A smooth curve and a polished presentation

Samsung UE65H8000 | LED/LCD TV | £3300

This is our first taster of Samsung's 2014 range of TVs, and we are mostly impressed. The upmarket H8000 series was announced at the Las Vegas Consumer Electronics Show in January, and we've been waiting impatiently for the first production samples. If this 65in set is representative of this range's talents (48in and 55in screens sizes are also available) then Samsung is on good form.

The big news is that the H8000 features a curved screen. Last year we reviewed a couple of curved TVs - one from Samsung and the other from LG - and both sported OLED panels. This year, Samsung's gone back to LCD panels (using edge-LEDs to supply the backlighting), and is not necessarily the worse for it.

We're still undecided about the merits of a curved panel. We can see the attraction for a single viewer who sits straight in front of the screen. Such a person will enjoy a more immersive picture that's as sharp and crisp at the edges as it is in the middle. And let's not underestimate the high-tech brownie points earned by owning something as different at this. Even so, if you buy one of these, be prepared to discuss the merits or otherwise of the curved screen with just about every visitor.

It's all about the angle

Are there any downsides to the curved screen? If you're viewing at an angle, the proportions of the image distort according to how far along the curve you look. This effect won't be massively off-putting to most people, but is acknowledged by the TV manufacturers enough for them to demonstrate at shows sets with bendable screens that adjust for curvature.

When you get past the curved shape, you're left

with a well-featured 65in Full HD set. Those expecting a 4K or OLED panel in such an upmarket set are in for a disappointment. It seems that production difficulties and the associated costs have forced Samsung to put OLED technology on the back burner for a while, at least for the mass market.

The omission of 4K is more of an issue for us. Admittedly the bandwagon of this higher-resolution technology has only just started rolling, and there's quite a way to go before we would consider 4K ability essential in every TV. But a high-end model such as this should be adequately future-proofed. We don't think the UE65H8000 is. Our view is cemented by the knowledge that the company has 65in 4K-capable models available at around £4000 while Sony has alternatives at around £3500 (see p20). We would expect these prices to drop over time too.

A master of the black arts

We start our viewing with a Blu-ray of *Jack Reacher*. This is a somewhat murky film with a touch of (intentional) grain to the image, and the H8000 copes well. Over recent years Samsung has shown itself to be a master of delivering deep blacks with its LCD sets and this TV is no different - it's properly dark, and more akin to what we're used to seeing with a good plasma panel.

More than that, this Samsung is capable of revealing fine detail in shadows, rather than lose it all in a uniform darkness as some rivals do. Try to catch it out with scenes that combine bright and dark elements in one frame and it responds well. There's enough punch in whites to satisfy, but

perhaps less than we're used to from the brand. It seems Samsung has taken a step back

> from its traditional full-throttle approach to delivering contrasts and colours, taking a more mature, subtler route.

The result is a natural presentation with a convincing colour palette. Difficult-to-render features such as skin tones are nicely handled, and even vivid-colour scenes from the London Olympics opening ceremony come through with plenty of sparkle. There's a lot of insight here, and a real sign of progress for Samsung.

Motion is well handled, even in busy scenes, and it's impressive how this set stays composed and avoids the overly processed feel some rivals still impart.

Things aren't quite flawless though. In very dark scenes there's some unevenness in the backlighting. It's not enough to spoil things, but it's worse than we've come to expect from Samsung. We hope this isn't a sign that the company is allowing build quality standards to drop.

Quality in depth with 3D

The UE65H8000 comes with two pairs of active glasses. They are light and relatively comfortable. We load our current favourite 3D film, *Gravity*, and enjoy what we see. This TV is hugely accomplished when fed with properly produced 3D source material such as this. The image remains stable, only really showing signs of struggling in complex scenes such as the initial debris hit at the start of the film.

The depth of the image impresses us, and we like the nicely rounded way this set draws people and objects. It's a long way ahead of the layered 2D effect we still see from many alternatives.

It stays bright too, despite the usual dimming effect that 3D replay suffers from. The overall level of detail is impressive as is the TV's understated way of delivering it.

We move on to a DVD of *Stoker* and the UE65H8000 continues to please. The picture is surprisingly free of noise (considering the upscaling involved) and is crisply detailed. The set's well-balanced

Samsung has long been at the cutting edge as far as smart functionality is concerned. Perhaps surprisingly, the story this year is of refinement rather than any radical change. There are some minor tweaks to make accessibility of source material from the likes of smartphones and tablets just a bit easier, and some slight reorganisation of some apps. It's all still pretty slick and easy to use, though we do wonder whether this failure to take a big step forwards leaves a gap for rivals to fill.

Samsung has been terrific in equipping its sets with catch-up services (4oD, ITV player, Demand 5) and film apps (Netflix, Wuaki.tv), and for the most part it remains so. The lack of BBC iPlayer on our review sample is a bit of a shock, but we're told it should be coming soon. Let's hope so.

YouTube and web browsing are handled reasonably well, though browsing still isn't quite slick enough for our tastes. YouTube in particular is rendered well considering the low quality of some of the video streams.

We like the multiview feature. It allows the viewer to watch two sets of content at the same time. Useful

Samsung has made notable improvements in the sound quality of its TVs over the past few years and that continues with the UE65H8000. It uses downward-firing speakers for the left and right channels helped out by a subwoofer. There's 40W of power amplification driving the three channels.

The sound is perfectly listenable, although naturally you will get a significant improvement with a good soundbar or home cinema system. It has decent detail and refinement enough to not sound aggressive even at high volume.

Minimal and traditional

The UE65H8000 comes with two remote handsets. There's a well-laid out traditional wand with a full array of buttons, and a redesigned, more minimalist one. We like the look of this pebble remote, but it doesn't feel that classy in use. In the end we go back to the standard alternative, finding it more intuitive. Gesture control is still available, but we still haven't warmed to it.



It's not difficult to argue that, without 4K technology, the UE65H8OOO will soon look dated. If it does, it won't be for want of new smart functionality.

Take a look around the back and you will find a space for what Samsung calls an Evolution Kit. This kit allows the processing and smart functionality of the set to be upgraded in years to come. The company has already started supplying suitable modules for older models (at around £200 a pop), so there's reason to be confident that this screen will benefit similarly when the time comes.

As you'd expect, there is no shortage of connections here. There are four HDMIs, three USBs and the ability to connect to your home network, both wired and wirelessly. We always recommend a wired hook-up because it's a more stable connection. Legacy analogue video inputs such as component, composite and Scart are also included.

The TV is easy to set-up. The menus are relatively unchanged from last year and are none the worse for that. They're laid out simply and for the most part are easy to

understand. It's worth playing around with the active contrast and motion modes, but by and large we tend to keep settings on low if we use them at all. And we don't need to do much tinkering to get a good picture - always a good sign.

Double up on content

We like the new multiview feature. It splits the screen to allow the viewer to watch two sets of content at the same time, so you can watch, say, a live football match while browsing the internet. Useful.

Less useful is Football Mode. No doubt trying to cash in on the World Cup starting in June, this does strange things to the picture - imagine the most hyped shop demo image you've ever seen - and unbalances the otherwise-acceptable sound.

A couple of years ago a Full HD 65in set costing just over £3000 would have been seen as a bargain. Today, we think it needs to have 4K ability to fully justify the price – even with great spec and arguably the most convincing colour palette Samsung has engineered to date. The UE65H8000 also has a curved screen of course, but while it's a great talking point we're not totally sold on that yet.

Make no mistake, the UE65H8000 is a truly accomplished performer. But in today's cut-throat market, sometimes even that isn't enough to earn a wholehearted recommendation.

REVIEWER'S NOTES... 5 THINGS ABOUT THE SAMSUNG UE65H8000

It takes two of us to unpack the H8000 and we're impressed by its style. Thankfully Samsung has had a rethink on its stand designs too. It's time to take a closer look at the build. It's good but perhaps lacks the slickness of finish we'd expect at this price. Connectivity is good though.

We start to optimise the picture and sound. Samsung's menus are logical for the most part and easy to follow. The screen looks great without much work.

The curved screen still doesn't convince us. It looks cool and would be a talking point with visitors, but it doesn't work well for a group of people in our room.

We like this set. It has beautifully balanced colours and one of the best active 3D images we've seen. Even the glasses are relatively comfortable.

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Sony HT-CT370 | Soundbar | £350

Soundbar is still a work in progress for Sony

Sony was late onto the soundbar scene, but has moved quickly. We weren't impressed by the first Sony bar we reviewed, the HT-ST3, earlier this year, so can it change our minds with the HT-CT370?

This model is based on the earlier HT-CT260 soundbar, but this time mounts a speaker diffuser on top of the drive units to help control sound dispersion. The subwoofer has also undergone tweaks to improve audio stability, and added an extra magnet for more powerful bass too.

First impressions are good. Available in black or silver, the HT-CT370 is a classy-

free iOS and Android SongPal control app come in handy here too.

We start our test with Thor: The Dark World (the HT-CT370 decodes Dolby TrueHD audio as well as DTS-HD Master Audio). There's tight integration between the soundbar and sub (the sub wirelessly and automatically connects to the main unit, so all it needs is plugging in to the mains). It isn't shy either: bass is impressively deep. If you want drama, the HT-CT370 offers plenty.

looking, compact soundbar. It's diamondshaped in profile and has a silky cloth grille hiding its two 6cm drivers. A central LED text display is bold and easily readable. The unit lies almost flat (at just a 25-degree angle) though, so the upward-facing display can be difficult to read from afar at seated level.

The front-facing wireless sub. which also has a two-sided sloped frontage, is slim and tall - albeit deep - making it fairly easy to accommodate. We propped it up near our TV stand, although it lay happily horizontally underneath the TV too.

A good selection of connections

Set-up is easy. With 3.5mm, optical and three HDMI inputs, as well as an HDMI output, you're spoiled for choice with connections. Bluetooth with near-field connectivity (NFC) makes wireless streaming possible with the press of a button too. Buttons on top of the unit can initiate Bluetooth pairing, as well as flick between sources, power on/off and control volume.

supplied remote control, though. It's orderly, with a neat bottom section of buttons dedicated to Bluetooth controls. It can double as your TV controller as well, if you have a Sony set. Alternatively, Sony's

settings: 'Music' gives an even sound and adds body to the midrange, while 'Gaming' boosts treble. 'Night' flattens dynamics so you don't annoy the neighbours. 'P.Audio' (or 'Portable Audio') is our favourite, though, as it delivers the most convincing balance.

Sony incorporates its own 'surround' technology, designed to expand the soundfield. It works well enough, but it just doesn't have the room-filling ability of the similarly priced Yamaha YSP-1400. It also has a hard, thin delivery. A treble-edged sound may make action scenes intense and dramatic, but it isn't easy on the ears. We pine for a fuller

sound with more warmth, solidity and subtlety. When we spin Toy Story 3, the familiar voices are clear and direct, but lack warmth and weight behind them, as well as the subtlety needed to bring out their different nuances.

Thinness manifests itself

We play Jamiroquai's Virtual Insanity over Bluetooth and that thinness manifests itself again: cymbals are bright and the drums have a sharp edge. It's not offensive on the ear, but you want more from your music.

Sony's design and features lay a good foundation for a promising mid-price soundbar, but its performance lets the HT-CT370 down. An improvement on the previous Sony soundbar, then, but it still leaves us wanting more.

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Oppo PM-1 | Headphones | £1100

Oppo stuns with hi-fi cans

We must admit to being baffled by Oppo's product range. The company is best known for its high-end Blu-ray players, but then it joined the mobile phone market. And now we have the PM-1 planar magnetic headphones. If there's a market strategy, we can't tell what it is.

The PM-1s are high-end cans aimed at properly dedicated audiophiles, but can any pair of headphones justify spending over £1000? By the time we're done listening, our answer is an effusive 'yes'.

First, though, a word on planar magnetic technology. A planar magnetic driver has a diaphragm printed with a conductor and held between magnets. The magnetic field generated as the music signal passes through the conductor reacts to the field generated by the magnets, causing the diaphragm to move. The idea is to offer greater accuracy and minimise distortion.

Inside story

The PM-1's 395g weight and denim carry-pouch suggest Oppo really wants you to wear them outside. We're not entirely sure why. These cans are open-backed and unashamedly leaky. People can hear you, and you can hear them. It's the latter that concerns us the most: the sound is too good to be polluted by a bus.

The PM-1s are a just a lovely listen. Their demeanour is so smooth and welcoming that we could (and did) listen for hours. What strikes us immediately is the sense of scale. It's huge - spacious and airy. Music doesn't sound like it's stuck between vour ears, but rather floating around your head with a satisfying, impressive dimensionality.

Tonally the sound is nicely balanced and there's also an extraordinary level of detail. Layer upon layer are revealed, and we hear new things we've never spotted before, even on some of our most beaten tracks.

The art of discernment

It's not hard to point out the differences between a CD of The Dark Knight Rises soundtrack and its 24-bit/192kHz counterpart. The latter clearly offers more detail, scale and emotional impact.

Use a low-quality recording and you will hear its shortcomings. But these headphones won't make a meal out of a recording's flaws. An MP3 of The Flaming Lips' Race For The Prize often sounds downright harsh, but not here.

Don't take that to mean they're toothless, because they can pack one hell of a punch. It's rare to get bass this good on a pair of headphones.

It's taken a lot of restraint not to discuss the physical side of the PM-1s until this point in the review. They are gorgeous

headphones, lavished with attention to detail. Super-soft lambskin leather (or velour, if you prefer) covers the headband and removable ear pads. Build quality and comfort are exemplary.

We're still surprised Oppo has turned its hand to headphones - but the bigger surprise is just how great they sound. The PM-1s are a resounding success. Yes, £1100 is a lot to spend, but given the right partnering equipment - no smartphones, for heaven's sake - we think they're worth it.

The DMP-BDT260 is our first look at Panasonic's 2014 Blu-ray player range. A middle-sitter in the six-strong line-up, it's sandwiched between the bottom-of-therange DMP-BD81 (£80) and flagship DMP-BDT700 (£550).

Panasonic had an outstanding run with Blu-ray players last year, totting up its five-star credentials and establishing a rivalry with Sony. So will its new range keep up the good track record? If the BDT260 is anything to go by, the answer is 'yes'.

Far from lost in space

Put on *After Earth* and it's clear we have another sterling performer on our hands. In the very first scenes, pictures in space show impressive contrast: stars look bright against the deep black canvas, and big white spaceships look striking.

Motion is smooth and judder-free as spaceships cruise along, managing to remain stable during the jerky movements when the ship loses control.

Fine detail is the Pana's forte too, digging up texture in the characters' rubbery bodysuits and conveying subtleties in facial expressions. Rich and punchy colours are instantly arresting. Greens in the wildlife are lush and bloody carcasses are bright red. There's a tinge of oversaturation to the lustrous colour palette, but we like its ability to make content eye-catching.

Skin tones remain well-judged though, rendering natural complexions and realistic shadows on faces.

Clean cars and vibrant wizards

Switch Blu-ray discs to *Rush* and clean whites on the car's bodypaint offset oily blacks on tyres. There's good texture on the latter, and that sense of wear on the seatbelts shows it's really paying attention to detail.

Like the others in Panasonic's new range (bar the BD81), the BDT260 supports 3D. Load *Harry Potter and the Deathly Hallows Part 1* Blu-ray and it's every bit as impressive. The picture is pin-sharp and

On this evidence there's no sign of stable, while much of the detail and rich colour balance apparent in 2D content is high standards slip present and correct.

Badly handled motion can be particularly uncomfortable in 3D, but this Panasonic takes erratic broomsticks dodging traffic and weaving in and out of one another in its stride.

Those who still have large DVD collections will be pleased: it does a fine job upscaling standard definition. With *Star Wars: Return of the Jedi*, there's radiant shine to C3-PO's gold metal body, and

The Panasonic interface is intuitive, and navigating menus is straightforward too. Getting from A to B can feel a bit longwinded, though, and requires some patience. The lack of a display is a niggle.

Panasonic doesn't offer a control app for this year's players, remaining reliant on a physical remote control. In keeping with its

impressive punch to the brick-red landscape. Compared with our award-winning Sony BDP-S5100, motion is a little smoother and the picture less prone to noise.

Sonic solidity

Panasonic hasn't rested on its laurels where sound is concerned either. As with its picture, its sound revels in richness. There's decent weight behind voices and film tracks generally sound robust. When the iconic *Star Wars* theme tune plays atop the disc menu, it sounds big and authoritative.

As well as disc-playing, you get USB playback and DLNA for accessing files from a network or compatible storage device. You'll need an internet connection for the latter, which can be achieved wirelessly thanks to the BDT260's built-in wi-fi. A LAN socket provides wired access.

As far as files go, it supports a throng of formats including MKV, MP4, FLAC, AAC and WAV. You'll also find the commonplace YouTube, Facebook, Netflix and catch-upon-demand apps pre-loaded on the

previous design, it's lovely to use: buttons are nicely spread and well positioned.

The BDT260 has been worth the wait. It may not be the most feature-packed player out there, but its picture and sound performance heartily make up for it. If this is indicative of the range, we can't wait to see what the rest of it has in store.

Quad 9AS | Active stereo speakers | £600

Smart active Quads show talent

Active speakers with a highresolution DAC and versatile digital connections? The Quad 9AS speakers certainly piqued our interest.

Based on the mini-monitor design of the (now discontinued) 9L active speakers, the new Ouad 9ASes house 100W of amplification and a DAC capable of playing audio files of up to 24-bit/192kHz. The active design means each speaker houses class AB amplifiers to power the drivers, hence the need for heat sinks at their base.

We start with the Game of Thrones soundtrack playing on our MacBook Pro (USB connection) and the Quad 9ASes soars with a clean and articulate sound. The King's Arrival is clear and playful, with each instrument easy to pick out in the huge and open soundfield. It's a big-scale sound, and can go loud without distortion.

Sparkle and flourish

There's space at the top end for the treble to sparkle and flourish, although it can sound hard-edged if pushed. While the 9ASes don't have too much low extension, the balance suits a desktop system nicely - they don't boom when a bassline kicks in. We'd avoid placing them too close to the wall, though, to keep that airy sound.

But for all the pristine-sounding talents, there's something lacking with the Quads. Voices are focused and expressive, but not enough to hold our attention. Switching to Daft Punk (24-bit/176.4kHz from our reference streamer via the Quad's coax input) highlights the 9ASes' lack of agility and rhythm. The beats of Get Lucky are a touch flat, and the track's sense of fun is diluted.

We play our desktop favourites, the Ruark MR1s in comparison and, while the petite speakers may not have the same insight as



the Quads, they certainly are more fun to listen to (at half the price too).

The 9ASes have a smart finish, with an uncluttered fascia, so we keep the grilles off. The build is sturdy and compact, and feels premium. The relatively compact size of the 9ASes - they're smaller than most hi-fi standmounters - is akin to the Q Acoustics Q-BT3 and Dali Kubik Free speakers. Each speaker has a new 25mm fabric-dome tweeter, and a 10cm Keylar cone mid/bass driver, and both channels have to be plugged to a power source. They're available in high-gloss white, black and ruby red, and there are optional feet to angle the speakers upwards.

Bass adjustment options

Quad provides a three-point bass equaliser to adjust the low extension depending on where you place the 9AS speakers, but we found the 'Boost' option boomy and overbearing in any position. Unsurprisingly, 'Flat' provides the most neutral response, but we prefer the 'Shelf' option for a leaner and snappier bass, especially when the 9ASes are placed on a desk. A compact remote with basic volume and input controls is included - it's simple to use, although we had to point the remote directly at the speaker for it to work; if you point from even a slight angle, it doesn't.

On the digital front, there are asynchronous USB, coaxial and optical inputs, all of which support 24-bit/192kHz resolution - an ideal combination for those who have a streamer or a laptop full of music files.

There's no Bluetooth built in, so you will have to plug your iPod, smartphone or MP3 player in to the 3.5mm input. RCA inputs for analogue sources are on the back panel, while there's a subwoofer output to create a 2.1 system, which could make the 9ASes a decent soundbar alternative.

All in all, the Quad 9ASes have a good number of plus points, but we'd like better rhythm and a sense of fun from them. Bluetooth connection would be nice, too. They need to up their game a bit to better rivals at this price.

Yamaha has a great track record with budget AV receivers, with last year's RX-V375 winning a Best Buy Award. So can the new Yamaha RX-V377 continue the success of its predecessor?

With 70W for each of the five channels (at six ohms), and 4K Ultra HD pass-through across its HDMI inputs, you'd be forgiven for thinking the RX-V377 is identical to its previous model - aside from being 10 quid more expensive. But the real difference lies (apart from a slight reordering of inputs and outputs) in its surround-sound performance. Powerful, punchy and full of detail, this RX-V377 lives up to expectations. Yamaha receivers usually excel at steering surround-sound effects across the room with precision and detail, and this receiver shows off these talents on both Blu-ray and DVD.

Play *Pacific Rim* Blu-ray and you're in a bubble of sound with such startlingly accurate and detailed placement that you're immediately sucked into the action. Integration between the speakers is seamless. It's weightier and more authoritative than the RX-V375 too, and it demands your attention, whatever the film.

In Bruges is a perfect case in point - the RX-V377 shows off its clarity and subtlety very well. This receiver comes with no fewer than 17 distinct DSP modes, and while they're fun to play around with

(Sci-Fi and Drama for movies are worth trying), we prefer the 'Straight' option.

AV receivers don't tend to be as skilled with music as with movies, and the RX-V377 is the same. However, its newfound authority gives music Blu-rays and songs played from an iPod a touch more confidence and punch than before. We're not surprised to see a few features sacrificed to keep the price in the budget category. There are no networking features on the RX-V377, meaning you can't stream wireless as there's no DLNA, AirPlay, wi-fi, or Bluetooth. Nor do you get internet radio.

Bluetooth wireless receiver

However, the RX-V377 does have built-in FM and AM tuners and there's also the option of plugging in a YBA-11 Bluetooth wireless receiver into the back panel. It will cost you around £50, but it will let you stream music from your smart device using Bluetooth.

Those with Apple devices can still play their digital tunes by plugging an iPod, iPhone or iPad into the front panel USB port (which handily also charges your device), while other music players can be plugged into the 3.5mm input. We do wish the speaker terminals were of a consistent type across the board - it's a mixture of spring clip terminals and banana plugs.

Sturdily built, relatively compact and available in black or silver, this receiver

The RX-V377 is sturdily built, relatively compact and available in black or silver

keeps things refreshingly simple. The display is large and the on-screen menu is basic but easy to use.

Yamaha's automatic calibration set-up is easy, and makes sure the receiver is tuned to suit your speakers and room acoustics. Its measurements are largely accurate, although we'd still manually check the speaker configurations (it kept registering our very large centre speaker as 'small').

Meanwhile, the remote control is a little cluttered, but once you get used to where the buttons are. it's intuitive to use.

The RX-V377 isn't revolutionary, yet Yamaha doesn't rest upon its laurels - this is a hugely capable budget receiver.

JBL Authentics L16 | Wireless speaker | £900

Elegant high-flyer falls a little flat



The wireless speaker market may be filled to the rafters, but there aren't many out there like the JBL Authentics L16.

An all-singing, all-dancing one-box system designed to cover all your entertainment needs - be it for music, TV or films - it's a multi-talented product. And at a lofty £900, a rather lone wolf in a pack of humbly priced speakers at the moment.

Jack of many trades

So what does it actually do? AirPlay ability lets you play music wirelessly from any Apple device, and DLNA compatibility digs up files over your home network. Bluetooth (aptX) is another way to go wireless, with NFC connecting your device with a mere tap on the speaker.

A 3.5mm jack provides direct connection to a device, as do a digital optical and a pair of analogue inputs. There's a phono stage to hook up a turntable. Two USB sockets allow for charging smartphones and tablets. Qienabled (wireless charging) devices can also be charged on the central pod.

If that's not enough, the L16 can double up as a soundbar. If you do plan to use it to boost your TV's sound, be aware that it's 29cm tall and 37cm deep, so slotting it under a telly might be tricky. It's heavy too - over 16kg. It's also gorgeous, complete with its walnut enclosure and striking retro grilles.

The L16 certainly goes the whole hog with connections, so it's a shame JBL doesn't supply any leads in the box. Having paid £900, we'd be miffed to have to fork out extra-

The L16 has a 25mm tweeter, 5cm pulp cone driver and 13cm woofer either side of the baffle. Each of the six drivers is powered by its own 50W amplifier. Underneath, two downfiring ports complement the drivers to help deliver more bass.

There's no remote. Sigh. Instead, the free downloadable JBL MusicFlow app lets you control volume, source and fiddle with EQ from your sofa.

The L16 also supports FLAC and WAV files up to 24-bit/96kHz.

The L16 is the first to feature Harman's Clari-Fi technology (named 'Signal Doctor') too. The company claims the software restores 90% of audio lost in digital compression by analyzing a track's audio signals and correcting waveform deficiencies. Translation: it should serve up more detail in lossy formats like MP3.

We see how it flies with an 128kbit/s MP3 of Michael Jackson's Smooth Criminal and, using the app to turn Signal Doctor on, we're pleased with the results. It benefits from the extra processing, demonstrating clearer bass and more prominent treble. Instruments We can't fault the L16's sumptuous walnut-veneer finish

and 'waffle' retro grille

have more space around them too. We'd keep that mode switched on.

If you're considering buying the L16, it will be for its big, open sound. It's convincingly room-filling and stays well poised at higher volumes. There's oodles of detail to hand too. Thumping basslines can feel fat, though, and treble can stick out too, so balance isn't its greatest asset.

Timing isn't up to speed and dynamics aren't as supple as we'd like either, making the most up-beat tunes feel static and messy. It fails to shake a leg with Quincy Jones's jolly Blues In The Night piece.

Though vocals are well focused, the Audio Pro Allroom Air One wireless speaker gave us more texture in Alison Krauss's sweet voice - and that's less than half the price.

Clarity with TV

Testing its TV-boosting qualities, we wire it to our reference Samsung TV via an optical cable. Flicking through daytime TV, newsreaders' voices come through clear with no lip-sync issues and sound effects on game shows are crisp - albeit a little bright.

The JBL Authentic L16 certainly sounds like a good idea. The problem is, £900 is a lot to fork out for any piece of hi-fi and the performance struggles to take the plaudits that compatibility and convenience do. It lacks the charisma, cohesiveness and balance we want from our music.

Sony's X9 range combines 4K resolution, a wedge design and Magnetic Fluid Speakers, and comes in 79in. 65in and 55in screen sizes. The 65in KD-65X9005B is the first Ultra 4K TV we've seen from Sony this year.

It looks and feels every bit the premium set it aims to be. Build quality and finish are excellent, and the way the top curves over the edge is an elegant touch. There's also a Skype camera discreetly built in.

A fair amount of wedge

The wedge design helps lower the screen's centre of gravity, allowing Sony to use small metal feet as support instead of the usual screen-width stand. The feet can slot in to two positions - either at each end or nearer the middle - so it should fit most racks.

Ultra HD 4K resolution is the headline act here, and the 9005B is fitted with the latest specifications to support 4K content: HDMI 2.0 standard across all four HDMI inputs, and the HEVC/H.265 decoder that enables 4K content streamed from Netflix.

Native 4K content is still thin on the ground, so Sony has provided us with a server full of demo clips and trailers. And when you fill the full 3840 x 2160 panel with native 4K content the 65in Sony

While the Sony TV is capable of streaming Netflix's 4K content (limited to House of Cards series two at the moment, Breaking Bad soon), whether you'll be able to watch in 4K will depend on your broadband speed - Netflix recommends at least 15 to 20 Mbps to stream 4K resolution.

Our test room's network isn't that capable yet (an upgrade is coming soon), but Netflix automatically downsamples content if sufficient bandwidth isn't available, so we are able to watch a House of Cards episode at 1080p, instead of its full 4K resolution. It's an impressively detailed picture for the most part, but exhibits a degree of noise and blocking on occasion.

Most of us, of course, will be watching the usual Full HD films and TV shows. along with standard Freeview broadcasts.

The Pacific Rim Blu-ray gives the 9005B plenty of upscaling work. Director Guillermo del Toro throws every shade of colour in, with bursts of yellow, red and green punctuating the overall deep blue and black sets. The 65in screen does a great job of upscaling the 1080p picture to fill the 4K resolution, with only a tiny hint of graininess (which can be smoothed out to a certain degree using noise filters).

The amount of detail and clarity is brilliant of course, but it's the colour reproduction we're wowed by. The colours are accurate and punchy

screen comes to life. The amount of detail and clarity is brilliant of course, but it's the colour reproduction we're wowed by. From pencils to exotic landscapes, the colours are as accurate as they are punchy. There's a subtlety to each shade that's really impressive, allowing a natural and realistic colour palette that doesn't attempt to overdo red fruits or blue skies in any scene.

The rich colours and contrast don't fade when viewed slightly off-axis, either - though we would have liked a touch more depth and subtlety to the black reproduction.

The edge-lit LED backlighting is just a touch uneven on our review set. It's not strong enough to be distracting when watching films or clips on screen, but it's a little disappointing to see on a premium set.

The highlights of the Sony's 4K picture remain: a crisp, detailed picture with a skill for natural colours, especially skin tones. The colours retain their realistic palette while also delivering rich textures and plenty of excitement. Freeview HD channels have a similar character.

But it's not all good news. Motion isn't as convincing as we expected, and we set the Motionflow processing to Standard to iron out the instabilities, which adds a hint of unnatural crispness to the picture. We also have to tinker to try to get black levels as deep as possible without sacrificing brightness and punch in white areas.

While we're impressed with how Blu-ray content is upscaled, we can't say the same for DVDs. Even bearing in mind



that the TV is making up 95 per cent of the picture itself, Inside Llewyn Davis on DVD is fuzzy around the edges. There's a fair degree of noise to the picture and fine details appear blurred.

We play test favourite *Life Of Pi* to test the TV's active 3D tech, and are immediately impressed: the 3D is lovely to watch. You get totally drawn in to the film, with the ocean and endless horizon providing a gorgeous and dramatic 3D depth.

We have to hand it to Sony - the KD-65X9005B sounds great, rich, detailed

and open - we don't feel an immediate need for an extra sound system during testing.

You get two remote handsets with the 65X9005B: Sony's standard remote that's dead easy to use; and a new 'One-Flick' remote with a compact touchpad design.

Thorough and intuitive smarts

The new, mature design of Sony's smart TV portal is neatly laid out in the main categories of TV, Movie, Music and Apps. It's easy to flick through each panel, where you'll find all the relevant features and apps in each category.

Also new to Sony TVs this year is the Discover feature, which gives you quick access to all your favourite and most-used channels and services, and recommends related content. Elsewhere, the Social View button on both supplied remotes activates a scrolling Twitter feed at the bottom of the TV screen. You can select a trending topic or enter your own keyword.

It's a big set, but the moveable feet mean it should fit on most stands or tables There's plenty we like about the Sony KD-65X9005B, from its stylish build to its intuitive smart features. We particularly love its natural and subtle hues of colour.

It's not quite the unequivocal success story we were expecting set, though. The uneven backlighting, limited black level and motion niggles, along with the not-so-great DVD upscaling quality, do start to add up.

This set is a stunner with 4K content, though. If you're determined to have the latest TV tech and want to be an early 4K adopter, this is a pretty good place to start.

Jabra Solemate Mini | Bluetooth speaker | £60

Solemate that's hard to fall in love with

The Jabra Solemate Mini gets its name for two reasons: one, it's the baby of the three-strong Solemate speaker family. Second, because of its grooved, trainer-inspired 'sole', which aims to prevent bass vibration from distorting its sound.

It's dinky, but don't let its size fool you, as it's a sturdy little thing - tough enough to survive a rough ride in a bag thanks to its rubber casing. It's dust- and water-resistant too, meaning it should handle all conditions.

There are three large buttons on the top face of the speaker for controlling pairing and volume, and along the right-hand side you find the microUSB charging port, 3.5mm input and power switch.

Turn it over

There's a near-field communication (NFC) spot on the left hand side for one-touch Bluetooth connectivity with compatible devices. If you turn it over you will find a handy storage spot for the included 3.5mm audio cable, snaked into its grooved base.

It connects via Bluetooth version 3.0 not the up-to-date 4.0, mind, which would improve power efficiency - but the Jabra has an eight-hour battery life, which should be ample. Pairing is simple. If you're not able to use the NFC functionality, you can do it the old fashioned way by pressing the central button on the top of the device, which also doubles as a call/answer button when using the Mini as a speakerphone.

Be prepared though, for the Jabra comes with some rather loud, and cheesy, voice commands. Fortunately, you can turn these off by holding down the 'volume down' button while turning the Jabra on. Two drivers and a single bass radiator are in charge of the sound, and do a good job at squeezing a big sound out of a small unit.

If you push it to its top volume, you lose clarity and organisation for a very raw sound. Dynamically it becomes squashed and recordings sounds messy and

unrefined, so it's a much cleaner sound and more comfortable at mid-volume.

The Jabra tends to be bass forward dishing out plenty of low-end punch with most recordings, which keeps the speaker from sounding thin or unsubstantial. The pounding drums in Florence and the Machine's Dog Days are Over hit with impressive weight for such a small speaker, but ultimately lack the refinement and control we'd like. There's a hint of radiator rattle too, most noticeable in quieter tracks.

DSP kicks in

Take your bass low, and the speaker's DSP (digital-signal processing) kicks in to stop the speaker distorting. Play Lil Wayne's AMilli and the rumbling deep bass notes heard on better speakers are almost lost. Bass fans will want to look elsewhere perhaps to the Sony SRS-X3 (page 58).

The Jabra probably sits most comfortably in the midrange, so vocal-heavy music and acoustic tracks sound good. Tori Amos's Trouble's Lament sounds clean, well balanced and listenable, if dynamically flat.



USE IT WITH

Sony Xperia

Not only is the Xperia Z2 our new favourite Android phone, it also packs NFC for easy connectivity with the Solemate Mini.

Everything sounds as though it's at the same volume, with no real difference between loud and quiet sections of a track.

We do have to remember what sort of product we're dealing with here though, and at what price tag. For the money and its size, the Jabra does a decent job. It gives the much-pricier Jawbone Mini Jambox a run for its money in the performance stakes.

But we still can't help wanting more from it. Edge the volume over midway and things start to lose clarity and organisation. The Jabra's outright volume is impressive, but it never manages to shake the restrictions of its size, always sounding like a small speaker being forced to go loud.

Spend a bit more and you can get the JBL Flip 2 (page 57) or the larger (but still portable) Cambridge Audio Minx Go. Both are markedly better. If you are on a budget, though, the Jabra is worth a look, as long as you're happy to accept its restrictions.



World Cup 2014

4K? Mobile? Online? The World Cup in tech

England have their 23-man squad; we have many ways of following them. Here's how you can...

he World Cup – like the Olympic Games, it's a major sporting event that comes around only every four years. It's a big deal for fans – and a big deal for broadcast and technology firms involved in beaming the action into our living rooms. UK rights holders – the BBC, ITV and talkSPORT – have now confirmed their plans for the tournament, so it's just a matter of waiting for it all to kick off.

The World Cup is often the catalyst for new techology (see side panel). This promises to be the first 4K World Cup and the most mobile and on-demand ever, with one in four people expected to use smartphones and tablets to watch games. So, how can you enjoy it all?

On television

The World Cup is one of the spectacles reserved in the UK for broadcast on free-to-air channels, so TV duties are shared by BBC and ITV.

The duo have already agreed how to split the group games between them, with ITV showing the opening fixture between Brazil and Croatia on 12th June, and the BBC having England's first game against Italy on 16th June.

On radio

If you'd rather listen to the action, you can listen on BBC Radio and talkSPORT, the latter

of which has signed up with Sports Yapper, a social media app for fans to talk about all the latest news.

Online, on demand

The talkSPORT/
SportsYapper
partnership shows how
this World Cup may
well be the most
interactive yet. The
BBC and ITV are also
priming their online
services. You'll be
able to catch up
with all BBC
content through

BBC iPlayer on a multitude of connected devices. And ITV promises the same, with a brand new website designed for mobile and tablet users featuring highlights, in-game clips and extra analysis.

4K forward?

You'll probably also want to know how the action will be delivered. So what of the latest in television technology?

Sony and FIFA will provide Ultra HD 4K TV coverage of three full fixtures including the final, plus the official film - but it's looking unlikely that there will be a UK broadcast partner, meaning it might be left to Japan to enjoy the first 4K games. We shall see.



UK broadcast rights holders

BBC SPORT

BBC Sport is planning extensive coverage from Brazil this summer, with 31 live matches on TV and over 160 hours of programming – and this will include match highlights and reruns on BBC One, Two and Three, as well as the three respective high-definition channels.

The BBC will also broadcast 24 days of live football on Radio 5 Live, while there will be full use of online platforms for computer, tablet, smartphone and game console viewing.

TTV SPORT

With 20 live games from the group stage and a further 14 from the knockout phases, **ITV Sport** will be screening its share of the games on ITV and ITV4 this summer.

And it's promising plenty more online, with itv.com set

to offer highlights packages of all 64 World Cup matches. In-game video clips, live stats, latest news and extra analysis will also be provided.



The third UK rights holder for the World Cup is **talkSPORT**. It will offer live coverage of every game on analogue radio (1089 or 1053MW), DAB radio, through its mobile app, on TV or via its website. There's also a Soundcloud page for catch up content.

4K, then, seems to be marching all the way to the final in the eyes of FIFA; but 3D, on the other hand, will be knocked out early, it seems. The BBC is taking a break from the third dimension, with FIFA itself casting further doubt on the format. As recently as March, FIFA had "yet to make a decision" on provision of 3D for the event - and that was with just three months to go.

All eves on Brazil

In contrast with previous World Cups, 2014's technological advances may not be as freely

accessible as colour TV in 1970, for example. 3D has been left on the bench and 4K is yet to cut it at this level, but we still have high definition.

On the other hand, will this prove to be the World Cup where online shines? The BBC alone is providing 50 per cent more coverage than it did in 2010 and ITV has its dedicated website ready to go to keep you entertained throughout the tournament. While eyes focus on whether Ultra HD 4K comes to the party, it may be internet connections and data plans that shine through in 2014.

The fifth World Cup was also the first to be broadcast on UK TV. There was no ITV until 1955, so BBC went it alone in Switzerland and showed a number of games to audiences back home thanks to the new Eurovision network.

For the first time, Mexico 1970 offered viewers the chance to see the luxurious blue of Italy, the vibrant yellow of Brazil and the majesty of Bobby Moore's tackle on Pele, as colour TV finally came to football's biggest occasion.



2006 - The first high-def World Cup

The 2006 event can claim two firsts. ITV trialled HD coverage of the tournament for the first time, while it was also the first to be produced entirely in widescreen – both 16:9 and "postbox". That couldn't stop England going out on penalties again, however.



When it comes to speakers, sometimes you just want to go bigger, bolder and louder. We put seven magnificent contenders to the test... which will be the last pair standing? ometimes it's better to get floorstanding speakers instead of standmounting ones. You don't need to worry about stands, so they may offer better value - and they don't always take up any more space than standmounters. But the real reason is this: sometimes you just want to go bigger, bolder and louder. We've gathered seven sets of floorstanders, all costing between £1000 and £1400. At

this price, you are potentially getting the best of both worlds: you will get a significant hike in quality over budget alternatives, and sometimes you will get components that have filtered down from the high-end models. Our current champion, the two-time Award-winning Tannoy Revolution DC6T SEs will face six newcomers, including the latest from B&W and Q Acoustics. We can't wait to see what happens...



Acoustic Energy 305 £1000

The Acoustic Energy 305s are the floorstanders in the company's midrange 3-Series that brought us the brilliant 301 standmounters, which we awarded five stars. Therefore we hoped for great things from their larger siblings but, sadly, bigger doesn't always mean better.

First impressions are good. We like the look of the AE 305s. The design is refreshing and more eye-catching than the typical square-edged cabinet, yet the minimalist approach is subtle enough not to look silly.

Build quality is impressive: solid and sturdy, with a high-gloss black or white finish that looks and feels every bit as premium as pricier speakers. The front has an angled baffle, free of holes thanks to the magnetic speaker grilles.

Easier positioning

There's a 28mm fabric-dome tweeter and three 11cm aluminium cones (one for midrange and two for bass). There's also a reflex port, slot-shaped to reduce air turbulence and front-firing for unfussy positioning. Around the back you will find a single pair of terminals, so there's no biwiring. Despite a

pleasing introduction, we find ourselves somewhat disappointed once we get down to business.

The 305s need better timing and greater dynamic punch. They don't hit quite when they should, nor as hard as they should. The result is a lack of enthusiasm, which undermines the entire performance. It's a shame, because the AE 305s have some very strong points and are agile. Whatever we throw at them, there is a precision to the way they start and stop, helping to give the sound clarity.

A well-organised soundstage

We like the amount of detail from the 305s: it means that instruments and vocals are textured and easily identified. They are also easily placed on the broad soundstage, which is well organised.

There's impressive control, even at higher volumes. Crank it up and the sound never becomes harsh. Tonally, it's a balanced performance, with no undue emphasis on any part of the frequency range. The bass should also be applauded for its depth: there's not too much of it,

but it's enough to have a decent stab at Nick Cave's *We No Who U R*. We're also impressed by the seamless integration between frequencies, as well as the sense of cohesion. However, we can't get past the restrained dynamics and timing. We keep wishing for a tighter sound.

Feet tapping

No matter what we listen to, the music never feels particularly engaging. The AE 305s never seem to try very hard at getting your feet tapping, and performers sound almost bored.

Ultimately, though, there's little you can do to change the overall performance of the AE 305s. They look lovely, but similar money can get you a more entertaining sound elsewhere.

Rating ★★★☆☆

FOR Impressive precision; good integration; looks good; solid build and fine finish

AGAINST Don't convey the excitement in music particularly well

VERDICT Despite some strengths, the AE 305s are not entertaining enough





We've always been fans of Bowers & Wilkins's 600 series. Our first experience of the new range was the B&W 685 S2 standmounters, which proved a big improvement on the originals, and they went on to win a group test. Next up are the 683 S2 floorstanders – are they as impressive? The answer is an emphatic yes. Our expectations have been exceeded. The new 683s are seriously capable, and some of the best floorstanders we've heard at this price.

Health and safety

But first, a few words on set-up. For health and safety regulations, B&W has supplied plinths to fit the bottom of the speakers for health and safety reasons, in case they topple. However, we think the speakers sound better with the plinths off. Timing is tighter and fine detail is more apparent.

We'd also recommend biwiring the speakers and standing them in generous space, with a little toeing in to solidify stereo imaging.

It may not come as a surprise that big speakers sound big. The 683 S2s are larger than many of their peers, but the sense of scale is massive. The soundstage is wide and tall, and instruments are organised with plenty of room to breathe.

There's good clarity. The performance is sharp and precise, stopping and starting right on cue. This helps to create a very deliberate vibe: music is performed with confidence and verve - we'd go so far as to say panache.

Tonally they are well balanced and well integrated, but we should give a shout-out to the 683 S2s' impressive low end. It's deep and authoritive enough to make you briefly wonder if there's a subwoofer hidden somewhere. And yet nothing gets drowned out by the bass. This is the kind of low-end heft we like: powerful but nuanced and controlled enough not to compromise the rest of the frequency range.

For the muscle on hand, there's a surprising level of nuance. The 683 S2s are big and bold. They grab your attention effortlessly and stir your feet, but also provide delicacy and subtlety. We're not entirely sure how B&W has managed to achieve this stunning performance, but it's surely due to careful engineering. There's a new

tweeter: an aluminium dome reinforced by an aluminium ring for rigidity. It is decoupled from the cabinet by a gel ring to minimise the impact of unwanted vibrations from the other drivers. It also has a protective grille (which doubles as a waveguide) these days, so it's slightly safer from wandering fingers.

A new spider

Elsewhere, the twin bass cones have also been reinforced with rings of aluminium, and the FST Kevlar midrange driver has a new spider.

The 683 S2s are tremendously talented speakers, all things considered. We're impressed by their power, scale and delicacy - they're wonderfully versatile performers.

Rating ****

FOR Massive scale; plenty of power; plenty of nuance and delicacy

AGAINST They need a room with a bit of space to accommodate them

VERDICT A very strong and versatile performance; another winner for B&W

ELAC FS 147 £1100

The ELAC FS 147s are the floorstanders in the company's Line 140 series, which sits somewhere in the middle of the range. They're siblings to the standmounting BS 142s, which we reviewed last month, judging them to be a touch unsubtle, but fun. It's clear these speakers come from the same family, because they have similar traits. The FS 147s are great for outright fun, even if they struggle with nuance.

The two 14cm mid/bass drivers feature what the company calls 'Al-sandwich' - 0.2mm of aluminium foil, glued to a pulp fibre cone to form a sandwich membrane, which is intended to reduce distortions.

Flared at both ends

Each speaker has two rear-firing reflex ports. These are flared at both ends to reduce noise from air turbulence. You get multiple foam bungs, so you can choose just how much you want to block up the ports, depending on where the speakers are positioned. There's also the JET tweeter, which is what ELAC calls its ribbon tweeters.

These speakers look quite nice from the sofa, but close up, less impressive (see roundel below). The build is solid enough, but we're not too sure about the finish. Most of the cabinet has a black ash finish, with its face made of glossy plastic.

When it comes to the FS 147s' sound, we already said these are a little unsubtle, but fun - and that's the key thing to know about these speakers.

A nice detailed top end

Tonally they have an even-handed approach, with no emphasis on any part of the frequency range. Rhythmic drive and dynamics are quite strong, and there's a liveliness to performance. The level of detail is good, particularly at the top end where the treble is clear and precise. We can't get away from 'unsubtle but fun', though.

Let's start with the fun. The FS 147s have a boundless enthusiasm that we find quite infectious.
The sound is bold and energetic, charging along to whatever you play like an excitable puppy. They are definitely good for those who want a big sound for house parties.

For nuance, however, you may want to look elsewhere. The bass, for instance, feels oversimplified. If you're after layers and subtlety to your music, you will struggle to find them here. If you want speakers to pick up every strum or hi-hat, you will be slightly let down.

Sense of purpose

We said it before with the BS 142 standmounters, and we'll say it again with the FS 147s. These ELACs have a clear sense of purpose - and that's fun. The FS 147s certainly aren't for those who want to sit and analyse every part of a record. If you just want to be entertained, however, and you're not overly fussed about the details, these will serve you well.

Rating ★★★★☆

FOR Pleasing enthusiasm; clear and precise treble; crisp rhythmic ability

AGAINST Not very much in the way of detail and subtlety; build quality could be better

VERDICT A fun set of speakers if you're after outright entertainment over analysis



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Mission SX3 £1300

Take one look at the Mission SX3s' cabinet and it's clear a lot of thought has gone into the design. While some manufacturers (Acoustic Energy, for instance) go for the whole minimalist thing, there's a lot going on here.

For starters, they are beautifully put together. The black veneer on our review sample was applied with care and feels very professional. And then there are the curves. Lots of them, there essentially to reduce internal standing waves. We think it looks nice, lending the speakers a touch of elegance over their typically square-edged competitors.

Tweeter in the middle

At the front you find two 13cm aluminium cones for midrange and bass. Sitting between these is a 25mm titanium-dome tweeter. The back, meanwhile, features a reflex port and two pairs of speaker terminals.

Inside, interleaving layers of wood have been glued and pressed at high temperatures for 48 hours, and then left to cool naturally - a process that supposedly renders the cabinet acoustically inert.

Very fancy stuff, but unfortunately it doesn't prevent the Missions SX3s from giving an unexceptional performance. There's nothing disastrous, but equally there's nothing particularly great here.

Clear, detailed - but slack

It's a clear sound, with plenty of detail - as much as the Tannoy Revolution DC6T SEs or the Q Acoustics Concept 40s. Tonal balance is fine - you won't be preoccupied with any part of the frequency range.

But the sense of timing feels a bit slack, and there's no real sense of dynamism either. It doesn't help that integration is a little off - the bass feels a bit disjointed. Put these together and you don't really get much excitement.

We listen to Of Monsters And Men's *Dirty Paws*, and the opening guitar section feels ponderous, keeping up with the piece but never propelling it. What we really want is a bit of exuberance, but we never get it. The same track played through Bowers & Wilkins' 683 S2s or the NEAT Motive SX2s has a lot more va-va-voom.

It doesn't get much better as we crank it up. The sound hardens when

pushed, losing composure and getting a little coarse instead.

Mission says these speakers were designed to work well in a variety of placements. In practice we found them not too co-operative when given too much free space. They definitely prefer to be near, though not right up against, a wall, which helps firm up the performance to a degree.

We find ourselves frustrated with the SX3s. They're good-looking and well built, and we had high expectations after testing their standmount siblings (the four-star SX1s and 5-star SX2s). Sadly, the performance isn't up to that of the competition. These speakers meet the minimum standard we'd expect at this price, but the same money spent elsewhere can get you better sound.

Rating ★★★☆☆

FOR Good amount of detail; elegant, well-made cabinets

AGAINST Needs stronger dynamics and better timing; short on excitement

VERDICT The Mission SX3s look good, but their performance is average





We've got a thing for tiny speakers. It's partly because they look adorable, partly because they can be more practical - and also we marvel if they out-perform the big guns out there. In the case of the NEAT Motive SX2s, it's all of the above. They look great, they save space, and they're top performers at the price.

Admittedly there's not much in the way of perceived value - not when compared with the monolithic Bower & Wilkins 683 S2s - but these tiny titans have plenty going for them.

Laid-back approach

So what do we have here? Cabinets standing just 76cm high, leaning back on their plinth, not unlike the Tower of Pisa. There's a new tweeter: a 25mm inverted dome made of anodised aluminium (instead of the titanium on older models).

Internally, bracing and damping have been upgraded since the previous generation. There's also a separate enclosure for the tweeter unit, which aims to minimise interference.

Now, that leaning cabinet. It's not just a fashion statement. The idea is

that the shorter cabinets need to compensate, and tilting back allows them to fire up at your ears.

Build quality is very high. Our walnut cabinets are finished to a very professional standard (natural oak, black oak and satin white are also available).

When it comes to sound, we have to be realistic. At this size, the SX2s could never compete with the scale of large rivals such as the Q Acoustics Concept 40s. In absolute terms, the sound put out by the NEATs is not massive.

But it's big enough, and surprisingly so. Close your eyes and you can't tell the sound is coming from cabinets way short of one metre tall. Bigger rivals clearly sound bigger in bigger rooms, but use the SX2s in a small or mediumsized room and you're laughing.

The greatest strength of the SX2s is their liveliness. Punchy dynamics and precise timing work together to make the performance very expressive. The sense of enthusiasm is infectious.

These speakers want you to have a good time, and it didn't take long before we forgot about our analyses, merrily tapping our feet along to whole albums at a time.

Admittedly, the NEATs won't win at floorstander Top Trumps. The B&Ws offer more detail and subtlety, not to mention greater scale and deeper bass.

Winning personality

That said, you'd be having too much fun to care. What you get are hugely entertaining performers whose charming personality far outweighs any sense of a lack of analysis. These speakers won't blow the roof off, or flap your trousers or other such clichés, but they will bring a smile to your face.

We really like the NEAT Motive SX2s. They are great little speakers that get so much right we don't mind a few small imperfections. Sure, the B&W 683 S2s can shout louder, but get these into a smaller room and they rule supreme.

Rating ****

FOR Strong dynamics; good timing; insightful presentation; small stature; good build

AGAINST Not the strongest in terms of outright scale or power

VERDICT If you don't have much space, these need to be on your shortlist

Q Acoustics Concept 40 £1000

Q Acoustics has done very well for itself in only eight years. It's taken on and often defeated larger, betterestablished brands. It's won so many of our Awards that we've lost count. Last year it even won our loudspeaker Product of the Year gong, thanks to the Concept 20 standmounters. Now we have the floorstander version. Can Q Acoustics keep up its run of success?

Growing in confidence

There's one issue here, and it's the price. Part of the reason the brand has done so well is that it has always offered top-quality products at low prices. However, these floorstanders cost just as much as the two-time Award-winning Tannoy Revolution DC6T SEs. Q Acoustics is clearly growing in confidence. Fortunately, that confidence is justified. The Concept 40s are stonkingly good.

The Concept 40s recycle much of what made the Concept 20s so successful. The key element is the cabinet, which uses a box-within-a-box design. Two thin layers of MDF are separated with Gelcore, an elastic compound that acts as a sort of sonic

moat and reduces cabinet resonance. This sandwich approach is used on each side of the cabinet, except the front and back. Both use thick MDF panels, but the front is further reinforced with a large aluminium plate. The soft-dome tweeter is decoupled from the front panel to reduce sound-degrading vibration from the other drivers.

As we've come to expect from Q Acoustics, build quality is exemplary. The high-gloss black or white finishes are flawless, and construction is solid. There are three feet on each speaker, which promises better stability than four. All of this pays off, because the sound is seriously impressive. The signature Q Acoustics sound is alive and well: a smooth and refined presentation that trades outright excitement for easy listening.

The great sense of scale from the Concept 20s makes a return. There's plenty of space, and the presentation is wonderfully airy. You can listen for hours on end.

There's enough punch to entertain: dynamics are strong, and the low end demonstrates enough agility to mean business. It's an affable sound, but don't think there's no bite.

When it comes to energy, the Tannoy Revolution DC6T SEs offer more excitement and greater precision, but the Concept 40s rarely seem lacking. They could be accused of being a little polite, but it would be a mistake to assume they're too laid-back.

Well-behaved cabinet

Detail is good. The sound is clean, no doubt helped by that well-behaved cabinet. The B&W 683 S2s offer a greater sense of texture, but the Concept 40s offer greater integration between the frequencies, and greater overall consistency of sound.

Once again, Q Acoustics has delivered the goods.

FOR Smooth, refined balance; consistency across frequency range; fine stereo imaging; impressive build

Tannoy Revolution DC6T SE £1000

It's nice to be the champion, but that also means everyone wants a shot at you. The Tannoy Revolution DC6T SEs have been our Award-winners at this price for two years in a row. Once again, they've been hauled out to deal with younger, fresher opponents.

Do they have one more fight in them, or is it time to retire? It's somewhere inbetween. These are still impressive speakers that we'd heartily recommend, although they're no longer at the top of their game.

The 'SE' stands for 'Special Edition', which marks them out as the tweaked version of the original DC6Ts, which were Award-winners in their own right.

Not just a rebadge

But it's not just a rebadge with a new lick of paint: the SEs got a new stabilising plinth, revised motor system on the drivers, enhanced crossovers and extensive internal bracing; Changes that earned them superstardom.

We've always been keen on the way these speakers look, and they remain one of the most attractive floorstanders we've seen. The trapezoidal cabinet, designed to reduce internal standing waves, is solidly put together. The labelling on the two pairs of speaker terminals is tricky to read, but that's a small niggle.

It's not just about the looks though: the design is also pretty clever, thanks to the 15cm Dual Concentric driver, which places the tweeter in the middle of the cone. The idea is to improve accuracy and time alignment.

Elsewhere you will find a 15cm bass driver and a rear-firing reflex port.

Get the DC6T SEs firing and it's hard not to be impressed by their sound. Give them a little toe-in, and there's an impressive focus to the soundstage, with a precise placement to vocals and instruments. The sound is very clean. The frequency range is cohesive and nicely integrated. The low end is weighty but precise, and lively enough to provide immediacy.

Experiment with biwiring

You also get plenty of detail, and dynamics are strong. Mix in the keen timing and you have a performance that's exciting without being overly enthusiastic. Biwiring the speakers

gives you a more open and expansive sound, but that does come at the cost of a little cohesion.

In isolation, these Tannoys don't have a problem. But next to newcomers such as the Q Acoustics Concept 40s or the B&W 683 S2s the champs begin to show their age. They make the Tannoys seem a little forward and unsubtle by comparison.

Still skilled performers

The Awards we gave them show we really liked the DC6T SEs first time out - and we still do. These are skilled performers and nobody would regret taking them home. But their asking price must be a consideration now. For the same amount, you can get better sound these days.

Rating ★★★★☆

FOR Focused soundstage; high precision; good energy; fine integration and cohesion

AGAINST Newer rivals offer more detail, greater scale and refinement

VERDICT These two-time Award-winners are still good, but no longer top of their game



Il shapes, all sizes: this is the funnest kind of test. And the results are more varied than we expected. Sometimes it's hard to make recommendations because all the entries are so strong, but in this case there's a clear running order.

Firmly in first place are the freshly revamped Bowers & Wilkins 683s. They offer pretty much everything we want from a floorstander: massive scale with plenty of power, a real sense of drive but also enough nuance and delicacy to deal with subtler elements. So they require a bit of space but, for the money, they are deeply impressive.

A good Motive

Next up are the NEAT Motive SX2s. These lose out to the B&Ws because in absolute terms they're pricier and a little transparent. But they have real strength when it comes to dynamics and timing. Add that to a sense of refinement and you have a very fun, expressive pair of speakers. We also like

the smaller, space-saving stature and the flexibility of positioning. If you have a smaller listening room, these promise to put a smile on your face.

Q Acoustics' Concept 40s come next. We love their smooth and spacious presentation, which makes for endlessly easy listening. But there's plenty of detail and excitement too, and although they could still be a little too polite for some, we think these are generally strong and hugely likeable speakers.

Fourth place! Yes, the two-time Award-winning champions have been firmly knocked off their perch, and it is with a heavy heart that we take the fifth star from the Tannoy Revolution DC6T SEs. It's not that they do anything wrong, it's simply that they have now been overtaken by newer opponents that display stronger dynamics and greater refinement. They put up a good fight though, and we still heartily recommend them.


German brand ELAC comes next, offering a real sense of fun, which is

good for those just looking to be entertained. They're not very subtle, however, and we wouldn't recommend them for anyone looking for something remotely analytical.

Great expectations

The Acoustic Energy 305s were something of a disappointment because we expected good things after testing their talented standmounted counterparts. Sadly, they are let down by a lack of dynamic punch. There are a few things to like, such as the lovely aesthetics and a high level of sonic precision. But ultimately we weren't moved by their performance.

That leaves the Mission SX3s in last place. They deliver the minimum of what we'd expect for a pair of speakers over £1000. There's a good amount of detail, but beyond that the dynamics, timing and integration are average. Compared with the competition, the sound lacks the ability to truly engross and entertain.

THINGS TO CONSIDER:

Positioning

Most of the floorstanders here have been designed to work best away from walls or corners, so choose carefully if you can't give them the space they may need.

Before you buy make sure you listen to your chosen speakers - if possible at home - hooked up to the kit you intend to partner them with. A bright-sounding amp or ill-matched CD player can stymie the best speakers.

Time

Remember that speakers need time to bed in. Sometimes they won't reach their best until they've clocked a good few days'-worth of playing time.

Finlux was last year's underdog story. Its unassuming sets impressed us as great screens for great prices, and we had high hopes for this new Finlux 55F9076-T. It's already had a price cut from £1200 to £900, so it's certainly aiming to play the value card.

One look at the 9076-T and it seems Finlux wants to up its game with a sleek, smart finish. The bezel surrounding the 55in LED-backlight LCD screen is sliver-thin, and the curved metal stand with its 'chrome' finish is smart. It looks really good out of its box.

The set wobbles a bit on its stand, but it's well-built otherwise - just make sure the curved stand will fit your TV rack.

The 9076-T has the essential apps such as BBC iPlayer, Netflix and YouTube, and a couple of surprises in Blinkbox and TuneIn Radio. You will also find Twitter, Facebook and Skype here (you'll need to buy an extra camera for Skype though).

Around the back there are four HDMI inputs and two USB ports (one of which supports HDD recording), and analogue connections such as component, composite and scart inputs. A digital optical output is present, as is a Freeview HD tuner. You can connect to your home network using the ethernet port, although Finlux does include a

separate wi-fi dongle for wireless. The set is DLNA-compatible, too, which means you can stream content from any compatible devices (laptop, NAS device, smartphones) to the screen.

A decent performer off-air

Clear and bright with decent detail, the 9076-T performs fairly well with broadcast TV. Daytime shows such as *This Morning* benefit from its clean and stark whites. But the blacks are not as deep as they should be, which can be seen with Blu-ray Marvel films. As the title suggests, *Thor 2: The Dark World* demands a set with strong insight, but the Finlux's relatively poor blacks rob the picture of punch and excitement.

Setting the backlight level to medium drives the blacks deeper, although you will be sacrificing some brightness and anyone sitting at an angle to the TV may find the colours and blacks fading somewhat too. Play the 3D Blu-ray of *Life of Pi* and the Finlux's passive-3D performance has decent depth and is gentle on the eyes.

A (generous) eight pairs of passive glasses are included too.

Voices and dialogue are fine, as the 9076-T pushes the midrange forward, but it's not as solid as we'd like, and leaves the rest of the sound feeling thin.

We have to take issue with the new remote control. Last year, Finlux's remotes were simple and easy to use with a flat design. This year it's chosen a concave design and our fingers slip off the domed 'OK' button.

We're a bit disappointed with this TV. Those issues with black depth, a lack of crisp detail and the remote were at odds with its original £1200 price. They are at odds with its £900 price too, sadly.

PHILIPS 55PFS6609

£1200 ***

If you've converted your film collection to Blu-ray and have eyes only for Full HD content, then this Philips 55PFS6609 is well worth an audition.

The 55in LED-backlit LCD screen with Full HD 3D and smart features is the first Philips TV we've seen this year, and it shines with high-definition content. Play the Blu-ray of *Iron Man 3* or watch Formula One HD, and you will find crisp lines, punchy colours, and enough detail to keep you hooked.

Pleasing depth

The Philips's picture has a glossy look with stark highlights, deep blacks, and stable motion-handling to keep action scenes in check. This translates to 3D films, too, with *The Adventures of Tintin* conveyed with pleasing depth. The two pairs of supplied active-3D glasses could be more comfortable, though.

The colour palette is vivid, although the reds aren't quite as vibrant as on the Samsung UE48H6400. The Philips is much happier with greens and blues, which have a rich and detailed balance, although we think dark scenes could have more insight. The picture could also be cleaner. We set the noise-reduction setting to medium to soften any graininess in HD and standard-definition pictures - *Stoker's* natural

palette is bereft of subtlety on DVD, and shadows lack the definition to convey space between characters and rooms. Flick to any standard-def broadcast channel and fuzzy edges, lack of truly deep blacks, and softness all disappoint.

Our favourite feature is the 6609's Ambilight: a series of LEDs on either side of the TV change colour in response to the picture, so adding to the perceived depth of field. It's effective. The TV's build quality is sturdy, although the swivel stand could look a bit smarter.

Even with Philips's Ambi-woox sound technology (a special driver aims to boost midrange and bass) on board, the 6609 sounds muddled. Voices are muffled and hollow, and turning up the volume gives the sound a bright edge.

The essential apps are here, alongside Philips's own Cloud TV which gives access to TV channels from the internet. The Social TV option activates a sidebar for Facebook and Twitter feeds, and you can also access content in cloud storage. The interface and menus aren't very responsive, but our major gripe is with

the sluggish remote control. The cheap plastic build does it no favours either.

You get four HDMI inputs, all of which support ARC (Audio Return Channel). There are also two USB ports, and an optical audio output. You can connect to your network using ethernet, or the built-in wi-fi. There's also component and phono inputs, and two tuners: one for Freeview HD and one for satellite channels (which isn't Freesat compliant).

We have mixed emotions about the 6609. It doesn't handle standard-def content particularly well and it's sluggish to use. On the other hand, it looks great with anything in HD. Is that enough to splash out £1200 on? We're not quite sure.

Have you come across a 48in LED/LCD screen before? We certainly haven't. The Samsung UE48H6400 is the first of this new screen size, and we like it. A lot.

Sharp, clear and full of subtle detail that's impressive at this mid-range price, the 6400 hooked us when we turned it on. At £700 (down from £1000), this could be the best TV deal we've seen this year, what with its smart build and numerous features.

Screen feels right

High-definition pictures burst with clarity and crispness, and the screen has a beautifully judged colour palette, full of depth, subtlety and punch. Black areas are deep, yet still have subtle detail. We barely feel the need to tweak the picture settings, either, as the screen feels pretty right, straight out of the box.

The 6400 is adept at rendering reds, which are vibrant and subtle. Skin tones look natural, making rivals like the Sony KDL-50W829B and Philips 55PFS6609 look unconvincing in comparison. The 6400 is one of the cleanest pictures we've seen this year for both Full HD and DVD. The upscaling is good, with plenty of detail, despite the lower resolution. Its smooth motion and strong contrast translates well on 3D films, too. The 3D depth in the Blu-ray of *Life of Pi* is

immersive, and crystal-clear detail makes it compelling (Samsung includes two pairs of active glasses). The sound has a rounded quality to it, with none of the tinniness usually found in flatscreens. It's not quite the effect of a home cinema system, so a soundbar, such as the Award-winning Philips HTL5120 (£250), would work well here.

Samsung's smart TV portal remains largely unchanged, which is no bad thing. There are tweaks across the interface, but the speediness remains the same. You get a wealth of catch-up services (ITV Player, 4oD, Demand 5) as well as Netflix, BFI Player, Vimeo and YouTube. Curiously, BBC iPlayer is still missing, but we are assured it's only an update away. TuneIn and vTuner internet radio are also available, alongside the usual social network apps.

Samsung's Football Mode differs from Sony's by offering to record football highlights based on crowd noise. The setting, however, is garish in both picture and sound, so we would steer clear of activating it. Samsung's standard remote makes navigation second nature, but we're less enthused with the new pebble-shaped smart touch remote. The touchpad is too small, while the pointer needs a steady hand. And we still don't enjoy voice interaction.

The 6400 has a decent array of connections on the back, with four HDMI inputs and three USB ports. You also get an input each for component, composite and scart, and an optical audio output. For internet, you can go wired or wireless, and a Freeview HD tuner takes care of your broadcast TV.

Is this 48in Samsung screen one of the best TV deals of the year so far? We certainly think so.

The Sony KDL-50W829B was the first 2014 TV we laid eyes on, and the natural detail and colours on its Full HD screen impressed us right away. It's a goodlooking set, too, with a barely there bezel making it look surprisingly small for a 50in screen - and at just £900, too.

But we've seen other TVs since, and this Sony TV has stiff competition. Its skill with natural hues and detail makes easy work of the many shades of brown and the bleak, blue-tinged wintry setting of *Inside Llewyn Davis*. There's insight in the shadows, while the whites are clean and stark next to deep blacks.

Crisp and punchy

Switch to *Pacific Rim* on Blu-ray and the Sony screen looks crisp and punchy. It's a bright and involving picture, with no hint of the viewing-angle issues that plagued last year's Sony sets. 3D films (the Sony is an active set) retain all the screen's characteristics and the sense of depth is immersive, although there are some instances of motion instability.

The 829B is a talented upscaler, as confident with DVD and standard-def pictures as with Blu-rays. It's a relatively noise-free picture too, and Freeview channels are bright and detailed. However, the Sony's picture looks slightly subdued next to the new

Samsung UE48H6400 - the Samsung's 48in screen is just that bit sharper around the edges, and more proficient when it comes to rendering vivid reds and skin tones. The Sony fares pretty well with sound: voices are clear, direct and easy to follow, while there's no thinness or bright edges. It's not the most dynamic or weighty sound we've heard, but it doesn't grate either.

Sony's smart interface is one of the best we've seen, with the panels for music, movies and TV laid out neatly. Sony's own Video and Music Unlimited apps take centre stage, while Netflix and Amazon Instant are there with YouTube and NPR Radio apps. You also get BBC iPlayer and Demand 5.

Sony's Football Mode is a smooth motion-processing option that gives a wide spread of sound and is nowhere as overblown or garish as Samsung's version. Social networking is improved on this year's TVs with Social View, which activates a scrolling Twitter feed.

Meanwhile, there are four HDMI inputs for your sources. You can also

stream HD from an Android device using the MHL (Mobile High-link Definition) connection, while ARC support lets you feed TV sound to a soundbar. The 829B also has a Freeview HD tuner and a satellite tuner, and an ethernet port for connecting to your home network.

Sony's remote remains intuitive and easy to use. You can get an optional 'One-Flick' touchpad remote, but its cheap-feeling frame and clumsy gestures aren't a patch on the standard handset.

Overall, the 829B is no longer at the top of the pile with its most talented rivals offering better performance - but we're still fond of it, and it remains a pretty compelling watch.

ast year, 42in screen sizes were all the rage. But this year we're Igoing bigger - as the first crop of 2014 TVs prove that big-screen entertainment is the way forward. And with on-demand apps, catch-up services and social networking seen as standard now on any self-respecting Full HD TV. the focus falls on one significant factor. Picture quality.

The four sets we have on test here couldn't be more different when it comes to picture. The Samsung UE48H6400 stands head and shoulders 55F9076-T isn't the usual bargain we've above the rest with a superbly detailed and natural performance, and for a great price. Its subtlety with colours betters even the Sony - which until now was the most natural-looking screen. Both TVs offer a smart experience, though, with speedy and stylish

interfaces making them a joy to use. The Philips 55PFS6609, meanwhile. is not as intuitive - We'd like a much smoother user experience and better upscaling for £1200. The Philips's saving grace is its high-definition performance. The 55in screen bursts into life with sharp and punchy detail that makes watching Blu-ray films a real treat.

The 55in screen from Finlux, however, isn't quite up to standard. Even with a £300 price cut, the £900 come to expect from Finlux, no matter how smart the set looks.

Without doubt, the best TV performer of the year so far is Samsung's 48in screen. For £700, it's great value, and it will deliver a superb all-round performance in your home.

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The Jawbone Mini Jambox makes quite a first impression. Slim and light enough to slip in your pocket, its build quality is second-to-none, with a body largely made of aluminium.

It's colourful too, available in nine finishes with several front grille patterns to choose from. It's this grille design that takes up the entire Mini front panel, with large, stylised volume and play/pause controls along the top edge. Smaller power and pairing buttons, plus a 3.5mm input and microUSB port, are found along the right-hand side, leaving the other edges clean. At just 38mm thick, there are two small drivers and a passive bass radiator squeezed into its slim frame – a standard setup in portable speakers these days.

It's good to see the most up-to-date Bluetooth version 4.0 is on board, and pairing is easy - you hold down the pairing button to make the Mini Jambox visible and then select it on your chosen device in the usual way. There's no near-field communication (NFC) to speed up this procedure, though.

We play Iggy Azalea's *Fancy* and the synthesised bassline intro lacks the depth and impact heard on the Sony SRS-X3. There's not a lot of bass punch here to speak of, though it stays free of obvious distortion at most volumes. The Jambox has a mid/treble-heavy character, which is no good thing: it's a hard, thin sound, making the speaker an uncomfortable and tiring listen for any duration. Vocals have a harshness, sounding muffled and closed in, amid a congested presentation.

Dynamically flat

This affects the timing of tracks too, which feel dynamically flat and unexciting, lacking the get-up-and-go of the JBL Flip 2. There's not much volume to play with either - fair enough, considering the Jambox's size - and it doesn't give any sense of oomph. This becomes more of a problem when you take it outside (likely to be the main use) - it sounds insubstantial with no walls to reinforce its sound. Push it to its maximum volume, and there's enough

distortion in the midrange to make you want to turn it down again.

There are a few interesting features here: the recently-added Multi Play, which lets you pair two Mini Jamboxes to play music in unison or as left and right speakers. There's also a free-to-download app, allowing you to turn your playlists from the likes of iTunes, Deezer, Spotify and Rdio into one mega playlist. The Jambox also offers a pretty impressive 10-hour (quoted) battery life.

The Jambox's fate is sealed by its price. At £120 you feel like you're paying a premium for the stylish looks, rather than its sound quality. There is better out there for similar money.

We loved the original JBL Flip, praising it as 'a sensational blend of portability and performance'. A year on and a number of improvements later, we're pleased to say we're suitably impressed the second time around.

Keeping the same cylindrical design as its predecessor, the Flip takes its name from its ability to be used in either vertical or horizontal positions. It's worth seeing which works best for you, but we found it to be more engaging placed vertically. This also gives you easier access to the controls, which sit rather awkwardly out of sight on the left-hand-side when horizontal.

The controls have been subtly tweaked too, so they no longer stand proud of the Flip's design, but are built into it instead. You see nothing but icons on the surface, but find a satisfying click when you press them. Other tweaks to its design include a standard microUSB charging port in place of the proprietary one previously, and the addition of near-field communication (NFC) for quick Bluetooth pairing. As before, it comes with a carry case to protect it

while on the move. Behind the Flip 2's grille sit dual 40mm drivers, driven by 6W amplifiers, and a bass port, which produce quite a performance for a portable. Its strength lies in the midrange, with voices pushed forward, creating a clear presentation that lends itself well to vocal-heavy tracks such as Prince's funk-driven tune *The Breakdown*.

On its feet

The Flip 2 has a great sense of rhythm too, and is quick enough on its feet to handle all the attitude of Daft Punk's *Lose Yourself to Dance.* It's an exciting listen. We would like more weight in the low end though, which feels a little restrained with bass-heavy tracks.

The treble can also sound pushed at times - particularly at higher volumes. The Flip 2 can go impressively loud but, as with many speakers of this type, that doesn't mean it should.

We'd recommend keeping it a few notches under the max if you want to keep things comfortable. Luckily, when outside, this flaw is less noticeable, with its presentation more evenly balanced. The prominent midrange actually lends itself to outdoors, as vocals and melody are clearly heard no matter the surrounding noise, while its exciting character is not lost either.

Our only other gripe is with the Flip 2's battery life: at five hours, it falls short of the competition and while it's fine for a day in the garden, for a weekend's camping it could be troublesome.

The JBL Flip 2 has made some positive improvements to its predecessor, but it's still not perfect.

To earn five stars, it needs more substantial bass kick and, of course, there's the significant problem with its battery life. A highly praised four stars it is, then, for the JBL Flip 2.

Sony's SRS-X3 flaunts more bassy punch than most speakers of its size should be allowed to, but the difference is, it does it with aplomb. The SRS-X3 handles even the deepest basslines well.

Connectivity is via the slightly outdated Bluetooth 2.1, but there is near-field communication (NFC) on board for quicker, easier pairing with compatible devices. Play Drake's *Worst Behaviour* and the weighty low-end cuts through the mix with satisfying impact, sounding warm and controlled. It's impressive, if not sonically pure.

Switch to something heavier, and the brooding bass guitar in Staind's *Fade* is delivered with depth and confidence. There's real scale to the presentation too.

This is partly due to the two passive radiators inside the SRS-X3, one at the front, one at the back (most competitors have only one), which support two full-range drivers, driven by a 10W amplifier. Sony's 'Sound Mode' also

bucks the trend by offering EQ settings and does a good job at widening the soundstage further still, introducing some space to the presentation.

The SRS-X3's bassy punch does come with flaws: the weight of the low end means the midrange takes a back seat, and vocals feel lost during bassy sections. This means a slight lack of clarity when compared to the midrange-forward JBL Flip 2.

Power and punch

Many of the SRS-X3's weaknesses are balanced out when outdoors. The weight in the bass gives it power and punch without overpowering the rest of the frequency range. It sounds very impressive, dealing with acoustic music as well as synthheavy dance tracks, and creating a smooth, well-rounded presentation. You could listen for hours on end. It goes loud too, and does a reasonable job at keeping things in control. We would recommend not maxing out the volume if you want your music to stay distortion-free, however.

Its seven-hour quoted battery life is about average for these speakers, particularly with its power. You will get longer out of the Jawbone Mini Jambox, but less sonic substance.

In terms of portability, the SRS-X3 is no match for the skinny Jawbone Mini Jambox, but you will still be able to carry it around, and it's well made to boot. What you sacrifice in bag real estate you will certainly earn back in performance.

The Sony SRS-X3 is the priciest speaker on test, and with the £100 JBL Flip 2 snapping at its heels, it doesn't quite do enough to earn a fifth star. But it's a hugely confident performer that certainly deserves consideration when buying any product in this category.

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its own particular flaws, but the **JBL Flip 2** has the edge, thanks to its level of organisation and lighter price-tag

he portable wireless speaker category is a tricky one - it's never easy finding that happy medium between size and sound.

Among the three on test we find two that come close, but fall just short of the five-star honour we're used to bestowing on our test favourites.

It's not often we have a test winner that isn't five stars, but in this case it feels justified. Both the Sony SRS-X3 and the JBL Flip 2 put forward formidable, if not faultless, performances for their size. In the end, we decided the presentation of the JBL Flip 2 had the edge over the Sony SRS-X3, offering that extra level of organisation, detail and clarity that the Sony just fell short on. The SRS-X3, on the other hand, has stacks of scale, weight and power that is missing from

the JBL, making it an immediately impressive listen. While we'd have liked it to be a little lighter on its feet to bring more excitement to its character, its smooth, easy-to-listen-to performance made it a gem to use at length.


When it really came down to it, the extra cost of the Sony and the Flip 2's better level of organisation gave JBL the win - although its lack of bass and unimpressive battery life are enough to stop it achieving five stars.

That leaves the Jawbone Mini Jambox, which is simply outclassed here. To give it its due, it's significantly smaller than its testmates - a super-slim speaker that puts style first.

Unfortunately that means a smaller, poorer sound, lacking the weight, power and dynamics of both the Sony and JBL.





First they made calls. Then they got smart. Now they are woven into the very fabric of our lives. In the land of the smartphone, the king is an Android, so we set out to answer the ultimate question: which of these is the best?

et's park the iPhone for a minute - it's Android time. This operating system is used by the majority of smartphone owners worldwide and run by dozens of key mobile manufacturers. It's fair to say Android now rules the mobile world.

There are around one billion (and counting) Android-powered devices in existence today and, with tons of smartphones launched every year, competition never lets up.

2014 looks like being no different, with new flagships from HTC, Sony and Samsung looking to leapfrog their predecessors and oust rivals with enhanced specs and first-rate features.

Among these you'll find Android's latest KitKat 4.4 software, improved

performance speeds, cutting-edge designs - some with waterproof and dustproof builds - camera quality to rival your compact, and even 4K filming (yes, Ultra HD may not be in screens just yet, but it has found its way into smartphones nonetheless).

We've already encountered all three of those new-generation handsets in our First Tests and praised each of them: the HTC for its gorgeous design, Sony for superb sound and Samsung for its dazzling screen. But how do these newcomers compete with existing Google and LG flagships? We're putting the five ringers through the daily grind to find out, so if you are looking for an upgrade and wondering which one to have in your hand, read on.



The Google Nexus 5 could be the best value-for-money smartphone out there. If you're after a feature-packed phone for half the price of the Apple, HTC, Samsung and Sony flagships, then buying Google's latest handset is a no-brainer.

You might expect the design of a handset priced at less than £300 to cut corners. Not here: the Nexus 5 is a nice slab of engineering. Its polycarbonate shell has a matte-black (white, or bright red are also available) rubber back panel, curved edges and is smooth to touch.

It's 8.6mm thick: though you wouldn't tell by holding it. Despite matching the HTC One M8's 5in screen, it feels dinky and light compared with most rivals.

Vanilla treat

We've always been fans of vanilla Android and the untouched operating system on the Nexus 5 is a treat to use. Running the latest Android KitKat 4.4, its interface is clean, intuitive and fast. Icons are big, functionality smooth.

The 5's 1920×1080 Full HD screen is still up-to-date and with 445ppi, has the edge over most rivals in resolution.

Sharp, clean lines and well-judged colours with natural hues make for a

warm and refined display, but it isn't as eye-catching as the LG G2 or Sony Xperia Z2. Contrast lags behind them too.

Pics that pull their punches

The same can be said of the Nexus 5's camera performance. Pictures are clean and produce natural, realistic colours, but photos aren't as striking as those produced by the LG G2 and photo effects are on the skimpy side too. A 1.3-megapixel front-facing camera just about suffices for shameless selfies.

Move on to sound and the Nexus 5 is also trumped by its rivals, despite a decent performance - music is clear, detailed and balanced, but Sony, Apple and HTC do it better.

Under the hood the Nexus 5 impresses. Its 2.2GHz Qualcomm Snapdragon 800 chip is no longer headline spec, but it's still a powerful machine, handling multiple apps instantaneously and zipping through data-heavy web pages quickly.

Its 2300mAh battery might not be as good as the G2's massive 3000mAh one, but it does the job. With 20 per cent juice remaining after 16 hours of play – which included location services and

wi-fi powered on and the downloading of a movie - we didn't feel shortchanged. A wireless charger is included.

The Nexus 5's sealed body means you can't house a replacement battery, nor a memory card - Nexus phones have never had gateways to expand storage and this is no different. 16GB or 32GB options onboard should cater for a mass of media, though.

The Nexus 5 finally bows down to more advanced rivals after a lengthy stint as one of our favourite smartphones. It's no surprise: 2014's newcomers have been mightily impressive so far, upping the game in both specs and design (discounting the Samsung S5 on the latter). Google needs a new champion to regain that fifth star. Did anyone say Nexus 6?

VERDICT A decent all-rounder that remains a steal, but now left behind by new arrivals



We tip our hat to HTC. Producing a successor to last year's best-reviewed phone, the HTC One, must have been a daunting task - but they've nailed it.

The HTC One (M8) is as impressive as its predecessor and has us using words like 'gorgeous' and 'stunning' from the off.

Beautiful to (be)hold

Pick it up and it's a thing of beauty. Made with 90 per cent metal, the M8's body is a single piece of aluminium with a shiny back panel and Gorilla-glass screen. We're fans of the brushed metal - it puts Samsung's plastic shells to shame.

At 160g the M8 is lighter than the Sony Xperia Z2, but no featherweight compared with the LG G2 or Samsung S5. Curvy corners and tapered edges make it nice to hold and the build is solid.

The One M8 has bettered the One with a 5in Full HD screen. With 441 pixels per inch, its display is sharp, has a vivid colour palette, oily blacks and brilliant whites. Samsung's S5 is even blacker and Sony's Xperia Z2 has more detail, but the M8 still has the wow factor.

Performance-wise, it's impressive: with 2GB RAM, its 2.3GHz Qualcomm Snapdragon 801 processor gets through web pages quickly and juggles numerous apps without a glitch. During our test, nothing slowed it down.

As is to be expected, such efficiency takes its toll on the 2600mAh battery. The M8 hasn't the stamina of its rivals and will need recharging overnight, but it will last a full day of busy usage.

There's little pre-loaded bloatware, and apps bunched together in folders make for an uncluttered menu. Our only snag is that motion is a bit abrupt: a little extra smoothness wouldn't go amiss.

Alongside various shortcut actions, HTC introduces a new 'Bundle' feature - a single tile that draws together information on a specific topic. A built-in IR blaster means the M8 can be used as your TV remote control too.

Pixel-packing camera

The M8 keeps the One's 4.1 Ultrapixels - bigger than megapixels and supposed to catch more light - and there's a new twin-tone flash, which aims to produce purer colours and natural skin tones.

A standard five-megapixel front-facing camera is joined by two rear cameras
- HTC calls it the 'duo camera', which allows you to bring blurry objects into

focus - or vice versa - even after you've taken a photo. Very clever.

In standard mode photos come out nice and bright, with the deep blacks and milky whites among the best, but colours are often a little over-saturated.

HTC's BoomSound speakers have had their chambers redesigned for better stereo separation and a boost in volume. If you listen to your phone through its own speakers, this is the best-sounding device here - although that is, admittedly, faint praise. A BoomSound setting adds weight to lower frequencies.

HTC has taken something great and made it even better. The One (M8) eclipses its predecessor, tidying up a few niggles and improving on an already superb phone. This is easily one of the best Android phones money can buy.

VERDICT Building on an already great phone, the One (M8) impresses on almost every level



On release, the LG G2 wowed us with its gorgeous display, lightning-fast performance, great camera and remarkable specification - it was the first smartphone with high-res audio support.

The new kids on the block may have toppled it now, but don't dismiss it - it's one of the oldest handsets in this test, but you wouldn't think it from the spec sheet.

Visual treats

The 5.2in Full HD screen remains as beautiful as ever, with bright, radiant colours, sharp lines and impressive contrast. The IPS (in-plane switching) display means wide viewing angles are well catered-for too. The G2 screen was a favourite of ours for a long time, although the subtler colours and deeper blacks of the HTC One (M8) trump it now.

Despite the decent-sized screen, the phone isn't that big. It's still one of the most ergonomic we've come across, with slim bezels and a smooth, curvaceous back that's great to hold. Its one-piece polycarbonate shell is 9.1mm thick - a smidgeon thicker than Samsung's S5 and Sony's Xperia Z2 - but it's not restrictive.

For a button-free frontage, LG has put power and volume buttons (which

double up as memo and camera shortcuts) on the back of the handset. Positioned where your fingers naturally rest, they are surprisingly intuitive to use once you're used to it.

There are features aplenty here, but some of them seem a little futile: Audio Zooming lets you pinpoint subjects for sound during video capture. Similarly, Zoom to Track magnifies an object and tracks it throughout.

The download for the latest 4.4 KitKat OS is imminent, but for now it runs off the 4.2.2 Jelly Bean OS. As a result, icons are big, menus are clean and orderly, and functionality is smooth. Qualcomm's Snapdragon 800 2.2GHz quad-core processor performs well, and the swiping of menus is responsive.

Healthy amounts of juice

The G2 has plenty of power. The 3000mAh battery copes fine with the wi-fi always on, running apps and browsing. For a full charge, the G2 takes little more than an hour.

Moving on to media, play a 24-bit/96kHz FLAC of Kate Bush's *Snowflake* through AKG's K451 headphones (£50) and oodles of detail comes through. But

compared with HTC's One (M8) and Sony's Xperia Z2, the music feels lifeless.

When we make calls they come through loud and clear at both ends, and there is no miscommunication, even in the midst of busy traffic.

Its 13-megapixel camera has an LED flash, nine-point focusing and optical image stabilization, as well as a bundle of effects to play with. Photos are sharp, detailed and textured, and brightness is good - even if the G2's camera is arguably no longer ahead of the pack.

Full HD video records at 60fps and the results are good in our test - clear, fairly detailed and good with motion.

Newer rivals may better its specs and performance now, but that doesn't make the G2 a has-been. LG's flagship phone remains a worthy contender.

VERDICT A good all-rounder that still gives newer rivals a run for their money



Samsung's S5 will probably be one of this year's best-selling smartphones; the S3 is the world's most popular handset, the S4 proved a worthy successor, and this latest flagship phone has a stack of new and improved features.

Yet overall it's a mixed bag - impressing and disappointing at the same time.

Plastic: fantastic?

First, the design leaves us underwhelmed. Samsung is still pushing the plastic - with chrome-look-frame - and it now looks second-rate alongside rivals.

The new model is large, yet we never need two hands to operate it and a diagonal thumb-swipe across the screen should be easy enough for most users.

The S5 is thicker and heavier than the S4 - albeit by only 0.2mm and 15g, and its 8.1mm depth and 145g weight is still thinner and lighter than the Sony Xperia Z2 and HTC One (M8). Just like the Sony, the S5 is dustproof and waterproof in up to one metre of water.

The S5's Super AMOLED Full HD display is up there with the best. Vibrant and punchy, colours have plenty of life and lines are sharp. It's the best contrast we've seen on a phone - even if it doesn't

have the subtlety, detail or colour accuracy of the Sony Experia Z2 or HTC One (M8). There are display-mode options if you want to tweak the look.

Samsung has gone for a less-is-more approach - goodbye gimmicky icons and excessive bloatware, hello manageable menus and uniform graphics. And the S5 zips through operations with its speedy 2.5GHz Snapdragon 801 processor.

There's 2GB RAM of memory, and 16GB or 32GB internal storage options plus a microSD card slot. The 2800mAh battery gives us 16 hours of constant use.

Samsung's new CSI-style finger scanner means you can unlock your home screen with a swipe of your digit. In day-to-day use it's volatile to say the least. We reached maximum failed attempts on a number of occasions, then had to enter a password anyway. Hmm.

The 16-megapixel rear camera produces bright, punchy and attention-grabbing photos, with luscious greens and rosy reds. We'd prefer truer images at times, but it works well in poor light.

The S5 doesn't disappoint when it comes to camera effects: for budding photographers, HDR (high dynamic range) creates lighter pictures in dimly

lit conditions, while Selective Focus zooms in on objects within 50cm.

Sound hasn't seen much of an improvement over the S4. There is no high-res audio, although it adds FLAC and WAV support to the stock formats. The sound is balanced and fairly detailed, but it fails to inspire. It just doesn't convey rhythms with much vigour, and dynamics sound lazy.

Smart in so many ways

This is a decent phone: we like its smart interface, dazzling screen and speedy, stutter-free performance. Then there is its water-resistant body.

Samsung has clearly chosen evolution over revolution here, but uninspiring design and feeble sound are nevertheless significant faults in our book.

Sony obviously couldn't wait to unveil its Xperia Z2 - it comes just months after the launch of the Z1 - but it's easy to see why. This phone is a resounding success, with its impressive execution, refined, punchy screen and top-quality sound.

The Z2 is a block of beauty. Its glass front and back panels, and aluminium frame, put the Samsung S5's plastic casing to shame, and its rectangular, narrow build is unusual. Although it's not as universally friendly to hold as its curvier rivals, we get used to it quickly.

The Z2 is bigger and heavier than most rivals and feels as solid as a high-end phone should. There are a few minor design issues: the reflective quality of the glass gives off a glare, and we found it difficult to distinguish between up and down operations on the volume rocker.

Not slippery when wet

This phone is more than well built - it can be dropped in 1.5m of water for up to 30 minutes. And not only does it survive a run in the rain, but the bright, punchy screen - Full HD, 5.2in, 1920 x 1080 pixels - is also easy to use when wet. The Z2 also has improved viewing angles and motion that is commendably lag-free.

This is the best-sounding Android phone we've heard. Clear, open and spacious, the Z2 has plenty of detail. Play Eminem's *Rhyme Or Reason* through AKG's K451 headphones and vocals have insight and expression. It times well too.

Noises off

The Z2 has noise-cancelling technology, which works with music replay. This is claimed to block 98 per cent of ambient noise. You'll need the company's noise-cancelling MDR-NC31EM headphones to benefit though. They come bundled from most retailers, and reduce background noise significantly.

Call settings are worthwhile too. We found voices clear in normal use, but turning on Noise Suppression and Speaker Voice Enhancement brought enhancements in clarity.

Photos have plenty of detail and warmth. Superior Auto mode is the default setting but we'd stick to manual mode, where photos are sharp, textured and balanced. The 8x digital zoom keeps remarkable detail and clarity too.

When it comes to photo and video effects, the Z2 has plenty, including Augmented Reality, which adds animated effects to photos, and Timeshift Burst, which captures 61 frames in just two seconds. A headlining Z2 feature is 4K filming - though the display won't do the 3840 x 2160 resolution justice (you will need a 4K telly for that), playback still looks impressively detailed and rich. The downside? Clips eat up storage and the phone heats up noticeably.

The Z2 runs multiple apps and browsers with ease. The 3200mAh cell - which gives a day and a half of heavy usage - ensures good usability.

The Z2 is one of the best phones money can buy. Is it the best Android? Possibly. With that bigger screen, improved performance, enhanced camera, excellent stereo sound and noise-cancelling, it's outstanding.

With such a bun-fight in the smartphone market, a win in a test of the newest Android devices is a big deal. The chic **Sony Xperia Z2** seals it with great sound and a fine screen

f anything can change an iOS fan's mind, it's the Sony Xperia Z2. With its smart, robust design, superb screen and unmatched sound, it's a brilliant follow-up to its already spectacular predecessor, the Z1, and the clear winner of this test. The only downside is the large, block-like shape of the phone, which may not suit all hand sizes.

It isn't a walkover, mind. The HTC One (M8) makes a great first impression with its lovely design. It's not all style and no substance, either - the M8 is a dream to use, and impresses with its clean, smart interface and quick performance. The M8's sound and camera are both impressive too.

The highly anticipated Samsung S5 is not much of a departure from the S-range we've seen to date, but there's nothing wrong with that. It does a lot of things right, including an unfussy, back-to-basics interface and a dazzling screen. Substandard design and uninspiring sound means it doesn't get that fifth star though.

Six months has passed since Google and LG released their flagship phones, and both remain decent devices: the Nexus 5 for its attractive price and snappy performance, the G2 for its ergonomic design and beautiful screen. But when their performance and specs are compared with the newcomers, they both lose a star.

IN ADMIRATION OF MUSIC

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When you're spending £1000-plus on a DAC it's not unreasonable to expect superb sound – but these digital wonders offer far more than that

ow that the computer is, for an increasing number of us, the main repository for our music files, a digital-to-analogue converter is becoming a vital piece of a modern hi-fi system. When you get to the £1000 pricepoint, though, you're buying more than simply a DAC. These four fine offerings also serve as terrific preamplifiers and headphone amplifiers - this is hi-fi equipment for the 21st Century.

Cambridge Audio Azur 851D £1000

If you're looking for a full-width digital preamplifier, then you've come to the right place. While others in this test have smaller footprints and look more at home on a desktop, the 851D has the presence (and dimensions) to take a spot in a more traditional system.

It's built in to one of the company's beautifully finished full-size 8-series cases, and features a clear, backlit display and an extensive range of features. We're even fans of the supplied remote: it's quality. Easy to use, it can be used to control other Cambridge kit and makes a mockery of the wand (we use the term loosely) supplied with the Fostex.

Ticks most of the boxes

You can't play DSD (Direct Stream Digital) files through the Cambridge, but apart from that the 851D ticks most of the boxes. It will play 24-bit/192kHz files through all inputs: coaxial, optical, USB and AES/EBU. The supplied Bluetooth dongle is aptX compatible, which opens up the DAC for use with smartphones and tablets. Like all the products in this test, the 851D also includes a headphone output and has the option to be used as

a digital preamplifier - the variable output can be connected directly into a power amp or active speakers for those who want a purer digital system.

The Azur 851D makes a good impression from the start. Play John Williams's *Theme From Jurassic Park* and there's decent detail plus an even tone to the track. There's good precision and solidity within the soundstage. It's wide, deep and the various sections of the orchestra are layered nicely. Stable imaging keeps all these various elements in check.

The Cambridge offers a range of digital filters to choose from, some of which make subtle changes to the sound. We preferred the 'Minimum' filter, as it sounded more organic and fluid in our reference Bryston/Naim set-up. We suggest you experiment to see which filter works best for you.

Even listening to Tom Odell's *Another Love* through Bluetooth - once you accept the inevitable drop-off in terms of resolution and insight - the Cambridge still sounds the part. The piano sounds solid and focused with a decent smattering of detail.

Change to a CD-quality rip of Louis Armstrong's *We Have All The Time In The World*, though, and a few chinks appear in the 851D's armour. There's detail and agility, but the DAC is less successful at communicating the nuances of the music - the emotive strings or Armstrong's timeless, expressive vocal.

Unnatural hardness

The Cambridge doesn't sound quite as expressive or sophisticated as the top machines in its class. There's even a slight hint of brightness and unnatural hardness on the edge of some of those notes. But the 851D is a fine machine, and even if it isn't the last word in entertainment or emotion, it's still well worth giving an audition.

Chord Hugo £1400

The first time we reviewed the Hugo, in our May issue, we were delighted yet dismayed. The sound quality was stunning, but a couple of serious (and very basic) design flaws left us tearing our hair out. The result was a four-star rating when it could easily have been a five. But now the Hugo is back, and it's good to see Chord has addressed the issues. The line-level single-ended outputs now have a larger cutout in the casework, meaning interconnects with chunky plugs can fit without issue.

The narrow gap around the coaxial digital input remains, but at least you now get an adapter supplied in the box.

Cocktail sticks

And the power switch, which was originally so recessed you needed cocktail sticks to reach it, now sticks out further from the casework.

Now that there are no distractions, you can concentrate on the Hugo's sheer brilliance. We're still scratching our heads over how Chord has managed to build such a smartly finished, feature-packed device without sacrificing any sound quality. Just to clarify, this is a

bona fide digital preamp with DAC, internal volume control, optical and coaxial inputs, two USB sockets, an analogue output, three (yes, three) headphone outputs and, last but not least, aptX Bluetooth connectivity.

A rechargeable battery too

And it's portable! That's right, Chord has even found enough room inside that petite aluminium casework for built-in rechargeable batteries. A two-hour charge should be good enough for 12 hours' use. It's really going above and beyond the call of duty for a product of its type, and should be applauded.

But even with the exhaustive feature set, Chord hasn't taken its eye off the ball with regards sound quality. Hugo's as happy and communicative with a 320kbps Spotify stream as it is feeding off the meaty resolution of a DSD music file. Start with a basic Bluetooth stream of *Me And My Shadow* by Frank Sinatra and Sammy Davis Jr., and the Chord transports you straight to the smoky clubs of 1960s Las Vegas. The Chord's desire for detail and natural tone really brings the vocals to the fore. Trumpets

and drums sound realistic and pure. They're brought to life with amazing dynamics and really drive home the swing and sway of the tune.

Speed up the tempo with Sam Smith's *Money On My Mind*, and the Hugo's happy to go with the flow. The sprightly drums keep the track light on its feet but there's still weight and solidity too. The Hugo gets the balance of drive and restraint spot on. Each click and clap is defined suitably. The beat really takes hold thanks to the Chord's ability to lock onto rhythms, and organise them.

The Chord's neutral, even-handed approach to music is as evident whether you're using it as a DAC or headphone amp - the Hugo is a device of many talents and plenty of charm.

Fostex HP-A8 £1150



Fostex isn't a brand that springs to mind when you think of DACs or digital preamplifiers. But the company isn't exactly alien to audio. Fostex was, indeed still is, a key player in professional recording equipment. But in recent years its portfolio has broadened to include active speakers and headphones.

Reading the specifications for the HP-A8, it seems Fostex has been doing its homework. On paper, there's nothing that puts it at a serious disadvantage against rival machines. There's 24-bit/192kHz support across all digital inputs: USB, two optical and one coaxial digital, all of which live on the back of the unit.

SD card slot

One thing we weren't expecting to see is an SD card slot. This isn't a feature we see regularly - it's actually something we're more used to on a TV - but it does allow you to fill a high-capacity card with high-res, DSD music files and play them back through the Fostex. Another way of enjoying DSD files off your computer is by installing the latest

version of the Fostex Audio Player (downloadable from its site) for a Mac or PC (provided you're running a compatible operating system). It's a simple, stripped piece of playback software that does exactly what it says: you add high-res music to a playlist and take it from there. Twin outputs on the front of the HP-A8 allow you to connect different pairs of headphones. The adjustable gain adds flexibility and compatibility with different types of cans. Being picky, it would be good to see Bluetooth, but it isn't a deal-breaker.

Build quality is okay, but it can't match rivals such as the Cambridge 851D. The switches and dials on the front feel a bit cheap, and although the display is legible enough it isn't a patch on the green-and-black OLED on the Naim DAC-V1. Play a DSD file of Marvin Gaye's *What's Going On* and the Fostex starts well. Vocals and instruments sound silky smooth, rich and refined. There's a good level of detail and the controlled, even tonal balance means you can just sit back and enjoy this timeless classic.

Spend more time with the Fostex though, and you discover the DAC never

really gets out of first gear. Instead of sounding punchy and playful, the HP-A8 is too polite and it doesn't make for particularly memorable listening.

Play the *Superman* theme by the City of Prague Philharmonic Orchestra and the Fostex sounds more reserved than rousing. While leading rivals inspire you to reach for your top button and run to the nearest phone booth, the Fostex barely raises an eyelid. Strings and wind instruments, while perfectly palatable, don't have the dynamics to excite.

We don't want to be too down on the Fostex, though. It has sonic limitations, but it never really offends. And with a few tweaks here and there, there's nothing to say Fostex can't go on to make great strides in this market.

Naim DAC-V1 £1250

In this line-up, the V1's distinctive green and black styling and shoebox design make it immediately recognisable as a Naim product. The aluminium shell, OLED display, soft-touch buttons and tactile volume control all enhance the fit and finish. The plastic remote control lets the side down slightly, but we've seen worse at this price range.

Like the other products on test, part of the Naim's digital DNA is the asynchronous USB port, for connecting directly to a laptop. Likewise, it also acts as a preamplifier, with coaxial, optical and BNC inputs for hooking up sources.

Futureproofing

These can handle music up to 24-bit/192kHz, while the USB port is capable of 24-bit/384kHz. Music at this ultra-high resolution isn't yet widely available but, while there's an element of futureproofing here, some may find the current lack of DSD support a little disappointing. Naim isn't afraid to update its products if there's enough demand for a particular feature though, so never say never...

But we won't linger too long on this minor quibble, especially when the Naim

sounds as exceptional as it does. The V1 has the ability to sound driven, focused and dramatic when required, but also boasts the flexibility to shift down through the gears for greater subtlety and finesse with more delicate tracks.

Play Elton John's *Rocket Man* through the coaxial input and the Naim peels back layer after layer of detail. There's a real sense of rhythm and fluidity to the easy-going piano play.

The lazy bass guitar bobs along in the background and each note is delivered with laser-guided precision. You never feel disconnected or indifferent about the track, which is always a sign of quality kit

Move over to the unit's asynchronous USB input and Kanye West's *Black Skinhead* injects a change of pace and drive, which the V1 wastes no time communicating. The Naim now shows us the more powerful, robust side to its character. The track's hefty, almost tribal drumbeat is hammered home with interest, as is the aggression in West's voice. There's a great feeling of space, married to top-drawer dynamics, both of which ramp up the entertainment factor.

And the good times continue when we switch to using the Naim as a headphone amp. Through a decent pair of cans, the V1 maintains its sense of focus and direction. The Naim still manages to deliver a relatively lowly 256kbps iTunes version of Adele's *Skyfall* with gusto, delivering verses with delicacy and the chorus with a fantastic sense of drama.

Revisiting the unit

As you can probably tell, our opinion on the DAC-V1 hasn't really changed since we handed out its Award. Revisiting the unit just reinforces how talented it still is, but there's still some stern opposition, particularly from the talented Chord Hugo. Turn the page for our verdict...

Once you hear the Hugo, there's no going back. Track after track the Chord impresses, excelling in ways that rivals at this price simply cannot match. It's rare to come across a product offering so much on every level.


The Award-winning Naim sounds very good, but even the V1 has to hold its hands up in recognition of the Chord's uncanny attention to detail and sublime dynamic skills.

Having said that, fans of the Naim sound will have a lot of joy: there's a great sense of clarity and transparency, and it sounds beautifully balanced. On paper, the 851D talks the right language. And upon viewing, the Cambridge has the appearance, build quality and features that should really make it a genuine contender. But when it comes down to sound quality, it just struggles to summon the charisma and character needed to strike up a relationship with the listener.

Fine-tune the Fostex

The Fostex needs more fine-tuning, but it feels as if there's some good potential there to be worked on. There's a decent sense of weight and solidity to the sound - but there's just no spark to make it stand out. And after all, we listen to music to be entertained, not just to pass the time.

an any piece of hi-fi ever justify costing £30,000? We're not so sure. But if the price isn't an issue, and you're really serious about vinyl replay, this Kronos turntable is as good a starting point as any.

As we'd expect, there's serious engineering involved here, and a few ideas that, while not unique, are uncommon. The twin-platter arrangement gets top billing here.

Why use two platters when everyone else thinks one is enough? Well, if you have a suspended turntable design (such as this one) there's a tendency for the sub-chassis - the bit that supports the platter and arm - to try to turn in the

direction of the spinning platter. Think of a bucket full of water being stirred slowly by a spoon. Given enough time all the water will spin along with the stirring motion. Of course the subchassis never actually spins because it's held by the suspension, but what does happen is an unsteady equilibrium that (Kronos says) affects the deck's ability to produce the finest of details.

Improves resolution

The addition of a second identical platter spinning in the opposite direction is said to cancel out this movement, and so improves resolution. We disabled the drive to the second platter - in other words, took the belts off - and the deck certainly sounded messier and less

insightful. So the twin-platter system obviously works. But there are obvious downsides to this arrangement beyond the additional expense and mechanical complexity. By adding a second platter, and a motor to drive it, there is an issue with greater mechanical noise in the turntable structure – never a good thing. Kronos has tried to minimise this with the use of high-quality DC motors and a well-engineered main-bearing design.

The spinning speed of both platters is controlled electronically by using optical sensors that read the markers imprinted on the edge of the platters. The individual speed read-outs are on a large digital display at the front of the deck.

Aside from the drive system, Kronos has taken care with the turntable

structure. Its top plate, sub-chassis and base all use a layered construction of metal and high-density wood. This delivers a rigid but well-damped structure, which is suspended with Viton/silicon (posh rubber) O-rings.

Overall build is as solid as you'd hope, and there's no denying the impressively high quality of the engineering involved in the mechanical components. The Kronos is not beyond criticism though, and we'd like to see better attention to detail, particularly in its finish.

For example, the central wooden layers of the top plate and sub-chassis aren't machined to perfection, and in some areas we could feel what we think is glue residue on the outer, visible edge. It needs to be better. Clearaudio has

decks that have a similar layered construction and does a notably better job in terms of finish. Kronos needs to pay much more

attention here.

The turntable weighs in at a seriously hefty 41kg, and that's before the arm and cartridge are added. If you have the space, the solidly made dedicated support table - add another £10k - performs well, but the deck shouldn't have any issue being used with another support as long as it is large, rigid and structurally well behaved.

There's enough flexibility in the Kronos's design to accommodate most suitably talented tone arms. Our review sample came equipped with the highly rated Graham Phantom II arm (£3995) and Lyra Skala cartridge (£2895), to good effect.

Set-up is pretty straightforward, but given the price level we would expect the dealer to optimise the deck on site. It's pretty simple to use: on/off and the speed change are The solidly made, dedicated support table will cost you another £10k.

controlled by a couple of touch-sensitive switches on the base. These aren't particularly responsive and there's a knack to using them. Initially, we got pretty frustrated with the lack of response, but familiarity meant such issues faded.

The price, understandably, leads to the expectation that the Kronos wows from the off. It doesn't. This is a deck we took some time to warm to. It has a

measured, understated approach that garners admiration over time.

Playing a complex piece of music such as Radiohead's 15 Step, the Kronos takes it all in stride. We're taken with the level of clarity, and the deck's way of delivering each sound with precision without losing sight of the musical whole. Most turntables tend to turn this into a bit of a mess, making a lot of the sounds feel like random events, but that isn't the case here. The Kronos is cohesive, organised and fully in charge. It's mighty impressive in this regard.

Dynamics - both large- and small-scale - are beautifully defined and

convincingly fluid. There's plenty of punch to the distinctive bassline of *15 Step*, and the deck has no trouble communicating the drive and pacing of the piece.

A switch to our reference Clearaudio Innovation Wood - a mere snip at around a quarter of the price - shows that there's greater exuberance in the piece than the Kronos reveals, but it's at the expense of resolution and precision. For the first time ever we find our reference turntable a little unruly and lacking fine detail. It's quite eye opening.

Something grander

Move on to something grander, such as Beethoven's *Fifth Symphony*, and the Kronos responds with a huge sound stage that's impressively wide and surprisingly deep. There's a pleasing sense of space to the recording and a wonderful stability to instruments as the music grows in intensity. The tonality of the arm and cartridge chosen is spot on, and overall they make really good partners for the turntable.

We're also taken by the authority of the complete package and the power it delivers during crescendos in the music. There's little feeling of holding back, and it makes for an engaging experience.

Hear the Kronos in a suitably talented system and there's no denying it's a hugely capable product. That price puts it beyond

the means of most people, but it does show the sonic heights a humble record can reach. The Kronos isn't perfect; no product, no matter how expensive, is. But it is an incredibly tempting piece of kit nonetheless.

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

e've always had a soft spot for Triangle's speakers. This French company may not always turn out the best-balanced products, but it invariably comes up with speakers that entertain, and for us that's priceless.

Triangle has always prioritised excitement over refinement and tonal purity. Move towards the upper end of the company's output and the trade-off become less marked. And that's the case with the Signature Deltas.

The Signature Deltas are certainly not cheap, but they offer a level of performance well beyond what we would expect from their price tag. We've heard speakers that sound a whole lot worse and cost a whole lot more.

In terms of engineering there's little here to surprise anyone familiar with the brand. The Signature Delta is a three-way design that uses twin 18.5cm glassfibre bass drivers, while for the midrange Triangle sticks to a damped paper cone, pointing towards the material's balance between rigidity, low weight and decent internal damping as justification.

The drive-unit array is completed by one of Triangle's trademark horn-loaded aluminium dome tweeters. The idea is to improve sensitivity - something Triangle is big on - while keeping distortion low.

Well made and elegant

Build quality is good. The cabinet is made of seven thin layers of high-density fibreboard, curved to produce what we think is quite an elegant shape. It's finished in one of three high-gloss options: the mahogany of our review sample looks good but there are white and black alternatives too.

The front-firing port is made of plastic (not unusual) but looks a little cheap, while the spiking arrangement isn't quite as rigid as we'd like.

The Signature Delta's rated sensitivity is impressively high at 92dB/W/m. We certainly got very high levels from our resident Bryston BP26/4BSST2 pre/power combination without pushing too hard. Such high sensitivity means that you should get good volume levels from relatively low-power amplifiers too.

Entertainment comes first

Start listening and it's clear that the Signature Deltas are entertainers of the highest order. We start off with Hans Zimmer's *Mombasa* (from the *Inception* soundtrack) and are stunned with the Delta's dynamics. These floorstanders punch hard and don't hold back. Yet, when necessary, they go quiet easily too.

Tonally, things are mostly balanced, but we've heard more even-handed speakers at this level. Still, they're refined enough for all their good qualities to shine through. We love Triangle's direct, hard-hitting approach to music replay. It's in stark contrast to some of the more traditional alternatives, which tend to put refinement and tonal purity first.

Stereo imaging is good rather than great - not as expansive as we've heard, but reasonably precise. We positioned the speakers well away from all walls, fairly wide apart with a small degree of toe-in. They have a fairly narrow listening sweet spot - something to bear in mind if you tend to do serious listening with other people.

We turn the volume up - all in the interest of science, you understand - and are impressed by the way these speakers

The sound doesn't harden up or get aggressive at the top end. These Triangles are articulate and agile, tracking fast-moving basslines with ease. Each low-frequency transient is delivered with exceptional punch.

While the tweeter isn't the sweetest around - certainly compared with the Diamond alternative of B&W - it's fast, insightful and well integrated.

Triangle speakers usually excel at rhythms and these floorstanders are no exception. They're happy to charge along with the likes of Kanye West's *Yeezus*, pounding out the beats with conviction and communicating changes of pace with breathtaking ease.

Add this terrific timing ability to strong dynamics and impressive resolution, and you have speakers that can stand toe-to-toe with the very best of the opposition. Triangle may not be the first name that comes to mind when thinking about five-grand floorstanders, but on this evidence it should be.

Remaking or 'rebooting' a cult classic tends to lead to no end of trouble - but *RoboCop* isn't the train wreck it could so easily have been.

That's not to say it's a patch on the original - let's get that straight from the off. This is inferior in nearly every way. But it does have some merits, and doesn't deserve to be dismissed too quickly.

The premise is mostly the same. A policeman ('Cop') is severely injured in the line of duty, and then made into a machine ('Robo') by an evil organisation.

It's a chance to bash the corporate world. In 1987, it was done with panache: lashings of biting satire on top of the so-nasty-it's-funny sort of childish ultraviolence.

That's largely been replaced with a straight-up political angle. Hey, drones are topical, let's mention those! Without the humour, it's less effective.

Where this version succeeds is in its boldness. It doesn't slavishly repeat the original. There are a few references for the scrutinising fans, but for better or worse this mostly charts its own course.

Alex Murphy is no longer a machine slowly regaining his humanity: he is now man coping with robotic bits.

This allows for elements of body horror, which are effective. It also raises questions about the ethics of man-machine integration.

All a bit one-dimensional

Sadly, that's all undermined by one-dimensional characters with very little to do. Grieving wife, check. Leather-clad mobsters, check. At least Gary Oldman has a decent role as a conflicted scientist reluctantly following corporate bosses, while Samuel L Jackson is shoutier than ever as a militant TV show host.

It doesn't help that the action is uninspired. RoboCop never does anything particularly smart or cool. Instead, the film periodically becomes a bland videogame with an uncharismatic Iron Man clone.

Thankfully, it sounds thrilling. Robocop's mechanical footsteps are wonderfully bass-heavy, and bound to annoy your neighbours in DTS HD Master Audio 5.1. The Zimmer-lite soundtrack is easily forgotten, but it does have a pounding enthusiasm - and Basil Poledouris's original main theme is kept intact. It looks good too, with a surprising amount of colour in what could have been very grey.

Ultimately, this *RoboCop* is occasionally fun (if rarely memorable) as long as you approach it with an open mind. It's certainly a lot more enjoyable than *RoboCop 2* or 3. We wouldn't buy that for a dollar – but we might stream it on Netflix.

Deities have acolytes everywhere, of course, but nonetheless there's still something vaguely extraordinary about two Swedish sisters so sincerely and effectively channelling the melodies of Jimmy Webb, the harmonies of The Carter Family and occasionally flashing the attitude of Johnny Cash.

For their third album, First Aid Kit (Klara and Johanna Söderberg) have polished their Nashville touchstones on the tunes and played up their Agnetha/Anni-Frid vibe on the cover. Opener (and first single) *My Silver*

Lining comprehensively establishes the Stay Gold manifesto: widescreen strings, relentless and touch-tight harmonies, gentle-but-insistently shuffling tempo and medium-sized melodic hook.

A tasteful peak of intensity

Admittedly there's little in the way of dynamic variation here. Instead *Stay Gold* establishes a tasteful peak of intensity at the outset and seldom gets much quieter or louder – and certainly not without plenty of advance warning.

It's a sweet-sounding recording though, and is heard to best advantage on a set-up that's sympathetic to the warm, complex tonality of fiddles, picked steel-string acoustic and pedal steel guitars. On Master Pretender, The Bell, Fleeting One and the title track in particular, the emphasis on the midrange, and the amount of nuance and detail therein, really separates a great system from a good one.

LITTLE DRAGON Nabuma Rubberband Out now

Four albums in seven years ain't bad going in this day and age. And given that each Little Dragon release since 2007's eponymous debut has been an improvement on (if far from a radical departure from) the last, it seems there are still some bands with the work ethic and the quality control

The Little Dragon signature sound – streamlined and wide-open, often with a skeletal demo-like spaciousness and always with a crystalline vocal cradled carefully away from the drone and clatter – is

strongly to the fore. But, and perhaps for the first time, there's a unity and coherence to the eleven-and-a-bit tracks here that makes *Nabuma Rubberband* a more self-possessed album than any of those that preceded it.

A good system tester

In terms of pushing your system into breaking sweat, Nabuma Rubberband has plenty to recommend it. First single Klapp Klapp, along with Pretty Girls, Paris and, especially, Killing Me all have the sort of hyper-extended low-end presence, grindingly analogue midrange texture and liberal application of Syndrum that makes organisation, stereo focus and transient detail retrieval absolutely paramount. Punch is nothing without control, of course, and unless it has the ability to start and stop on the proverbial, your set-up is going to struggle. If it can, though, here's a recording of rare authority and unshowy power.

Initially, it's fairly smart. Neeson's detective work is as subtle as the fasten-seatbelt light. Tension is maintained as passengers drop off in mysterious ways and the terrorist is clearly in control. The Sherlock-style on-screen text taunting is effective, if overused.

It does have a daft ending, where Neeson defies the laws of physics to save the day. Oh, and Julianne Moore is pointless in it.

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



LCD with **LED** blacklight

LCD (Liquid Crystal Display) sets are the most common type of TV. They use a backlight that shines through the coloured pixels to send the image into the room. On the best sets, standards get close to good Plasma televisions. LCD sets tend to be slim and light, making them better for wall-mounting.



Despite being a new piece of technology,
OLED has come a long way in the last few years.
It uses a layer of organic molecules that emit
light when a current is passed through them –
and because it requires so little electricity and
circuitry, the panels are incredibly thin and are
often used for the screens seen in curved TVs.



Plasma displays don't have a backlight; instead each pixel emits its own light. In the past, this has given Plasmas a contrast advantage, since when a pixel is turned off, it's completely black. With Panasonic leaving the Plasma market it looks like a fading technology, but if done well can still deliver great results.



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
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

You've bought a new TV and discovered that the flat panel makes the sound a bit tinny and it lacks bass. What you need is something with a bit more grunt...

Soundbars

A soundbar is one option. Some will come with a separate subwoofer that sits on the floor for beefier bass and while inputs and outputs aren't plentiful, a few will have a combination of HDMI, coaxial and optical (but most soundbars don't). Some are wireless capable, with apps like Spotify available.

Soundbases

We've tested a number of soundbases in recent months and the idea of a one-box solution that sits under your telly is one that appeals if space is at a premium. Connectivity tends to be limited to a few inputs and Bluetooth, but the size of the unit makes for a chunky, hefty sound. We expect the next generation of soundbases to be even better.

Hi-fi Speakers

Hi-fi loudspeakers tend give you a better all-round sound at a higher price points but bear in mind that you'll need speaker cables and amplifier (to drive the speakers) too.

Powered Speakers

They're not the only options though. Powered speakers (which have amps built in) can do a similar job, are relatively small and some have optical/HDMI connections. need to save space

We reviewed the Z2 in the current issue and were stunned by its build quality and screen but where it really excels for a smartphone is in its top notch sound. Its built-in speakers are better than most and the handset also features aptX Bluetooth, which produces a much better sound than standard Bluetooth.

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

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The end for MP3?

If you own a half decent hi-fi system, using 'FLAC' instead of 'MP3' files could be music to everyone's ears

For those of us that consider themselves a music lover, albeit to different degrees, we are part of a very fortunate generation. We now have access to an ever-growing wealth of recorded music of extraordinary range and depth, effectively accumulated over the last 60 years. With the

introduction of the microgroove LP record in the early 1950's, playback quality took a quantum leap forward and this also coincided with a far higher standard of recording techniques. Although further improvements have been made over the years, this was a watershed time that first introduced hi-fi as a reality.

Listening to music has many benefits

Hi-Fi is, of course, a means to an end – the reproduction of music.

Many studies over the years have shown remarkable benefits for mankind through listening to music. Making music is intrinsic to all cultures and music is often used for various therapeutic purposes because it involves using the whole brain. It is believed to improve memory and intelligence, improve physical development and coordination, reduce stress and blood pressure, and even reduce levels of pain.

We now have literally millions of recorded music tracks available to us in all genres and many different formats. One trend over recent years, however, has been to deliberately downgrade the quality in order to offer quantity. The main culprits have been MP3 and AAC formats which were designed as a low cost form of delivery when download speeds were slow and computer chip memory was expensive. Neither now applies and both formats should be consigned to history

along with 78 rpm records and the 8-track cartridge. Unfortunately, such is the current market penetration of MP3 and AAC formats that many people today are listening to a considerably lower quality of music reproduction than their peers back in the 1970's.

Bach - my favourite!

Quality vs quantity

Let us explain. The maximum resolution from MP3 and AAC file formats, which are both highly compressed, is 320 kbps (kilobytes per second) which compares with CD quality of 1411 kbps. This means the resolution quality is less than a quarter of that provided by a standard CD. However, most MP3 or AAC files are downloaded over the internet and the most used download resolution is 128 kbps, which is around one-eleventh of CD quality. This should ring alarm bells. If you are only playing back these tracks on an iPod or mobile phone with a pair of earbuds, the quality may be irrelevant to

you. But if these tracks are your primary source of music, perhaps with an iPod dock into a decent hi-fi system, you are only making a very poor quality sound louder. Information is irretrievably lost and the full dynamic range is lacking. The quality will be very poor in contrast with a full

resolution version even if you are completely unaware of the loss you are inflicting upon yourself. This can even affect the type of music listened to as most classical recordings downloaded as an MP3 or AAC file will have so much information missing, and all the complexities of the music lost, with the end result that the recording is reduced to just the essence of a tune.

What is the future of recorded music?

There are now positive signs for the future of recorded music. Audiophiles, or hi-fi connoisseurs, have been very important to the music industry as they are generally avid music lovers who aim to maximise their enjoyment by listening to music at its best quality level, which means the play-back of great recordings through hi-end hi-fi to achieve the most outstanding results. Without

them, a main driver for quality would probably be removed from the music industry. They have always sought out quality but there is now an increasing awareness among the wider public of the serious deficiencies of the highly compressed formats. Full resolution audio streaming, as well as CD quality downloads, are already available and will surely become the eventual norm with this greater awareness of the tremendous quality benefit. Consumers will vote through their purchases and will seek out higher resolution recordings. Look at Qobuz for a new high-profile entry into this field who offer CD quality (16 bit/44.1 kHz FLAC) streaming for over 15 million tracks.

The reality is that audiophiles and specialist hifi retailers (and the ones listed on this page represent the UK's finest) are essential to each other.

Headphones: What to consider?

Know you over-ear from your openbacked cans? Here's a simple guide to the differences between each one.

Open-backed or closed?

Open-backed designs tend to leak your music to the outside world but deliver what many people say is a more natural, transparent sound. That's fine for running, but not too sociable at work or on the train. For commuting, look for a closed-back design that seals in the sound. AKG's K55Os (right) are a fine choice for those looking to keep their choice of music to themselves.



Over-ear or in-ear?

Over-ears tend to be better for power and openess, but good earphones are still more than worthy. Smartphones come with their own, basic brand but we'd upgrade to the SoundMagic E1Os for a better experience. Over-ears are ideal for a long journey where noise is always high. Look for a noise-cancelling option to shut the snorers out if you can find a pair at a suitable price.





Stereo systems

This category includes a wide range of products including all-in-one packages where the speakers are part of the system, through to micro systems where the electronics are housed separately from the speakers. A streaming option is available on many newer systems.

Multi-room: An introduction

Multi-room streaming is set to become a lot more popular in 2014 but what exactly is it and how do you stand to benefit from a multi-room set-up?

We would generally classify a multi-room set-up as one that allows the user the ability to share or stream content from a source (smartphone, tablet, PC or NAS drive, for example) to different zones (or receivers) around the house.

The number of zones you have will dictate the number of streaming options available. Some multi-room set-ups are rather limited in what you can do with them, while others (such as Sonos) allow for a lot of freedom in how you want to set your system up.

Most wireless speakers need to be within a certain range of the music source to work (around 10m), and so as long as the receiver is in range then grouping your speakers together should not be too much of a problem and in most cases can be done via an app. You can link by

using your home mains network through a series of adapters too. But do remember that each speaker will add to cost of a multi-room system and they're not cheap. A two system speaker can set you back £400 and a more extensive set-up that covers several rooms can set you back thousands of pounds.

Conveniently the majority of devices can stream via wi-fi (local network) and Bluetooth while some companies feature their own proprietary technology such as Apple's AirPlay or Sonos' own wireless protocol.

There's freedom to play content source locally (i.e. digital files stored on a hard drive/NAS device) or from integrated third party apps such as Google Play Music or Spotify although you'll have to pay a subscription to access third party apps.



And the music? The ability with some multi-room players to play different music in each zone is a useful one but the really clever feature is synchronising your music across a number of devices, meaning you can pause one, walk to another, and continue where you left off. Despite that, a multi-room set-up won't best a dedicated hi-fi separate in terms of sound quality.

And very few set-ups support 24-bit/192kHz playback files and considering the bandwidth required you may be better off listening to a separate system that supports it.

In terms of convenience though, you'll be hard pressed to find a better solution to listening to your music without having to move you hi-fi gear from room to room.

How it works: PonoMusic

Kickstarted to the tune of \$6.2 million, PonoMusic promises a 'revolution' in how we listen to music. But just how will it work?

With its successful Kickstarter campaign behind it, the Neil Young-backed start-up is aiming for a 'revolution in music listening', that's a laudable cause for sure, but can it succeed?

Eschewing compressed MP3s and low-bitrate downloads, PonoMusic will offer a sizeable library of high-res music files, which will play on any compatible high-res audio player or, preferably for Young and co., the PonoPlaver.

There are two parts to the PonoMusic equation. The physical part is the PonoPlayer. Despite being shaped like a famous chocolate bar (a prism to be more exact), it's what's on the inside that counts

with this portable music player.

The PonoPlayer claims high-end components for top-quality sound, from a class-leading DAC to a natural-sounding digital filter.

A digital music ecosystem

The player will have 64GB of onboard storage with a removable MicroSD slot (an extra 64GB) bringing it to storage parity with Sony's NWZ-ZX1 high-res Walkman, albeit less than the Apple iPod Classic (160GB).

The second part of the equation is the PonoMusic online store, music app and desktop



music management software.

The pricing of albums has been set for America but there's been no word on any pricing outside the US, with \$15 to \$25 expected to be the sweet spot for lossless. DRM-free albums.

Due for a US release in October 2014, the PonoMusic venture aims to bring high-res audio to a larger, mainstream audience. We shall see.

Jargon buster: File formats

AAC: A compressed audio format that has a bitrate of 256kbps. AIFF: A lossless, uncompressed format that's popular on Apple systems. ALAC: Also known as Apple Lossless. It's a lossless data-compression format that works only with Apple devices.

FLAC: A lossless format that claims to offer no loss in audio quality. Also has the ability to embed metadata.

MP3: A compression system limited to 320kbps. Good for small hard drives. WAV: A music file format that's used to store uncompressed audio.

Which OS? iOS

So many tablets, so very few operating systems. Each one is good but what, exactly, are they good at? First up is iOS...

When you think of mobile operating systems, Apple iOS is probably the first that comes to mind. With the release of the seventh version last year, the staleness of previous iterations has been wiped away with a brighter, more transparent look.

Like it or not. iOS is slick and fast with a simple, uncluttered interface. Whether it's through a swipe, double tap or multi -finger gestures, you can navigate the many apps (one million plus), a number

Apple Maps is getting better but it's still behind Google Maps that only Android can rival. We'd temper its advantage with the notion that you wouldn't use too many apps but, then again, more is better.

iOS 7 has brought many improvements to Apple's own apps with Control Center bringing easy access to your settings and both the Messaging and Mail apps overhauled. It still has faults elsewhere though. Siri, Apple's voice recognition assistant, remains inconsistent and the Maps app can frustrate.

If it's entertainment you're looking for then you'll find a wealth of it to sate your appetite. With the iTunes Store, iOS has a comprehensive entertainment centre that covers, music, ebooks, films, podcasts, TV shows and much more without breaking into a sweat. Film downloads are available in 1080p (you can rent and buy in standard definition



too), and music at a bitrate of 256kpbs (AAC format, ALAC is still not available through the store). Some tracks have also been encoded using the 'Mastered for iTunes' software, which some claim produces higher sound quality.

In terms of productivity apps Apple has a wide range that includes Microsoft Office, Adobe's Creative suite, Google Docs' online storage lockers such as Dropbox, Google Drive, and Microsoft's OneDrive. And with Apple's own creativity apps such as GarageBand, KeyNote and Numbers, there's a variety of options to choose from.

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
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amsung wasn't always the all-dominating TV juggernaut it is today. As far as we're concerned it all kicked off with the PS-50Q7 plasma TV we reviewed back in October 2006.

Until then, Samsung was an also-ran in our tests. It got the occasional four-star review, but that was usually because it offered a decent set at an aggressive price, rather than having a product that could stand toe-to-toe with the best from Sony or Panasonic.

The PS-50Q7 started the change. This plasma still undercut rivals massively - it was £1600 cheaper than the mighty Pioneer PDP-506XDE - but it had a good picture too. This was a straightforward TV, like everything else on the market, and not a home entertainment hub in the way we expect now.

Fast forward to the curved UE65H8000 (see page 8) and it's obvious that Samsung has built strongly on the PS-50Q7's foundation. The brand now leads the TV world as far as technology is concerned, and to a large degree sets the standard for performance at each price point.

It's a powerful position in the market place, one that many a rival will want to emulate. We wish them luck.



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
