift, preventing *The Lego Movie* from looking soft or uninspiring, and instead allowing it to jump out of the screen with a really crisp, colourful palette.

There's a similar sense of punch and detail with music playback. You can hear it with the softer musical score from *Frozen*



or the more dramatic, traditional Hollywood soundtrack to *The Amazing Spider-Man 2*. The Sony delivers tunes with a real sense of fluidity and rhythm, but still hits hard enough to give more explosive, wilder soundtracks the sofa-shaking impact they deserve.

Changing your movie-playing source can be a simple, relatively inexpensive upgrade, and with the Sony BDP-S5200 you really can't go wrong for the money.

Beyerdynamic T51i | On-ear headphones | £245 Welcome a remote cousin

It all started at the end of 2011. The Beyerdynamic T5Ops came out, and we loved them. We loved them enough to give them an Award. Then Beyerdynamic launched the T51ps. Once more, our response was nothing short of effusive.

But we always had one minor misgiving. Although billed as the ideal headphones for portable use, they lacked an in-line microphone remote - putting them at a disadvantage for mobile phone users.

Thankfully, Beyerdynamic has fixed this issue. The T51is have a remote. The three buttons mean it is optimised for iOS, but the play/pause/call buttons will work on Android and Windows devices too. Controls are pleasant: good click; responsive.

Identikit improvement

As far as additions go, that's about it. We're told the T51is were based on the T51ps. Aside from the remote unit, it looks as though the two sets of headphones are virtually identical. And that's no bad thing.

They're easily among the best portable on-ear headphones we've heard at this price. As with their predecessors, there are no major flaws here, but significant positives. We'll start with detail. There is a lot of it. The T51is give an incredibly insightful performance, revealing the textures of instruments and nuances in vocals. Each frequency is beautifully judged. There's remarkable clarity and bite at the top, but it's smooth enough to avoid hardness. The midrange is eloquent and poised. Bass notes are substantial. but taut. The three buttons on the remote means it is optimised for iOS, but the play/pause/call buttons will work on Android and Windows devices too

everdynamic

We like the Beyerdynamic T51i's skeletal body and brushed-metal finish

The Beyerdynamic T51is give an incredibly insightful performance, revealing the textures of instruments and nuances in vocals. Each frequency is beautifully judged

In rhythmic terms, the T51is possess timing of regimented precision. Leading and trailing edges of notes start and stop where they're meant to. It's never forced, nor overly analytical. Big dynamic variances are dispatched with enough confidence to ensure vivacity. Put it together and you have rounded, wellbalanced cans that pay attention to detail, without forgetting how to have a bit of fun.

Light but impressively sturdy

On the physical side, these are superbly engineered. They're light, for starters. You wouldn't expect that from a mostly metal body. And it's sturdy metal too. These will take a lot of punishment and still come out singing. This lightness helps them sit comfortably on your head. As do earpads of viscoelastic filling (read: super-soft memory-foam) and synthetic leather. We should mention the closed-back construction, which provides a few degrees of passive noise isolation. Along with the snug (but never squeezy) ear pads, this provides a neat way to separate oneself from the outside world. The T51is are great for commutes.

Check the industrial chic

The looks? Well, you might think different but we quite like the design. With a relatively skeletal body and a brushedmetal finish, we think the T51is look functionally elegant. Industrial chic, if you will. Then again some may prefer something shinier and more obviously luxurious. The Sennheiser Momentums, for example, would win in a beauty contest. But we think the Beyerdynamics are better performers, with greater detail and precision.

Look no further if you have up to £250 for a pair of on-ear headphones. Beyerdynamic is stronger than ever, and now there's a remote control. What more could you ask for?

Far from one small step, it's been one giant leap for TV-kind this past year. You want the moon? Today's best tellies suggest you can now have it

Best 46-52in TV Samsung UE48H6400 £700

An oddly sized TV, from somewhere near the dead centre of its manufacturer's extensive model range, doesn't automatically strike us as a potential Product of the Year. A high-performance, smart-as-you-like TV that gets its already-enticing price cut by nearly a third almost immediately it goes on sale, on the other hand, does. The Samsung UE48H6400 is all of the above-mentioned things and, despite arriving in a year that's seen TV brands both big and small really up their game, it's one of the most obviously outstanding value-for-money propositions in this entire magazine.

Styling is of the 'decent but hardly heart-stopping' school, while specification (in terms of socketry, smart functionality, choice of remote controls, 3D functionality, you name it) is extensive. While most rivals tend to pick and choose from the range of catch-up services, this Samsung packs in the lot: BBC iPlayer, ITV Player, 4oD and Demand 5. And there's no arguing with that amount of screen for this amount of money.

Picture brilliance across the board

Aside from those attractions, the Samsung is the outstanding TV of the past 12 months for one, fairly straightforward, reason: the quality of image it delivers from any and all sources.

Offering a balanced, clean and brilliantly stable picture with the best by which we mean high-def - sources, the Samsung's colour palette is convincing and its facility with skin-tones exemplary. This, plus great contrast and minimal picture noise, also helps make the Samsung's Active 3D reproduction enjoyable and low-fatigue. We just wish there were more than two pairs of 3D glasses in the box. Switch down the resolution levels to DVD or standard-def TV broadcasts and the UE48H6400 is pretty heroic: picture noise is controlled well and motion hardly suffers at all. Like the best sportspeople, the Samsung has an all-round game.

Add in passable sound (by no means a given on TVs of any price) together with a predictably slick and logical ergonomic user experience, and the Samsung UE48H6400 is nigh-on impossible to fault. Make sure you see it for yourself.

TELEVISIONS AWARDS 2014

There are many reasons this Sony is our Best Buy at this screen size, of course, but resolution is as good a place as any to start. Many manufacturers seem to think there's no need to fit a Full HD 1920 x 1080 resolution panel to a 32-in TV. Sony doesn't agree, and the benefits of its stance are obvious for all to see.

Natural balance

The Sony's a tremendously well-balanced watch. Colours are natural, whether they're skin-tones, brightly punchy primaries or subtly drab. Contrasts are strong too, and there's ample detail to the brightest white or inkiest black scenes.

Detail levels are good, and the benefits of a native Full HD panel become obvious when you study the Sony's confident and secure handling of on-screen motion.

Best 22-39in TV Sony KDL-32W706B **£350**

Ergonomically, this is everything you expect from a Sony – especially the SideView app, which is a colourful, logical and useful feature – and it's built and styled to match. Connections are numerous, Sony's online Entertainment Network covers all the smart

content, catch-up TV, video on-demand and what-have-you in some style... even the sound is a cut above the usual flatscreen flatness.

2014 has been a weirdly hit-and-miss year for Sony TVs - there's been more variance across model ranges and screen sizes than we would expect. But with the KDL-32W706B (and the KDL-40W605B below) the company has comprehensively hit the bull's-eye. At £350 this Sony represents prodigious value for money, and for those who want a screen this size it's something of a no-brainer.

Ergonomically, the **Sony KDL-32W706B** is everything you expect from the marque, especially the SideView app, a colourful, logical, useful feature

The handsome, eminently affordable Sony KDL-40W605B emerged with five stars from its First Test in the August 2014 issue, and by the October issue had made off with a seven-way Supertest win too. So it's not the biggest surprise to see it grasp the accolade of the best 40-46in TV we've seen this year - although its £450 price-tag still has the capacity to make us double-take.

Detail under any circumstances

Subtle and punchy in equal measure, the Sony can offer detail in even the inkiest, most uniformly black scenes and variation in the most glaringly bright. The colour balance - rich and vivid, but unarguably natural too - is well judged, with skin-tones appearing especially convincing. Motion is dealt with confidently and edges are crisply drawn. What's more, all of

the above is equally true for upscaled content as it is for native 1080p stuff. Sound is nothing special - it's as thin as the TV itself, and as bright as the pictures it produces - but at this price we're not going to get sniffy about it.

At any money the 605's connectivity and ergonomics would be admirable, so at this pared-back price they're deeply impressive. Four HDMIs, a pair of USBs,

integrated wi-fi and Freeview HD tuner take care of your inputs,

with the network connection opening up Sony's excellent Music and Video Unlimited portal to Netflix, iPlayer, YouTube and dozens more. The remote control is brief and logical, the on-screen menus simple and thorough. And Sony's TV SideView control app is an object lesson in concise, neat and in-depth usability.

So it seems you can have it all. Performance, functionality, usability, looks and unarguable build quality in one great-value product. If this is the sort of screen-size you're interested in, you positively must give the Sony KDL-40W605B a viewing.

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Best 52-60in TV

Samsung UE55HU7500 £2200

Anyone with eyes to see wants to get in on the 4K ultra-high-def action, but sensible folk aren't about to pay through the nose for the privilege. And that's where the truly outstanding UE55HU7500 comes in.

At 55 inches it's big-but-not-too-big, and at £2200 it's even more affordable than it was when we gave it the full five stars in our September 2014 issue. But what sets it apart, and what set it up on its Awards pedestal, is its prodigious combination of picture quality, build quality, on-line functionality, design and

ergonomics. In every area the UE55HU7500 is right on the money.

The best treatment for the best material

This screen is at its best with 4K material, naturally, and with some native Netflix content streamed in the Samsung looks superb. Every important component of picture creation – colour, contrast, detail, edge definition, you name it – is beyond reproach. And with excellent motion-handling added to the equation, the UE55HU7500 is a staggeringly

immersive watch.



4K TVs have plenty to do when it comes to upscaling Full HD or (heaven forbid) standard-def material, but the Samsung stays composed and convincing when it's dealing with the lower-res stuff. 1080p Blu-ray images are a match for the best native Full HD screens, and even standard-definition TV broadcasts aren't the dog's dinner that the amount of scaling required might suggest.

As befits a TV at this sort of money, the UE55HU7500 is thoroughly specified. 3D (with a couple of pairs of active-shutter glasses thrown in), four HDMIs, 3 USBs and some legacy connections, a smooth five-page smart interface, satellite and Freeview HD tuners... everything you might require, basically.

Like most flatscreen TVs, regardless of price, the Samsung doesn't produce the most exciting or full-bodied sound you ever heard. But that's a problem that can be overcome; spending this sort of money on a state-of-the-art TV suggests/ demands you spend again on some sound equipment (soundbar/soundbase/5.1 system) that will do justice to the pictures. And believe us, these pictures are worth that extra expense.

Best 60in+ TV Samsung UE65HU7500 £3500

What with the trend in TVs - especially cutting-edge, top-of-the-range TVs - being towards the massive, the first 2014 Samsung 4K UHD TV we tested this year was this one. Now, 65 inches is a big telly in anyone's language, and £3500 is a big price tag, but if it's big-screen, no-compromise, full-on 4K action you crave, then the UE65HU7500 is the TV for you.

More of the same

As the model number suggests, this is a bigger, pricier version of the screen we've just eulogised (above). So it will come as no surprise to find the UE65HU7500 is, on paper, pretty much identical to its littler sibling in all but screensize. You have the same all-encompassing suite of socketry, multiple control options (remote, little remote, app), superbly wide-ranging smart interface and active 3D (including glasses). And,

What makes the **Samsung UE65HU7500** much more than just a great 4K TV is the work it does when dealing with high- and standard-definition resolutions of course, a similarly bravura performance when it comes to delivering detailed, subtle, vivid, utterly believable pictures.

One of the real pleasures of a 4K TV is how easily you can ignore your Mum's advice about sitting too close. Such is the sharpness, the smoothness, the prodigious detail of the images the Samsung delivers, all the advice regarding viewing

distances (as they relate to Full HD TVs) goes out of the window. You can sit good and close to this 65in monster safe

can sit good and close to this 65in monster safe from eye-strain or fatigue for at least the first half of an HBO box set. And throughout, you can thrill to the amazing motion fidelity, tremendous colour balance and staggering amount of detail up there on the screen.

But what makes the Samsung much more than just a great 4K TV is the work it does when



dealing with high-and standard-definition resolutions. Full HD pictures via Blu-ray, 576p DVD images and even the real poverty-level stuff from standard-def TV broadcasts is sympathetically upscaled onto that huge panel. That's one of the reasons the UE65HU7500 is among the best TVs we've seen this year.

Soundbars & Soundbases

Flatscreen televisions rarely sound great, but the simple addition of a soundbar or soundbase is a great, fuss-free way to improve your audio

Best soundbar £300-£600 Q Acoustics Media 4 £400

When we first reviewed Q Acoustics' first soundbar in August, we'd have happily bet it would end up in the final showdown for an Award. Now here it is claiming a Product of the Year accolade.

It's little wonder: the QM4 (the company's official abbreviation) is a huge step up from conventional flatscreen sound – mirroring the insightful, full-bodied and even-handed character we've come to expect from the company's successful stereo speakers.

Play *Fast & Furious* 6 and it conveys a real sense of excitement and drama as cars race and high-paced pursuits unfold with the storyline. There's no doubting the part the internal subwoofer plays; reinforcing roaring engines and earth-shattering explosions with admirable weight and control.

For the sake of clarity

Dialogue comes through with clarity and expression - and highs are never overbearing. Even as car windows shatter on impact, the sound stays poised and avoids coming across as harsh.

This Award was a close call between the QM4 and Yamaha YSP-1400. Although you get a greater sense of sound effects panning around you with the Yamaha, the QM4 delivers unmatched solidity and detail. Unlike other soundbars at this price, the QM4 is missing any optional sound or surround modes, but we'll excuse that: we don't feel we're missing out with the one-sound suits-all setting. Suitable for 40in TVs and bigger, the QM4 looks reasonably compact from the front, but the trapezoidal cabinet actually extends back - around 14cm - to house a large elliptical subwoofer. Twin 65mm BMR drivers (Balanced Mode Radiators) are the final pieces in this 2.1 soundbar.

Input needed

The relatively simple, unfussy design is apparent in the features and functionality on offer, too. Although there's an optical input, a pair of analogue RCA inputs and a single 3.5mm socket, some of you may be disappointed by the absence of HDMI inputs.

You do get aptX Bluetooth support, though, as well as the convenience of near-field communication (NFC) pairing with your compatible smartphones and tablets.

When a manufacturer tries its hand at something different, the results could go either way. Thankfully for Q Acoustics, its unexpected entrance into the realm of soundbars has paid off - the QM4 is a leading light in its very impressive product range.

Best soundbar up to £300 Philips HTL5140 £270

Philips has taken the successful sound recipe of its brilliant one-box HTL5120 and turned it into a more practical slimline bar and wireless subwoofer. The result: an Award-winning budget soundbar.

Balanced, dynamic and well-integrated, the HTL5140 runs rings around its rivals.

Play *Jurassic Park* and you get a huge leap in quality from your TV speakers: the Philips not only delivers greater scale and dynamic build-up in the film track, but is an open book where detail is concerned. Dialogue carries weight and insight, while highs and lows don't



let the side down. The sharp sound of cracking dinosaur eggs is clear and defined, and the sub sinks its teeth into the footfall of the T-Rex.

Comes up smelling of Roses

There's a definite sense of dimension to the sound, too, as helicopters fly across the screen - an effect bolstered by activating the Philips's 'Virtual Surround Sound' mode.

The finale concert from *The Stone Roses: Made of Stone* DVD shows the Philips's grasp of rhythm and tempo. Electric riffs have gusto and vocals pull through with expression.

At only 5cm tall, the bar is one of the least obtrusive designs we've laid eyes on - there will be no screen-covering headaches when it's laid in front of your telly. The partnering wireless subwoofer has a slender build that's easy to hide away too.

The bar is made up of three individual parts: two detachable metal-mesh ends (each hiding four racetrack drivers and two 2.5cm mylar tweeters) and a central glossy-black control The **Philips HTL5140** has a sleek design and a wealth of connections: HDMI, optical, 3.5mm, USB, aptX Bluetooth, and the added convenience of NFC

panel with simple touch functions and a bright text display. It's a sleek and functional design, helped by its wealth of connections around the back: HDMI, optical, 3.5mm and USB inputs, and aptX Bluetooth, with the added convenience of one-touch NFC pairing. An HDMI ARC output makes connecting your external devices (Blu-ray players, set-top boxes etc) directly to the bar possible too.

Crowd-pleaser

It's not always easy extracting the quality products from a crowded, budget-soundbar market, but the HTL5140 stands out above all

others. For a (very reasonable) £270, you get a sleek, space-efficient and greatsounding solution for boosting your television's sound. And that can't be bad.

Best soundbar £600+

Yamaha YSP-2500 **£800**

swings across the screen. For the ultimate surround sound experience, its '5beam' setting is the best of the playback and 'beam' modes.

There's more than enough detail to keep us engrossed with the action on screen too, and the film's sound effects are placed with startling

accuracy and impact. Thanks to the Yamaha's expressive dynamics, the pounding track that scores the chase scene is full of tension.

The Focal Dimension (£890) was in the running for this Award after impressing with a slightly fuller midrange. But its bulkier build is less practical and it can't surround like the Yamaha YSP-2500.

For songs streamed over Bluetooth, we switch to the 'Stereo' mode for tighter, more musical rhythms. This is an open, authoritative delivery capable of solid vocals and melodic tunes.

Practical too, the bar sits low enough to be placed in front of most TVs without obstructing the screen, while the wireless sub can be tucked away in a corner. The bright display is clear, while the remote has a premium feel and layout. The Home Theatre Controller app (free on iOS and Android) is a superb substitute too.

The '2500 has plenty of connections as well: three HDMI, two optical and single coaxial inputs; a pair of RCA plugs and 3.5mm mini-jack. If you don't want the clutter and complexity of a traditional 5.1 speaker package and

AV receiver, the Yamaha YSP-2500 is the most appealing solution out there.

After missing out on a soundbar Award last year, Yamaha returns to this page in style, proving once again that you don't need a bulky speaker package for surround sound.

The successor to the 2012 Award-winning YSP-2200, the YSP-2500 is a paragon of the company's successful sound projection technology - delivering a big 5.1 surround sound experience from just a slim bar and discreet wireless subwoofer.

Surrounded by magic

The magic lies in the way it uses delay control to direct sound beams from the bar's 16 speakers (each driven by 2-watts of amplification) to bounce off the walls and reflect sound around the room - thus creating an enveloping virtual 5.1 surround field. An IntelliBeam function further optimises sound to match your specific room (like auto-calibration on an AV receiver).

The result is staggering. Play *The Amazing Spider-Man 2* and its expansive soundfield mimics a 5.1 surround system. Spidey's web shooter pans around you convincingly, and there's a good sense of dimension to the sound as he

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Best soundbase up to £300 Cambridge Audio TV2 £200

Another Awards issue, another new product category. Soundbases essentially fight the same cause as soundbars: to boost the weedy sound of televisions. But unlike their TV-boosting sidekick, they have a more traditional chassis (or 'base', if you like) and are designed for you to to place your TV on top of it.

The Cambridge Audio TV2 is the cheapest of our two new Best Buys and the successor to Cambridge Audio's much-loved Minx TV which was en route to securing this spot before the TV2's recent arrival.

Packing a punch

Rich, dynamic and balanced, the TV2 doesn't just give you a leg up in volume. Coming from a typical telly's speaker, punching and boneshattering sound effects in *The Raid 2* are thin and hollow. Out of the TV2, they sound dense

The **Cambridge Audio TV2** is not just a leg up in volume. Effects in The Raid 2 are dense and defined, while dialogue pulls through with expression



and defined. The TV2 handles the oscillating dynamics of the film score too, and when the action is sidelined, dialogue is solid and expressive.

Of the four EQ settings, we like 'Music' best for its well-judged, even-handed delivery. Play music over Bluetooth (it supports aptX and has a 10m range) and its musical delivery has a good grasp of timing - obviously a wired connection brings improvements in clarity and balance.

While the TV2 should cater for most 40-odd inch TVs, you should check that your model is a suitable fit. The manual states it must have a base no wider than 55cm and no deeper than 30cm. And it should weigh no more than 30kg.

Conforming to the conventional rectangular body, the TV2 has a smart matt finish and cloth-grille front. An LED light shines through clearly to indicate commands. Peeling away the removable front panel uncovers the two Balanced Mode Radiator speakers (the down-firing bass driver is located on the unit's underside), and a control panel for setting up the TV2 to learn your Sky remote controls.

Socket to them

The supplied remote is tall, curved and easy to hold, with clearly laid-out buttons. Get past the absence of an HDMI input, and the optical input, pair of analogue plugs and 3.5mm mini-jack make for a fairly good list of connections. The rear-facing sockets are easy to use, too.

The Cambridge Audio TV2 has all the criteria: full-bodied, insightful sound and a practical build. For £200, what more could you ask?

Best soundbase £300+ Canton DM 75 £450

When we reviewed the Canton DM 50 last year and ("one of the best soundbases we've heard to the date"), we said it would "take one hell of a dy

soundbase" to better it. A year on, we have that soundbase: its big brother. The DM 75 is a jumbo version of its smaller sibling, designed to accommodate the bigger TV sizes on the market and among the best 'bases

sizes on the market and among the best 'bases we've heard at any price point.

Power and precision

Aside from an extra dose of power and weight brought by two extra woofers in a bigger cabinet, everything we loved about the DM 50's performance is here: a rich, balanced delivery, dynamic aptitude and insightful expression.

Play *Jurassic Park* and it's clear that the DM 75 is made for action-packed movies. There's bass depth to dinosaur stomps, while Velociraptor's high-pitched screams are clear and sharp, but never piercing. As the dramatic theme score culminates, the DM 75's big, dynamic presentation blows you away. Even when volume is turned up, an even presentation ensures it's never uncomfortable.

Dialogue delivery is just as impressive, pulling through with solidity and detail aplenty, and the texture of rain is easy to make out.

It's a similar story streaming music over aptX Bluetooth: balance and detail abound and,

The **Canton DM 75** is clearly made for action-packed movies. Even when volume is turned up, its even presentation ensures it's never uncomfortable although clarity is compromised over the wireless connection, there's still enough attack and expression to enjoy.

Cater for the masses

The DM 75 can cater for almost any telly you want to place on top of it - Canton claims its sturdy build can take up to 40kg - but does require a pretty large tabletop or equipment rack to sit flat upon. If you prefer positioning it more like a soundbar in front of your TV, its 7cm height should sit nicely below screen level.

Available in black, silver or white, its modest brushed-matt casing is smart. A metal-meshed front panel hides two 5cm midrange drivers and two 2.5cm tweeters - unless you peer underneath the unit, you won't see the four 10cm woofers. Connections are fair: two digital (coaxial and optical) join a pair of analogue inputs and a subwoofer output.

> A blue LED display proves easily readable from a distance and helpfully responsive to the nice remote control. A do-it-all product like

the Canton DM 75 is hard to find and even harder to pass up.



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Get your choice of amp right and your whole system will bristle with energy and realism. If that sounds tempting, try one of these four

Best stereo amplifier £400-£800 Arcam FMJ A19 £650

Arcam wins the stereo amplifier Product of the Year title for the second year, and deservedly so. We haven't come across any alternative that betters this integrated's combination of build, features and sound quality.

The A19 is happy in a wide range of systems, getting more out of Wharfedale's £200 Diamond 220s than most people would believe possible, but also driving something more premium - say PMC's Twenty 22s - with considerable skill. This amp is impressively faithful to source components; the better they are the better it will sound.

Beefy delivery, inclusive attitude

Once it's up and running, the first thing you'll notice about this amplifier is its sonic scale – it fills up our largish main listening room with clean and open sound. This Arcam isn't fussy about musical genre either, sounding equally at home with the likes of Jay Z as it is playing a Mahler Symphony.

We love the A19's sense of control and its composure when pushed hard. This isn't the kind of product that grabs the attention on a short demo - it sounds smooth and pleasant rather than overtly exciting on initial acquaintance. But give this Arcam a little time and you'll realise that it's a terrific all-rounder; it has punch, power and a wonderfully fluid way with dynamics that belies its 50 watts per channel power rating.

Listen to *15 Step* from Radiohead's *In Rainbows* set and the A19 takes it all in stride. This is a complex track layered with intricate rhythms and can easily sound messy if the system isn't talented enough. There's no such problem with the A19. It punches hard and with precision, delivering bass notes with real grip and power while ably rendering the complexity.

There's a lovely sense of refinement here and the kind of full-bodied tonal balance that will make the most of aggressive recordings and sources, while tempering the behaviour of bright-sounding speakers.

Move away from sound and this Arcam continues to impress. It's solid, well made and beautifully finished. There's a sensible range of inputs too, including a decent phono stage. We're equally taken with the headphone output, which mirrors the amplifier's excellent sound into speakers.

The Arcam A19 remains a top-class amplifier for the money, and fully deserves all the accolades it gets. Buy it with confidence.

Best stereo amplifier up to £400

Marantz PM6005 £300

Previous generations

high resolution the PM6005 might be a budget amp, but it's built-in DAC supports high-res audio files of up to 24-bit/ 192kHz

Marantz is something of a master at producing class-leading budget kit and the PM6005 is further evidence of that talent. Along with its partnering CD player - the CD6005 - this amplifier sets the standard for entry-level hi-fi.

What makes it special? As with all our Award winners, it's a combination of factors that makes the PM6005 such a good buy. It's beautifully made for starters. Entry-level hi-fi doesn't have to feel cheap, and this amplifier is proof of that. The casework is nice and solid while the quality of finish wouldn't be embarrassed by comparison to kit that costs twice as much.

Equipped for the task

It's well equipped too, with a decent number of line-level inputs (four), tone controls, headphone output and a surprisingly capable phono stage. It's not a backward-looking design either, as the provision of optical and coaxial digital inputs shows. And the inclusion of a digital-to-analogue converter shows that Marantz has recognised the changing habits in how people listen to music. We do wish Marantz had gone just one step further, though, and included a USB input for a more straightforward connection to laptops. Still, the lack of such a connection is no deal-breaker. of Marantz's budget amplifiers sacrificed attack and timing precision for refinement. Not this one. It's still one of the most listenable amplifiers around - both revealing and forgiving - but it matches these qualities with a newly found rhythmic thrust no rival can better.

Play Michael Jackson's *Bad* on vinyl and the PM6005 marshals the intricate and complex arrangements into a cohesive, rhythmic performance of tight drumbeats and melodious harmonies. There's plenty of detail and it's well organised and layered. We're equally taken with the soundfield - spacious, nicely focused and stable, even when things become demanding.

Weather's *Horehound* (both on CD and streamed from Spotify) the Marantz delivers an attitude-laden performance full of drama, the open top end managing to sound smooth without losing any bite. Basslines are deep and taut, string plucks are tactile.

There's plenty to sing about with this Marantz amp. The digital inputs broaden its appeal to a wider audience than previous incarnations and give it an edge over most traditional rivals, but it's that wonderfully lively and detailed sound quality that seals the deal. You'll love it.

Best stereo amplifier £800-£1500 Rega Elex-R £900



It takes a supremely talented amplifier to knock the terrific Naim Nait 5si off its perch, and that's what the Rega Elex-R is.

By using the much-admired Brio-R amp as a base and adding circuit elements from the unquestionably talented Elicit-R (£1600, see right) into the mix, Rega has created one of the most talented sub-£1000 amplifiers we've heard.

One of the family

Anyone familiar with Rega's current amplifier range will recognise the Elex-R's sonic character. It delivers a fast, agile sound that's as rhythmically surefooted as we've heard at this level. Play a piece of music such as alt-J's *Breezeblocks* and the Rega is right at home. It's happy to deliver that thickly layered bassline with power and has no trouble rendering dynamic shifts and changes of pace with enthusiasm. There's an addictive sense of liveliness and energy, something rivals tend to tone down in the search for greater refinement.

Tonally the Rega edges towards leanness, though if partnered with care (avoiding sources and speakers that err too far towards brightness) all will be fine. We used a range of speakers from Dali's lively Zensor 3s and B&W's 685s right the

Play alt-J's Breezeblocks and the **Rega Elex-R** is right at home. It has no trouble rendering dynamic shifts and changes of pace with enthusiasm way to PMC's mighty Twenty 26s, and at no point did the Rega fail to shine.

Of course, a power output of around 70W-per-channel isn't enough to make the floor shake in really large rooms, but we think this Rega is capable of decent levels in most set-ups.

Switching to Tchaikovsky's *Marché Slave Op.31* shows that this amplifier

can keep track of complex instrumental arrangements and deliver scale with authority. We're pleased with the resolution on offer too.

Traditional approach

Move away from sound and the Rega remains on sure ground, as long as all you want is a traditional stereo amplifier. There are no digital inputs, though we think Rega would direct you to its talented DAC for number-crunching duties. Instead, you get a good-quality MM phono stage, one that's talented enough to make the most of £1000 turntable packages such as Rega's own RP6 (that's a surprise).

We ended our First Test of the Elex-R by suggesting rival products from class leaders such as Naim, Cyrus and Roksan would have plenty of worry about from this unassuming compact amplifier. It turns out we were right.

Best stereo amplifier £1500+

Rega's Elicit-R is the best-value premium integrated amplifier we know. It takes the considerable strengths of the already impressive Elex-R and builds on them strongly, fully justifying the extra outlay.

As with all our Award winners, performance is excellent. The Elicit's most impressive talent is its rhythmic ability. It has an immensely surefooted way with musical timing that can't help but grab the listener's attention.

Complexity with cohesion

Play Kate Bush's Watching You Without Me and all the different instruments hit with impeccable precision - it's what keeps the complicated arrangement cohesive and musically interesting.

Rega Elicit-R £1600

Keep listening and you'll find the Elicit-R manages to dig up incredible amounts of subtle detail - drums hit with realistic impact and tautness, while it handles Clint Mansell's delicate ambient soundtrack for Moon with pleasing cohesion. It's particularly talented with vocals - Kate Bush's voice sounds sensitive and ethereal, making it easy to engage with the music.

The most impressive talent here is rhythmical ability. The Rega *Elicit-R* has a hugely surefooted way with timing that can't help but grab the listener's attention

-

Dynamic expression is impressive too. A power output of 105W per channel may be par for the course at this level but the Elicit-R puts its watts to particularly good effect, delivering the huge dynamic swings of the *Inception* OST with real venom.

Some might find the Elicit-R to have a slight leanness to its overall sound, and a hint of brightness to the treble. One or two rivals certainly have a warmer and smoother balance - but provided care is taken with system matching this should never be an issue.

The payback for the slight lack of richness is a very revealing and transparent character. True, it won't hide flaws in recordings or partnering equipment but it will give a very clear insight into whatever you're listening to. If you want to

hear everything on a recording we can't think of a rival that does it better.

Add solid build and a neat finish into the equation - along with a comprehensive, well-constructed remote control unit - and you have what we think is a truly top-class amplifier. If you have the budget for this level of amplification, we can't think of a better buy for the money.

Records were once dusty relics of your Dad's generation, but vinyl's popularity has come full circle and we've got three decks to put you in a spin

Best turntable £400-£800 Rega RP3/Elys2 £550

The Rega RP3/Elys2 combination retains its Product of the Year title for the fourth consecutive year – and we can't think of another product that's managed that feat. It's a stunning achievement for what is, outwardly, a pretty unassuming product.

Rega has worked on the premise of 'if it isn't broken, don't fix it' for decades, and the company is not about to change its ways now. And why should it, when the results are this good? The RP3 is simply a refinement of what has gone before. The long-running RB300 arm design has been given a once-over and the plinth now includes extra structural reinforcement. But this remains a simple design, and is all the better for it.

The right support

All turntables need a decent, level support and here it's even more important; three hard, rubber feet will only go so far when it comes to isolation. It really needs a rigid, low-resonance platform to truly shine, and placed well away from the speakers is preferable. Get this aspect of set-up right and the RP3/Elys2 combination simply sings.

It has all the power and dynamic thrust to make the most of Bob Marley's *Exodus*, and the insight to differentiate musical strands even when things get demanding. There's composure, and ability to communicate the rhythmic flow and changes of pace as well. Subtlety is on offer here too, as John Coltrane's *A Love Supreme* proves.

The heart of the matter

The Rega combination gets the tonality of instruments right and its presentation is impressive. Perhaps most importantly, this player seems to get straight to heart of the performance, delivering plenty of emotion.

It's possible to buy this turntable without a cartridge, but we recommend buying the package that includes Rega's excellent Elys2 moving-magnet cartridge. It adds around £75 to the cost - the price we've quoted - but the money is well spent. The cartridge comes pre-fitted, but its unusual three-bolt fixing means alignment is hard to get wrong.

This is a deck that has been decades in the making. It's time well spent by Rega and we wouldn't be amazed to see the RP3 here again next year.

Best turntable up to £400

If the Rega RP3 winning the Product of the Year title again hasn't created a sense of déjà vu, then Pro-ject winning yet another Award at the entry level certainly will. Few companies have been as dominant in their category as much as Pro-ject down the years.

This is the second year the Essential II has won our budget Award, and rightly so. No rival has come close to bettering it as an overall package. As the name implies, the Essential II is pretty basic: there's no headline-grabbing material or technology here, just great build at a highly-competitive price. The inclusion of a pre-fitted Ortofon OM5e moving magnet cartridge in the price simply adds to the appeal.

Little wonders

With turntables, it's the little things that make big differences. Things like the quality of the

main bearing or those used in the arm make a huge impact. Those on the Essential II are as good as we've seen for the price. We've come across the Ortofon cartridge before - it's a good, solid performer. Let it run in a little and you'll get a nicely balanced performance.

Michael Jackson's Bad is an album that demands a crisp sense of rhythm and the Essential II is happy to oblige. There's plenty of drive and punch to the sound, which is underpinned by surprisingly articulate low frequencies.

Bare necessities

The Essential II hasn't got the analysis to strip bare a recording like this, but neither does anything else at this level. What it does is deliver the music in an exciting and entertaining way. It keeps us listening, wanting more, and that's what makes the Essential II special.

Move onto Paul Dukas's The Sorcerer's Apprentice and the Pro-ject delivers a sound full

of life and drama. There's plenty of detail, and enough refinement from that Ortofon cartridge to stop things getting edgy. We're pleased with the deck's scale and composure. These qualities aren't very common with this kind of product at this price level.

Budgeting for pleasure

The Pro-ject Essential II is the perfect budget deck. It's sensibly priced and well made, but most of all it sounds great. Sure, you can get better performance - but you'll have to spend a lot more to do so.

Best turntable £800+

Clearaudio Concept £995

We're happy to welcome Clearaudio's Concept back into the Awards fold. We can't think of the last time a previous winner came back to reclaim its crown.

It's not quite the same as the original though, despite the name remaining unchanged. Since 2011 Clearaudio has upgraded the arm significantly, with improved wiring and revised bearing assembly and metal work. The deck itself is mostly unchanged bar some tweaks to the feet. The big news is a hefty price drop that takes the Concept back below the £1000 price point. That's enough to steal the honours from the Rega RP6 and take over as our

strongest recommendation at this level. The Clearaudio's strengths are untouched by time: it remains the ideal one-stop solution for record replay in a market sector where most audiophiles think the way to optimise sound is mixing and matching.

The Concept comes pre-assembled: the cartridge is mounted and even the arm counterweight is set. The latter would be a disaster with a conventional arm design, but in this case the Concept's unusual magnetic arm bearings float, so damage doesn't occur.

Easy to set up and easy to use - the Concept is a solid design, lacking any form of isolation. So, as with the Rega and Pro-ject, a level, low-resonance support is a must.

A special ownership experience

Beyond that, the solid design means minimal fiddling and the deck doesn't go out of tune during use. You get an electronic speed change too: 33¹/₃. 45. and 78rpm.

The Concept has a fast and agile sound that picks up subtleties with ease. It has strong dynamics and sonic precision, and is at home with all types of music, with a neutrality of character to fit most systems.

We're in favour of products that make the ownership experience special and this Clearaudio does just that. It's brilliantly made, combining simple lines with top-quality finish. Few rivals at this price look classier. But great build and a smart appearance aren't enough to win a Best Buy. The Concept wins because it sounds great.

Best standmounter £400-£800 B&w 685 52 £500

Bowers & Wilkins' revised 600 range has been a spectacular success. These 685 S2s take our overall Product of the Year title, and the floorstanding 683s (p52) have also won their class with ease. It's quite some achievement from the 685 S2s, especially when you consider how much we love last year's Best Buy at this price, KEF's marvellous LS50s.

So what makes these speakers so great? Well there's a fair bit of technical improvement over the original 600 range. The tweeter assembly, for example, is suspended in a ring of soft gel. This keeps it isolated from any cabinet vibrations caused by the midbass driver. This new 600 range marks the first time B&W has used such mechanical decoupling when mounting a tweeter inside the cabinet.

The 16.5cm mid/bass driver remains mostly the same. The bulletshaped phase plug of the previous generation is replaced with a mushroom-shaped 'dust cap' derived from the high-end B&W PM1 speakers, which further damps the driver down at certain frequencies. The new shape, and foam material, also lessen unwanted resonance and aims for a smoother driver-response in the upper frequencies. Technical tweakery is all very well - but how do they sound? In a word: brilliant. Right from the start, these B&W 685s burst to life with a powerful, clear and agile sound. These are hugely talented and enjoyable speakers, and a definite step up from their predecessors. The sense of scale is massive, especially coming from relatively compact standmounters. The soundstage is wide and deep, enveloping you in a richly detailed, subtly dynamic and cohesive performance whether you're playing Aerosmith, Lorde or a Hans Zimmer soundtrack.

Whole lotta bass

The deep and taut bass is particularly impressive. Play Led Zeppelin's *Whole Lotta Love* and the bass notes are so rich and muscular it's hard to believe they're coming from such a compact cabinet. These speakers can also go extremely loud with little obvious distortion, too.

The 685 S2s are hugely entertaining. They're the speakers we'd put on to get our friends into hi-fi and we can't think of a better reason to give the new B&W 685s our Product of the Year title.

Best stereo speakers up to £200 Wharfedale Diamond 220 £200

Looking for the most talented budget speakers on the market? Look no further. Wharfedale's Diamond 220s have managed to dislodge the excellent Q Acoustics 2020is in the process, which is no mean feat.

Wharfedale's engineers have used composite cabinet walls made with two thin MDF layers sandwiching a chipboard filling. It works really well, producing a sturdy cabinet that's controlled in terms of resonance. This means you'll hear far more of what the drive units are doing rather than the cabinet. And what does that mean for you, the listener? A clearer, more detailed sound.

Diamond designing

Changes from the last generation of Diamond standmounter include a bigger magnet on the 13cm woven-Kevlar mid/bass driver in an attempt to make the speakers a little easier to drive and improve responsiveness. The unusual slot-loaded port arrangement first seen on the 100 series makes a reappearance here too, and it has been tweaked to reduce distortion. It's claimed to be more efficient than a conventional port but, as always, the proof is in the listening.

The tweeter remains unchanged. It still sits in a deeply dished waveguide, which helps

efficiency, particularly through the crossover region.

When it comes to sound quality, the Diamond 220s are excellent. These speakers deliver a meaty bass with more power and punch than we expect from boxes that stand just 50cm high. Lows are also articulate, able to track fastmoving basslines with ease. Move up the frequency range and the good news continues. Midrange quality is terrific, pointing to quality drive units and a well-designed crossover network. Listen to Adele's 21 set and it's hard not to be taken in by the emotion in her delivery.

The **Wharfedale Diamond 220s** sound excellent. They deliver a surprisingly meaty bass with far more power than we expect from a 50cm box



Switching to Holst's *Jupiter*, we're impressed by the balanced tonality and the 220s' ability to deliver large-scale dynamic shifts with enthusiasm. Stereo imaging is good too. Put it all together and you have a top-class pair of budget speakers. Well done Wharfedale.

Best stereo speakers £200-£400





Last year's Product of the Year remain our favourite speakers at this price. All the qualities we so admired last time around haven't been diminished in the past 12 months. The Q Acoustics Concept 20s remain very fine speakers for the money.

Mind you, they might not appear so on first look. The drive units, after all, owe much to their budget sibling 2020is. No, it's the Concept 20s' cabinet that marks them out as different. And special.

They use a box-within-abox idea, where the inner and outer enclosures (both made of 10mm MDF panels) are separated by a compliant compound called Gelcore. This helps to damp any panel resonances, turning that unwanted energy into heat. No, the Concept 20s didn't get noticeably hotter after a long listening session, or at least not hot enough for us to notice. The idea behind the cabinet design is to silence the

enclosure, leaving the sound coming from just the drive units.

The **Q Acoustics Concept 20s'** presentation is articulate and subtle, yet has punch and attack to satisfy, even when we listen to Dead Weather's 60 Feet Tall It's amazing just how much difference this makes. Placed on their stands (£200 but well worth it), positioned clear of the back wall and angled in slightly towards the listener, these speakers sing. Such is their clarity throughout the frequency range and dynamic verve that we are repeatedly drawn into listening to complete albums rather than just short sections of songs as is usual during our testing process.

Plenty of character

The Concept 20s sound all-of-a-piece, seamless in fact, and have a consistency of character from the deepest bass upwards that's rarely heard at this or any price.

The presentation is articulate and subtle, yet has the punch and attack to satisfy, even when we listen to the likes of The Dead Weather's 60 *Feet Tall*. There's a measured hand when it comes to rhythms, but changes in pace and the under-laying momentum of the music is easily heard.

It's the transparency that impresses most, though. The result is a high level of precision, excellent definition and the ability to play complex music without a loss of organisation.

These Q Acoustics are great speakers and give plenty of more expensive rivals food for thought.



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Best standmounter £800-£1500 ATC SCM11 £1200

ATC's SCM11s have made this category their own down the years. Few products have dominated their price point so completely. If rivals hoped ATC was going to slip up with a range revamp, they've been sorely disappointed. The new generation SCM11s continue where their predecessors left off - and have taken performance levels to a new level.

There have been some notable changes: while the mid/bass driver remains unchanged, it's now housed in a smarter, curved cabinet and partnered to a new in-house tweeter design.

The new tweeter really is a big deal. Most companies the size of ATC buy drive units from large OEM drive unit suppliers and simply integrate them into their speakers. Never a company to take the easy route, ATC has spent years developing this 25mm soft dome and manufactures it itself. One listen proves its worth.

The SCM11s' sound is remarkably clean and more transparent than ever. Combine that with a high level of detail and you get superb insight into recordings such as Van Morrison's *Moondance*. Vocals are given air and plenty of emotion. The song's distinctive walking bassline is rendered with tautness and enthusiasm, while dynamic shifts are delivered in a pleasingly expressive way. In keeping with ATC tradition, these SCM11s are a sealed-box design. That means the low frequencies aren't delivered in quite the generous quantities of some ported rivals. What you do get is impressive bass texture, tonality and detail. We reckon a slight hit in outright quantity is worth it for the excellent control on hand. In fact, the whole frequency range is superbly controlled. Nothing we do can wrong-foot these speakers, which remain composed no matter how hard we push. We go from Atoms for Peace to Massive Attack, via a spot of Eminem: at every turn the ATCs demonstrate an extraordinary level of precision.

That precision extends to the focused stereo image as we switch to *Jupiter* from Holst's *The Planets* suite. These ATCs make it easy to place parts of the orchestra on the wide soundstage.

The trait we like the most about the original SCM11s - their natural, balanced sound - is here, too. Whatever we feed the speakers, the sound comes out uncoloured and uncorrupted. That makes them hugely versatile, and an easy listen.

The SCM11s continue to set the standards at this price. Given a suitably talented system they bring music to life in a way no rival can match.

Best standmounter £1500+

PMC Twenty 22s hold onto their Best Buy title for yet another year - the third in succession, which is impressive. It takes an especially talented product to achieve this, but as our *Group Test* of premium standmounters in the November 2014 issue shows, there still isn't an alternative that delivers a better

> all-round sonic performance. There's plenty to admire technically. The tweeter, a 27mm Sonolex dome, is designed to deliver high levels of detail with wide dispersion; the paper-coned mid/bass driver (PMC likes paper's light weight, rigidity and resonance behaviour) is specifically designed for use with a transmission line.

The inclusion of a transmission line makes PMC speakers different from most rivals. The idea is that the rearward

output of the mid/bass driver is forced through an internal folded path and exits through the rectangular grille at the front of the speakers. This path is lined with specially chosen damping material that absorbs all but the lowest frequencies in the sound. As these very low frequencies exit the transmission line, they augment the forward output of the driver. PMC thinks this is the best way to get highquality, low-distortion bass.

The cabinet remains a sturdy affair. Its sloped-back appearance may look a little odd at first (and necessitates the use of dedicated stands to look balanced) but it gives a good foundation for the drive units to work from.

Stand and deliver

These Twenty 22 standmounters are immensely fast and precise. Their detail levels are excellent, and they deliver the sound with breathtaking agility. You can add wide dispersion and a focused soundstage to the list of plus points.

Tonally, the speakers sound even and immensely taut. Some may prefer a more relaxing presentation, but it would be very hard to find such leading-edge definition and speed any other way.

These PMC speakers do it all. They have the scale and power to do justice to Tchaikovsky's *1812 Overture* in full flow and the tonal balance to render individual instruments convincingly. They'll also deliver intimate music such as Bon Iver's *Michicant* with a pleasing amount of finesse. The 22s' detail resolution and way with low-level dynamics is as good as anything we've heard at this price.

Best floorstander up to £600

The Q Acoustics 2050i floorstanders won their first Award in 2012. Two years on, our opinion hasn't changed: we still think they're superb.

Let's start with the design. At 100x27x32cm, they're on the chunky side for floorstanders at this level. But bigger doesn't mean boxier - their combination of straight and rounded edges has a more elegant feel than fully rectangular rivals.

They're built really well - nice and solid with the kind of finish that wouldn't disgrace a product at twice the price. Hidden speaker connections - tucked under the integrated steel plinth - keep cables tidy. This leaves the back clean of clutter, aside from a flared reflex port large enough to lose a pet hamster in.

Smooth and full-bodied

The driver complement looks formidable: there are two 16.5cm midrange/bass drivers

accompanying a 25mm soft-dome tweeter. The tweeter is compliantly mounted to minimise distortion caused by vibrations generated by the twin mid/bass units. Such touches demonstrate an impressive attention to detail.

In use, the 2050is perform very much like other Q Acoustics speakers we've heard. Sound is full-bodied and smooth, and more forgiving to recordings of lower quality. There's a good amount of detail at the top end, while vocals are clear and engaging. Move down the frequency and there's plenty of punch, as we'd expect from speakers of this size. Lows are nicely controlled: put on Red Hot Chili Peppers' *Give It Away* and the funky bassline is taut and precise.

Biwiring the 2050is will give you a little more detail, with greater articulation and power, while angling them in slightly will help tighten the stereo image. And make sure to keep them away from walls in order to keep that bass controlled. These speakers also fill a large room with ease - they have great dynamic ability, there's heft and the stereo imaging is good. They even stay composed when things get loud.

There's no shortage of affordable floorstanders but there is a shortage of quality options. Except for the 2050is that is, with a build, finish and sound no rival can better.



Best floorstander £600-£1200

B&W 683 S2 £1150



We're really taken with Bowers & Wilkins' new 600 range. These floorstanders are just as impressive as the smaller 685 S2s and it's hardly surprising to say these speakers sound big physically the 683 S2s are larger than many of their peers. But the sense of scale they produce is massive. The soundstage is wide and tall, and instruments have room to breathe.

Of course, the electronic partners have to be talented: we'd be looking at Cyrus's CDi CD player and Arcam's A19 amplifier to even begin to show what these speakers can really do.

Making the right overtures

And what the 683 S2s can do is deliver superb clarity. They reveal plenty of detail and deliver it in an organised and stable way. Play Tchaikovsky's *1812 Overture* and they respond with enthusiasm, thumping out huge dynamic swings yet still keeping a track on low-level instrumental strands. Their presentation is sharp and precise. Tonally, they're well balanced and well integrated, with an impressive low end that is deep and authoritative enough to make you briefly wonder if there's a subwoofer hidden somewhere.

And yet nothing gets drowned out by the bass. This is the kind of low-end heft we like:

powerful, but nuanced enough not to compromise the rest of the frequency range.

There's a surprising level of finesse here, too - the 683 S2s can sound as refined as P.G. Wodehouse's Jeeves. We're not entirely sure just how B&W has managed to achieve this, but it's surely down to clever engineering.

There's a new tweeter: an aluminium dome reinforced by an aluminium ring for rigidity. It sits in its own gel-filled cavity, to minimise the impact of unwanted vibrations from the other drivers. It also has a protective grille (and waveguide) these days, so it's slightly safer from fingers. Elsewhere, the twin bass cones have been reinforced with aluminium rings, and the FST Kevlar midrange driver has a new spider.

We're very impressed by the mix of power, scale and delicacy on offer from the 683 S2s. If you have the space, you won't be disappointed.

We should really mention the **B&W 683 S2s'** impressive low end. Deep and authoritative, it's enough to make you wonder if a subwoofer is hidden somewhere

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Best floorstander £1200+

Spendor A6R £2500

It's easy to be unimpressed by the Spendor A6R. They cost quite a lot of money and look fairly ordinary in a neat kind of way. Yet in some ways these speakers are extraordinary.

They're an update on a previous favourite, the A6 - but there are big changes, including a new mid/bass drive unit and a re-engineered crossover. You'd never know it to look at them though, as they keep the same compact, understated design as their predecessors.

Charm offensive

Characteristically, there's a lot of the A6 charm in these new speakers. The excellent musicality is still there, and the A6Rs show a keen interest in making any music you throw at them feel right at home.

This is down to a superb performance across the frequency range, showcasing a deep and

The **Spendor A6R** shows a level of dynamic attack that outshines even last year's Award-winning PMC Twenty 23. It keeps a strong grip on bouncing basslines punchy low end alongside an expressive midrange and a detailed, refined treble. Each feels like a well-judged part of a whole, slotting together perfectly to produce a well balanced, coherent listen.

Detail levels are second-to-none and there is layer upon layer of fine detail to grasp. Notes have depth and dimension, oft-lost nuances are picked up in all their glory and vocals are conveyed with all their reality and emotion.

Dynamically, the A6 was never a slouch, but the A6Rs show another level of dynamic attack that outshines even last year's Award-winning PMC Twenty 23s. It keeps a strong grip on bouncing basslines, with a low end that's both punchy and agile enough to keep up with other energy found in the frequency range.

As a rather upfront pair of speakers, they do require some consideration when it comes to pairing them. The treble stays just on the right side of bright and aggressive when we test them but, matched with an amp of similar character, could tip the scale into hardness - something worth considering should you be looking at building a system around them. But get it right and these are as talented a pair of speakers as we've heard for the price. The A6Rs truly are a stunning achievement.

Best desktop speaker Ruark MR1s £300

Ruark's MR1s hold on to our best desktop speaker Award for the second year running. That's quite some achievement considering just how competitive this sector has become.

These impress straight out of the box. They look smart dressed in a walnut veneer (black- or white-lacquer finishes are also available) and it's obvious a great deal of care has gone into getting the details of the finish just so.

While not as compact as some rivals, at 17cm tall they're still a comfortable size to fit on most desks - and we rate them enough to move a few things around, just to make sure they fit.

Rolling not fumbling

It's worth the effort because these sound lovely. Play Adele's *Rolling In The Deep* and it's hard not to be impressed by the MRI's expressive midrange and their ability to latch onto a rhythm track with determination. There's warmth and texture to voices and a level of subtlety that immediately sets these speakers apart from the rest of the desktop crowd.

Detail is abundant, and even when you give the Ruarks something a little meatier to chew over, such as Massive Attack's *Angel*, they don't misstep once, keeping organised and in control throughout. Bass is solid and digs pretty deep too. Just as importantly, it's tuneful and articulate.

These Ruarks shine dynamically. They do a great job of letting the horns in Justin Timberlake's *Take Back the Night* create the impact intended, while keeping a toe-tapping hold on the catchy instrumentation.

Overall, the MR1s are a really musical listen, portraying the full

extension of every note from the low-end all the way up through the treble, so you feel you're getting every bit of what a piece of music has to offer. Switch to aptX Bluetooth from a MacBook Pro and there's a slight drop in sound quality compared with the wired connection, but not enough to spoil enjoyment.

Take a bit of care with placement and you'll be rewarded. The MRIs like to be placed near a back wall if you want a fuller bass, and we'd try to avoid any clutter directly in front of them. Then the MRIs are hard to fault.

Best smartphone under 5in iPhone 6 from £540 SIM free

There was a time when Apple's iPhone commanded the smartphone marketplace. Talk of 'iPhone killers' was rife, but largely unsubstantiated, leaving the Apple handset without any real concerns about the competition for a number few years.

Of course, that is far from the case in today's market, with some seriously good handsets coming from all sides to challenge Apple - and with impressive specs as well.

2K screens, 20-megapixel+ cameras, high-res music support and octo-core processors are just some of the buzzwords we've heard from this year's big launches. The iPhone 6 has none of those, so why are we giving it the Product of the Year gong?

Impeccable performer

For everything it lacks in spec-list grunt, the iPhone 6 makes up for with a performance and user experience that's very hard to argue with. Quite simply, compare it with its Android competition in the key areas of video and music, and it comes out on top.

With its new 4.7in screen and increased resolution of 1334 x 750, the iPhone has never looked better.

It might not be full HD but it's as crisp and sharp as they come, with edges accurately drawn and fine detail picked out well.

grunt, the Apple iPhone 6

Best smartphone 5in+ Sony Xperia Z3 £530 SIM free

It can be a little hard keeping up with Sony's smartphone line-up. It's been less than two years since the first Xperia Z handset launched, and already we've arrived at the fourth iteration - the Xperia Z3. The good news is this version finally feels like the Xperia handset we've really been waiting for, bringing together a superb performance with a truly stylish design.

The first thing to notice is that the rather harsh, angular edges of its predecessors are gone, replaced by a more curved design which makes it easier and more comfortable to hold.

The colour of the edges match the phone now too, making it look more premium, while its ports and buttons have also seen some tweaking to fall in line with this softer approach.

Attention seeker

We love the new look, which finally feels like it matches the attention to detail Sony places in other parts of the phone.

Its 5.2in full HD screen remains the same size as in the Z2, which feels like a good choice, and it packs much of Sony's TV technology into its display. The result is a wonderfully sharp and accurate picture, which excels with fine detail. Colours are rich and punchy, if on the more vibrant side of neutral, and motion is well handled once a few settings are slightly tweaked.

When it comes to music, the Xperia Z3 has followed in the footsteps of the rest of the company by adding in high-resolution music playback to its offering.

We still lean towards standard-res as the main benchmark for quality though, and the Z3 wins out here as well. It's a leaner presentation than the iPhone,

The **Sony Xperia Z3's** biggest achievement has to be its battery life, which is nothing short of excellent and will easily manage an entire day and then some but it's just as engaging, with strong dynamics and plenty of detail to go at.

When it comes to high-res playback, it's the best, most entertaining performance we've heard on a smartphone yet - with the added detail, subtlety and transparency you'd expect from better resolution music combined with excellent timing and precision.

Content contentment

The Xperia Z3's on-board storage helps you make the most of this, with 32GB as standard, expandable via microSD card - making it a lot cheaper to be a content hoarder than, say, on the Apple iPhone.

Despite all of this, one of the Z3's biggest achievements is its battery life, which is nothing short of excellent. You will easily manage an entire day and then some with reasonably heavy use, which is no mean feat by current standards.

If you're looking for the best Android phone of 2014, this is most certainly it, and while it misses out on our Product of the Year gong this year, with Sony now apparently in its stride, we can't wait to see what they do next.



Colours are on the cool side of neutral, but look believable rather than washed out, and contrast is strong, with deep detailed blacks offset by strong, controlled whites.

We've always loved the way the iPhone sounds, and the iPhone 6 is the bestsounding yet. The rich, full-bodied character that makes it so listenable remains, but with a touch more clarity compared to the iPhone 5S, meaning it's more detailed and dynamic than ever.

No, there's no high-res music support here, but with a standard resolution sound this good it's hard to be disappointed, particularly when this is the level the majority of people will be listening at.

Win by design

Add to that a brand new design that's impossibly slim and more desirable than ever, a faster processor complete with updated graphics for console-style gaming on the go, and the well-considered usability tweaks introduced with iOS 8, and we don't think there's a more deserving winner of our smartphone Product of the Year.

The iPhone 6 is going to have its detractors, but our guess is, they haven't even tried it. We can't recommend strongly enough that they do so.

In-ear beadphones

The market for these little marvels has exploded of late, so don't settle for those bundled buds – you can do much better, regardless of budget

Extras and bonus features

As well as sounding great, the Sonys come with an inline mic remote, carrying pouch and cord length adjuster.

Best in-ears £50-£150 Sony MDR-EX650AP £60

If you think it's not really possible to achieve any kind of real sound quality for such a reasonable sum of money, have a listen to these Sony buds, then re-evaluate.

It starts with the design, which is rather lovely. Considering brass has been used to make musical instruments for centuries, it's surprising it rarely features in the construction of hi-fi components. But here, both the internal sound path and the enclosure itself are constructed using trombone material. These buds are solid, and comfortable to wear.

Journey into space

The sound is just as pleasant. Vocals are engaging and focused, but given plenty of space. Listen to something floaty (Arcade Fire comes to mind) and it will sound suitably ethereal. Instruments are placed expertly on the expansive sound field. The overall presentation is fabulously expressive.

Go for a bit of punch (and you can't punch much more than Daft Punk) and these buds prove to be enthusiastic purveyors of pop beats, too. Drums are precise and snappy. There's a delicate sparkle at the top end and a weighty bassline in the basement, which underpins everything but never drowns out the rest of the range. There's also no shortage of nuanced detail, capable of stripping back layers of a song without revelling in flaws.

All that, and there's even an inline mic remote. Pretty, great-sounding, and practical to boot, these Sony buds are mighty impressive.

Best in-ears up to £50 SoundMagic E10S £40

Over the past few years our regard for SoundMagic has developed into a deep admiration. The original E10 headphones came out of nowhere to dominate the budget in-ear domain for three years in a row.

Despite the success, SoundMagic hasn't rested on its laurels. The E10s keep receiving little tweaks. There have been subtle improvements in sound, and more obvious overhauls such as new cabling. Now we have the E10S.

The S is for 'smartphone'. The most obvious change is the inclusion of an inline mic remote for pause and playback.

There's also a clever little switch in the plug that guarantees button compatibility regardless of the operating system on your smartphone. It's SoundMagic's way of dealing with different manufacturers, whose phones don't always play nicely with your buttons.

Improved sound and extra features: if you're looking to upgrade from your portable's bundled buds, the **SoundMagic E10s** are where you should start Internally, driver placement and venting have been adjusted to improve sound. This tweak has also been applied to the standard E10 model, which remains available for a fiver less. That's good for those who don't need buttons.

Elsewhere, it's business as usual, including the same cable, twisted for toughness and glossy to prevent snagging in pockets. They're the same well-made metal buds too, which, as well as looking smart, feel a good deal more luxurious than their price might suggest.

The internal tweaks work, because the audio performance is better than ever. It's a more refined sound, offering more smoothness and subtlety at the top end.

Agility, sparkle and space

Bass weight is nicely judged, making for a tight, agile sound. The treble sparkles, and vocals are clear and nuanced. You get a lovely, airy presentation with a good sense of space, and plenty of detail too.

It's quite hard to improve on an Awardwinning recipe, but SoundMagic has done just that. Improved sound, same good engineering and extra features too: if you're looking to upgrade from your portable device's bundled buds, this is where you should start.

Best in-ears £150-£300

When we think of the Shure SE425s, quite a few superlatives come to mind. But we're tight on space, so we'll settle for five: fun; absorbing; classy; polished; captivating.

It's all in the detail, literally and figuratively. Get some music going and it's as if the SE425s disappear, leaving you with just the sound they're producing. It would be a shameful understatement to call them immersive. The level of finesse on offer here is astonishing. You'll hear things you never thought were there, even on recordings you thought you knew inside out.

For those about to rock

There's an abundance of energy. Put on a bit of AC/DC and the SE425s prove they're more than capable of handling punchy rock and tight rhythms. Guitar-picking is especially evident and sharp-edged, yet the sound never tips over into brashness.

The midrange is as solid as you like. That vein of detail continues right down the frequency range. Vocals are placed to the fore, yet they never clash with various other elements in the same frequency range. There's plenty of nuance too, and it's not hard to tell who's had a few too many cigarettes.

Shure SE425 **£200**

Descend to the frequency depths and there's a good amount of thud. It's helped by the sense of isolation, which aids the low-frequency extension. The SE425s really do block out almost everything around you, locking the music inside your head.

The design is a bit unusual: it's the in-ear monitor configuration favoured by pros, where the cable passes up your back and splits behind your head. They pass over the top of your ears, secured in place with a cable slider and wire inserts that mould to the shape of your lugs.

The enclosures are detachable, so worn-out cables can be replaced for less than the price of a new set of earphones. The enclosures also swivel on the ends of the cables, making them easier to fit and more comfortable to wear.

It's safe to say we think the Shure SE425s are great. If you can get over the less-than-conventional styling and get them into your ears (easier than you might think), you'll never look back. These are the finest in-ears at this price we've heard in ages, and that's why they deserve an Award for the second year running.

Apples are not the only fruit

There are versions of the SE425s offering three-button remotes for Apple, or one button for everything else.

Best in-ears £300+ Sennheiser IE 800 £600

Expensive in-ear headphones tend to have a tough time convincing people of their worth. It's all about perceived value - they're only tiny little things, but you want how much?

Yes, the IE 800s are eye-wateringly expensive, but they also sound astonishingly good. Once you've had a listen to these buds, the scope of their abilities becomes apparent.

No matter what you throw at them, the Sennheisers remain entirely unfazed. Their authority and control are unquestionable. Low-frequency stuff is delivered with speed, definition and superb tonal variation.

Midrange communication and articulation is among the best we've heard from in-ears. Then there's that crisp attack at the top, along with a fanatical level of attention on the beginning and decay of notes. Dynamic headroom is considerable, refinement and timing are

Yes, the **Sennheiser IE 800**s are eye-wateringly expensive, but they also sound astonishingly good. Once you've listened, the scope of their abilities becomes apparent absolutely first-rate, while stereo focus and soundstaging are entirely lucid.

Such is the Sennheisers' manoeuvrability, eloquence and integration that the interplay between the musicians is not only apparent but obvious. Where sheer musicality is concerned, the IE 800s make a pretty much watertight case for themselves.

If you're spending this much, you'll want some fancy tech to justify it - and the IE 800s don't disappoint. The extra-wideband transducers promise distortion-free sound even at near-dangerous volume levels. Harmonic distortion levels are so low as to be apparently non-existent.

Small, but technically accomplished

Ceramic housings and dampened two-chamber absorbers also let you know that these small, unassuming-looking earbuds mean business.

While there isn't much space to express the idea of premium materials, or painstaking construction, the Sennheisers' single-piece ceramic enclosures feel solid, and the stout cable resists tangling and transmitting noise.

If you can justify the cost, we think you'd be hard-pressed to find a more accomplished set of headphones at anywhere near this price.

Baby boomers The case for in-ears



The most traditional hi-fi headphone design (also called circumaural), these cup your ears completely, usually with semi-airtight earcups. You'll notice cans of this type used as monitors in recording studios: depending on the type of design they use they can be extremely effective at cutting out the noise of the outside world.



ON-EAR

Supra-aural or on-ear designs tend to be smaller and lighter than circumaural models. They sit on your ears rather than over them, usually pressing on to them as well. Some listeners find them lighter and easier to wear for extended listening than over-ear models, but their design necessarily means they tend to allow in more sounds from outside.



IN-EAR

Gone are the days when everyone else has to hear your music. In-ear buds are a great way to isolate yourself in sound. Nowadays, in-ears usually come with rubber tips, which provide a good seal and help the music travel only down your ear canals. There are many designs out there and a better fit means better sound, so experiment with tip sizes.

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DRAGONFLY

Living with it The DragonFly has only a 3.5mm headphone output - and that's it. Volume is controlled via the computer.

So much of our music is now stored in the digital domain that it's never been more important to get a decent digital-to-analogue converter

Best DAC up to £300 AudioQuest DragonFly v1.2 £130

The original DragonFly created a huge buzz (pardon the pun) when it launched back in 2012. AudioQuest managed to take a DAC and headphone amp, two traditional hi-fi components, and serve them up in a great-sounding consumer-friendly package. The DAC even won a Product of the Year award for its troubles.

Fast-forward a couple of years and history is repeating itself - the DragonFly is back, new and improved. Despite 'v1.2' being significantly cheaper than the original, inside there have been changes to the signal path between the DAC chip and analogue output. The internal power supply has also been tweaked.

We've always been fans of the design. The logo lights up in different colours to indicate the sampling rate of the file being played: green is 44.1kHz, blue is 48kHz, amber is 88.2kHz and magenta is 96kHz.

It's the DragonFly - but better

Play a couple of tracks and we soon hear that the open, spacious, detailed sound of the original DragonFly is still there, but the new version sounds even cleaner and clearer. There's even greater dynamic thrust. *Imagine the Fire*, from *The Dark Knight Rises* OST, is a brooding blockbuster of a track – pacy, powerful and dynamic. And the DragonFly easily communicates all these facets to the listener. Whether it's a WAV version or a relatively low bitrate file via Spotify, the sense of drama, rising intensity and the explosive nature of the track are all expressed perfectly.

The DragonFly's ability to follow a track's rhythm and timing are superb. Duke Dumont's *I Got U* is a feel-good dance tune and the DAC matches it with a fine sense of enthusiasm and an equally upbeat tempo.

The emergence of the DragonFly led to a steady stream of impressive rivals from the likes of Fiio and Cambridge Audio - but it's the DragonFly v1.2 that takes the Product of the Year laurels.

Best DAC £300-£500

Arcam irDAC £400

Product of the Year in 2013. the Arcam irDAC has to settle for a Best Buy Award this year. But that doesn't mean its sound quality is any less spellbinding - this is still a fantastic piece of kit for the money.

Fire it up and you'll find the Arcam's ability to stay true to the rhythm of a track is what makes it stand out from many of its peers. From simple hip-hop to complex jazz and classical pieces, the Arcam has the speed and agility to communicate pace and momentum superbly.

Plenty of connecting options

It helps that Arcam has equipped the irDAC with technology and design cues derived from the company's high-end FMJ D33 DAC. Beneath the well-damped aluminium casework you'll find much to admire in the high-quality output stage, advanced eight-stage power supply and high-grade Burr-Brown DAC.

The irDAC offers plenty of connections. The twin optical inputs (which support material up to 24-bit/96kHz) and the twin coaxial digital inputs (which can handle 24-bit/192kHz files) mean the Arcam can take feeds from multiple sources such as CD players, streamers, TVs and games consoles too. So, far from it being confined to your hi-fi kit rack, it can help to



improve the sound from your other home entertainment kit too. One of the two USB inputs is dedicated for Apple devices so the unit can also make the most of digital files stored on a smartphone or tablet.

The Arcam irDAC sounds big. bold, detailed and cohesive - and it absolutely sings, doing a grand job of joining strings, piano and bass, flowing them together

and it absolutely sings. Play Kanye West's Gone and the irDAC manages the ebb and flow of the track superbly. It does a grand job of joining the strings, piano and bass, flowing them together. It all comes together beautifully, producing a fluid, entertaining and expertly organised product that really engages.

The Arcam is never less than entertaining. The way it encourages you to keep listening is a rare talent, and one we are more than happy to confirm with a Best Buy Award.

Best DAC £500-£700

Audiolab M-DAC £600

The M-DAC has won so many Awards (2014 makes it four in as many years) it's starting to feel like a piece of the furniture. In fact, you'll often see reviewers fighting over who gets to use it as their desktop DAC in the office.

It's understandable, really. The M-DAC is a classy-looking unit, and it doesn't put style over function either. Alongside the single USB socket are two coaxial and two optical inputs, while you can choose from optical, coaxial, RCA and balanced XLR outputs.

Having so many onboard connections would be rendered moot, of course, if the M-DAC wasn't so easy to use. Thankfully it's a joy, with a large display that helps you see exactly what you're doing with your music. There's a

remote control to switch between inputs, and the M-DAC's display shows the bit depth and sampling rate of the input signal. We can just

guitar rifts and an expressive vocal. We knew four vears ago, when we reviewed it for the very first time, that the M-DAC was a bit of a steal, and nothing we've heard at this money since has made us change our mind.

Best DAC £700-£1000

Chord Chordette QuteEX £990

Let's start with the bad news. Chord has replaced last year's Award-winner at this price. the Chordette QuteHD. The good news is its successor keeps everything we love, adds extra functionality and sounds even better. Basically, Chord picks up where it left off with a Best Buy Award. Not that you'd think the Chordette QuteEX was necessarily a brand-new model - it looks pretty much identical to its predecessor, apart from the identifying sticker.

Both the Chord's chipset and motherboard have been upgraded. This means the 'EX' can handle 384kHz sampling rates and DSD 128 over its asynchronous USB socket, as well as files of more conventional resolution. In keeping with the rest of the company's DAC range, the Chord doesn't use an off-the-shelf DAC chip - instead it uses a bespoke, programmable circuit which is tailored to suit its needs.

The lights reveal all

The QuteEX puts on something of a light show - peer through the window on the top and you'll see the inside change colour depending on the sample rate being played through the coaxial, optical or USB inputs. There are no front panel buttons or display - inputs are auto-sensed and the DAC switches accordingly.



The QuteEX sounds more organised and more detailed than its now-defunct sibling. The DAC displays great confidence and composure with simple and complex arrangements. There's a great deal of resolution and texture to Bruce

The **Chord QuteEX** displays great confidence and composure with arrangements. Instruments sound natural and believable. It shows no signs of weakness

Springsteen's Heaven's Wall in 24-bit/88kHz form. Instruments sound natural and believable, as does Bruce's rough-around-the-edges vocal.

Time, from the Inception soundtrack, is more of a test of the Chord's ability to handle complex bass arrangements. It shows no signs of weakness. The DAC gives plenty of weight, digs deep, defines edges with skill and manages to give every last ounce of information. And the Chord still shows enough delicacy to handle the solemn piano notes at the end of the track.

This is a step up from the Arcam irDAC and you have to spend half as much again to better it. That makes the QuteEX quite something.

Best DAC £1000+

Chord Hugo £1400

Just when you thought it couldn't get any better for Chord following the exploits of the Chordette QuteEX, the British company finds itself the recipient of its second Award in a page.

The Hugo's sound quality justifies the jump in price, and it also comes packed with a whole host of useful features. In fact, we're still scratching our heads over quite how Chord has managed to build such a smartly



finished, feature-packed device at the money without sacrificing sound quality. Just to clarify, this is a bona fide digital pre-amplifier with DAC, optical and coaxial inputs, two USB sockets, an analogue output, three (yes, three) headphone outputs and - last but not least aptX Bluetooth connectivity.

Take it wherever you go

And it's portable! That's right - Chord has even found room inside that petite aluminium

casework for built-in rechargeable batteries. A two-hour charge should be good enough for 12 hours' use. It's really going above and beyond the call of duty for a product of its type, and should be applauded.

But, as we say, Chord hasn't taken its eye off the ball in the slightest with regards sound quality. The Hugo is as happy and communicative with a 320kbps Spotify stream as it feeding off the meaty resolution of a DSD music file. Start with a basic Bluetooth stream of Aretha Franklin's I Say A Little Prayer and the Chord transports you directly to the recording studio. The Hugo's desire for detail and

natural tone really brings the vocal to the fore. Piano and guitar sound realistic and pure, brought to life with amazing dynamics. It all blends together to really deliver the soulful feel of the track.

Change tack slightly, with Emeli Sandé's Heaven, and the Hugo goes with the flow. Highs sound airy and lively, but there's still decent weight and solidity too. The Chord gets the balance of subtlety during the verses and drive during the chorus spot on. The beat really takes hold thanks to the Hugo's ability to lock onto rhythms and organise them.

The Chord Hugo's neutral, even-handed approach to music is as evident whether you're using it as a DAC or heapdhone amp - it's a device of many talents and plenty of charm. And that's easily enough to convince us it deserves a Best Buy Award.

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Blu-ray players

Blu-ray players are superb all-rounders. You'll struggle to beat their picture quality, they're great DVD players, and they sound excellent too



BLU-RAY DISC/DVD PLAYER BOP-S72

Most Blu-ray players also have plenty of smart capabilities, offering the likes of BBC iPlayer, Netflix, Spotify and more.

Best Blu-ray player £150-£300 Sony BDP-S7200 £220

History has a habit of repeating itself, and although the model has changed from last year the result is the same. A Sony Blu-ray player once again finds itself winning our Product of the Year Award.

The S7200 sits at the top of Sony's current range of Blu-ray players and features picture-processing technologies you won't find on any other Sony machine, as well as a number of audio components specific to this model. Sony has focused on squeezing out all the performance it can at the price.

The Sony's star actually shines brightest when it comes to sound quality: it's entertaining, exciting and musical, impressing us when it comes to Blu-ray discs, DVDs and CDs. The S7200 shows great enthusiasm and timing whether you're watching the Blu-ray of U2's *360° at the Rose Bowl* or using the player to stream 24-bit/192kHz WAV files off a NAS drive. The Sony handles music with a level of finesse you don't normally hear at this price.

And the S7200 also excels visually. Watch the Blu-ray of *Muppets Most Wanted* and the Sony picks out all the fine detail on Kermit and the fur on Fozzie Bear. It's a stunning picture that really draws the viewer in with an impressive sense of depth and realism. The player is able to contrast between both the subtle and the bold hues of the main characters, while edges are sharply drawn and movement remains stable. Switch to a DVD of *Lincoln* and the Sony rises to the challenge of upscaling the content to 1080p resolution, relaying solid blacks and fine insight in the shadows.

4K upscaling is included, as is a decent level of smart functionality (even if you have to forgo ITV Player and 4OD). Sony's Entertainment Network acts as your one-stop-shop for music and video on-demand.

We're quite taken with the minimalist design, not least because it fits in so nicely with Sony's home cinema amplifiers, including the outstanding STR-DN1050 (see page 68-69). Now that would make for quite the home cinema coupling.

There's no doubt in our minds: if you want the best pound-for-pound Blu-ray player currently on the market, you need the Sony BDP-S7200.

The Sony BDP-S7200 handles music with a level of finesse you don't normally hear at this price. And it also excels visually, with its stunning picture providing an impressive sense of depth and realism

Best Blu-ray player up to £150 Sony BDP-S5200 £95

The BDP-S5200 is all about providing serious bang for just a handful of bucks.

It looks small and unassuming - it's pretty much half the width of your average home cinema separate. Turn the machine on and vou're whisked to the Sony's home page in super-quick time - and the player wastes no time loading discs.

The 5200 isn't overflowing with connections, but you're given all the basics you could want from a budget player, including an HDMI output and built-in wi-fi.

An excellent, natural-looking picture

Gravity on Blu-ray is equally impressive in 2D or 3D, and the Sony does both justice with a brilliant picture. The depth and sense of realism is wonderfully immersive. The Sony's picture doesn't feel fake or forced even when all the space debris comes flying out of the screen towards your face. There's an excellent level of contrast as the black expanse of space is punctuated by stars, satellites and astronauts. Whites are punchy, but dark areas remain inky black and the Sony still has enough in the tank to extract plenty of detail from the shadows. The Sony also has a firm hand on all the



movement - when Sandra Bullock spins out of control during the opening salvo, edges remain resolute and sharply drawn.

Upscaling a DVD to match a TV's 1080p resolution is no easy task, but the Sony puts in a

shift, preventing *The Lego Movie* from looking soft and instead allowing it to jump out of the screen with a crisp, colourful palette.

There's a similar sense of punch and detail with music. You can hear it with the softer musical score from Frozen or the more 'Hollywood' soundtrack to The Amazing Spider-Man 2. The Sony delivers tunes with a real sense of fluidity and rhythm, but hits hard enough to give more explosive soundtracks the sofa-shaking impact they deserve.

If you're looking to upgrade from a traditional DVD player to something more capable, the BDP-S5200 is a bona fide bargain.

Best Blu-ray player £300+

We're used to seeing Panasonic Blu-ray players battling it out at the budget end of the market, but can't remember seeing a £500 machine from the company. It's a bold move, especially when you've got serious rivals like the multiple Award-winning Marantz UD7007 to contend with. But this gamble has paid off handsomely.

The picture is fantastic. Playing The Lego Movie we're captivated by the punchy hues, the intense black levels, the bright whites and incredible level of detail. Colours are beautifully balanced and the Panasonic's excellent contrast makes for a bold and riveting picture.

Switch to The Adventures of Tintin (in both 2D and 3D) and the Panasonic shows off its smooth

handling of motion. It doesn't put a foot out of place during the exhilarating chase through the streets of Baghar. It may be an animated film, but the textures of jumpers, metal pipes, Snowy's fur and the sea are tangible - the subtlety the Panasonic describes is astounding.

The Panasonic DMP-BDT700's picture is fantastic. We're captivated by the intense black levels, bright whites and incredible level of detail

The sense of depth is excellent, and it's a crisper, smoother and cleaner picture than any budget alternatives we've seen. Even upscaling old-school DVDs brings great results.

A powerful, precise sound

Movie soundtracks are clear and detailed. Hans Zimmer's soundtrack for Rush is relayed with power, scale and precision. There's a real zip to the Panasonic's sound.

The unit is sleek and the brushed aluminium adds class. The loading tray is hidden underneath a magnetic flap, which leaves the fascia uncluttered when not is use. The remote control is nice, with buttons and shortcuts logically laid out. It's backlit too - living with the BDT700 is a fuss-free and rewarding experience.

It's also well-connected, boasting twin 4K/60p-compatible HDMI outputs. You

> can even use the player with older surround amps lacking HDMI sockets thanks to the 7.1 multichannel analogue output.

Add to the mix a decent suite of smart features and high-res audio music playback, and you've got a seriously potent package. Plug in the BDT700, hit play and see for yourself.

Home cinema Solve amplifiers

If you are after power, precision and purity of sound while watching movies or listening to music at home, then these amps are ideal

Best home cinema amplifier £350-£700 sony STR-DN1050 £500

If there's one habit you don't want to kick, it's winning - and Sony finds itself in the enviable position of producing the Product of the Year in this category for the second year running.

This time it's all down to the stunning STR-DN1050 - an amplifier with skills that makes a mockery of the very reasonable price tag.

What makes Sony's achievement all the more impressive is the competition it has fought off. At this level, we are spoiled for choice: Onkyo, Denon, Pioneer and Yamaha. They all competed with the Sony in a recent *Group Test* but fell short, leaving the STR-DN1050 in pole position.

Box of delights

The Sony is pleasing from the moment you take it out of the box. The auto-calibration experience is a swift and pleasant one. The menu system has been slightly tweaked for 2014 and it's equally enjoyable, offering bold, easy-to-navigate menus, while the new-look remote is superb in its simplicity. Functionality such as aptX Bluetooth, highresolution music playback, six HDMI inputs and 4K upscaling are all welcome, as are Spotify Connect and AirPlay. And all this is before you even get to the sound quality.

Play *300: Rise of an Empire* and you discover the Sony's a big-sounding, muscular amp that makes you sit up and pay attention.

Articulate heavyweight

Its low end has neighbour-bothering weight, giving drive and drama to the on-screen action. This is nicely balanced by an articulate, spacious midrange and clear treble that come together to produce a cohesive sound in a wide soundfield. Add in excellent dynamics and pin-sharp precision, and the result is a thoroughly engaging and exciting listen even at low volumes.

The STR-DN1050 also performs well with dialogue and more subtle sound effects, proving to be the one of the most detailed amps we've ever tested at this price. Voices are crisp and textured, clarity is second-to-none and sound placement is spot on.

We didn't think it possible, but Sony has managed raise its game, and the bar, with the STR-DN1050: an outstanding Product of the Year.

Best home cinema amplifier up to £350 Yamaha RX-V377 £250

Yamaha's budget home cinema amps have dominated this price point in recent years - and 2014 is no different. If you're new to the idea of surround sound and want a solid foundation for a system. look no further than the RX-V377.

Compared to home cinema amps further up the price scale, you miss out on a few niceties such as 4K upscaling, AirPlay and internet radio streaming - but you do get Yamaha's automatic speaker calibration technology to help with set-up. There's also 4K Ultra HD pass-through and four HDMI inputs.

Down to the wireless

There's the option to go wireless with Yamaha's YBA-11 Bluetooth receiver for an additional £50, while those with an iDevice can always play straight through the front-panel USB port (which can also be used to charge).

However, sound quality is the key when it comes to home cinema amps: powerful, punchy and full of detail, the RX-V377 exceeds our expectations. Yamaha receivers usually excel at steering surround-sound effects across the room with precision and detail - and this receiver does so on both Blu-ray and DVD.

Play the DTS-HD Master Audio soundtrack of Robocop, and you're placed in a bubble of sound with such startlingly accurate and detailed placement that you're immediately sucked into the action. Effects panning between speakers is

seamless. It's weightier and more authoritative than anything we've heard at this price. The Yamaha grabs your attention in a good way, whatever the film. Only Lovers Left Alive is a great example - it switches easily from crashes and bangs to an atmospheric feel, where dialogue is prominent. When subtlety is required, the Yamaha delivers.

Even when you use the Yamaha as purely a stereo amp, its confidence and punch come to the fore - cementing its position as our numberone recommendation at this price point.

Best home cinema amplifier £700+

Pioneer SC-LX58 £1400

delivering a thoroughly immersive sound premium surround-sound amplifiers isn't too through your room with agility and accuracy.

The detail definition is exquisite. Everything that pings off Captain America's shield is clearly identified, and when he throws the disc at somebody's face there's weight behind it. This

detail extends throughout the frequency range, too: bass is deep and articulate, while the top end is nicely rounded and refined.

It's not all about muscle, of course. The Pioneer is capable of musical nuance as well. Move on to a Blu-ray of U2: 360° and the amp does a beautiful job rendering the emotive intro of Where The Streets Have No Name; Edge's guitar has a sense of fluidity and rhythm.

Heavy metal sounds

The design isn't going to turn heads - it's a heavy, black or silver metal box, and built like a tank. There are eight HDMI inputs and three outputs; 3D playback is supported, as is 4K 60p pass-through and upscaling. The SC-LX58 has built-in aptX Bluetooth, while there's built-in AirPlay compatibility too. You also have internet radio, plus Spotify Connect.

If you want to use the Pioneer as a music streamer it has WAV, FLAC, Apple Lossless and high-res support (including files up to 24-bit/192kHz), while there's support for Dolby Atmos surround-sound tech.

If you're looking to make the move from an entry-level home cinema system to something more mature, powerful and refined, then the Pioneer SC-LX58 is more than qualified.

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Speaker package

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Up against the wall The Dali standmounts

sound best when pointed straight ahead and set fairly close to a wall – ideal for smaller rooms

Best traditional package £700-£1500 Dali Zensor 15.1 £980

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It takes something very special to win an Award for a second year, but something exceptional to pick up Product of the Year again too. That coup belongs to the Dalis. You could argue that it's because the high fliers in the speaker package categories remain unchanged from last year, but that seems rather dismissive when you remind yourself of the Dali's make-up: two pairs of the brilliant Zensor 1 standmounts, an expressive Vokal centre speaker and an authoritative yet articulate E-9F subwoofer.

Together they run like clockwork. Well made, consistently matched and easy to accommodate, the Zensor 1 package offers the whole works without having to spend an arm and a leg. The Vokal is a little chunky at 44cm wide and 29cm deep, so make sure your TV rack can house it. These speakers can be wall mounted, lending them a flexibility many rivals lack.

The 34cm-cubed sub is helpfully unfussy when it comes to placement in the room thanks to its floor-facing port. While it has a front-firing 23cm aluminium drive unit, the rest of the channels use the same 25mm soft-dome tweeter and 13cm wood-fibre mid/bass driver for a uniform presentation. It pays off - we admire the consistency in character between the front channels - the soundfield stays close-knit as sound effects pass across all three units.

The exquisite talents of the Zensor 1s are clear from the off: fluid and dynamic with splendid attention to detail, they make for an exciting listen as we delve into the action-packed *Robocop* reboot. There's plenty of pop to gunfire as our hero carries out his training regime, and the beautifully integrated subwoofer is as fast as it is precise.

A clear message from the centre ground

The centre speaker keeps its side of the bargain too, impressing with its insightful and delicate delivery of dialogue.

Swap discs to Kanye West's *Yeezus* album and the Zensor 1's refined yet exciting presentation reminds us why they've been so successful in the market. Their stereo delivery is balanced and detailed, enthusiastic and engaging – and that's about as much as we can ask for on music replay.

Whether it's with music or movies, the Zensor 15.1 produces a stunning sound. That's £1000 well spent, we say.

Best traditional package up to £700 Q Acoustics 2000i 5.1 £650

Another year goes by and this package remains untouched. We simply can't find a rival (trust us, we've looked) that even comes close to the Q Acoustics' performance-per-pound offering - despite its £25 hike in price since last year.

The marvel comes from two pairs of the much-loved 2010i standmounts making up the front left and right channels and back surrounds, an expressive 2000Ci centre speaker and a powerful 2070Si subwoofer.

A pretty face, and more besides

It's a neat bundle: the glossy white (or black) tapered cabinets set the bar high for design and finish at this price. Their compact, unfussy build wins points for practicality, too - the 2010is are happy sitting close to a wall if space is tight, making them ideal for smaller rooms, while the slim subwoofer can be easily tucked out of sight. The centre is a little bulkier than ideal, mind.

If speaker stands are impractical for your set-up (or budget), all the speakers here - with the exception of the subwoofer - can be wall-mounted. Handy indeed.

Typically for Q Acoustic speakers, the terminals can be found on the cabinet base, so - once the fiddly procedure of connecting cables is out of the way - the result is trim and tidy. But it's in the sonic department that the package really shines. Delivering an easy-going yet detailed sound that strikes the right balance between smoothness and attack, every speaker plays its part to deliver a thrilling movie experience: the 2010is' presentation is cohesive, dynamic and detailed, and the sub digs deep

but stays in control. The Centre speaker gives dialogue real expression and solidity. As we spin *The*

Amazing Spiderman 2, there's good tonal consistency between

swinging effects as Spidey web-shoots his way through New York, and a wide and

consuming soundfield. We simply don't expect the scale this system can deliver for this money.

Stereo delivery is similarly impressive, the front pair of satellites proving rhythmically sound, while basslines are controlled but authoritative. Vocals are crystal clear, and there's a good sense of stage imagery when we play live recordings.

It might be a tad pricier than last year, but the 2000i 5.1 is still remarkably good value.

Best traditional package £1500-£2500 Cambridge Audio Aero 5.1 £1500

It's a pleasure to have these speakers back out in the open - not least because they've shed £150 in the last year.

The neat and robust Aero 5.1 package consisting of a pair of Aero 6 floorstanders, an Aero 5 centre speaker, a pair of Aero 3 bipole



surrounds and a relatively compact Aero 9 subwoofer - sees off rivals for another year and remains a high-flier in the sub-£2000 market.

Following suit with the company's history of technology-packed products, the talking point of this Aero range is its BMR (Balanced Mode Radiator) drivers. These cover a much wider frequency range than a conventional driver (250Hz to 22kHz, to be precise) and move the crossover point into a region where our ears are far less sensitive to the distortions that are

inevitable in any frequency handover. The result? A cleaner, more direct sound, and wide dispersion even at the very high frequencies.

Left and right in unison

The company has continued to incorporate the technology into many of its products of late, and we can see why. Here, the presence of the 4.6cm drivers in the front channels ensures they work in unison for a cohesive presentation.

Load up *Star Trek Into Darkness* and that tight co-operation is apparent as the *USS Enterprise* blasts left-to-right.

Producing a stunningly direct sound that excels in focus and clarity, this

system makes more conventional rivals sound a little soft and blurred in comparison. Its delivery shows no shortage of punch or attack as grenades are launched, and there's plenty to praise where detail and dynamics are concerned.

It only takes one on-screen explosion to appreciate the exceptional power and grunt from the sub's forward-facing 25cm driver.

It's not long before we're engrossed in the action - and that's in part thanks to the surrounds. Its their bipole design - which means they fire sound both forward and backward to make the soundfield more 'wrap around' - that make the experience totally immersive.

Though the package's slightly lean disposition gives it an agile quality, it makes system pairing crucial. Stay away from bright or aggressive electronics and you'll have a sound to marvel at.

Producing a stunningly direct sound that excels in focus and clarity, the **Cambridge Audio Aero 5.1** makes rivals sound a little blurred in comparison
Best traditional package £2500+ KEF R100 5.1 £2850

Despite some fierce rivalry from the brilliant Monitor Audio Silver 6AV12 this year, this elegant KEF combination takes the cake yet again, even in the face of the R100 standmounts (of which two pairs make up this package's corners) dropping their fifth star earlier this year.



Slipping from a five- to a four-star rating in the mid-range speaker market doesn't change the fact that, in a surround system, they work terrifically. In fact, their partnership with the R200 centre speaker and R400b subwoofer is a match made in heaven.

KEF's Uni-Q drivers are at the heart of these exquisitely built speakers and comprise a 25mm aluminium dome tweeter - with a 'tangerine' wave guide for improved rigidity - at the centre of a 13cm aluminum alloy mid/bass driver. The configuration is designed to deliver consistent dispersion, and help with driver integration too.

It certainly pays off - integration between treble and midrange is seamless, to the point that listeners will struggle to distinguish between the two drivers on each speaker. That cohesiveness is true of the front three channels, too: the consistency of their tonal character

Integration between treble and midrange is seamless, but it's the scale of the **KEF R100 5.1** that impresses most – especially given the package's compact size means that sound remains the same as it moves between the channels. As they should.

But it's the scale of the system that impresses most - especially considering the package's compact size. The wide-open soundstage conveys the sense of the roaring crowd in *The Hunger Games: Catching Fire* superbly.

Clarity and detail

Refreshingly crisp and clear, the speakers handle the immediacy of Katniss' shooting arrows with precision. There's no shortage of detail in battle scenes, and the room-filling dynamics work wonders with the film's melodramatic soundtrack. The centre speaker ties it all together nicely, conveying impressive authority and expression with voices, while the powerful and agile sub does its bit too.

As crowd-pleasing with music as it is with movies, the KEF's stereo performance has all the balance and refinement, subtlety and rhythmic flair to make you fall in love with your favourite albums all over again.

Whether its finished in high-gloss piano white or black, rosewood or walnut veneer, the KEF is a born entertainer, and brings proper cinema surround sound to your home. You just have to supply the popcorn.

Best style package up to £700 Tannoy HTS-101 £350

Sometimes the very best products can only get better by lowering their asking price – and that's the case with the Tannoy. The package has dominated this category for the last three years, and 2014 is no different.

If you're toying with the idea of buying a soundbar or soundbase over a speaker package because space or budget (or both) is tight, the Tannoy could well swing your decision the other way. Compact and affordable, the HTS-101 proves you don't have to go big, or dig deep into your wallet, to get a first-rate sound from your movie collection.

Enduring looks

You don't even have to compromise on build and looks. It may have been knocking around for a few years, but the glossy finish of its straight-edged wooden cabinets is still tasteful by today's standards.

Beneath the grille of each of the four tiny satellites are a 19mm titanium-dome tweeter and a 7.5cm paper mid/bass driver, while the slightly larger centre channel doubles up on the bigger driver. The equally space-efficient sub is blessed with 100W of power and a 20cm driver.

Load up *Pacific Rim* and the exhilaratingly action-packed film basks in the Tannoy's

impressive scale and detail. The gapless soundfield has a good sense of depth and breadth, and the breathing space between each sound effect makes for an effortless listen. Even during the rather dense Kaiju battle, tracking crossfire across the channels is easy work.

Constructive dialogue

While the satellites' subtle dynamic shifts are a highlight, the centre proves just as accomplished in the dialogue-driven scenes.

Tonally, it's nicely pitched just on the exciting side of neutral, with crisp and attacking highs complemented by a brisk and textured bass. The top end can be pronounced though, so a little care with matching wouldn't go amiss.

Nine Simone's *My Baby Just Cares For Me* is good for showing up timing and detail blips, but the Tannoys show no such shortcomings.

Compact and affordable, the **Tannoy HTS-101** proves you don't have to go big, or dig deep into your wallet, to get a first-rate sound from your movie collection Instead, piano rhythms are spot-on, and you'll be taken aback by the texture of Simone's vocals.

In short, the HTS-101 is every bit as good as we remember. If you're after an open, exciting and full-scale sound from a discreet and shiny set-up, the Tannoy is yours for the taking. Still dead set on that soundbar?

Best style package £700-£1000 Q Acoustics Q7000i £900

If anything supports the notion that size doesn't matter, it's this hugely impressive 5.1 package - which you might remember seeing in this very spot in last year's Awards issue.

From just five small pill-shaped satellites and an accompanying subwoofer, you get an impressive sense of scale and a wide-open delivery of sound that far belies the physical proportions of this talented package.

Fine tonal character

But, of course, products can't win an award on size and scale alone. Thankfully, the Q7000i's performance offers the whole shebang. Walking a fine balance between smoothness and excitement, its tonal character is easy and enjoyable to listen to. Jump to the chase scene finale in *Fast & Furious 6* and the busy soundfield is clear and alive with detail.

Gun-shots fire from one car window to another with precision and accuracy, ricocheting convincingly around the channels without any gaps or lapses in concentration. Despite the picture being jam-packed with breakneck action, sound never feels lagging or missing information.

You get a reassuring thud from the bass, too, as cars hurtle into buildings. It's packed with

texture and manages to stay organised and agile without sacrificing any bass punch. This package keeps its composure at higher volumes too, and can flaunt its dynamic expression even at quieter levels.

Give John Legend: Live At The House Of Blues a whirl and the package thrives on the raw and

atmospheric nature of a live recording. Spirited and insightful, the system's rendering allows you to really feel the passion in Legend's vocals.

Perfect if you're short on space or want a discreet set-up, the matt-finished package

Although you get an impressive sense of scale, products can't win an award on size and scale alone. Thankfully, the **Q Acoustics Q7000i** offers the whole shebang Out of sight, out of mind

The sub's terminals, and volume and crossover controls, are all tucked behind a side panel, making for a neat installation

(available in black or white) will slip into the shadows of the rest of your system nicely - or (bar the subwoofer) take up a patch on the wall if you choose. The satellites hide two 7.5cm long-throw mid/bass drivers that surround a 25mm ring-radiator tweeter, while the active sub packs a 20cm woofer.

"We wouldn't be surprised to see it back here in 2014" were our concluding words of the Q7000i last year, and (unsurprisingly then) here it is. Having taken the crown from the original Q7000 package last year, it remains at the top of the game in the cut-throat sub-£1000 market. Can it do the triple come 2015?

Best style package £1000-£1400 Bowers & Wilkins MT-50 £1100

The M-1 satellites are a real standout in the speaker package universe - they make up the lion's share of not one but two multi-awardwinning B&W speaker packages (the other is on the opposite page).

And well they might - married with the ASW608 subwoofer, as here, they make a particularly good team. We haven't come across anything even remotely as competitive in the £1000-ish price band. Though we prefer the bottom-end clout of B&W's pricier flagship sub, featured in the MT-60D package, we like the ASW608's agility and pace. It provides loads of detail and just enough kick without overloading the room. What's more, its modest size makes it incredibly easy to house.

Ample placement options

The unfussy M-1s are designed to work best when close, or even stuck, to a wall, so finding a home for them will be no trouble.

Put the bundle to work with a demanding Hans Zimmer track (this time the *Pirates of the Caribbean: On Stranger Tides* Blu-ray comes off the shelf) and that familiar orchestral score has plenty of dynamic might. It serves up stacks of drama at the track's climax, and shows no

aversion to being pushed in the louder moments.

seem restricted.

You may think it a Herculean task for such a diminutive package to fill a room, but the scope of the soundfield is startling. Always authoritative, it never makes the soundtrack Take to the waters as the swashbuckling action ensues on the *Black Pearl*, and you're met with open, sparkling highs as swords clash in intense grapples. Attack and detail are here in spades, while thrashing waves carry weight and texture.

The verbal sparring between the pirates is projected with superb focus, carrying enough clarity and definition to reveal the nuances in each of their throaty 'ooh arrs'.

The good news continues with music performance. The MT-50 revels in the far-flung punch of Eminem's *Bad Guy*, while rendering all the deftness of the quirky bass tab. And let's not forget its expressive midrange - there's ferocity in those aggressive vocals.

Factor in its unique, versatile design to its all-round superb performance, and the MT-50 is one to be reckoned with.

Monitor Audio may now have an upgraded version of this package - the newer Radius R90HT12 brings in the company's more advanced W12 subwoofer and carries a £2000 price tag - but thankfully this original R90HT1 is still around.

Remaining a juicy filling between the two lower- and higher-priced B&W award-winners, the R90HT1 is ideal for those yearning for a discreet set-up.

At home in your room

Its two pairs of Radius 90 standmounts should blend in with most living rooms, whether they're on dedicated stands or wall-mounted (specific brackets and stands are available at extra cost), and the Radius 200 centre channel is compact enough for most equipment racks. Even the cubic Radius 390 subwoofer looks

stealthy enough not to intrude too much. The surround speakers all use drivers made from Monitor Audio's ceramiccoated Aluminium/ Magnesium (C-CAM) alloy, which has since reappeared in the company's newer Silver AV612 package. Monitor Audio claims the cone boasts low levels of distortion thanks to its longer excursion.

The sub has a 25cm C-CAM driver augmented by a passive radiator, and of its three sound settings ('Music, 'Impact' and 'Movie'), 'Music' gets our vote for its fine balance of solidity and punch. The Radius 390 displays a potent combination of precision and weight, staying taut and controlled when the plane crashes in the very silly action-fest *Enemies Closer*.

Of course, the surrounds have a huge hand in this package's success, and integrate seamlessly with the sub. The surround field is like an



airtight unit, with effects flowing smoothly and consistently between each channel. And as gunfire pours into the surrounds, they tear through with punch and precision.

Give the Radius a few days' workout before undertaking any serious movie-watching and the top end will lose its out-of-the-box brightness, making way for crisp and detailed highs. To boot, the centre channel delivers clear and communicative voices.

Overall, you have a package that blends nicely. With price, performance and practicality on its side, the Radius ticks all the boxes.

Best style package £1800+ Bowers & Wilkins MT-60D £1950

While the M-1 satellites are the pinnacles of the B&W MT-50 package, their accompanying PV 1D subwoofer is the real jewel in the MT-60D's crown. And that's not just down to its cool spherical casing. Featuring opposing drive units, clever digital signal processing and EQ presets, it's exactly what we want underpinning the brilliant satellites.

Real depth and high-tech

Taut, controlled and full of impact, that sub goes gut-stirringly deep as it swallows up the thud of Thor's Lightning Strike hammer in *Thor: The Dark World.* It's a perfect match for the M-1s, which use a tweeter that borrows technology from the company's high-end Nautilus speakers and a mid/bass driver that adopts a similar design to the brilliant PM1 standmounts. It's impressive tech spec, and central to the dynamic and detailed craft of these speakers.

As the momentous score bellows out of the corners, the M-1s burst into life with staggering dynamics and drive. The soundfield is spacious and clean, the satellites steering effects confidently around the room, while the centre speaker does a fine job of caressing Chris Hemworth's deep, burly voice with favourable weight and solidity.

Even after a sufficient run-in, those highs can sound a touch excitable at bigger volumes so something like the even, refined (not to mention current Award-winning) Pioneer SC-LX58 amp (£1400) would fit well here. Controlled and full of impact, the sub in the **Bowers & Wilkins MT-60D** goes gut-stirringly deep as it swallows up the thud of Thor's Lightning Strike hammer

The satellites and sub work together in harmony for a presentation that's balanced, precise and squeaky-clean, not just with movies but music too. Loading up Drake's *Nothing Was The Same* album throws it into a 2.1 configuration, and the delivery is music to our ears. Reinforcing the package's enthusiasm and composure, it drops the artist's charismatic beats and melodies with insight and inflection.

To top it all off, every part of this uniquely designed package looks stunning in either its matte-black or all-white finish, and it's easy to accommodate as well.

It's little surprise this talented all-rounder celebrates its third win in a row at this price, and we have no doubt about its worth as a Best Buy. The MT-60D once again sets the bar for high-end style packages.

TV screen sizes are getting bigger, it's true – but for the ultimate in big-screen home cinema thrills you just can't beat a projector

Throw ratio

Make sure your projector will fit your room: its throw ratio will determine how far back from your screen the projector needs to be.

Best projector £1500-£2500 Epson EH-TW7200 £1900

Epson is no stranger to the coveted Product of the Year gong. Last year's entry was a shoo-in, and the new EH-TW7200 takes its step into the spotlight with an astonishingly assured and captivating picture.

What strikes us most about the EH-TW7200 is just how effortless it is. From its picture performance and ease of use to its swift set up and superb construction - everything about this projector screams quality.

A clean, bright, detailed picture

Captain America: The Winter Soldier is fast becoming one of our favourite test Blu-rays, not least because it marries a natural palette with brilliantly choreographed action sequences. It shows off the Epson's talents perfectly. The picture is clean, bright, and has sky-high levels of subtle detail. It's a masterfully balanced picture, one that fleshes out realistic skin tones as confidently as it brings out the bright blues and reds of our hero's uniform. Whites punch clear and stark, black levels reach stunning depths without compromising on finer details. With a claimed contrast ratio of 120,000:1 and 2000 lumens bright, it's no wonder this LCD projector has such an exciting and punchy picture. Motion is as smooth as it can be.

This kind of quality isn't reserved just for Blu-rays. DVDs look fresh and detail-laden even with the drop in resolution. And the heart-lurching scenes in *Gravity* are dramatic and engrossing in 3D. The screen stays bright even after we put on the supplied pair of active-shutter glasses.

Beautifully made and very well connected

The Epson's hefty chassis could easily look cumbersome and ungainly, but the curved design and smooth, uncluttered white finish looks rather elegant. It's beautifully made, and controls are neatly hidden away under flaps. It's well connected too, with twin HDMI, PC, component and composite inputs, and the supplied backlit remote is intuitive to use.

The inclusion of vertical and horizontal lens-shift wheels makes positioning flexible and speedy. A quick twiddle with the manual zoom and focus controls, and the picture is sharp and centred in no time. Like we said: effortless.

We expect a lot from a £1900 projector, and the EH-TW7200 delivers. It's a brilliant, fuss-free performer. Add a worthy source, AV amplifier and speaker package and you have one classy home-cinema system.

Best projector up to £1500 Ben0 W1400 £1000

Two years ago, BenQ dominated the budget projector category. With last year's winning Epson EH-TW5910 now out of the way (it's been discontinued), BenQ makes its comeback with this great-value offering.

It's had to leap over its younger sibling - the admittedly more budget W1070+, fresh from a *Group Test* win - to get here. The W1070+ is an achievement for just £650, but the W1400 gives a more mature and balanced take on the exuberant colour presentation.

Rich hues and plenty of detail

Showing the Blu-ray of *Life of Pi* the stunning landscapes are delivered with rich hues and lots of detail. There's convincing texture to Pi's sun-baked skin, the tiger's CGI fur and the silky waters of the ocean. The warm, sunlit scenes shine bright and clear, although the BenQ's

colour palette tips towards a richer presentation than is totally natural. It's not too overblown, though, and W1400 delivers this lively quality alongside subtle shading and good skin-tones. Black levels plunge deep, with plenty to see in shadows. Not bad for £1000.

Inevitably, there's a drop in sharpness and subtlety when we switch to DVD. That steady balance between exciting and natural colour is still present, though.

There's a good sense of depth and punch to 3D films, despite the inevitable darkening. A pair of active-shutter glasses is supplied - they are light and not too tiring on the eyes. Our only real gripe is that we're not entirely convinced by the W1400's handling of motion - slow pans across the screen look a little shaky. But since we find this true in pretty much every rival, we'll write it off as a minor niggle.

Elsewhere, the W1400's compact build, backlit remote and multiple connections make it a doddle to use. A vertical lens shift further speeds up the set up process. There are even surprisingly listenable built-in speakers (but we'd urge you to get a 5.1 speaker package).

If you've been thinking about taking those first steps towards your own home cinema, this projector is a great place to start. It won't cost you a fortune, and you'll be the envy of your friends with such riveting big-screen performance.

Best projector £2000+ Sony VPL-HW55ES £2800

We like symmetry, we like unfussy machines. We also like expensive projectors that perform so superbly they blow the competition away. The Panasonic PT-AT6000E has won this Award for the past two years, and we've previously said, "there still isn't anything on the

market that can beat this projector." Well, now there is. Everything the Panasonic does, this astonishing Sony does it better. Design? It's pleasingly symmetrical, and has a clean, glossy finish topping off the superb build quality. Use? Connections are simple (one component and two HDMI inputs tucked away at the side); the remote and menus are slick and

intuitive. Set up is smoothly done, albeit with a

That's forgiven the second we start to watch the Sony's picture. Wow! Just wow. There aren't many times in our day-to-day reviewing that we get absorbed in a movie without nitpicking at the picture quality, but this Sony nails it. It's a stunningly natural, detailed and immensely enjoyable picture. Objects are crisply defined without looking overly sharp; it's very bright, even with (active) 3D films. Highlights shine, and inky black levels are intense yet textured.



The colour palette is expertly judged, taking on a remarkably realistic tone while still packing lots of punch. The subtleties in shading and gradations give that much more depth to any film we're watching, whether it's the bright, colourful world of *The Amazing Spider-Man 2* or the bleak,

The Sony VPL-HW55ES

provides an immensely enjoyable picture. Inky black levels are intense yet textured and the colour palette is expertly judged dusty tones of *Peaky Blinders* on Blu-ray. Skin tones are among the most realistic we've seen.

And motion handling is good too. The Sony handles slow pans and speedy action scenes with such confidence and grace we have no issues when watching *Gravity* in 3D.

We know £2800 is a lot to pay for a projector, but the VPL-HW55ES is worth every penny. Its performance is genuinely cinematic, and the premium construction makes it a desirable object. When our only niggle is a lens shift that could operate more smoothly, well, we know we're on to a winner.

If you're looking for a top-class premium projector, look no further than this Sony.

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Tablets

Best tablet over 8in Apple iPad Air from £400

Apple lost out to Google in last year's tablet Product of the Year Award, but then it launched the iPad Air - the most desirable tablet to come out of Cupertino to date.

Build quality is impeccable. No tablet on the market can match the way the iPad Air feels in the hand - its unibody aluminium construction looks and feels as premium as ever. But it's the reduction of thickness and weight that makes the biggest difference in use. It's managed to shave 2mm from its chassis and nearly 200g in bulk, compared to its predecessor, making the iPad Air easier to hold in one hand.

Vision of beauty

The iPad Air offers the same 2048 x 1536 resolution display as before retaining its punchy, sharp, clean image and adding a little more brightness to whites (though blacks remain detailed and inky deep) and a touch more crispness. This improved image processing is thanks to the boosted 64-bit A7 processor and its M7 co-processor (which deals with motion-related data collection, leaving the A7 to deal with bigger jobs).

This also ensures a faster, slicker user experience than before, and while some of its competitors may match it in speed, iOS remains the best for tablet-specific apps – a factor that cannot be underestimated. The sound quality of Apple's phones and tablets always impress

us, and the iPad Air is no different, with its exciting, refined character. Sound, just like the picture performance, is crisper on the Air than with previous versions - with a clean, open and precise character

that its competitors can't come close to. Voices are wonderfully

expressive too, and there's an improved sense of space. There might be tablets out there capable of playing higher resolution file formats, but none manage such a cohesive and listenable character as that found on the iPad Air.

The 10in-tablet arena isn't as crowded as it used to be, with many manufacturers focusing their attentions on the smaller end of the market. But despite some good competition from manufacturers such as Samsung and Sony this year, we haven't been able to find the same balance of performance, functionality and pure usability anywhere else. The Nexus 7 still offers superb value for money, but this year it's been bested.

Best tablet up to 8in Google Nexus 7 from £200

No one had really taken the smaller tablet category seriously until Google produced the Nexus 7 in 2012. Apple followed shortly afterwards, with its 8in iPad Mini, and now everyone is at it: LG, Samsung and Amazon.

None, however, has been able to match the Nexus 7's excellent performance-per-pound ratio. Though we've seen advances in screen technology in 2014, with resolutions and pixels-per-inch increasing, the Nexus 7 remains very competitive. It still looks remarkably sharp, with a beautifully balanced colour palette that is never short of punch. It's not flustered by motion either, and its strong handle of contrast makes for strikingly bright whites against deep, but detailed, blacks.

Music performance is equally strong. It's enjoyable to listen to and, if you're without headphones, its stereo speakers produce a relatively rich, full-bodied sound too. This is all backed up by a quad-core processor that keeps things running smoothly, not to mention the purest version of Android (fully updatable to the most recent version, Kitkat 4.4.4); our favourite way to experience Google's operating system.

However, the knockout punch to win this Award is the Nexus 7's price: you can now get the 32GB version for around £200, making it half the price of a comparable iPad Mini with Retina.

Wireless Speakers

We want our music to be mobile these days. Here's an impressive bunch of Award winners that will shift your ideas of 'high-fidelity' for any location

Best wireless speaker £750+ Naim Mu-so £895

The neatly-designed Au-so app gives you full ontrol over your music cross smartphones and NAS devices, as well as the speaker's settings.

This is as close to hi-fi as a wireless speaker has ever been. The Naim Mu-so establishes a convincing template of how premium wireless speakers should be. It looks stunning. The wooden cabinet is wrapped in a layer of aluminium, giving it a premium, hefty feel. The aluminium heatsink spanning the length of the unit is distinctive, and overall the finish is exquisite. The highlight, of course, is that gorgeous volume dial, which doubles up as the unit's interface. We can't stop tapping at the classy, illuminated touchscreen, nor can we stop turning the smooth and perfectly weighted volume dial - it's a tempting bit of kit.

Stream on

Naim has thrown every method of streaming into the Mu-so, covering all OS platforms and devices: aptX Bluetooth, AirPlay, UPnP, ethernet and wi-fi connections, Spotify Connect and thousands of internet radio stations. Physical connections include 3.5mm and optical inputs, and a USB port that plays and charges Apple devices. File compatibility is extensive as well, from low-res Spotify streams to 24-bit/192kHz WAV, FLAC and AIFF files. Soundwise, the sheer power - all 450W of it - pulsing through songs is incredible. It drives the huge-scale presentation with a confidence, ease and skill we wouldn't have thought possible from a wireless speaker. There's an astonishing depth of detail. Subtleties in the harmonics and textures of instruments are laid bare, basslines are taut and punchy, and highs have plenty of bite without ever sounding aggressively sharp. Attack and delicacy go hand-in-hand here.

The Mu-so's full-bodied and weighty sound lends authority and enthusiasm to all files played through it. While it flourishes with hi-res tracks, it doesn't shy away from tackling MP3s with just as much enthusiasm. Instruments are arranged accurately in a spacious soundstage, and notes start and stop with unerring precision. Voices in particular benefit from Naim's talent with midrange fidelity - every attitude, emotion and intonation is subtly revealed.

The Naim Mu-so came with high expectations, and it passes with flying colours. Its design and performance prove worthy of its premium billing, and offer a pointer into the possibilities of the wireless speaker.

Best wireless speaker up to £150

Cambridge Audio Go £120

In a market saturated with budget Bluetooth speakers, the Cambridge Audio Go stands head-and-shoulders above the competition. The company's propensity for turning out talented portable speakers continues with the updated Go - it's a stellar performer at such an attractive price.

It's £20 pricier than last year's model (the Minx Go, which won Product of the Year), but it comes with a host of added features. The new Go has the higher-quality aptX codec for Bluetooth streaming, near-field communication (NFC) pairing, and it will charge your smartphone via the USB port (without needing to be plugged into the mains). The cabinet has been given a polish, too, with dedicated buttons for the inputs and satin finishes in black or white. The steadying foot has been done away with - the Go stands up on its own. Build quality is solid, yet it's still small and light enough to carry in a large handbag.

Upwardly mobile

And this portable compact speaker is likely to become quite the jet-setter: its powerful lithium-ion battery lasts for an impressive 18 hours of playback. It's a good thing, too, as once you start streaming songs over Bluetooth you'll never want to stop. The sound is upbeat, punchy, and full of admirable detail. The bold dynamics seem to defy its petite dimensions, and there's plenty to admire in the rich, full-bodied delivery. Rhythm changes are superbly handled, timing is spot-on, and it never runs out of energy. It sounds weighty, too.

Digging the bass

The basslines in SBTRKT's *Wildfire* dig deep enough for a cabinet of this size, while the treble stays clear of any brittleness. Lesser speakers would stumble clumsily or inflict

The **Cambridge Audio Go** is £20 pricier than last year's model but it comes with a host of added features. The cabinet has been given a nice polish too sharp edges on to the listener, but the Go soldiers on and keeps its composure intact. Voices are packed with character - it's not afraid to tackle the more subtle tones of Nina Simone or Tom Waits.

Go for gold

Most importantly, the Go is just so much fun to listen to. Few wireless speakers offer such a winning combination of build, portability and performance.

Its closest rival is the rugged and funky Ultimate Ears Boom, but the Go's battery lasts longer, it sounds better and it's cheaper, too. Which settles it rather easily: the Go is our runaway winner in this category.

Best wireless speaker £150-£300

Monitor Audio Airstream S200 £200

The Monitor Audio Airstream S200 has gone from First Test to Award-winner in the blink of an eye. We're floored by the scale of its talent: from the array of streaming options to its excellent sound quality, it's a very tempting product.

Let's talk about that spacious and subtle sound first: the open presentation, the clear and confident delivery, the punchy rhythm - it's impressive stuff from a speaker of its size and price. The Monitor Audio is lively and eager to please, which is exactly the kind of approach you want if your music library is made up of streamed files of all kinds of resolution.

Equal to the task

Feed it CD-ripped WAV files from your computer and it'll soar happily, digging up rich detail with a sense of fun. But it doesn't discriminate against lower-resolution files. Spotify-streamed tracks from your smartphone are handled with just as much deftness, and the S200 takes it upon itself to deliver the most engaging and entertaining sound it can muster.

We like how the S200 can go loud without sounding laboured. Drums hit with satisfying impact, and the basslines are taut and punchy. There are no sharp edges - it's all smooth sailing at the top end. Vocals sound natural and solid. It's a more powerful performance than its obvious price-rival, the Samsung M5, which (despite its recent *Group Test* win) is easily beaten by the subtler, more musical Monitor Audio speaker.

An impressive features set is yet another reason why this wireless speaker caught our attention. There's little this S200 can't do. AptX Bluetooth comes as standard, but it also throws in AirPlay, DLNA and Monitor Audio's own Airstream Direct connection into the mix. iOS devices can also be plugged into the USB port for playback and charging. Whether you want to stream from a PC, NAS device, Mac or Android, the options are there.

If you prefer hardwiring your music players, the 3.5mm input will serve you well. The tall speaker is shaped a bit like a wonky skyscraper, but there's a premium feel to the elegant finish, and the slim stature will make it easy to fit anywhere in the house. Multi-purpose buttons at the side help speed along AirPlay and wi-fi set up, and the clearly-positioned LED handily changes colour depending on the selected input.

Put it all together and we're stunned that the S200 offers so much in such an affordable package. It's remarkably good for just £200, and simply blows away the competition.



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Best wireless speaker £300-£500

Geneva Model S Wireless DAB+ £330

A year ago we were expressing our surprise and delight - at hearing hi-fi-standard music from this little wireless speaker. Time hasn't abated our love for this gorgeous Geneva system, nor has its performance faltered in light of newer. cheaper rivals.

It's a simple system: Bluetooth for streaming, 3.5mm for wired connection. While we have yet to enjoy the delights of DAB+ in our corner of

the world. DAB and FM tuners cover all your radio-listening needs. We needn't have worried if better-specced speakers would usurp the Geneva's place in our Awards issue: there's simply nothing at this price to challenge the Model S's sonic ability.

Classy Model

We're impressed how remarkably clear, musical and agile the Model S sounds: alt-J's etherealyet-funky tracks are delivered with layers of detail, and the fluid, melodic dynamics are conveyed effortlessly. Instruments stop and start with precision, and there's

subtlety to the harmonics of piano notes and guitar strums. Despite its diminutive size, it packs quite a punch. Basslines go low and drums have impact. There's an understated power that drives the Geneva's rhythmic delivery, which means you get a captivating sound whether you're playing Kate Bush or Megadeth. Silences have depth, and there's space enough in the open soundfield for complex recordings to breathe. Voices are nuanced, with emotion and attitude coming

to the fore. Part of why we're so smitten with the Model S is that it works as a bedside speaker too. It remains an interesting listen even at lower night-time volumes, and there's an alarm clock that can be programmed to wake you up to the sound of your favourite radio station. DAB stations sound crisper and punchier than FM, but overall the quality is pleasant as long as you get decent reception.

The speaker itself is a thing of beauty. The minimalist design and piano-gloss finish (in black, red or white) are impeccable, lending a premium feel. We're fond of the glowing touch-sensitive controls on the top - they respond instantly. Move up the price scale and you'll find the premium products Naim Mu-so and Dali Kubik Free taking wireless speakers closer to the 'hi-fi' category. But for half their price, this Geneva speaker is a fantastic option.

The Geneva Model S Wireless **DAB+** can work as a bedside speaker. It remains an interesting listen even at lower volumes and there's an alarm clock built in

A richly detailed and fluid performance wrapped up in a luxurious cloth finish - we're huge fans of the Dali Kubik Free.

It may be costly, but Dali's expertise in traditional hi-fi speakers has found its way here. The compact build is sturdy, the finish classy, and we like the row of tiny symbols and LEDs along the bottom edge that indicate which input is in use. It's an elegant design.

Musically, it's an absolute treat. Songs are delivered with an enthusiasm. The rhythm is taut, upbeat and has a tireless drive that doesn't let up no matter how hard the Kubik is driven. Notes stop and start with precision. Drums hit with power, and a full-bodied sound accentuates the clear and sparkling high notes.

Voice of reason

It's particularly subtle and delicate with vocals. There's so much feeling and expression in Birdy's breathy vocals, while Eminem's raps are delivered unflinchingly. There's warmth to the clean sound, and Kubik's ability to dig up a tremendous amount of detail means your attention will be fully engaged.

Optical and micro-USB inputs - both support 24-bit/96kHz files - are neatly hidden underneath the base of the speaker. There's a

handy USB port for charging your smart devices, while a 3.5mm input opens up compatibility with a variety of music players. Bluetooth is of the aptX variety. A credit-card style remote is supplied, but you're more likely to use your smartphone's intuitive controls for playback and volume changing.

The Kubik's party trick comes in the flavour of a second, extra unit, named the Kubik Xtra. Link them up to create a stereo system, which you can then use as desktop or TV speakers. The Xtra module costs £295, but it does add weight and a wider stereo image.

On its own, though, the Kubik Free is an immensely entertaining listen. It's talented enough for involved listening sessions, and fun enough to provide the soundtrack for a house party. It's seen off fierce competition from price-rival and well-featured Sony SRS-X9. The

Best portable on-ears up to £100 AKG Y50 £80

AKG has had a good run when it comes to our Awards. For three years in a row the company has had at least one winner. And in each of those three years, one of those products has managed to get Product of the Year. Now, make it four.

The AKG Y50s were only introduced in August, but they've not taken long to win our admiration. They're a radical departure from what we've come to expect from AKG. The branding is bold, with the logo so large it doesn't entirely fit on the colourful (or black) backgrounds. This is the Y-series, a 'lifestyle' range aimed at attracting a younger crowd.

It's a creative design, but it's not just a gimmick. These headphones are exceptionally well made. The aluminium ear cups, each housing a 40mm driver, offer a smooth glossy feel and fine cosmetic detail. The headband of wafer-thin stainless steel looks delicate, but it is durable enough to survive being yanked out of your pocket, manbag or handbag.

Speaking of which, portability is not an issue. They're larger than the AKG K451s (2013's Product of the Year), but the folding mechanism is neat: they fold flat and collapse inwards to fit into the supplied pouch.

But while it's a surprise in the design department, there's nothing unexpected about the sound. While the appearance might not be typical for AKG, the performance is. It's certainly not a case of style over substance.

Punch plus precision equals fun

Play something with a bit of bounce (anything from Pharrel Williams, then) and the Y50s will revel in it. Their timing and rhythmic precision is impressive, and the far-reaching dynamic punch helps to make for an entertaining listen.

There's a lovely sense of space, too - more than you might expect from small, closed-back cans - and it's filled well with a balanced, insightful sound. Clap beats, vocals and cymbals are all clearly presented. There's an extra gesture towards the low end, but this is no bad thing. A nice bonus is the silence provided by the leather earpads, which are great at blocking out other people's racket. Perfect for a commute, then.

Don't let the funky, cheerful design fool you: when it comes to sound quality, the AKY Y50s are perfectly serious, and seriously good.

Best portable on-ears £100-£200 Philips Fidelio M1MKII £180

A winner, improved. Last year, the Philips Fidelio M1s won this Award. But Philips didn't want to rest. Now we have the follow up, the M1MKIIs.

The new design boasts a lighter voice coil, extended high frequencies and more accurately tuned bass. It works, because the sound is a step up from what won our hearts and ears last year. There is an abundance of detail, only now it is

accompanied by a larger sense of space, with

more precision and greater clarity. The sound is never clinical, though. It's a fun listen. The bass is as weighty as ever, but it's now better defined.

Aesthetically, there's little change; the MKII is a light yet sturdy body of, mostly, metal and leather. The earpads of memory-foam sit snugly on the ears, gripping but never squeezing while providing a good deal of passive noise isolation. If you're looking for a pair of portable

headphones under £200, you've found them.

Best portable on-ears £200+ Beyerdynamic T51i £245

We've always been wary of inline mic remotes. It's true that they're terribly useful if you've got a portable music player, but often they cost more and make the headphones sound worse.

Full credit Beyerdynamic, then, for adding one to its T51p without upping the price or spoiling the sound quality. Armed with this new remote, and now called T51i, these are our new favourite portable on-ears because now they're practical as well as nicely designed and great-sounding. Sonically, they're beautiful. It's an insightful performance, capable of revealing the textures of instruments and the nuances in strands of accompanying vocals. The top offers clarity and bite, but it's smooth enough to avoid hardness. The midrange is eloquent and poised, while bass notes are substantial and taut. Timing is a matter of regimented precision. Top it off with big dynamics and plenty of confidence, and you have a ruddy good listen on the go.

Best home on-ears up to £150 AKG K550 £100

A massive bargain. That's what these closedback headphones are. 'Bargain' because this time last year they cost £200. Now, thanks to a price war, they're widely available for £100. 'Massive' because these are big in every way. The large earpieces feature 50mm drivers, the headband is broad, and the cable is long.

But they're surprisingly light. And also very comfortable. Unless you have the lugs of a small elephant, these are an over-ear design, yet the sound pumped out is airy and spacious in a way that's beyond most closed-back designs.

Sweetly communicative, the K550s handle tempos in a natural manner. It's a dynamic listen as they punch into (and out of) low frequencies with precision, and they're as at home with lush, analogue sounds and hardhitting electronica alike.

These were a hugely capable pair at £200, but at £100 they'll be hard to beat.

Best home on-ears £150-£300 Grado SR325e £300

As headphones go, these aren't that big. But we've put them in the 'home on-ears' category because that's where you'll use them unless you're determined to start fights on a bus.

The thing is, they leak a lot of sound. Anyone anywhere near you would be able to hear every single note. Why is this a good thing? Because closed-back designs create internal reflections, enclosure vibrations and standing waves - all of which are detrimental to sound quality. The looks or leaking won't be for everyone, but there's no doubt about their structural integrity and the on-ear foam pads are comfortable.

They are stonkingly good performers. It's a clear, weighty musical sound. Listen to anything from Michael Jackson and the Grados lap up the rhythmic energy. Layers of tracks are distinct and well organised, and all musical styles are treated with equal respect. Just wait until you're home before you break out the *Mamma Mia*.

We've long been acquainted with Shure's great-sounding, comfortable headphones, but these really are something.

By Jove, they are comfy. The super-soft earpads are covered in Alcantara, which can also be found on Formula One car seats. It's about as close as you'll get to a bear hug for your ears.

The large oval earcups are less than ideal as travelling companions, but weight - at a surprisingly light 286g - is not a problem.

It only takes a moment to appreciate the dynamic, exquisitely detailed sound on offer here. It's a broad sonic presentation with a wide spread. They're as easy on the ears as they are on the ear lobes, with a balanced presentation.

Play anything upbeat and they're fanatical. Bass lines are distinct. The headphones' fast, nimble manner makes a meal of the subtlest of rhythmic shifts. Factor in the seamless fluidity and it's a performance that's hard to match.

Best wireless on-ears Philips Fidelio M2BT £250

volume. This year Philips has added NFC so you can pair by tapping a compatible phone.

It's in sound quality where the M2BTs really excel. They're obviously cut from the same cloth as the non-Bluetooth version as they produce a punchy, rich, full-bodied sound.

There's plenty of detail throughout the frequency range, and vocals sound focused and emotive. They're really entertaining. If you want to cut loose, you can't go wrong here.



Best noise-cancelling on-ears Bose QuietComfort 25 £270

It's not often a product hogs an Award for four years in a row. That's the case with the Bose QuietComfort 15s, parked right here from 2010 to 2013. It would take a lot to dethrone such a Colossus, so around of applause, please, for the Bose QuietComfort 25, successor and superior in every way: design, aesthetics, performance.

'Quiet' is right, the QC25s at times giving the impression of actively pushing silence into your ears. The idle hum of office air conditioning is

easily eliminated. Take these on a commute and they will soon become your new best friend. They're comfortable too, as the name suggests. Performance is stronger than ever. There's a good deal of detail, with plenty of nuance in guitar-picking and vocals. It's a clear, balanced and insightful sound too, but fun with it.

Quiet, comfortable and great-sounding factor in the shiny new looks and you have something very special indeed.

On-ears - home and away

Stay at home headphones

Some of the bigger cans here are clearly designed for home use - they're just too big to be used on your commute. Traditionally more truly hi-fi, they can immerse you in music, - and keep your tunes to yourself.



Out and about

A lot of on-ear headphones, though, are designed to be taken out and about - many of them are foldable for easy stowage. They aren't as discreet as in-ear models, but some find them more comfortable and even better-sounding. It's worth experimenting to find which type you prefer.

Multi-room Systems

Hi-fi lovers finally got what they've long wished for in 2014: multi-room systems that are easy to use, versatile, and most importantly, sound great

Open access

Best multi-room system £500+ Bluesound from £1200

High-resolution music has seen a surge of support in 2014 and, after years of asking for it, the hi-fi community finally got what it wanted: a musically talented multi-room system capable of 24-bit/192kHz music playback. The best of these comes from a new company called Bluesound.

While the name might not be familiar, the people behind it are: it's home to many of the same designers and engineers who pioneered respected hi-fi brand NAD in the 70s. With its tag line of "Hi-fi for the wireless generation", it's answered the call for high-quality multi-room.

Take five

Bluesound has launched five products that cover most situations. The Node is a simple music streamer, attaching to an existing amp and speaker set-up to make it wireless and multi-room ready. The Powernode is similar, but features a built-in amp so you just need speakers, while the Pulse is Bluesound's "one box" integrated speaker solution. Add to that the music-streaming, CD-ripping, 1TB-packing Bluesound Vault and the Duo 2.1 speaker package, and you've got high-resolution music throughout the home. There's even a USB port on the back of all of its components, meaning you can add a USB key filled with music for playback from any speaker in the house, or a Bluetooth dongle to further stretch the Bluesound's capabilities.

It's a hugely versatile system and one of the most musical multi-room systems we've heard, with an open, spacious presentation and plenty of detail. Everything you throw at this system sounds entertaining. What tops off the experience is its pure usability. Whether you're using the desktop app, or you're on your tablet or smartphone, it's simple to use.

It's not cheap (we've listed two Pulse modules - the lowest cost 'out of the box' multi-room solution), but one listen will have you hooked.

Best multi-room system up to £500 Sonos from £340

For years Sonos has been synonymous with multi-room audio and dominated the market. And despite a number of capable competitors trying their hand at toppling them this year, this doesn't look set to change any time soon.

A big reason for this is the breadth of products Sonos has to offer - and the addition of the Play:1 to the family late last year only bolsters that.

Have an existing set-up that you want to go wireless with? The Sonos Connect will do that for you. Only got speakers? Try the Connect: Amp. The family of Play:5, Play:3 and the new Play:1 has the integrated speaker market covered at various sizes, while the Playbar and Sub brings all of Sonos's multi-room smarts to your home cinema set-up. No other system on the market can match it.

App side of performance

Of course all this wouldn't mean much if the user experience wasn't up to scratch, but Sonos has that right too. Of all the systems we've tested, Sonos is the easiest to set up, and when it comes to usability it remains one of the most intuitive, too.

The Sonos app sits at the heart of the system, and is a large part of its charm. With the app, you can easily control all of the speakers in your house, search music on network drives and

The **Sonos** app sits at the heart of the system. You can control all of the speakers, search music on network drives, and access a wide range of streaming services choose from the widest choice of streaming services on any multi-room system - giving you access to all your music in one place.

You're also able to build playlists directly within Sonos, and from multiple sources as well. So if you want tracks from Spotify, Qobuz and Deezer to play nice with tracks from your NAS drive, you can do so.

From a performance perspective, the Sonos system continues to impress. Each member of the Sonos family packs the same entertaining, enthusiastic character, so you get a wholly universal sound, no matter which parts of the system you own.

Across the spectrum

It might not offer high-res support like some other systems, but what it does deliver is an insightful and full-bodied sound that works across all genres. It's well balanced, offering a solid, but controlled, bass with a treble that never sounds hard or harsh.

Vocals are expressive and focused. Rhythms have precision, and the soundstage is wide and open - all coming together to provide a thoroughly engaging listen that you'll never tire of.

Best of all, with the addition of the Play:1 speaker, a Sonos multi-room system is cheaper and more accessible than ever. The price listed here is the lowest combined price of two speakers (well it would hardly be a multi-room system with one, would it?), meaning you could get started for under £350 with two of the £170 Play:1s.

If high-res music is not a consideration for you, Sonos's ecosystem is hard to fault, and it remains one of our favourite ways to transform your system into a multi-room experience.

The streamer is an integral part of the music lovers' consciousness now. Find out how we made up our minds on the Award winners

Best streamer £600-£1000 Cambridge Audio Stream Magic 6 v2 £700

After a successful number of years for the first version of this streamer, Cambridge Audio has released an update - introducing new functionality that helps this versatile unit regain Product of the Year status.

A lot of things about it remain the same, and that's no bad thing. It's still an accomplished network player, capable of handling most popular file formats (AAC, WAV, FLAC, MP3) up to 24-bit/192kHz, and it can still be used as a DAC and digital pre-amp, bringing its influence upon a whole system's-worth of kit thanks to its plethora of digital inputs.

It looks almost exactly the same too, and its sound is as excellent as ever, offering a confident performance, no matter the genre or file size.

Changing the game

Before we get into that though, it's worth considering what has changed. Native 24-bit/192kHz playback is now capable over wi-fi as well as via USB thanks to a more powerful streaming module. And a lot of work has been done, to great effect, to improve and simplify the user interface and control apps. This new processor architecture also means browsing menus are much faster than on its predecessor, plus Spotify Connect has now been added to make this streamer more flexible and versatile than ever. Soundwise, it's a very similar character to before – powerful, with a strong rhythmic drive and a boundless enthusiasm for any music you throw at it.

Play a 16-bit/44.1kHz file of Kanye West's *Send It Up* and the Cambridge Audio shows good control over the shrill synth note, never sounding pushed or hard. Vocals are expressive, and the bass tight and agile.

Captivating detail

Detail levels are certainly impressive, even on 320kbps streams from Spotify, where it still offers a decent level of insight without uncovering the fragility of weaker recordings. Dynamically it's superb too, demonstrating admirable precision with the way it deals with loud and soft, and the starting and stopping of notes.

Above all, it's as captivating as ever, and its new functionality makes it a better proposition than ever before. Back on the top and rightfully so - the Stream Magic 6 v2 is an easy choice for Product of the Year.

Best streamer up to £600

The entry-level streaming category has found a new star in the Bluesound Node. As the most affordable component of the company's excellent multi-room system, it's no wonder it caught our eye when in our testing rooms.

It's a music streamer but not as we know it - shunning the standard black box look for a glossy cubed design instead. Just like all of the Bluesound range, it doesn't have to be used in a multi-room set up, though that added Bluesound Node £400

functionality is always nice to have for the future, even if you don't have the need for it now.

Spec and span

Specs are kept relatively simple. It will hook up to your amp via its analogue outs, or there's a single optical out instead, with a USB port for connecting USB keys and an optional Bluetooth dongle for further increasing its functionality.

It's capable of playing uncompressed FLAC and WAV files up to 24-bit/192kHz, as well as

other popular audio formats: MP3, AIFF, AAC and WMA. It also has the option for streaming directly from Spotify, Rdio, Deezer, Qobuz and TuneIn Radio. Connection to the home network can be wired or wi-fi.

Through its tablet, smartphone or desktop app, the Bluesound Node will discover any music stored both on your network and locally, indexing it quickly and simply for easy playback. It'll also offer you the option to create and save playlists from across multiple sources, which is a nice touch.

Best of all though, is the way the Node sounds. It's a rich and fullbodied character, which is well balanced and full of enthusiasm. Bass response is full and punchy, with detailed, focused midrange and controlled treble all working together to ensure nothing is ever overbearing, nor laid back.

It's rhythmically adept too, and hangs together beautifully, offering space and separation to instruments and vocals.

Ready for resolution

This is the case no matter what resolution of music you throw at it. Of course high-res content offers more transparency and detail, but the Node's fun, entertaining way with music doesn't change when you drop down to a 320kbps stream from Spotify, for example.

In fact, it's hard not to be entertained by the Bluesound Node - an endlessly entertaining box of tricks at a superb price.

Best streamer £1000-£1500

Cyrus Stream Xa £1250

The Cyrus Stream Xa uPnP network player is one of Cyrus's more straightforward streamers, doing away with any pre-amp functionality to focus purely on streaming music.

On board there is a 32-bit DAC, capable of streaming 24-bit/192kHz high-res recordings, alongside networking capabilities. This streamer features six digital inputs to ensure its influence can be felt across your whole system.

Bus down the line

As with all Cyrus kit, there's room for upgrades down the line too, including the ability to add an external DAC and power supply should you wish, plus connections The **Cyrus Stream Xa** is a Cyrus product through and through. It's got all the main characteristics of the signature Cyrus sound, with class-leading levels of detail

for the MC Bus control system, allowing this to slip seamlessly into an existing Cyrus system.

Set-up is simple and quickly done via the front panel, the Xa picking up our networked drives without issue. For controlling music,

there's the included 'n-remote' and Cyrus's Cadence app

for Android and iOS,

which is well worth a look following its most recent update this summer.

Mark of Cyrus

The Cyrus Xa is a Cyrus product through and through, and we're not just talking about its half-width aluminium design. It's got all the main characteristics of the signature Cyrus sound - superbly organised, with class-leading levels of detail and a hugely musical tone.

Stars into space

Stream The Unthanks' *Starless* and the instruments in the introduction are reproduced with real subtlety and insight, while the vocals sound beautifully textured and three-dimensional. There's plenty of space awarded to the presentation throughout the frequency range for that matter, with all elements working together cohesively to form a sound to make the Cyrus family proud.

It's as precise as it is agile, as detailed as it is dynamic. While its bass punches low and controlled, its treble is allowed the space to soar high without restriction, steering clear of hardness even with aggressive recordings.

This helps to inject a likeable liveliness to its character, one that hooks you in and keeps you listening album after album.

There's no doubt that paying over £1000 for a streamer is a serious consideration, but one listen to this and you will hear where every penny is going.



Best streamer £1500+

Cyrus Stream XP2-Qx £2010

As the old saying goes, if it ain't broke, don't fix it - and seeing the Cyrus Stream XP2-Qx here for the third-year-running, certainly suggests that the adage is true.

Cyrus's flagship streamer and pre-amp is a powerhouse of high-tech specifications, with its top-of-the-range Qx DAC module on board, supported by a superbly specified power supply and internal circuitry.

The right input

There's a wealth of auxiliary input options to go at, so you can connect all manner of kit (including tablets and smartphones), and it supports file playback all the way up to 24-bit/192kHz, with almost any file format you can throw at it.

At this price, the XP2-Qx needs to prove its worth though, and it does so without hesitation. Once on our network, it finds our high-respacking NAS drive quickly, and we stream Hans Zimmer's brooding *Gotham's Reckoning*.

The XP2-Qx immediately demonstrates its superior rhythmic ability, with a fast, agile character that never loses its footing or sounds unsure of itself.

Instead it powers forwards with confidence, showing off its dynamic wherewithal

throughout, steadily building the tension and releasing it as the music moves through its dramatic peaks and troughs.

There's plenty of room at the top end for the treble to reach a natural high without ever sounding strained, while the powerful

bass is as agile as it is strong - offering punch and solidity when it matters.

There's a really high level of clarity here too, meaning detail retrieval is outstanding across the frequency range, with each instrument finding its own space within the open and transparent soundstage. We could listen to it for hours.

Remote backup

For control, you can use Cyrus's much-improved Cadence app or the included 'n-remote', either of which make browsing, playback and source selection a bit more convenient than using the unit's front panel.



It's the sound quality that really shines here though - and the XP2-Qx continues to provide the best on the market at this price. If you've got this kind of budget to play with for a music streamer, we can't recommend this addition to your system enough.

The **Cyrus Stream XP2-Qx** needs to prove its worth at this price, and does so without hesitation, with its rhythmic ability and fast, agile character

Best music-streaming service **Spotify from free**

Music streaming has become a way of life for many consumers. The number of services has grown exponentially over the past few years, offering access to libraries of varying size and quality, from the 72kbps of Rara up to CD-quality streaming from French start-up Qobuz.

But it's hard to look past Spotify for the complete all-round experience. It manages to balance performance and features with a huge catalogue of music. It has the widest platform support of all its rivals. Android, iOS, Windows Phone, BlackBerry and even Symbian have apps, while Spotify also features on Virgin TiVo boxes, Sonos speakers and a growing number of home cinema and hi-fi products.

The service keeps its catalogue up to date too, updating its page of new releases daily. Its influence in the industry has won it exclusives from the likes of Led Zeppelin and Metallica, with very few gaps of note elsewhere - a fact that wins it major brownie points.

Premium subscribers paying £10 per month get the all-you-can-eat experience and 320kbps playback. Then there's 160kbps as the free bitrate and a 96kbps option for mobile users wanting to limit data use. The top bitrate offers great levels of detail and a well-balanced sound.

Spotify is arguably the company that kicked off the music streaming revolution, and it's still blazing a trail six years after launch. More than 40 million active users says everything.

Best video-subscription service Netflix from £6/month

NETFLIX

If you want to be universally loved, you have to be universal - and, to put it bluntly, Netflix is everywhere. TVs, tablets and even games consoles, all are inroads for one of the most satisfying video streaming services out there.

£6 per month gets you unlimited access to films and TV shows, and you can stream to two devices at the same time. If you want to use up to four, the price goes up to £9. It's simple – a lot less confusing than the likes of Amazon Prime Instant Video.

Netflix doesn't only supply big-hitting TV series such as 24 and The Killing, it has also started making them. Exclusive content such as House Of Cards and Orange Is The New Black are both Netflix Original programmes. Then there is the film catalogue – although you don't get all the latest releases (Amazon has an advantage here).

Picture quality to match

Netflix is also at the cutting edge of picture quality, with *House Of Cards* and *Breaking Bad* available in glorious 4K. If you've got a compatible TV, and broadband around 15mbps, you're in for a visual treat. Netflix's standard 1080p streaming (called 'Super HD') gives really impressive results too, and so does the 5.1 surround sound.

Across every device we've tested, the interface is simple, attractive and practical. This really is one of the most complete and smartly executed services out there, and a must for any TV-addict.

Best video-on-demand service Google Play price varies



If it's the very latest titles you want, but would rather dip in and out than pay a subscription, then

Google Play is well worth investigating. Unlike alternatives such as Apple's iTunes Store, it's open to supporting devices from outside its immediate ecosystem, making it more accessible. Google's library isn't far off what Apple's iTunes Store offers - the video quality is just as good and titles are marginally more affordable.

Viewing flexibility

Purchases are kept in your account 'for ever', while rentals expire in 30 days (or 48 hours once you start watching). There's a five-device download limit, while rentals are restricted to one. Video resolution is up to 1080p, and audio up to 5.1 surround sound. (Quite a large chunk of the content is in stereo, so there's a little room for improvement in this area.) If you want to access Google Play on a TV, you can connect your phone or tablet to the TV, or use Google's Chromecast streaming stick (£35). Content can be downloaded for offline viewing on Android devices, and there's still scope to watch your purchases on Apple devices using the relevant Google app. On each platform, it's easy to find your way around the neatly organised catalogue too.

Well-equipped and effectively organised, Google Play is a legitimate alternative to buying Blu-rays and DVDs. In fact, it ticks pretty much all the boxes that a video-on-demand service should.



What's special about the 7000i Series?

The answer is clearly 'Sound Quality'

Unlike its many 'Style' competitors, 7000i speakers reproduce music just as perfectly as they convey the full scale of home cinema soundtracks. This proves the overall quality of the design. Good loudspeakers accurately reproduce whatever sound is played through them. If a style speaker is incapable of accurately reproducing high quality music, then its design is fundamentally flawed. These flaws, although initially less obvious, become increasingly audible to listeners trying to enjoy and 'experience' movie soundtracks.

Best music system £400-£800 Cambridge Audio Minx Xi £600

Fancy a streaming system, but not sure if you're ready to dish out the cash for a class-leading Naim or Cyrus? This excellent Cambridge Audio Minx Xi is just the solution for you. It's an impressive package, offering myriad streaming features and the kind of insightful yet musical performance that's difficult to achieve for £600.

Width, height and depth

Down to business, and the Minx charges through alt-J's dreamy dub-pop tunes with a lively, sure-footed sense of rhythm. Instruments are easily identifiable and placed inside an airy soundstage that's as wide as it is tall and deep. Dynamic upheavals are handled with ease. There are no hard edges, and plenty of dynamic headroom.

The subtle harmonics and vocals inflections in *Fitzpleasure* are beautifully conveyed. There's texture to the synthesised strums, while the ethereal sound is weighted and cohesively organised. The song flows so smoothly that you barely notice just how deep and taut the bassline is nor how crisp the sound is. The Minx Xi makes it all sound effortless. High-resolution audio files are supported up to 24-bit/96kHz. We would have preferred an upper limit of 192kHz, but it's not a deal breaker.

minx

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The Minx Xi is kitted out with a good spread of digital and analogue connections, including three USB ports. Supplied dongles give the unit aptX Bluetooth and wi-fi abilities. One of the biggest attractions of this Cambridge Audio system is that it gives you thousands of internet radio stations at your fingertips thanks to the preloaded BBC iPlayer, Rhapsody and Pandora services. Spotify playlists can be streamed from your smart device, while connected laptops and NAS devices can be played using wired or wireless methods.

This is an attractive piece of kit, too. The petite size will fit into most spaces, and we're quite taken with the sleek, glossy finish and sharply legible display.

What we love most about the Minx Xi is its ability to balance stunning levels of insight with an easy-going approach to music. Its willingness to get along with a variety of speakers comes a close second. Awarding it a Product of the Year gong was an easy decision. It's a fantastic system.

Best music system up to £400 Denon D-M39DAB £310

In a time when the wireless speakers market is exploding, the micro-system could easily be written off as obsolete.

But time and again - three years in a row now - the excellent D-M39DAB proves the micro system is still relevant, still appealing, and a great-sounding machine for the money.

The key component is the CD player. Despite the rising tide of audio files and streaming services, let's not pretend we still don't own a stack of CDs that are begging to be played. And you'll want to play them through this. It's a wonderfully musical presentation. There's a sweet and engaging way to the Denon, which zings through songs with lively, agile timing and layers of subtle detail. Its midrange fidelity in particular is commendable.

Capable when challenged

It doesn't baulk at fast, attacking tunes (Eminem's *The Way I Am*) or at far-reaching dynamics (Hans Zimmer's *Time*), and there's a good sense of scale, with instruments placed in a spacious soundfield. It never sounds overly bright, either.



You won't get any networking or Bluetooth features with the Denon, but an Apple-approved USB port in front lets you play songs and streaming services from your iPod, iPhone and iPad, and other music players can go through the 3.5mm jack.

While songs played through USB aren't quite as detailed and transparent as on CD, the Denon still treats them with respect. WAV files offer more insight than Spotify streams, but the Denon imprints its musicality over any song, regardless of file type or resolution. The DAB and FM tuners sound solid and clear, with higher-quality stations getting the upper hand.

You can buy the unit on its own and add your own speakers, but we love the system as a whole. It's a steal for £310, and no other micro-system – at any price – comes close to the Denon's value for money.

Best music system £800-£1500

The UnitiQute 2 is a tiny powerhouse of a system. Its half-width design, streaming prowess and sonic ability won us over last year, and there's still no rival to its claim as the music streaming system of choice at this price.

Even by today's standards, the Naim UnitiQute 2 has a modern look about it. The impeccable finish, the uncluttered fascia, the high-contrast OLED display - it all combines to produce a very smart-looking machine.

Underneath the neat chassis lie the twin beating hearts of the UnitiQute 2: a 30W-perchannel amplifier derived from the superb Nait 5i, and a 24-bit/192kHz Burr Brown DAC that handles music in all popular file formats, including WAV, FLAC, ALAC, MP3 and Windows Media files.

Options galore

The unit is DLNA certified, too, so you can easily stream music stored on a PC, Mac or NAS device either wirelessly or via ethernet. Connectivity is exhaustive, including five digital inputs that can handle hi-res audio, a pair of RCA inputs, a 3.5mm/optical hybrid, and a USB port for plugging in iPods. DAB+, DAB and FM tuners, and the excellent vTuner internet radio service are also provided.

Naim UnitiQute 2 £1195

Its looks belie the sheer power, scale and insight it can achieve. The UQ2 is astonishingly transparent and revealing sometimes unforgivingly so and delivers an open and weighted sound. Whether you're playing Shostakovich, Shakira or The Smashing Pumpkins, the stop and start of notes are dealt with unerring precision, the rhythm is fast and nimble, and detail retrieval is nothing short of exceptional.

Voices are loaded with character. Subtle intonations are laid bare, while emotion and attitude are delivered unflinchingly. Instruments are accurately placed, and songs of all resolutions are marshalled with exquisite control and cohesion.

Its looks belie the sheer power, scale and insight it can achieve. The **Naim UnitiQute 2** is astonishingly revealing and delivers an open, weighted sound It's an enthralling listen, with songs sweeping around a vast, airy soundstage with effortless dynamic reach. The system can go extremely loud without faltering or sounding laboured when driven hard. Basslines are satisfying deep, taut and laden with texture, while the treble reaches sweet, clear highs.

There are few rivals that can compete against such an accomplished system, so if you've got the budget for it, the Naim UQ2 is worth consideration. Add a pair of great speakers, and you've got a mighty powerful music system.

Best music system £1500+ Cyrus Lyric 09 £3000

Allowing for analogue

Despite the Lyric's flair for digital, analogue connections aren't forgotten, with a stereo input and output included.

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The Cyrus Lyric 09 made quite the splash when we first reviewed it. Its looks - a far cry from the aluminium half-width chassis that has remained a design staple for the marque since 1984 - are, well, different. The angular shape, the glowing CD slot, and the touchscreen display all mark this out as something unusual.

The looks here might divide opinion, but it's admirable to see a company take a risk and try something different. On the performance side, Cyrus has remained true to its heritage. A stunningly precise, enthusiastic and agile sound bursts from the Lyric O9. It's the sound we all know and love from Cyrus, with added muscle.

High-quality treatment for all

There's a fabulous amount of detail on board. Feed it hi-res audio and the Lyric lavishes you with the extra resolution - it's an extremely confident and subtle player. It's not a sonic snob, either. The Cyrus delivers Spotify streams with as much diligence as it would a 24-bit/192kHz FLAC file, managing to pick out subtle edges of notes, with a clean and precise sound that is usually unheard over Bluetooth.

From the *Inception* soundtrack to Adele's ballads, the Lyric shows off its remarkable dynamic reach. The sense of scale is awe-

inspiring and it handles sudden shifts from loud to quiet with ease and authority. It sounds utterly gorgeous.

As befits its price tag, the Lyric is laden with extensive features. A built in 24-bit/192kHz DAC can be accessed by the USB, coaxial and optical inputs. The Lyric supports a large variety of

It's the sound we all know and love from Cyrus, but with added muscle formats, from hi-res WAV, FLAC and AIFF files to the more humble MP3s. If you have songs stored on a NAS device or laptop, you can stream them over your home network using wireless or wired means. Bluetooth is of the higher quality aptX quality, and a vast number of radio stations are in your grasp thanks to DAB and FM tuners and TuneIn internet radio.

All-in-one systems tend to come with a caveat or two. But in the Lyric's stunning performance we found none. Yes, £3000 is a lot to pay, but when something is this good, it's worth it.

Best cinema system Sony BDV-N5200W £500

You may not think £500 is enough to build up a home cinema system from scratch, but you haven't reckoned with Sony. The BDV-N5200W is a fantastic all-in-one system that has more goodies than a Christmas stocking.

Including a Blu-ray player, multichannel amplifier, five speakers, a wireless subwoofer and all the latest smart features you can think of, this neat and stylish package is your ticket to bringing the cinema into your home without breaking the bank.

Play the Blu-ray of *The Amazing Spider-Man 2* and the DTS-HD Master Audio soundtrack zings across the 5.1 channel system with a remarkable amount of precision and authority. The sound is crystal clear, and oozes subtle detail. There's plenty of excitement as special effects - Spidey's web-slinging across Midtown skyscrapers, Electro's crackling electricity - are steered across the five speakers with lively timing. It's a captivating listen.

Always engaging

Dynamics are free to soar in an open and wide soundfield, and it's a testament to the Sony's sonic skill that it all sounds interesting even at low volumes. Part of this is because dialogue is fiercely crisp and expressive - you'll never get bored watching films with this Sony system. Explosions are packed with punch and attack, and the talented subwoofer sets the weighty, rumbling foundation.

We know how good Sony Blu-ray players can be, and this one does its lineage proud by delivering a beautifully punchy, clean and richly detailed picture. Colours are vibrant while maintaining a natural tone, and motion is stable.

Wired and wireless connections open up a world of on-demand video and music streaming from smart apps such as BBCiPlayer, Netflix, Demand 5 and Amazon Instant. Bluetooth, NFC and DLNA certification mean that you can stream music from laptops, smartphones and NAS devices

There's plenty of excitement with the **Sony BDV-N5200W** as special effects are steered across the five speakers with lively timing. It's a captivating listen



over your home network. Connections are plentiful, and the Sony also supports the rarer DSD and SACD formats alongside the more regular 3D Blu-rays, DVDs and CDs.

You'll need a dedicated hi-fi system for seriously cohesive and musical results, but streamed tracks and music Blu-rays still sound enveloping and powerfully cinematic.

We can't think of a tidier system. The Sony does it all, and does it so brilliantly and effortlessly that we're eager to fork out £500.

They might seem to be incidental players in any musical performance, but these sonic extras can make all the difference to your system's sound

Best Bluetooth receiver Arcam miniBlink £90

For a wallet-friendly £90, this aptX-supporting Bluetooth receiver makes the idea of a wireless set-up all the more tempting.

The small, compact unit is shaped like a well-polished pebble, featuring only a round Bluetooth button (press and hold for easy pairing) and single 3.5mm output. Though the device's limited connections may seem a little mean to those expecting digital outputs to feed into an amplifier or external DAC, performance through the supplied 3.5mm-to-RCA phono cable is surprisingly good.

Unusually smooth

Where some Bluetooth receivers sound prickly and bright, the miniBlink has a smooth, insightful and rhythmical temperament. It's impressive that Arcam has managed to squeeze such a sense of refinement and quality from a device like this.

The 'Blink doesn't leave much to the imagination, faithfully laying bare the percussive and vocal details in The Knife's *Pass This On*. There's texture and variation to steel drums – a decent amount of reverb is clear too – and vocals quiver, while musical oddities abound.

You get a real feel for dynamic shifts within music: huge leaps from quiet moments to more outlandish sections are explicitly done, and music sounds all the more exciting for it.

This sound quality doesn't come easy to products like this, which makes the miniBlink's abilities all the more special.

Our reference system sounds transparent and beautifully balanced - treble notes are clear but never teeter on brightness, and bass has depth and control. After taking the crown from Chord last year, the Atlas Element Integra proves it's still well ahead of the competition.

A nicely made cable with sturdy plastic plugs, it slips nicely into our reference system to facilitate a well balanced and rhythmic performance. The system's presentation has plenty of detail and there's equilibrium across the frequencies; vocals have a nice parity between solidity and transparency. It's a musical sound, too, showing impeccable timing with Wyclef Jean's *80 Bars*. The soundstage is pleasingly wide and there's good dynamic range. The Integra isn't cheap, but it's worth it.

Rega continues its dominance over this category for the third year running. Last year's Award-winner remains an affordable go-to product for vinyl lovers thanks to its big, authoritative and punchy sound.

A wide-open soundstage gets the best from sparse, vocal-driven recordings, and its

Best equipment rack

Atacama Evoque Eco 60-40 £450

It wins kudos on design alone - the 40mm bamboo shelves and glossy-black legs provide a striking and handsome look - but the latest rack from Atacama is not just a pretty unit.

It helps provide great performance, too: the Eco allows our Cyrus CDi/ Roksan Caspian M2 reference system to sound solid, expressive, hugely entertaining and full of attack. Basslines are punchy, high notes are clear and open, and vocals are delivered with subtlety.

It's customizable, too. You can add extra shelves for £150 each and choose from natural, medium or dark finishes. It's available with various leg lengths too.

Best speaker stand Atacama Moseco 6 £120

Atacama does the double. Knocking the three-time winner Custom Design FS104 Signatures off top spot, the Moseco 6s help our system sound rich, musical and dynamic.

Our reference ATC SCM 11 standmounts blossom with punch, detail and rhythm. There's texture in basslines, twang in guitars, and insightful, if slightly forward, vocals. This kind of performance normally costs a sight more than the £120 these Atacamas will set you back.

The two metal poles and substantial bamboo base that make up each stand make for smart and sturdy support, with darker finishes and colours available for a small premium.

Two enduring greats plus a return to the top for a legendary disc-spinning marque – the choice of premium hardware for CD lovers is as good as ever

Best CD player £500-£1500 Cyrus CDi £1050

For years Cyrus seemed like a permanent fixture in our CD player Awards, yet in 2013 it missed out altogether thanks to the brilliance of Naim's CD5si. The company's answer was the introduction of the CDi, and what a response it has turned out to be.

The CDi replaces both the CD6 SE2 and CD8 SE2 players, falling between them in price but eclipsing both in performance. As is usual with Cyrus's products you'd never guess from the outside that this was a new model. The casework retains the company's classic half-width design, leaving the CDi looking like any of its slot-loading predecessors.

But take a look inside and it is clear much has changed. Cyrus has continued to develop its in-house transport mechanism and the software behind it. The company is particularly proud of the transport's ability to read the data off the disc correctly the first time rather than relying on error correction to fill in the gaps.

The CDi's other technical highlight is an upgraded DAC section that now uses a new 32-bit design. The aim, as always, is to improve resolution and dynamics while keeping noise and distortion as low as possible.

Around the back of the player are two pairs of single-ended analogue outputs and the traditional digital duo of optical and coaxial. There's also a connection for the £500 outboard PSX-R power supply (see roundel).

In true Cyrus tradition this player puts detail resolution, agility and dynamic expression above all else. We certainly haven't come across a more insightful performer below the £1500 mark.

Speed, punch and resolution

Take a listen to Stravinsky's *The Rite Of Spring* and the CDi puts on an exhilarating show. The music's savage dynamics are delivered with breathtaking speed and punch, and the level of resolution is top-class. We know few players, even at double this price, that deliver as much in the way of detail and precision. There's class-leading composure too, with the player keeping a firm hold of low-level instruments even when the piece becomes demanding. This stability is deeply impressive.

Cyrus players have tended to edge towards leanness in their tonal balance, and the CDi still shows a little of that trait. Avoid overly bright or aggressive partnering kit and the player's innate refinement is enough to avoid any issues.

We ended our *First Test* of the CDi by suggesting that Naim's CD5si had plenty to fear. With hindsight it really did. The CDi is the best player we have heard anywhere near this price this year – and for that it grabs the Product of the Year title for 2014.

Best CD player under £500 Marantz CD6005 £280

Marantz has made something of a habit of winning our budget CD player award. This is the second time the CD6005 has won this category, and that accolade follows years of domination by its predecessors. A £70 price drop from last year doesn't hurt its case either.

An aura of class

As with all of Marantz's best budget offerings, the CD6005 is a superbly judged product. It's beautifully built for starters; there's a solidity and aura of class around this player that no rival we've come across can better. It comes down to sturdy casework, lovely finish and a slick precision to the way the controls work. Even the remote control is classier than the norm at this level. All this would count for nothing if the player didn't perform but, of course, it does - rather well.

The CD6005's sonic presentation marries refinement and drama superbly. There's an element of deliberate smoothing of rough edges here, which makes a lot of sense in this part of the market. Many budget amplifiers and speakers are prone to aggression and hardness, particularly in the treble, so the Marantz's tailored balance helps counter that.



However, this civility doesn't go too far. Any recording that should excite still does, and that quality is vital.

The CD6005 is a design with plenty of sonic stretch, which is good news for those who love

The **Marantz CD6005** is a player that will continue to shine long after you've upgraded the rest of your system. It's a pleasure to use and even better to listen to to upgrade. As you'd expect, it will shine with similarly priced partnering equipment. The company's PM6005 is the obvious amplification partner and we like what Dali's lively Zensor 3s do at the end of this pairing.

But move up to the realms of Arcam's A19 with B&W's 685S 2s, and the Marantz CD player is more than up to taking the extra scrutiny. In such a set-up this player sounds right at home.

This is a player that will continue to shine long after you've upgraded the rest of your system. It's a pleasure to use and even better to listen to. If you're looking for the best budget CD player on the market, look no further.

You can add strong rhythmic ability and stable soundstaging to this player's list of talents too. Build quality is everything we'd

expect at this level - solid, well finished and damped - and the controls work with positive precision. It takes a gifted product to win one

of our Awards just once. To win one of our Awards just once. To win it five consecutive years means the Caspian M2 is exceptional. Buy with confidence.

You'd think we'd get bored of recommending the Caspian M2 CD player by now. This is the fifth consecutive year this masterful player has won our premium CD-player category, which is a stupendous achievement.

That's five years in which none of the competition has managed to come up with a similarly priced player that we prefer. Some have more features, but, when it comes to all-round talent, nothing has come close to worrying the Caspian.

This Roksan doesn't feature digital inputs nor does it stream music from an iDevice as the Marantz CD6005 does. What it does do, however, is play CDs brilliantly.

Expanding functionality

Today's 'simple' radios are aping the features of larger kit, with many offering LAN streaming, Spotify Connect and more

Best radio £100-£200

Roberts Stream 93i £150

The Roberts Stream 93i is beautifully put together – a well-engineered product, with substantial weight to back up its desk/counter-top size.

And you certainly get your money's worth. This is an FM/DAB/internet radio that will also act as a music player, accessing your digital music over a local area network (LAN). You can do this via the wired ethernet socket or the built-in wi-fi. A USB port allows you to play music direct from a memory stick if you don't have LAN capabilities. And, in a final impressive flourish, the 93i also has Spotify Connect built in, so you can use your smartphone or tablet (via wi-fi) to remotely control your Spotify music.

Set-up is simple - a 'wizard' holds your hand through the whole process of accessing your network, scanning the airwaves for signals and generally getting you up and running.

Sound that lives up to the promise

And we're very happy to report that all our good impressions and the comprehensive specification are backed up by an extremely impressive performance. This radio sounds really good.

Roberts has managed to combine a clear midrange (imperative for voice radio) with bright - not sharp - treble, and surprisingly powerful bass.It's the bass that impresses most, with precise low notes going surprisingly deep for such a relatively small box. Often when a smallish unit has strong bass, other parts of the frequency range can suffer, but with the 93i everything blends to make for a really enjoyable listen.

Radio reception, whether via the internet, DAB or FM is exemplary. The music player uses UPnP, and it found our Naim UnitiServe almost before we'd started looking for it. It won't play high-res files, but can handle MP3, WMA, AAC, FLAC and WAV. The sound matches the tuners' impressive standards.

Spotify Connect is a winner too. With your mobile device on the same network as the 93i, your Spotify playlists are accessible via the radio. The sound quality though, while acceptable, can't match the radio performance.

This Roberts is a really fine machine. It covers all bases for radio and adds useful features in the form of the music player and Spotify Connect. Most important of all, it sounds excellent for a unit of this size.

This bargain of a radio won our 'Up to £100' Best Buy gong last year, and it has retained its place at the top for 2014. It's no great surprise, when you consider the quality you're getting.

The D2 is a nicely put-together unit. The tuners are effective, finding most stations without fuss and then sticking to them with a cast-iron grasp. There are 20 presets available, 10 each for FM and DAB. Three are easily accessible via the buttons numbered one to three alongside the display; the other seven once you have pressed the '4+' button and then chosen via the select knob. That's a little unusual, perhaps, but it's perfectly intuitive once you get used to it – and it keeps fascia clutter down.

As well as the radio tuners, the Evoke D2 has an auxiliary input to accommodate an external source, plus an alarm with a variety of functions

and a sleep timer. For what it's worth, we think it looks good too.

The Evoke D2 sounds excellent for a sub-£100 radio. It's incredibly detailed, excelling with voices and allowing rich mid-tones to come to the fore. It doesn't overdo it though, and maintains a natural balance across the frequency range. Bass is fast and taut without being overbearing or too prominent, and higher notes ring clear without ever becoming brassy at higher volumes.

On which note, it must be said that this radio doesn't go quite as loud as some rivals. It's perfectly fine for normal listening in the bedroom or kitchen, but don't expect it to fill a large, busy room with sound.

Increasing portability

We would seriously consider investing in a ChargePak - Pure's rechargeable battery pack - as well (another £28). That would make the radio really portable for alfresco listening.

The Evoke D2 sounds balanced and easy to listen to across a wide range of programming,



whether over FM, DAB or via the aux input. Add the Pure's value and ample feature count, and it does more than enough to retain its place as our budget radio Best Buy.

TVs have evolved in the past decade or two into smarter, more complex machines - and the same can be said for the radio.

Take the Revo SuperConnect. Not content with the standard issue FM and DAB, the Revo has lots of extra features and functionality.

Hook it up to your home network (via wi-fi) and you can access the varied world of internet radio. DLNA certification means the radio can also access music stored on a Mac, PC or NAS (Network Attached Storage) device over your network. And tunes stored on a smartphone or tablet can be played via Bluetooth (aptX Bluetooth is supported).

There's more: the Revo is one of the first radios to offer Spotify Connect, so if you have a Premium subscription you can control and play tracks from your account.

We're fans of the Revo's modern-with-a-dashof-retro looks. The 2.7 in OLED display and aluminium front panel contrast nicely with the cabinet's walnut veneer.

> The display shows menus and track information. The Revo makes good use of screen space, showing relevant info for radio stations and songs (including bitrate and music format).

Control is via a small joystick - it takes a little while to get used to, but the radio is quick to respond and it makes light work of the set-up menus.

Supplementing the joystick controller is the remote control. This isn't the usual credit cardsized handset - it's pretty big, and great to use. The **Revo SuperConnect** is one of the first radios to offer Spotify Connect, so if you have a Premium subscription you can play tracks from your account

Behind the grille, you can just about make out the Revo's single 3.5in BMR (Balanced Mode Radiator) driver, powered by a 15W amp.

On paper, that doesn't seem like a recipe for power, but this radio kicks out an impressively weighty sound. There's no trace of harshness or brightness, and you will hear good-quality sound no matter the source. The way the SuperConnect handles voices, in particular, lends itself well to dialogue-heavy radio and podcasts.

Rich pickings

Bass sounds richer and fuller than we've heard from rivals - and if it's too full for your taste, you can turn it down easily using the tone settings.

Not many radios we review manage to impress on so many fronts. Design, ease of use and sound quality - the Revo has it all. Super by name, super by nature - and a clear Best Buy.

Sky hasn't changed much over the past year, but that's no bad thing, because it's a service we know and love. From apps, to content, to the box itself, the Sky service is better than ever, and still pips rivals in our affections, thanks to a wealth of content - including HD - and a class-leading user experience.

The latest box comes with built-in wi-fi, making it easier to access Sky's on-demand TV content and catch-up TV services such as BBC iPlayer. Naturally, we'd go for the top-spec, 2TB model, which is ideal for stockpiling TV programmes and films for a rainy day.

The unit itself costs £250, but you can get it from £150 if you add a channel pack. The storage is divided: 400GB is for On Demand content and operating system, but 1.5TB is entirely yours to fill with whatever you want to record.

What's 1.5TB in recording terms? Well, only 350 hours of HD content, or 1180 hours in standard definition. The days of deleting content to make space aren't quite over, but consider them significantly delayed. Go ahead and download that TV box set.

The On Demand (formerly Anytime) service has a fresh interface, dividing a plethora of HD and SD programming into tabs of content. Showcase takes you straight to the latest shows and films, plucked from both the TV Guide and Sky Store downloads. You'll also find a Catch Up section that's as comprehensive as any. It includes BBC iPlayer, ITV Player, 40D, Demand 5 as well as a heap of on-demand content from Sky's own channels and others.

As ever, the box delivers excellent picture and sound quality. The 1080i HD pictures are crisp and vibrant, while standard-definition content is clean and stable. Compatible broadcasts are accompanied by decent 5.1 surround sound, which can be delivered over HDMI – no need to faff about with digital optical cables.

Sky's latest doesn't need to change: it's marvellous just as it is. And that's why it deserves yet another Award.

Sometimes, someone will throw out something perfectly good in the name of change and progress. That's not always a good thing. That's why we're quite glad Humax hasn't done that.

The company has gone for a liberal sprinkling of improvements, rather than a total overhaul. This year's DTR-T2000 is not a massive departure from last year's Award-winning DTR-T1010, but it's certainly better.

The obvious stuff starts with the design. It's smaller. The power supply is now an external block, keeping the device cooler - which means no noisy fan. It's also a stronger box, made primarily of metal rather than plastic.

Less self-evident are the improvements to operation. Button presses are a lot more responsive, so the overall experience feels faster. No longer do you have to press keys in frustration and wait as the system catches up. Menus are much zippier too, with lag dramatically reduced.

If it ain't broke...

That, though, is where the key differences end. Not that this matters, because last year's offering was a corker, and that remains the case here. If you want Youview, this is how you should get it.



Youview is like Freeview on steroids. It's a free service that gives you access to more than 70 TV and radio channels, which you can pause, rewind and record using the 500GB of storage.

There's also all manner of web-based fun. The box uses your broadband to get content from the major catch-up services. These are integrated with the electronic guide, which lets

The **Humax DTR-T2000** uses broadband to access the catch-up services. These are integrated with the electronic guide, which lets you scroll back by seven days you scroll back by seven days. Browse, pick something you missed, and the appropriate catch-up service will load.

The main catch-up services are present: BBC iPlayer, iTV Player, 4 on Demand and Demand 5. There's also Sky's Now TV, Sky Store, Milkshake! (for kids), S4C (in Wales), STV (in Scotland) and UKTV (content from Dave, Really and Yesterday).

Standard and HD picture quality are both great: pictures are clean and detailed, with decent motion handling and sharply drawn edges. Twin tuners means you can record one channel and watch another at the same time, or record two channels together. Once you taste the magic of Youview, you'll never turn back. This box, better than ever, is the way to go.

Spend a lot more The Imaging Science Foundation trains TV dealers to calibrate TV to professional standards, and for the not-inconsiderable sum of £250 they'll visit your home and make sure you're getting the very best from your TV. If fine-tuning is your thing, it doesn't get better than this.

Setting up your subwoofer

Positioning counts

Place your sub where you usually sit, connect it, and then disconnect your speakers (at the amp end). Play music with good bass and then walk around the room, listening to the low frequencies. You'll hear lifts in several places,

caused by the interaction of the bass notes and your room's acoustics. These are 'nodes' and your sub will go in one of these locations.

Less can mean more

Don't turn the volume up too much on your sub, it's a common failing we hear. Bass should underpin your sound and contribute where appropriate - but not dominate.

Let music help you

The best way to set your sub levels is to play a piece of stereo music that you're familiar with: turn the subwoofer's

volume level up until you can just hear the bass starting to dominate a little too much - and then drop the volume back a tad. It's not a completely scientific method, but it does work and will help in finding the best way to integrate your sub.

The end for MP3?

If you own a half decent hi-fi system, using 'FLAC' instead of 'MP3' files could be music to everyone's ears

For those of us that consider themselves a music lover, albeit to different degrees, we are part of a very fortunate generation. We now have access to an ever-growing wealth of recorded music of extraordinary range and depth, effectively accumulated over the last 60 years. With the

introduction of the microgroove LP record in the early 1950's, playback quality took a quantum leap forward and this also coincided with a far higher standard of recording techniques. Although further improvements have been made over the years, this was a watershed time that first introduced hi-fi as a reality.

Listening to music has many benefits

Hi-Fi is, of course, a means to an end – the reproduction of music. Many studies over the years have shown remarkable benefits for mankind through listening to music. Making music is intrinsic to all cultures and music is often used for various therapeutic purposes because it involves using the whole brain. It is believed to improve memory and intelligence, improve physical development and coordination, reduce stress and blood pressure, and even reduce levels of pain.

We now have literally millions of recorded music tracks available to us in all genres and many different formats. One trend over recent years, however, has been to deliberately downgrade the quality in order to offer quantity. The main culprits have been MP3 and AAC formats which were designed as a low cost form of delivery when download speeds were slow and computer chip memory was expensive. Neither now applies and both formats should be consigned to history along with 78 rpm records and the 8-track cartridge. Unfortunately, such is the current market penetration of MP3 and AAC formats that many people today are listening to a considerably lower quality of music reproduction than their peers back in the 1970's.



Quality vs quantity

Let us explain. The maximum resolution from MP3 and AAC file formats, which are both highly compressed, is 320 kbps (kilobytes per second) which compares with CD quality of 1411 kbps. This means the resolution quality is less than a quarter of that provided by a standard CD. However, most MP3 or AAC files are downloaded over the internet and the most used download resolution is 128 kbps, which is around one-eleventh of CD quality. This should ring alarm bells. If you are only playing back these tracks on an iPod or mobile phone with a pair of earbuds, the quality may be irrelevant to you. But if these tracks are your primary source of music, perhaps with an iPod dock into a decent hi-fi system, you are only making a very poor quality sound louder. Information is irretrievably lost and the full dynamic range is lacking. The quality will be very poor in contrast with a full

> resolution version even if you are completely unaware of the loss you are inflicting upon yourself. This can even affect the type of music listened to as most classical recordings downloaded as an MP3 or AAC file will have so much information missing, and all the complexities of the music lost, with the end result that the recording is reduced to just the essence of a tune.

What is the future of recorded music?

There are now positive signs for the future of recorded music. Audiophiles, or hi-fi connoisseurs, have been very important to the music industry as they are generally avid music lovers who aim to maximise their enjoyment by listening to music at its best quality level, which means the play-back of great recordings through hi-end hi-fi to achieve the most outstanding results. Without

them, a main driver for quality would probably be removed from the music industry. They have always sought out quality but there is now an increasing awareness among the wider public of the serious deficiencies of the highly compressed formats. Full resolution audio streaming, as well as CD quality downloads, are already available and will surely become the eventual norm with this greater awareness of the tremendous quality benefit. Consumers will vote through their purchases and will seek out higher resolution recordings. Look at Qobuz for a new high-profile entry into this field who offer CD quality (16 bit/44.1 kHz FLAC) streaming for over 15 million tracks.

here were outboard digital-toanalogue converters before Arcam's Delta Black Box, but none that made anything like the impact of this unassuming unit.

Back in 1988, DACs were an exotic proposition, usually part of a two-box CD player combo and invariably costly.

At £250 the Arcam was a fraction of the price of other DACs, and was intended as an upgrade to existing players or as a partner to CD transports.

Black Box was an apt name. There were two switches on the front - phase and power - and a single coaxial input. Early on in production, Arcam added a little toggle switch next to the input connection. This switch allowed the Black Box to accept digital signals from sources that were wired in reverse phase: apparently a few were. which resulted in no sound unless the switch was flicked.

Unusually, the Black Box had two outputs - one at CD-player level, the other padded down to about half that to avoid overloading the amplifier input stages of the day.

CD was still new and not all amplifiers could cope with the two-volt output of this source.

Fast-forward to today's irDAC and it's obvious the audio landscape has changed notably. There are loads of inputs to accommodate everything from computers to iPhones. CD is still in the mix but augmented by the ability to play high-resolution data streams.

As different as the irDAC looks to that original Black Box, they still share a common purpose: that's to get the best sound from a digital source at a sensible price. Things change, but not so much at Arcam. it seems.

It's still a black box, perhaps, but this Arcam will accept signals from a large number of sources





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
